UNION LEADERS DECLARE MINERS WANT TO ACCEPT PRESIDENT'S PROPOSALS FOR ENDING COAL STRIKE

Forecast Amicable Ending if Anthracite Operators Take White House View

MINERS WILL NOT CONSENT TO PLAN FOR ARBITRATION

Declare That Issue is Not Exactly Like That Interpreted From the White House

(By International News.)
Washington, July 13.—Miners want to accept President Harding's proposal for settlement of the coal strike. Union leaders forecasted this afternoon, if the anthracite operators state that the acceptance is interpreted in the White House view of the issue. Anthracite operators will accept the proposal purely as a plan of arbitration, but the miners will not consent to that basis. Just what the outcome of the White House proposal will be is awaited with keen interest on all sides. It was sated and the miners particularly hopeful that the president's view combines that of the operators.

ROBBERS CRACK SAFE AT GARRIS LUMBER COMPANY

Thieves Secure Small Change But Leave Several Hundred Dollars in Checks

Robbers entered the office of the Garriss Lumber Company Tuesday night, cracked the large safe with a sledge hammer and secured what small change had been left behind by the office force the evening before. There was several hundred dollars in checks in the safe, but the thieves failed to take anything but the change.

While members of the police department have been endeavoring to get a clue, nothing of any definite nature so far has been secured and the identity of the thieves will probably remain a mystery. The nightwatchman at the plant frightened the robbers away as he returned to the office after making his round of the premises.

DEATH OF GROCER IS STILL MYSTERY

Motive that Prompted Shooting of Ed. O'Brien Still Remains Complete Mystery

Nashville, July 13.—The motive that prompted the sensational shooting Tuesday of Edward O'Brien, a grocer of this city, had not been revealed today. O'Brien, who is slowly dying in a hospital from pistol wounds, refuses to divulge the secret. Dr. John Hall, brother of Dr. Tom Hall, who is under bond on a charge of assault for intent to murder was arrested on a warrant sworn out by the father of the wounded man.

EIGHT CHILDREN ARE KILLED WHEN SHELL EXPLODES

Watertown, N. Y. Children Blown to Fragments While Playing Near Shell

SHELL WAS KEPT AS SOUVENIR IN HOME OF THE CITY

Fragments of Clothing of Children Found Lodged in Trees and on House Tops

Watertown, N. Y., July 12.—Eight children ranging in age from 11 to 16 were blown to pieces late today by the explosion of a 75-millimeter shell on the back porch of a house in Dimmick street, occupied by Edward G. Workman and William L. Salisbury.

The dead: Morris Salisbury, 16; Frances Wiley, 13; Vivian Jones, 12; Olin Brown, 11; Anson Workman, 13; Edna Workman, 14; Sarah Barden, 13, and Donald Horton, 12, of Rulaski, N. Y., who was visiting the Brown boy.

The shell, which was owned by Mr. Workman, was one which he had kept as a souvenir and used on the rear porch to hold the door from closing. It was believed to be "dead."

The children were playing croquet in the back yard. The shell is believed to have either been set off by the hot sun or to have been struck by one of the victims with a croquet mallet. Windows within a radius of two blocks of the place were smashed.

Practically all of the clothing was blown off the bodies of the children. Fragments of it lodged in trees and house tops in the vicinity. The bodies were horribly mutilated but identification was possible in every instance.

One of the first physicians on the scene was Dr. F. W. Jones, lifting a covering had been placed over one of the forms, he recognized the body of his 12-year-old daughter, Vivian, by means of an adhesive dressing he had placed on a cut on her leg barely a half hour before. He did not know his daughter was in the group and was almost overcome with grief.

The bodies of the children were found apparently at places where they had been standing in their croquet games. Near them lay fragments of the croquet mallets. Several of the balls used in the game were blown to bits and the wickets were torn from the ground.

ADMINISTRATION TO SPANK DEMOCRATS

After Vanquishing Tariff Leaders Turn Their Attention to Southern Opponents

Washington, July 13.—Having vanquished the insurgent tariff "bloc" in three successive days administration leaders today turned their attention to "spanking" southern Democrats who opposed the tariff "bloc."

