

COLLAPSE OF LABOR BOARD EFFORTS TO SETTLE RAILWAY STRIKE PROVES STUNNING BLOW TO ADMINISTRATION

**Believed Harding Will be
Forced to Take Another
Drastic Step Soon**

(By International News.)

Washington, July 20.—Collapse of the railway labor board's efforts to make peace in the rail strike proved a staggering blow to hopes of the administration. It is believed that within forty-eight hours President Harding will be compelled to take another drastic step to avert the industrial paralysis steadily creeping over the country.

One government official predicted today that if the rail strike is not stopped in the next ten days the situation will be one of chaotic confusion on all roads.

One final extreme course of action appeared open to the government today, that being in the seizure of both mines and railroads and their operation until peace is restored. This will only be taken as a last resort, however, and developments of the next several hours will be watched with interest.

ANOTHER ARREST FEATURES STRIKE AT WILMINGTON

**E. L. Fonville Also Charged
With Murder Following
Engineer's Death**

Wilmington, July 19.—Service of a second warrant charging E. L. Fonville, Atlantic Coast Line yardmaster with murder and the denial of bond is the latest development in last night's tragedy near the Union Station when John Shotwell, engineer, employed by the same company, is alleged to have been shot to death by Herbert E. Dallas, assistant yardmaster. The shooting occurred about seven o'clock and Southwell breathed his last at five a. m. today at the James Walker Memorial Hospital, where he was carried for treatment.

Request over the remains of the deceased engineer will be held during the afternoon, beginning at 3 o'clock, with Justice John J. Furlong acting as coroner in the absence of Coroner A. S. Holden. The following men, empaneled this morning, constitute the coroner's jury: Water H. Bair, foreman; Raymond D. Christman, W. H. Register, Harold W. Wells, Charlie G. Southerland and John Biddle.

The body was first viewed by Acting Coroner Furlong shortly after five o'clock this morning at the hospital. He then empaneled the jury, the members of which viewed the remains and adjourned until 3 o'clock in the afternoon. All witnesses will be heard at that time and the session will be held in the assembly room of the county commissioners.

MORRISON SCORES HARDING POLICIES TO END COAL STRIKE

Raleigh, N. C., July 19.—"Your position is practically to use the power of the government against the strikers," Governor Morrison said in a telegram in reply to President Harding's message in regard to the opening of the coal mines. "and in the enforcement of police regulations and the upholding of the law, the strikers will naturally have little confidence in the impartiality or fairness of soldiers or other agencies of force directed by a government which has staked a decided stand against them, however urgent the reasons for such a stand may be."

Governor Morrison's telegram to the President in part follows:

"There is very little mining in this state and so far as I know there are no strike troubles in this industry. It would be a vain thing for me to invite coal miners to return to work in this state, but I would do so, anyway. I am truly sorry that a judgment long formed and repeatedly expressed heretofore in my state prevents my agreeing with your position as set forth in your telegram. I deem the whole policy of national and state government trying to adjust labor disputes unwise. It always forfeits the confidence of the side to such a controversy finally decided against by the government and creates suspicion of the impartiality of its exercise of police powers. I believe the full duty of the government and the part of wisdom to uphold the law with fairness and impartiality and permit parties in industrial disputes to fight the economic battles to a finish."

GOVERNMENT MAY YET BE FORCED TO TAKE OVER ROADS

The men are alleged to have delayed the trains by attacking workers.

SECRETARY DENBY NARROWLY ESCAPES DEATH IN AIRSHIP

**Secretary of Navy Uninjured
When Plane of Chinese Gov-
ernment Falls to Earth**

(By International News.)

Peking, July 19.—Secretary Edwin Denby, of the American Navy, narrowly escaped death here today in an airplane accident. He was flying at a height of 4,000 feet over the Great Wall when the engine of the plane stalled. The machine was demolished in landing, but Mr. Denby was uninjured.

