STRIKE BREAKERS SEVERELY BEATEN BY MASKED MEN

Five Strike Breakers Killed While Working on an Engine.

ALL BADLY BEATEN
AND ONE REPORTED
FATALLY INJURED

Sheriff Blue Claims to Know
Identity of some of the Men
in the Fight.

Southern Pines, Aug. 4.—Twenty-five masked men, thought by the authorities to be striking Seaboard shopmen, attacked five strike-breakers and a guard at work on a disabled freight engine on a siding at Manly, two miles north of here, late this afternoon, bound and gagged them, loaded them in automobiles, carried them several miles from the scene and beat them severely, one of them perhaps fatally.

Sheriff D. A. Blue, just back from his race to Raleigh with three negro prisoners who barely escaped lynching here this morning, went immediately to the scene of the attack and began a search for the masked assailants. Arrests are expected tomorrow morning, he declared tonight. The identity of several of the men is believed to have been established here tonight.

Names of the five beaten workmen and the guard could not be learned here tonight, but it is believed that they are from Raleigh, where the Seaboard is endeavoring to keep its shops in operation. The locomotive had been broken down on the siding for the entire day, and the workmen were endeavoring to get it in condition to return it to Raleigh. The raid on them was made very quietly about dusk.

Late tonight Sheriff Blue was endeavoring to get in touch with Governor Morrison to have troops removed from Aberdeen a few days ago—returned here. He had not been able to get in communication with Raleigh. The injured men were given medical attention here, and the more seriously injured will be sent to the hospital in Raleigh late tonight.

SEVERAL CASES GIVEN HEARING IN POLICE COURT

ROCKY MOUNT MAN SLIGHTLY INJURED WHEN CARS CRASH

Chevrolet Truck and Reo Touring Car Collide Last Night With Serious Result

C. H. Teacherwith, driving a Chevrolet truck of the Bon Bon Candy Co. of Rocky Mount, received painful injuries when his truck collided with a Reo Touring car, driven by Fred Brewington, colored, of Winterville, at the corner of Broad street and Dickinson avenue last night about 12 o'clock. The collision occurred with such force that both cars were almost completely demolished. Mr. Teacherwith being thrown to the pavement with such force as to render him unconscious for several minutes.

Brewington was this morning found guilty of driving an automobile in a reckless and careless manner and while intoxicated and fined \$100 and cost by Mayor D. M. Clark in police court. A bottle of liquor was found in his car immediately after the accident and police say he had been drinking heavily.

Teacherwith had driven out to the forks of the hard surface roads to have his car filled with gas and was returning to Greenville when he observed the touring car turning in Dickinson avenue from another street. He made an effort to get out of the way, but the touring car crashed into him before this could be done. The truck was loaded with several kinds of candies manufactured by the Bon Bon Company, and this was scattered over the street for some distance.

It is considered remarkable how both men escaped without more serious injuries. While Teacherwith was unconscious when picked up a short time later by members of the police department his injuries are not considered serious and it is probable he will recover in a short time. The damage to both cars and stock of candy will amount to several hundred dollars.

Senate Plans To Consider Motive Power of Roads

Washington, Aug. 5.—While railway executive union leaders today continued to differ on condition of motive power, the senate promised to intervene and call for information from the Interstate Commerce commission soon. Senator Cummings asked for passage of the Harrison resolution calling for this information.

New French Note Sent To Germany

(By International News.)

Paris, Aug. 5.—The new French note, replying to Germany's communication, was received this morning and forwarded to Berlin. It revealed new penalties which France will impose on Germany to enforce payment of private loans and indemnity.

The measure is purely financial and not military and is not nearly so stern as anticipated. It provides for suspension of recognition of the German credit. No credits will be granted Germany for the sale of sequestered German property. Germany will not be notified of property sales and this makes it impossible for Germany to recompense owners.

Banks owing Germany will be instructed to withhold payment for requisition by the French.

Thirty Killed In Fighting In Rome Districts

Hundred Wounded In Terrific Battles Between Italian Factions.

Rome, Aug. 5.—Thirty persons were killed and more than a hundred were wounded in fighting occurring between Fascist socialists and communists in northern Italy, according to advices received from that district today.

Negro Blockader Is Killed In Raid Near This City

June Price, of Mount Olive, Killed by Sheriff While Other Members Escape From Still Two and a Half Miles From Greenville; Still and Several Gallons of Whiskey Captured.

