

High Prices Prevail On Tobacco Markets

RAILWAY HEADS FIRMLY REJECT HARDING'S PLAN

Executives Courteously Decline to Reinstatement Strikers With- out Impaired Rights

New York, Aug. 1.—Railway executives of the nation today firmly, but courteously rejected the program advanced by the Harding administration for settlement of the rail strike.

Willing to accept conditionally two suggestions put forward by the White House—that both sides abide by wage decisions of the Railroad Labor Board and that lawsuits springing out of the strike be withdrawn—the heads of 148 roads declared emphatically that it was impossible to reinstate strikers with unimpaired seniority rights, the third provision in the President's plan.

After being told by Robert S. Lovett, of the Union Pacific, that there was no moral or practical reason for budging from their position, the executives disbanded, caught the first trains for their respective headquarters and indicated they were going ahead and would operate their roads with the forces they had assembled since the shopmen walked out on July 1.

The decision not to yield on the question of seniority was made known to the White House by telegraph after the rail heads had listened to a 20-minute address by Secretary of Commerce, Hoover, who, as direct representative of the President, told them in effect, that the administration held the seniority question of minor importance in comparison with that of upholding the Railroad Labor Board.

This action was taken in the face of a letter from President Harding addressed to T. Dewitt Cuyler, chairman of the American Association of Railway Executives, embodying "the terms of agreement, as I understand them, upon which the railway managers and the United Shop Craft Workers are to agree, preliminary to calling off the existing strike."

South Carolina Reports General Average of 20c

Telegrams received from Lumberton, N. C., and Lake City, S. C., Shows That Farmers Are Highly Elated at First Sales Yesterday; Other Markets Report Similar Averages. Lake City Has Record Break.

Late and more detailed reports from early North Carolina markets in the southeastern section of the state and South Carolina markets bear out the statement carried in yesterday's Reflector that tobacco was selling around twenty cents a pound or nearly double the opening average on these markets last year. The reports received today cover more territory and are from men well acquainted with tobacco and know what they are talking about.

The first report yesterday was received from Lake City, the largest of the South Carolina markets. This was sent by F. D. Foxhall of Greenville and stated that the market sold over a half million pounds at an average of about twenty cents. More complete reports show this statement was correct and that prospects for a most successful season were never brighter.

High prices in the early belt are generally considered as an indication of good prices in the great bright leaf belt of Eastern North Carolina, which will open within the next two weeks.

The following telegram was received this morning from M. R. Graveley, who attended sales at Lake City yesterday:

"Lake City market opened yesterday, selling the greatest number of pounds of tobacco in

history of the market in one day over the auction floors. Sales amounted to \$50,890 pounds at an average of 21.33."

Another telegram received today from J. R. Hodges, buyer of the Person Garrett Company, who is on the Lumberton market stated:

"Lumberton sold 60,000 pounds yesterday at an average of 20 cents."

Other reports received from these markets verified the telegrams received by this paper. The quality of tobacco sold in South Carolina is of a much inferior grade than that in the great belt, and it is generally believed prices will show as great an increase for the good grades as for the bad. The excellent showing made by the early markets has occasioned general satisfaction in this part of the state where the bulk of fine grade bright leaf is produced and tobaccoists and farmers also are looking forward to a most successful season. Further developments will be watched with interest, and in the meantime great preparations will be made for the opening of the Eastern markets. Greenville will have triple sales this year and a scene of the most intense activity will prevail here during the opening days.

The Supreme Lodge, Knights of Gideon, convened at Sycamore Hill Baptist church in this city yesterday for its sixteenth annual session. Seven hundred delegates representing practically every section of the state were in attendance at the opening session yesterday and entered into activities in an interesting way. The final session will be held this afternoon and tonight a public reception will be tendered visitors at the Center Brick warehouse.

The opening session was called to order by Sir J. W. Grimes, supreme commander, who at the outset outlined the policy and procedure of the session in an interesting way. All supreme officers were presented with special designed badges by the supreme commander.

The reports of the supreme officers were of an inspiring nature, and all were commended for their efficient management of affairs.

FULL ACCEPTANCE OF STRIKE PLANS APPEARS ASSURED

Final Action by Union Leaders Is Expected to Take Place During the Day

Chicago, Aug. 1.—Full acceptance of President Harding's peace plan by the striking shopmen was declared by union leaders to have been practically assured as a result of today's meeting of the shop crafts' policy committee. Final action was expected at another meeting to be held tomorrow.

