AYDEN RED CROSS IN FINE SESSION FRIDAY AFTERNOON

Several Important Matters Are Taken Under Consideration During the Meeting

The executive committee of the Ayden Red Cross Branch held their regular monthly meeting in the board of directors room of the First National Bank. Chairman G. W. Prescott presided, Mr. L. E. Turnage, secretary read minutes of the last meeting.

The civic committee is to meet again with the Ayden Street committee, relative the erection of a fountain at the corner of Lee and Third streets. The mosquitoes and rats have been so bad in Ayden this year that the committee is going to try and work out a practical plan to rid the town of same.

Mr. Prescott read the three letters which he had received from Hon. H. S. Ward relative the shrubs while the Red Cross branch hoped to receive from the Botanical Gardens in Washington, to use in beautifying the town.

Miss Louisa Hubbard, executive secretary was asked to explain the First Aid work as outlined by Dr. W. I. Wooten, chairman of the Red Cross Department. In the county, Supt. R. G. Fitzgerald is going to request that this course be given in all county high schools, but as the Ayden High School is not under his jurisdiction, the Ayden Red Cross branch asked Miss Hubbard if she would meet with the school board and take this matter up with them.

Motion was made and unanimously carried to extend thanks to chairman G. A. Johnson, Mr. and Mrs. R. F. Pittman, and Mrs. Woods for their splendid community meeting held on June 30th.

Meeting adjourned to meet the first Friday in August at 4 p. m.

Steamship Egypt Said to Contain Many Packages of Parcel Post Also

Washington, July 8.—Eighteen bags of United States mail, consisting of a hundred and one parcel post packages, are on board the sinking steamship Egypt the post office department announced today.

DECLARES CONGRESS WILL ENACT BONUS

Washington, July 7.—"There will be no adjournment of congress until the soldiers' compensation bill has been made a law. It will be taken up and disposed of under a special agreement as soon as the tariff bill is passed."

This promise was made today by Senator McCumber, of North Dakota, chairman of the finance committee, to Miss H. H. Smith, of Whiteman, Mo., who delivered a petition bearing a million signatures for enactment by congress of the soldiers' bonus bill. Miss Smith, dressed in the uniform of the Salvation Army, was accompanied by a score of wounded veterans from the Walter Reid Hospital, when she presented the memorial.

"It's heavy and certainly has some weight," said Senator McCumber as he grasped the bundle.

"We hope it will have some weight in the Senate," Miss Smith responded.

"It will," the Senator replied.

GOVERNMENT MAY SEIZE COAL MINES

Administration Plans to Take Drastic Step in Effort to Supply Coal for Winter

Washington, July 8.—Ultimate seizure of a key to mines to guarantee a supply of fuel next winter has been virtually decided upon by the administration as a final and drastic step in the coal strike, it was learned from a reliable source this afternoon.

The president is said to have held out for postponement of action until he has exhausted all effort to bring about a peaceful settlement. Advisers, however, agree that drastic action is necessary and are urging senators to be in accord with the chief executive.

COLES GIVES UP FIGHT TO HOLD MAYOR'S JOB

Youngstown, Ohio, July 7.—Former Mayor George L. Cole today gave up his fight to regain the mayor's chair. "I'll serve if I'm mayor," he said, "but I'm not willing to neglect my private business and spend \$5,000 to \$10,000 to regain the office and probably after serving without pay making enemies by the hundreds in every attempt to save money for the people of Youngstown."

"In going to let the case be settled by the question of whether the acts of William B. Reese as mayor are legal. If his name on the new bond issue is accepted as mayor, I'll drop the fight to regain the office."

LEAGUE DIRECTORS IN SHORT SESSION HERE LAST NIGHT

Decide to Hire Three Umpires. Two of Which Are Already in Service

Four directors of the Eastern Carolina league met in rooms of the Chamber of commerce last night, but nothing of any importance was taken up for consideration. The matter of umpires was discussed at length, and it was decided to hire three, two of which are already in service.

The league has had considerable trouble in getting efficient umpires this season, but it is believed the matter has been settled to the general satisfaction of all parties concerned. In several instances recently good umpires were so scarce that players were chosen from the various teams and these proved more satisfactory in many ways.

