TO HIS OLD FRIEND

Splendid Floral Offerings Be-
speak of Esteem in Which
He Was Held

Funeral services for David Jordan
Whichard, who died at his home in
this city Tuesday morning at eleven
o'clock following several weeks' ill-
ness, were conducted from the Mem-
orial Baptist church yesterday after-
noon at five o'clock by Rev. Leland W.
Smith, pastor of the church, assisted
by Dr. T. H. Plemmons, pastor of the
Immanuel Baptist church and Dr.
B. W. Spillman, of Kinston, presi-
dent of the Southern Baptist conven-
tion, intimate friend of the deceased.
Interment was made at Cherry Hill
cemetery.

Following arrival of the funeral
cortege at the church Mrs. W. L.
Hall sweetly sang "I Heard the Voice
of Jesus Say." This was followed by
scripture reading and prayer by Dr.
T. H. Plemmons. A quartette com-
posed of Mrs. W. L. Hall, Miss Er-
nestine Forbes, C. B. Rowlett and W. W.
Lee sang "Beyond the Smiling and
the Weeping."

Rev. Leland W. Smith quoted sev-
eral scriptures from the Bible that
reflected the spirit of the dead mem-
ber. Each was appropriate and beau-
tiful and everyone who knew the life
works of Mr. Whichard knew that
the passages clearly and forcefully
portrayed the beauty and grandeur
of his character.

Dr. Spillman, who has known Mr.
Whichard the past thirty years, spoke
of the life of sacrifice which the de-
ceased lived in a way that touched
every heart. He said his life had
been devoted to others with an un-
selfish devotion that proved very
striking.

Dr. Spillman said that he had kept
a register of all of his friends who
had passed on and that only the day
before he added the name of Mr.
Whichard, one of the most devoted
friends he had ever had. While writ-
ing the name the question came to
him "Where is he?" Then he said he
knew where he was. That he was in
Heaven and that Heaven was only a
short distance away. It was where
Jesus was and that Jesus was in speak-
ing distance of all his children.

He told of the wonderful and
eventful life of his friend, and said
that as long as he knew him he never
heard him say anything bad of any-
one. He lived a life above reproach
and always placed others before self.
As the body was carried tenderly
from the church the quartette sang
"Saved by Grace." The choir in
which Mr. Whichard always sat in the
choir was draped in black.

The church was filled to its utmost
capacity by the hundreds of friends
who gathered to pay last tribute to
one who did so much for the com-
munity. At the cemetery the grave
was literally banked with floral of-
ferings that came from all sections
of the state. The flowers expressed in
a mute way the high esteem in which
the deceased was held. The floral of-
fering was one of the largest ever
seen here.

FINAL EFFORT TO

Definite Progress Reported
Following Conference at
White House Today.

Most Significant Development
In Fact That Officials Will
Stick to Jobs

Washington, July 27.—Definite pro-
gress towards establishing a truce in
the railroad strike which is slowly
strangling industry and commerce was
made at a series of conferences at
the White House today.

Each issue of the situation was
presented to President Harding and
all parties directly concerned were
engaged in the controversy.

The most significant development
was the announcement that certain
railway executives remain at Wash-
ington a week or so.

WAR DEPARTMENT
OFFICERS EDUCATE
PUBLIC ABOUT THE
DEFENSE SYSTEM

Citizens Need Enlightenment
Regarding Menacing Dan-
gers, Weeks Asserts

Washington, July 24.—With the zero
hour already set, the American army
is preparing to go over the top.

There has been no declaration of
war by Congress, but the Harding Ad-
ministration has approved the cam-
paign the War Department has em-
barked upon, and Secretary Weeks is
determined to "carry on" till the en-
emy hoists the white flag of defeat.

Casualties there may be in this new-
est war, but fatalities are unlikely,
for the attacks will employ not rifles
nor machine guns, but publicity; not
shrapnel nor high explosives, but facts.

The opening guns have already been
fired. Analysis of recent addresses by
Secretary Weeks, Assistant Secretary
Wainwright, General Pershing and
other Administration officials closely
identified with the military branches
of the Government, leave no doubt as
to their conviction that grave dangers
menace our institutions. Their ut-
terances indicate unmistakably they
have seen the necessity of placing the
problem of military preparedness
frankly before the people in a new
and more comprehensive light than
ever before has been attempted in
time of peace.

