Only \$959.33 Has Been Raised In Greenville for Near East Relief So Far
PUBLIC URGED TO CONTRIBUTE SOON AS POSSIBLE NOW
Cause Said to be One of Greatest American People Have Contributed to

While the Near East Relief campaign is meeting with only slight interest in Greenville at present time it was stated at campaign headquarters this morning that \$959.33 of the \$1,800 quota had been raised. This is hardly over half of the required sum and the public is urged to contribute liberally within the next few days so that the town may not fail in this great cause.

Bethel people have rallied to the call in a handsome way, as reports received from committee members this morning showed that over \$137 had been contributed. Other towns have given freely also, but the total amount has never been reported. The quota for the entire county, however, is \$3,600 and there is yet a long way to travel before this amount has been raised.

People desiring to contribute in a few days, and unless action is taken now Greenville will fall short of what the state campaign committee expects of her.

The cause is one of the greatest the American people have had an opportunity of giving to in years, and if they fail to respond as liberally as they should thousands of helpless women and children will starve to death during the cold winter months. The Near East people only need assistance this year as when another harvest season rolls around they may be able to take care of themselves. Disease and starvation, however, have resulted in a heavy toll of life and thousands will die even before this aid reaches them.

Preliminary Hearings Sought by Individuals Complained Against

Paris, July 5.—Agitation has been started for the adoption by France of the American system of "preliminary hearings" in cases where complaint has been brought against an individual or for some other reform of the present methods, which date from the time of Napoleon.

Any person, however good his record, who is charged by another person with a crime or misdemeanor, may, under the present system be subjected to all sorts of indignities and his reputation ruined for life, according to a legal authority writing in Le Matin.

Whether you are accused of murdering your cook or filching an article out of your neighbor's icebox—only the French don't have iceboxes—or slandering somebody, or refusing to pay your rent, or anything at all, you are held to be guilty until you prove yourself innocent and treated that way.

According to the article, an accused person is practically subject to the whim of the judge to whom the accusation is made. He can be called at any hour, his effects can be searched and his servants and friends questioned; his credit can be curtailed at the bank; he can even be arrested and thrown into jail. "No matter if he is the most honest of men and the complainant a scamp, the unhappy one has become the accused," writes the authority. "The fact that it may be the first time a man is haled into court makes no difference at all."

"If a man is proved innocent by trial and released from jail or embarrassing surveillance the odium still clings," says the authority. "He has only two resources—he may get a sort of certificate of innocence from the judge, and he may sue the complainant for calumny. Neither," the writer concludes, "is much satisfaction especially as the neighbors, enjoying gossip too much to let it die, never again act the same as before toward the accused," although his innocence has been legally proved."

Board for Second Time Intervenes and Prevents Walkout of Shop Workers
HOPE FOR EARLY RECOVERY GIVEN OUT EARLY TODAY
Jewell Says Shopmen Are Ready and Willing to Consider Settlement

Chicago, July 6.—A threatened extension of the strike of railway shopmen to include 12,000 signal men was prevented today by members of the United States Railroad Labor Board when D. W. Helt, head of the Brotherhood of Railroad Signal men, which has been taking a strike vote, promised to maintain the status quo pending further conferences.

It was the second time that intervention of board members has averted an extension of the walkout, a threatened strike of maintenance of way men having been prevented Tuesday through the efforts of Chairman Ben W. Hooper and E. L. McMenimen, labor members of the board.

Meanwhile, railway circles expressed strong hopes of a quick settlement of the shopmen's strike. B. M. Jewell, head of the shopmen, today reiterated former statements that the shopmen were willing to consider a settlement proposition submitted to them by any authoritative board.

The situation is improving so far as the strike is concerned, Mr. Jewell said, asserting that he had received reports from several points that "what few men that did remain at work last Saturday and Monday joined the walkout Wednesday."

Mr. Jewell said he had received a telegram from J. F. Valentine, of Cincinnati, head of the International Moulder's Union, authorizing a walkout of 2,500 moulders employed on railroads. He also exhibited telegrams from heads of the ladies' auxiliaries of the shopmen's organizations in which it was stated that the women were doing picket duty.

