BLOCK EFFORT TO GET QUICK ACTION IN SUGAR PROBES

Senator Harrison is Defeated in Effort to Call up Resolution in Senate

UTAH MAN MAKES FIRM DENIAL OF RECENT CHARGES

Smoot Says That Plan to Curtail Sugar Crop Was Made by Cubans Alone

Washington, Aug. 7.—The blocking of efforts to obtain immediate action on the Harrison sugar investigation resolution and an impassioned denial by Senator Smoot, Republican, Utah, that he had proposed in a letter to Major General Crowder, American representative to Cuba to reduction of the duty on sugar in return for the limitation of this year's Cuban sugar crop of 2,500,000 tons, marked Senate considerations today of the sugar schedule of the tariff bill.

Senator Harrison twice sought to call up his resolution, but the first time objection was made by Senator Smoot, who then was waiting to address the Senate, and later by Senator Curtis, of Kansas, the "Republican whip."

When Senator Smoot objected Senator Nicholson, Republican, Colorado, moved to defer action on the sugar schedule until there had been an investigation of what he declared were "serious" charges contained in newspaper clippings read to the Senate Sunday by Senator Harrison. His motion, however, was ruled out of order.

Senator Smoot then proceeded with a detailed review of efforts which had been made, he said, to save the domestic sugar industry from destruction by American sugar refiners and New York bankers, who, he added, were faced with losses with the dropping of sugar prices after they had advanced two cents a pound on the prospective Cuban crop. He asserted that the proposal to limit the Cuban crop had come from Cuba and read a published statement by the President of Cuba, denying that American government officials had proposed a reduction of the crop in return for lower tariff duties. The Harrison resolution proposes, among other things, an inquiry into charges that such proposals had been made.

LOCAL FESTIVAL POSTPONED UNTIL WEDNESDAY NIGHT

Negro Republicans Favor Henry Ford

Newport News, Va., Aug. 7.—Sentiment was overwhelmingly in favor of Henry Ford's candidacy for President of the United States at the meeting yesterday of district chairmen and secretaries of Virginia's "Lily Black" (negro) Republicans at Bay Shore. Final endorsement, however, was deferred until August 12, when a second meeting will be held in Richmond. Believing they have a balance of power in the ninth district for years Republican negroes took steps to enter their own candidate to oppose the "Lily White" and Democratic nominees for the House of Representatives there.

MARKHAM MAKES INSPECTION OF TOBACCO PLANTS

Member Child Welfare Commission Finds Conditions at Redrying Plants Favorable

CHIEF VIOLATIONS ARE CONFINED TO THE TOILET LAWS

Eastern Section of the State Ranks Well With Other Parts of the Country

Mr. D. R. Markham, of the State Child Welfare Commission, spent several hours in the city yesterday in conference with K. T. Futrell, Supt. public welfare. While here a number of the large redrying tobacco plants were inspected in the city and a number of matters under this commission discussed according to a statement by Mr. Futrell.

Mr. Markham stated that the eastern section ranked well with the other sections of the state regarding violations of the Child Labor Law. The Toilet Law, where men and women are employed, was among the violations found here. He spoke of the splendid co-operation on the part of employers to comply with the law in every case found. Anything to raise the moral standard of our employees is beneficial. A strict observance of the Toilet Law for both sanitary and moral reasons was emphasized by Mr. Markham, and he stated this idea was found with the employers.

In one of the eastern counties where eight hundred children were given a physical examination for work certificates, two hundred and fifty five were found defective and unable to work. Many of them had tuberculosis and diabetes. Mr. Markham stated these children, were now being treated and soon would be able to return to usefully and remunerative employment physically able to work. He further stated that the physical examination required of all children seeking employment under the commission was finding thousands in the state a need of medical attention.

Washington, New Bern, Beaufort and other points in the eastern part of the state are to be covered during this month by Mr. Markham in co-operation with the local, Supt. of Public Welfare. He left here early this morning for Washington to spend a day with Mr. Searright, local welfare officer of Beaufort county.

