TOWN ALDERMEN IN BUSY SESSION HERE LAST NIGHT

Several Improvements to Street and Extension of Sewer Lines Discussed

F. A. HASKINS ELECTED CHIEF OF CITY FIRE DEPARTMENT FOR YEAR

Standing Committees of the Board of Aldermen Also Appointed During Evening

The board of aldermen in regular monthly session here last night discussed contemplated improvements to city streets and sewer lines, elected F. A. Haskins, as chief of the fire department to succeed D. D. Overton, and appointed standing committees for the administrative year beginning July 1st, 1922 and ending June 30th, 1923. The session was one of the busiest in many months and featured in the payment of bills and several other routine matters.

Among the improvements considered was the proposal of getting water and sewer to the colored graded schools, improving Third street in the vicinity of the ravine, extensions of sewer on Myrtle street and sewer extensions on Paris avenue. While no definite action was taken at the time, it is expected a decision will be reached at a later date.

The Norfolk Southern railroad was ordered to pave between their tracks on 9 and 10th streets. At this time the crossing is in bad condition and has occasioned no little complaint from the public.

The street committee was also ordered to improve all dirt sidewalks of the city, and the next several weeks will see these improvements well under way and many completed.

After the election of Mr. Haskins as fire chief the board appointed E. H. Foley as his assistant. Mr. Haskins was asked to do everything possible to improve the personnel of his department and to make it one of the most efficient in the state. The new chief has been connected with the department several years and his election was considered with general favor.

D. D. Overton, former chief of the fire department, was elected building inspector for the ensuing year. The work of this office has increased to no little extent in past months and requires considerable time.

PRESIDENT ISSUES FIRST STATEMENT TO RAIL STRIKERS

Harding Directs All Persons to Refrain from Interfering in the Strike

ASKS COOPERATION OF PUBLIC TOWARDS UPHOLDING THE LAW

Peaceful Settlement of Controversy Absolutely Essential, He Declares

Washington, July 11.—President Harding in a proclamation issued at the White House late tonight directed "all" persons to refrain from all interference with the lawful efforts to maintain interstate transportation and the carrying of the United States mail.

In the proclamation, which was issued after a day in which continued reports had reached the Postoffice Department of interference by railroad strikers with mail trains, the President invited the co-operation of all public authorities, State and municipal, and the "aid of all good citizens." To uphold the laws and to "facilitate those operations in safety which are essential to life and liberty, and the security of property and our common public welfare."

The peaceful settlement of controversy between shopcraft employees and carriers, it was stated, "in accordance with law and due respect for the established agencies for such settlement, are essential to the security and well being of our people."

The President took the position that men willing to maintain the operation of railroad trains in order to transport mail have the "same indisputable right to work that others have to decline to work."

President Harding was occupied throughout the evening with the preparation of the proclamation, delaying his dinner one hour in order to go over the first transcript. He returned to the executive offices after dinner and remained here until the proclamation was made public about 10:40 p. m.

The text of the proclamation follows: "A proclamation.

"Whereas, the United States Railroad Labor Board is an agency of the government, created by law and charged with the duty of adjusting disputes between railroad operators and employees engaged in interstate commerce; and

"Whereas, the United States Railroad Labor Board has recently handed down decisions, one affecting the wage of the shopcraft employees, the other declaring the contract system of shopcraft work with outside agencies to be contrary to the intent of the Transportation Act and, therefore, that such practice must be discontinued.

SHOPMAN DEMAND STATE TO REMOVE TROOPS AT ONCE

Men in "Big Four" Shops Decline to Work With Soldiers on Duty Around Them

TROOPS ARE ALSO ON DUTY IN MANY OTHER TERRITORIES

Union Officials Order Their Men to Keep Mail Trains Moving Every Day

Chicago, Ill., July 11.—With State troops and United States deputy marshals on guard in half a dozen states to avert violence and prevent interference with the movement of the mails or interstate commerce, leaders of the "Big Four" railroad brotherhoods and railway executives were hurrying to Chicago tonight to confer tomorrow on issues growing out of the shopmen's strike.

