GREENVILLE ROTARY CLUB WILL ENTERTAIN INTER-CITY ROTARY CONFERENCE DURING NEXT FALL

First Plans Outlined at Regular Business Meeting of the Club Last Night

PRESIDENT WINSLOW TELLS OF CONFERENCE IN LOS ANGELES, CAL.

Twenty-six Countries Were Represented at International Convention

The regular business meeting of the Rotary Club was held at the beautiful home on Rotary avenue yesterday evening at six-thirty and featured in the usual social and several interesting talks. The session was presided over by J. E. Winslow, president, who has just returned from Los Angeles, California where he attended the international convention of Rotary clubs.

The first talk of the evening was made by Dr. P. J. Chester, head of the Pitt county health department. He spoke on the subject of "Rotary in Business and brought out a number of points of interest to his hearers. He showed what an important part the principles of Rotary played in the business world and said they moulded sentiment that is bound to bring about greater things in the next generation.

Professor Robert H. Wright conducted a "quiz" and several members called upon to tell on what committees he had served in Rotary and what work had been accomplished. This proved highly informative and showed encouraging progress in the past.

President Winslow told of his trip to the convention, presenting many facts which his hearers listened to with keenest interest. He said the convention was the greatest in history of Rotary and that principles of the organization predominated all other issues. Flags of twenty-six countries flaunted proudly over the speaker's stage, and each of these countries was represented by well informed delegates.

He said it was Rotary from the beginning to the closing of the conference and that all speeches carried something of great value to everyone present. The ideas presented by each speaker were interesting to say the least, as they showed what other countries think about conditions and what they have done for the organization's success.

The next inter-city convention of district Rotarians will be held in Greenville this fall, it was stated, and committees of the local club were instructed to get busy and make arrangements for entertaining the many visitors expected to be in attendance during the one day the conference will be in progress. All clubs are interested in what Greenville is doing as it is the only club in the world with a home of its own and Greenville is the smallest town in the world with a Rotary club.

STRIKE SITUATION IS GROWING WORSE DAILY, SELF SAYS

Clerk of Corporation Commission Writes Merchants Association of Conditions

That the strike situation is more serious than the general public realizes is set forth in an interesting way in a letter received this morning by Miss Ella Renner, secretary of the Merchants association from Mr. R. O. Self, clerk of the State Corporation commission. The letter was in reply to a protest against the discontinuance of passenger trains, and shows what the corporation has been doing to prevent serious consequences.

The letter in part, follows: "Replying to your letter of the 14th inst., the commission directs me to say that this train service will be discontinued as soon as possible. The strike situation is growing worse daily. The Seaboard Air Line suspended forty trains on its system in several states yesterday and it is very probable that other train service will have to be suspended within the near future. The situation is much graver than the public seems to understand and there is no evidence of early improvement.

"For the past three weeks the railroads have had a few operatives who kept up some of the minor repairs but they quit today and all the equipment now which becomes impaired is very likely to be side-tracked until the conditions improve to the point where some body can be had to make repairs.

"The governor and railroad officials are in conference today in regard to sending state troops to guard the shops while the non-union men can make needed repairs but it is not known what the result will be."

KIMREY TO ASSIST IN PLACING COW ON ALL COUNTY FARMS

Lo king forward to finally placing a good watch cow on every Pitt county farm, the Pitt county Chamber of commerce and county agent, W. B. Pace, have secured the service of Mr. A. C. Kimrey, assistant dairy husbandman, of Raleigh for a campaign, beginning August 16th.

The purpose of this campaign is to tell the importance of the dairy cow to the people of this section. It is one thing to have a cow and quite another to have a good cow. Good cows, if they continue good, must have good attention. Necessary pasturage, a good home, plenty of fresh water, etc., are indispensable, if results are to obtain.

Secretary Smith, of Pitt county Chamber of Commerce, stated this morning that he has found quite a lot of interest manifested along this line throughout the county. The people from all sections of the county are enthusiastically endorsing this project.

THIRTY INJURED IN EXPLOSIONS

New York, July 18.—Thirty firemen were hurt, one of whom died, in two terrific explosions which occurred during a fire alarm preceding a fire that wrecked a six story warehouse of the Manhattan Storage Transit Co. Dozens of residents of the neighborhood were hurt by flying debris.

