FAILURE TO HEAD SIGNALS RESULTS IN DEATH OF 38

Engineer Drives Fast Train Into Local Passenger Train on Missouri Pacific

MORE THAN HUNDRED PERSONS INJURED IN GASHTLY AFFAIR

Many Horrible Scenes in Evidence During the Crash and Immediately After

Sulphur Springs, Mo., Aug. 6.—Failure of an engineer to heed a block signal caused the rear-end collision on the Missouri Pacific here last night in which 38 persons were killed and about 137 injured, 12 seriously, according to John Cannon, Assistant general manager of the road.

Train No. 4, a fast passenger vestibuled steel train running at full speed, crashed into No. 32, a local composed of five wooden day coaches, a baggage and an express car as the engine was taking on water with the coaches stretching back on a trestle over Glaise Creek.

The impact hurled two of the coaches down a 50 foot embankment edging the Mississippi and telescoped four other coaches, crushing a number of passengers to death in their seats. Both trains were behind, the fast passenger running from Fort Worth, Texas, to St. Louis, carrying 180 passengers and the local 100 persons.

According to Mr. Cannon, Engineer Matt Enger Glenn of St. Louis, engineer of the fast passenger, failed to heed a block signal warning him the track was not clear ahead. Glenn 57 years old, an engineer for 35 years without a black mark against his record, was killed when he jumped from his cab just before the crash. Edward Tinsley, also of St. Louis, fireman of No. 4, remained at his post and was injured seriously.

Engineer Glenn shortly before arriving in Sulphur Springs received orders "on the run" to pull over on a siding at Cliff Cave, 10 miles north of here, to allow "Sunshine Special No. 1" en route from St. Louis to Texas points to pass and Mr. Cannon explained the engineer failed to heed the signal because he apparently was reading these orders when he passed the block. The orders were found near his body.

Washington, Aug. 7.—Production in many industries of the country has slowed down because of the railway and coal strikes, but the disturbances haven't effected the deeper under currents of returning prosperity and there is a general feeling that early settlements will be reached and that business will continue to increase, it was stated this afternoon by the department of commerce.

In a comprehensive commercial and industrial review for the month of June the department said that recent figures of business movements during the month bear out previous conclusions with regard to the retarding effect of labor difficulties in industry.

REPORTS SPLENDID SALES OF TREASURY CERTIFICATES HERE

Pitt County People Have Purchased \$4,414,086 in Treasury Savings in Six Months

As evidence of returning prosperity, and the accumulation of savings and the willingness and desire of the public to invest surplus funds in a safe and sane manner, Howard T. Cree, director of the government Savings organization of the Fifth Federal Reserve District, has informed the local postmaster that the people of this district have purchased in the first six months of this year treasury savings certificates to the amount of \$4,414,086. This is more than five and one-half times the amount sold during the same period last year, and represents a per capita investment of 48 cents for every man, woman and child in the district.

Distribution of these savings certificates, largely through post offices, among the several states comprising the district is as follows:

Washington, D. C., \$456,000, per capita \$1.14; West Virginia \$1,139,440, per capita \$.92; Virginia \$753,034, per capita \$.36; North Carolina \$729,528, per capita \$.30; Maryland \$172,253, per capita \$.13; South Carolina \$190,477, per capita \$.12.

The United States treasury through the post office department is enlisted in an effort to stimulate regular savings and safe investment on the part of the American people in order to reaccumulate the wealth consumed and destroyed during the war. Post offices throughout the country are offering citizens the facilities of the Postal Savings System for the deposit of funds and Treasury Savings Certificates for the investment of funds, the latter increasing 25 per cent in five years, or 3 1-2 per cent if redeemed prior to maturity.

Secret Service Men and Striker Killed in Fight

Railway Leaders Predict Relief In Strike Issue

Whether the relief will come as result of peace between employees and employers or the government assuming partial direction of fuel transportation has not been disclosed.

All parties have their eyes turned towards Cleveland where a joint conference of miners and operators has convened. It is believed the White House will make important step in the strike late today or after the cabinet meets tomorrow.

Republicans Plan to Pass Tariff In Double Quick Time

ONE ROAD TERM FEATURES COURT DURING MORNING

Willie Stew Sentenced to Six Months on the Road on a Larceny Charge

An unusually light docket faced Judge Louis G. Cooper in today's session of county court and work was completed long before the usual hour. The most important case taken up was that against Willie Stew, colored man of this county charged with larceny. He was sentenced to six months on the county roads at hard work.

Sam short, colored transfer driver of this city, recently indicted on a charge of selling and receiving liquor was found not guilty. The case was sent up from Mayor's court.

Fountain Fletcher, was fined the sum of \$50 and cost on a charge of carrying a concealed weapon.

Sam Dixon, recently arrested on a warrant charging assault with a deadly weapon was found guilty and fined \$25 and costs.

James Byrd, also charged with assault with a deadly weapon, was released upon payment of \$50 and cost of action.

This constituted the majority of important cases heard during the morning, although there were three or four other issues bound over to the next term of superior court.

