SERIOUS SETBACK TO INDUSTRY HAS NOT YET OCCURRED

Business Shows Decided Slowing Up But Revival is Not Checked

STEEL INDUSTRY CHIEF SUFFERER IT IS DECLARED

Car Loadings Reassuring But Production of Coal Continues Very Bad

New York, July 30.—Although the check to the country's business recently imposed by the strikes grew during the past week, the curtailment is not yet large and a definite setback to the industrial revival is not yet a probability. The steel industry, which has been operating at a comparatively high rate, appears to be the chief sufferer. Here the loss of production is something like 10 per cent. This industry, too, has been considerably upset over the possible effects of the priorities established with regard to coal distribution.

The trade realizes that its position is not the preferred one enjoyed during the war. Second thoughts on priorities have, however, been reassuring. It is realized that dislocations in the existing situation are not likely to be as severe as at first surmised, and that the general effect of priorities should be a reduction in congestion and a gain in coal output.

Car loading figures meanwhile have been reassuring. The total number for the week ended July 15 is 881,000, which represents a recovery of 143,000 as compared with the previous holiday week. The total is within 17,000 of the high record for the year. Exclusive of coal, loadings were close to the high record for all time. It may be seen, therefore, that general business so far has suffered relatively slightly.

Coal production on the other hand, remains poor. The Geological Survey's estimate for the week ended July 22 amounted to only 3,600,000 tons, or practically the smallest total for any week in recent years. Railroad congestion was again the cause of loss in output. In this connection the carriers claimed that the start of the past week showed a considerable gain in car loadings, but pending publication of returns for the entire week it is difficult to say how important the gain may be.

Classes are meeting today instead of on next Saturday so that the students can get home one day sooner. The summer school will close on Friday afternoon.

The commencement exercises will be held on Thursday evening. The public is invited to attend. President Wright will deliver the address before the graduating class. The distinguishing feature of this commencement will be the conferring of degrees on the first A. B. graduates of the college.

SAYS PEACE TERMS OF STRIKE ISSUES ALREADY AGREED TO

Man in Close Official Touch With Situation Declares Formal Action Necessary

TERMS OF SETTLEMENT MAY BE CONCLUDED AT ANY MOMENT NOW

Exact Terms of Ratification May Not be Made Known Within Next Several Hours

Chicago, July 30.—Peace terms already have been agreed to in the country-wide railroad strike and formal ratification has been assured through President Harding's efforts, it was asserted tonight by a man in close official touch with the situation.

All that now remains before the strike, which has cost the workers upward of \$40,000,000 in wages passed into history, it was asserted, was the formal endorsement of the terms of settlement by the railway executives' meeting in New York and the strike leaders, who will convene in Chicago at the same hour.

"The acceptance of President Harding's proposal was a foregone conclusion before T. De Witt Cuyler issued the call for the meeting of the rail executives in New York and Bert M. Jewell, head of the striking shopmen, summoned a similar meeting of union chiefs for the same date," this man who has been in closest touch with the entire situation declared.

"The rail executives will finally decide to yield for the good of the country, sweeping aside the seniority issue," he continued, "but their gesture will give little consolation to the men who walked out on July 1, for besides their loss in pay they will lose some of their seniority rights to the men who remained at work, seeing their original grievances returned to the United States Railroad Labor Board for rehearing, and the question of a national adjustment board and certain other points taken up by congress."

"The exact terms probably will not be known until after Tuesday's meetings, but whatever they are the objections of a minority on either side will not be sufficiently strong to obstruct or prevent their ratification by both sides. The seniority issue has been raised since the beginning of the strike, it must be remembered, and it is not as great a stumbling block as it has seemed at times. When the time comes it will be disposed of with justice to all and to the satisfaction of the great majority of the workers."

AKERS DELIVERS SERIES OF TALKS BEFORE COLLEGE

Superintendent of Halifax County Speaks at Assembly Exercises

Last week there were three very interesting features of morning assembly exercises at East Carolina Teachers College. Mr. A. E. Akers, a member of the faculty, superintendent of Halifax county, told what a county superintendent expects of a teachers and Mr. W. A. Mills superintendent of Lenoir county told what a city superintendent expects of a teacher.

On Saturday morning the music department presented a delightful twenty-minute program. Fifth, sixth and seventh grade songs were sung by groups of students, thus completing a list that included all the grades in school. There was one piano number.

On Saturday afternoon a private recital was given by the piano students, every one playing something. There were some violin numbers also. Miss Correll, piano teacher had charge of the recital.

