SAYS SHOPMEN'S STRIKE WILL NOT
BE CALLED OFF AND MEN WILL STAY
OUT UNTIL JUSTICE HAS BEEN DONEJEWELL RETURNS
SHARP ANSWER TO
RAILWAY LEADERSDeclares Executives of Rail-
roads Are Seeking to Des-
troy Life of UnionLABOR BOARD MAY
PROCEED ALONG AN
ENTIRELY NEW PLANDeclare Every Effort Will be
Made to Bring the Issue to
Early Conclusion

Chicago, July 13. — The railway shopmen's strike will not be called off, and the men will not be ordered back to work, "until justice has been secured," B. M. Jewell, head of the railway employees department of the American Federation of Labor said tonight in a statement replying to the rail executive's ultimatum of yesterday.

The rail executives suggested that the strike be called off and the men return to work after which differences might be taken up before United States Railroad Labor Board.

Mr. Jewell, in tonight's statement intimated that the reason the executives refused to meet shopcrafts of ficer in an effort to mediate the strike as had been suggested, was that the railways hope to destroy the employee's organization. If such is the case, the statement said, the railroads are due to receive a sudden awakening and the American public should charge them with the responsibility.

At the Labor Board headquarters, it was announced that an effort might be made along new lines to settle the strikes, but no details were given. After rail executives had refused to meet shopcrafts representatives yesterday, board members announced that the executives, who refused to confer, did not speak for the individual railroads and intimated that a new plan of settlement might be based on this fact.

The shopcrafts representatives replied today to President Harding's proclamation which declared that the strike must be settled through the authorized agencies, by placing the blame for the strike on the railroads and asserting that carriers had violated many decisions of the Labor Board.

Other events during the day included orders from the War Department to have troops in readiness to protect the Missouri, Kansas and Texas lines in the hands of a receiver appointed by the United States Court, announcement by Postmaster General Work that 50,000 motor vehicles can be used to transport the mails if rail services fail and the issuing of restraining orders to the St. Louis and San Francisco railway at Fort Smith, Arkansas, and the Chicago and Eastern Illinois, and the Toledo, St. Louis and Western railroads at East St. Louis, Illinois.

Dr. Laughinghouse told of the progress made with the bad pay list recently compiled by the society, and said it had resulted in much good to the members in all parts of the county.

HARDING PLANS TO

COMMISSION IS
UNABLE TO ACT
IN TRAIN ISSUETaking Off of N. & S. Trains is
Merely an Emergency Measure
and TemporaryCOMMISSION WILL
ACT AS SOON AS
IT IS POSSIBLEShortage of Railway Equip-
ment Plays Important Part
in Discontinuance

That the Corporation commission is powerless to prevent the discontinuance of passenger trains while the strike is in progress is set forth in an emphatic way in a letter received today by President R. H. Wright of the Teachers College from R. O. Self, clerk of the commission. The company claims that the trains were taken off as an emergency measure because of strike conditions, but the commission will not let it be more than a temporary measure for the relief of railway companies during the existence of the strike.

The letter to Mr. Wright follows: "Your letter in regard to discontinuance of certain Norfolk Southern trains received. These trains were taken off without the knowledge or consent of the corporation commission and the commission ordered the officials of the railroad company here to explain their action in regard thereto. The company claims that it was done as an emergency measure because of strike conditions and of course the commission will not let it be more than a temporary measure for the relief of the company during the existence of such strike conditions. This strike, of course, affects the Norfolk Southern more readily than other roads, as the Norfolk Southern has only enough equipment to operate its trains in normal times, and other roads have a surplus equipment which can replace that equipment when becomes impaired. The Norfolk Southern claims that this conservation of equipment is made for the purpose of conserving its equipment to such extent that it may continue to serve its patrons in a limited way, provided the strike lasts longer than is expected.

"The Federal Boiler inspectors require that all boilers be washed out every night and under the order of the labor board no one can do this except those authorized mechanics who are now on the strike and under the regulations of the labor board the railroad cannot delegate this particular authority to substitutes.