President Sends Letter to Men Offering Them Jobs Back With Inducements
ULTIMATUMS ALSO ISSUED BY OTHER RAILWAY LEADERS
Men Who Fail to Return July 10 Will be Declared Out of Employment

Wilmington, July 6.—Two thousand letters to striking employees, appealing to them to resume work, were mailed from the office of president John R. Kenly, of the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad today.

The letters offer former seniority pass privileges and protection and benefits of the relief and pension departments to all who resume work prior to Monday, July 10th, and warns that those not reporting for duty by that time will be considered as out of the employ of the company, and will lose all rights of seniority.

It is asserted in the letters that the strike is not against the railroad company, but against the people of the United States to thwart the purpose of law by force.

The sixth day of the strike of railroad shopmen in Atlanta found both sides divergent claims—some railroad officials insisting that the places of the strikers were being filled and union leaders declaring that their ranks remained unbroken. Pickets were stationed at all shops, but no disorders were reported.

The ultimatum of the Georgia and the Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis railroads and the Atlanta terminal resulted in the return of some men, officials stated, but no figures were announced. The last of these ultimatums expired this morning and officials said that strikers who now return must do so as new employees.

No efforts to replace the strikers have been made by the Southern, Seaboard Airline or Central of Georgia, but local executives said all men who can qualify for work will be accepted.

Harrison Charges Republicans With Trying to Restrict Yield in Cuban Fields
SENATOR SMOOT IS ALLEGED TO HAVE ENGINEERED DEAL
Believes Republicans Would Have Cubans Restrict Cuba Yield if Possible

Washington, July 6.—Renewing discussion of the Republican petition for cloture on the tariff bill Senator Harrison, Democrat, Mississippi, told the Senate today Democrats planned when the sugar schedule was reached "to expose the deal attempted to be put over" by Senator Smoot, of Utah, ranking Republican on the finance committee whereby Cuba would have restricted its sugar production in return for lower tariff duties on that commodity. He argued that this was one of the reasons why the Republicans wanted to cut off discussion on the tariff.

Senator Harrison charged that Senator Smoot had written a letter to Major General Enoch H. Crowder, representative of the American government in Cuba, with a view "to straining Cuba into entering a contract to restrict its sugar crop to 2,500,000 tons and in return was to receive a tariff not so high as that proposed."

"We wouldn't have the time under the cloture rule to read the letter to General Crowder and the contract that was attempted to be put into effect," declared Senator Harrison.

The Mississippi Senator read from addresses of various Republican Senators delivered in 1918 and opposing a cloture proposed at that time by the Democrats and which would have limited general debate to one and one-half hours to each Senator and discussion of each amendment to twenty minutes for each Senator. Among others he quoted from a speech by the then Senator Harding in which Mr. Harding declared that the freedom of debate in the United States Senate is one of the highest guarantees we have of American institutions.

By Importation of Polish and Russian Children Will Aid Rehabilitation
Census of Schools Shows 16,135 Children in Schools of County the Past Year
RURAL SCHOOLS HAVE ENROLLMENT OF 12,404 PUPILS
Only Eighteen Additional Teachers Were Employed to Take Care of Increase

Paris, July 7.—Race suicide, the bugaboo of France, will be arrested by importing surplus Polish and Russian children if a campaign launched by General Maitrot in the Echo de Paris bears fruit. General Maitrot points out that while millions of children are starving in Eastern Europe because of insufficient crops, in France theopposite danger threatens; crops cannot be harvested because there are not enough hands.

The General estimates that before the war there were more than five million mal workers in the agricultural districts of France. Today there are not more than a half million, the fertile soil of France intensely cultivated should furnish food for 200,000,000 inhabitants.

Belgium has already set an example of child adoption by distributing 10,000 Polish children among the rural population. These children will be the farm hands of the next generation in Belgium. "Belgium has set the pace, let us follow," declares the editorial in the Echo de Paris.

"If the prefects can arrange a system of distributing the children it will be easy to arrange their transportation to France. We have already appropriated funds for Russian relief. They might be utilized to double advantage by transporting the starving children to France."

The Journal editorially proposes that France take better care of the children she already has. It pointed out that the health regulations regarding children have not been changed since 1874. The Journal would force each parent to keep a small book in which the health record of the child would be marked. The book would have to be endorsed by the attending physician and would tell all about the child's measles, whooping cough and mumps.