Bishop Kilgo Rallies After Sinking Spell

Charlotte, Aug. 7.—Bishop John C. Kilgo, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, who is critically ill at his home here, rallied late today and his conditions tonight was reported as encouraging. During the evening, at intervals, he recognized members of his family. He was holding his own so well that his physician left him tonight shortly before 10 o'clock after having been in constant attendance at his bedside for many hours.

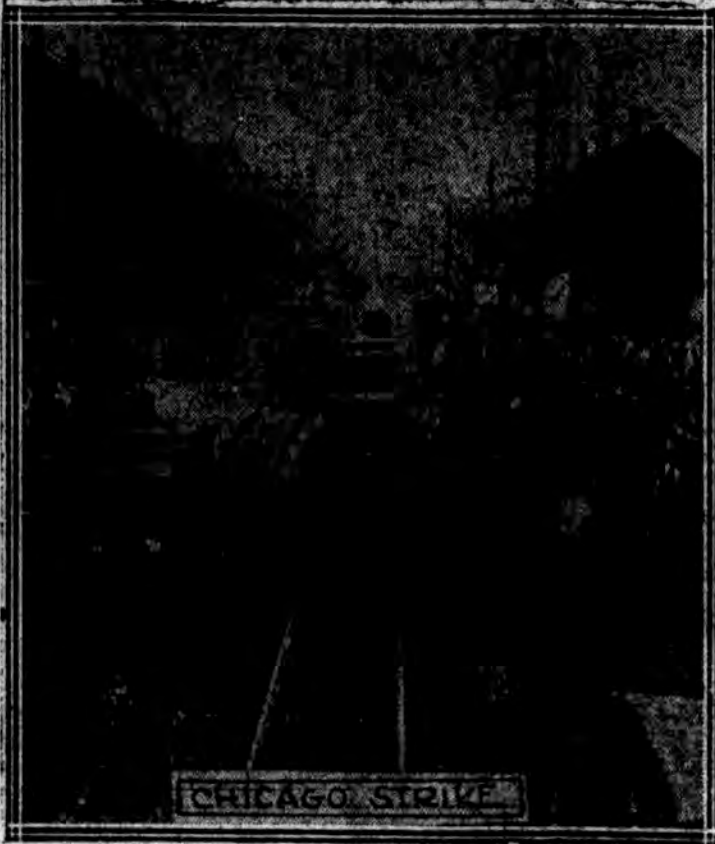
Troops On Duty In Rail Strike Area

No statement was forthcoming as to what progress, if any, was made at today's meeting.

Thursday at 3:30 p. m. the Water Carnival at Amuse Park, will determine who are the champion swimmers of the county. The contests are free for all. Any one who wishes to compete will notify A. B. Corey chairman or Bert Green, captain. This includes any one who resides in Pitt county while Greenville is an inland town, it is to be noted that the capital city who boasts of a life saving corp, second to none, has recognized the efficiency of the local corp. Much credit is due Mr. Corey and Capt. Green, that they have established such a splendid record. The events Thursday are open to any resident of Pitt county already many contestants have registered and by Thursday, most of the best swimmers of the county will be present to show their efficiency. A handsome loving cup and two gold medals are the prizes. Besides the opportunity of winning the championship of the state life saving corp. Pitt county has many expert swimmers and they owe it to themselves and to their county to be on hand Thursday and win first place, to compete with the Raleigh swimmers. This week is Learn to Swim Week at the Park. Each day members of the life saving corp are on duty, to see that every one has a chance to learn. Miss Louisa Hubbard, Red Cross secretary, has made arrangements with the park, that any member of the Junior Red Cross will be entitled to bathing free. All Junior Red Cross members have to do is to state they are members of the Junior Red Cross and bath tickets are issued to them free. All members are requested to bring their own bath suits otherwise they will be charged regular rental prices. In the last three years over two hundred people have learned to swim at Forbes Mill pond and it is to be noted that in ninety years there has been no one drowned. Safety first, is their motto, the life saving corp is there to protect it.

