

COMMISSION TO AWARD TWO ROAD CONTRACTS SOON

Bids for Construction of Hard
Roads to Falkland and Cox's
Mill Received

ATLANTA CONCERN PRESENTS LOWEST BID FOR SYSTEMS

Roads to Extend Five Miles
Towards Falkland and Seven
Miles to Cox's Mill

Members of the Pitt County Highway commission were in session in this city yesterday to consider bids for construction of sixteen foot reinforced concrete highways extending five miles from Greenville to Falkland and seven miles from Greenville towards Cox's Mill. While there were four bids received at the time contracts will not be awarded until the regular meeting of the board of commissioners to be held in this city next Monday.

The lowest bid presented for construction of both projects was from the Clayton Mitchell Company of Atlanta, Ga. The bid was \$289,490.79. The commission will consider these figures during the remainder of the week and be in readiness for rendering a decision when the board of commissioners meet next week.

The next lowest bidder was Porter & Peck, of this city, their bid being \$305,612.44. Discus & Miller, of Bethel, bid \$308,217.81. The highest bidders were Chetwood Driscoll, their figures being \$334,521.32.

The roads to Falkland and Cox's mill are probably traveled as much as any in the county, and the construction of the hard surfaced systems will be received with general interest by people in both sections. It is expected that construction work will get under way within a short time after contracts have been awarded, and in that event they will be completed much sooner than other roads because of the short distance involved.

The county highway commission has been able to make splendid progress with its work the last few months, as the road to Ayden has been made very evident, every effort will be made to complete the entire system as early as possible.

AMERICAN LEGION MEMBERSHIP DRIVE ON IN THIS STATE

Much Interest Centered
Around National Convention
to be Held This Year

On July 25th the American Legion got under way a State-wide membership campaign or drive. This campaign will continue through until August 8th, the date on which will be determined our voting strength at the State convention to be held in Greensboro on September 8th and 9th. Pitt county post now stands at twelve in size in this state as of July 27th, with a paid-up membership of one hundred and seventy-six. What is to prevent our post from numbering two hundred strong or better on August 8th.

On October 16th to 21st, will convene our next national convention. A better place than New Orleans could not be selected for this purpose. Mangum, J. W. Sears and others. Cotton farmers, bankers, merchants professional men and everybody should hear the message this man will bring to us Friday. The meeting will be in the court house at 10:30 a. m.

Tobacco Averages 20c at Lake City Opening Today

A telegram, received this afternoon from F. D. Foxhall, Greenville tobaccoist, who is attending the opening of the Lake City, South Carolina, tobacco market, stated that the market sold six hundred thousand pounds today with an average of twenty cents a pound. This is exactly double last year's opening average, and indicates a general improvement in the price situation.

The opening of the South Carolina markets is always attended

by large crowds of tobaccoists from all markets, as prices are considered something of a barometer to those that will prevail in bright leaf districts. Lake City is one of South Carolina's prominent selling points and the information coming from Mr. Foxhall may be considered of the most reliable nature.

Other reports are expected during the day, but it isn't believed the average will vary to any great extent.

SEVEN COWS SLAIN AS RESULT OF TEST FOR TUBERCULOSIS

Dr. Faulhaber Inspects 115
Cows of County and Finds
Seven Infected

Dr. L. J. Faulhaber, assistant state veterinarian, Raleigh, N. C., has just finished his work of testing 115 cattle around Greenville, Winterville and Stokes. The method of diagnosis used was the Intradermal Test. The Intradermal Test is the most accurate test and it is used in preference to all other test by federal inspectors. In this test the tuberculin is injected between the layers of the skin, only a few drops being used, and it is usually applied in the region at the base of the tail where the skin is soft. The reaction from this test consists of a swelling at the point of injection and this swelling is observed from 48 to 108 hours after injection.

Of the 115 head of milk cows tested in Pitt county seven reacted to the test and were slain under supervision of Dr. Faulhaber Monday. All of these showed well developed lesions and tuberculosis nodules throughout the internal organs of the body. These cows all looked perfectly healthy and nobody would have suspected that they had tuberculosis. The people on whose farms these cows were found to be infected were very anxious to have them destroyed at once and every one of them were slain and destroyed Monday.

Dr. Faulhaber stated that a great number of the counties in North Carolina are now having all the cattle in the county tested. This work is carried on co-operatively between the county, state and Federal Government. It does not take a great while to complete this work in any one county and when the work is started in any county that county is automatically protected from importing the disease in cattle brought in as they will all have to be tested before coming in to the county. This is a protection that our people need in Pitt county.

