UNION CHIEFS ARE OPTIMISTIC OVER PEACE POSSIBILITY

Jewell Returns from Washington Highly Elated Over Outcome of Meeting

SHOPCRAFTS WILL MEET AGAIN SOON IN CAPITAL CITY

Much Speculation Prevails as to Outcome of Demands for Separate Settlement

Chicago, July 28.—With President Harding prepared to submit definite proposals to end the railway shopmen's strike and B. M. Jewell, head of the shop crafts, and his international presidents hurrying back to Chicago after conferences with Mr. Harding, the fourth week of the walk out ended tonight while both executives and union heads viewed optimistically the possibility of an early settlement.

The strike headquarters here reported early tonight no call for a meeting of the shop craft executive committee had been issued, but Mr. Jewell announced in Washington they would be here Tuesday. Railway executives have already issued a call for a meeting in New York next Tuesday, when the peace proposals are expected to be submitted.

While rail executives and union leaders showed no open inclination to recede from their position on seniority, it was generally conceded that wages and working rules disputes—two of the strike issues—would be settled by the Labor Board while the contracting out of shop work—the third issue on which the shopmen struck—has been, according to the Labor Board, already adjusted on practically all roads.

There was considerable speculation on both sides as to what disposition would be made of the union's request for national adjustment boards to decide disputes. Regional adjustment boards have been suggested in labor board circles as a compromise.

Separate agreements between the strikers and the individual railroads—the other plan to end the walkout which has been most considered since the announcement several days ago that the Labor Board had ceased its peace efforts—received a setback today when the striking shopmen of the Baltimore and Ohio refused to accept the railroad's proposal for settlement.

Disorders in connection with the strike became more pronounced today. The entire city of Denison, Texas, was placed under martial law while in various sections clashes between workers and strike sympathizers were reported. Court action against the strikers continued.

TARBORO-KINSTON GAME FORFEITED TO BANDITS

Kinston, July 28.—Hitting the ball hard behind the fine twirling of Fisher, the Kinston Highwaymen hatted their way to another victory here today, the score being 4 to 0, when the game was forfeited to the locals, 9 to 0, by Umpire Crisp, after the Tar Babies had showed their true colors and had evidently and forcibly delayed the game, and after several warnings by the umpire still persisted in their unorthodox behavior. The game was played with a storm in the west, north and north east, and with rain a possibility even when the fans went out to the park a little before 4 o'clock. At that a large number attended and a good game could have been played had not the Tarboro team decided to prevent the game going the necessary five innings by their poor, unreasonable and vicious unorthodoxy. Both local and visiting fans condemned the Tarboro outfit.

WHISKEY CHARGE FIGURES LARGELY IN POLICE COURT

Several Other Cases Disposed of By Mayor D. M. Clark During the Morning

TUBERCULIN TEST APPLIED TO MANY COWS OF COUNTY

Dr. L. J. Faulhaber Makes Excellent Progress With Work on Eradicating Disease

Dr. L. J. Faulhaber, assistant state veterinarian, who has been conducting the tuberculin test of cows in this community the past several days continued his work today, assisted by W. B. Pace, farm demonstration agent of Pitt county. The first injection of cattle was made Wednesday, and today Dr. Faulhaber will be able to determine whether or not the animals have tuberculosis. Many prominent farmers of the county will take advantage of this opportunity to protect their stock from the ravages of tuberculosis and the county should derive great good.

FOUR SUBMARINES DISAPPEAR ALONG CALIFORNIA COAST

Missing Crafts Part of Flotilla of Twelve Bound for Hampton Roads

Los Angeles, Cal., July 28.—Naval authorities here tonight were investigating the report that four of 12 submarines bound from Los Angeles to Hampton Roads, Va., for decommissioning, had disappeared off the lower California coast, south of Ensenada.

At nine o'clock tonight it was stated at the submarine base at Los Angeles harbor that no information had been obtained explaining the story of Captain Thomas W. Sheridan, of the liner City of Honolulu, who reported meeting the flotilla yesterday and counting only eight undersea craft, or clarifying inter-flotilla messages intercepted here.

These messages included an order for the L-8 to stand by to take a tow line from the L-5. Another from Commander Roy L. Stover, commanding the flotilla, stated he had eight submarines in convoy of the tender Beaver, and made no mention of the other four.

The supposedly missing vessels are the L-5, L-7 and L-8, built at Long Beach, Cal., during the war and the last of the type on the Pacific Coast. The decommissioning was planned because submarines of the L-type are obsolete.

RUM DISPENSERS GIVE CITY POLICE RATHER BUSY DAY

Four Members of the Traffic Taken in Custody During Morning's Activities

Dispensers of monkey rum and honest to goodness corn whiskey figured prominently in a series of raids by members of the police department today, and when the smoke of battle had cleared away four traffic members found themselves in the clutches of the law. Three of the men were white, and one colored.

They are Jack Corey, Joe Little, Heber Sutton and Sam Short, color-transfer driver.

The largest raid was made on a place operated by Little and Sutton, in the cotton mill district near the ball park, and resulted in the capture of eighteen gallons of corn whiskey, the largest capture reported by the police in several weeks. The cops said the supply had evidently been placed in stock for the game this afternoon, and was sufficient to have "fired up" quite a number of fellows who still persist in following in the footsteps of the deceased John Barclay-corn.

A number of bottles filled with rye and monkey rum were found at the place operated by Sam Short on Second street. Funnels and other things necessary to sale of the beverage was found at the place.

A gallon jug about two-thirds full of whiskey was located at Henry Bakers' place located in the cotton mill district. The jug was found secreted in the yard, but Baker said he didn't know who put it there.