Daniel Lane, of Stantonburg, pastor of the Methodist church, accompanied by about twenty-five Boy Scouts, was in the city a short time yesterday en route to Camp Leach where they will be in annual encampment. Mr. Lane remained in Greenville until all cars containing the Scouts arrived and then proceeded to Washington and from there to Camp Leach.

The Scouts were a happy looking lot and were looking forward to their ten day stay with much pleasure. Stantonburg has a strong camp considering the size of the town and Mr. Lane as Scoutmaster has been able to accomplish a wonderful amount of good work in their behalf.

Mr. Lane is well known in Greenville, having been pastor of the Methodist church at Arden prior to the war. He also spoke at the Teachers college here several times, and is well and favorably known by a large circle of friends.

Farmer Killed When Car Rolls Down Hill

Lenoir, Aug. 7.—Lee Bolick, a prominent farmer of this county, received injuries from which he died two hours later, and his wife received a broken shoulder in an automobile accident, which occurred on the Lenoir-Hickory road 7 miles south of here, last evening. Mr. Bolick with his family had driven to Granite Falls to see a physician. The accident occurred while he was returning home when he attempted to round a curve at a too rapid rate of speed. His skull was fractured. There were three children in the car with Mr. and Mrs. Bolick when the accident occurred. These received only minor injuries or scratches. The car turned over several times down the hill.

A Charlotte physician en route to Blowing Rock in another car was in sight of the car when it was wrecked. He gave first aid and rushed the injured to a Hickory hospital.

BOARD OF TRADE ELECT OFFICERS FOR THIS SEASON

Tobacco Men in Session Last Night Elected A. E. Hobgood President

PLANS FOR OPENING HERE NEXT TUESDAY FULLY CONSIDERED

Triple Sales Will Make it so Third and Fourth Sales Can be Eliminated

The Greenville Tobacco Board of Trade met last night preparatory to the opening of the market here next Tuesday, elected officers for the season and discussed several matters affecting the market at the present time.

Officers elected are: A. E. Hobgood, president; G. V. Smith, vice-president; H. A. Bost, secretary and treasurer.

The meeting was attended by every warehouseman of the city, and it was stated that everything is in splendid condition for the opening of the market next Tuesday. Every house is prepared to give service superior to anything in recent years, and will be ready to serve the farmer in a highly efficient and satisfactory manner.

All big purchasing companies will be represented by three sets of buyers, it was stated, and this will greatly facilitate sales. In fact, blocked sales will be a thing of the past as the three sales will be able to clear the floors of even the heaviest offerings during opening days.

Every house will have either first or second sale throughout the entire season, as triple sales will eliminate third and fourth sales which were necessitated by double sale plan.

It was stated that the market was never prepared to serve such a great number of farmers as at the present time, and it is expected that growers from many other counties will have their offerings here the opening days. The price situation is expected to also be favorable and a very successful season is anticipated.

PRICES CONTINUE RAPID ADVANCE ON SOUTHERN MARKET

Local Tobacconists Return and Report Splendid Increase in South Carolina

NOTHING TO REPORT THAT PRICES HAVE "GONE TO PIECES"

Prices Have Advanced From Eight to Ten Cents Per Pound Since Opening Day

Several local tobacco buyers who have been on the South Carolina markets since the opening day returned to Greenville today and report continued improvement in the price situation. In fact, it is stated that prices have advanced from eight to ten cents per pound since the opening day, which brings the average up to twenty-five and twenty-seven cents.

This gives the lie to rumors circulated in this section that South Carolina markets had gone to pieces since the opening days and shows the situation to be more favorable in many ways. Just how such unfavorable reports got in circulation in this vicinity is not known, but everyone may rest assured that they are false and contrary to conditions actually prevailing in southwestern North Carolina and South Carolina.

