MANY CHANGES ARE EXPECTED IN RAIL STRIKE THIS WEEK

Shopman's Strike Enters Second Week Fraught With Greater Possibilities

BOARD MEMBERS TO HOLD CONFERENCES WITH CLERKS SOON

It Is Generally Believed That Strike of Clerks Will be Averted Soon.

Chicago, July 9.—With soldiers on active duty in Illinois and troops mobilized in five other states, the ninth day of the strike of railway shopmen passed quietly while many railroads prepared to resume active operation of trains tomorrow, several carriers having warned striking employees to return by that date or forfeit seniority rights.

B. M. Jewell, head of the railway employees department of the American Federal of Labor, had nothing to say at strike headquarters and no news was forthcoming from either the carriers or the United States Labor board.

While the Sunday holiday was uneventful, the rest of the week was fraught with possibilities. Tomorrow members of the board, who averted a strike of 400,000 maintenance of way men and 14,000 signal men through negotiations with union officials last week, are expected to confer with E. H. Fitzgerald, head of the clerks' union, in an effort to prevent the issuance of strike orders to this organization. Confidence was expressed here tonight in quarters close to the labor board that the clerks would follow the example set by the maintenance of way and signal men employees.

With the carriers urging striking employees to return to work, preparations were completed on a score of lines to attempt to resume active shop work tomorrow. Vacancies in the ranks, according to the railroads, will be filled by the hiring of new men. Realizing the possibilities for trouble with such a program, some of the railroads have asked for soldiers to protect their shops, while others expected to afford private protection to those who worked.

While the railroads predicted that many strikers would flock back to work when assured that protection would be afforded, union headquarters here have maintained that the strike is daily becoming more effective.

TWO CASES GIVEN FINAL HEARING IN COURT HERE TODAY

Stanley Moore and Almeta Washington Appeal from Six Month Road Sentences

One of the smallest dockets in several weeks faced Judge Louis G. Cooper in this morning's session of county court and work was completed long before the noon hour.

The most important case taken up for consideration during the morning was that against Stanley Moore, white man of this city and Almeta Washington, colored woman, who were arraigned on a charge of prostitution. They were found guilty and sentenced to six months on the county roads. Notice of appeal to superior court was immediately filed by attorneys and they were released upon bond of \$300. Moore and the woman were arrested one night last week by members of the police department. They were given preliminary hearing before Mayor D. M. Clark in police court and bound over to county court under appearance bond.

Jarvis Williams, charged with assault, was sentenced to four months on the roads.

These two cases constituted the docket, with the exception of one or two other issues which were continued to superior court or found not guilty.

BIG IMPROVEMENT IN NATION CROPS REPORTED TODAY

Corn Crop is Considered in Better Condition Than in Years, Forecast Says

Washington, July 9.—General improvement in crop conditions along the Atlantic and Gulf coasts and in the Northwest, east of the Rocky Mountains, was noted by the Agriculture department in its crop summary for the last half of June, made public today.

"Throughout the corn belt," the department's observers found "small grains were more or less injured by the unusual hot and dry weather. In the Southern states much badly needed field work was accomplished."

The corn crop generally made progress except in the Southwest, where it was neglected for cotton. Wheat threshing is going on in the Southwest and some of the Southeastern states. Oats are reported generally poor to fair, and cotton had fairly good growth. Weevils are numerous and considerable damage, as yet unestimated, has resulted. The Irish potato crop is reported to be "fair to good," a large acreage of beans and cabbages has been planted and other vegetables are said to be in good condition.

Tobacco harvesting has advanced in the "cigar wrapper" section of the Southeast and transplanting has progressed under fair but variable conditions elsewhere, the summary said. The crop is reported well advanced in Virginia and Maryland and a full acreage is predicted in Ohio, Indiana and Michigan.

REPUBLICANS GAIN SWAY IN TENNESSEE

Control of Public Utilities Will Temporarily Pass Into Party's Hands

Nashville, July 10.—Control of railroads and public utilities will temporarily pass into hands of the Republican party in this state following the appointment of a member of that body to succeed the late Colonel Enloe. The appointee will hold office until January 1st.

AGED EDITOR DIES AT BIRMINGHAM

Edward Barrett, Owner of Birmingham Herald, to be Buried This Afternoon

Birmingham, July 10.—Edward Barrett, fifty-six, editor and principal owner of the Birmingham Age Herald, who died last night of heart failure, will be buried this afternoon. He was a native of Athens, Georgia, and a graduate of Washington & Lee university. Practically his entire business life was spent in newspaper work, twenty-five years of it being in Birmingham.