At Bloomington, Illinois, where State troops have been guarding the Chicago and Alton railway shops, engineers, firemen, trainmen and conductors, members of the four big brotherhoods, voted today not to enter the shops or yards as long as troops are stationed there.

Union officials ordered their men to keep the mail trains running, however. Clerks employed in the yards and at the depot walked out last night, refusing to work under protection of the troops.

The day passed quietly at the shops. Only two shots were fired during the day and both were traced to accidental discharge of sentinels' rifles.

The matter of working with guards and State troops on duty is one of the matters on which the "Big Four" chiefs object.

Another issue to be discussed will be the alleged insistence of the carriers that members of the "Big Four" do work regularly assigned to the crafts now on strike. The United States Railroad Labor Board last week rendered an opinion that the members of one craft of workmen were not required to do the work of another union whose members were on strike, unless they did so voluntarily. Members of the "Big Four" unions also have protested that rolling stock has not been kept in condition since the strike of shopmen and engineers claiming that engines with defective brakes, headlights and air equipment had been turned over to them.

BULLEN'S WIDOW GRANTED DIVORCE

Martial Troubles of Margaret Robillard Ended With Decision of Courts Today

(By International News.)

Yatona, Fla., July 12.—The martial troubles of Margaret Bullen Robillard, widow of Roy Bullen, formerly prominent and wealthy Minneapolis sportsman, ended today when Judge Perkins signed a decree of absolute divorce. She charged that her husband married her under misrepresentation that he was a wealthy stock and bond salesman, while in reality, he was a porter and waiter in a Jacksonville restaurant. The suit was uncontested.

MURDER VERDICT IN JACKSON DEATH

Man Found Dead in Mill Pond Came to His Death by Foul Means, Coroner Declares

Columbus, Ga., July 12.—The coroner's jury investigating the death of Robert Jackson, mill hand whose body was found in a pond beaten about the head, rendered a verdict of murder here this afternoon.

ORDER FEDERAL TROOPS TO HOLD THEMSELVES IN READINESS FOR PREVENTING STRIKE DISORDERS

ALLIES WILL AID GERMANY BY CUTS OF REPARATIONS

Amount of Reparations Payment to be Materially Reduced in the Future

Paris, July 11.—The reparations commission decided today to relieve the German financial crisis to the extent of reducing the monthly installment of 50,000,000 gold marks due next Saturday on the schedule of payment to 32,000,000 gold marks. Germany had announced her willingness to pay the whole amount but the commission ruled that in view of the crisis, the smaller figure was all that would be required.

Credit to the amount of 18,000,000 gold marks was given Germany on her reparations account for deliveries of dyestuffs made during the last few months to the textile alliance of America for all the allied and also for deliveries of coal which had been made to Luxemburg at the request of the allied governments. These credits were due Germany for sometime, and the officials thought that this time was opportune to allow them, in view of the German difficulties.

The members of the reparations commission spent all day discussing the German crisis. Dr. Fisher and Herr Schroeder conferred with the members and had another talk with M. Dubois, president of the commission, in the course of which the German representatives reiterated their country's inability to meet cash payments after July.

The commission is expecting to receive a formula request from Germany for a moratorium in some form tomorrow; indications tonight were that the German note would ask that Germany be relieved of all remaining payments this year.

TAXI DRIVER HELD IN SERIOUS CASE

D. Rice Charged With Attempt to Bribe Customs Officials at Key West, Fla.

(By International News.)

Key West, Fla., July 12.—D. Rice, former taxi driver of Pensacola and druggist of Marion, Ga., is being held under bond here on a charge of attempting to bribe customs officials to allow him to bring opium to the United States.

Following preliminary hearing he was taken to Tampa where it is understood a similar charge is pending against him. Pensacola authorities are also said to want him on another charge.

MANUFACTURE OF POISON GAS ENDS

Government Orders Discontinuance of Gas Except for Research Purposes

Washington, July 12.—The manufacture of poison gas, except in limited amounts for research purposes, was ordered to be discontinued by the war department in compliance with the treaty on gas approved by the United States as result of the rams conference.