WEDNESDAY DESIGNATED "BOOSTER DAY" IN BASEBALL CIRCLES TO RAISE FUNDS FOR REMAINDER OF SEASON

Wednesday has been designated "booster day" in baseball circles of this city, and the public is urged to turn out in large numbers to witness the final game between Greenville and Tarboro in order that the local club may experience a financial revival. Several stores have already agreed to close at three o'clock in order to give their employees an opportunity of attending the game and it is hoped by Wednesday morning that every business house will have decided to do likewise.

The club is badly in need of finances at this time, Manager Guy Smith stated this afternoon, and will try to make up the shortage "booster day" instead of soliciting funds as customary. If everyone will give the right kind of support the club will go over the top and be able to continue the remainder of the season without the slightest worry about finances. Other clubs of the league are in splendid condition financially because the fans went to work and raised the required sum necessary to continue the season. New Bern is the last club to do this, and it is said they will be able to finish up in the best of form.

The admission "booster day" will be one dollar, and every body should be glad to pay this amount instead of contributing directly through committees as in the past. This is the first time financial assistance has been sorely needed since the season opened and it is hoped that the public will rally behind the movement in a way that will mean the greatest kind of success.

If you are a business man, the club asks you to close your doors at three o'clock, to go to the game yourself and take what employees you can. The best attendance of the season is necessary if "booster day" is to prove the kind of a success its promoters desire. So get busy and help the club on easy street while they are winning the last half preparatory to the championship series.

LEAGUE DIRECTORS REMOVE PROTESTS AGAINST BOEHLING

Tarboro and Farmville Drop Protests Against Playing of Greenville Pitcher

Directors of the Eastern Carolina league met in rooms of the Carolina club in this city Saturday night and decided a number of questions affecting practically every club in the league. Judge J. Lloyd Horton, of Farmville, president of the league, was present and did everything in his power to make things pass away pleasantly. Boehling, former pitcher of the Washington Americans, whose playing for Greenville last week resulted in a number of protests, was declared eligible, as the directors failed to find anything to the contrary. The eligibility of Ferry of Tarboro was also questioned, but after investigating the record produced by his club, it was held that Tarboro was justified in playing him.

The game between Kinston and Tarboro last Friday, which was forfeited to Kinston when the Tarboro club left the field, was permitted to stand, as evidence produced showed that the club should have remained on the field instead of attempting to delay the game as charged.

Farmville withdrew her protest against the playing of Boehling before the meeting, and when Tarboro did the same Greenville withdrew two protests registered against Tarboro during the week.

Kotch, member of the New Bern club, who is said to be the property of the Reading, Pennsylvania, club, was permitted to remain in the game until further facts could be obtained. He was farmed out from Reading to Rocky Mount, it is understood, but reported to New Bern instead. These facts, however, could not be definitely ascertained and consequently no decision regarding his eligibility could be rendered at the time.

The directors decided to urge all managers and field captains of the various clubs to aid in keeping down all possible ill feeling against the umpires. The papers of the league were asked to use their influence in getting the fans to show a better attitude. The umpires are said to have been ready to quit because of the unpleasant spirit among the fans, but decided to remain on the job after persuasion.

Several other matters of minor importance were taken up for consideration during the evening, but all were of a routine nature and of little interest to the public. The meeting was one of the most harmonious in several weeks and much good feeling was in evidence.

COMMUNITY SING HERE PRONOUNCED SPLENDID SUCCESS

Second Annual Sing at College Largely Attended Yesterday Evening

PROF. AUSTIN ACTS AS MASTER OF THE EVENING EXERCISES

Various Church Choirs Played Important Part in Elaborate Program

The second annual Community Sing at East Carolina Teachers College was a pronounced success. This year the people understood so well what was meant by a community sing that there was no time wasted with explanations, one group after another moved up swiftly as called. It went with snap and vim from the first note to the end. J. H. Rose was at his best as song leader, and Miss Minor was a wonderful accompanist.

Mr. Austin was master of ceremonies and made the announcements. At the beginning he made a brief talk, reminding the people of the first Community Sing in the county, just one year ago, and spoke beautifully of Mr. C. W. Wilson, the man who had dreamed of such a get-together meeting and to whom was due the great success of the first sing. This second sing, he said, was just as truly the work of Mr. Wilson as carrying on the work that he started.

After the singing the singing of America, Rev. W. P. Shamhart led in the reading of the twenty-third Psalm, and led in prayer. Then the singing began, in earnest. The numbers by the entire crowd and those by the groups alternated. The twelve or fifteen hundred people present made the welking ring with those fine old songs "Onward Christian Soldier," "When the Roll is Called up Yonder," "Joy to the World," "Come Thou Almighty King," "The Old North State" was sung as only a crowd of "tar-heels" can sing it. "Juanita" and "Old Kentucky Home" as sung last night seem to belong to a religious group, so were in keeping with the program.