Corey was entering the Garrison cafe when nabbed by the cops and had a gallon of whiskey in a traveling bag. He was given preliminary hearing before Mayor D. M. Clark and required to give bond of \$500. An Overland automobile was confiscated.

SUBMARINE BASES COMPLETED TODAY

HARDING AGREES CONGRESS MUST ACT IN STRIKES

President Believes Speedy Legislation Must be Enacted to Prevent Recurrence

DEMOCRATS AGREE WITH REPUBLICANS IN SINGLE ISSUE

Senator Cummings Thinks President Will Have Special Message for Congress

(By International News.)

Washington, July 29.—President Harding is in complete accord with senate that legislation must be enacted to speedily prevent a recurrence of the coal and railway strikes, it was stated in official circles today.

Republicans and Democrats, while conflicting in their views, believe with the president that congress must provide an effective and lasting remedy for the industrial situation.

Senator Cummings believes the president will soon have a special message for congress on the subject.

CANADA ASKED TO PURCHASE COAL IN OTHER COUNTRIES

United States Unable to Furnish Usual Supplies While Strike is On

Washington, July 29.—Canada has been advised by the United States that she must look to other markets for coal during the American emergency period, it was announced this afternoon.

The government has requested shipping companies to bunker their vessels at American ports only for the next port call. After August 5th shops under foreign registry will be asked to bunker abroad.

Don't forget to attend the community sing to be held at the Teachers College Sunday. The event is to be a great one and it is the duty of everyone to show their appreciation by their presence.

Railroad crossings in and around Greenville are as dangerous today as ever and unless something is done to protect the public the loss of life may be far more serious than in the past. The rapid increase in ownership of automobiles increases the danger of unprotected crossings and it is hoped some action will be taken by the city or county authorities to provide necessary protection. Overhead or underground passages may be constructed at small cost, and the danger of being killed by trains will be almost completely eliminated. Something must be done and it is the business of those having the power to act to get busy and do it before the toll of life becomes greater.

The boll weevil discovered on cotton fields around Grifton will do as much damage as those in other sections unless the farmers use proper means of destroying them. Acre after acre of cotton can be covered by the pest in comparatively short time and they appear when most unexpected. The county farm demonstration agent is ready and willing to do every thing possible to help the farmer set aside the probability of enormous loss and those who request assistance may be assured of receiving it immediately. The weevil is nothing to joke about as some seem to think and those who fail to prepare against him will be sorry after their crops have been destroyed.

The opening of the Greenville tobacco market next month will be watched with great interest, as everyone is hoping prices will be better than last year. The crop will be considerably smaller this year than last because of the excessive rainfall several weeks ago, and while quality in many instances will be inferior, there will be much good bright leaf. With the prices still charged for chewing and smoking tobacco there is no reason why prices for the raw product shouldn't be as good as ever. If the price for one is to remain high and it is only proper that the farmer should expect to receive his part. The price situation, it is believed, will be everything expected owing to the shortage of the crop, and if it is conditions locally will be better.

The embargo declared by the Norfolk and Southern railway on all freight shipments will work great hardship in the communities through which the line operates, and if the strike isn't settled sometime soon the situation will increase in seriousness. People living in that section should prepare for the worst as it is evident the strike is destined to continue longer and the train service to become more demoralized. The use of automobile trucks should be resorted to immediately as in this way alone can a real serious situation be staved off.

The tuberculin test of cows now being conducted in this county should receive proper attention from owners of cows. Tuberculosis may develop in stock without the owner being the wiser until the very last stages, and the danger in such cases is very great. The tests are being conducted under supervision of the county department of agriculture and any farmer can take advantage of them. It's to be hoped the importance of the movement will be fully realized and that many cow owners will avail themselves of this opportunity to determine the health of their stock.

IRON MAN BEALL DOWNS BEARS IN OPENING CONTEST

Blue Sox Give Pitcher Perfect Support and Hit Powell Hard in Every Frame

With Beall pitching an invincible brand of ball the Blue Sox yesterday afternoon were enabled to win the opening game of the series from New Bern by the score of 9 to 0. It was simply a case of too much Beall from the time he entered the box until the last ball had been pitched. He allowed the Bears only six widely scattered hits while his teammates pounded out a total of 19 off Powell's delivery.

One of the outstanding features of the game was the home run of Frazier for Greenville in the eighth frame with one man on base. It was the longest hit ball ever seen on the local diamond and the second home run in history. Frazier hit the ball with a powerful swing, sending it sailing over the outfield fence. The Bears were unable to do much damage, with only a few scattered hits. Beall's pitching was flawless, allowing only six hits and no runs. The Blue Sox' offense was supported by a solid defense, with several key plays in the field.

Thompson started out to do mound duty for the Sox but with two men down in the second frame the game was interrupted by rain. The clouds looked so threatening and the rain fell so freely for the time being that Thompson hopped in a car came to town, dressed up and went uptown before he heard that the game had been continued. Beall, however, had taken up where he left off, so he merely let out sigh of relief, knowing that all would be well.

The principal part of the stick work for Greenville was done by Stringfield, who secured four hits out of five trips to the plate. Frazier, Smith and White came in for next honors with three each all of which were singles with exception of Frazier's double and circuit clout. Beall's game was credited with two singles and Doran, Massey, Keating and Beall one each.

Greenville scored three runs in the third, one in the fifth, three in the sixth and two in the eighth. While the Bears played comparatively clean ball in the field their inability to hit at opportune moments was responsible for their defeat. They were credited with only two bobbies, which featured only in a slight way in the Sox victory.
