WESTERN PENNSYLVANIA COAL MINES TO OPEN FOR OPERATION NEXT WEEK DESPITE EFFORTS TO PREVENT WORK

Plans of Operators Are Secret But Armories Are Bristling With Excitement

TROOPS TO BE SENT TO EASTERN SECTIONS TO PREVENT DISORDER

Coal Will be Dug Before Middle of Week as Mines Must be Conditioned

(By International News)
Pittsburgh, July 21.—Western Pennsylvania coal operators, independent and associated, so about re-opening their mines today. Their plans are secret, but from one end of the state to another every armory is bristling with excitement and the most intense activity.
Troops are either leaving for unknown destinations or preparing to leave, while others are to go to western counties. The balance of military forces, however, will be held in camp in readiness for an emergency call.
Coal will not be dug before the middle of next week, because the mines must be cleaned and placed in condition, it was stated, but after that time excellent progress is expected to be made. The operators are determined to replenish the diminishing supplies and mean to do so now the government has assured them of protection.

WHEAT SHORTAGE IN EUROPE AIDS UNITED STATES

War Time Boon to Foreign Surplus Accumulated in the Nations

Washington, July 21.—American wheat growers hold a strong position this year. American wheat is needed in larger quantities to feed the world. Europe's supply of the bread staple is low. The world's stock of wheat is below average. The world's consumption capacity for wheat tends toward the pre-war average, while crops of all wheat-growing nations, except the United States, show reduced output.
Surveys of crop output made by experts of the commerce department show that wheat stocks are the lowest in several years. Argentina and Australia have much less wheat than last year. The carryover crop of the United States is comparatively light because of the heavier demands from abroad. Canada is reported to have large stocks on hand.
To meet international wheat demands the United States and Canada will share in orders, the United States keeping the lead as a wheat exporter. Experts find that wheat is passing through somewhat the same stages of readjustment as wool, cotton and other staple products. In pre-war times Europe was relied upon to absorb the American surplus as well as the surplus of other large wheat-producing countries.
The world would have faced serious wheat shortage during the past two years if surplus wheat stocks had not accumulated as a result of heavy production during the war years, according to the expert opinion of the government. Successive large crops during the war years helped to carry the world over the lean producing years that followed the war. The records show, however, that both production and consumption of what have been below average for the past five years.

GOVERNOR PLANS TO SEIZE MINES

Michigan Executive to Seize Mines Monday Afternoon, it Was Stated Today

Lansing, Mich., July 21.—Governor Gore-back plans to seize Michigan coal mines Monday afternoon it was stated from an authoritative source this afternoon. This is in line with government proposals and may result in the gradually diminishing supplies being replenished.

GOVERNMENT REVISES WHITE POTATO GRADES

Washington, July 21.—In response to a widespread demand, the department of agriculture has put into effect revised United States grades for white potatoes.
The revised grades provide for the elimination from United States No. 1 of misshapen potatoes and potatoes affected by hollow heart, and the addition of a grade known as No. 1 small.
These modifications, it was stated, have been approved by a large majority of 400 of the principal factors in the potato industry, to whom they were submitted for consideration before being put in to effect.

FAIL IN ATTEMPT TO SETTLE STRIKE OF RAIL WORKERS

Hurriedly Called Conference of Senators and Rail Chiefs Proves Failure

NO LEGISLATION FOUND APPLICABLE IN THIS ISSUE

Railroad Men Declare They Will Not Yield to National Board of Adjustment

Washington, July 21.—An effort to settle the railroad strike at a suddenly arranged conference of heads of leading railroads and members of the Senate Interstate Commerce committee here tonight was understood to have failed. Those attending the conference said it now appeared that a strike settlement was much more distant and expressed pessimism over the immediate outlook, viewing the coal and railroad strikes together.
The conference, which was said to have been called on the initiative of Senator Cummins, chairman of the Senate committee, was attended by T. Dewitt Cuyler, of the Association of Railway Executives, L. F. Loe, of the Delaware and Hudson, E. J. Pearson, of the New York New Haven and Hartford, W. W. Atterbury, of the Pennsylvania, Frank H. Alfred, of the Pere Marquette, and Senators Watson, of Indiana and Kellogg, of the Senate Interstate commerce committee.
The principal points in dispute between the executives, who were called here more or less secretly late today, and the union were gone over in detail at the conference together with the possibility of legislation to meet the situation. It was said that no legislation was practicable to deal with the present strike. The rail executives, it was stated, were insistent upon three points which the unions are demanding as a recession to send the men back to work. These are the seniority rule, the restoration of the pension status and the question of boards of adjustment between the employers and employees.

