HARDING AND LABOR CHIEFS DRAFT TENTATIVE PLAN FOR SETTLEMENT OF THE STRIKE OF RAIL WORKERS

Persuading Railroads to Restore Seniority Rights Only Thing to be Settled

SEVERAL RAILWAYS WILLING TO SETTLE BUT OTHERS AREN'T

Proposals Drawn up After Conference of President and Leaders of Railways

Washington, July 28.—Tentative proposals for the settlement of the railroad shopmen's strike were drawn up today after a series of conferences between President Harding and labor leaders headed by B. M. Jewell, of the shopmen's union.

It was understood that the suggested plan for settlement—details of which were withheld by those participating in its formulation—would be submitted later to executives of the railroads.

The settlement proposals apparently had reference to the seniority issue, which, it was generally agreed was the sole remaining bar to conclusion of the railroad war—or at least of an armistice in the struggle.

Should the railroad executives accept the plans, it was said, a re-hearing of issues which led to the strike would be held before the Railroad Labor Board and all other questions left to adjudication through such a proceeding.

The labor union officials, through B. M. Jewell, president of the railway employees' section of the American Federation of Labor, declared they could not comment upon the substance of their discussions with the President except that every point in the strike controversy had been gone over. W. H. Johnston, president of the International Association of Machinists; J. A. Franklin, president of the boiler makers; M. F. Ryan, president of the carmen; Timothy Healey, president of the stationary firemen and oilers; James Burns, vice-president of the sheet metal workers, and Edward Evans, vice-president of the Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, were in two meetings with Mr. Jewell and the president.

It was understood in Chicago when the labor group left yesterday for the capital that they would return tonight. The decision to extend their stay overnight was taken as another indication that hopeful progress had been made during the day.

T. Dewitt Cuyler, chairman of the Railway Executive Association, was with President Harding for an hour before the union leaders were received, and it was arranged for Mr. Cuyler to confer with the president tonight after the labor group left.

Miss Maude Lee, chairman of the Junior Red Cross, told of the festivals which the Juniors are planning for the first two weeks in August. Grifton, Ayden, Greenville and Bethel have made plans for their street carnivals, each working with a definite purpose in view.

Mrs. Williams of the Motor Corps, reported five trips made during the past month.

The home service report showed a total of 167 cases and 20 office calls during the month.

Miss Hubbard told of the work that had been done in Ayden, making especial mention of the choir organization there. She also mentioned interesting cases that had come to her attention.

It was noted that the life saving corps should be especially commended, at least one of the members has been instrumental in saving a life and another member is in camp with the Farmville Scouts, at their request.

Mrs. Pace and Dixon, of the venereal clinic, told of their health work and of the manner in which the clinic is being run. Many of the servants in and around Greenville are being treated. This should be of great benefit to the whole community.

SCHOOLS TO HAVE BETTER CHANCE AT STATE FAIR

Raleigh, July 28.—Students of the fine arts in colleges, private schools, public schools and professional artists will have an opportunity to exhibit their works at the North Carolina State Fair in October, for arrangements have not only been made for such exhibits, but substantial premiums are offered for the work of individual artists and for exhibits by schools and colleges which will make it worth while to put on these exhibits.

A premium of \$150 is being offered for the best painting by some artist who is a resident of North Carolina. A second premium of \$75 is being offered in this class. In addition to these premiums first and second money of \$25 and \$10 are being offered for the best paintings of a portrait in oil, a landscape in oil and a landscape in water color. But the thing that will appeal to the private institutions which teach art and to the high schools giving courses in art is the premium of one hundred dollars offered to such institutions for the collection of as many as fifteen objects of art, including work in oil, water color, charcoal, pen and ink, clay, also design or pictorial representation which may be included, or some form of industrial art, useful for house decoration, fabrics, magazine covers, etc.

A similar premium is offered to colleges or other institutions of higher learning for the best collection of art such as oil, charcoal, water color, pen and ink or pencil.

SLIGHT PROGRESS MADE IN GETTING COAL FROM MINES

Sporadic Attempts Made Under Protection of Troops in Pennsylvania Fails

Washington, Penn., July 28.—The prospect of getting coal out of unlicensed bituminous fields in southwestern Pennsylvania by use of strike breakers failed to brighten any today.

Sporadic attempts yesterday to resume production under protection of federal troops accomplished little in lessening the coal menace.

HAIL PLAYS HAVOC

Danville, Va., July 28.—The first hailstorm of the season took place last week doing considerable damage in several parts of Pittsylvania county. The worse damage reported was done at Witt, near here, where, within a radius of five miles ninety per cent of the corn and tobacco crops were ruined. A visit to that area showed fully the force of the storm and the size of the hail stones. Tobacco looked as though it had literally been under machine gun fire, the luxuriant leaves of the unusually promising crops there being stripped from the stalk and badly mutilated. Farmers of the section said that the hail stones were as large as the tip of a man's finger. The storm was not so severe elsewhere, but a good deal of damage to tobacco was done by violent and beating rains.—Southern Tobacco Journal.

THINGS GETTING NORMAL.

Railroad officials say conditions are returning to normal now they have been guaranteed proper protection from the government in the employment of non-union men. This will be received with greatest satisfaction on all sides, as seriousness of the strike is being daily impressed upon the public by paralyzed transportation. The shopmen on the other hand claim the strike is a hundred percent efficient.

While this claim may correspond with their feeling, it is certain the railroads have been able to reach out among the thousands of unemployed people and to get employees, even though it may be of the inexperienced kind. This raw material may be developed into valuable help in course of time and the men now out on strike will feel the results of their effort to paralyze industry.