Newspaper reports received from the markets contain the most reliable information obtainable and state that prices haven't shown the slightest decline on any single market. The demand for tobacco is so great that the price situation is bound to be favorable and the farmers in this section may rest assured of receiving prices conforming well to those prevailing on the early markets.

Tobacco grown in this section is of a much superior quality to that in South Carolina and as a consequence higher prices very naturally will be in evidence the opening day. While the crop in this section is comparatively smaller than last season the quality is much superior and the farmers have given more attention to grading and handling. These two features should play an important part in prices, it is believed, and they should be in proportion to the cost of production.

CO-OP WAREHOUSES OPEN IN CAROLINA WITH HEAVY SALES

Two Million Pounds Sold at Forty Receiving Places in the State

FARMERS REPORTED GREATLY PLEASED WITH THE PRICES

First Advances on All Grades Ranged From \$15.75 to \$120, Reports Show

Florence, S. C., Aug. 7.—Close to two million pounds of tobacco were handled by the forty receiving points of the Tobacco Growers' Co-operative Marketing Association in the South Carolina belt today and from every Co-operative market came reports of successful operation and satisfaction on the part of the member growers.

Never was there a more orderly opening of tobacco markets than took place today on the warehouse floors of the growers' association throughout South Carolina. With the precision of clock work, the machinery of the big co-operative association moved into action without a hitch and orderly marketing was attained at the first day's trial.

In contrast to the shouts of buyers, the tramping of tobacco the shifting of piles and the hurried inspection of the growers' product, a golden stream moved continuously today from wagons to graders, from graders to weighers and on to the ever accumulating piles of the weed in the storage rooms of the association.

Posted conspicuously in every warehouse were the advance cash payments to be made for each grade, and as the tobacco passed by the weighers' windows, it paid tribute to the growers in the form of checks and participation receipts which were made out according to the weight and grade of tobacco of each grower member.

The careful and thorough grading of each pile as it passed through the hands of experienced graders on every market was the feature that especially enthused the growers and the uniformity of grades and prices on various markets were notable.

Richard R. Patterson, general manager of the leaf department, T. C. Watkins, manager of warehouses for the association, A. R. Bredelove and C. B. Cheatham, of the leaf department, and other officials of the Tobacco Growers' Co-operative Association visited the co-operative warehouses at Lake City, Timmonsville, Kingstree, Darlington and Ocala, personally assisting the graders in their work.

FARMERS AT WHITEVILLE ARE GREATLY PLEASED

Whiteville, Aug. 7.—A great day was registered today for the tobacco growers who have signed up to sell their tobacco on the co-operative plan. The co-operative warehouses were opened in the counties of Robeson, Columbus and Bladen today simultaneously with the South Carolina co-operative markets.

The writer personally made the drive from Fairmont by automobile to Whiteville, through Chadbourne, giving an opportunity to hear expressions of those who had brought tobacco to these several markets. I am quite sure that on no other occasion in my life have I seen such a spirit of delight as at the beginning of this great plan. In fact there was not one man out of hundreds that I came in contact with but who spoke in the highest terms of the system, praising the manner in which the co-operative association had started out. There were scores and then some who came in to sign the contract with their more fortunate brothers who had signed earlier.

Striking shopmen and miners should refrain from disorders as much as possible and show to the outside world that they mean to fight on the square for the principles involved. Disorders as recently reported from other parts of the country doesn't help their cause in the slightest sense of the word. They should lean to the straight and narrow way and do the best they can to come out with clean hands.

The government reports continued increase of sales in government securities, and declares that this is a splendid indication of widespread prosperity, despite both rail and coal strike. While that may be the proper way to look at it, we are inclined to believe the public is purchasing these securities more extensively because they are not taxable. This single feature means a big saving to the persons with a little surplus money and those who invest this way show splendid signs of thrift.