"An application has been made to the board for the modification of this in order to give the railroads relief, but no relief has been given. "This leaves the commission in an embarrassing position, the railroad on the one hand saying that certain equipment is not safe for the transportation of passengers and the public on the other demanding that the commission restore the service. If the commission were to order the trains run by using this discarded equipment in all probability accidents would happen which would throw the blame back on the commission, who is not supposed to be expert in knowledge of safe equipment. As soon as conditions will permit, you may rest assured that this service will be restored or at least a hearing will be given to the parties interested and the matter passed on upon its merits.

"Railway trains are being eliminated on every system almost every day. Notice was received yesterday where ten mail trains out of Cincinnati had been discontinued effective today. The commission hopes that this condition will not last long enough to seriously curtail the passenger train service, but the railroads are doing everything in their power to keep service as nearly normal as possible and the commission will let no opportunity pass to exercise the right of the State in behalf of the people in such matters.

DEFER ACTION IN
FORD'S PROPOSAL
UNTIL SATURDAYSenate Committee Stands Five
for and Eight Against Ford
OwnershipISSUE TO BE CLOSED
WITH VOTE PLANNED
FOR NEXT MEETINGOnly Two Offers Have so
Far Been Considered by the
Committee

Washington, July 13. — After a story session, the Senate agricultural committee decided tonight to postpone action on the Ford and other offers for development of the government's properties at Muscle Shoals, Ala., until next Saturday.

At the time the committee agreed to vote without further debate on the question of reporting one of the proposals to the Senate for final consideration there.

It was understood that of the offers before the committee, either that proposed by Henry Ford or by Senator Norris of Nebraska, committee chairman, would be reported out. The committee's consideration tonight centered principally on those two offers, a wide division being apparent within the committee.

Thirteen of the sixteen committee members attended the session. Unofficial reports following the committee meeting represented the committee as being five against favorable report of the Ford offer and eight in favor.

Representatives of Henry Ford, the Alabama Power Company and of Frederick E. Engstrom were called before the committee's executive meeting and remained closeted with the committee for about an hour.

J. W. Worthington appeared for Mr. Ford and presented a telegram from W. B. Mayo, chief engineer of the Ford Motor Company, who regretted that illness preventing him from being present.

Chicago, July 14.—All railway and stationary firemen and oilers throughout country this afternoon received telegraph orders to suspend work at eight o'clock Monday morning. The order was sent out by President Healey and was received with general surprise.

The strike order will cut the heart out of railroad power houses and is expected to have far reaching effect in the present strike.

Eight thousand men are involved in the order and will accentuate the situation far more than it is at the present time.

The decision came on the heels of the threat of four hundred thousand maintenance way employees to join the strike. The situation involves a near revolt by the maintenance way men against officials, and hundreds are said to be striking in defiance of orders.

LITTLE GIRL IS
PAINFULLY HURT
IN AUTO WRECKGertrude Howell Run Down
Yesterday Afternoon by Car
Driven by Mrs. Peel

Gertrude, the two year old child of John Howell, who resides in the cotton mill section of this city was probably seriously injured yesterday afternoon about five o'clock, when run down by an automobile driven by Mrs. Gilbert Peel of Stokes. While the child was painfully hurt about the head physicians this morning entertained strong hope of its recovery.

The accident is believed to have been unavoidable. In fact, persons who witnessed it say several children were playing on the pavement of the road fronting Baker's store. They were in the middle of the street, as Mrs. Peel's car drew near, and she attempted to turn out to avoid running over them. As she turned out the Howell child stepped directly in front of the car and was struck before the driver could apply the brakes to save her life.

The child was knocked to the pavement with considerable force, sustaining injuries of the head which at first were considered fatal. Her condition had improved this morning and strong hope is entertained for recovery.

These members of the administration who have taken it upon themselves to "spank" opponents of the ship subsidy may find the job a greater one than expected. In fact, most of the opponents are from the south and licking a southerner is no easy matter, as many good men will gladly admit. The administration, however, has had enough lickings itself to attempt to take the offensive against any of its opponents.

