PRAISES STANDARD OF TRAINING TO BE FOUND AT COLLEGE

TO ATTEND SESSION OF THE BUILDING COMMITTEE OF COLLEGE THIS AFTERNOON

REACH AGREEMENT; WORKERS WILL RETURN

SEPARATE AGREEMENT OF THE PENNSYLVANIA LINE BELIEVED TO HAVE CLARIFYING EFFECT

Dr. E. C. Brooks, State superintendent of Education, made an excellent talk to the students of East Carolina Teachers College this morning at the assembly hour. He gave as the greatest art in teaching that of directing standards by which to judge people, and explained his meaning of the word "standards."

He made the statement that this is perhaps the best institution in the state for training teachers, and that it is because of the standards that are set, with that essence called spirit. He showed how standards of speech, of conduct, and of dress, take such prominent part in life. Out side of spirit the controlling influence in life has to do with changing, raising and bringing people up to standards. A political platform, he said, is nothing but the standard of the party for that year. Each denomination establishes certain standards and the people in the church choose the one whose standard they like best.

He asked the students pertinent questions as to what standards they would maintain in their communities next year, what tone they would give to their schoolrooms, what though life they would take into their work. He referred to the intellectual standards of the school, the health standards, and the religious standards. Throughout the Christian era the religious standard has been the life of Christ, and in all the mistakes the church has made, this has been the safeguard. He told the story of the treaty between Argentina and Chili and the erection of the statue of Christ on the the boundary line between the two nations.

He told the story of the Chinese school that had a mirror in which every child was told to look at himself as he entered the school and to ask himself certain questions as to his appearance and expression.

Certain standards had been set and he was to see if he came up to the standards.

Dr. Brooks has written a book on South America which will soon come from the press. His "Story of Cotton" has been exceedingly popular and is now used as a text book throughout the southern states. The new book by him will be popular, so they who have seen the advance copies predict.

The building committee of the college is in session today and Dr. Brooks is here attending this meeting. Mr. A. B. Andrews is here also.

A. W. McLean, of Lumberton, former member of the War Finance Corporation, accompanied the Tar Heels to Washington. Others in the party included former Congressman Lee D. Robinson, of Wadesboro, director, and Dr. B. W. Kilgore, director of the North Carolina Extension Service of the Department of Agriculture. C. B. Howard, sales manager, was also in the party.

President Austin anticipates no difficulty in financing the orderly marketing of the North Carolina cotton as, he has found the banks in this state ready to co-operate to the extent of their available resources.

He does not expect it will be necessary to use all the credits advanced by the War Finance Corporation, but its readiness to meet the request of the North Carolina association's very pleasing to him. The full amount asked for was granted.

While the North Carolina association already has 27,000 members representing a total of 350,000 bales of cotton, a membership campaign will be put on to bring the total sign up to 600,000 bales. At a meeting of the board of directors of the association here this week, it was decided to put on this campaign July 27 and continue it to August.

Following the mass meeting of the striking men last night which was addressed by J. E. McMahon, chairman of the executive committee of the State Federation of Labor, who urged the men to refrain from acts of violence and warned them against violating the terms of the injunction, absolute quiet has reigned in strike circles last night and today, no acts of violence being reported. Railroad officials declared there is nothing to disturb at South Rocky Mount as all the workers and guards have departed and but a scant half dozen officials are doing their best to keep the trains moving. So far there has been no interruption of passenger traffic, although an embargo was yesterday placed on all freight save livestock and perishables, through this point and is already making itself felt.

The drainage of Grindle Creek has been under consideration several years, but not until right recently were its promoters able to realize their ambition. The development will mean much to the county, and will result in the reclamation of hundreds of acres of land which have suffered heavily as result of improper drainage of the creek land.

One of the greatest development projects ever before considered in Pitt county will be taken up at a mass meeting to be held at the court house Saturday, July 29th at eleven o'clock when plans for the drainage of Swift Creek and Fork Swamp will be presented. Approximately 84,000 acres of land which could be converted into valuable farms is involved in this issue and will be one of the greatest reclamation projects ever attempted in this section.