STRIKE LEADERS IN CAPITAL CITY FOR CONFERENCE

Wait Over Sunday for Negotiations With Harding Proves Uneventful to Everyone

NOTHING DEFINITE SO FAR RECEIVED FROM WHITE HOUSE

Union Leaders Firmly Believe President Will Not Ask for Further Compromises

Washington, Aug. 6.—Leaders of the striking railway shopmen, E. M. Jewell, president of Railway employees department of the American Federation of Labor; W. H. Johnston, president of the Machinists' Association, and J. P. Noonan, chief of the electrical workers' Brotherhood, waited over Sunday in Washington, expecting to resume with president Harding tomorrow the negotiations for strike settlement which were re-opened on Saturday. There was in the mean time, a gathering of general chairman of the strike organizations on several of the eastern railway system, chiefly, Machinists' representatives, who reported on existing conditions, and discussed strike policies with the national leaders.

Nothing was forthcoming from the White House concerning the possible new negotiations which might result between railway executives and President Harding in furtherance of the settlement attempts. In spite of the refusal of the road managements to accept President Harding's request that all strikers be reinstated with full seniority in consideration of a calling off the strike, it is known that paths of communication between the administration and the more prominent heads remain completely open. Union representatives remained firm in the opinion that President Harding would not ask them to compromise further on seniority points; held out the impression that they had gone to the limit excepting his original offer and professed complete ignorance as to what his reconsideration of the problem might develop.

The union leaders expect other unions not on strike to follow up tomorrow the program of making representations to the President concerning the bad condition into which they claim the strike has put railroad rolling stock. This was begun Saturday by legislative agents of three of the train service brotherhood organizations, the engineers, trainmen and firemen and engineers and the intimidation left that while not contemplating actual strike employees in transportation service outside of the shopcrafts might adopt a policy of refusing service, in a semi-organized fashion, on trains or at line points where difficulty and danger in working trains or facilities is claimed to exist because of improper or insufficient shop work.

Order Surcharge to Be In Effect On Georgia Roads

Fifty Cent Increase in Pullman and Parlor Car Fares Ordered Soon It Was Reported Today

(By International News.)

Washington, 7.—Railroads operation in Georgia have been ordered by the Interstate Commerce commission to put into effect on or before September 20th, surcharges amounting to fifty per cent on sleeping and parlor cars and tickets on passengers traveling intrastate to make them conform with surcharges assessed against interstate passengers.

The state should appropriate sufficient funds for combatting the boll weevil menace next season as the situation is serious and deserves attention. The pest has wrought great damage in other sections and this part of the country will suffer as much as any unless effective measures are taken. This can be done without any great outlay of money and the state should see what can be done.

It is to be regretted that disorders should have occurred in the railroad strike in this state. It was hoped the strikers would leave the shops and remain peaceful until the strike had been settled. Killing men because they remain at work is uncalled for and the law should do everything possible to bring the responsible ones to account. The thing is bad enough as it is and it will increase in seriousness unless the men hold themselves in check and refuse to resort to disorder.

The prospects of good prices for cotton and tobacco this season has produced a spirit of elation among the majority of farmers in this section. Indications for success were never brighter and farmer that markets his crop carefully may rest assured prices will be in proportion to cost of production. The loss has been terrific the last two seasons, but with the improvement this year a number of growers should be able to come out at the big end of the horn.

That was an awful crime committed by colored men in the vicinity of Southern Pines last week and Sheriff Blue is to be commended for the splendid way he rushed the men to Raleigh to avoid mob violence. If he had procrastinated two crimes would have been committed instead of one and the state would have to bear the stigma of another lynching, or something equally as serious. Sheriffs in other counties should note the quick and effective way the Sandhill official handled the situation and remember that quickness is a valuable asset in all such situations.

Pitt county farmers who give proper attention to preparing their tobacco for market may be assured of receiving much better prices than those who fail to give this important matter proper attention. Any tobaccoist will tell you that carefully graded tobacco will bring better prices. It has been so in the past and certainly conditions won't be changed to any great extent this season. The farmer should give this matter the consideration which it deserves and be assured of receiving prices in proportion to the cost of production.

Coal operators have submitted an offer of separate peace, but whether this will result in anything to the advantage of either side remains to be seen. The strikers and mine operators should do everything possible to end the tie-up before the winter comes. If they don't the country will be faced by one of the most serious situations in history. The men are losing every day they remain idle, and if they delay much longer circumstances may force them to return to work under conditions not as favorable as at the present time. No time will be better than the present and if they ever intend doing anything it had better be done now.

Pitt county officials are to be commended for the splendid way they are going after violators of the prohibition laws. They have apprehended traffic members under the most unfavorable conditions, even threatened loss of life and it is the duty of the public to back them up in every way possible. While everyone regrets the loss of life occurring during some of the raids, it is gratifying to know the officers have come out unscathed. Capturing members of the traffic is dangerous business, and the officer that braves the darkness of the woods to enforce the life displays a spirit of intrepidity one is

bound to admire. It is up to the law abiding to render every bit of support and cooperation possible, as in this way alone will the country ever be able to free itself of the bad influence of the blackboard and the damnable beverage he manufactures.