A long series of committee amendments were proposed for slashing from ten to twenty percent of every rate on schedule affecting the cotton and cloth manufacturers.

The reduced rates will be a direct blow to industrial establishments throughout the cotton belt, placing them in competition to the low-tariff market.

POLICEMAN WHITEHURST TAKES MILITARY TRAINING

S. A. Whitehurst, member of the Greenville police department, has left for Camp McClellan, Alabama where he will take fifteen days training as a reserve officer in the regular army. He will return to Greenville July 26 and resume his work with the department.

BLUE SOX FINISH THE FIRST HALF WITH TARS TODAY

Last Half of League Season Will Open Tomorrow With Sox Playing in New Bern

The first half of the Eastern Carolina league will be brought to a close this afternoon with Greenville playing in Tarboro, New Bern at Washington and Farmville in Kinston. The second half will open tomorrow afternoon with Greenville playing in New Bern and this will be the beginning of one of the hardest fought series ever before seen in this league.

The closing of the first half this afternoon will see Washington declared winner of the series. New Bern has gained undisputed possession of second place, although Greenville is a mighty close contender. Tarboro will finish the race in fourth place, Farmville in fifth and Kinston, one of the best looking clubs in the league, in the cellar.

While Washington gained undisputed possession of first place in the early stages of the season, New Bern has proven a mighty close contender in the last few games. If the Bears had won over Greenville in the opening games of the week and Washington had lost it is highly probable the Pamlicoos might have been ousted from first place. As it were luck clung to them and no such thing as the Bears seriously threatening them has occurred. The Pamlicoos will finish the season about six games ahead of the Bears.

From indications at the present time it seems the main fight in the last half will be between the New Bern Bears and Greenville. However, nothing of any definite nature can be decided upon nor can the real strength of the other clubs be determined. Kinston and Tarboro have strengthened considerably for the final fight for honors and it is likely they may take the clean slate tomorrow and make exceptional showing.

Greater interest will be centered around the last half as it will be the last chance of the five clubs to gain sufficient honor to play the championship series off with the Pamlicoos. Washington, however, may try to win the second half also, in which case they will do the celebrating all by themselves. The increased strength of the various clubs will make the battle of the last half more stubborn and determined, and it is assured that the race will be a close one indeed.

After completing the series in New Bern this week the Sox will return home and meet the league leading Pamlicoos at the fair grounds.

INDUSTRY GREATLY IMPROVED IN U. S.

Federal Reserve System Reports Considerable Improvement in Nation's Banks

(By International News.)

Washington, July 13.—Industrial and financial conditions of the United States continue to improve despite labor disturbances, the federal reserve board stated this afternoon in concluding a country wide summary of the business situation of the nation.

Farmers are liquidating debts and repaying loans and large industrial enterprises are making less demands upon banks for assistance. Banks are carrying the largest reserves in months, the statement said.

GUN BATTLE RAGES BETWEEN STRIKERS AND SHOPS GUARDS

SHOW WILLINGNESS TO DO ANYTHING TO END GREAT STRIKE

State That Interruptions of Trains and Traffic Would Continue Indefinitely

Chicago, July 13.—Grievances of the railway shopman were laid before President Harding in a telegram from the executive council of the shop crafts union this afternoon.

Charges were partially implied against the labor board and violations of the law were charged to the carriers.

Willingness of the strikers to accept just settlement was asserted, and it was said that interruptions of commerce and mails would continue to increase until an adjustment had been reached.

SIX KILLED AND MANY INJURED IN TRAIN COLLISION

Forty-eight Injured When Missouri Pacific Fast Train Crashed into Freight

Kansas City, July 13.—A check up this morning showed a total of six dead and forty-eight injured when the Missouri Pacific freight and passenger trains collided on the outskirts of this city last night. Eighteen of the injured are in hospitals today. Misunderstanding of regular train orders is given as reason for the wreck.