All persons who own land in the vicinity of Swift Creek, Fork Swamp, Black Swamp, Gum Swamp and all tributaries are urged to attend this meeting for the purpose of organizing the Pitt county Drainage District No. 3, which will include all lands which drain into the above canals.

It is said that complete plans have been arranged for the drainage of Swift Creek and its tributaries and that the improvement may be perfected at a very low cost. Payments of the development can be arranged as the land owners desire, so it is easily seen that the opportunity of reclaiming the property was never greater.

The committee calling the meeting is composed of C. W. Weatherington, Charles Dudley, R. A. Wall, C. F. Joyner, W. G. Chapman and J. S. Pittman. The importance of proper drainage is being realized today as never before and people in every section are making an effort to avoid serious damage by floods in the future.

The loss by recent rainfall would have been greatly decreased if lowlands had been properly drained, and it is hoped a recurrence of such damage may be avoided in the future through proper drainage.

Greater Interest Centered Around Automobile Trip

Tour of South Carolina and Georgia to be Made Under Favorable Conditions

Inasmuch as the trip will not begin until August 2nd, quite likely there are a number of others who would be interested. Secretary Smith, of the Pitt County Chamber of Commerce, will be glad to give any one such information as they might desire in connection with this tour.

REPORT TO SETTLE SHOPMEN'S STRIKE CONTINUED TODAY

Maintenance Way Men Sticking to Their Jobs Despite Persuasion of Shopmen

PENNSYLVANIA LINES REACH AGREEMENT; WORKERS WILL RETURN

SEPARATE AGREEMENT OF THE PENNSYLVANIA LINE BELIEVED TO HAVE CLARIFYING EFFECT

Chicago, July 18.—With E. F. Grable, president of the maintenance of way union, asserting that he did not expect his men to leave their work, steps looking toward a peaceful settlement of the shopmen's strike continued today.

Announcement by the Pennsylvania Railroad that a mutually satisfactory wage agreement had been reached with its shopmen was considered by some railroad and union leaders to have had a clarifying effect on the entire situation, inasmuch as the Pennsylvania has insisted on dealing direct with its own men.

Mr. Grable issued a statement tonight asserting that "the path to an early adjustment is open" so far as the 400,000 maintenance men are concerned. Referring to his conference with President Harding last week, Mr. Grable said he had received assurances that Chairman Cummins, of the Senate interstate commerce commission, expected to hold early hearings on disputed questions on the labor provisions of the Transportation Act, particularly with reference to the living wage principle.

"The basis for the guidance of the Board in the present act is to set a 'just wage,'" Mr. Grable's statement said. "The present situation which should be settled by such a hearing by the Interstate commerce commission of the Senate and amendments to laws is an interpretation of this phrase 'just and reasonable' and its application to a living wage."

Mr. Grable said he advised the Board of orders sent to his general chairman to open negotiations with their respective roads immediately regarding disputed rules, working conditions and wages and to submit the case to the board if an agreement was not reached.

The first of these disputes came before the board today, the dispute being that of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul road. The carrier set aside the thirty-day clause in existing agreement for the filing of a dispute and Mr. Grable secured the board's promise for early hearings on this and similar cases, many of which will be consolidated.

POTATO STORAGE HOUSE IS PLANNED AT BETHEL SOON

Stockholders Decide to Begin Erection of 10,000 Bushel Warehouse Immediately

Bethel, N. C., July 19.—At an enthusiastic meeting of growers and stockholders of the Bethel Sweet Potato Growers Association here last night plans were perfected in the organization of the Bethel Sweet Potato Storage House Corporation by electing the following directors, S. M. Jones, Pres. W. M. Pruett, S. C. Ives, E. A. Tripp, W. O. Manning and J. L. Gurganus and Dr. C. J. Eilen. Mr. J. B. Corey was elected secretary and treasurer of this corporation.

Bids were received and considered for the erection for the 10,000 bushel storage house that the association proposes to build. The building committee was instructed to award the contract and proceed with the building immediately. This building is to be completed ready for use by the first to the middle of September.