The directors, however, believe the two already in service and the one under consideration will fill the bill for the remainder of the first half at least.

GRIFTON CHAPTER CHANGES DATE OF REGULAR MEETING

Special Session of Chapter Held at Grifton Bank Yesterday Morning

Chmn. G. T. Gardner called a meeting of the Grifton Red Cross Branch on yesterday morning at 9:30 in the Director's room of the Grifton Bank. It was unanimously decided that it would be best to have regular monthly meetings at 3 p. m. on the first Wednesday in every month.

Mrs. C. Mays, was elected secretary of the Grifton Branch, and Dr. W. W. Dawson as Chmn. of the Grifton First Aid Course which will be given in the high school in Grifton next year in connection with physiology and hygiene. Dr. Dawson will be asked to give practical demonstrations and test ability and skill of the children.

Mrs. C. E. Gardner, Chmn. Junior work will choose an assistant for recreation with the younger children. Mrs. Joel Patrick is to appoint three assistants on her civic dept. to help with anti-mosquito and rat campaigns which the Red Cross Branch intends to stage in Grifton.

Publisher Dowd of the News and Attorney Briggs for Honeycut fought in the court room when Dowd called Briggs a liar when he charged the News with printing untruths. Dowd hit the lawyer such a crashing blow that he was knocked against the judge, upsetting his official dignity. They apologized to the court and were forgiven.

SEVERAL ACTIONS GIVEN HEARING IN CITY COURT TODAY

Stanley Moore and Almeter Washington Given Hearing on Charge of Prostitution

The cases were of a minor nature except last involving Stanley Moore, young white man of this city and Almeter Washington, colored woman, charged with prostitution. The two were arrested one night this week by members of the police department and held until the preliminary hearing this morning. The case was bound over to the next term of county court and will probably be heard before Judge Louis G. Cooper next Monday morning.

E. N. Richards, charged with bathing in the town limits of Tarboro, was found guilty and released upon payment of cost.

R. L. Brunson, charged with speeding, was required to pay a fine of ten dollars and cost before receiving his release.

BEARS FIGHT SOX FOR SECOND PLACE HERE NEXT WEEK

Thompson and Beal to Hurl for Sox in Determining Contest Monday and Tuesday

After completing the series at Kinston this afternoon the Blue Sox will return home and prepare to meet the New Bern Bears at the fair grounds Monday and Tuesday. These two games will probably be the hardest fought of the season as they will largely determine which of the two clubs come out in second place when the first half closes.

The first half will be brought to a close Thursday afternoon with Greenville playing in Tarboro, but the two games to be played here Monday and Tuesday with the Bears will be the determining games of the season.

There is no chance of either New Bern or Greenville winning first half and the battle will be to see which can come out in second place.

In order to be prepared for New Bern Monday and Tuesday the Sox will very likely pitch Hathaway in the lead of Thompson in Kinston today. This will leave Thompson and Beal to do the mound duty against New Bern Monday and Tuesday, and there is no reason on earth why the Sox should not come out victorious if the two heavers receive proper support in the field and at the bat.

That Washington has the first half pitched at this time is not to be questioned in the slightest sense of the word. They are three whole games ahead of the Bears and five ahead of Greenville, and such a thing as catching up is out of the question.

POSTAL RECEIPTS SHOW INCREASES

Further Evidence of Improving Conditions Indicated in Final Reports

Washington, July 8.—Further evidence of improving business conditions were given in reports of postal receipts from fifty of the largest cities of the United States the postoffice department announced this afternoon. Receipts show an increase of nearly two and a half million over June last year.

SAYS SUCCESS OF TARIFF WILL MEAN FAILURE OF G. O. P.

LaFollette Launches Sharp Attack on Measure and Sounds Note of Warning

Washington, July 7.—In an attack on the administration tariff bill, Senator LaFollette, Wisconsin, Republican member of the finance committee declared today in the Senate that the passage of the measure would mean the defeat of the Republican party in the elections in November and in the Presidential elections in 1924.

"I do not understand," said Senator LaFollette, "how men charged with the duty of upholding and preserving the principles of the Republican party, even if they feel no responsibility to the people who elected them, can deliberately force through legislation which they must know means the defeat, if not the utter ruin of the party."