The plane belonged to the Chinese government and had seen service in the recent fighting between Generals Wu Pei-fu and Chang To-Lin. Secretary Denby emphasized, however, that he had made the flight at his own suggestion and that he did not go as the guest of the Peking administration.

The forced landing, made in the heart of the hills traversed by the Great Wall, was a thrilling one after a spectacular flight in which the high altitude was reached to avoid the mountain tops.

The party took off from the capital at noon. In the plane, besides the head of the American navy, were Captain Robert Bruce and Commander George Simpson, of the American Navy, and Charles Dolan, of Boston, who piloted the machine.

After circling over Peking, Mr. Denby suggested that they proceed to the Great Wall of China. After half an hour's flying over the wall at a altitude of 4,000 feet, the Secretary expressed a desire to follow the course of the ancient barrier to observe its serpentine path over the hills and sides.

The plane was turned along the course of the wall when suddenly the gasoline feed clogged and the pistons stopped, leaving the party 4,000 feet in the air with a series of peaks and crags below.

AIR PROPELLER IS NEW INVENTION OF ENGLISH ENGINEER

**Governments of Many Nations
Test Device Constructed by
Henry Leitner**

London, July 19.—After years of trial and experiment Henry Leitner, a British engineer, has produced an all-metal propeller, which is now being submitted to practical tests by the British, French, American and Japanese governments.

France is so well satisfied with the results already obtained that she has placed a contract for the manufacture of propellers for her air force on this pattern. A factory has been constructed in France and dies are being made.

One of the first reports on the Leitner propeller in 1917 stated that it had been tested to 75 horsepower without deterioration.

Since that day the French official research station has given this metal propeller a test with an engine of 340 horsepower. It revolved at the rate of 1,655 revolutions a minute, "without showing signs of fatigue," according to the official report.

A similar test by the British research department gave the same result. A propeller has been sent to the United States Government to be tested on a still more powerful machine. In one test a piece of metal struck the revolving blade instead of shivering to pieces the blade was dented only.

ALL EFFORTS TO END RAIL STRIKE FAIL COMPLETELY

**Ben W. Hopper, Chairman of
Labor Board, Says Situation
Continues Serious**

(By International News.)

**GREAT NUMBER OF
TRAINS ARE BEING
CANCELLED DAILY**

**Northwest Seems to be the
Hardest Hit by Strike of
Shopmen and Others**

Chicago, July 20.—Failure of all efforts to bring about the settlement of the countrywide strike of the railway shopmen was announced in a statement issued today by Ben W. Hopper, chairman of the United States Railroad Labor Board.

"As there does not seem any probability of reconciling the views of the carriers and the men on the question at issue, the labor board and none of its members are now engaged in any further efforts along that line," the statement said.

The shopmen's strike, 19 days old, is beginning to be felt throughout the country in a gradual slowing up of schedules and the cancellation or combination of many trains to save equipment.

Fifteen railroad centers in the middle and far west reported today that 247 trains have been or are about to be cancelled. The southwest, from St. Louis to Texas points, appears to be the heaviest hit.

Combined with the rail strike, the coal strike is also entering into this transportation question. Railroad stocks were depleted when the shopmen struck, and with the curtailments of freight service, several railroads are hard pressed for coal to keep their engines running.

A considerable amount of freight traffic, officials said, has been diverted to the Erie roads in distress, thru-trains are running almost on time.

In the immediate vicinity, roads report virtually no interruption of passenger traffic. Between Cleveland and Detroit passenger steamers, which ordinarily carry part of the summer load, have been withdrawn because of the coal situation. No trains on the Santa Fe have been cancelled.

A few delays were reported by officials of the Michigan Central, but no trains have been removed, they said. New York Central officials said no trains on their system have been removed, but stated delays in passenger and freight service are reported daily.

Two through trains on the Baltimore and Ohio and one local run have been cancelled on the Chicago division. One of the trains cancelled carried mail. Passenger trains continue to run late, the officials said, but show improvement.

