

SEVEN MEMBERS OF SENATE COMMITTEE RECOMMEND ABSOLUTE ACCEPTANCE OF FORD'S PROPOSAL OF ALABAMA PROJECT

Gigantic Trade War Between Ford and Trusts Heralded by Senate Action

COMMITTEE BRANDS NORRIS PLAN AS AN EXTRAVAGANT ISSUE

Ford to Develop Monster Water Project Equal to That of Niagara Falls

Washington, Aug. 4.—Heralding a gigantic war between Henry Ford and industrial trusts, seven members of the senate agricultural committee today recommended absolute acceptance of Ford's offer for Muscle Shoals in a minority report made public today.

Hinting that Ford will launch a trade war if he obtains control of Muscle Shoals, the report warned that Ford's development of Muscle Shoals might bring about a means to avoid future paralysis of industry through the breakdown of fuel and transportation systems.

The report also branded the Norris plan of government ownership as extravagant waste and declared that Ford's was the only plan to give the people an opportunity to benefit by Muscle Shoals. The acceptance will result in a monster water power development comparable to a Niagara Falls, it was stated.

ELSIE HINES WILL BE CROWNED QUEEN OF AYDEN FESTIVAL

Miss Elsie Hines was today elected queen of the mid-summer festival to be conducted in Ayden tonight, and promptly at eight o'clock she will be crowned "queen of the festival" by Mr. Jack Blount, who has taken an active interest in the race.

Miss Hines polled approximately 2,835 votes of the 5,381 cast in the contest. Miss Irene Barwick brought up second place, and was giving the winner a pretty tight race when the contest closed.

The festival will be held at the Ayden graded school building tonight and it is expected a large crowd will be in attendance. Dances will be pulled off by young women representing Grifton, Bethel, Greenville and Ayden. An interesting program has been provided for the occasion and it is expected the affair will eclipse anything of the kind ever before held in this county.

The dancers won favorable recognition at the festival conducted in Grifton last night and it is expected they will score a great hit in Ayden tonight. They will be seen in action at the Greenville festival which will be held here next Tuesday night.

Miss Louise Hubbard, executive secretary of the Red Cross who has the festivals in charge, stated this afternoon that Ayden people had manifested more than usual interest in the outcome of the affair and for this reason an unusually large attendance

RIGID ECONOMICS SAVE STATE OVER \$123,000 YEARLY

Dr. Brooks Directed to Decrease Expenditures and Does it in a Fine Way

Raleigh, Aug. 3.—Drastic economies in the administration of the State Board of Education effected a saving of \$123,000 for the school year of 1921-22, and more effective organization of high schools during the coming year will effect a saving of approximately \$250,000, according to the annual report of Superintendent E. C. Brooks to the State Board of Education made public yesterday.

Directed by the special session of the General Assembly to cut down \$75,000 somewhere in the expenditure of public schools appropriations made in the regular session, the department did that and some more, according to the figures in the report, and as a result of the savings, counties that receive State aid will get about \$900,000 as their share of the equalizing fund next year.

Only the Text Book Commission and the department of Teacher Training went over the appropriations and declared a deficit during the year, while every other department administered under the board of education cut under the appropriation. The Teacher Training expenditures covered sixteen months, and the Text Book commission found its labors so complicated that more time and money were needed to do the work.

PRESIDENT WRIGHT DELIVERS ADDRESS AT COLLEGE FINALS

Teachers College Confers First Degree Upon Two Young Women Graduates

EIGHT STUDENTS RECEIVE DIPLOMAS DURING EXERCISES

Professor Wright Introduced by Professor L. R. Meadows, of Summer School

Commencement at East Carolina Teachers College last night was an occasion of peculiar importance, for the first degrees ever conferred by a teachers college in North Carolina were conferred at the August commencement. Miss Gertrude Chamberlain, of Cheraw, South Carolina, and Miss Virginia Faison Pigford, of Faison, were the two young women who have the distinction of being the first graduates of the four year course and thus the first to receive the A. B. degree, and the first from this college to be granted the A grade of certificate by the state department of education.

President Wright in conferring the degree said that he was glad that this occurred at the August graduation exercises, because it breaks a tradition, the old idea that degrees could not be granted at any time except in June. He said he was glad to announce that diplomas and degrees are granted by East Carolina Teachers College whenever the students complete their work for these. The announcement was made that a number of the graduates from the two year normal course are in college this summer and are working towards their degrees.