"If the elections of 1910 and 1914 and 1916 mean nothing to them, then let them look to the Republican primaries held in Indiana, in Iowa, in North Dakota and other states within the last few months. Powerful, indeed, must be the influences which can bludgeon through this legislation when the political leaders responsible for it know it means the defeat of their party and the end of the political lives of most of the leaders responsible for this bill."

Reviewing the political upsets which followed passage of the Payne-Aldrich law, Senator LaFollette declared that had it not been for resentment of the people against the Wilson administration growing out of the war and what followed, there is no doubt that the Republicans would never have returned to power unless it reformed its tariff policy and gave satisfactory guarantees that its reformation was permanent.

DEMAND RETURN OF GERMAN DYES

German Dye Patents Under Dispute Between Chemical Foundation of Nation

Washington, July 8.—Demand for return to the government of former German dye patents now held by chemical foundations will be served upon Francis Carvan and other officials of the foundation Monday, alien property custodian Miller announced today.

GERMANY ON VERGE OF COLLAPSE TODAY

British Officials Believe Financial Collapse of Country is Imminent

London, July 8.—British officials today openly expressed fears of financial and economic collapse of Germany. Premier Lloyd George is giving his personal attention to the problem, although it seems hopeless. The British cabinet is also considering the issue.

The public will be glad to note that Admiral Kato is so much in favor of peace on land and sea. He has certainly shown a splendid spirit since the armament conference and if he continues his influence should have much effect in making principles of the league of nations an actuality. Peace on land and sea, as to proper advantage under such conditions and it is hope the town will get behind the telephone company and see that recent orders for removal of the oills ar carried out to the minute.

The strike situation is becoming serious in the movement of passenger trains, and should this become more general the government should take some action in remedying the situation. Strikers are the greatest menace to industry the country has ever had and should they be prolonged the situation will become more serious with each succeeding day. It may be true the railroad men are fighting for a principle, whatever that be, but that's not helping the general public in the slightest sense of the word and that's what we've got to consider. If the strike can't continue without interruption of train service then it's about time for the government to take a hand.

Under no circumstances will the government tolerate hindrance to the movement of United States mail, and should the strike become so serious that this is affected, then it may be time for the government to show its hand. While it isn't likely the strike will become so serious, it is probable, however, that mail service will be slightly impaired as it certainly will be if several passenger trains are taken off the various lines. The mail will get to its destination in due time of course, but getting it at the usual time is what the public wants. Something must be done before the situation becomes serious and it might be advisable to do it now before drastic action will have to be resorted to.

Vocational education is very necessary in this country at the present time as it opens a way to the young man to learn some useful trade or profession. Not everyone can attend college, but they can find some good profession to follow, during life and make of themselves honorable men and women. The busy man or woman is a valuable asset to the country, but those without any particular trade can't be what they would under other circumstances. It is hoped vocational education will be given the attention of which it is deserving, as it will make the nation far more prosperous in every sense of the word.

There seems to be some hope of settling the great coal strike, but where the hope exists is difficult for the public to determine. If any progress has been made in the issue, it must be on the quiet as nothing has been given out that would indicate anything of the kind. We hope, however, the situation will improve as things would be serious in the country should the coal supply be as short this summer as it is at the present time. The strikers can't afford to hold out as they have done during summer months. The union funds won't last all ways and when they began to dwindle away as they are doing every day strikers and leaders too will find work necessary. Keeping the wolf from the door will certainly be an inspiration in this instance.

Pitt county people will be interested in learning that bids will soon be let for the hard surfaced roads from Greenville to Falkland and to the Beaufort county line. Another improvement of interest is completion of the Arden road road. Paving has already been completed from Greenville to Arden and the road will be opened to the public within the next two weeks. That this means much to the business men of both towns is not to be doubted. They should

derive great benefit from increased trade, as everyone living out of town will feel more like making the trip. Bethel will also be interested in announcement of letting the contract for paving of the Greenville and Bethel road. This is one of the worst roads in the county at present time and one of the most frequently used. When the county seat is connected by a chain of hard surfaced roads conditions will be much better and everyone will have an opportunity of becoming better acquainted with their seat of government.

