GOVERNOR ASKED TO SEND TROOPS TO ROCKY MOUNT

Adjutant General Metts Ordered to Raleigh to Confer With Governor Morrison

THIRTEEN POLICEMEN KIDNAPPED AT A. C. L. SHOPS AT RY. MOUNT

Officials of Company Charge Strikers With Treating Men Roughly

Raleigh, July 16.—Governor Morrison was requested last night by the mayor of Rocky Mount and the sheriffs of Edgecombe and Nash counties to send troops to guard the Rocky Mount shops of the Atlantic Coast Line. The Governor directed that the request be put in writing and forwarded to him. At the same time he ordered Adjutant General J. Van B. Metts, who is at Camp Glenn with the 10th Infantry, to proceed to Raleigh. General Metts left at once by automobile and he will confer with the governor on the situation today.

The governor indicated last night that he would take no action until after receipt of the written request and the conference with General Metts today.

Rocky Mount, July 16.—Thirteen special company policemen, who have been guarding the Atlantic Coast Lines shops at South Rocky Mount, were kidnapped and hustled out of the city in automobiles early this morning by a band of alleged shop strikers, estimated to number anywhere from 100 to 300. Later today railroad officials stated that seven of the guards had reported from points around Elm City and Wilson, while the other six are still missing.

Other developments today included the securing of an injunction against the striking workers by the Atlantic Coast Line railroad and the addressing of a mass meeting of the strikers and others by Mayor C. L. Gay, who urged the men to stay within the law and advised that outside force would be requested to cope with the situation unless the provisions of the law were obeyed.

Railway officials, who conversed with some of the deported men over long distance telephone, quote the men as saying that they were taken to points somewhere in the vicinity of Wilson and Elm City in machines by their kidnappers and then dumped out. The men were roughly treated, according to company officials, and two received injuries which were of sufficient seriousness to cause them to seek the attention of physicians. A complete investigation of the affair is understood to be under way while search is being made for the missing men.

BUSINESS SHOWS BIG IMPROVEMENT DESPITE STRIKES

Encouraging Trend Toward Improvement Noted During the Week Just Closed

New York, July 16.—With the country's two major labor disputes still contributing their element of uncertainty, business and financial news during the past week suggest that the trend toward improvement is uninterrupted. Railroad car loadings for the last week in June were slightly smaller than in the one previous, which set a new high record for the year. The loss is accounted for by smaller coal shipments, the movement of merchandise showing a further gain.

Indication that a better demand for steel products is being maintained were confirmed by the June 30 total of unfilled orders of the U. S. Steel Corporation. As of the first of the current month the corporations books show 5,365,000 tons of unfinished business, this figure being 381,000 tons larger than on May 30 and 1,494,000 tons above that on February 28, when the low point of the recent depression was made. It is estimated, furthermore, that the June 30 figure means that new business during June amounted to more than 1,400,000 tons which is a volume exceeding the corporations' monthly production capacity. At present steel output is experiencing a mild check on account of the railroad strike, the Steel Corporation's rate of operations having been reduced from 77 per cent to 75 per cent. Meanwhile the trade has developed a certain amount of anxiety over a possible car shortage this fall, pointing out that the increase in new business which would accompany termination of the strike would coincide with the active period of crop movement.

NEGRO SENTENCED TO PUBLIC ROADS IN COUNTY COURT

John Ivey Speight Draws Six Months for Carrying a Concealed Weapon

The lightest docket in several months faced Judge Louis G. Cooper, in this morning's session of county court and work was completed considerably earlier than expected. The shortage of cases indicates that the element is either trying to do better or too busy to indulge in favorite pastimes.

The only case considered today was that against John Ivey Speight, colored man who has figured prominently in police circles of late. He was charged with carrying a concealed weapon and after proper evidence had been submitted Judge Cooper sentenced him to six months in jail to be assigned to work on the public roads.

SEVERAL KILLED IN MINE WARFARE IN WEST VIRGINIA

Sheriff Duvall and Thirteen Others Killed in Terrific Fighting Among Miners

FIGHTING CONTINUED AT SEVERAL POINTS EARLY THIS MORNING

State Troops Are Being Rushed to Cliftonville in Effort to Quell Disorders

(By International News.)

Welburg, W. Va., July 17.—The mine war continued to rage around Cliftonville, near here, this afternoon, and the situation is more serious than ever.

Sheriff Duvall is dead and thirteen casualties have been listed, with fighting still in progress. Nine buildings have been burned.

State troops are being rushed to the scene. The miners have been working non-union labor, which is believed to have reaped in the disorders. The miners are said to be firmly entrenched.