SEVERAL TRAINS DISCONTINUED ON DIFFERENT LINES

Industrial Conditions as Result of Strike Lead to Taking Off of Many Trains

Washington, July 13.—Industrial conditions as result of the combined mine and railway strike led to the discontinuance of a number of mail trains today, the postoffice has been advised. Inspectors at Atlanta reported the discontinuance of trains 7 and 8 from Atlanta to Birmingham, of train 1 and 2 from Brooksville to Tampa, Florida.

BANK OF ENGLAND TO REDUCE RATES

Minimum Discount Rates Reduced From Three and a Half to Three Per Cent

London, July 13.—The minimum discount rate of the Bank of England has been reduced from three and a half of three percent, the lowest since the ending of the war according to reports received here today.

METAL TRADES TO AID STRIKERS IN PRESENT CRISIS

Metal Trades Department Refuses to Accept Any More Repair Work, Is Said

of all unions affiliated with the metal trades department of the American Federation of Labor were instructed in orders sent out today from the headquarters here that no further repair work will be authorized on locomotives coming from railroads on which strikes are in progress to outside shops employing union labor.

The order sent out by A. J. Berres, secretary-treasurer of the department, was to be effective at once. Identical copies were to the presidents of interests affiliated with the metal trades group who were instructed to notify their locals.

The unions affected include boiler-makers, electric workers, pipe fitters, plumbers, painters and carpenters, as well as machinists and blacksmiths. The American Locomotive Works, to which many of the railroads affected by the strike, have been sending their hauling equipment for necessary repair, was specifically referred to in the order. In a statement tonight Mr. Berres declared there was "enough work on new locomotives in the plants of this company to keep the workmen busy and there will be no cessation from work unless attempts are made to force the men to do the repair work."

"This action was taken upon the earnest solicitation of the organizations affiliated with the railroad department of the American Federation of Labor," he said, "many of whom are so affiliated with the Metal Trades Department. Every assistance that can be given to the shopmen now on strike on all railroads should be given."

Majority of Six Senators Said to be Directly in Favor of Muscle Shoals Proposal

FIVE OTHERS WILL PROBABLY HOLD OFF FOR MODIFICATIONS

Senators McNary and Norris Said to be in Opposition to Acceptance at All

(By International News.)
Washington, July 13.—Henry Ford is nearing a realization of his plan to launch a great business movement throughout the south, as the International News service has learned that the senate agriculture committee will recommend acceptance of Ford's offer for Muscle Shoals.

The committee will meet tonight for final consideration of the proposals. A majority of six senators are favoring acceptance and it is expected five others are also favorable to Ford, but will head out for modification of the bid. Senators McNary of Oregon and Norris of Nebraska have directly rejected the offer, and recommended that the government run the plant as a corporation.

Democrats are progressive but they are not progressive enough to see where the ship subsidy will improve public conditions. The subsidy is nothing more than the selection of a number of business men to reap its profits. If that is progress of the type which all Democrats are arguing for then we want to change our principles to no little extent.

Now that cotton picking draws near the farmer should be thinking more seriously of erecting cotton storage warehouses, such as proposed by the government. Bonded warehouses will do much to conserve the cotton supply in this section and it is hoped the farmers, backed by all organizations, will get busy and see what they can do. Potato storage warehouses are also necessary and would prove invaluable assets to the farmer. Thousands of dollars are lost annually as result of improper preservation and unless something is done the situation isn't likely to improve. Let's get busy and see what can be done.

The railroad strikers have declined to work with troops on the job, but that hardly will cause the government to withdraw the forces as long as there is prospect of the slightest disorder. The strike situation is serious, but the government's action in placing troops wherever disorders occur will hardly accentuate conditions. If the strikers would do the right thing they would return to work and cut out their foolishness. Since they intend to stick to their guns it is perfectly natural for the government to take such measures as necessary to protect public rights.

The city did the right thing in remodeling the old city market building and converting it into city offices. The building has been divided into necessary departments and presents a business like appearance that is bound to impress the stranger as he enters. Each department is so divided that confusion is absolutely eliminated, and the city's business may be conducted in an orderly way all the time. Not many towns have such splendidly arranged offices and the aldermen are to be congratulated in taking this forward looking step. The police department is also far ahead of the old place. The building formerly occupied by the water and light department has been remodelled and devoted to this cause and as a consequence all departments are properly housed. This is a progressive step and indicates an unusually progressive spirit in municipal circles.