SAYS EMPLOYEES ARE TRYING TO DESTROY UNIONS

**Senator Walsh, of Labor Com-
mittee, Charges Industrial
Troubles to Strikers**

(By International News.)

Washington, July 20.—Industrial disturbances culminating from the coal and rail strikes are due, according to Senator Walsh, member of the senate labor committee, to a disposition of certain employees to destroy unionism and to attempt certain employees with governmental encouragement, to defate wages and reduce production costs.

Raleigh, July 20.—A company of light infantry was dispatched to Rocky Mount today where striking railway men are said to have been interfering with fruit movement. Three squads of riflemen have also been sent to Aberdeen where peach shipments have been interrupted.

DOING THE RIGHT THING.

Bethel citizens are taking a forward looking step in erecting the potato storage warehouse and the farmers this year should save thousands of dollars.

Proper preservation of potato is very necessary if the industry is made the great success desired and in taking the initiative, Bethel has probably set a pace for the entire county.

The storage warehouse has proved of great value to other communities and there is no reason on earth why it shouldn't prove so in Pitt county.

Sweet potato production will probably be greater in this section the next year or so than in several years. Farmers are beginning to see the necessity of diversification, and the potato acreage will probably be among the first to receive increased attention.

Many other parts of the country have enjoyed their part of prosperity as result of potato production alone and if they can do so Pitt county farmers can also. It's to be hoped every township will have a storage warehouse by the next harvesting season as in this way alone can the industry be what it should.

The mass meeting to be held at the court house Saturday for considering plans for the drainage of Swift Creek and Fork swamp lands should be largely attended as this is an issue in which nearly a hundred thousand acres of land are at stake. At the present time this land is absolutely worthless so far as farm purposes is concerned, but when properly drained it can be converted into farm land of the most valuable kind. The project is of greater importance even than Grindle Creek because there is more land at stake, and it is the duty of everyone to be present at the mass meeting and use their influence in forming the drainage association to carry on the work. Reclamation of swamp lands is occupying more or less attention in all parts of the country, and eventually farming will be conducted upon a more extensive plan because there will be far more valuable farm land available. The government is using its influence in this work but unless the citizens do their part conditions will never become as favorable as they should. Let's all get together and do what we can in making this section what it should be.

If the coal operators return to their mines and resume work as requested by President Harding they should have the fullest protection and co-operation from the government in guarding public rights and properties. The operators realize the danger of placing non-union men on the job, and it would only be fair to them for the government to do everything necessary to guarantee the safety of their property in this last supreme effort to prevent wide-spread suffering as result of the coal shortage. The miners are determined to strike to their decision and evidently don't care what becomes of the public, therefore the public must take care of itself as best it can. The mine owners place their lives and properties in jeopardy when they resume operation despite threats of the union men and should be properly protected.

The act of the supreme court in annulling the child labor law will not be received with general pleasure throughout the country, and not very many broad minded business men will take advantage of the decision. It is very much to the credit of North Carolina cotton mill men that they have made no effort to take advantage of the law by hiring children under age. These children should be in school receiving whatever advantage offered them. Eventually they will make citizens everyone will be proud of. Taking a small child and forcing him to work long hours is the surest way of giving civilization a setback and it is hoped the court decision will carry little weight.

It is gratifying to note that Grindle Creek is to be properly drained as hundreds of acres of good farm land are involved. In recent years much of this land could not be cultivated because of fear of flood, but with the canal extending over a certain territory a considerable amount of worthless land will be reclaimed and placed in proper state of cultivation. People owning property in this district do the right thing in promoting the project. Their property will not only be increased in value, but will become more productive and less exposed to damage by the elements. This is a forward looking step and one that means much to the county and its people.