The League of Nations has not stopped at preventing wars. It is the purpose of the organization at this time to reach out and see what can be done in controlling the great epidemics of diseases causing such disorder in other parts of the world. The league is on the right track in this direction and we hope it will continue until something has been accomplished. Such an organization can accomplish more than the prevention of warfare, and the world will be glad to see the influence of the league extended.

While Pitt county farmers may be elated at the prospect of good prices for their tobacco this season they shouldn't forget the importance of proper grading. Everyone knows that tobacco properly handled and graded will demand better prices than that receiving little or no attention and it is to the direct advantage of everyone to grade the best they can. There is something more connected with the production of tobacco than merely growing it and getting it to the market and the farmer that gives these other features proper attention will be the one to come out at the big end of the horn.

The treasury department says prosperity is becoming more widespread in this country and says the outlook for the future is brighter than it has been in years. This is certainly gratifying and we hope the government knows what it is talking about. Conditions are bound to be unsettled while the strikers are in progress, but as soon as these are favorably concluded business should pick up noticeably in all sections. The situation would be as good as desired if it were not for disorders resulting from the strike, but if there is a change for better in the near future everyone will be satisfied.

Everybody should attend the mid-summer festival to be held in Greenville this evening at eight o'clock, under auspices of the Red Cross. This is the first affair of its kind ever held here and should be a great success if the public rallies behind it as it should. The Red Cross is doing wonderful work in this county, but how much greater will its work be if the public gives liberal support. This is a valuable asset in endeavors of all kind and it is up to the appreciative public to assist in all undertaking for civic improvement.

Speeding is as bad in this county at the present time as it has ever been before and unless county authorities do something to better the situation the future will see conditions more accentuated than at the present time. Automobile drivers with no respect for themselves or the law should not be permitted to drive so reckless and the sooner authorities provide sufficient officers to improve the situation the better everyone will like it. The commissioners could provide traffic cops without any great outlay of money. In fact, there would be

many arrests in the course of a month and fines alone would handsomely repay the county. Something must be done or loss of life will be terrific.

The tariff bill may be passed when members of the Republican party get things lined up as they like, but not until then. Tariff is something the country does not need at this time and if it should be defeated the general run of people would be much better off. Opponents should throw every ounce of weight in the final fight and do what they can to bring about defeat.

Henry Ford has received the support of several members of the senate and indications are that he may get the plant at Muscle Shoals after all. That he is capable of transforming the great nitrate plant into one of the greatest industries in the country today is not to be doubted in the least and the sooner he gets charge of the project the better everyone will like it. Ford is one of the greatest business men the country has ever known and if he says he will do a thing it's a safe bet he will do it. He has said he would give employment to a million men at the Shoals and that he will do so cannot be doubted. The senate will do nothing unless should it let Ford win out.

LUMBER FIRM WILL BUILD MODEL TOWN

New Industrial City Planned by Long-Bell Company for Pacific Coast

Kansas City, Mo., Aug.—The laying out of a model industrial city on the Pacific coast, fifty miles from Portland, Ore., is contemplated in the near future, according to an announcement of the Long-Bell Lumber Company, of this city. At this point, near Kelso, Wash., the company has commenced construction of several lumber mills. These mills, it is said, will have a capacity equal to their entire eleven mills operating in the southern pine district.

R. A. Long, president of the company, declared the depletion of pine forests in the southern timber district has been largely responsible for the contemplated transfer of the company's interests to the northern district.

The proposed municipality site lies adjacent to the banks of the Columbia River, and company officials stated it would make an ideal location for their industry.

Nearly 4,000 men—employees of the company—together with their families will emigrate to the northern timber center, and it is expected they will form a nucleus from which a city

having various industries will eventually grow.

"The site was chosen largely because of its advantageous proximity to the Columbia River," Long said.

"We have seven and a quarter miles of water front on the Columbia River and five miles on the Cowlitz River.