Maurice de Rothschild, member of the Chamber of Deputies, promises to introduce a measure which would enforce new respect for the health of children.

There were a total of 16,135 children attending the public schools of Pitt county during the past session, according to the school census contained in the annual report of R. G. Fitzgerald, superintendent of Public schools, which was made public yesterday. The report also showed that 7,814 of these children were white and 3,821 colored.

Enrollment for the rural schools is estimated at 12,404, of which 5,586 are white and 6,818 colored. Enrollment of the rural schools last year increased by 1,827 pupils, and the average daily attendance showed an increase of 1,892.

To take care of the increased daily attendance, Superintendent Fitzgerald's report shows that only 18 additional teachers were employed, or less than one teacher for each hundred increase in the average daily attendance. There were 50 white schools in operation during the session, and 55 colored schools, employing a total of 16 white teachers and 100 colored teachers. These figures, however, do not include Greenville and Ayden schools.

The average length of the term of white schools was 135 days and for colored schools 120 days.

There were 158,046 children transported to the rural schools of the county during the year without an accident. Every school was crowded and teachers were overworked and the need for enlargement was very evident. There are exactly 21 one teacher schools in the county, many others having been replaced by consolidated schools, greatly decreasing the cost of operation in many ways.

The report shows to what extent the county school system has increased in the last year, although the figures do not include Ayden and Greenville schools. The total census, however, includes all schools and indicates the enormous number of children under the care and supervision of our educational system while school is in session.

Copper Still Is Taken in Raids At Grimesland
Fifty Gallon Copper Still Taken by Williams and Officer Swain of Grimesland

The whiskey traffic of this section was given another paralyzing blow yesterday when Deputy Sheriff Thad Williams and Policeman Swain of Grimesland succeeded in capturing a fifty gallon copper still about two miles from Grimesland. They made an effort to locate some whiskey, but it was evident the distillers had disposed of all on hand.

The still was of the usual type used in the manufacture of corn whiskey in this part of the state and contained worm and all auxiliaries. The officers have no idea who the still belonged to, but were hopeful of catching some one at the still. They failed in this, however, as the raid happened to be made on the wrong day.

The still showed signs of constant operation, and it is believed it played an important part in supplying demands of the section.

D. L. Patrick Dies at Ayden This Afternoon

Mr. D. L. Patrick, prominent citizen of Ayden, who has been ill several months, died at his home this afternoon at one-thirty o'clock as result of a leaking heart. Funeral arrangements had not been completed this afternoon and will be announced at a later date.

The deceased is survived by two sons and two daughters, Mr. Edward Patrick of Washington, N. C., Joe Patrick, of Ayden, Mrs. Eugene Cox of Greensboro, and Mrs. W. J. Boyd of Ayden.

Mr. Patrick was seventy-six years of age, and was born and reared in Pitt county, having made his home in Ayden the past several years. He was prominently identified in the business circles of the city and his death will be received with keen regret.

ASK RECOGNITION OF MEXICAN LABOR
American Labor Has Not Been Changed by Recent Kidnapping of Americans

Washington, July 7.—The recent kidnapping of American citizens in Mexico has not changed the view of organized labor in the United States that immediate recognition should be extended the Obregon government. This statement was contained in a letter from the president of the American Federation of Labor to Secretary of State Hughes.

Washington, July 7.—The campaign of the American Federation of Labor to abolish the child labor law will be continued at a meeting to be held here July 17th by a committee of seventeen members who will be appointed by President Samuel Gompers.

PRESIDENT PLANS TO AGAIN TRY TO END COAL STRIKE
If Miners Insist on Deadlock He May Carry Out Threat of Government Operation

Columbus, July 7.—With his vacation ended, President Harding left Columbus this morning by motor for Washington where he will resume his official duties. The president will again try to get the coal mine operators to start to producing coal in face of an almost certain famine.

He has no definite program to suggest Monday but is determined that production of coal will be resumed as soon as possible and in time to stave off public suffering. If the miners and operators persist in a deadlock it was indicated that the president would make good his implied threat of seizure of the mines and government operation.