President Harding has called on the governors of all states to use their influence in ending the strike. Exactly what he expects to accomplish through such a request cannot be determined, but he has something in mind and thinks the strikers may listen to state heads more quickly than to others. While the governors in some states may do as requested there are others who will decline to do more than they have already done. The issue isn't for governor to settle, as Governor Cameron Morrison of North Carolina has said and if everyone takes the same view the request will meet with little success.

We regret to learn of disorders among railroad strikers in North Carolina or any other state for that matter as we were in hope the strike would begin and be concluded without anyone being the worse off. The issues, however, are more serious than dreamed of at first, and it is probable even loss of life may occur before compromise is effected. This is certainly to be regretted as the strike itself is serious enough without bloodshed. The government should act immediately and do everything possible to avert the serious situation which appears inevitable. Timely action may have some effect with the strikers, but unless it is timely it will prove futile.

BRITISH APPROPRIATION GREAT AID TO CANADIANS

Ottawa, Ont., July 20.—The Empire Settlement bill recently passed by the British House of Commons makes available 15,000,000 pounds sterling annually for fifteen years for the purpose of financing British colonists who desire to settle in overseas dominions of the Empire. The bill, it is believed, will prove a great impetus to immigration to Canada from the British Isles.

The bill provides that one-half of the sum made available shall be devoted to paying the passage of settlers to the dominions they select as their future home and the other half is to be used to make loans to them after they have gone upon the land. The maximum loan to each settler is reckoned at 1,500 by the government.

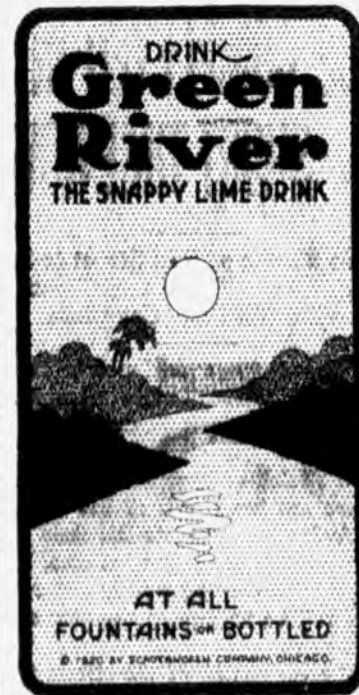

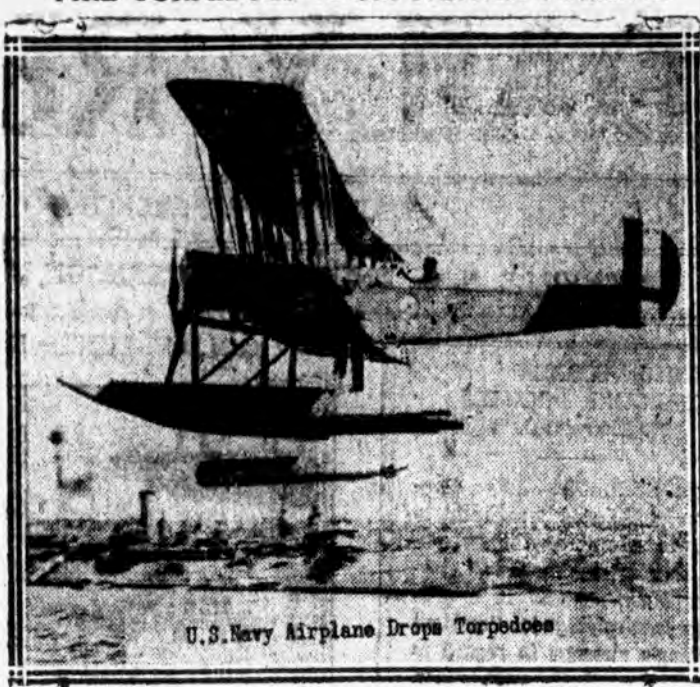

FIRE TORPEDOES FROM U. S. NAVY PLANES



U. S. Navy Airplane Drops Torpedoes

The torpedo airplane is the latest development in offensive weapons in naval warfare. In future naval battles torpedo planes will be used for swift and deadly attacks on capital ships. Flying at from seventy-five to 100 miles an hour, they will deliver their attacks in mass formation, the mechanically controlled torpedo continuing its progress when dropped into the water. The Bureau of Aeronautics of the U. S. Navy is developing a new type torpedo airplane that will be the best of its kind in the world. Photograph shows one of the planes about to drop its charge.