TARBORO TO END FIRST HALF WITH GREENVILLE CLUB

Red Stewart's Tars to Play at Fair Grounds Here This Afternoon and Tomorrow

After winning two straight games from the New Bern Bears the Blue Sox will complete the first half of the season with Tarboro at the fair grounds this afternoon and tomorrow. If Greenville should win today and New Bern loses the Sox will come out in second place. The Bears were one half game ahead of the Sox after their two straight defeats here this week and unless they handle Farmville in old time form Greenville will take second place.

That Washington will win the first half is already a certainty. Their victory over Kinston yesterday set aside the possibility of New Bern catching up with them. Greenville rendered the Pamlicoes valiant services by defeating the Bears two straight games and eliminated the prospect of a lively contest in the final games.

That Tarboro will make a good showing here today and tomorrow is an established fact. The Tars have been making splendid progress against other clubs the last few days, and the acquisition of new players greatly increases their chances of defeating Greenville. Practically all clubs have new material for the second half on the bench and when the first half is tossed in the second race Friday fans will see a much faster class of ball.

Greenville and New Bern promise to be the most stubborn contenders for honors of the last half and the public will watch the first few games with much interest. Greenville will open the second half on Bear territory and then go to Washington where they will play with champions of the first half. This is mighty hefty opposition for the opening games, but if the Sox can make an even break they will do splendidly. New Bern, however, has proven helpless before the powerful Blue Sox hurlers and the opening of the second half may find them in the same condition.

PRESIDENT WARNS THAT TRAINS MUST OPERATE AS USUAL

Proclamation Declares That Interference From Strikers Will Not be Tolerated

TROOPS WILL BE USED AT MOMENT THEY ARE NEEDED

All Persons Directed to Refrain From Doing Anything to Injure Train Service

(By International News.)

Washington, July 12.—Orders to federal troops at strategic points to hold themselves in readiness to carry out the terms of the president's proclamation in the rail strike crisis are understood to have gone forward from the White House this afternoon. The use of troops, if they should be needed, is regarded as the next step after the presidential proclamation that United States mail should not be interfered with. The interstate commerce commission will not be interrupted in its proceedings and they will continue without interruption.

President Harding's proclamation directed all persons to refrain from interfering with the lawful efforts to maintain interstate transportation and carrying of United States mail and threatened such action as the government might deem necessary and advisable.

While the presence of troops in several railroad districts has not been received with general favor by the strikers it is hardly likely they will make any effort to oppose the regular operation of trains. The government has stated its position clearly and concisely and it isn't likely that anything out of the ordinary will happen in the next several hours, unless the unexpected occurs.

GAMBLING IN GRAIN MAY BE ENDED SOON

President Harding has now asked for arbitration in the coal strike. Instead of asking it might be to his advantage to dive in and do the arbitrating himself.

Attorney General Daugherty says the government will protect trains of the nation while the strike is in progress. This will be received with pleasure, but we would much rather see him end the strike and get things back to normal.

The former kaiser of Germany has entered suit for libel against a well known cartoonist in Berlin, expecting that he will have the pleasure of assuaging his wounded feelings through the court. If any humorist can make the kaiser's character any blacker and more reprehensible than it has already been, then he is going some, that's all we've got to say.

Germany is unable to pay her indemnity, but she is able to make developments wherever these are found necessary. It's strange that a country should be in such deplorable condition financially when her industries are humming and many of them working overtime. Germany has been given credit of being the smartest country in the world and if she beats her way out of the indemnity she will earn the title.

That great number of railroad men who have remained on the job are to be congratulated as the railroads will be able to continue to operate without the demoralization that will necessarily come about in case the strike should become general. The situation, however, is of the most serious nature and the government should do everything possible to bring the issue to a satisfactory conclusion.