FIRST BOLL WEEVIL LOCATED IN COTTON CROP NEAR GRIFTON

Evidence of Pest Found on Mrs. Tom Worthington's Farm, Two Miles Out

W. B. Pace, farm demonstration agent of Pitt county, stated yesterday afternoon that the boll weevil had reached Pitt county and that considerable damage had already been done to a crop of cotton on the plantation of Mrs. Tom Worthington, two miles from Grifton. Several cotton blossoms on this plantation were examined by Mr. Pace and evidence of the weevil was as plain as in other sections where ravages have been disastrous.

The weevil will spread from one plantation to another until the entire cotton acreage is infested, but the farmer can reduce his loss by timely application of destructive measures. Calcium arsenate is said to be the best thing with which to combat the weevil, Mr. Pace said, but farmers aren't advised to use it this year because the cotton is too large to experience much results. With continued spread of the pest, however, the farmer will find it to his advantage to use it freely and to get in touch with the farm department and take advantage of all information connected with combating the greatest menace to cotton the world has ever known.

That the weevil will visit other parts of the county is not to be doubted, in the least. Mr. Pace said he would inspect the majority of crops within the next several days to determine exactly what progress has been made. Other counties have also reported the prevalence of the pest the last few days, and as millions are bred by one weevil alone it is believed virtually all cotton growing sections will have the visitors by cotton picking time.

The weevil hatches in the bloom and destroys it before it can fully develop, Mr. Pace said, and the only way this can be prevented is to dust every acre of cotton with calcium arsenate. The dew settles on the cotton at night and when the weevil comes out to take a sip of the dew in the morning he drinks his death, as the arsenate has already been mixed with the dew. This is the most effective way of combating the pest, although many other means have been devised, and farmers are advised to use it freely.

STRIKE SITUATION REPORTED QUIET IN CLINTONVILLE, VA.

Many Deputies and Prisoners Searching for Men Guilty of Killing Sheriff Yesterday

AMERICAN EXPORT TRADE IMPROVES

Nation Exporting Goods in Huge Quantities Despite Tie up of Transportation

Washington, July 18.—Despite un- stabilized condition of the foreign exchange and the general economic confusion in Europe, the United States is exporting goods in huge quantities, the commerce department announced today.

June exports amounted to \$31 million dollars, an increase of twenty-seven millions over May. Imports amounted to \$260 millions, approximately eight million more than during the month of May.

AUTOMOBILE TOUR OF GEORGIA WILL BEGIN AUGUST 2ND

Trip to Study Farm Conditions is Now an Assured Fact and Increasing in Interest

TOUR WILL ALSO TAKE IN SEVERAL S. C. TERRITORIES

Many Prominent Business Men and Planters Have Signified Intention of Going

A movement of more than passing significance is that initiated by the Pitt County Chamber of Commerce and the county agent. An automobile tour of South Carolina, and Georgia is now an assured fact. For the past several days the trip has been agitated and fostered, and now that it has become a reality is gratifying to those who have been working on it. The trip will begin August 2.

The purpose of the trip is to visit those sections of Georgia which have made progress under boll weevil conditions and study the underlying causes of this progress. There are several key places that will be visited and their methods of diversified farming studied carefully.

That diversified farming must be put in operation here is evident. A careful analysis of the present situation will bring this fact close home. The boll weevil is now at work in Pitt county. By another reason quite a bit of damage will result to the farmers of Pitt county, unless they begin now to diversify.

Those sections of Georgia will be visited which have something definite to show as the result of their thinking and planning. Chicken farms, hog farms, grain elevators, stock yards, sweet potato curing houses, dairies, creameries, etc., will be visited and the various angles studied carefully.

The people of Pitt county have demonstrated that they believe this movement to be most significant and will place our people two or three years ahead as a result of the information obtained. Dr. W. W. Dawson of Grifton said: "I do not believe that a greater movement could be started at the present moment than to see this trip through. It will be worth a great deal."

The following have already definitely committed themselves for this trip: from Grifton, G. T. Gardner, L. J. Chapman; from Ayden: Stancill Hodges and R. W. Smith; Winterville, A. W. Ange and Roy Cox; Greenville W. J. Hardee and G. B. W. Hadley, Farmville, Jno. T. Thorne and T. C. Turnage; Grimesland, W. E. Procter; Bethel; W. J. Smith. Fountain, R. A. Fountain.