GOVERNMENT WILL SEIZE COAL MINES WHEN NECESSARY

Every Department Ready to Act in Case of an Emergency, it Was Stated Today

Washington, July 21.—The government won't be caught unprepared if it should become necessary to seize and operate the coal mines of the country, members of the cabinet told members of the International News Service this afternoon.
The government stands ready with a corps of mining engineers to train an army of workers and is also prepared to send maintenance men into the mines to take the places of union miners who are preparing to leave their posts at the pumps.

DYNAMITE IS USED TO DESTROY MONSTER STILL

Greenville, S. C., July 21.—What is declared to be the largest and most complete distilling plant ever seized by raiding officers was captured near here by a group of Federal prohibition officers.
The outfit was too large to be destroyed with axes, and two sticks of dynamite were set off under the apparatus, blowing it to bits.
The plant consisted of a large brick furnace base, over which was a steel riveted boiler having a capacity of approximately 400 gallons. Two copper condensing outfits were connected with the boiler, each having a capacity of ninety gallons. Five thousand gallons of rye beer was poured out by the officers. No arrests were made.

JOE BOEHLING TO APPEAR ON MOUND FOR LOCALS SOON

Former Washington American Hurler to Begin Work Monday or Tuesday

Joe Boehling, of Richmond, a former pitcher of the Washington Americans, has signed up with Greenville and will be seen on the mound Monday or Tuesday of next week. Boehling is a hurler of no little ability, having established a record of thirteen straight victories while pitching for Washington.
In fact, he established such an enviable reputation that the day he pitched was known as "Boehling Day" and always drew unusually large crowds of spectators from Richmond, his home town, and Washington.
Boehling retired from service in the big league to enter the business field in Richmond and Greenville is very fortunate in securing his services the remainder of this season. He is not only a great pitcher, but is a terror with the willow and may be seen in the field before doing mound duty next week.
The acquisition of another pitcher greatly increases the strength of the Greenville club and it is probable the remainder of the season will witness a better showing than during the first half.

COMMISSION PLANS TO INSURE QUICK SHIPMENT OF COAL

Prepares to Move Coal to Any Point Wherever it is Needed the Worst

Washington, July 21.—The Interstate Commerce commission is preparing to insure shipments of fuel to all parts of the country in the greatest need. In fact, preparations may be so extensive that they will take on the same aspect of war time activities.

TOY BALLOON OF OHIO BOY TRAVELS 300 MILES

Cincinnati, July 21.—A toy balloon, of the common or street corner variety, filled with illuminating gas and released on the afternoon of July 4 by Clifford Unsinger, journeyed 320 miles to Cookeville, Tenn., in 18 hours and was picked up by Gilbert Hatfield, a nineteen year old farmer. The balloon was one of a score sent up by the Cincinnati man with his name and address attached to them, and the letter which he received from Hatfield stated that it was first sighted by him while he was plowing corn near his home. So far the other nineteen balloons have not been reported.

PLAN TO PUT COAL RATIONING PLANS INTO EFFECT SOON

Administration Officials Watch Dwindling Supply of Coal With Great Concern

DAUGHERTY SAYS SHORTAGE APPEARS CERTAIN THIS YEAR

Hoover and Interstate Commerce Commission Working on Rationing Plans

Washington, July 20.—Development of plans for stretching out the nation's coal supply, now dwindling under continued impact of the mine and rail strike, was the immediate concern today of Federal officials acting in the industrial situation. Secretary Hoover announced that within a day or two the Interstate Commerce Commission and the Commerce department would put into operation a scheme of diverting to essential lines the coal coming from non-union mines and those that may be opened up in union territory by use of priority orders governing transportation. The object will be the maintenance of the transportation machine.
Next in order for coal supply from the diminished output, it was indicated, would be the Northern great lake ports, and should the found impossible to avert a shortage, the coal distribution plan might be expanded to become a complete rationing of supply to other industries and territories as their necessities might appear.
Attorney General Daugherty commented in connection with this plan that the strike disruptions had already made it certain that there would be a coal shortage next winter.

Replies of governors to President Harding's invitation that they guarantee protection to mine operation in spite of the strike continued to come to the White House, practically all assuring the Federal government support.

Governor Groesbeck, of Michigan, outlined plans for opening mines there under state control with Federal sanction, but comment was withheld.
In connection with a message from Governor Morrison, of North Carolina, questioning the President's policy in asking that the mines be opened, even if force was necessary to protect workers, high administration officials pointed out that responsibility for coal production in that state was small. Only one coal mine is operating there, it was said, employing sixty miners, none of whom are members of the union and who averaged about 50 tons per day.