Following the meeting none of the union leaders would comment on the situation, left, as it was, in mid-air, with a very definite trend, however, toward acceptance.

The rejection of the seniority proposal by the railroad executives in New York and their qualified acceptance of the President's other two points were received without comment by the strikers.

Discussion of the points of the President's peace program followed the reading of his communication to B. M. Jewell, president of the Federated Shop Crafts, who came direct from a conference with his executive council, Chairman Ben W. Hooper, of the Labor Board, and A. O. Wharton, one of the board's labor members. Mr. Wharton, who formerly held Mr. Jewell's present position, was understood to have attended the conference and later the meeting of the policy committee, at the suggestion of the President. Chairman Hooper, who was invited to attend the policy committee meeting, also suggested the attendance of Mr. Wharton, but agreed he would be glad to attend later if he could be of any service.

Some opposition to President Harding's peace program was raised by members of the policy committee, their complaint being on account of absence of any provision on wages. Answering these complaints, union leaders said that a rehearing by the labor board which was to be gained under the peace program would doubtless result in wage advances.

The discussion also brought out the belief of the union leaders that the creation of adjustment boards to settle disputes between roads and workers might be required of the roads by the labor board. The union chiefs also were said to have informed the meeting that should the board feel that it could not force the establishment of the adjustment boards, that they had reason to believe that congress would be asked to amend the transportation law in this respect.

With good prices for tobacco indicated by the South Carolina opening Pitt county farmers should brace up and forget great loss resulting from excessive rainfall.

Today is "booster day" in baseball circles and everyone will turn out to see the club make its best showing of the year. The day is designated as "booster day" principally for the purpose of raising funds for the club. Admission is larger than ordinarily, between considering that money is to be raised in this way instead of individual solicitation as in the past it is believed everyone will like it better. The crowd should be larger than under ordinary circumstances.

The strike situation becomes more favorable with each succeeding day, and before the week is over news that an agreement has been reached may be received. That this would cause widespread joy and satisfaction cannot be doubted in the slightest sense of the word. Everybody realizes what a serious situation will result from a long drawn out strike and many city churches are praying that the disaster may be avoided by amicable settlement of issues involved. The strikers by this time should realize the great harm to their industry and should return to work forgetting difference with are unequalled for in every sense of the word. Wage reductions are the most natural thing in the world when considering the country is returning to normal and any set of workmen unwilling to bear their part haven't the country or their particular industry at heart.

Everybody in Greenville would be glad to have the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce permanently located here, and if the directors should decide in our favor they may rest assured the city will do everything to live up to the honor conferred upon it. That this is the ideal location for the home office is indubitable. With the president and several other officers living here or in close proximity it is easily seen that the institution would derive a great saving in having the office close to them. The managers would not be forced to spend so much in railroad fare and postage, and when any vital issue occurred they would be in close touch with one another. Then they would also be in daily communication, and this fact alone should mean great things to the people which they serve. The officers would certainly not go amiss in deciding to definitely locate headquarters here and the institution should be accepted.

Good road work under construction in this county is greeted with little or no all sides as everyone realizes what splendid road systems mean to them. The letting of contracts here yesterday means that our system will be extended in the near future. When all towns are connected by hard surfaced roads industry will be conducted much better than in past years. Transportation will be speeded up as never before and when this is done business necessarily experiences good results. We hope the good road work will continue until every road of any importance in the county has been completed, for we can never make the progress we should until this has been done. The county has been forced to provide an enormous sum of money to make this work possible, but this is small indeed compared to the great benefit which the public will derive. After the present appropriation has been exhausted the county wouldn't do anything wrong to provide more money to continue the work until a complete net work of good roads has been provided.

The outlook for improved tobacco prices is very bright for this season as early reports received from South Carolina yesterday indicate. When farmers tell good everybody in this part of the country takes good, and for that reason strength in prices will be.

be received with genuine interest on all sides. The South Carolina price situation may generally be considered something of an index to conditions to prevail in the bright leaf districts, and this being the case farmers may look forward to better conditions than last year. That they deserve this cannot be doubted in the slightest sense of the word. Excessive rainfall wrought great damage in many of the best tobacco raising sections of the county and unless farmers will suffer worse than in the past several months. This crop shortage will have a good influence on prices and it is believed it is largely responsible for the fine showing made in South Carolina, although it is true South Carolina tobacco is much inferior to that grown locally.

