HOOVER TO PUT RATIONING PLAN IN EFFECT TODAY

To Ask Operators of Six States to Co-operate with the Government.

PLANS TO SECURE
DISTRIBUTION IN
ALL PARTS NATION

Effort Will Also Be made to Keep Prices From Advancing During Strike.

Washington, July 23.—Operators from the coal producing districts of six states will be asked tomorrow by Secretary Hoover to co-operate with the government and the railroads in a plan to insure the distribution of fuel to the carriers and public utilities and to prevent profiteering during the strike emergency.

All angles of Mr. Hoover's scheme, which contemplates the formation of a central committee to operate through local commissions in the producing districts of Virginia, West Virginia, Tennessee, Kentucky, Pennsylvania and Alabama, were threshed out today at a series of conferences of the Federal agencies involved. Before the opening of the meeting tomorrow morning Mr. Hoover will have from Attorney General Daugherty a report on the powers accruing to the government in the emergency through the co-operation of the Interstate Commerce Commission and its authority under the law regulating interstate commerce.

In general, Mr. Hoover's program was understood to contemplate the creation of an emergency machine with the committee composed of a representative from the department of commerce, Justice, Interior and the interstate commerce commission, with the commerce secretary as chairman, operating through the local committees established in the producing districts at the line of the voluntary agreements fixing maximum fair prices.

FEDERAL CONTROL ONLY HOPE SEEN IN RAIL STRIKE

Seventeenth Week of Coal Strike and Fourth of Railway Sees No Change

(By International News.)
Washington, July 24.—The seventeenth week of the coal strike and the fourth week of the railroad strike began today with the government holding a reserve trump card. Assumption that the federal control of the country's transportation and distribution system can be conducted under authority vested by the emergency clauses of the transportation act, this week is expected to determine whether the card will be played.

This will be a crucial week of tense industrial situations, according to government officials. The week will determine the ability of railroads to function alone and the production of coal in volumes by workers at the mines.

The cabinet meeting to be held tomorrow is expected to determine the question of federal control of railroads.

LABOR BOARD WILL AGAIN FEATURE IN STRIKE SETTLEMENT

Hooper's Return From Conference with President May Produce Developments.

UNION LEADERS TALK
OVER SITUATION WITH
SECRETARY OF LABOR

Secretary Labor Declares Strike Can Be Settled Upon Certain Conditions.

Chicago, July 23.—Hope for a settlement of the railroad strike centered tonight in the Railroad Labor Board again, following the return of Ben Hooper, its chairman, from a conference with President Harding.

While Mr. Hooper was meeting the government officials in Washington B. M. Jewell and other strike leaders were in conference with James J. Davis, secretary of labor at Mooseheart, Ills.

At the end of the meeting and before departing for Washington, Mr. Davis expressed the belief that the strike could be settled at once if the roads would restore the seniority rights of the strikers and the Labor Board would take up the question in dispute.

In discussing the hope for settlement, the leaders reviewed the situation since the strike's inception July 10.

They pointed to the situation which preceded the walkout and to the fact that the strike was taken on three questions. These grievances were given in a strike bulletin issued on July 7 by Mr. Jewell, which said: "The present strike situation is caused by—

"1. The establishment of unjust wages by decision of the United States Labor Board.

"2. The establishment of unjust working conditions which curtailed overtime pay allowed under government operation.

"3. Contracting out of shop work to evade the application of the Transportation Act."

Mr. Hooper, after conferring with railroad labor leaders, asserted it was one of the two supplemental points, that of the restoration of seniority rights—added only after the inauguration of the strike—that stood in the way of settlement. He listed the five demands in the following order:

"1. Abolition of the contract system.

"2. Establishment of a national adjustment board.

"3. Rehearing of the wages and rules in dispute by the Labor Board.

"4. Roads to dismiss all lawsuits growing out of the strike.

"5. Restoration of seniority rights to the strikers."

