GEORGIA CHAMBER SENDS INVITATION TO PITT COUNTY

Thomasville Invites Automobile Party to Spend Some-time There.

COMMUNITY OFFERS MANY INTERESTING THINGS TO FARMER

Diversified Farming One of the Great Issues of that Part of Georgia.

The following letter from Thomasville, Ga., to members of the Pitt County Chamber of Commerce, planning to make an automobile tour of that state will be read with interest as it shows the chamber of commerce of that place is alert and wide awake to interests of other sections as well as its own:

Replying to your letter of the 18th inst. We note that 25 of your representative farmers, merchants and bankers will make a tour through Georgia during the first two weeks in August to study diversified farming in the light of the boll weevil, and that you will arrive at Thomasville on or about Wednesday, August 10th, if agreeable with us.

Now, we will be delighted to have your party visit us and will do all in our power to make your stay a pleasant one, and we extend to you a most cordial invitation.

In the first place, we have three miles from Thomasville, a State Experimental Farm, giving particular attention to raising cotton under boll weevil conditions. This will give you first hand information about how to combat the boll weevil with poison, as well as a history of the performance of the different early maturing varieties of cotton.

In the second place, you will see here some of the finest cattle in the United States, of Canada, and you will see further that proper grasses may be grown in the south with good condition. We raise both beef and dairy cattle with marked success, as you are doubtless aware from reports reaching you in the press.

In the third place, you will see here large pecan groves which were started here, even before the boll weevil made his debut. You will learn that cantaloupes, melons, peanuts, sugarcane, trucking crops and hogs all contribute their share in diversified farming and that the farmer is not dependent upon cotton alone, as a money crop.

Do not fail to include Thomasville in your itinerary, for by skipping us you would lose the opportunity of seeing a section which prepared itself to meet the boll weevil conditions at its very beginning.

Washington, July 24.—The average annual pay of rural postmen using motor vehicles is \$2,570, as compared with \$1,830 for those using horse-drawn vehicles, according to the latest report of the Postmaster-General.

AVERT STRIKE OF 10,000 AGENTS ON EASTERN RAILWAYS

Eastern Roads Preparing for the Formation of New Union of Shop Workers.

B & O NEGOTIATING SEPARATE SETTLEMENT AT THE PRESENT TIME

Few Outbreaks in the Strike Situation Reported from Other Sections.

Chicago, July 24.—The averting of a strike of approximately 10,000 station agents, preparations for the formation of new unions of shop workers on forty Eastern roads and negotiations for a separate peace on the Baltimore and Ohio marked the progress today of the railway shopmen's strike.

The move for new unions to take the place of the striking shop crafts was initiated by L. F. Lorce, Eastern regional chairman of the Association of Railway Executives, and was taken as an indication of the intention of the roads to hold out against the strikers' demand for a return of seniority rights as preliminary to any settlement.

The Eastern roads plan to take advantage of rulings by the labor board by organizing new shopmen in such a way that each system will have its own union and will be able to negotiate separately with its men. Parleys for a separate peace, due representatives of the striking shopmen and the Baltimore and Ohio Railway, attracted considerable attention in union circles, but strike leaders refused to make any comment.

The efforts of W. L. McMenimen, labor member of the rail board, today prevented a further spread of the strike at a conference with W. O. Noone, head of the station agents' organization. Mr. Noone complained that the station agents were being forced to do the work of the strikers, but Mr. McMenimen gave him such assurances that any grievances would be corrected that the station agents would remain at work pending a conference with the labor board.

MISSOURI SOON MAY HAVE STATE POLICE

St. Louis, July 25.—Agitation has been started in this city for the creation of a State police in Missouri to be equipped with motorcycles, automobiles, aeroplanes and horses. The provision for such a Missouri police will be made in a bill to be introduced in the next session of the legislature, which convenes in January, 1923.

Alpheus Stewart, together with several other residents of St. Louis, is organizing a committee to introduce and advance the bill.

Stewart pointed out that there are ten States in the Union that have a State police. They are: Pennsylvania, New York, New Jersey, West Virginia, Massachusetts, Michigan, Tennessee, Texas, Colorado and Connecticut.

Several other states, he says, have semi-state organizations, but they are not patterned after the Pennsylvania and have very small forces. These include Delaware, Nevada, Idaho, Maryland and Washington.