"Three trunk-line railroads touch our townsite and heavy freight lines traverse the rivers to the Pacific

Ocean. We will have access to all the markets of the world."

WHITE SLAVE ACT DOES NOT APPLY TO WOMEN

Denver, Aug. 1.—The Mann White Slave law is a one-sided affair, according to interpretation by local agents of the Federal Department of Justice and cannot be invoked in cases where women transport men.

Two girls were held in jail here several hours while Federal agents investigated "white slave" charges.

The girls, according to Russell Byron, head of the department of justice here, declared they had brought two men to the city from Louisville, Ky., in a big touring car. Byron said the girls admitted paying all the expenses of the trip.

The girls were taken into custody

by Federal agents in an alleged "love nest" in this city. The men were also held temporarily.

The party was released after an investigation disclosed that the Federal law does not provide that transportation of men from one state to another by women is illegal.

ARMY OFFICERS URGE STRICT PROHIBITION IN HAWAIIAN ISLAND

(By International News.)
Honolulu, T. H., Aug. 1.—Voicing the belief that illicit liquor is working havoc in the enlisted ranks of the army and navy stationed in Hawaii, Major-General C. P. Summerall, commanding the Hawaiian department, United States Army, and Rear Admiral Edward Simpson, commandant of the Fourteenth Naval District, have appeared before officials of the Anti-Saloon League of Hawaii to plead for stricter enforcement of the prohibition laws.

According to Admiral Simpson, a number of enlisted men of the navy stationed at Pearl Harbor have had to be returned to the mainland for treatment of troubles which are traceable directly to the use of bootleg liquor. Insanity and blindness are mentioned as the most serious results encountered by the naval medical authorities. General Summerall cited similar cases occurring in the ranks of the army and asked that the force of public opinion be brought to bear on those who have charge of prohibition enforcement.

Governor W. R. Farrington spoke in behalf of the Territory, pleading

support of the government in the fight of the government in the fight to wipe out the illicit liquor traffic in the islands. He stated that, in his opinion, this traffic is steadily on the decrease.

POPE'S COOK, FOUND TO BE CROOKED, DISCHARGED

Milan, Aug. 1.—Pope Pius XI has dismissed his cook, according to a report here.

The Pope, it is reported, in examining his accounts, discovered that the cook charged him twice for the same chicken and the dismissal followed.

Carryings On of the American Legion

The Literary Digest in its balloting on the Soldiers' Bonus, asks the question: "Do you favor a Federal bonus for all American Soldiers and Sailors who wore the uniform during the World War?" This is quite an unfair question to ask the former service men of the United States, for as a matter of fact none of us favor a bonus for the man who holds a dishonorable discharge from service. What the Legion desires is Adjusted compensation, not a bonus. This adjusted compensation is desired for men who served sixty days or more, and for men who were honorably discharged. Why should a man be recompensed for dishonesty or dishonorableness—should a premium be placed on unfaithfulness to one's country? The answer is "No." To ask such a question as the Literary Digest has asked is as the American Legion Weekly puts it, the same as asking a man "Are you still beating your wife?" Neither question is answerable by a straight yes or no by an honorable man. Consequently the ballot is hard to answer, and the presumption is that a good many are not answering it, but letting it go unnoticed as it so well deserves unless some qualification is attached to it.

There is no reason to believe that the Literary Digest has an ulterior motive in asking such question or that it is a machine for propaganda, but rather that it is a blunder made in all sincerity. Nevertheless the blunder is not diminished or made less deplorable.

The total vote on the bonus as recorded by the Literary Digest in its issue of July 22nd, 1922, showed for 102,978, against 102,270.