Mr. Hooper asserted his investigation had convinced him that "no serious obstacle is to be found to peace" in any of the points except the fifth.

WELSH MINES TO FURNISH AMERICA WITH FUTURE COAL

British Miners Refuse to Place Embargo on Shipment of Coal to United States

(By International News.)

London, July 24.—America has contracted for a total output of many Welsh coal mines until the mine strike in the United States has been settled, it was announced at Cardiff this afternoon.

The British Federation of miners have not acted to prevent shipment of coal to the United States and there is no indication that such action will be taken. It is understood, however, that the British section of the union is reluctant to act because of failure of Americans to support the British union in their last strike.

MISS RENA BREWER BURIED SUNDAY AT WILLIAMSTON, N. C.

Young Woman Died Suddenly Saturday Night as Result of Acute Indigestion

Rena, the eighteen year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Brewer, who reside on the O. L. Joyner farm, several miles from this city, died suddenly Saturday night shortly after nine o'clock. The remains were taken to Williamston, where interment was made in the city cemetery Sunday afternoon.

The death was a distinct shock to the family and entire community, as Miss Brewer was apparently in the best of health. She attended a show in Greenville early Saturday evening and returned home about nine o'clock. After conversing with her parents a short while she went to her room up stairs and retired. About twenty minutes later Mr. and Mrs. Brewer heard a peculiar noise in the girl's bedroom, and upon investigation found her dead. A physician, who was immediately rushed to the home, attributed death to an attack of acute indigestion.

STRIKER KILLED AT NORELL N. Y.

Norell, N. Y., July 24.—In a battle at the railroad yards here today Frank Arbididni, striking shopman, was shot and killed and Charles Ceisero, striker, was also wounded in the fight.

Three extra railroad detectives were held on charges of manslaughter. The shooting is said to have followed an attempt to arrest one of the men following disorder.

BEARS TAKE TWO GAMES BY FLOCK OF STRONG HITS

New Bern, July 22.—The Bears took a double bill from the Tar Babies here this afternoon, the first by the score of 3 to 1 and the second, a 7 inning affair to the tune of 4 to 0.

Both games were hard fought affairs, with the New Bern team hitting in the pinches and showing up the best. In the first game, Snyder twirled masterly ball and time and again proved worthy of his metal. In the second conflict, Lefty Wilson pitched even better ball, shutting out the Tarboro outfit.

Klein pulled a sensational catch back of third base in the seventh inning of the first game, when two Tarboro men were on. He just literally cut off two or more runs.

The fielding of the Bears was nearly perfect in the second affair. New Bern made no bobbles and more than made up for the 5 errors in the first game.

TUBERCULIN TEST OF COWS TO BEGIN IN PITT THIS WEEK

Expert to Test About 75 Animals at Greenville, Winterville and Stokes.

GOVERNMENT TO SELL
PICRIC ACID SUPPLY
AT REDUCED PRICES

Great Results Obtained From Hog Feeding Demonstration Now Under Way.

Dr. William Moore, State Veterinarian, according to agreement, some time ago, will send a man to Greenville Wednesday, July 26, for the purpose of testing about 75 milch cows for tuberculosis. This work will be done for farmers in Pitt county in cooperation with W. B. Pace, County Farm Agent, and will be conducted as a free demonstration—there being no cost to the owners of the cattle. The cattle to be tested will be assembled in Greenville, Winterville and Stokes.

While this is only a demonstration and will cover a very small portion of the county, it is the desire of Dr. Moore that a large number of farmers will attend these demonstrations and become interested in having their own cattle tested. No person should drink milk from a cow that has not been tested for tuberculosis.

The United States Government has several million pounds of picric acid for distribution. This is a high explosive which was used very extensively during the War. This material is put in sticks very similar to dynamite, but it is much more powerful. It is not any more dangerous to handle than commercial dynamite. The cost of this explosive is about \$9.00 per hundred pounds, delivered in Greenville.