Falkland was the only community outside of Greenville represented. Under the leadership of Miss Gladys Warren they sang beautifully "More Love to Thee." This was one of the best.

The Immanuel Baptist and Jarvis Memorial Methodist had numbers on the program. Two of the largest Sunday schools, by a strange coincidence had the same song, "We're Marching to Zion." The Christian Sunday school sang "We Must Win Them, One by One." The Presbyterian sang "He Walks with Me," the Memorial Baptists sang "We shall See the King Some Day." The Bible Classes sang "Throw Out the Life Line," the Kiwanians sang "I Need Thee Every Hour" and the Rotarians sang "Whoop up the Old South." The last special numbers were by the young ladies of the Teachers College. A special chorus sang "The Vesper Hymn," and the entire school sang "Day is Dying."

After the closing song "Blest Be the Tie" Rev. N. D. Wiggs pronounced the benediction.

Although there was not so large a crowd as last year and many people stayed in their cars and listened instead of joining in, the sing was a success. There were perhaps twelve hundred people singing. Most of the people were from Greenville, with only a sprinkling from the country. This was partly due to the threatening clouds in the afternoon.

TENNILLE INVITES AUTOMOBILE PARTY TO VISIT SECTION

Georgia Town Has Some Interesting Things to Show Members of Chamber

The following letter from the Tennille Advertising club, inviting the Chamber of Commerce automobile party to visit that section, will be read with interest here:

Tennille, Ga., July 27, 1922.
Mr. Horace Smith,
Secretary, Chamber of Commerce,
Greenville, N. C.,
My Dear Sir:

As we see from the Dublin, Ga., papers that representative men of your community are going to visit Laurens County (Dublin) about the fourth of August I am writing this letter to suggest that if you make your trip in automobiles I do not believe you will make any mistake you route the party through Washington county, as we have here this year several of the modern horse-power dusting machines on some of the finest crops of cotton that grows in this part of the state and have other fine crops that are not being treated. We also have some machines on what is classed poor land, side by side with farms that are not using the calcium arsenate. The writer as a machine on one of the farms of the latter class there is a very marked contrast between his crop of fruited cotton and the crops of those around him who have not used the calcium arsenate. I assume it will not take more than two hours, at the outside, for your party to stop at Tennille, meet the President of this club and other men who are using the dusting machines and see the crops right in and close around Tennille. If you will afford us the pleasure of piloting your party to and through some of the near-by farms please drop a line to Mr. C. F. Brown, who will gladly arrange to meet the party and furnish pilots to go out with them. Let Mr. Brown know about when to expect them.

It is a great thing for your people who have not seen the ravages of the boll weevil to come to Georgia, because it would be impossible for men of even the highest order of imaginative powers to appreciate the damage. It is to be hoped that you can impress your people that the farmer is not alone by any means in the heavy losses the boll weevil brings with it; for all commercial life and social welfare of every kind and character takes his and her share with even more uniformity than is felt by a people visited with famine; for, as a matter of fact the one bes off the banker and the merchant—in most communities trust and venture and venture and trust those they have known to always be good for obligations until banks fail, the merchants who have always been "good" fail, the churches fall behind with their preacher, in fact there none who escape. Much of this can be remedied where men of influence go into the infested communities and leisurely—not too hurriedly—make inquiries for themselves and take as accurate note of the evil and its remedies as he can back to the folk at home.

As you pass Sandersville stop and see the Dairies there and at Warthen; then come on over to Tennille and let our Ad club friends show you the cotton as spoken of in the first part of this letter. Really this particular community has not suffered as some others have, because we have diversified more and out people have profited much by early observations before the weevil got this far.

TOMORROW IS EXPECTED TO SEE AN END OF PARALYZING RAIL STRIKE EVERYWHERE

RAILWAY LEADERS TO HOLD FINAL MEETING IN NEW YORK CITY

Labor Leaders to Meet in Chicago to Accept President Harding's Proposals

(By International News.)
Washington, July 31.—Confidence prevailed in cabinet circles today that this week will see the passing of the grave industrial crisis in this country. Tomorrow is expected to see an end to the paralyzing rail strike with executive representing a hundred and forty-eight railroads meeting in New York.

At the same time leaders will meet in Chicago to vote on acceptance of President Harding's peace proposal. Acceptance by labor will be prompt, it is understood and acceptance by the railroads is also certain, according to administration spokesmen.