WAYNE ARTILLERY TO ROCKY MOUNT

Company Entrained Today to do Guard Duty at Railroad Shops of Coast Line

Goldsboro, July 21.—The Wayne county battery, field artillery and machine gun unit has entrained for Rocky Mount where they will guard shops of the Atlantic Coast Line where recently disorders occurred. The men were in the best of spirits and anticipated no trouble after their arrival.

GENERAL MOSELEY FLAYS INSULTERS OF UNIFORM

Battle Creek, Mich., July 21.—Sharp criticism of the "unthinkable disrespect" which Battle Creek girls crimed for the United States army uniform when they requested Camp Custer soldiers to wear civilian clothes at dances is contained in a statement issued by Brigadier-General George Moseley, camp commander.
"Can it be that the uniform of the man of the United States army, especially when it covers the body of a fine upstanding enlisted man in a selected regiment, is a badge of shame or reproach?" asked the general.

KENTUCKY FIGHTS EXCESSIVE RATES

Commission Claims Rates Are Higher in One Section Than in Others

(By International News.)

Washington, July 21.—Freight rates on soft coal from western Kentucky to Chattanooga and points to northern Georgia are unreasonably and unduly prejudicial to Kentucky mines, the Interstate Commerce commission declared in a stated issued this afternoon. The commission said that rates were fifty cents a ton higher by the Louisville and Nashville railroad than from Jellico and Mid-dleboro groups to the same points. An order adjusting the rates will be issued.

OUTLOOK FOR FALL AND WINTER.

Conditions at the close of the first half of 1922 indicate that business will expand moderately during the autumn and winter months. It is now one year since the definite beginning of recovery from the depression of 1920-21. Progress was slow until the close of 1921, but since the beginning of 1922 improvement has been rapid. Money is cheap. The crop outlook is excellent. With few exceptions, stocks of raw materials and of manufactured products are not larger than necessary to bridge the normal period between production and consumption. Commodity prices are rising. The movement at present seems to be primarily one of adjustment between the different classes of commodities, and as long as the upward tendency does not assume a speculative character, it is a favorable factor. Except for strikes, there is little idleness. Production has expanded steadily since the beginning of the year, and as yet the usual mid-summer dullness has been little felt.

Any fair appraisement of the situation must, however, take cognizance of several groups of qualifying factors. First and most important of these is the position of domestic consumers. Many are cautious and disposed to economize. Buying is not likely to be stimulated by reports of impending shortage of goods, or fears of higher prices, for except in the case of necessities the public is willing to wait, or to do without, if prices show a tendency to soar. Furthermore, large sections of the population cannot buy, no matter how willing, if prices rise too rapidly. Although they have recovered somewhat, wages and salaries are lower than two years ago. Enforced unemployment left many workers in debt, or with depleted savings, not yet made good. Strikes have kept hundreds of thousands in idleness for months and threaten to result in idleness for other thousands if not speedily brought to an end. Farmers are usually conservative buyers and although prices of farm products have improved, prices of what farmers must buy are still too high in relation to what they have to sell to place them in a position to expand their purchases rapidly.

Governor Morrison has firmly declined to assist President Harding in ending the coal strike, believing that his policy is wrong and entirely out of line with good business judgment. Whether the governor is right in this attitude will be made very plain later, but something must be done and the public can't hardly blame the president for trying to protect industry by any means at hand. In fact, the public haven't respected the rights of the public and why should they be respected. The strike is costing the public millions of dollars daily and if something isn't done conditions are going to become more accentuated.

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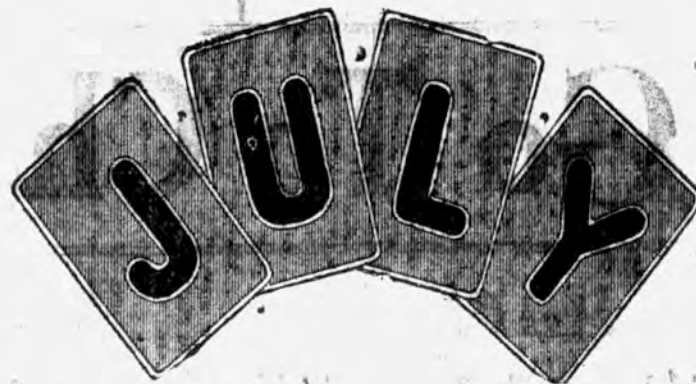