It is to be regretted that the railroad strike can't continue without disorders reported from various parts of the country, as an agreement will never be reached until tempers cool off and the level headed workmen get to work and try to settle questions in dispute. Strikes are bad even without loss of life, and the public is hopeful that this form of vandalism will be eliminated until the controversy may be settled.

The Russians won't agree to anything at the Hague conference and have made the questions so complicated that reaching an agreement seems to be next to impossible. If Russia isn't sufficiently interested in her own plight to help other nations to solve her problems, then they should be permitted to go their way. Repeated refusal to comply with what the more powerful nations consider advisable will do her people no good and the sooner the fact is considered, the earlier they may expect to recover from the present deplorable situation.

Now that President Harding has set forth his views in regards to the rail strike and coal situation the strikers should see how near they can come to fulfilling the provisions of his statement. That his proclamation contained nothing that will in any way injure the strikers is very plain and they can do nothing more than help him bring about amicable settlement. Something must be done, but nothing can be accomplished by continued controversy. The only thing to do is to get to work in an earnest effort to reach an agreement and to stick to it after it is reached.

The War Finance corporation has placed ten million dollars at the disposal of cotton growers of the nation, and the next year should see a great part of this amount distributed in the cotton growing states. The government is doing the right thing in providing money for the farmer and the more they place at his disposition the greater will be national prosperity. Conditions are not the best in the world to be sure, but with this money distributed throughout the country things are bound to improve. The erection of cotton storage warehouses also will do much towards preserving the cotton supply in the future, and every section where such structures are erected will witness great prosperity.

These members of the administra-

itself to attempt to take the offensive
against any of its opponents.

get to work and try to settle ques-
tions in dispute. Strikes are had even with-

sy may be settled.

The Russians won't agree to any-

have made the questions so com-
plicated that reaching an agreement
seems to be next to impossible. If
Russia isn't sufficiently interested in
her own plight to help other nations
to solve her problems, then they
should be permitted to go their way.
Repeated refusal to comply with what
the more powerful nations consider
advisable will do her people no good
and the sooner the fact is considered
the earlier they may expect to re-
cover from the present deplorable
situation.

Now that President Harding has
set forth his views in regards to the
rail strike and coal situation the
strikers should see how near they
can come to fulfilling the provisions
of his statement. That his proclama-
tion contained nothing that will in
any way injure the strikers is very
plain and they can do nothing more
than help him bring about amicable
settlement. Something must be done,
but nothing can be accomplished by
continued controversy. The only
thing to do is to get to work in an
earnest effort to reach an agreement
and to stick to it after it is reached.

The War Finance corporation has
placed ten million dollars at the dis-
posal of cotton growers of the na-
tion, and the next year should see
a great part of this amount distributed
in the cotton growing states. The
government is doing the right thing in
providing money for the farmer and
the more they place at his disposition
the greater will be national prosper-
ity. Conditions are not the best in the

distributed throughout the country
things are bound to improve. The
erection of cotton storage warehouses
also will do much towards preserving
the cotton supply in the future, and

GERMANS EXPECT AMERICAN GOLD TO REFILL COFFERS

Exchange Situation Will Get
Boom From Money Spent by
Globe Trotters

Berlin, July.—A hundred thousand Americans are expected to visit Germany during this summer season. They may improve the exchange situation by spending \$40,000,000 while they are here, says the *Acht Uhr Blatt*.

It is estimated that if every traveler only stays in Germany for four weeks, spending \$400 during this time, as an average, twelve billion paper marks will flow into the empty pockets of those Germans that get in touch with them as hotel keepers, dealers, storekeepers. This will enable the German Government to buy more foreign stocks and thus improve the general exchange situation.

The expenses of Americans coming here are figured out as including a hundred dollars for personal comforts, a hundred dollars for purchases, and two hundred dollars for the passage back to the States.

The German shipping agencies, including the Hamburg American Line and the North German Lloyd, announce that all available berths have been booked for American citizens on all liners bound to Hamburg and Bremen during the summer months. These liners will be able to carry about 3,000 first and second-class passengers within a week, so that 3,000 visitors are expected to flood Germany within eleven weeks. This is a very low figure, as it represents a minimum.