The Greenville Post of the American Legion has reached a seeming standstill regarding membership. Not an increase since last week. The Post here should have a membership of at least 300, and there is a potential strength far greater than that. Why can't all these former service men be brought within the fold? Simply because we do not go after them with sufficient persuasion. The call is for every member or man to get on the job and solicit, membership from reveille to taps continuously and hard. Don't let us just because a fellow once says no, but look him up next day and talk to him again, after awhile he will begin to realize what the Legion means to him and all the rest of our former service men. 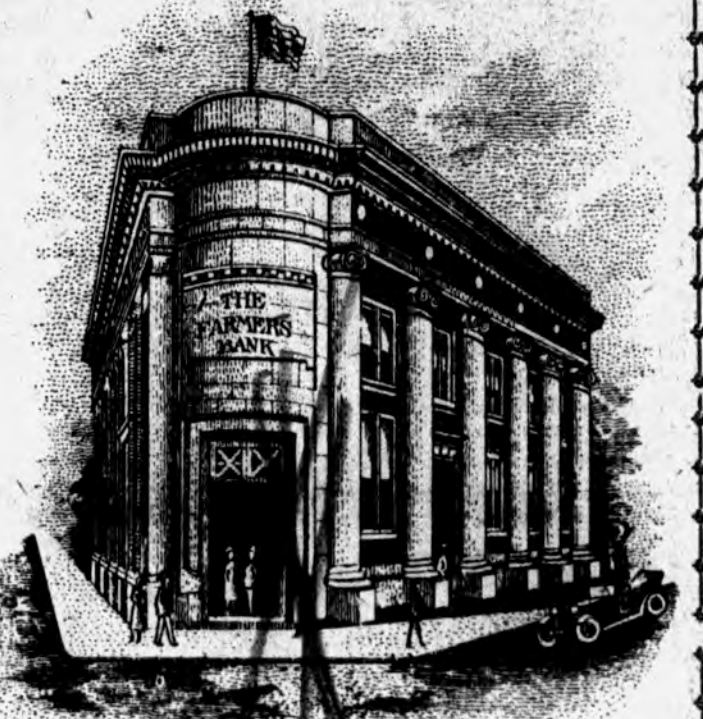
patrol and asked me to get in. He smiled and I just couldn't turn him down. Here I am."

Boehling Hurls Sox to 5 to 4 Victory Over Highwaymen in Well Played Game

With Boehling hurling a superb brand of ball the Blue Sox were enabled to take the fourth game from the Kinston Highwaymen by the score of 5 to 4. The game was comparatively fast in every frame, and Greenville played airtight ball until the eighth inning when Boehling "let up" and the Bandits sent their first three runners to the checking station. A wild throw and error combined featured in the Bandits' success at this juncture. They also scored one run in the ninth inning.

One of the principal features of the day for Greenville was Frazier's home run with no men on. Out of four trips to the plate "Monk" secured a total of four safeties, none of which were for extra bases with exception of the home run clout. Smith also featured with the willow for the locals, securing two hits and a similar number of free passes to first. Stringfield secured two hits out of four trips to the rubber.

Evans, the young hurler who has had more or less success with the Bandits, appeared on the mound, and while he hurled creditably, the Sox found his delivery for a total of ten hits, the majority of which were easily well bunched that they were easily converted into runs. The rally with the willow began in the very first inning when the first three runners of the game were shoved across the plate. Another tally was added in the third and one in the sixth but after that time Evans settled down and positively declined to yield anything in the way of a run.

It looked as though Joe Boehling, former American league hurler, would have a perfect day, but in the eighth frame he slowed down in his rapid pace and permitted the Bandits to hit a few. The visitors immediately took advantage of the situation and sent three runners over the rubber. Boehling didn't figure on the error and wild throw of his teammates, but after giving the Bandits one in the ninth he slowed down and retired the side when it looked to Bandit followers as if they had excellent chances of coming out victorious.

Greenville had a total of two earned runs and Kinston only one. Sweeney, Leftwich, Evans and Koval did the principal work with the willow for the Bandits, Koval being credited with a triple and Evans a double. The strikeouts for either pitcher was not as large as usual Boehling being credited with four and Evans three.