IRON MAN BEALL

HURLS BLUE SOX TO ANOTHER WIN

By Timely Hitting Sox Score Runs in Sixth, Seventh and Ninth Innings

Entirely too much Beall held Tarboro, hopelessly deadlocked for nine innings at the fair grounds yesterday afternoon and Greenville easily nosed out with a 4 to 0 victory. The Greenville hurler probably never appeared at more direct advantage and succeeded in holding the heavy Tarboro sluggers to only three widely scattered singles during the entire game. The whole Sox outfit rendered perfect support and handled the ball in a way that made scoring for the visitors absolutely impossible.

Firth appeared on the mound for the visitors and breezed along like a house afire until the sixth frame when Greenville sent the first runner across the rubber. Scoring continued in the seventh and the eighth when the last three runners were sent to the checking station. Stringfield featured in the field and at the bat for Greenville as it was his double in the eighth that resulted in the two extra runs. His work in the field was of an exceptionally brilliant nature, especially when he made a short run backwards and caught a line drive that was apparently labeled for two bases. Other members of the club also accepted several difficult chances and not in a single instance did they fail to show up in old time form.

The visitors on the other hand weren't able to handle the ball as deliberately and precisely as the day before, and made four bobbles that featured prominently in their defeat. Two miscues came at a time when Greenville had men on bases, but the others occurred at moments when they meant little or nothing in the way of scoring.

The whole secret of the Sox success, however, lies in Beall's excellent work on the mound. Only in one single instance did the visitors seriously threaten home plate, but at that moment the "iron man" tightened up and positively declined to let them make any further advances. Neither hurler had any big day in the way of strikeouts, Beall being credited with four against Firth two. The game had settled down to a pitchers' duel until the sixth when timely work with the willow and Tarboro's inability to continue handling the ball resulted in the first two runners reaching home.

The Greenville club showed entirely different form from the day before, both in the field and at the bat, while Tarboro failed to measure up to expectations, although battling stubbornly. Massey and Stringfield featured with the stick for the Sox, the former being credited with two singles out of three trips to the rubber, and the latter a timely double in the eighth.

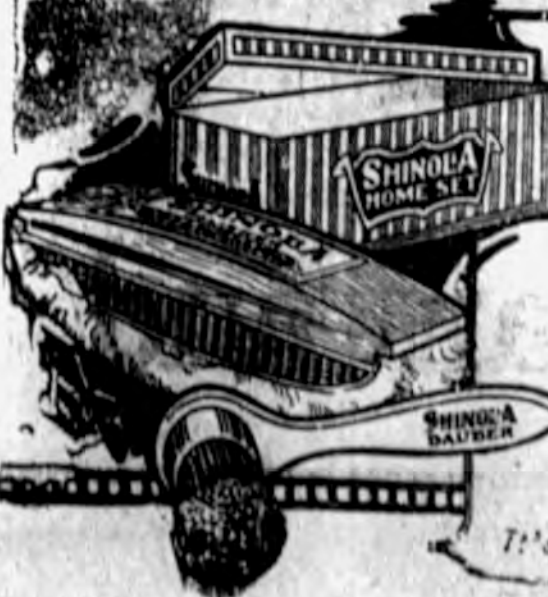

Have your cows been tested for tuberculosis? If not see that it is done without delay. Mr. Sam Dudley has recently had every cow in his herd tested and a few of them proved to be positive for tuberculosis. Every cow that showed positive reaction was immediately slaughtered and buried.

Since that time Mr. Dudley has thoroughly cleaned and disinfected his entire barn and dairy and you can rest assured he can furnish milk absolutely pure from tuberculosis.

I feel that Mr. Dudley should be congratulated for what he has done in order to furnish us milk free from tuberculosis. Of course this is quite a loss to Mr. Dudley in dollars and cents but he did not consider this at all when he found that these infected cows rendered his milk dangerous for food.

I am going to request that every

dairyman in Greenville that offers milk for sale file a certificate in my office showing that every cow in his herd is free from tuberculosis. I warn you to drink no milk from any cow that has not been tested and proven to be free from tuberculosis. If you do you are taking a great risk.

If you are buying milk ask your dairyman if his cows have been tested.

"We'll tell the world Mary is a good mother," declared the five little Camicias, grouped about their guardian sister. "She's best after our regular mother."



San Francisco, Cal. Aug. 1.—Mary is famed in song as being a grand old name and a great "pal," but Mary Josephine Camicia has proved to be a "grand little mother."

Twelve-year-old Peter Camicia told Judge Thomas F. Graham all about it in Superior Court the other day when Mary came forward as the youngest guardian in the history of San Francisco courts to give an accounting of her year's stewardship of a little brood of five Camicias.