The good roads system and high-powered automobiles, Stewart says, make it almost an impossibility to combat the work of the crooks. With State police all roads could be placed under surveillance to cut off escaping criminals.

DR. EDWARDS CLOSES REVIVAL AT OAK CITY

Dr. Ben M. Edwards, who has just closed a series of revival services in Oak City, was in the city today visiting friends. He will remain here probably the remainder of the week and then go to Walstonburg, where he will begin a revival Sunday. Mr. Edwards had great success at Oak City, there being thirty-four additions to the church.

D. J. Whichard, Sr., 59 years of age, former postmaster of Greenville and editor of The Reflector prior to his appointment as postmaster, died this morning at eleven o'clock following illness of several weeks of pernicious anemia. Funeral services will be conducted from the Memorial Baptist Church tomorrow afternoon at five o'clock by Rev. Leland W. Smith, pastor of the deceased.

Mr. J. L. Little, president of the National Bank, in speaking of the automobile tour, planned for Georgia points, said: "I am glad that such a representative lot of Pitt county men are going on the Georgia auto trip, for the purpose of studying diversified farming under boll weevil conditions. Unquestionably it will prove of great value to the entire county."

Mr. E. G. Flanagan, president of the Greenville Banking and Trust Company, in referring to the Georgia automobile trip, spoke as follows: "You have a great trip planned. It will mean much to your party. I have made the points you will cover, and am in position to state they have something to show you. It will be a great trip."

Mr. J. W. Holmes of Farmville is the latest to sign up for the trip. Mr. Holmes is anxious to get all the information possible that will help his section not to become as thoroughly exhausted as a great many points to the south of us. He looks on it as a great investment.

Mr. Jno. T. Thorne, of Farmville, who will make the trip, has already started on the diversified farming plan and is thoroughly sold to its importance. But that he may gain all the light of sections which have actually put over something definite he is making this trip with some 25 representative men of Pitt county. Mr. Thorne knows the possibilities of the trip planned.

L'Internationale, communist afternoon daily, has capped the climax with a contest to determine "the worst employer of Paris and surrounding country." It claims to have received four thousand responses, but "for obvious reasons" does not publish names of winning voters.

CHARGED WITH MURDER OF DR. RATHENAU



Herman Willibad, German military engineer, has been arrested on charges of having been one of the men who assassinated Dr. Walter Rathenau, German Foreign Minister, near his home in Berlin. A reward of 1,000,000 gold marks had been offered for his capture by the Berlin police.

WARD DELIVERS TIMELY ADDRESS AT GRIMESLAND

Congressman Speaks on Importance of Co-operative Marketing Other Men Speak.

A very enthusiastic meeting of business men and farmers was held in the school house at Grimesland yesterday by Mr. Dumas and several other business men of Washington after which our Congressman, Hon. Hallett Ward, addressed the meeting.

Mr. Ward started his speech by telling the audience that he would tell them nothing but what he knew to be true, since that even though he was not in politics in the future, that he expected to make this section his home, therefore he wished to retain their respect and confidence. Mr. Ward told of what the government is doing to aid the farmer back on his feet and aid him in recouping the heavy losses made during the past two years. He assured the audience that the government had investigated co-operating selling methods; had found the principal sound and was backing the movement with unlimited financial resources; that the millions loaned the marketing associations in the past had all been paid promptly at maturity.

Mr. Ward stated that the greatest obstacle in the way of success of co-operating marketing lay in the farmer, not co-operating with his fellow farmer and that in his opinion, every farmer owed it to his children, wife and himself to join the selling organizations; since it would free him from the slavery of serfdom under which he has been working in the past. Mr. Ward also stated that in his opinion we had the garden spot of the world and that all that kept us from being the richest section of the world was our antiquated methods of selling our crops; that no business except farming could have survived our selling methods and he therefore advised his friends to sign the contracts, abandon the antiquated methods and uphold co-operative marketing as it meant the success of the farmer and this section.

FEE CHARGED VISITORS TO MUSEUMS IN FRANCE

Paris, July 22.—Enforcement of a new regulation requiring the payment of places of historic interest in France of entrance fees to all museums and begins this month. The fee will be fifty centimes or one franc, according to the importance of the national monument or collection. Special rates will be made subscribers, students, wounded soldiers, members of large families and similar privileged classes.