This material is for distribution to farmers only, but before our farmers can get it they must cooperate and pool their orders. This material is shipped in car lots only, a minimum car being 16,000 pounds. Any farmer desiring this picric acid in quantities from 100 pounds up should see County Agent, W. B. Pace, and place his order at once.

Those who doubt that there is money in growing hogs in Pitt county should read the following results obtained from a feeding demonstration conducted by W. E. S. Smith, Fountain, N. C., in connection with County Farm Agent, of Pitt county.

On July 1st, 19 pigs, weighing 973 pounds, averaging 511 pounds, were put on a balanced ration consisting of 1-4 fish meal, 1-4 wheat middlings and 1-2 corn meal; this mixture being fed in a self-feeder. On July 21, twenty days later, the same 19 pigs were weighed again. This time they weighed 1642 pounds, which was a gain of 669 pounds, total, or an average gain of 351 pounds (thirty-five and one fifth). Each pig made an average daily gain of 1 3-4 pounds. During the twenty days they ate 1600 pounds of the feed. The cost of this 1600 pounds of feed was \$35.36. The cost of gain was \$5.28 per hundred pounds. Net profit above all cost of feed, \$30.54, figuring hogs at 10c per lb. gross. There is something like 15 of these demonstrations in operation in Pitt county at the present time. Any man interested in a self-feeder, and balanced ration for his hogs, should get in touch with the county farm agent at once.

ONLY ONE CASE GIVEN HEARING IN COURT HERE

Levy Cox, Colored, Fined \$50 for Assault with Pistol Upon Luke Daniels.

Levy Cox, colored man, residing about three miles from Greenville, was fined \$50 and costs by Judge Louis G. Cooper in this morning's session of county court. This was the only case disposed of during the morning, with the exception of three or four other issues which were continued until the next term of superior court.

Cox's appearance in court resulted from assault with a pistol upon another negro by the name of Luke Daniels. While no shooting actually took place, Luke didn't like the idea of looking down a pistol barrel with an angry man's finger on the trigger, and as soon as he was out of range he "got out a paper" for the arrest of Cox.

Cox made out like he didn't have any idea of shooting Daniels, and was "jest playing with him" but he couldn't convince the court of this fact. Evidence was also very much against him, but he was given his freedom upon payment of the fine.

Edgecombe county has gone in for sheep raising. Well, that is certainly better than raising the dickens as several other sections are doing at the time.

The tuberculin test of cows to be made in Pitt county this month should be followed with much interest by the stock raiser as thousands of dollars are lost annually through this disease alone. The expert from the agriculture department will examine many cows with her and will determine whether they are suffering from tuberculosis. The county agricultural department will be glad to assist in any way in this effort to help the farmer and it is hoped everyone will take advantage of the offer.

President Harding is beginning to get a sample of what President Wilson was up against during the war. His trouble, however, is confined principally to this country while Wilson had to shoulder the load of the world for a short time at least. The ability of the Democratic president to handle practically every situation satisfactorily was one of their principal features of the administration. The same thing can be said of the present chief executive.

Pitt county farmers must either fight the boll weevil or find the pest rapidly gaining grounds. Loss in other parts of the country has been appalling in past years and unless our farmers take proper preventative measures they will find themselves in the same position. The weevil increases rapidly and acres of cotton may be infested in less than a week's time if the cotton isn't sprayed with something to kill the pest. County agricultural departments are ready and willing to give out valuable information and the farmer that takes advantage of this will find to his advantage.

The completion of hard surfaced roads causes speeding to become more pronounced, and unless traffic cops are placed at proper points it will be dangerous indeed. The commissioners should do something to reduce the speeding. This can be done at small cost. In fact, the county would realize handsome return from fines imposed upon the violators. Eventually the speeders would find it advisable to drive along at a sane rate of speed, and the traffic officers could then be removed. The situation is truly serious at this time and it is up to the commissioners to get busy and see what can be done.