A negro by the name of June Price, about 25 years of age, said to be of Mount Olive, was shot and killed last night about 12 o'clock by members of a whiskey raiding party led by Sheriff Ernest Dudley. The shooting occurred at a still located in a swamp about two and a half miles from this city when the party attempted to raid a still which was watched over by four men. The other three members of the party made their escape, and it is hardly likely further arrests will ensue.

Price was brought to the county jail in this city immediately after the shooting and this morning an inquest was held over the body by Coroner S. G. Wilkerson. The jury's verdict was that the negro came to his death as result of a shot fired by members of the party during the skirmish prior to the capture of the still, and that they fired in self defense.

The party making the raid was composed of Sheriff Ernest Dudley, Deputy Sheriffs Thad Williams, R. E. Corbett and S. I. Dudley.

After the distillers had been routed the officers captured a fifty gallon copper still, which was in full blast at the time and about ten gallons of whiskey which had already been distilled. The entire equipment was destroyed before the officers returned. The still was located in a dense growth of forest in the center of a swamp. The officers were forced to use flashlights to find their way. Even then traveling was dangerous, as the ground was slick and they were threatened with falling in a canal. They spotted the still, however, and as they did so the distillers opened fire. During the fight Price was seen advancing on one of the officers, armed with a shotgun and pistol. He was fired upon and when the other members had fled the negro was found lying on the ground with a shotgun wound in his chest.

Sheriff Dudley placed the injured man in his car and rushed him to town where he might receive medical aid, but he died about an hour and a half later.

Price talked freely to Sheriff Dudley. He said he was a stranger in this section and that his home was in Mount Olive. He said he fell in with the whiskey makers after coming here and went in business with them for the time being.

The officers and distillers came in close contact during the battle with guns, and while it was difficult to identify the men because of the darkness it is believed they were all negroes. Sheriff Dudley intends to work up all clues in his possession and if possible bring about arrest of the other members.

BOLL WEEVIL IS MAKING HEADWAY IN PITT COUNTY

Pest Reported in Several Parts of the County at the Present Time

The boll weevil is making great headway in Pitt county at the present time and has covered at the present time. The farm demonstration agent says that the pest multiplies rapidly and can cover more territory than a man in a good automobile.

Numbers of farmers have discovered the presence of the pest on their farms, and may be seen on the street with specimens almost daily. Mr. Weevil first made his appearance in the Grifton community and since the time has spread rapidly according to people living in that section.

Several farmers said they had seen the weevil in their cotton sometime but didn't know what it was until the papers began printing pictures of the pest. There are very few at the present time who wouldn't recognize Mr. Weevil and when warfare is declared slaughter will become general. Cotton has developed to such extent that sprinkling it with acid would do no good, it is stated, and the farmer will have to wait until next planting season.

An effective campaign will be put on under direction of the county agricultural agent next year, and it is hoped ravages of the weevil will be checked before any great damage can be done.

COAL OPERATORS SUBMIT OFFER OF SEPARATE PEACE

Illinois Mine Operators Send Proposals to President Frank Farrington.

REFUSE TO ATTEND
NEXT MEETING TO BE
HELD AT CLEVELAND

Mines Will be Opened if the Same Scale is Accepted, it is Stated.

Chicago, Aug. 4.—Illinois coal operators meeting here today refused to attend the meeting of union officials and operators called for Cleveland by John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers, but submitted a proposition to Frank Farrington, president of the Illinois miners' union, which, if accepted, would result in re-opening of Illinois mines.

According to and being governed by the request of the President of the United States, the proposal to Mr. Farrington said, "we are prepared to at once open our mines for work, paying the wage scale in effect at the expiration of the last contract. And to avoid possible further disruption of coal production this fall and winter when the coal supply will be dangerously short even under the best conditions, we will agree that the old wage scale shall remain effective until March 31, 1923.

The proposals suggested that immediately upon resumption of operations the whole matter of Illinois wages and working conditions be submitted to a board of arbitration composed of persons mutually agreed to or appointed by President Harding, no member of the board to be an operator or a miner.

The findings of the board, according to the terms of the proposal, would be binding and would constitute the wage basis for a period of two years from April 1, 1923.

The letter to President Lewis refusing to attend the Cleveland conference asserted that Mr. Lewis had called two such meetings and the Illinois operators accepted invitations but both were later abandoned. The letter also asserted that Illinois operators had accepted the proposal to end the strike made by President Harding, but that the miners had rejected it and blamed international officers of the union for the present situation. Through refusal of Mr. Lewis to allow such a conference, the present coal situation in Illinois has been brought about, the statement said.