FOOD PRICES ON SLIGHT INCREASE
General Increase Noted in Eighteen Cities of the Nation During the Last Month

Washington, July 7.—Food prices in the United States are going up the labor department announced today. From May 15th to June 15th the increase in eighteen cities from three percent. The increase in New York, Pittsburgh and Newark was less than five tenths of one percent. The same situation prevailed from Washington to Portland, Maine.

STRIKER ATTEMPTS TO BURN BOX CARS ON CHICAGO LINES
Special Agent of B. & O. Held on Charge of Firing Long String of Cars

Chicago, July 7.—A plot to burn hundreds of freight cars of the Baltimore and Ohio railroad in the Chicago manufacturing district, was charged to J. Molter, special agent of the road, after the flames had partly wrecked one of the string of cars on a siding. Molter is charged with the sympathy with strikers.

MAN CHARGED WITH RUNNING OVER BOYS IS HELD UNDER BOND
Mr. Hedgepath to be Given Final Hearing Tomorrow; Only One Boy Killed

Mr. Hedgepath, of Farmville, who ran over and killed 12 year old son and seriously injured the nine year old son of Mr. David Creek, who resides two and a half miles from Farmville, was arrested yesterday and released under bond of \$1,000 for his appearance at a preliminary hearing before Magistrate W. C. Joyner tomorrow afternoon in Farmville.

County Coroner S. G. Wilkerson conducted an inquest in the case this morning, and stated that only one of the children was killed and not two as stated in first reports yesterday. The hearing could not be completed owing to lack of evidence but this will be in readiness by tomorrow afternoon when final action will be taken.

While it is still believed that the collision with the boys, who were driving a mule hitched to a tobacco truck when the crash came, was purely an accident, Mr. Hedgepath will be given an opportunity to explain details of the tragedy at the preliminary hearing.

The accident has attracted considerable interest throughout the entire county, and the conclusion of the case will be awaited expectantly everywhere.

FORD'S DREAM OF MUSCLE SHOALS IS AGAIN DISTURBED
Monster Industrial Community Will be Delayed by Action of Senate Committee

Washington, July 7.—Henry Ford's dream of the creation of a monster industrial community at Muscle Shoals through control of the great water power project will not materialize at the present session of congress, Senator Capper, Republican of Kansas, predicted today although both the senate and house agreed to delay resumption of work until October to allow time for vote on Ford's proposal.

Senator Capper declared they wouldn't reach a decision this year and that it was doubtful if the next session would reach a vote, he declared the Ford contract should give the government complete control of the project before it would be acceptable.

President Harding plans a "sterner policy" in the strike issue. It's to be hoped he does something sterner than plan, whether he accomplished anything or not.

Early settlement of the railroad strike is seen in recent statements made by members of the labor board and union chiefs, according to reports sent out yesterday afternoon. The public will hope that the people doing the seeing have summed the thing up right.

Grade crossings in Pitt county are as dangerous today as ever and unless something is done severe loss of life is likely to occur at no distant date. The situation deserves attention of every person in the county and the sooner they get busy and see what can be done the better everyone will feel about it.

The tariff bill will mean fifteen million dollars in additional cost to the American farmer, according to information given out yesterday. That being the case it looks like it is to the interest of the farmer to go on like he is. In fact, his burdens are great enough without any tariff and it is hoped the Democrats will do everything to defeat Mr. McCumber's pet bill.

Tobacco in Lenoir county has suffered about as much in Pitt county, and the loss will be probably as great in one as another. While this will hit many farms a mighty hard blow, it may be that they will recover through high prices for what is produced. This the only way by which the farmer will save himself, and goodness knows we hope it will not fail.

Strong hope for settlement of the coal strike is held out by my members of the senate, but whether they have any reasons for such cannot be said. It is believed, however, that the strike has continued as long as it should and that the operators and operatives will decide upon some plan of compromise or permanent settlement in the near future. Conditions are certainly serious enough to justify such and the sooner the miners get busy the sooner they will recover from the financial strain occasioned by long weeks of idleness.

With the cotton famine in view it looks like the price should show greater strength. The slight rise the last day or so may be the beginning of prosperity for the grower and in that case Pitt county, a great cotton producing county, will be vitally affected. While we are all interested in the fleecy staple, every one around here is much more interested in what bright leaf will bring. That prices are destined to show greater strength this year is not to be doubted and the sooner the change is in evidence after the market opens the better everyone will like it.