In the threat following the war Sec-
retary Weeks and General Pershing
see what they believe to be a dan-
ger not only to the Army alone, but to
American Governmental institutions
generally, and Secretary Wainwright
in his most recent public utterances
is even more outspoken.

"In some ways these times are as
critical for the future of our republic
as those of 1917 and 1918," he de-
clared, speaking for the Administration.
"We have our enemies, although they
do not wear a distinctive uniform.
They attack from within instead of
without."

Innumerable "isms" have sprung up
throughout the country since the great
war, Wainwright believes, which have
as an objective the destruction of
Americanism, "to which we owe all
that we possess as a nation."

"Groups of peoples and classes are
organizing for every kind of purpose
except a patriotic and national one,"
he continued. "Insidious propaganda
is being directed against all the fun-
damentals of our Government. The
most pernicious of all are those who
are striving to substitute international-
ism for nationalism. They would
destroy from within that no enemy
has ever been able to do from with-
out—our ideals of government, con-
stitution, institutions, liberties, and
leadership in the world."

WEEVL ATTRACTS
MUCH INTEREST IN
THIS CITY TODAY

First Specimen From Grifton
Community Placed on Dis-
play by Farm Agent

The first boll weevil probably ever
seen in Greenville was placed on dis-
play at the Home Drug Company
this morning by W. B. Pace, farm
demonstration agent of Pitt county,
and to say that the little pest attrac-
ted great attention would be expres-
ing it mildly. People gazed on him with
as much wonder as a Barnum and
Bailey elephant, marvelling that such
a small insect is capable of producing
such destruction to cotton crops.

The weevil was taken from a farm
in the Grifton community where the
first evidence of his arrival was dis-
covered several days ago. There was
nothing at all peculiar about the ap-
pearance of the pest. He was ex-
actly like those pictured in the phar-
macy sent out by the various agricul-
tural departments and had two long
front legs which give him such great
speed.

Mr. Pace plucked an infested blos-
som from the cotton field at Grifton
and brought it to his office several
days ago. The weevil was nothing
but an egg then, but he developed
rapidly and today is a man sized
specimen.

That the weevil will do great de-
struction to the cotton crop in this
section is not to be questioned, but
this can be greatly reduced by the
use of proper methods of destruction.
Mr. Pace is exerting every effort to
fully inform farmers of the danger
confronting them and hopes to have
them prepared to combat the pest by
next season.

CITY MERCHANTS
IN SESSION HERE
DURING YESTERDAY

Important Matter Discussed at
Meeting in Rooms Adjoining
Chamber of Commerce

An interesting meeting of the Mer-
chant association was held in rooms
adjoining the chamber of commerce
yesterday morning at ten o'clock, and
several plans for activity of the or-
ganization were discussed at consid-
erable length. The meeting was pres-
ided over by Miss Maude Lee, presi-
dent, who at the outset spoke about
organizing the association into differ-
ent units and for each unit to meet
once a month.

While no definite action was taken
in the matter at the time, the presi-
dent requested the members to think

One of the most interesting mat-

that of stores closing at ten o'clock

MOTIVE POWER OF

IN MEMORIAM.

North Carolina sustained a distinct loss in the death Tuesday of David Jordan Whigham, Sr., founder of The Daily Reflector and postmaster of Greenville under the Wilson administration. He was not only an estimable and worthy citizen, but one of those pioneers who helped blaze the way for industrial and educational advancement of the community in which he resided so many years.

The deceased loved Greenville, and his entire life was spent in serving public interests. During the infancy of the town his paper proved one of the most powerful mediums for the moral, religious and industrial advancement of the community. He took an active part in all great issues which have confronted the city and his influence counted largely in their success.

That the community will miss the influence of such a character cannot be questioned in the slightest sense of the word. His love for humanity and untiring devotion for his friends was expressed so plainly in his daily work in past years that the separation which death has occasioned will be distinctly felt by everyone. Only great men live to serve humanity as he did and their passing always leaves a great void which time alone can fill.

Having been in almost intimate touch with this paper even until his last days, his loss is felt keenly indeed by those who considered a greater part of his burden when he became postmaster. He loved the paper and the people he served with an unquenchable devotion and the greatest spirit which the columns of the paper may reflect will be an ever increasing monument to its founder.