Samuel Gompers denounced the ruling of the labor board in outlawing the striking shopmen, but who cares what Samuel Gompers says, except of course that several thousand men he controls through the unions. Sentiment such as he expresses does the government no good, and he might find it to advantage of himself and unions to keep quiet until a settlement has been reached. The settlement, however, seems to be far away at this time, but the action of the government has placed the railroad workers in a position that is delicate in the extreme. In fact, the government has said it will not tolerate the slightest interference in train service, and if this isn't concise and plain enough, then we don't know how much plainer the workmen want it. It is either reach an agreement now or prolong the strike with the nation enjoying usual railroad service. And in the long run the strikers will wish they had not been so quick to strike.

The city aldermen did the right thing in deciding to improve the city

streets and to make sewer extensions wherever necessary. The extensions will greatly increase the sanitary condition of the parts of the city affected and improvements of the bad streets will add much to the appearance of the entire town. We have often referred to the serious need of improvements on Third street, and are glad to note that this is to be one of the first streets to be considered. This section of town is building up rapidly, but cannot experience the boom it should until the main street leading to the section is placed in proper condition. When it rains excessively the street is almost impassable and residents are placed at a great disadvantage. We know of no improvement we would rather see made at this time, and trust the aldermen will continue in their good work until there is no room left for the slightest complaint in any section of town.

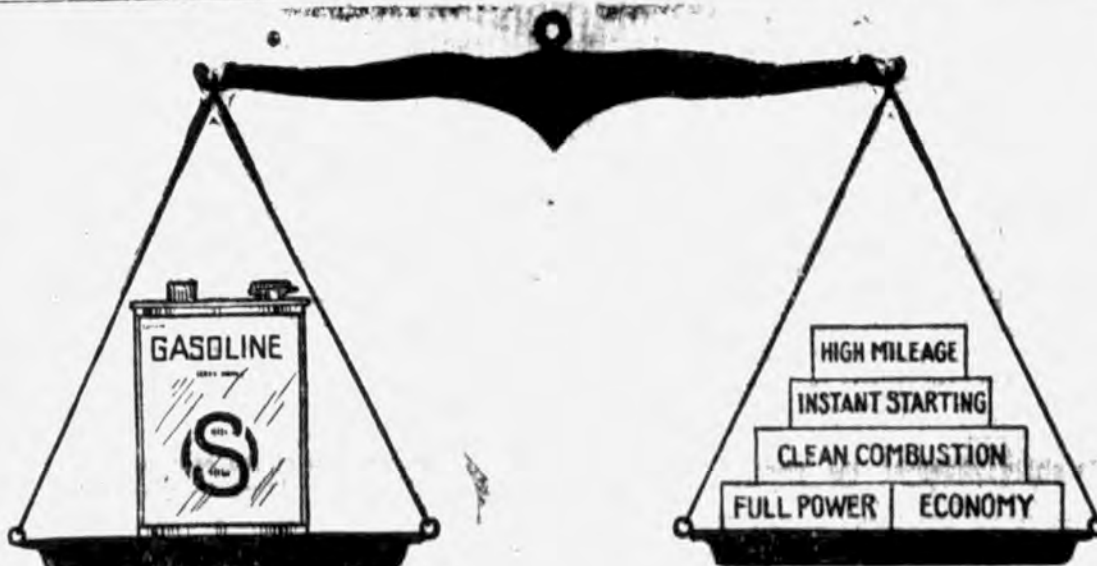

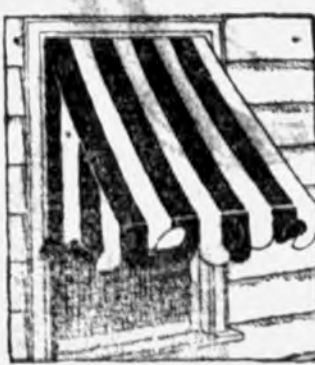