Now the railroads have agreed to stop farming out work it is likely that many shopmen will return to work. This was one of the main principles which the strikers were fighting for and it looks like they would find it advisable to return to their work before they begin to suffer consequences of their folly. The return of shopmen in other districts is an indication that they are satisfied, and it is believable their action will result in others following in the near future.

The public will be interested in an announcement that western Europe is recovering along agricultural lines, especially since the world is faced by a cotton famine Europe has done very

little towards supplying world demands since ending of the war and now they are expecting to be able to be able provide what they use conditions may become better. The strain has been great upon America, but we have been able to stand the pressure like real Americans.

The major part of the stick work for the Sox was done by Carson, Doran, Smith, Strinfield and Massey, each of whom secured two safeties each out of five trips to the rubber. Beall, Frazier, and Duncan secured one hit each. The only extra base hitting was done by Frazier and Carson, who were credited with doubles.

McQuinn featured with the stick for Tarboro, getting three hits out of four trips to the rubber, one of which was for an extra base. Bradley secured two singles and Marable and Crump one.

Greenville had eleven runners left on bases against Tarboro only six. The Sox did the greatest part of their scoring in the second frame when a powerful batting rally resulted in five runners reaching the checking station. Another tally was made in the fourth and one in the sixth. Tarboro scored one in the second and one in the ninth.

The game completed the series between the two teams, Greenville going to Kinston for the remainder of the week and Tarboro to New Bern. The victory gave the Sox two straight over Tarboro and one from Washington, or three games won to two lost for the entire week.

That Greenville infield works like an Elgin watch at present time, and if the boys can keep hooked up that way until the last half we are due to get a running start over the rest of the boys.

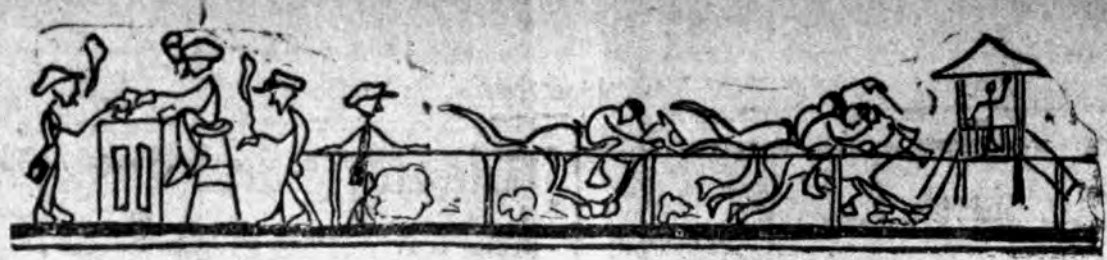

a man has failed in the Virginia or Piedmont he goes away from the Eastern Carolina a whole lot faster than he did from the other two. In fact an outfielder, who couldn't make the grade with Greenville is holding down a regular berth in a Virginia league club, and playing good ball in the slower company.

An infielder who couldn't use was hailed by this same Raleigh writer as one of the fastest men he had seen. He has since been let out and is playing down here, but with the tail-end club. Which goes to show what the Disturbers judgment is worth.

The two teams in this organization which offer the best comparison between college players and class D

professionals are New Bern and Tarboro. True, New Bern derives quite a bit of her strength from higher class professionals, but she has more college regulars than any of the others. Tarboro has one Georgetown pitcher who has already been signed by Detroit. They have one man from the International league, one V. M. I. man and all the rest are from the Virginia and Piedmont leaguers. And, in considering Tarboro, it must be borne in mind that Mark Webb is pitching steady ball.—Washington Daily News.

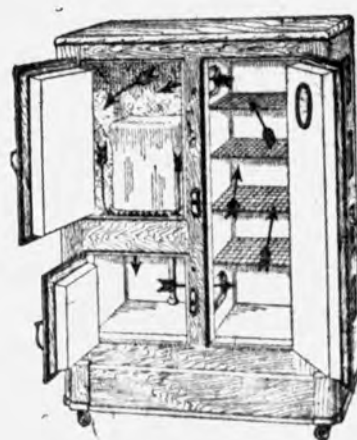
