

GERMANY UNABLE TO PAY INDEMNITY AT PRESENT TIME

Financial Condition Has Reached Desperate Proportions in That Country

REPRESENTATIVES ASK OTHER NATIONS TO DO SOMETHING FOR THEM

Herr Schroeder Has Asked Berlin for Instruction to Act in the Matter

Paris, July 10.—The two representatives of the German government, Dr. Fischer, chairman of the German war debts commission, and Herr Schroeder, under secretary of finances, during the course of a 3-hours conference this afternoon informed M. Dubois, president of the reparations commission, that the financial situation of Germany had reached such a desperate state that cash payments of the indemnity would soon become impossible.

While the Germans did not formally request a moratorium, they made it plain to M. Dubois, and later to each of the members of the commission that Germany felt that such relief would be the only way out of her difficulties.

M. Dubois and the others of the commission listened to the German representatives and asked many questions but reserved their decision until a later date, after the commission has formally received Germany's request and given it full consideration. The commission will meet tomorrow to discuss the new crisis and it is probable that Fischer will have further informal conversations with the members. Herr Schroeder has asked Berlin for instructions and may return to Germany tomorrow.

It is explained that the Germans do not seem to know just what was wanted, but among the tentative proposals they had with them was one calling for payment of the remaining cash installments this year by means of a loan provided a moratorium of at least two years was granted. Without a moratorium a loan could not be raised, the Germans explained.

TARIFF OPPOSITION BREAKS COMPLETELY

Democratic Forces Given Away and Leaders Concede Successful Passage of Bill

(By International News.)

Washington, July 11.—After 12 hours of ceaseless debate the McCumber tariff bill entered into final stages following a complete break down of the cold Democratic opposition this afternoon.

Leaders of every faction agreed that the bill would pass the senate not later than August 15th.

Senator McCumber denied that the administration intended to delay or recommit the same opinion voiced by Senator Simmons, North Carolinian who declared that the Democrats want the bill to pass as early as possible so that effects will be felt before election day.

GERMAN HUMORIST IS SUED BY THE KAISER

Berlin, July 11.—The ex-Kaiser's lawyer, in Berlin, has filed suit for libel against the well-known satirist Carl Sternheim, for poking fun at the ex-Kaiser in his latest book, "Lilusa," in which the ex-war lord's character Lilusa "knocks" its memoirs on the floor of the stable. It is a sharp satire on the role the ex-Kaiser played in politics at Petrograd, London and Berlin while he was in power.

MONEY NEEDED FOR HIGHWAYS SAYS NOTED ROAD EXPERT

Highway Transportation Will Become Indispensable, Is McDonald's Belief

Washington, July 11.—"Plan now the financing of highways for the future and lace highway transportation, which has become an indispensable part of our national life, on a firm foundation."

This advice was sounded by Thomas H. McDonald, chief of the Bureau of Public Board of the Agriculture Department.

Asserting that the United States is starting out to construct a system of highways such as no nation ever constructed before, McDonald declared this great undertaking is being entered into "because highways are not a luxury, but furnish a real service, have a real earning capacity and have become a national necessity." The next approach to the highway construction contemplated by the United States, according to McDonald, is found in France and Germany, and the area of neither is as large as Texas.

"For such an undertaking to be successful," McDonald said, "financing to care for maintenance, reconstruction and new construction should be planned for a long period of years in advance. Changes in methods of raising funds every few years, uncertainty as to whether funds will be provided and periods in which funds are not provided all increase the final cost of highways. Such a policy would soon bring any private business to disaster."

"Development and increase in numbers of motor vehicles and the coincident need and demand for good roads," McDonald continued, "have come so rapidly that methods of raising funds have often been expedients for the time being. Consideration has been given not so much to the just distribution of the cost as to how the funds can be raised with the least controversy and the utmost ease. Then, too, the use made of the highways and the service rendered by them have changed greatly within the last few years."

HEDGEPATH HELD FOR HEARING IN SUPERIOR COURT

Farmville Man Charged With Running Over Creech Boys, Given First Trial Saturday

J. K. Hedgepath, Farmville man charged with running over and killing the nine year old son of David Creech, farmer residing near Farmville, and severely injuring his twelve year old son, was given a preliminary hearing before Magistrate Joyner in Farmville Saturday afternoon and bound over to the next term of Superior court under bond of \$2,000. While no witnesses were placed on the stand, sufficient cause was found to bind the defendant over to the higher court with bond being increased from \$1,000 to \$2,000.

The inquest conducted by county Coroner S. G. Wilkerson Friday afternoon and Saturday resulted in disagreement by members of the jury who failed to agree after repeated attempts to render a decision.

Evidence brought out at the preliminary hearing, it is alleged, showed that the defendant was driving on the wrong side of the road when the accident occurred. It was also discovered that his breaks were not working. While it was at first declared that the wreck was purely accidental, this evidence, it was said, justified the defendant being held for examination before the higher court.

The wreck was one of the most serious that has occurred in the Farmville community in years. The two boys had gone to a neighbor's house to help in housing tobacco. They had been given charge of a tobacco truck and mule and were going down the road when the car approached. The mule, it is said, became frightened and plunged in front of the car, which was going at a fairly good rate of speed, resulting in the death of the nine year old boy and serious injury of the other.