STATE EDUCATORS SPEND SATURDAY AT THE COLLEGE

W. T. Allen and Dr. J. H. Highsmith Speak Before Student Body While Here

A. T. Allen, director of teacher training in the State department of education, and Dr. J. H. Highsmith, inpector of high schools for the state, spent the day at East Carolina Teachers College Saturday.

Both of these men talked to the students at the Assembly hour, each giving some strong points on what makes the efficient teacher.

Dr. Highsmith spoke of three fears that handicap a teacher; the fear of the loss of health, the fear of dependence, and the fear of the loss of a job. He showed how the work in physical education was helping to eliminate the first fear; the efforts to raise teachers' salaries with suggestions for saving are helping to drive out the second fear; and how efficient training, certainly in the minds of the teachers about their own qualifications, will drive out the last fear.

He gave as the qualifications of the efficient teacher two elements; hereditary, the "born teacher," and training. Mr. Allen took up the last fear, fear of losing a job, and told just what the state is doing in its attempts to make the teaching profession a real profession, on a level with the other professions. He gave as the three essentials of this; financial returns that will attract and hold the best people in the profession; the necessity for specialized training; and a code of ethics which is not written above but that comes from the teachers themselves.

HITCHCOCK MAY BE RENOMINATED

RAILWAY FIREMEN AND OILERS JOIN SHOPMEN'S STRIKE

Eight Thousand Men Ordered to Walkout Before Night Fall Today, Reports State

Chicago, July 17.—Stationary firemen and oilers on practically all railroads throughout the country today joined the strike of shopmen. It is expected about eight thousand men will walk out before nightfall.

Savannah, Ga., 17.—A negro cook on a diner was killed and four passengers were injured near Cox, Georgia, this morning when a through train of the Seaboard Air Line from Washington to Jacksonville wrecked. Five coaches were overturned when the train struck a broken rail.

HOPES OF SETTLING COAL STRIKE DASHED AT CAPITAL TODAY

Washington, July 17.—Hopes for quick and early settlement of the coal strike with major parties in controversy here were apparently dashed this afternoon with announcement of the policy of the committee of the United Mine workers to leave the capital today.
Meanwhile the administration will mark time both in the road coal strike. President Harding said nothing pending receipt of bituminous miners reply.

DEVEREAUX PLAYERS SLIGHTLY DELAYED IN REACHING CITY

Will Reach Here in Time for Entertainment Tonight, However

The Devereux Players will assuredly be here on the six-thirty Atlantic Coast Line train from Weldon and will give the evening performance at East Carolina Teachers College at the hour advertised, 8:30. They telephoned from Weldon that they were stranded there and found it impossible to get across the country with their baggage in time for the matinee this afternoon, therefore it was necessary to call off the matinee.

This was a very great disappointment to the college people and to the public. They had advertised the matinee in good faith, assured that the players could get here as they had Sunday between dates. They had a big skip to make, however, and because of the confusion of trains due to the strike they failed to make the connections that would put them here. They did not know until they reached Weldon that they could not get here in time. It was nearly two o'clock before the messages came through to the college.

WYCHE FEATURES IN STORY TELLING AT THE COLLEGE

After Spending Several Days Here Noted Humorist Leaves for Trip to Raleigh

Richard T. Wyche, the story-teller, who spent several days at East Carolina Teachers College last week telling stories and talking on story-telling, left Saturday afternoon for Raleigh, where he will tell stories at the State College.

He told stories at twilight two evenings, and at other times when the school assembled.
On Friday evening the story-telling was open to the public and a number of town people were in the audience. He entertained with Uncle Remus stories, incidentally dropping hints of how to tell stories and giving intimate personal bits about Joel Chandler Harris, who was a friend of his. He showed his knowledge of human nature by making the stories the main thing on a hot summer night instead of making the lecture on stories the leading feature and illustrating with stories.

COLORADO BOY SHOT NEAR CITY SUNDAY

Willie Holloway Shot Through Lung While Playing With Friends Sunday Afternoon

Willie Holloway, fifteen year old colored boy employed on the Bill Sutton farm, a few miles from Greenville, was accidentally shot through the top of the right lung while playing with a crowd of boys in a road near his home Sunday afternoon. A bullet from a 32 calibre revolver entered the boy's chest, passed on through the top of his lung and lodged in his back. While the injury is serious, physicians have strong hope of his recovery.

Holloway with a crowd of boys were frolicking in the road. They became interested in the pistol and began a thorough inspection of the contents of its chamber. The revolver suddenly fired and Holloway, who was standing several yards away, dropped to the ground crying out that he was shot. The boys became so excited that it could not be ascertained which one had the gun when it fired.