Decision of numbers of the railway employees to remain on the job despite the walkout of shomen is very commendable and that they will never have cause for regret is not to be doubted in the least. Strikes are the worst thing in the world and the money the men lose while away from work will be much greater than they could possibly lose by remaining on the job. Then, too, there are going to be many workmen without jobs unless they come to terms and return to work before the 15th of the month. The railroads have promised them certain inducements should they return to their jobs, but should they fail they will be marked as unemployed. This will produce a serious situation among men forced to work for a living and there will be thousands who will wish they had remained on the job and not responded to the call to strike. The main thing the men struck for has been settled by the railway leaders, and there is no use to continue the strike, unless they are determined to force the wage increases. The thing is bad enough as it is and no one should do anything to make it worse.

The fact that more than a million and a quarter people are idle in the United States should cause the man on a strike to sit up and take notice. The country is in no mood to tolerate labor disorders and the man who wants to remain idle can certainly do so as there are plenty others ready and willing to step into the job he stepped out of. This is the case of the railroad men and the miners also, and the sooner they realize the fact in all its seriousness the sooner they may decide to return to former jobs and do their best to serve the country as faithfully as in the past. The country can't possibly recover with strikes in progress and the government should tolerate nothing tending to disrupt legitimate industry. The trip through Alabama and Georgia planned by the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce should be of great benefit to the members of the party as they will be able to get first hand information on subjects uppermost in the minds of the farming people. Both Georgia and Florida are great farming countries and have taken advance steps in diversification of crops. This is something in which Pitt county farmers want to take more interest in the future, as the day will come when the production of what they eat and what is consumed by the cattle will be of intestimable value. In recent years these things have been purchased at the stores in town at retail prices and the money which they made in other ways goes right out again. Diversification will eliminate this, and the farmers who now produce tobacco and cotton entirely will find themselves much better off financially.

HIGHWAYMEN DOWN SOX IN A THRILLING AFFAIR YESTERDAY

Smith's Circuit Clout in Ninth With Bases Full Momentarily Paralyzed Highwaymen

The Kinston Highwaymen recovered from a long losing streak yesterday and defeated the Blue Sox by the score of 7 to 6. The victory, however, came mightily near being turned into defeat in the ninth inning when Smith cracked out a circuit clout with the bases full. The score stood 7 to 2 in favor of the Highwaymen at the time, however, and the four runs shoved across in less time than it takes to tell the tale were not exactly enough to change the tide of victory in favor of the Sox.

Loach appeared on the mound for the Blue Sox, but failed to show up any better than in other games of the season. The Highwaymen found him in effective in the third, fourth and sixth innings and were able to bunch enough hits to put the old game on ice. Jack Frost appeared on the firing line for the Highwaymen and while pounded hard and freely was more fortunate in keeping hits scattered. He yielded a total of thirteen safeties, one for the entire circuit and another for two bases. Loach yielded twelve hits three of which were for two bases and one for three.

Both clubs played fairly fast ball in the infield, Greenville being credited with two errors and Kinston one. Kinston scored all runs on clean hitting except two which resulted largely from errors. The Highwaymen had a big day in the way of double plays, making three. Luck favored them in this instance as it probably never will again, and they were able to make an exceptionally fine showing. There was no particularly brilliant fielding on either side, and if Kinston sowed any decided for mover the visitors it was not evident in any part of the game.

With Kinston pitching Jack Frost, unquestionably their best and the Blue Sox Loach, one of the hardest luck hurlers in the league, the final outcome of the game is considered remarkable. If the Sox can make this kind of a showing with that brand of mound work they should find the Highwaymen easy under ordinary conditions, or when their fielding and hitting proclivities are supported by good mound work.

Smith's wallop in the ninth momentarily paralyzed the Highwaymen, but when the cloud had cleared away and it was found that the Sox were still one behind everyone felt easier. If the lead, however, had been held down somewhat the Sox would have again returned home with a ninth lining victory to their credit.

The heavy stick work for Greenville was done by Duncan and White, who secured three hits each, Loach and Frazier who secured two each and Massey who was credited with one. Crawford for Kinston secured three hits out of five trips to the plate, one of which was a triple, a single and double. Frost, Rodgers and Adams came in for next honors, being credited with two each, Frost getting two doubles and Rogers one each.