Removal of telephone and telegraph poles on Evans and Fifth streets to make way for the white way is an improvement everyone is proud of, but there still remains a pole or so on Evans street in the main business section that is nothing more than an eye sore. The committee having installation of the white way in charge should have these poles removed immediately. They are not only unnecessary, as we have stated, and detract to no little extent from the natural beauty of the white way system. The street will be brilliantly illuminated at night when all poles are removed and appear considerably wider and more attractive. The improvement is one we have been fighting too long to realize to let two or three poles remain and it is to be hoped the committee will get busy and have the poles removed, even though drastic action maybe necessary.

Everyone will be glad to note that the government will be prepared if it becomes necessary to seize the coal mines. This will tend to settle uncertainty as to what action will be taken and cause industry to continue more confidently than under ordinary conditions. It has been evident from the first that something should be done, but when and how it would be done was a matter of much speculation. There may be some who will disagree with the government in such drastic action, but when considering coal supply it is very evident quick and concerted action would be necessary. While some difficulty may be incurred in seizing the mines the presence of troops will convince the strike breakers that disorders will not be tolerated and that the public will not be allowed to suffer at their expense.

WHY PROCRASTINATE?

By chance Tuesday I overheard a Greenville warehouse man tell another party that neither the Imperial, Export nor the American Tobacco Companies would buy a pound of tobacco from the Co-Op. I then made myself seen to this party and told the warehouseman that he knew he was lying and had no grounds to make any such assertion. I had been told that such propaganda was being circulated, but doubted it.

This and similar propaganda is being circulated to scare those who have signed and to deter others from signing but it will prove a boomerang to those who are circulating same. It was used by those fighting the Co-operating marketing system in Kentucky and it is a well known fact that the Companies did buy and are still buying from the association. No one of them are buying your tobacco because they love you. It is a business proposition. They buy to supply their manufacturing trade. If they have not the leaf they can not sell the manufactured product. Tobacco has to have at least one year's age before it is manufactured or it will not burn free; therefore the manufacturer has to anticipate his wants or buy from some one who has redried and carried the leaf.

The manufacturer is going to buy where he gets value. If he can buy his leaf so it will be cheaper to him from the warehouse floor and keep his brands up you can not blame him. To the floor cost he has to add all expenses of buying, etc., all of which will come in the actual cost before manufacturing but he has to have tobacco or go out of the manufacturing business. Therefore the farmer is as necessary to him as is the one who consumes his manufactured product. If his competitor pays the same price as he does they are on the same footing. Hence when buying at auction his buyers buy it as cheap as they can, each buyer endeavoring to get his the cheapest. The association can sell the manufacturer his leaf by sample, one buyer doing all of the buying. It takes scores under the auction system and there will be much other expenses that can be saved that under the auction system has to be charged to the cost of the leaf.

The association will only sell in the "green or soft" state what the manufacturer will buy at a fair price to the producer the balance will be redried and store until he wants it at a fair price or we find some one who does in this or a foreign country. The last is what the speculator has been doing for years and he is still in business. The opposition tell you we will have to carry it for five years or more. "This is rot." But if we do have to carry it over it will improve while we have it in hands, and when we sell it we will get its value and this is far better than giving it away at the same time effecting the price on what the manufacturer does need. Co-operating marketing is a good business proposition.

The association has employed men of ability to run its affairs, every one of whom is under bond; they have secured plenty of redrying capacity. They government is backing it with its finances and the good Lord has cut the yield so my advice is to stick with your Co-Brother Farmer and not be frightened by those who for personal gain are trying to mislead you and defeat what has helped farmers in other localities and will also lift this section out of its present condition making it as it is due to be the richest section of the U. S.

KENTUCKY FARMERS PROFIT BY STAYING OUT BURLEY CO-OPERATIVE ASSOCIATION

Mr. James S. Stone, president of the Burley Tobacco Growers' Cooperative Association, is credited with the following statement by Press reports out of Lexington, Ky.:

"There can be little doubt that the formation of the Burley Association was a factor in the better prices this year on the independent market. This fact is generally recognized now even by those who, remaining out of the Association profited by its organization."

The independent market sold over their floors at auction, as in past years, around eighty million pounds of tobacco, the Cooperative Association received around one hundred and twenty million according to press reports. The auction sales averaged according to our best information obtainable, \$22.06 per hundred which included fine, good, medium and common tobaccos and left practically no tobacco in the farmers' hands to be carried over. The Cooperative Association, according to reliable reports has advanced its members an average of between seven and eight cents per pound on the tobacco delivered to them. They have on hand around 60 million pounds of tobacco, and if this tobacco is common tobacco they are liable to have it on hand a long time as there is very little demand for common tobacco. These figures would indicate that the Association has sold around sixty million pounds of tobacco, a large per cent of which was probably the best tobacco delivered to the Association, and only advanced the farmer a few cents a pound.