In the hearing Saturday the defendant was represented by Albion Dunn of Greenville and the State by R. T. Martin of Farmville.

DAUGHERTY SAYS TRAINS WILL BE FULLY PROTECTED

Attorney General Says Mails Will be Continued Without Interruption

GREATER NUMBERS OF TROOPS BEING PLACED IN ACTION

Emergency Forces of United States Marshals Will be Used in Emergency

Chicago, July 10.—With increasing numbers of State troops and emergency forces of United States deputy marshals on guard wherever outbreaks have been threatened, the government today's announced that life and property would be protected, the mails continued and interstate commerce not interrupted, despite the strike of railway shippers.

After a conference with President Harding, Attorney General Daugherty said the government would make certain that law and order was preserved through the appointment of deputy marshals.

The Attorney General announced came shortly after Lieutenant Governor Sterling, acting head of the State of Illinois, had ordered five companies of National guardsmen to Bloomington to protect the shops of the Chicago and Alton railroad. The ordering out of the State troops followed appeals from the local authorities who declared that civil authority had collapsed and that the soldiers were needed to protect life and property. They were greeted on their arrival at Bloomington by crowds of strike sympathizers with jeers and ribald comment.

In Clinton, Ill., where the Illinois Central shops have been under guard of State troops since Saturday night when an outbreak was threatened following a fatal shooting affray, the day passed in comparative quietness, although several shots were fired by sentries at a group of men who believed to have been advancing to attack the shops. The attackers fled, none of them being injured. At Aurora, Illinois, where an emergency force of deputy marshals has been on guard since the Burlington obtained a temporary injunction against violence on Saturday, several hundred strikers and strike sympathizers held a silent parade about the shops. All of the Aurora police and many railroad guard watched the demonstration, which was orderly.

RAILWAY SIGNALMEN TO REMAIN AT WORK

President Holt Promulgates Order to Twelve Thousand Men Who Are on the Job

(By International News.)

Chicago, July 11.—D. Holt, president of the brotherhood of railway signalmen promulgated an order to his twelve thousand men directing them to remain at work until every measure for obtaining peace has been exhausted. The men had voted for a strike.

MUNICH TRAIN STATION IS LARGEST IN WORLD

Berlin, July 11.—Munich Central Station, with its thirty-two rails, is now the biggest railway station in the world. Next to it comes St. Louis, U. S. A., with thirty-one rails, Paris Gare du Nord with twenty-eight rails, and Leipzig with twenty-six rails.

The total cost of the Munich station amounted to only 30,000,000 marks, against 135,000,000 marks for the Leipzig station.

Somebody must do some conceding
if the railroad or coal strike is
brought to an end and it's about time
for them to get their heads together
and see what can be done. Things
are beginning to be serious now and
should not be permitted to run much
longer without an agreement.

If reports from different govern-
ments mean anything, and we are
sure they do, business is on an up-
ward trend in this country at the
present time and is destined to make
even greater progress in the next
few months. These departments keep
a careful check on conditions and
are in position to more accurately
size up things than the ordinary run
of people. These reports are a
splendid index to what is being done
and should prove a pretty good guide
to the public.

If you haven't given to the Near
East Relief campaign get busy and
do so immediately. Everyone should
contribute liberally to this great
cause as it is one in which human
lives by the thousands are at stake.
If America fails to provide the re-
quired sum of money thousands of
women and children will die as re-
sult of hunger, disease and cold this
winter. Can you imagine a situation
more appalling. Get and contribute
liberally before the campaign is
brought to a close.

The Republican old guard fears
the tariff bill may cause the party's
downfall. That they had just cause
for their fear is not to be question-
ed in the least. In fact, the public
has severely repudiated the tariff
supporters in recent elections and
this will be even more pronounced
in the days to come. Tariff is ex-
actly what the country doesn't need
and should it be enacted into law
business will suffer more than it has
ever done before. The old guard
has evidently seen the handwriting on
the wall and will hereafter confine
its efforts to nursing the public.

LaPollette is a member of the Re-
publican party, but he talks some of
the best Democratic doctrine it has
been our pleasure to hear in some-
times. In fact, he seems to be in per-
fect accord with what the Democrats
have been doing and are intending to
do, and may even go so far as to
lend his support. He has been much
criticized because of his opposition to
the tariff, but this comes from mem-
bers of his town party and not the
Democrats. Most the level headed
Republicans will line up on the right
side before the fight is over and if
the tariff gets by it will do so after
a hard fought battle.

The miners may not like the way
President Harding put the issue up
to them, but that shouldn't worry
the president in doing what he be-
lieves to be for the best of the peo-
ple he was elected to serve. The
strike has demoralized industry long
enough now. The winter is approach-
ing and unless the coal supply is in-
creased the winter will be one of
the most acutest situations in
history. The public will support the
president in the position he has taken,
and if he needs any support it will
be given freely and liberally.