Both Ayden and Grifton, as well as Winterville saw that they will double the present certified list. When the other places shall have been visited, it is confident that at least 25 will be signed up for the trip.

FIVE DEMANDS OF STRIKING SHOPMEN ARE MADE PUBLIC

Hopes for Early Peace in the Strike Situation Still Held Out by Officials

MAINTENANCE WAY MEN CONTINUE TO LEAVE THEIR JOBS

Some Additions to Ranks of Strikers Reported From Several Parts of Country

Washington, July 17.—The five demands of the striking shopmen was announced today as the restoration of all seniority rights strikers, immediate establishment of a National adjustment board so that the men may obtain quicker action on local grievances than is possible through the Labor Board. The abolishment of outside contracting by the roads, the restoration of certain rules and working agreements and a return to the scale of wages in effect before the cut ordered by the Labor Board for July 1 became effective, simultaneously with the strike.

An indication of negotiations on these issues in the statement of R. A. Henning, general chairman of the Federated shopcrafts of the North west, that only the refusal of the Eastern roads to reinstate striking workers with their full seniority rights was preventing a settlement as far as the roads of the Northwest were concerned.

Hopes for an early peace also were based on the attitude of E. F. Grable, president of the maintenance of way employees, who arrived in Chicago tonight for conferences with members of the Labor Board to get support to prevent carriers from requiring maintenance men to do strikers' work.

While maintenance men were reported from various sections of the country, mostly New York, as having joined the strike, Mr. Grable asserted that such walkouts were entirely unauthorized and that no strike orders would be issued until at least a meeting of the grand lodge of his organization in Detroit on Thursday. He will report there the result of the negotiations with members of the Labor Board.

Some additions to the ranks of the strikers in various sections were also reported among the clerks, freight handlers, firemen and oilers, but railway executives declared that the defections had been more than made up by the numbers of shopmen who returned to work on the last day allowed them on many roads to protect their seniority rights.

MISSIONARY HOLDS SPLENDID SERVICES AT COLLEGE SUNDAY

Miss Elizabeth Bass Delivered Fine Message to Students on Campus Sunday Afternoon

She also gave a few simple, heartfelt words as to what it means to give oneself for service of this kind.

Greenville people have a right to be proud of the malaria campaign which has been in progress the past two years, as much good work has been accomplished and the city today probably has the best record of any other in Eastern Carolina. Hundreds of traveling men come here from other sections where they were unable to rest comfortably on account of the troublesome mosquito. They not only find conditions better, but are surprised to learn that the mosquito has been entirely banished. The campaign has done this much, and it is something every citizen has a right to be proud of.

The head of the Russian delegation at the conference for the reconstruction of Russia has asked for a continuance of deliberations, even though Russia caused the conference to break up and leave the question in disgust. I. M. Litvinoff represented the mass of Russian people the conference might be able to accomplish something, but since he carries no more weight than the ordinary Russian leader his request can't mean much one way or the other. If Russia isn't sufficiently interested in her own reconstruction to help the delegates solve her problems, then the other countries might as well give up the job.

Farmers are curing tobacco in all parts of the county at present time and when the market opens August 15th there will be very few not ready to place their entire crop on the floor for sale. While only a small portion of the crop will be sold the first two weeks, it is expected everything will be cleaned up by the holiday season. In fact, the shortage this year is more pronounced than in years, and good tobacco no doubt will demand much better prices than under ordinary conditions. While the rain did incalculable damage to many farmers those with good tobacco will be able to come out with colors flying. The quality, however, will be inferior compared to past years on account of second growth resulting from the rain but there will be some good tobacco and this should demand splendid prices. Things look mighty blue at present, but that old saying about every cloud has a silver lining may yet come true, though it certainly won't affect all farmers this season.