How much better they would be if they had remained on the job. The public would be more kindly disposed and things generally would be much better off. There is nothing in the world that demoralizes industry like strikes and no set of workmen should jeopardize the future of an industry through which they gain their daily support.

Conditions are different from two years ago and reduction of wages is a natural process in the return to normalcy. Shopmen should have realized the fact and remained on the job until differences could be amicably adjusted.

The fight being waged by chambers of commerce and other organizations in Eastern North Carolina to prevent the removal of passenger trains of the Norfolk-Southern railroad is perfectly justified when considering the great harm this action will do in disruption of traffic. The strike is serious not one doubt, but if there is any possible chance of the trains being continued on regular schedule we hope the railroad heads will make it their business to do so. It is difficult enough to reach this section anyway and the taking off of the trains will make it even more so. The railroad company should make an effort to continue these trains even though they may not run exactly on schedule all the time, as the public will appreciate the action. The strike is bad, but taking off trains has made things worse.

Greenville people should do everything possible to attend the community sing at the Teachers College Sunday, as this is an event by which the community will be drawn closer together. The sing will be led by J. H. Rose, superintendent of public schools. We are compelled to go out of our midst to get a leader and the fact everyone knows him should cause them to take part in the singing with greater interest. These kind of gatherings should be promoted by the man or woman with the community at heart. Eventually they will become of greater importance and their results will be far reaching indeed. Let's get together and do what we can for success of the occasion.

Pooling of coal in the producing district, and distribution of cars under a preferential system to be instituted under authority of the Interstate Commerce Commission, is planned to permit of the marshalling of fuel at the most available points for quick shipment to the destinations where most needed. Co-operation between the railroad and the interstate commerce commission would make possible adequate supply of cars and establishment of freight embargoes, if necessary, to facilitate fuel movement.

There is nothing like expression of appreciation. It makes hearts happier and souls lighter and engenders a spirit of good feeling among everyone.

So let's support everything pertaining to the school in every way possible and help it to develop into not "one" of the greatest, but "the" greatest educational institution in North Carolina. Or possibly in the entire South. That would be better.

Secretary Hoover's plan of disturbing the diminishing coal supply is exactly what we have needed to avoid a serious situation. The former food administrator has shown his usual tact and versatility in this issue as all others, and that he will get results is not to be doubted. He is a student of industry, knows what the public wants and believes in justice to all and if he fails to avert threatening paralysis of industry through the strike we will certainly be in a pitiable plight. With the promise of proper military support in case of eventualities he should be able to get sufficient labor to the mines to supply the nation with coal long enough to stave off serious conditions. Then, too, the supply which we are to purchase from British mines will help materially, and between the two, things should pass off smoothly.

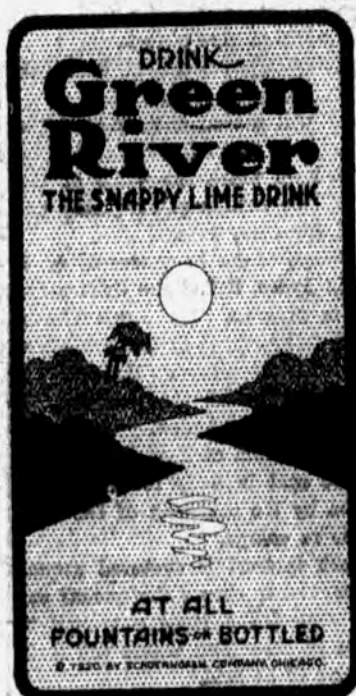

THE AGRICULTURAL SITUATION

Good crops at fair prices make the United States prosperous. Nearly one half the people of the country are directly dependent upon agriculture and a much larger proportion are indirectly dependent upon it for livelihood. The ability of this country to produce food and other agricultural raw materials has made possible its rapid industrial development and is the basis of its foreign trade.

It is now mid-season and although adverse weather might result in marked downward revisions of crop estimates, it can be safely assumed that the crop year 1922 will be reasonably satisfactory. Even if harvest results should fall below the yield which has been forecast there is no doubt that the United States has a good wheat crop. The corn crop is by no means made. To July estimate is for a crop somewhat less than last year but slightly in excess of the average crop during the five years 1916-20. There is a large carry over, however,

and a yield equivalent to the five-year average would mean satisfactory conditions in the corn belt. With the exception of oats the outlook for other grains is good and large crops of potatoes and tobacco are expected. A cotton crop considerably larger than last year is now indicated but uncertainty as to deterioration which may be caused by the boll weevil makes the final yield uncertain.

The American farmer is assured of a market. The domestic market is the greatest consuming market of the world, the population of this country being equal to the combined population of the United Kingdom and the German Republic. The methods of handling, shipping, financing and marketing the crops of the United States for export are unexcelled, and the only important competitor of this country from the standpoint of freight

haul to Europe is the Dominion of Canada. The exportable surplus of the American crops of 1922 will be promptly absorbed by the international market.

The last two years have been discouraging to farmers, but they are increasingly becoming aware of their advantageous competitive position and are recovering their old confidence. Prices of leading farm products are now much above their recent low point and also well above the pre-war level. There is no reason to expect a return of the price levels of the boom years but there is likewise no reason which might justify a fear that the unprofitable prices of the adjustment period of 1920-21 will return. Farmers are reducing their indebtedness. They are expanding their purchases of agricultural implements, fertilizers and other farm

necessaries, and the time is not far ahead when they will be in a position to increase their purchase of other classes of goods. Business in the agricultural districts shows confidence and that confidence is a justifiable basis for faith in the entire business situation of the country.