The wounded boy was immediately rushed to the Skinner-Smith emergency hospital here where the bullet was removed and the wound dressed.

WOMAN IS KILLED WHEN DAM BURSTS AND FLOODS CITY

Property Loss Estimated at \$1,000,000 Also Occurs in Williamansett, Mass.

BUILDINGS SWEEPED FROM FOUNDATIONS BY FORCE OF FLOOD

Trees and Telephone Poles Also Uprooted as Seven Feet of Water Covers City

Williamansett, Mass., July 17.—One woman is dead and property loss estimated a million dollars resulted of a flood which swept through this place when two dams gave away. A wall of water seven feet high swept everything in its path. Buildings were torn from their foundations and trees and telephone poles were uprooted. The flood is the most serious and destructive that has visited this section in many years, and it is very likely the toll of life will grow as reports from outlying sections are received.

RADIO BRINGS INFORMATION TO ISOLATED POINTS

Potent Agencies of Civilization Are Strengthened by Newest Fad

New York, July 17.—The future of radio telegraphy is assured. It already has a healthy and well defined field. The future of the radiophone broadcasting, however, is another matter and in this we can speculate with only limitation of the imagination.

Contrary to popular understanding, radio has not come to us suddenly. It has been under development continuously during the last twenty-two years. Commercial radio communication—that is, overseas radio teledevelopment and has found a large market in the telegraph traffic between the United States and Europe and between the United States and Japan. The total volume is constantly increasing.

As to radio telephony, it has been under development during the past fifteen years, and during the World War was successfully used for both one-way and two-way communications. It is not communication in a two-way sense. Radio broadcasting is the application of a fairly well developed science to a new use. Broadcasting is the recent development, not radio.

We may visualize the future radio as developing in quantity and quality, perhaps, as news distribution has grown since Franklin's time and as organized entertainment has grown in popular favor since the days of Tony Pastor's Theatre. Radiophone broadcasting gives us a new facility by means of which these potent agencies of civilization may be strengthened and made more popular and universal.

Broadcasting already has given the condition of isolation a new meaning. Isolation now, if it exists, must be a desired condition. No man, no family, no matter where located geographically with regard to railroads or wire telegraphs, need be beyond the range of daily radiophone broadcasted news items. It is difficult, therefore, to understand how any thinking person can believe that broadcasting will not be further extended. Isolation of families in rural or mountain districts no longer need be involuntary.

Democrats haven't much campaign material for the next election, but from all indications they won't need much to beat the Harding administration, it is said.

Things are growing worse in Republican ranks and after a while they won't know where to turn on account of confusion. But as this is exactly what the public has been expecting no one is surprised.

The railroad workers might as well enjoy their independence at the present time. One of these days when the long system of hard surfaced roads are completed their striking will trouble the country only in a minor way. Trucks will then largely take the place of trains, even for long distance, and workmen who strike will find their vacation longer than expected.

The miners continue to refuse offers of arbitration because they fail to measure up to expectation. If they continue like this the strike will endure until necessity forces them to return to their jobs. Union funds won't last always, and eventually even the "heads" who do so much advising may find it to their advantage to get the men back to the mines as early as possible.

President Harding says he will keep a firm grasp upon the strike situation and when the time for drastic action arrives, will do what ever advisable. That the situation is deserving of the undivided attention of the chief executive is not to be doubted and the sooner he decides upon some plan of reaching an amicable conclusion the earlier the situation will improve. It is to be hoped something can be done, as the public is really the sufferer and deserves immediate relief.

Wayne county has a movement under way for development of peach orchards. That this is something other counties should take note of is not to be doubted. Orchards have been allowed to go to destruction in this section because of the importance of other crops. But farm demonstration agents are every day preaching the need of diversification and when they succeed every community is going to be far more prosperous than in past years. Wayne county has taken a forward looking step and it is hoped their success will be great enough to attract the attention of every farmer in the state.

Wayne county is planning for the biggest fair in years, so reports say. So are other counties. In fact, each succeeding year in the fair business is bound to be bigger and better. If they weren't attendance would fall off and the public would lose all interest in the diversions. Pitt county is also planning for a great fair. We will have horse racing both afternoons and night and this alone will be an attraction ample of attracting many thousands who wouldn't think of witnessing an ordinary program. A brilliantly illuminated race track will add greatly to the fair, and is certain to prove a great drawing card at night.

Continued withdrawal of passenger trains on various railway lines has served to increase the seriousness of the strike situation, but promise of early reinstatement is promised by officials. Many roads have limited equipment and this is one of the main reasons why so many trains are being taken off. Repairs must wait until the locomotives return as forces are not large enough to keep up with the enormous amount of work. Main service has also been seriously affected but Uncle Sam has placed motor vehicles in use and will make deliveries as if nothing had happened. If the railroad were able to do likewise the situation wouldn't be so serious, but unfortunately they are not and the public has to suffer the consequences.