That circuit drive couldn't have come at a better time, unless it had given us a two run lead.

And after this thrilling ninth inning experience the Highwaymen will pile up as big a lead as possible.

But the lead won't be possible to-day with Thompson during the work on the firing line. Tommy has a different brand of stuff than Loach and if the Highwaymen get a lead it will be mighty small.

It can't be said the club didn't field and hit behind Loach yesterday. They did both in a way that elicited the highest praise from Kinston. Kinston, however, hit opportunely in the first part of the game and piled up such a lead that two or three home runs would be necessary to overcome.

Smith is evidently trying to overcome Babe Ruth's home run record. The hard hitting Sox drove out his fifth four base hit in the ninth inning with bases full—a feat Babe Ruth performed in Tuesday's game.

Washington unquestionably has clinched the first half and it is now up to Manager Smith and Captain Doran to augment their pitching staff with two more hurlers of the class of Beall and Thompson.

While Loach and Hathaway are good pitchers, they have played in mighty hard luck and have also been hit mighty hard. They will have to tighten up if they intend to remain in such fast company.

We have the best infield and outfield in the league, there's no question about it, and if we can get four reliable pitchers we will be all O. K. We can't afford to let sentiment stand in the way of purely business matters.

The New Bern Bears will be great contenders for the second half and with the recent acquisitions to the pitching staff they are going to give the Sox a fit unless they strengthen along the same line. There's lots of luck in baseball, we admit that, but there's lots of difference between a weak pitcher and a strong one.

Let's finish up this old first half the best we can, boys, and start out determined to take the second. We can't do so by any foolishness. We can't sacrifice business principles for sentiment and the sooner this fact is firmly fixed in mind the earlier we will get a firm grip on the first half.

The season has continued long enough now for the various managers to fully determine the best men on their clubs. And it's about time the real should be separated from the real stuff. Let's get busy, Doran, and straighten out the gang for a determined fight for the last half.

Doran has whipped into form one of the fastest and best trained infields in the league, and with Thompson and Beall should be able to win everything before them in the last half. That's exactly what we want to do, so let's get busy and augment the pitching staff with dependable hard working fellows.

Kinston is constantly trying out new arrivals in infield, outfield and on the pitching staff and when the next half begins they are going to be able to make a showing worth something.

Farmville is also doing everything to strengthen weak points and to say that they expect to make a good showing the next half would be expressing the matter mildly.

The way the Blue Sox hammered Frost, Kinston's crack pitcher, indicated the boys would have cleaned up in yesterday's game if Loach had been able to curb the Highwaymen's batting rally in early stages. If he could prevent hits being bunched conditions would be entirely different.

It's a pity to lose a game after the boys hammered Kinston's best as they did, but we can't expect to win unless we find a way to prevent the other side hitting so opportunely all at one time.

Now, Tommy old boy, hop in there and give the Highwaymen a fit to-day. It's in you and if you come out with colors trailing in the dust it will be a case of hard luck and not a regular occurrence.

HIGHWAYMEN DOWN SOX IN A THRILLING AFFAIR YESTERDAY

Smith's Circuit Clout in Ninth With Bases Full Momentarily Paralyzed Highwaymen

The Kinston Highwaymen recovered from a long losing streak yesterday and defeated the Blue Sox by the score of 7 to 6. The victory, however, came mighty near being turned into defeat in the ninth inning when Smith cracked out a circuit clout with the bases full. The score stood 7 to 2 in favor of the Highwaymen at the time, however, and the four runs shoved across in less time than it takes to tell the tale were not exactly enough to change the tide of victory in favor of the Sox.

Loach appeared on the mound for the Blue Sox, but failed to show up any better than in other games of the season. The Highwaymen found him in effective in the third, fourth and sixth innings and were able to bunch enough hits to put the old game on ice. Jack Frost appeared on the firing line for the Highwaymen and while pounded hard and freely was more fortunate in keeping hits scattered. He yielded a total of thirteen safeties, one for the entire circuit and another for two bases. Loach yielded twelve hits three of which were for two bases and one for three.