Hopes of immediate settlement of the coal strike have been dashed

again and President Harding is left in the same embarrassing position as usual. It's a pity he can't call the mines and operators together long enough to reach some kind of a compromise. It is very evident something must be done and if the chief executive of the government can't do it who in the world are we to look to. The controversy should not be allowed to continue any longer than possible and if the miners still persist in maintaining an attitude of indifference the president should make it his business to put the mines in operation under government supervision. This will not appeal to the miners. But who cares what appeals to them so long as the public is saved from suffering. The time for action has come and if Mr. Harding can't do anything why not turn things over to congress and let its members act at once.

The railroad strike has increased in seriousness with the walkout of stationery firemen and oiler and the railroads will be less capable of rendering efficient service now than ever. It's a pity something can't be done. This is the time of year when crops should be moved as hurriedly as possible, especially perishable products, and the strikers are doing themselves and industry the greatest harm imaginable in interrupting transportation. Several officials have said that they will keep their trains moving even though they have to hire outside labor. That's the thing to do until the strike is settled. Certainly the strikers can't object to this when they know it is for the country's own good. If they should object and resort to disorder the government should immediately protect the interests of the public. In this way alone can we expect to come out of the strike without the greatest injury to industry in years.

With refusal of all offers for development of Muscle Shoals it is to be presumed that the government means to operate the plant itself. While this may be generally acceptable to members of the Republican party, Democrats believe Henry Ford would be able to do more than all other parties concerned and that the government would do the wise thing by turning the property over to him. The government, however, has a peculiar notion about developing things. Thousands of dollars worth of valuable material and equipment used during the war have been destroyed for the simple reason the government couldn't use it to an advantage and didn't want anyone else to derive any benefit from it. The hard earned money of the American people is spent recklessly—far to recklessly for their own good. And when they try to develop Muscle Shoals under government supervision another large amount of hard earned money will be spent unwisely.

PARIS STUDENTS WILL USE PERSHING STADIUM

Paris, July 18.—French school children are to have the benefit of the Pershing Stadium, built by the A. E. F. Work has been started on the big field, which is near Jolville-le-Pont, to reconstruct the stadium itself and to convert the arena into drill ground and track space for boys and girls. The Paris Municipal Council, doing the work is following a suggestion made by the international committee on Olympic Games.

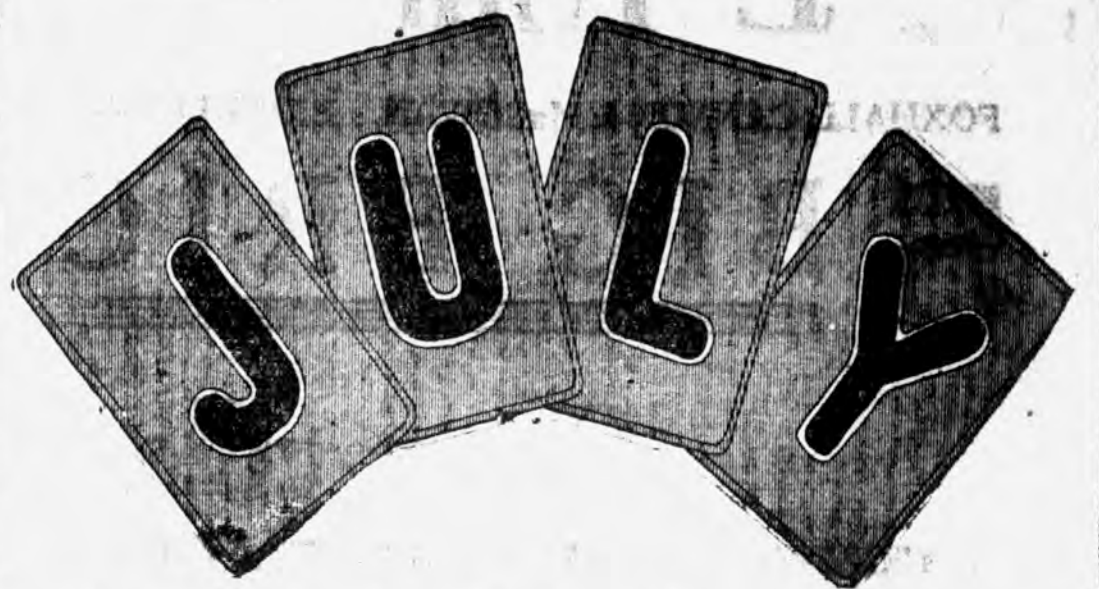