While the majority of railway workmen are the best paid men in the country certain branches of the system are so poorly paid they can hardly live. The section hand for instance, finds it difficult indeed to live, and no one can blame him when he fights further reduction. If there is to be any fairness about the thing they should equalize wages and make it so that all branches of labor will be happy and prosperous instead of only one.

WHY WAIT AND SEE?

Some time ago I received through the mails a circular-letter. It purported to discuss cooperative marketing and persuade the farmer not to sign the contract, but "Wait and see."

Such doctrine as "Wait and see" is the most damnable and dangerous propaganda that could be handed a civilized or uncivilized people. "Wait and see" cannot be linked with progress.

"Wait and see" is the very opposite of effort.

"Wait and see" is a doctrine so dangerous that the religious sects of our country condemn it, and ministers proclaim from the pulpit that "Wait and see" will fill a seething hell with writhing souls.

"Wait and see" has impoverished countries, homes and people.

"Wait and see" has starved millions in distant lands, filled our asylums, county homes and orphan asylums.

"Wait and see" is the mother of indolence, lassitude and the father of evil.

Had the writer of "Wait and see" adopted it himself he would not have written it, because "Wait and see" comes before the beginning of anything—before effort.

But, Mr. Farmer, why should you "Wait and see?" Haven't you seen enough? What else can you see? Our opponents said the farmers could not be organized. We now have seventy-five thousand. They said we could not finance the Association; we have thirty million of dollars as a beginner. They said we could not secure warehouses; we now have two hundred and six houses, and will build one in Wilson.

They said we could not get redrying and storage plants; we now have enough to handle three million pounds per day. They say we can't sell our tobacco; the Burley pool has sold to date two-thirds, and can sell all tobacco on hand.

They say we will have to keep the tobacco five years. Did Kentucky? But they say the farmer of North and South Carolina, "Wait and see." What else is there to see? You have seen every argument they put up fail or prove false.

Yes, they want you to "Wait and see," but what will you see? You will see yourself and family toiling sixteen hours a day, facing sickness, death, hail, scorching sun, drowning rains, fertilizer accounts and failure—without assurance, without insurance, without recreation, without time for worship or pleasure, and at the last end of the year's toil see the crop, the fruits of your labor, placed on a merciless market, where speculators can come in and help themselves.

Of course they don't want you to organize and sell your crops in a business manner, but sell them on a glutted market and destroy in a minute a year's hope.

They want you to "Wait and see," because that will give them one more crop to nick from.

In conclusion, will say to all, that as long as you live in this great country of ours, as long as a merciful God watches over you and sheds His daily blessings upon you, never step in the way of progress, nor practice (and by no means preach) the abominable and accursed doctrine of "Wait and see."—By F. DEVELOPMENT IS KEENLY WATCHED BY THE OFFICIALS

Events of Next Six Months Will Decide Fate of Russia

By HARRY L. ROGERS, International News Service Staff Correspondent.

Washington.—The events of the next six months should tell the tale of Soviet Russia, at least so far as the present phase of its existence is concerned, according to Administration officials in closest touch with the situation.

Whether Lenin continues in power, or whether by reason of illness, death or otherwise he should lose control of the machine he has created, officials believe developments between now and the first of the year will have clarified the situation sufficiently to warrant this Government in taking a new account of stock.

There is an almost unanimous conviction here that Lenin himself, if free to follow his own bent, would be willing to make such concessions as practically to meet the conditions laid down by Secretary of State Hughes as essential to the resumption of relations between the United States and Russia. The Soviet delegation at Genoa, according to the most reliable information available here, was obviously seeking some graceful way of deserting the more radical principles of communism, but were forced to proceed slowly both on account of the strength of the orthodox communist element at home and the opposition of communists all over the world.

During The Hague conference there were evidences that the more astute Bolshevik leaders were working in this direction, notwithstanding occasional outbursts from radicals, who waved the red flag with old-time vigor. Should Lenin remain in power it is believed here that he will be able to accomplish something definite during the next six months, either in the way of modification of Soviet policy to meet the demands of the outside world, or at least he will have satisfied himself that conformity with the views of such nations as

the United States and France is a concession too radical for the cohorts of Bolshevism to accept. If events prove that Lenin is really out of the running, as has been intimated in some of the reports concerning his physical condition, then it is thought likely that six months will prove a sufficient time for the readjustment which must inevitably follow the elimination of Lenin from the affairs of Russia.