Eight young women received their diplomas for having completed their two year normal school course. These were Misses Virginia Arthur, Della Bryan, Ida Holland, Elma Lewter, Nelle McDonald, Ruth Swinney, Addie Sharp, and Florence Woodard. With the diplomas, President Wright also delivered to them the B grade of primary or grammar grade certificate and Bibles. North Carolina is the only state in the Union that gives a Bible as a guide to each one of the

GOVERNMENT WILL DELAY ACTION IN RAILROAD STRIKE

Mail Delayed by Rumor That Government is Seeking Receivership From the Roads

TEN THOUSAND SHOP WORKERS FORM NEW UNION ON SANTA FEE

Association of Telegraphs Demand That Their Rights be Protected in End

Washington, Aug. 3.—Indications continued to multiply today that the Federal government contemplates no immediate step in the rail strike situation. A member of President Harding's cabinet declared, however, that as an abstract proposition "it might be imagined" that the government would apply for receiverships of such railroads as were unable to execute their mail carrying contracts.

The cabinet official emphasized that he was not saying that any receivership proceedings were imminent and Postoffice Department officials said that general the mails were being handled with only slight interruption and delay.

Ten thousand shopmen on the Santa Fe, who have formed an association of new employes, today telegraphed Chairman Hooper, of the United States Railroad Labor Board, demanding their rights be safeguarded in any settlement of the shopmen's strike.

They are entitled, they say, to protection in the seniority rights acquired during the strike.

White Men And Women Injured In Gun Battle

Fight on Birmingham Street Car Causes Serious Injury of Participants This Afternoon

Birmingham, Aug. 4.—Two white men, one perhaps fatally wounded and two negro women are in a hospital here as result of a shooting fray last night three alleged striking shopmen ordered employees of the Frisco railroad from a street car.

Big Four Railway To Take Drastic Action in Strike

Charge That Rolling Stock Is In Dangerous Condition and Menace to Public

Washington, Aug. 4.—Drastic action by the "Big Four" railway brotherhoods is imminent as result of conditions of the railway rolling stock, brotherhood leaders told members of the International News Service today.

It was charged that defective locomotives were operated in violation of federal laws. Leaders are gathering data for an energetic protest to congress.

HIGH PRICES FOR TOBACCO PREVAIL IN GEORGIA CITIES

Tifton Market Averages as High as Thirty Cents During Opening Days There

QUALITY CONSIDERED GREATLY SUPERIOR TO LAST TWO SEASONS

Douglas, Georgia Also Makes Splendid Showing on All Grades of Leaf

Macon, Ga., Aug. 3.—Satisfactory prices were paid today, the second day of the Georgia tobacco markets, according to reports from different buying centers. Hundreds of buyers are bidding for the offerings of growers. At Tifton more than 100,000 pounds were sold at an average of 30 cents, top prices being 65 cents a pound. Highest prices paid at Abbeville were 32 cents, two big lots being sold at that figure and another for 26 cents. At Hazlehurst 10,000 were sold, the prices ranging from 10 to 44 cents. Buyers say that the grade and quality is better than last year at all points.

Tifton, Ga., Aug. 3.—More than 100,000 pounds of bright tobacco, South Georgia's comparatively new farm product, was sold yesterday, the opening day of the market. The prices ranged from 23 to 65 cents a pound, with an average around 30 cents.

Douglas, Ga., Aug. 3.—Tobacco markets throughout South Georgia opened yesterday and sales involved many thousands of dollars. At Douglas, 91,500 pounds of tobacco were sold while in other nearby towns sales totalled 110,000 pounds. Prices at Douglas ranged from 7 cents to \$1.18 per pound, while in other markets prices ranged from 7 cents to 65 cents. Approximately 10,000 persons attended the sale here.

TOBACCO BUYERS ARRIVING IN THIS TOWN DAILY NOW

Export Tobacco Company and John E. Hughes Complete Their Buying Force Here

Buyers of the companies to be represented on this market this season are arriving in Greenville daily now as the opening day draws nearer and by the end of next week it is expected every company will have a full corps of men ready for business.

The names of buyers of the Imperial Tobacco Company were carried in yesterday's paper. Since that time names of representatives of the Export and John E. Hughes have been ascertained. The Export will have Messrs. A. E. Hobgood, V. E. Wells and T. C. Young. Mr. Hobgood has represented the concern here for a number of years and it well acquainted with conditions prevailing locally. The others have seen long experience in the industry and will be on the job the opening day.

John E. Hughes will be represented by H. A. Bost, E. J. Garret and Mr. Corbin, who will also represent R. J. Reynolds. They will also be for themselves and on order. Mr. Bost has been long service in the tobacco business, having been located in Greenville several years. Mr. Garret and Corbin have also been in the field many years and are well prepared to represent the company in an efficient way.