Automobile speeding on the hard surfaced roads of the county is becoming one of our greatest annoyances at present time and unless something is done to discourage it the loss of life in the past will be small compared to the future. Traffic cops should be placed on these roads until the speeding has been reduced and the county would find it a paying proposition. Sufficient arrest would be made to pay two or three officers handsome salaries, and the work they would be able to do would be worth several times the price paid them. The situation is really becoming serious and unless some action is taken those with little regard for law and order will make things more accentuated. We hope county authorities will consider this matter at their next meeting and do something to bring about an improvement.

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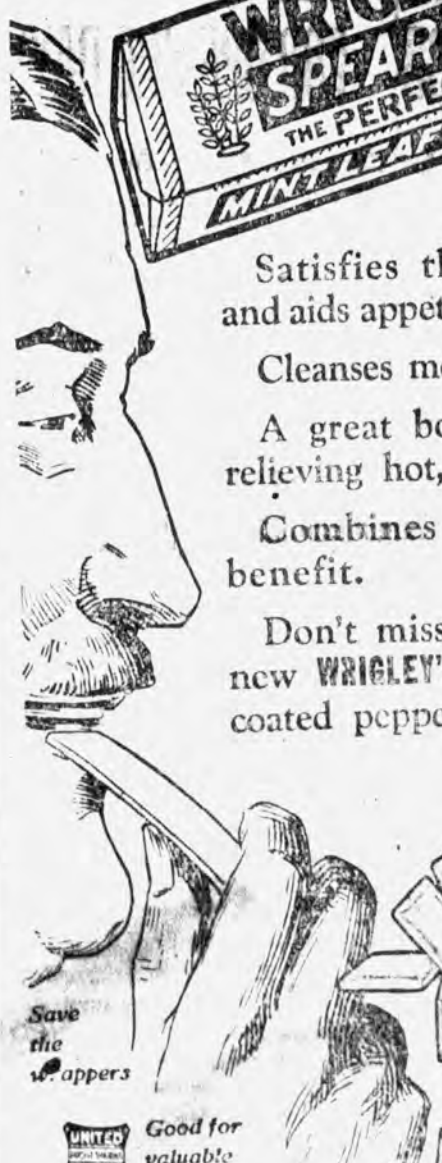

NAME OF LINCOLN IS DEFENDED BY ONE OF LINCOLN'S FRIENDS

Springfield Ill. Aug. Charges made by Miss Mildred Rutherford, of Athens, Ga., against Abraham Lincoln as the instigator of the Civil War, are denied by Henry B. Rankin, eighty-five, Lincoln's biographer, who studied in the Great Emancipator's law office here.

"No man that ever lived was more lied about as to his personal manners and purposes of life than Lincoln," the historian said in discounting the charges. "During the war he went with Seward and met the Confederate Cabinet and challenged them to write whatever conditions of peace they desired, but nothing came of it."

Rankin professed ignorance of the reasons underlying the renewal of the charge at this time.

"However," he said, "it will not damage his memory, because it is a lie."

Rankin is the author of "Personal Recollections of Lincoln." For years he has devoted his time to compiling incidents from the life of Lincoln, seldom stirring from a couch where he is confined by ill health.

RECLAMATION OF ARID LAND URGED BY SENATOR McNARY

Progress of Ogden, Utah, Is Cited as Example of What Can Be Done

By J. BART CAMPBELL, International News Service Staff Correspondent.

Washington, — Ogden, Utah, has 32,804 inhabitants. It is a city of irrigated land. It is a city of prosperity, however, are supported by a much wider irrigated area—2,000,000 acres—of which several smaller cities in the area are situated. But for the irrigation and reclamation of this central territory there would be no Ogden, which the Chamber of Commerce estimates receives and distributes about \$30,000,000 worth of manufactured Eastern products annually.

Senator Charles L. McNary (R.) of Ogden, chairman of the senate irrigation and reclamation of arid land committee, cited Ogden as a splendid example of the beneficial effect of transforming the desert into a land of plenty by the simple use of water.

Senator McNary is the author of a bill authorizing an aggregate appropriation of \$250,000,000 by which the secretary of the interior would be authorized to provide for the reclamation of immense areas of dry, swamp and overflowed land for agricultural purposes in the West and South.

Harding Endorses Bill.

The bill has the endorsement of President Harding and of a large prospective of party affiliations, and Senator McNary, in an effort to secure the early enactment of the legislation proposed, offered it recently as an amendment to the McCarver soldier's bonus bill, which the senate has agreed to act on once the pending tariff bill is out of the way.

The ex-service man is taken care of in the McNary measure by being accorded preferential rights to reclaimed land for homestead site and by being entitled to employment first on whatever irrigation or reclamation projects are undertaken or ordered by the secretary of the interior.

Whether the bill is adopted as a "rider" on the bonus legislation or is taken up by the senate later on as a separate proposition, its ultimate passage is conceded by both Republican and Democratic leaders, who admit that its provisions are bound to prove of incalculable benefit to the West and South.