Greater interest than ever is expected around the opening days this season and it is expected record crowds will be in attendance.

Great Britain must be figuring on fighting future wars in the air judging by the order for construction of five hundred airplanes. And enormous sum of money will be necessary in this issue and the country might find it much wiser to expend it for something more necessary.

Republicans have admitted delaying of the tariff bill. No one would ever believe it when considering that it is purely a Republican issue. They had some motive for holding things up, however, and this may be brought out at a later date.

Prices continue to show great strength on the South Carolina tobacco market, and indications are very bright for success in this section where the best grade bright leaf is produced. The farmers should carefully grade their offerings and rest assured of receiving prices in proportion to the cost of production.

The Ku Klux Klan won a great victory in the Oklahoma primary, and in future should be able to wield greater influence. The Klan isn't so bad as some try to paint it. In fact, it has been charged with things its members wouldn't stoop to, and the future may see its forces greatly strengthened. Evil doesn't necessarily result from secrecy, as some like to claim, and the Klan may be able to demonstrate the fact in due time.

The closing of the summer term of the Teachers College here yesterday was an important occasion to those who have spent so much time to make this part of school work as great as it has proven to be. The summer terms have grown in importance simply because the school heads saw the need of this extra training for young teachers, and if this interest continues to increase as it likely will, the future is very bright indeed. Attendance will increase with each succeeding year and the school very soon will become even a greater force for the development of state teachers. It is a credit to Greenville and the people should do everything possible for its success.

Rigid economies under the direction of Dr. E. C. Brooks, head of the state board of education saved the state sum of \$125,000 during the past year. That the head of our educational system deserves the thanks of the public cannot be doubted. He was requested to save \$75,000, but instead of doing that went a little further and saved several thousand more. If this economy program should continue the state will be able to extend its educational program to a greater extent than ever before. The money saved may be placed in developments along other lines where it is necessary and eventually our system will be much greater than it is today.

We hope the county commissioners in next session will consider protecting the dangerous railroad crossings of the country. The rapid increase in automobiles has greatly increased the danger of the crossings and the loss of life in the past will be mild compared to the future unless something is done. Overhead or underground crossings may be provided without any great outlay of money and it is the duty of both town and county authorities to remove the evil as much as possible. The saving of one single life would be worth everything expended in improving the crossings, and this deserves to be seriously considered by those whom have assumed the responsibility of government.

American business men have held up orders for coal in England, believing the American strike will be brought to an end. While they think they are doing the right thing it might be advisable to let the British mines fill the orders until assured the strike is at an end. The strike may continue several weeks longer and the cancelled orders would come in mighty good. If Britain is will-

ing to let us have coal we should take advantage of the offer and secure as much as possible while we have the opportunity. When the winter comes demand upon the foreign mines may be so great that our orders cannot be filled. It's mighty cheering to believe the strike will be concluded at an early date but that old saying about "A bird in the hand is worth two in the bush" is mighty applicable in this instance.

The government doesn't contemplate any early action in the strike, it was indicated yesterday and it is very probable the parties involved will continue conferring until agreement has been reached. This attitude on the part of the government will very likely cause both sides to consume as much time as they like. In other words with the prospect of immediate government interference removed they will be able to agree and disagree as long as they like, although it isn't probable there will be much agreeing. It is hoped a decision may be reached within the next several hours as the situation grows serious with each succeeding day and demands early action. Railroad rolling stock is deteriorating rapidly and unless something is done many lines will be forced to suspend operations of more trains than they already have. This would be a serious blow to transportation. In fact present conditions are mild compared to the future unless agreement is reached. The government should change its attitude within mighty short time if the opposing forces should show no signs of getting down to brass tacks.

GROWERS TO END DRIVE AUGUST 15th

Recent Landslide in South Carolina Will Have Effect in this State.

(News and Observer.) The membership campaign of the Tobacco Growers' Co-operative Association in the Eastern Carolina belt will close Tuesday, August 15th, and no more contracts for this year's crop will be accepted after that date, according to announcement from association headquarters at Raleigh yesterday.

The recent landslide of South Carolina

olina Growers to the big co-operative, the general dissatisfaction of the growers who decided to wait and see and the subsequent signing of contracts by many farmers during a brief re-opening of the membership lists by the association this week, now places from 65 to 70 per cent of South Carolina tobacco with the farmers' organization in that State, according to latest estimates.

Although prices on the auction market continue to hold steady, all reports indicate that the offerings have rapidly declined in volume. Interest centers on the opening of the co-operative warehouses on Monday, August 7th.