AUTOMOBILE TRIP TO GEORGIA WILL BEGIN WEDNESDAY

Cars to Leave Greenville Wednesday Morning Promptly at Six O'clock

Arrangements are practically completed for the Georgia automobile tour. According to a statement made by Secretary Smith of the Pitt county Chamber of Commerce and W. B. Pace, county agent, under whose auspices the trip has been planned, the two Greenville cars and the Grimesland car will leave the Proctor Hotel here Wednesday morning promptly at 6 o'clock. The Griffon car and the Farmville car with a probable one from Ayden and Winterville will go directly to Goldsboro. Goldsboro is the central meeting place and from the Kenon Hotel the party will proceed on the journey.

Particular attention is called to the Goldsboro. Every car is urged to leave in time so as to arrive promptly at 8:00 o'clock.

J. F. King of this city and G. S. Porter of Chicora are the latest to sign up for the trip. Both are enthusiastic and believe in the possibilities of the proposed tour.

DANGER OF GREEK MILITARY DRIVES BELIEVED PASSED

London, July 31.—Danger of a military drive by Greeks occupying Constantinople is believed to have been passed as result of vigorous action by the allies to prevent any such occurrence.

It was learned at Downing street today that Lloyd George had agreed with Greece to hold up military activities and the Great Britain and France were in accord with the situation.

BLUE SOX WIN FINAL CONTEST FROM BEARS

Greenville made it two straights from New Bern by taking Saturday afternoon's contest by the score of 3 to 0. The game was one of the prettiest seen on the local diamond as both clubs played in comparatively fast form despite three errors, and handled the ball in a way that drew a constant stream of applause from the grand stand and bleachers.

The outstanding feature of the game probably was the pitching of Boehling, former southpaw of the Washington Americans, who had the Bears at his mercy throughout the entire game. Only in one single instance did the one time major league idol find himself really in danger of being scored upon. His coming in the ninth inning when the Bears secured two hits, swelling their total to three for the entire game. This rally was cut short, however, when Boehling tightened up and retired the next batsmen in a way that appealed to the hundreds of fans attending the game to see him work for the first time.

New Bern also worked recent acquisition on the firing line, and while the Sox scored under safeties, the majority were well scattered and failed to produce anything in the way of runs. Ohlme exhibited world's of stuff at critical stages and saved the Bears from going down under an overwhelming score. The game was converted into something like a pitcher's battle after Greenville scored in the third inning, with Boehling finding his work much easier than under ordinary circumstances.

The principal part of the stick for Greenville was done by Doran who secured a double and single. Frazier, Smith, Stringfield, Keating and Carson were credited with one hit each. Wilson, R. Morris and Shirley were the only members of the Bear outfit able to connect for safeties. R. Morris hit for Fred in the ninth, and surpassed all expectations by getting a hit.

While both clubs were credited with three errors, they played an exceptionally good game in the field. This was especially so on the part of the Greenville players, who played in a way that failed to yield the Bears the slightest kind of an advantage. Boehling was credited with six strikeouts against Oehme two. Greenville had six men left on bases and New Bern five. The Bears were credited with two double plays against Greenville one.

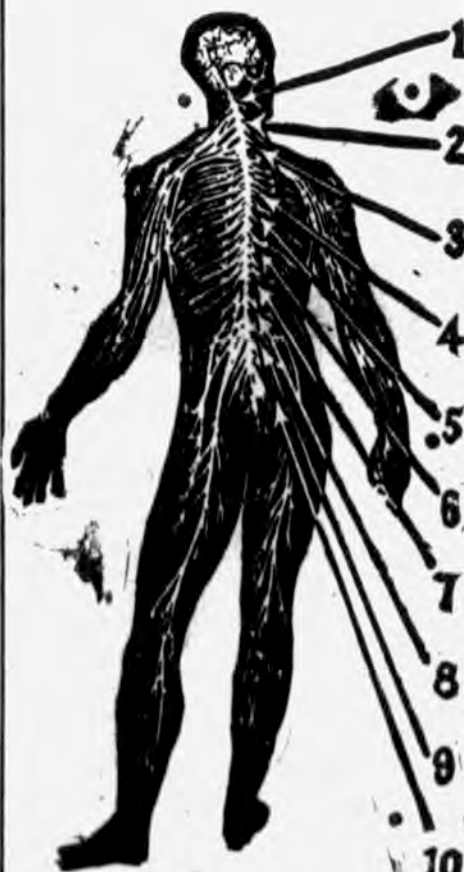