The growers association has around thirty acres signed under contract to be stored in this building and as many more acres growing that waiting to see the outcome of the housing proposition before they sign the contracts. The outlook for the potato crop here at the present is splendid.

Pitt county business men should join the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce in its trip through the states of Alabama and Georgia for the purpose of getting first hand information as to certain crops and measures used in combatting differ-ent pests. The trip should be of in-estimable value to the business man as well as the farmers as he will see for himself exactly what is taking place. This will certainly be more valuable than reading about it and impressions would be far more cer-tain. It's to be hoped scores will make the trip and return to put their experience into the industry at home.

It is very evident the coal strike will continue for quite a while yet and it is up to the government to get busy and see what can be done to relieve the situation which is be-coming rather acute with each suc-ceeding day. That the reserve sup-ply, which some thought would continue indefinitely, has practically been exhausted is evident by reports from the mining districts. And un-less some action is taken the winter will see hard times indeed. Prices will advance despite everything the government or anybody might do. It is perfectly natural that people able to pay high prices would do so if they thought they were going to suf-fer and where would the ordinary laboring man come in. The govern-ment shouldn't delay action any lon-ger than necessary, and the sooner they get men in the mines and the wheels of industry humming the quick-er the situation will be relieved.

AN UNWELCOME VISITOR.

The first boll weevil has made its appearance in Pitt county and unless the farmers take the offensive the pest will be so strongly entrenched by next year that crops will suffer inevitably. We have heard much about the weevil in past years, and knew it would reach us after a while, but very few farmers have thought over the matter seriously. The time has come, however, for serious consideration, and the grower that expects to raise his usual crop next year must prepare himself. The use of arsenate is considered the most effective way of combatting the pest. It has been used extensively in all areas visited by the weevil with pronounced success. In fact, farm demonstration agents have investigated the best means of decreasing the ravages and have found to their own satisfaction that arsenate destroys the weevil more ef-fectively than all other things com-bined. Stricken districts have used the powder to a direct advantage in past months, and as a result crop de-struction isn't near so bad as two years ago when great havoc was wrought in hundreds of cotton pro-ducting communities. The weevil multiplies rapidly. One weevil can create a million in com-paratively short time and at this rate fields can be covered by the pest in startlingly short time. The farmer's work will be greatly increased by employing these measures but they will find they have gained more than can possibly be lost. Some people seem to think the danger of the weevil is exaggerated. That is a mistake, as extensive reading of authoritative literature will show, will find the job a big one and the pest as serious as the worst picture ever painted it. So the thing to do is to prepare for eventualities.

SAYS MILK SHOULD BE USED AS FOOD FOR THE CHILDREN

Expert Says it Contains More Materials for Health and Growth Than Other Foods

(By Zella Wigent)

There is no more important article of food especially for growing children than milk. It contains more of the materials necessary to health and growth than any other food.

Growing children need whole milk. Dr. E. V. McCullom, of Johns Hopkins University, declares that "No family has the right to purchase meat until each member has a pint of milk daily."

Milk is highly in lime content and lime is good for bones and teeth. Besides being easily prepared, palatable and of high mineral content, milk is one of the "protective" foods. Green leaves, such as lettuce, spinach, chard and cabbage, and the yolk of egg, are the only foods which contain the protective, growth-making principle in any quantity.

Milk Cheaper Than Meat.
It is cheaper than eggs or meat and there is no waste. No other food can take its place.

Thirty first-grade pupils in Brooklyn, Iowa, were given a pint of milk at recess periods every day from January through April. Fourteen of the 30 pupils were underweight in January, six of them being more than seven per cent underweight.

Children Gain Weight.

At the end of the four months the records were completed for 26 of the children. Eighteen of them gained weight; four remained the same; four lost weight. Twelve of the 14 underweight children gained weight and none was seven per cent or more underweight. The average, actual gain was two pounds per child, which was one-half pound above the average normal gain.