The rest, up to a hundred thousand passengers, booked berths of French, British and even Scandinavian liners and will reach Central Europe via Holland, France and Denmark.

Reports from New York state that practically all berths are "sold out" for summer of 1922, thereby verifying the German estimates.

"There is no reason to complain about this American invasion," concludes the *Acht Uhr Blatt*. "All these globe trotters will, of course, contribute to increase the scarcity of goods of all kinds over here, but on the other hand, they will make plenty of Germans happy through their purchases, as it is a well-known fact that Americans spend their money freely while travelling abroad, although Uncle Sam is a fairly thrifty housekeeper at home."

KANSAS CITY WILL HAVE AIR TERMINAL

Army Air Service Officers
Have Selected Site for Huge
Airdrome

Kansas City, Mo., July.—One of the largest and most up-to-date airdromes in the United States was virtually assured for Kansas City when army officers of the Air Service selected a tract of land here as a site for a proposed army airport.

The Government recently appropriated money for the establishment of flying fields in ten of the principal cities of the United States. The land, according to stipulation at that time, was to be furnished by a corporation or community. Although numerous other cities have bid for similar airdromes this urban community was the second one chosen. Boston was the first.

The Air Terminal Association, Inc., has purchased the site, which is the tract formerly owned by the George L. Chughton estate. Captain Harry Thurber, quartermaster construction officer, of Fort Leavenworth, has asked for bids for the erection of hangars and other equipment necessary for the maintenance of Kansas City's new flying field. The site is composed of 153 acres.

Officials of the Company which purchased the property stated that the ground at one end of the field will be turned over to the Flying Club of Kansas City so that the club can build a club house there. They also said that the intention of the Air Terminal Association, Inc., was to establish aviation here in such a manner that its practicability will be unquestioned. Civilian flying as well as army flying will be encouraged, it was said. Three army hangars will be built by the Air Service of the army and six others by the corporation which purchased the tract of land.

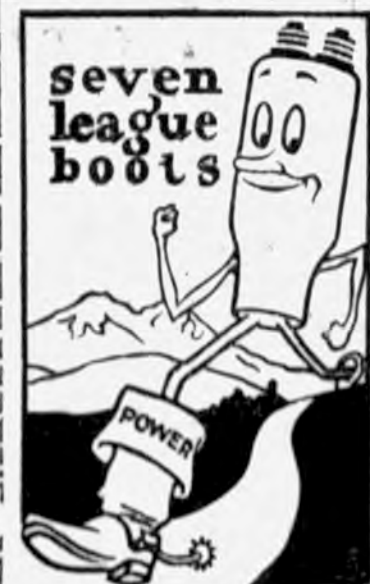

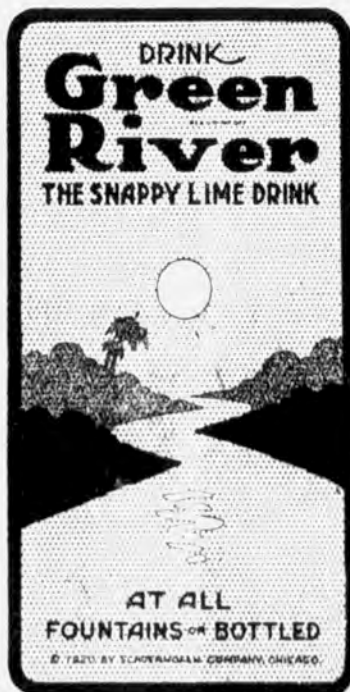

After two years of legal formality the municipality has started its program of strengthening and rebuilding streets torn up by German shells.

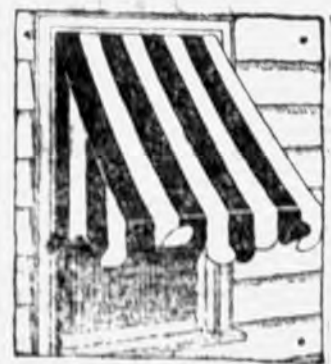