The employment bureau of the United States boasts that the country is taking vigorous strides toward industrial prosperity when strikes and other disorders have produced one of the worst situations in history. How in the world such a conclusion can be reached is more than we can understand, but the bureau has been reliably informed and probably speaks from knowledge of conditions. However, when the strikes are brought to an end and the millions of men off their jobs return we will believe what the board has to say about the period of prosperity.

Governor Cameron Morrison is on the right track when he proposes to restock streams of the state with edible fish. The fishing industry can be developed to great proportions providing the streams contain many fish and it is only proper that the chief executive should use his influence in this direction. Think of the enormous sums of money paid to other states for fish and fresh water products alone and then consider what an important part North Carolina might play if her streams were abundantly stocked. The problem is a great one and it is hoped the governor won't

let up until he has accomplished what he started out to.

The law should not deal leniently with automobile speeders as they are the greatest menace to public safety to be found. Think of the accidents occurring daily throughout the country and think how many of them might have been avoided had careful drivers been at the wheel. Some automobile drivers will speed by other cars at a high rate of speed, failing to remember that the slightest little imperfection in mechanism might plunge them and the occupants of the other cars to instant death. It's a pity other lives have to be jeopardized by this type of driver, as riding would be more delightful and beneficial. Strict enforcement of the law should be exercised in every town and persons violating the traffic regulations should be severely prosecuted.

Everyone will be glad to hear of the addition of several rooms to the Proctor Hotel as this will add greatly to the accommodations of the place. The Proctor is probably one of the most handsome structures to be found in Eastern Carolina, and while crowded from time to time, this condition should be greatly relieved with twenty-one extra rooms and bath. Aside from this there will be three nice office buildings on the first floor. Business offices have been in great demand in Greenville the last few months and these will do much towards bringing relief. Mr. Flanagan is to be congratulated in this effort to provide the town with proper hotel accommodations and that he will be well rewarded by the hand some structure goes without saying.

ITALY SEETHES WITH PARTY POLITICS AND FACTIONAL BATTLES

Various Groups Strive for Control in Parliament of Government

By Clara Wold, International News Staff Correspondent

Rome, July 12.—One never hears an Italian say he is not interested in politics. He might as well say that he doesn't care whether or not he has a light in his house tonight—that it makes no difference to him if trains, street cars and carozas do not run tomorrow; that the mere matter of getting the news and the post this week or next does not interest him. For it is with these essentials that the politics of Italy deal so swiftly and directly that the failure of a party to put a bill through the Parliament today may result in a general "red" or "white" strike tomorrow.

Even if you are a woman who never wants the vote and there are a few such women in Italy, although they never formed an anti-suffrage organization—you are not excused from following the political situation of the country. On the street cars people loudly discuss Bolshevism, Socialism and Fascism. In cafes men and women scream back and forth in heated arguments for or against Socialism. The King alone is let out of all discussions. All Italy loves him. "The King alone is let out of all discussions. All Italy loves him. The King alone is let out of all discussions. "He is a nice fellow," they say in English to you. "And he has a fine family." That ends the conversation about the King.

Italy has entered on a new era. Italians will tell you. The entire

political situation has changed. All the old leaders might as well be forgotten. Giolitti, Nitti, Nicola—all the Premiers of the past belong to another age, an age that has been left behind.

Italy first extended universal suffrage to her men, which meant that the national vote was suddenly increased from three million to nine million voters—the extra six million being mostly peasants and largely illiterate. Their votes went to the clerical party and to the socialists.

The second measure passed by the old reactionary Parliament—gave Italy proportional representation. All working Italy smiles up its sleeve to think the reactionaries dealt their own death blow, when they passed this measure. It took directly out of the hands of the Nittians and Giolittians the power to control Parliament and brought the political struggle of Italy into the hands of the organized parties, the Socialists and the Popolare (the old clerical party), with the Fascisti and Communists playing lesser parts.

GOOD PROGRESS IS NOW SHOWN IN U. S. BUSINESS

Demand for Labor Increases
Report of Credit Bureau
Announces

(By International News.)