It can be readily seen that the farmer who did not sign with the Association, has profited by not doing so, while the farmer who did sign has only received a small advance and can't receive all his money until all the tobacco is sold and there is no way to tell when it will be sold. A report from reliable sources in Kentucky states that large numbers of farmers have no definite idea when they will draw more money. This same report refers to the news items sent out by the association, as follows:

many members have not advised the association the town at which they will want to deliver their tobacco. If you have not received one of the cards as to this, advise the Raleigh office and they will send you one. These cards are absolutely necessary to enable us to register the grower at his most convenient market.

It would appear from the above statement that the farmer who remained out of the association by re-crop for five years, has sold his tobacco and is now ready to go about his back at a very satisfactory price over the auction floors, received his money in cash and in full as he sold his tobacco and is now ready to go about his business. The farmer who signed his tobacco to the pool has received a small advance, sold a part of his crop, and has on hand a large per cent which he does not know when he will sell or what it will bring. He also has probably not been paid in full for what he has sold, does not know just when he will be paid, and won't know what it has cost him to sell his crop until it is all sold. In fact it is very evident that the pooled farmer is at sea.

After all is said and done the old auction system is the best, because it pays cash in full for all tobacco sold, there is no long wait, no storage at the farmers' expense, no carry-over of stocks of tobacco from year to year, has cost to sell, and last but not least rear contract, no doubt as to what it no doubt but that auction system has proven best for the farmers in Kentucky, and will prove best for him in North Carolina.—Southern Tobacco Journal.