The pooling in the association warehouse of the amount of each advance allowed for each grade of tobacco and the thorough schooling of the association graders is significant in view of the widespread dissatisfaction among the unorganized growers.

The last drive of the Tobacco Growers' Co-operative Association into Eastern Carolina begins next Monday with meetings at Fremont Apex, Smithfield and Washington. Covering twenty-two points throughout the eastern counties, veteran campaigners from North Carolina, Kentucky and Virginia fresh from their successful meetings in the South Carolina belt will aid in the final cleanup of the Eastern Carolina farmers.

TREND OF AMERICAN FOREIGN TRADE

A net balance of imports into the United States, by which foreign nations can eventually pay their debts to America, is not indicated in the near future, the National Bank of Commerce in New York believes. Although this country's excess of exports has recently declined to an average only moderately higher than pre-war levels this excess is still being maintained by making new loans and investments abroad. In the August issue of its magazine, Commerce Monthly, the bank says:

"It is worthy of note that although the total value of foreign trade is still more than 60 per cent above the pre-war total the current average monthly net balances of exports is only moderately above the pre-war level.

"This substantial reduction in the excess of exports does not, however, indicate that an excess of imports is a probable development of the near future. The expectation of a net balance of imports is based on the fact that eventually the obligations of other countries to the United States can be liquidated only by payments in goods and services. But as regards the largest item in this indebtedness—the advances made by the government to the allies—interest payments have thus far been deferred and consequently have exercised no influence on the trade balance. Moreover, general negotiations regarding funding and interest payments on the allied indebtedness have hardly more than begun, so that for some months at least the influence of this factor on the trade balance will be slight.

"On the other hand, credit is being afforded to foreign governments and enterprises on a substantial scale. Flotations of foreign governmental and private securities in this country, for the first six months of the current year, are estimated at more than 675 million dollars. To this sum must be added the unrecorded but substantial flow of capital into foreign enterprises and into investment in foreign currency securities. The export of American capital, therefore, has in recent months much more than offset the net balance of exports of goods. In addition the major part of the country's foreign commerce is being carried in foreign vessels and tourist traffic is going abroad in heavy volume, further offsetting the balance of merchandise exports.

DISAPPROVES OF CO-OPERATIVE MARKETING

To the Editor:

The "co-op" campaign for contract signers will soon come to a close according to their statement, and according to the warehousemen the auction sales of leaf tobacco will soon begin. Since the bright belt crop of 1921 has been sold there have been a great many things to happen to confuse the men who makes this crop. And what has caused all of this confusion? As the writer sees it, a promoter from California came east, and after looking the situation over, decided that it would pay to stay awhile as things looked good to him. He soon gathered around him men of different types. Some had money, but the most of them were broke and the plan as outlined to them would give them a good job, and also a chance to sell their high priced warehouse property. The men with money had other matters that this plan would help them out with.

Now who was going to relieve these men of their financial difficulties? The farmer. How was he going to do it? By agreeing to deliver to this crowd all the tobacco he grew for five long years. What were they going to do with it? They were going to take title to it, put first liens on it, borrow money on it, buy all the warehouses they could find sellers for, pay the promoters their part, make a small advance to the farmer at time of delivery, pay salaries and other expenses that they may have. After the tobacco is sold and all of the above items are paid, if there is any money left who does it belong to? Why, the farmer of course.

So far as the farmer is concerned it is what he gets himself that counts. It is certainly not that which is promised him and he never gets. These promoters that are swarming over North Carolina, Virginia and South Carolina, tell us that the pool in Kentucky, is a success. What are the facts in the case? Kentucky pooled 120,000,000 pounds, has sold 70 million pounds and now holding 50 million pounds, advanced to the farmer \$15.85 per hundred in two separate payments, now to make the second payment it was necessary to borrow four million dollars on the tobacco that is being held, which is supposed to be 50 per cent of the value of same.

And if this tobacco is sold and the farmer gets the entire difference between the amount borrowed and the amount sold for he will get an all round average of \$19.18 per hundred against \$22.66 that the free farmer received for his at auction. Which means that if the Kentucky farmers had not been in the pool they would have received \$3.48 per hundred pounds, or \$4,176,000 more than they will. That's what it will cost to have the pool in Kentucky for one season. What will it cost the farmers here? Do we want to lose several million dollars in order to say that we have a pool like they have in Kentucky? There is no law in North Carolina to prevent a farmer from signing up, but let him remember that after he signs up he will pay his share of the loss.