New York, July 12.—Summarizing the favorable and the unfavorable factors in the present business situation, Secretary J. H. Tregoe, of the National Association of Credit Men, in his July letter to the 20,000 manufacturing, wholesale and banking members of the association, said:

"Six months of the present year have passed. Long enough to see since the observing student of the recent fact that 1922 will be a constructive year, not a year in which a complete revival could be expected. The upward grade of a business cycle is far more difficult and slower to take than the downward grade. June, the sixth month of the year, has passed on the whole a little progress. As we anticipated, failures have decreased in number and amount. The indicators of a growing, healthy condition are showing.

"The disposition to speculate has not been entirely abandoned. It has kept into housing construction. Drawing together the favorable and unfavorable factors as they appear to us just now, we would class the situation as favorable.

"The economy in the raising of the present year's crops. This economy will be a tremendous help to the farmer and increase his purchasing power. This is now reflected in an increased sale of most other horses. The agricultural sections are looking well.

"The production of basic commodities is on the upward trend despite the coal situation.

"The railroads are coming into the market. Freight cars ordered up to June 3 total 80,000, three times the number ordered in 1921. If this rate continues there will be an output of 100,000 freight cars in 1922."

CONTRACT IS LET FOR ADDITION TO HOTEL STRUCTURE

Contract for \$25,000 Improvements to Proctor Hotel Awarded C. C. Rackley

Construction work in connection with the addition to the Proctor Hotel will begin this week, according to an announcement made today by E. G. Flanagan, owner of the building.

The contract was awarded to C. C. Rackley of Wilson, who will get his men on the job immediately and do everything to rush the job to completion. The improvements will cost approximately \$25,000.

The addition will be on Third street on the site of the offices formerly occupied by Mayor D. M. Clark and J. Conrad Lanier, and will be the same number of stories as the main building. This will give the hotel exactly 21 additional rooms with bath and three office buildings and baths on the first floor. This will provide the hotel approximately one hundred rooms.

Mr. Flanagan stated yesterday afternoon that work would be pushed forward as rapidly as possible as the contract calls for completion by October the first.

The main building has just been repainted both on the outside and inside and presents an attractive appearance. The additional rooms will give it probably greater capacity than any other hotel of the size in this section of the state, and congestion of the past several months will be completely eliminated.

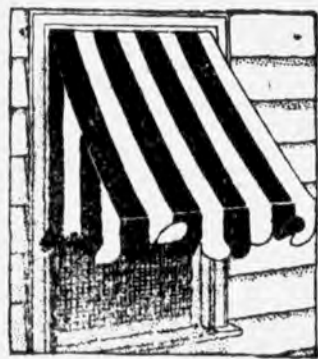

"BERRY PICKERS FINED FOUR BEING NEAR STILL

Atlanta, Ga., July 12.—Pick your blackberries a safe distance from moon shine stills. Blackberry picking may be considered a crime when indulged in too close to a still, it was decided by U. S. Commissioner Carter here. Ben Bell, Bealer Bell and Jordan Gilley, white, and Howard Strike and George Ammons, negroes, were arrested by Federal prohibition agents in Clayton county.

The prohibition agents said the five men were in a ditch in the vicinity of a still that was running in full blast and that when the officers approached all ran, but were caught and arrested.

Ben Bell plead guilty to operating the still. The other four men claimed they were picking blackberries and didn't know there was a still in the vicinity. Judge Carter decided that placed each of the men under \$100 a greater distance from a still and placed each of them under \$100 bond.

AIRPLANES TO BE USED IN FORESTRY CAMPAIGN

Honolulu, T. H., July 12.—Army airplanes have been pressed into service here to assist the Territorial Department of Forestry in the reforestation of certain inaccessible districts in the mountainous country back of the United States military reservation at Schofield Barracks.

The mountain districts which are being reforested are so precipitous that the foresters have been unable to get in to do their work. An appeal made to the head of the Air Service forces on Oahu resulted in the loan of several planes, which in favorable weather fly over the steeper gorges, while tree seeds are dropped by members of the forestry staff, who are taken along as passengers.