FAVOR HIGHWAY IN FLORIDA DISTRICT

Congressional Delegations Adopt Declaration Urging Highway Construction

Washington, July 10.—Congressional delegations from Florida, Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi and Texas adopted a declaration urging construction of the highway from St. Augustine, Fla., to San Diego, California which will be known as the old Spanish trail, it was announced. The plan was endorsed by the war department.

PROFESSOR DEAL HOLDS SERVICES AT THE COLLEGE

Member of Faculty Speaks Before Y. W. C. A. Members

Professor R. C. Deal, of the faculty, conducted Y. W. C. A. services at East Carolina Teachers College on Sunday evening, making an exceeding interesting talk on that much discussed subject, "The modern girl."

Mr. Deal summed up briefly, but clearly. Mr. Deal gave a brief, but clear survey of what the magazines and newspapers have given on the subject, summing up the accusations, the suggested cures. His talk was impersonal, but at the end he spoke as a teacher, a father, and as an American citizen on what he thought were the significant tendencies and the effect on both the girls and society in general.

He paid a fine tribute to the young women in the college, saying that in his association with the students of the college he had found the majority to be intelligent young women, of good sense and character. The charges he brought were general charges and were these: The modern girl has broken down all restraint to attract attention, she has not only bobbed her hair, but she has bobbed her dress, and dresses in such a way as to become the center of a gazing set of loafers; she has become lax in language; she is guilty of bad personal habits, such as smoking cigarettes. Many places the blame on the war because of the freedom from restraint women found during the war.

Mr. Deal spoke feelingly on the subject of standards for young women that would uphold the virtues of the past. No community is better than its citizenship and no citizenship better than its woman.

RICHARD WYNCHIE TO LECTURE AT LOCAL COLLEGE THURSDAY

Mr. Wynchie tells the Uncle Remus stories and the great hero stories, in a thrilling, wonderful manner, making the characters pass before his listeners in action, while the story-teller stands calm and unmoved, doing all by the magic of his words and voice.

The public is invited to enjoy the evening of entertainment with the college people, free of charge. The stories appeal especially to grown people and the boys and girls in the upper grades or in high school rather than to the very little children.

NEW BERN BEARS TO PLAY SOX IN THIS CITY TODAY

Two Clubs to Clash in Final Games of First Half Here This Afternoon and Tues.

Greenville fans will be given an opportunity of seeing two of the best played games of the season at the fair grounds today and tomorrow when the New Bern Bears and the Blue Sox come in contact for the last time during the first half. Both clubs are in excellent trim for the battle and that they will measure up to expectations is not to be doubted in the least.

Beall and Thompson will do the mound work for the Sox and it is very likely that Lefty Wilson and Snyder will appear on the firing line for the Bears. This assures everyone of seeing something out of the ordinary, as each twirler is considered among the best in the league. Wilson recently joined the Bear club, but is in excellent shape and should be able to give a good account of himself. Fans will remember that it was his mighty arm that defeated the Greenville club in the final championship game of the season last year.

The two clubs are probably the most evenly matched in the league. This fact was very much in evidence last year when seven games were required to complete the championship. New Bern has practically the same club and so has Greenville, with exception of a few minor changes. The clash here a week ago indicated a slight superiority of the Blue Sox over the Bears, but the struggle then will be mild in comparison to that today, as the two games will determine which of the two clubs will come out in second place in the first half.

PRESIDENT WARNS MINERS THAT WORK MUST BE RESUMED

Washington, July 10.—President Harding delivered the government's ultimatum to the warring coal miners and operators at a brief and tense session at the White House this afternoon.

The president informed the miners that mining must be resumed at once or that the dispute would be submitted to an arbitration commission appointed by the government to clear up. Clear intimation was conveyed by the president that failure to do this would result in government control and seizure of the miners. The factions were given until tonight to decide.

WEBB AND WILSON FIGHT 11 INNINGS TO 4-4 TIE GAME

New Bern, July 8.—The Bears and the Tar Babies fought for 11 innings here today, till darkness ended the fastest and one of the prettiest games played here this season, score 4-4. Mark Webb's homer, with two on in the second, featured the game. The Tarboro twirler had a good day of it getting two hits out of four times up. He also only allowed New Bern 6 hits to Tarboro's 8 and except for the fourth inning kept the Bears from hitting consecutively. Incidentally, Webb led the Tar Babies in batting, no other batter getting over 1 hit.