Both clubs played fairly fact ball in the infield, Greenville being credited with two errors and Kinston one. Kinston scored all runs on clean hitting except two which resulted largely from errors. The Highwaymen had a big day in the way of double plays, making three. Luck favored them in this instance as it probably never will again, and they were able to make an exceptionally fine showing. There was no particularly brilliant fielding on either side, and if Kinston sowed any decided for moyer the visitors it was not evident in any part of the game.

With Kinston pitching Jack Frost, unquestionably their best and the Blue Sox Loach, one of the hardest luck hurlers in the league, the final outcome of the game is considered remarkable. If the Sox can make this kind of a showing with that brand of mound work they should find the Highwaymen easy under ordinary conditions, or when their fielding and hitting propensities are supported by good mound work.

Smith's wallop in the ninth momentarily paralyzed the Highwaymen, but when the clout had cleared away and it was found that the Sox were still one behind everyone felt easier. If the lead, however, had been held down somewhat the Sox would have again returned home with a ninth lining victory to their credit.

The heavy stick work for Greenville was done by Duncan and White, who secured three hits each, Loach and Frazier who secured two each and Massey who was credited with one. Crawford for Kinston secured three hits out of five trips to the plate, one of which was a triple, a single and double. Frost, Rodgers and Adams came in for next honors, being credited with two each, Frost getting two doubles and Rogers one, each.

But the lead won't be possible today with Thompson during the work on the firing line. Tommy has a different brand of stuff than Loach and if the Highwaymen get a lead it will be mighty small.

It can't be said the club didn't field and hit behind Loach yesterday. They did both in a way that elicited the highest praise from Kinston. Kinston, however, hit opportunely in the first part of the game and piled up such a lead that two or three home runs would be necessary to overcome.

Smith is evidently trying to overcome Babe Ruth's home run record. The hard hitting Sox drove out his fifth four base hit in the ninth inning with bases full—a feat Babe Ruth performed in Tuesday's game.

Washington unquestionably has clinched the first half and it is now up to Manager Smith and Captain Doran to augment their pitching staff with two more hurlers of the class of Beall and Thompson.

While Loach and Hathaway are good pitchers, they have played in mighty hard luck and have also been hit mighty hard. They will have to tighten up if they intend to remain in such fast company.

We have the best infield and outfield in the league, there's no question about it, and if we can get four reliable pitchers we will be all O. K. We can't afford to let sentiment stand in the way of purely business matters.

The New Bern Bears will be great contenders for the second half and with the recent acquisitions to the pitching staff they are going to give the Sox a fit unless they strengthen along the same line. There's no loss of luck in baseball, we admit that, but there's lots of difference between a weak pitcher and a strong one.

Let's finish up this old first half the best we can, boys, and start out determined to take the second. We can't do so by any foolishness. We can't sacrifice business principles for sentiment and the sooner this fact is firmly fixed in mind the earlier we will get a firm grip on the first half.

The season has continued long enough now for the various managers to fully determine the best men on their clubs. And it's about time the chaff should be separated from the real stuff. Let's get busy, Doran, and straighten out the gang for a determined fight for the last half.

Doran has whipped into form one of the fastest and best trained infielders in the league, and with Thompson and Beall should be able to win everything before them in the last half. That's exactly what we want to do, so let's get busy and augment the pitching staff with dependable hard working fellows.

Kinston is constantly trying out new arrivals in infield, outfield and on the pitching staff and when the next half begins they are going to be able to make a showing worth something.

Farmville is also doing everything to strengthen weak points and to say that they expect to make a good showing the next half would be expressing the matter mildly.

The way the Blue Sox hammered Frost, Kinston's crack pitcher, indicated the boys would have cleaned up in yesterday's game if Loach had been able to curb the Highwaymen's batting rally in early stages. If he could prevent hits being bunched conditions would be entirely different.

It's a pity to lose a game after the boys hammered Kinston's best as they did, but we can't expect to win unless we find a way to prevent the other side hitting so opportunely all at one time.

Now, Tommy old boy, hop in there and give the Highwaymen a fit today. It's in you and if you come out with colors trailing in the dust it will be a case of hard luck and not a regular occurrence.