Each company will have three buyers on the market this season instead of two as in previous years. This will expedite the sale of bright leaf in many ways and farmers will not be forced to wait any great length of time before their pile is reached. The market will probably be more successful this season than ever before and is well prepared to offer service superior to anything in this section of the state.

Prospects are very bright at this time for an early end of the great railroad strike and the public is rejoicing that even this much encouragement has been received. President Harding has presented proposals which the strikers are ready to accept but which the railroad owners aren't so much in favor. The time for settling the dispute has come and both sides should remember the bad effect the strike is having on the country and get down to business and reach a decision.

Great Britain has rallied behind the American people in this moment of serious strike conditions, and the several million tons of coal they are to send us will relieve conditions to no little extent. If miners of that country had supported American strikers we would indeed be in a bad plight but as it is we may be able to pull through without serious handicap of industry. The diminishing coal supply will be distributed among the states until it is exhausted and may be by that time things will be more favorable over here. The public at least hopes it and will be looking forward hopefully with that end in view.

Booster day proved a great success so far as the local ball club is concerned, and the team will be able to continue the season without financial handicap. While this boost will strengthen the club considerably, it will be necessary for the public to continue giving liberal support during the remaining days of the season. If we should play in the championship series the crowds will be large enough to put us on a sound footing. On the other hand it will be necessary to resort to another booster day program. We aren't thinking of doing anything but winning the last half, however, so we hope fans will turn out in large numbers and help boost the boys on to victory.

The danger of unprotected railroad crossings is being more keenly realized in all parts of the country at present time and movements are under foot for eliminating the evil as much as possible. It is the duty of city and county authorities in every community to provide proper protection. If they find it is too expensive to provide flagmen or gates with bells, it might be advisable to build either overhead or underground passages. This can be done at the more dangerous places without any great outlay of money, and if officials fail to realize the necessity for such action the public should immediately demand it. Several deaths have occurred in and around Greenville as result of unprotected crossings and the toll will increase to appalling proportions unless something is done to improve the situation. The rapid increase in automobiles increases the danger of crossings, therefore, it is up to commissioners and city officials to get busy and see if this evil can't be set aside.

Continued strength of prices on the South Carolina markets is proving a great source of pleasure in this section of the country where the best grade bright leaf is produced. If the poor quality of tobacco produced in South Carolina can demand such prices, it is certain conditions will be favorable in the great bright leaf centers. Good prices in the southwestern section of this state is taken as an indication of improvement locally also, and farmers are looking forward with interest to opening of the market. One fact that will mean much to the farmer should be carefully considered before the crop is marketed. And that is the use of proper care in grading and preparing the leaf for marketing. Warehousemen have urged the farmer to pay careful attention to this important feature in the past, and while they met with results it has never been considered as serious as it should. We trust our farmers will do every

thing possible for their benefit this season, if they do prices and everything else will come out to their advantage.

THE PRIDE OF PITT.

People attending the ball games at Farmville and Kinston are greatly impressed by the splendid hard surfaced highways between these two cities, and will be glad when the entire system in this county is completed. By the opening of the next baseball season it is probable we may be connected with Washington and Tarboro and traveling then will be much easier than under present conditions.

There is nothing that adds to the pleasure of riding in an automobile more than good roads, and the county that builds them is certainly spending its money wisely. Pitt county has probably appropriated a larger sum for construction of hard roads than any other in this section of the state and as a consequence our system will be far superior to anything else.

We voted a bond issue of \$500,000 to match a similar amount by the state and federal governments. It was realized at the time the bonds were voted that this would be the last opportunity to receive state and federal aid and the county came across in a way that showed everyone favored better roads. Conditions will certainly be better when all counties and important towns and cities are connected by good roads and business will experience an improvement never before paralleled.

GOLDSBORO CHOSEN HEADQUARTERS FOR EASTERN CHAMBER

during the meeting of the directors' meeting: H. H. Taylor, Rocky Gap, Md.; Rev. H. Goddard, W. H. Austin, Smithfield, N. C.; J. H. McDaniel, J. T. Scotland, N. C.; and Dr. C. J. Ellen, Greenville.

Dr. C. J. Ellen, of Greenville, the permanent president, has served as temporary president since the organization was started early last fall and has become thoroughly familiar with the workings of the organization. By the time the schools open in the fall it will be safe to say that every county in the State will have the chance at a good high school education.