President Harding has told the coal
operators that they will be expected
to return to work in the near future,
or that the government must take
over the mines and protect the pub-
lic. If this wasn't plain enough,
then we are at loss to understand
what the miners desire to wake them
up. The president did the right
thing. The strike has continued long
enough for any sane body of men
to reach an agreement and if they
dare to continue to jeopardize their
own industry and their own personal
interests they should be allowed to
pursue their course. The public's
interest, however, should be fully
protected and it is up to the president
to take such action as he may deem
necessary and advisable.

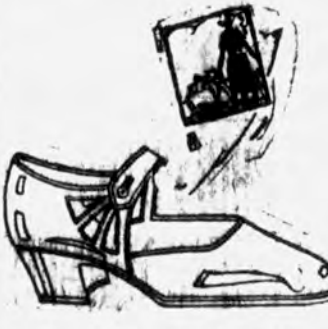

SPLINDID TEAM MATES
LET THEM HELP PULL THE LOAD

Auspices Pitt County Chamber of Commerce.

In a recent talk in one of the Southern states, H. S. Mobley, of the agricultural extension department of the International Harvester Company, used the above chart with telling effect.

"To harness a cow and a hen and a hog to furnish farm power would be a huge joke to most of us," said Mr. Mobley. "That was the way it appeared to a school boy at one of my meetings. When he saw the chart, he laughed aloud and said, 'That kind of a team isn't worth much.'"

"Thousands of us have the same idea, but it is a mistaken idea. The patient cow, the industrious hen, the fast-growing hog, produce results that are astonishing. Each year this team produces for the farmers, approximately \$4,450,000,000. If this amount were equally distributed among our six and one-half million farms, it would give each farm, more than \$700 a year. "From the standpoint of production this is the most powerful team a farmer can use. I have never known a farmer who used this kind of a team who did not make a good living and a reasonable amount of money besides."

CO-OPERATIVES RECOGNIZED AS BIG OPPONENT

President Carrington, in Annual Report of Tobacco Association of U. S.

President T. M. Carrington, in his annual report read at the session of the Tobacco Association of the United States, this afternoon, at the Jefferson Hotel, said that the co-operative movement among the tobacco growers was "very interesting indeed" that "the farmer must take his bad with his good, with the understanding that when an over-production is made tobacco sells low and is bought by people who have got to hold it and take considerable chances on overcoming this very expensive tendency."

On Co-Operative Movement.
In regard to the co-operative movement he said:

"A big factor in the large crop of bright tobacco planted this year is the hope held out to them of co-operative selling, which was explained to the farmers that by holding their tobacco in a conglomerate unit and not rushing it on the market at times when there was no demand for it that they could reap immeasurable benefits as to prices by having the tobacco in such shape that if it was not taken at satisfactory prices in the green condition that they could hold until a demand at remunerated prices was obtained."

Too Big to Ignore.

"The co-operative movement in three states, Virginia, North and South Carolina, among the tobacco farmers, is too big to be noticed on this occasion, and it seems now that we will have a competitor of some considerable moment and size, but as their announced purpose is to help the farmer and not pull down any interests, the result of their activities, in carrying out this theory, will be very interesting indeed."

"Of course, if this organization can obtain a sufficient percentage of the crop, control the demand and get a price that will be satisfactory to the farmer, and at the same time not so high as to drive away business, and

can control future acreage, so as not to have these satisfactory prices bring about an over-production then they will indeed have made considerable headway to a successful accomplishment."

Subject to Same Influences.
"The farmer, however, is made of the same clay as those in other callings and is going to be subject to the same influences. In the past few years, he has made mistakes, but no bigger than bankers, manufacturers or merchants."

"He overproduced, but his tobacco did not go down as low as furs, silk, hides or wool, and he has the glorious privilege of being independent so far as food, is concerned, which others have not. In fact, the farmer is about the only man making his living (the balance of us simply trade it out of each other), but he is a very much coddled man at present from the farmers' bloc at the national capital to the rural influence in every state legislature, but as there are more of them than anybody else the presumption is that he is entitled to this unusual situation."

"The tobacco crop, however, has a great many angles. The whole crop that average 25c is composed of individual crops that sell at from 10c up to 50c, and each farmer sets out each year with the hope and determination of making that 50c crop. The fluctuations in the price of leaf tobacco are not desirable, and every consideration should be given by the larger factors in making the prices as uniform as possible, especially in trying to keep the seasons open as long as possible and avoiding the glut."

"The farmer must, therefore, take his bad with the good, with the understanding that when an over-production is made tobacco sells low and is bought by people who have got to hold it and take considerable chances on overcoming this very expensive contingency."

The above is taken from the News Leader of Richmond and is a portion of Mr. Carrington's address delivered at the annual meeting at which your Greenville Warehouse men were present. It was at this meeting that the opening date was changed for the market. Mr. Carrington also touched on the Kentucky proposition stating that it has been a success.

The co-operative marketing is gaining ground every day in all sections. The association can put up the tobacco on which there is no com-

petition or is below its value, the same as the dealers for years have been doing and they will be able to do it cheaper. The government has shown it is confidence by agreeing to advance thirty million dollars and it is now up to the farmer to decide if he is with his fellow farmer of those fighting the movement.