PROCTOR CONDUCTS Y. W. C. A. SERVICES AT LOCAL COLLEGE

Member of College Faculty Delivers Interesting Talk during the Exercises.

Mr. Proctor, a member of the College faculty, conducted the Y. W. C. A. services Sunday night. The topic of his talk was Faith. Faith the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of the things not seen. There is more uncertainty and doubt than ever before cast on the forms and ideas of Faith and Religion, this being due to the fact that there have been so many scientific discoveries in the past few years. The questions that sometimes come to a person are: "Is there a foundation strong and enduring to build our hope and faith on? We cannot rely upon our own frail strength, because we know we would fail."

In giving the history of the Hebrews, Paul has showed us how they have survived only because they had faith in the One Supreme Being. He who is greater than all the world. The trouble with the people of today is (that they) are too impatient to see the results of their labor. In the work of the teacher results are never seen to the fullest, but after she has gone her work goes on. The teacher can instill the higher thoughts and ideals in the minds of the people and leave it as a seed to live and grow. Definite results may not come until after we are dead.

What is our life's goal? Is it position and power which avails nothing in the end? Wealth and luxury—what does a man profit if he has gained world and loses his soul? Health and strength, without which we can do nothing, or joy and happiness? This is one thing that God wants all to have, but those who seek it selfishly will gain nothing in the end.

Service is a worthy goal for one to seek. When a person is of service they are doing God's work, then will all other things be added unto them. Service is only obtained through Faith. Christ did not expect the results of his work to be felt while on earth, but He did know that His words would live on. Plant good thoughts and form higher ideals in the minds of the people you work with, and your influence will live. Be strong; we are not here to play; stand up and speak out in God's service; faint not; fight on and tomorrow you will have your reward.

Scoville, pastor of the Jarvis Memorial Methodist Church of this city. The service will begin about eight o'clock, as the sing, which begins at seven will very likely be over by that hour. The largest attendance in weeks is expected.

LOCUSTS WILL INFEST MUCH FARM ACREAGE

Washington, July 21.—The seven-year locusts will be uninvited guests this year in Illinois and Southern Wisconsin, according to predictions by agriculture department experts. The characteristic whirring noise of the insect also will be heard in Indiana, on the border of Lake Michigan, and in the southern tier of counties in the state of Michigan, it was said, while a big brood will appear in eastern Iowa.

GREAT PROGRESS MADE IN BUILDING OPERATIONS HERE

Chamber of Commerce Statistics Indicate City is Experiencing Building Boom

BUILDING PERMITS ISSUED PAST YEAR VALUED AT \$525,695

Building and Loan Association Plays Important Part in Erection of Homes

London, July 25.—The British admiralty today began investigating the ownership of vessels alleged to have carried contraband whiskey to the United States from British soil. Officials are convinced that many ships, flying the British flag, are really owned by Americans.

MRS. WHITNEY INSPECTS SITE FOR MONUMENT OF FAMOUS "BUFFALO BILL"

Cody, Wyo., July 24.—Mrs. Harry Payne Whitney, of New York, noted sculptor, is here to study the surroundings in preparation for the sketching of designs from which one will be selected by the Boy Scouts of America and the Cody Memorial Association of New York City for the carving of a memorial to the late Colonel William Cody (Buffalo Bill) in this city, his own town.

It has been tentatively decided that the Boy Scouts of America will conduct the campaign for funds to finance the carving of the statue, which will be the highest type of art, and which will attract world-wide attention to Cody.

LEGION DEMANDS GENERAL SAWYER TO STAND ASIDE

Long Standing Disagreement Over Erection of Hospitals Brought to Head Today

SAWYER STRONGLY OPPOSED TO PLANS FOR SOLDIER RELIEF

Legion Declares Program of Veterans Bureau for Relief of men.

(By International News.)

Chicago, July 25.—Long standing disagreement between members of the American Legion and General Sawyer, personal physician and friend of President Harding over construction of hospitals for war veterans came to a head today when the Legion addressed a letter to General Sawyer, calling on him to stand aside and allow the program of the veterans bureau to go into effect at once. A copy of the letter was sent to President Harding also.