For New Bern, Fred Morris got three out of four trips. Klein and Ketch were the only other New Bern batters to hit safely. New Bern's five misuses added to the ease with which Tarboro kept the game tied up, while the Tars only made 2 errors.

FORD MAY YET GET ULTIMATE CONTROL OF MUSCLE SHOALS

Action of Senator Ladd Considered Favorable in Every Sense of the Word

SOUTHERN SENATORS EXPECTED TO RALLY BEHIND THE ISSUE

Question Expected to be Finally Concluded at Meeting at Early Date

Washington, July 10.—The prospect of Henry Ford getting ultimate control of Muscle Shoals was blooming today.

Action of Senator Ladd, Republican of North Carolina, in sponsoring Ford's offer is believed to be an indication that middle western Republicans would join southern Democrats in supporting the latest Ford contract.

With both Senator Ladd and Senator Harold, Republican of Oklahoma, and members of the senate agriculture committee supporting him, it was indicated that Ford might obtain a majority of votes of recommendation from the committee.

Southern Democrats, it has been assumed, will vote solidly for Ford, it was learned today. The committee will meet Thursday night when various offers will be finally discussed. Vote may be cast at the same time.

EDWARDS ENDS REVIVAL SERVICES AT ROBERSONVILLE

Large Crowd From Greenville Heard Dr. Ben Edwards in Final Sermon Last Night

The government is planning to seize a string of mines to relieve the severe coal shortage while the strike is in progress. That this is the right thing to do is not to be questioned, and the sooner it is done the better off every one will be. The shortage is really getting to be severe and only that most drastic kind of action can relieve the situation.

British officials have expressed fear of the financial and economic collapse of Germany. While there may be something to the report it is hardly believable that a nation like Germany is bankrupt. If this is the case what is the condition of France, England and other countries which have suffered ten times as much as Germany. Germany may be hard up, but financial collapse at this time would only be a means of staying off reparation problems.

Before the hard surfaced road system of the county has been completed the commissioners should make it their business to see that danger signals are placed in all school zones of the county and at dangerous curves. The cost of erecting these signs will be small in comparison to the cost of the lives to be lost unless some action is taken. It matters not how fine the system may be it cannot be what it should without signs to guide the traffic in zones where accidents are liable to occur.

Business continues to improve in this country despite reports to the contrary to grant about hard times, continue to plan about hard times, expecting the public to take what they say as serious. There is no reason on earth for people complain-

ing of hard times and depression at this time. Any man or woman willing to work can find something to do, and if they do not it is a good indication they don't want to work. Money may be somewhat tight, but there is plenty of it and anybody can get it by going to work and earning it.

Now that the Near East Relief campaign has about drawn to a close it is time for the public to get busy and see what they can do. The county has fallen short of its quota, and unless contributions are made more liberally than formerly we are going to fail. The cause is the greatest the American people have ever had an opportunity of giving to, and everyone should be proud of giving every cent they can. There is great suffering in progress in the Near East and it will be even more severe unless the American people give liberally in this campaign.

There are some dangerous railroad crossings in Pitt county and especially in Greenville and unless something is done to provide for safe crossing of the places severe loss of life eventually will occur. Several accidents have occurred in Greenville in recent years and this will likely increase in the future if the cross-

ings are not protected. It would be easy to provide underway or overhead crossings and the probability of cars being hit by trains would be eliminated. This matter is of sufficient importance to command attention and it is hoped the city authorities or commissioners will get busy and see how soon the danger can be set aside.

The American Red Cross is doing splendid work in Greenville and Pitt county at this time under direction of Miss Louise Hubbard and the public should do everything possible to help increase the scope of its activities. The various chapters have done much to improve the conditions of the many communities, but how much greater would be the success if everyone would co-operate with Miss Hubbard, who is an enterprising and versatile woman with the work of her organization at heart. She deserves our help and it is up to us to get busy and help make the institution even a greater success.

By hitting the ball hard at opportune moments Greenville was able to win the concluding game of the series from Kinston Saturday afternoon by the score of 7 to 3. The game was fairly well contested at times, especially by the Blue Sox, but the Highwaymen were unable to prevent bobbles which figured in their undoing.

Hathaway pitched effectively for Greenville, allowing the Highwaymen only seven hits which were pretty well scattered except in the sixth, eighth and ninth innings when the only runs were scored. At other stages of the game he had the opposing batters at his mercy and retired side after side in a way that elicited the highest commendation from the many visitors who followed the team to Kinston.