FIVE PROPOSALS PRESENTED TODAY IN STRIKE ISSUE

Specific Plans for Ending Great
Labor Tie-up Become
Effective

Cincinnati, O., July 31.—Five specific proposals for the settlement of the railroad strike are contained in President Harding's plan which will be submitted to railroad executives in New York and rail unions heads in Chicago tomorrow, it was asserted here tonight by an official of the railroad shopcrafts union. The official, who refused to permit use of his name stated that he had secured the information from rail union officials in Washington Saturday. The five specific proposals, according to the officials include:

1. That the employees will abide by the decisions of the United States Railroad Labor Board in the future.
2. In the matter of seniority the employees who remained on the job during the strike will receive preferential treatment, men who have been on strike will return with their seniority rights subject to those rights acquired during the strike by men who remained on the job and that the seniority of the employees will date from the time they entered service.
3. The men will accept the recent wage reductions of the railroad labor board pending a further rehearing on the matter by the board.
4. "Farming out" of shop work by the railroads will be discontinued.
5. Discussion of the establishment of adjustment board. Regarding the matter of adjustment boards the official stated that the unions desire a national board of adjustment while the railroad executives seek either regional or system boards.

SENIORITY RIGHTS MUST BE RESTORED TO RAIL WORKERS

Leaders of Railway Workers
Declare Restoration Must
be Made

LEADERS GATHER FOR MEETING AT WINDY CITY TODAY

Texas Town to Pray for Settlement of Strike at Churches Today

Chicago, July 31.—Leaders of the striking railway shopmen arriving here tonight for tomorrow's meeting called to consider President Harding's peace proposals insisted tonight despite all reports to the contrary that any settlement would restore their full seniority rights to the strikers. "The men will go back to the exact positions on both seniority lists and pension rolls they occupied before the walkout on July 1," declared the president of one of the unions who declined to permit the use of his name.

All expressed the belief that the terms of the President's plan would be ratified by the union leaders—the ninety men composing the policy committee of the railroad department of the American Federation of Labor. These represent the six shop crafts unions now on strike under the leadership of Bert M. Jewell.

The meeting of the strike leaders will open about the same hour the railway presidents will open their meeting in New York to act on the same proposals looking toward a settlement of the strike. Among the union men tonight the belief was expressed that the President's plan would meet the greatest opposition from a minority of the railway executives, but they were firm in the conviction that it would finally carry and that the strikers would be back at work before the end of the week.

Denison, Texas, will pray for settlement of the railroad strike. The mayor, in a proclamation, asked business houses tomorrow to close for one hour and urged citizens to assemble in church and pray that the conferences of executives and shopmen result in peace. All the local churches have arranged for morning prayer meetings.

The Southern Pacific Company, through its general manager, J. H. Dyer, announced it will not accept any plan to end the present shopmen's strike that calls for the displacing of men now in the service by strikers.

CHICAGO HARD HIT BY STRIKE OF RAILWAYMEN

Strike of Twenty Thousand Men Today Completely Paralyzed Industry

Chicago, Aug. 1.—Street and elevated railways are idle and a million Chicagoans were walking today when twenty thousand trainmen struck this morning. The tie is the most complete of any other transportation paralysis in years. The strike resulted as a protest against wage reductions.

LEFTY WILSON HOLDS KINSTON TEAM WHILE THE BEARS PUT OVER FIVE RUNS

New Bern, July 31.—Lefty Wilson was too much for the Kinstonians today, and the Bandits went down in defeat in the opening game of the series at Ghent Park by a score of 5 to 0. Only once during the game did the Bandits get a man as far as third base. Phillips walked in the fourth. Martin hit a hard one to the infield and both runners were safe. Waldhauer then tried to smother, and a snappy double play resulted, Phillips taking third. Koval was retired, then to first.

Railroad workers should return to
their jobs now while they are assured
that their seniority rights will be re-
stored. If they defer the matter the
railroad owners may find it advisable
to change their minds, as many have
already done. They can't be forced
to anything against their will and
when the strikers get this fact firmly
fixed in his mind it is probable the ma-
jority may find themselves returning
to their former jobs although they
may not like to.

Grade crossings haven't received
proper attention in Greenville and
Pitt county and life is as much in
danger today as ever. Something
should be done immediately to pro-
vide better crossings. This can be
done at no great expense and how
much safer the public would feel.
Other counties have awakened to the
seriousness of the situation and these
that haven't provided the crossing
have plans under way for construc-
tion.

Canada has been asked to purchase
coal in other countries until the strike
is brought to an end in this country.
That this was the right thing to do
cannot be questioned in the slightest
sense of the word when remembering
how short our supply is getting. We
cannot afford to jeopardize our own
industry to furnish Canada with a
normal amount when they can buy
it from some other country just as
easily as from us. The fact is, many
large industries in America are find-
ing it necessary to get foreign sup-
plies, and this being the case, it is
readily seen why Canada should be
denied.

The community sing held at the
Teachers College yesterday was all
that could be expected. A great
throng of representative citizens were
present and entered into activities in
a way that means great things for fu-
ture success of the sing. Such at-
tractions have a tendency of estab-
lishing a splendid spirit between the
people and the officer they are held
the sooner each section of the county
will be pulling together in one ac-
cord. This is a condition we have
wanted to see for many years and if
it can be made a reality through the
sing, why we say hold them every
Sabbath until our people are pulling
together like two old dray horses.