The Legion charges that General Sawyer obstructed the original plan to erect hospitals to care for ten thousand mentally disabled veterans and used his influence against it since it was first proposed. Feeling is very strong among those realizing the need of the hospitals for the disabled veterans and the plan come is watched with greatest interest.

FRANCE WILLING TO DELAY PAYMENT OF GERMAN DEBT

United States Informed of Conditions Provided Mellon Will Listen to France

(By International News.)

Washington, July 25.—France will delay payment of the principal of her debt of three and a half billion dollars indefinitely if this government will acquiesce to the proposal brought by Jean Parmentier.

Parmentier is understood to have pleaded with Secretary Mellon that France must depend upon payment of reparations from Germany. It is known that the United States is skeptical whether France will get the desired revenue from Germany.

CITY MERCHANTS TO HOLD MEETING

Interesting Session Called for Ten-thirty O'clock in Association Rooms.

An interesting session of the Merchants Association will be held in rooms adjoining the Chamber of Commerce Wednesday morning at ten-thirty o'clock, according to an announcement made this morning.

A number of business matters of more than usual interest will be taken up for discussion during the meeting and an unusually large attendance is expected.

WESTERN RAILROADS TO FIGHT STRIKERS

(By International News.)

Chicago, July 25.—Western railroads are expected to follow the example of Eastern roads and begin organization of a company of unions to replace the striking shopmen. The movement is believed to indicate that the roads are preparing a prolonged fight, with no intention of yielding to the strikers.

The general increase of prices
noted in eighteen cities of the Unit-
ed States may be received with favor
by some, but to those doing
everything possible to bring about
readjustment they mean the end is
still far away. Prices won't pos-
sibly remain as high as in past
months and the sooner the public be-
comes used to the change the bet-
ter off everyone will be.

The Interstate Commerce commis-
sion is rushing plans to insure fuel
shipment to those sections where
this becomes necessary. This infor-
mation will be received with interest
as the shortage is acute in some sec-
tions and demands action of the most
drastic nature. Industry must con-
tinue, but it cannot without sufficient
coal to keep large factories in opera-
tion. The commission intends to keep
things moving until the strikers reach
some agreement, and that's exactly
what the public desires.

Pitt county farmers and dairymen
should take advantage of the tuber-
culin test to be given cows in the
county this week, as his is some-
thing in which public health is vital-
ly concerned. Tuberculosis in cows
is dangerous, but can be eliminated
very easily by such tests as the
state department will conduct this
week in connection with the county
department. The expert is familiar
with the work and to say that he
will be able to accomplish much good
in expressing the matter mildly.

The plan of a strike sympathizer
to burn several hundred freight cars
in the manufacturing district of Chi-
cago was carrying his sentiment a
little too far and may result in fur-
ther disorders of the kind in other
sections. It's a pity the strike can't
be conducted with order. The thing
is bad enough as it is, and to doubly
aggravate the situation by resorting
to such meanness is going so far that
the government should make it hard
for those involved. The man charg-
ed with the crime should be prose-
cuted to the fullest extent as in this
way alone can further crime be dis-
courage.

Now that Pitt county farmers are
giving potato storage warehouse
some thought it is hoped they will
completely realize the necessity
of this improvement that every com-
munity will have a building of the
kind before another harvesting sea-
son rolls around. The warehouses can
be erected at small cost in compar-
ison to the great saving the farmers
will derive and no one realizes it
more than those who have seen them
tried out in other parts of the coun-
try. This section alone loses an
enormous amount of money annual-
ly through lack of preservation of
the crop and the loss will continue
to increase as acreage is increased.
The industry can be made a paying
one if proper storage facilities are
available and it is incumbent upon
the growers of every community to
provide this important feature.

The plan to ration the dwindling
coal supply seems to be a pretty good
one, and the sooner it is put into
operation the better everyone will
like it. With the limited supply of
coal to come from the mines while the
strike is in progress the majority of
industries should be able to continue
operation, although probably not at
full blast. The situation is probably
more serious than during the war be-
cause of delayed action, and the
sooner the government gets busy the
earlier we may expect relief.

The community sing to be held at
the Teachers College within the next
several days should be largely attend-
ed. Such attractions have a tendency
of drawing the public together as
nothing else can do and the more
things we have the sooner we may ex-
pect to see all communities pulling
together. In union there is strength
and when all the people of a county
pull together great things can be ac-
complished.