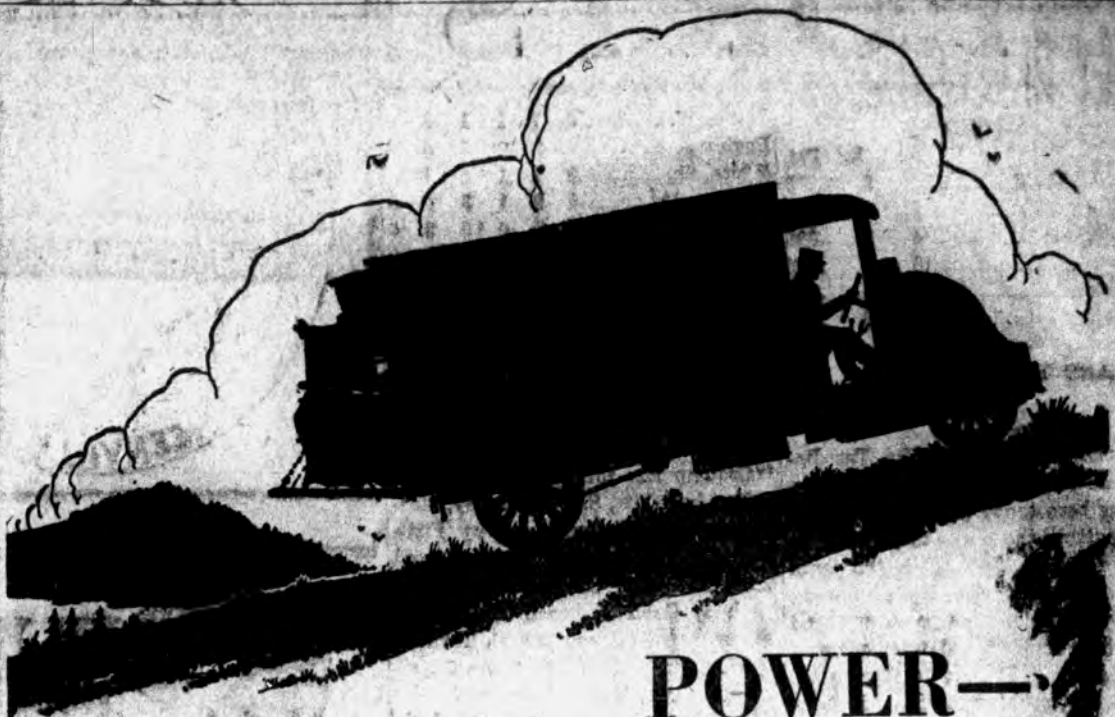

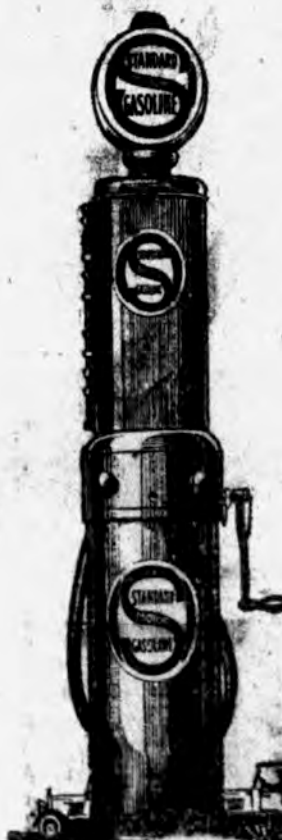

tempted intimidation? Did he ever fail in his entire public career, to challenge wrong and attack it, with the full power of his being, regardless of personal consequences? Was there ever a time when anything was proposed for the good of Greenville or Pitt county, that he did not lead in the fight to bring it about, or is there a public benefaction or institution in this county that does not owe in large part its existence to the unstinted and generous efforts of Dave Whichard?

In all his busy life he was never too busy to visit the homes of the sick or grief-stricken among his acquaintances and with words of hope and comfort and bright cheer help to relieve the grief and alleviate the sufferings of the sorrowing ones.

No home is exempt from death and few indeed there are in this community who have been thus afflicted have not had their sorrows tempered and their grief assuaged, by the kindly ministrations of this tender hearted man. I saw him many, many times during the influenza epidemic of 1918, when his own son was an absent sufferer in the army, of this terrible scourge and when the gloom of sorrow and anxiety hung like a funeral pall over our town and community, silently walking the streets, frequently, at late hours of the night and upon inquiry, found he had been or was going to see some sorrow-laden friend or to visit some grief-stricken home, to do his humble part as friend to lighten the burden of sorrow there.

If the flowers which he caused to be sent into homes where death had laid its icy hand on some loved one in this community, could today be placed upon the mound that covers his mortal remains, its spire would pierce the clouds and its fragrant incense perfume the heavens.

I knew this man possibly better than many of his more intimate associates, for more than thirty years he was my constant friend and I was his. Alike we shared each others confidences and it is no betrayal of that trust in anyway when I say I have seen him, in these later years sorely grieved and hurt, hurt to the hearts deepest depths, over some particular personal lack of appreciation. He pretty well knew and very accurately gauged public appreciation or lack of it and was never surprised or disappointed on this account and through it all he never permitted himself to become sour or harbor ill feelings. If he was deeply hurt, one would never discover it from his general bearing and if perchance he whis-

pered his feelings to some trusted one he was always willing, even eager to listen and if possible discover the error in himself and thus free the object of his personal grief from blame and if he could not do this, then charity toward the object softened his heart, for malice found no harbor there.

His years on earth were filled with a great deal of good, not much, if any bad. Whatever of error there was in his efforts and influence was of the head and not of the heart. He loved this town and county. He loved its people, its industries, its very wool and warp and filling and he loved above all his wife and his children, his church and his friends with a passion that absolutely obliterated and effaced every consideration of self interest in sacrifice and service to them.

Before he retired from the post office, I realized that he was a very ill man and as I saw him during the last few days of his occupancy of that office going about his work, preparatory to turning it over to his successor I marveled at his indomitable spirit and strength.

After he had been relieved of the burden and realized he no longer was compelled to do duty as a public official, the relaxation, amounting almost to collapse became very pronounced and I knew that by sheer courage he had forced "his heart and nerve and sinew to serve him long after they were gone and there was nothing left in him except the will, which said go on."

In the subsequent weeks I was often with him and never once did I hear him complain or find fault with anything or any body, nor did he ever give evidence that he realized his approaching end by words until a few days ago, as I entered his room and approached his bedside in company with his kinsman and my life long friend, C. L. Whichard of Norfolk, Va., he reached for my hand and holding on to it reminded me of a request that he made of me twenty or more years ago and told me where to find the facts I did not already know and said he was looking for the grim reaper most any time.

About my dear friend I have tried to write plainly as my feelings dictated, but I have not, I cannot do it, but what I have written has been the sincere promptings of a full heart and in obedience to a suggestion made by my departed friend twenty years ago, and however, much I have fallen short in my feeble effort to do him and his life's work simple justice I have at least done the best I could.

And now with a heart full of great grief at thy passing, sincere, kind, loyal, loving friend, I bid thee a long affectionately farewell.