AUTHENTIC HISTORY OF HAWAII BEING WRITTEN

Honolulu, T. H., July 20.—Work on the compilation of the first complete and absolutely authentic history of Hawaii will be inaugurated within the next few months, it is announced by the Hawaiian Historical Commission, which has the work in charge.

Ralph S. Kuykendall, formerly connected with Leland Stanford University will be in direct charge of the work of assembling and compiling data for the new history. The work will present many difficulties, owing to the fact that prior to one hundred years ago the Hawaiian people had no written language and much data must be gathered from stories and legends handed down by word of mouth.

MURPHY PULLS HOUDINI AND ESCAPES FROM JAIL

Melrose, Mass., July 20.—Michael D. Murphy, of this city, was in the local "jug" on a charge of intoxication. A turkey making his rounds gave Mike a big drink of water, pushed through a small opening in the lower part of his cell door. Ten minutes later Murphy was gone, although the door remained securely locked.

The next day Mike returned to Chief of Police Kerr and said: "Guess you want me in court. Home looked good to me through the bars, but I'm here, anyway." He was fined \$10.

PRESBYTERIAN OFFICIAL SAILS ON TRIP TO MISSIONARY FIELDS

Dr. W. H. Foulkes to Visit in Philippines and Many Parts of Orient

(By International News.)
Vancouver, B. C. — Dr. William (Ham) Foulkes, general secretary of the Presbyterian New Era Movement, sailed from here today on the steamship Prince of Australia. He will visit mission fields in the Philippines, Japan, Korea and China.

His journey is the result of official action taken by the General Assembly's committee of the New Movement. As expressed in the recorded vote of the New Era Staff, this is "in order to gather first-hand knowledge of the benevolent work of the church, with that zeal and understanding which have characterized the benevolent work in the homeland."

This is Dr. Foulkes' absence from the active work of the New Era movement in the United States in four years.

In addition to this getting acquainted at first hand with the work going on in the mission fields, Dr. Foulkes also hopes to present to the mission workers the type of work carried on by the New Era Movement. Presbyterianism in the foreign field, notably in Korea and the Philippines, has witnessed great growth as a result of the enthusiastic adoption of New Era methods from the beginning of the movement, and church leaders in the Orient will welcome first-hand presentation of New Era principles by the general secretary.

Dr. Sao-Ke Alfred Sze, in the work of relief of the Chinese famine, Dr. Foulkes is to be afforded unusual access to many in government circles in the Orient.

Dr. Foulkes expects to arrive in Yokohama August 7, in Tokio, August 14, in Seoul August 22, in Peking September 2, in Shanghai September 26, in Manila October 3, in Canton October 13, in Hongkong October 19. He will arrive back in the United States at Seattle November 7.

Dr. Foulkes is also secretary of the committee of the Presbyterian church on work in Europe, but has deferred a personal visit to Europe until after the completion of his far Eastern trip.

WHOLE GRAIN SEED IS IMMUNE FROM WEEVILS

Washington, July 20.—Whole grain or seed of a medium degree of hardness is immune from attack by the broad-nosed grain weevil, prevalent in Florida and found occasionally in Georgia and South Carolina, according to the department of agriculture. The rice weevil, however, with which it is commonly associated, being the attack, making it a simple matter for the weaker insect to reach the softer parts of the grain, experts said. Cracked, damaged, or soft seed is usually infested by the broad-nosed weevil.