During April, the final month of the test, 30 pupils of the second grade were used as a check. They were not given milk at recess time and all lost weight. Only three, or 10 per cent of the first grade pupils, who were

Given milk at recess, lost weight during the same month.

ARMY REPAIR SHOPS WILL OPEN SOON IN LEAVENWORTH, KAN.

Leavenworth, Kan., July 19.—The new \$400,000 motor transport repair shops, completed at Fort Leavenworth last March, and which will be utilized as a repairing and reconstruction center for the Motor Transport Corps of the army throughout the Middle West, will be operating full blast shortly, according to a telegram received from D. R. Anthony, Jr., Congressman, of Kansas.

Anthony stated that thirty-eight car loads of machinery, to be used in equipping the shops, would be en route here by rail from Camp Holabird, near Baltimore, some time after the first of July.

Provided the shops are operated as was intended at the time congress appropriated the money, all equipment of the Motor Transport Corps, used in widely separated corps areas will be sent here for repairing.

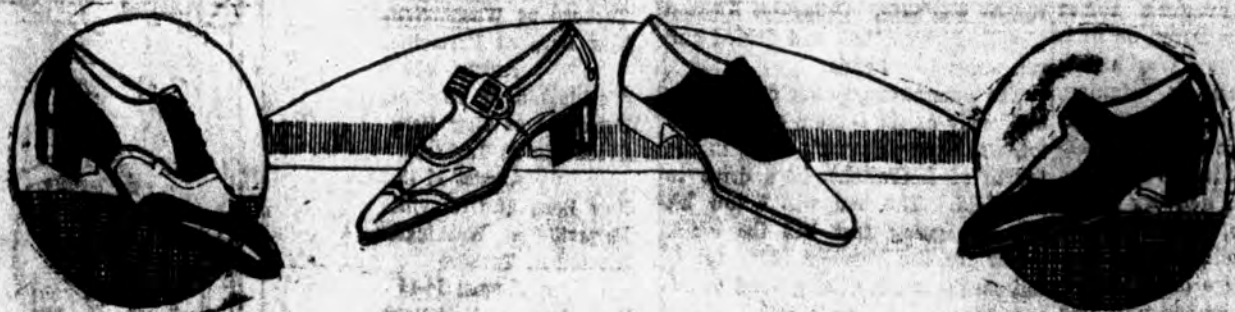

1. Slight subluxations at this point will cause so-called headaches, eye diseases, deafness, epilepsy, vertigo, insomnia, wry neck, facial paralysis, locomotor ataxia, etc.
2. A slight subluxation of a vertebra in this part of the spine is the cause of so-called throat trouble, neuralgia, pain in the shoulders and arms, goitre, nervous prostration, la grippe, dizziness, bleeding from nose, disorder of gums, catarrh, etc.
3. The arrow head marked No. 3 locates the part of the spine wherein subluxations will cause so-called bronchitis, felons, pain between the shoulder blades, rheumatism of the arms and shoulders, hay fever, writers' cramp, etc.
4. A vertebral subluxation at this point causes so-called nervousness, heart disease, asthma, pneumonia, tuberculosis, difficult breathing, other lung troubles, etc.
5. Stomach and liver troubles, enlargement of the spleen, pleurisy and a score of other troubles, so-called, are caused by subluxations in this part of the spine, sometimes so light as to remain unnoticed by others except the trained Chiropractor.
6. Here we find the cause of so-called gall stones, dyspepsia of upper bowels, fevers, shingles, hiccough, worms, etc.
7. Bright's disease, diabetes, floating kidney, skin disease, boils, eruptions and other diseases, so-called, are caused by nerves being pinched in the spinal openings at this point.
8. Regulations of such troubles as so-called appendicitis, peritonitis, lumbago, etc., follow Chiropractic adjustments at this point.
9. Why have so-called constipation, rectal troubles, sciatica, etc., when Chiropractic adjustments at this part of the spine will remove the cause?
10. A slight slippage of one or both innominate bones will likewise produce so-called sciatica, together with many "diseases" of pelvis and lower extremities.