Business has shown some slowing
up since the strikes became effective
but the revival has not been checked
to any great extent. The public must
do the best it can under the circum-
stances, and while the majority of
people are holding to their money in
anticipation of an emergency, num-
bers are spending freely as ever.
The financial situation, however, isn't
what it should be and won't improve
to any great extent until strikes are
settled and the ranks of unemployed
are thinned. The next few weeks
should see a great improvement in
everything and by fall things ought to
be on a firm trend upwards.

President Harding is beginning to
feel optimistic over the strike situa-
tion, but what he sees to make him
feel that way is hard for the public
to determine. If conditions aren't
more serious today than two weeks
ago, then it is difficult to understand
why they are not. The coal supply is
certainly diminishing with each suc-
ceeding day and unless the miners re-
turn to work the shortage will be
worse than ever. The rail workers
haven't any idea of returning to work
unless certain conditions are met and
the president may get as happy as
he likes, but it won't have any effect
with them. We hope, however, he
has something to be optimistic about
as we have worried along with strikes
long enough and would certainly like
to see a change for the better. The
strikers should seriously consider the
great harm done the country by their
action and then get down to business
and help get things back to normal.

The plan for distributing coal will
no doubt relieve the serious situation
confronting the country at present
time, and by the time miners return
to work conditions ought not to be so
bad. The shipment of coal from Great
Britain and other countries will help
relieve things, and with the reserve
supply on hand, we ought to tide over
the summer months at least. Pros-
pects of an early settlement of the
coal strike are brighter today than
in weeks and if the miners do what's
right they will forget and forgive and
get back into the mines and continue
operations as usual.

Things begin to look somewhat
brighter in the rail strike situation
at this time and those higher up seem
to think this will be the last week
of the crisis. This information will
be received with keenest interest on
all sides as conditions have been grow-
ing worse with each succeeding day
with little chance of relief. It is
gratifying to know the railroad head
and union men have been able to de-
cide upon terms of agreement and if
they can make it lasting and bet-
ter. Neither side will gain any partic-
ular advantage from the strike, and
the country will be worse off by far.
Strikes are the greatest disorganizers
of industry imaginable and when two
occur at the same time the public
very naturally suffers considerably
more. We hope the coal strike may
also be amicably concluded in the
near future, as this will facilitate
recovery on both sides.

WEBB DOWNS SOX IN OPENING GAME OF SERIES HERE

Costly Bobbles and Decision of Umpire Crisp Also Featured in Visitors' Victory

Tarboro won the opening game of the series from Greenville yesterday afternoon by the score of 3 to 0. Mark Webb pitched masterly ball for the visitors and was in no immediate danger of being scored upon until the ninth frame when with the bases full and only one down Greenville proved unable to connect for the required hit.

Thompson appeared on the mound for Greenville and pitched a wonderfully effective game. His support, however, was not up to the usual standard and Tarboro gained a lead in the second and fourth innings that the Blue Sox found impossible to overcome. A decision by Umpire Crisp was largely responsible for the last two runs. With two men on bases and two outs the man on third was caught off the base and put out. Crisp called him safe, and the next man drove through a safety scoring the two runners. The first run was scored on a bobble by Stringfield and White's failure to handle a line drive in the second frame.

After the disastrous fourth, however, the Greenville infield tightened up and played brilliantly the remainder of the game. Frazier in center field made a running catch of a long drive by Mark Webb which under ordinary circumstances would have been good for three bases. The fleet fielder went after the old apple like a greased streak of lightning and pulled off an audacious piece of highway robbery.

Tarboro showed splendid form in every part of the game, giving the big southpaw heavier the best kind of support both in the field and at the bat. Thompson deserved to come out victorious, as he hurled winning ball in every inning, and kept his so well scattered that they would never have resulted in runs if errors could be omitted. The entire club got a poor start in the very first inning and this combined with bad breaks gave Tarboro an advantage which they found no trouble in keeping.

That was a dangerous looking ninth inning rally the Sox staged. A base on balls followed by Smith's double

put a runner on second and third. The next man went out easily. The next, however, received a free pass to first, filling the bases. Massey and Beall made a desperate effort to connect for a required safety in this frame, but Webb proved invincible. He had great luck also and with the two combined the Sox were retired without scoring. At least one runner could have been scored if the score had been one to nothing, but they were after three runs to tie the score and cared for nothing less.

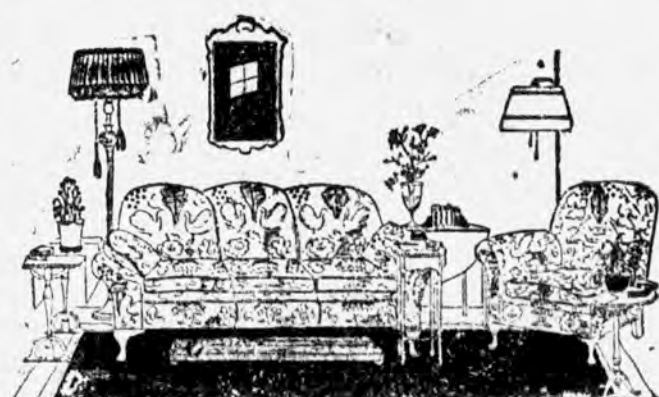
