Former History Teacher of
Raleigh High School Succeeds T. J. Sache

**GOOD TEACHERS
TO BE IN CHARGE
OF OTHER STUDIES**

**Faculty This Year Will be
Most Efficient in Many Years
It Is Believed**

Mr. Victor Davis of Tennessee, succeeded Mr. Sache as principal of the High School. Mr. Sache has gone to Columbia University to finish his work on his Master's Degree. Mr. Davis the new principal is a graduate of the East Tennessee Normal School, and also of the University of Tennessee. He has taught five years and has had about two years of military service. This summer he is at the University of Chicago working for his master's degree which he will obtain next summer. During the past year he taught history in the Raleigh High School, and also had charge of all student activities. He made a great success of his work there. He has also taken a very active interest in Boy Scout work. Last year he was scoutmaster of one of the Raleigh troops. He will be of great assistance to Boy Scout Executive Rose in carrying forward this worth while work in Greenville. He and Mrs. Davis will reach Greenville September 4, and will reside at the Vines House.

Miss Louise Wilkinson, Math teacher in the high school is an honor graduate of Salem College, taking highest honors in mathematics. She has taught very successfully in the Rocky Mount high school. Her father is chairman of the board of trustees of the Rocky Mount schools.

Miss Stella Rutherford, Latin and French, teacher in the high school has taught for the past three years in the Smithfield public schools and there made an enviable reputation. She has studied at University of Chicago, and this summer along with Miss Wilkinson, Miss Cousin and Miss Pugh was a student at the University of California.

Miss Doris Overton of this city is a graduate of Trinity College, graduating with honors, and taking high honors in her chosen subject, English. For the past two years she has had charge of the English in the Bethel high school. She will teach English this year in all the sixth and seventh grades where departmental work is done.

PITT CONTINUES TO LEAD IN SALE OF LEAF TOBACCO

**County Again Outclasses All
Others in Production of the
Bright Leaf Tobacco**

In a preliminary notice regarding the American tobacco industry for 1921 the Department of Commerce today stated that the leading county in the production of tobacco in the state of North Carolina is Pitt county.

On a basis of revenue collected on tobacco products North Carolina leads all the states in the union in the amount, this being \$79,570,000, out of a total of \$354,035,000. New York stands second on the list with revenue collected in that state of \$44,199,000, something above half the amount collected in North Carolina.

Phillip August Is Killed in Accident

Norfolk, Va., Aug. 8.—Crossing car tracks at Ocean View today, Phillip August, aged about 65 years, of Richmond, was struck and fatally injured by a car of the Virginia Railway and Power Company. Mr. August was taken to a hospital, where he died.

Hold Annual Fair In Hamilton County

Cincinnati, Aug.—Preparations are being made to make the sixty-second annual Carriage Fair here from August 9 to 12 the biggest in the history of Hamilton county. Three new horse barns have been contracted for which will house one hundred trotting and pacing horses, and all the old buildings at the fair grounds are being repainted.

Says Independents Handle Most 'Gas'

Washington, Aug. 8.—About half of the gasoline business in hand by the independent oil companies and about half by the Standard group of companies, R. L. Welch, secretary of the American Petroleum Institute, testified today in the Senate inquiry into gasoline prices.

"The independents have gradually and constantly taken a larger ratio of the business," said Mr. Welch, and added that of a total of 479 refining plants in the United States only 38 belonged to Standard group.

Long Says He Will Not File Contest

St. Louis, Aug. 8.—Breckinridge Long, defeated by Senator James A. Reed for the Democratic senatorial nomination at last Tuesday's primary, today issued a statement saying he will neither ask for a recount nor file a contest.

Declaring he still considered himself the choice of the Democrats of Missouri for the senatorial term, the former Third assistant secretary of State declared between 40,000 and 50,000 Republicans voted in the Democratic primary, but "owing to a defective primary law there is no legal remedy." Reed's plurality was approximately 6,425.

The Atlantic Coast Realty Company is enjoying splendid business at the present time, having last week sold over \$100,000 worth of building lots in Asheville, Greensboro, Burlington and Roanoke, Va., and are getting their old force together again preparing for a big fall business.

Started Tune While Successor Prayed

Winchester, Va., Aug. 8.—Because the Rev. J. H. Hawkins, deposed pastor of a negro church here, "started up a tune while his successor, the Rev. C. E. Larkin, was praying, and then called a woman member of the flock 'Jezebel' when she remonstrated with him," according to testimony of witnesses, Pastor Hawkins was fined \$25 and put under a peace bond on a charge of disturbing church services.

GOVERNMENT MAY TRY LEGISLATION IN STRIKE ISSUE

**Harding Asks House to Set in
Continuous Session to Cop
With Situation**

UNION CHIEFS GET TO GATHER TO FRAME REPLY TO PROPOSAL

**Separate Conferences of Heads
Fail to Result in Anything
Favorable**

Washington, Aug. 8.—President Harding has asked congressional leaders, in view of the menacing industrial situation arising from coal and rail strikes, to hold the House, now in recess, continuously in session along with the Senate after the House reconvenes next Tuesday.

The prospect was that failing to settle the labor controversies, the administration might call for legislation to enable the government to cope with conditions which thus far have failed to react favorably to efforts on the part of the executive.

Meanwhile, leaders of all unions in the transportation field began to gather in Washington for a conference to determine the response which shall be made to President Harding's latest offer of a settlement basis for the seven railroad unions now on strike and to determine as well, according to statements of those who will participate, joint or co-operative action the labor forces shall take in case the President's offer is rejected.

B. M. Jewell, chairman of the group officers of the striking unions, declared that he had received hundreds of telegrams today from locals of the shop crafts, "telling us to reject the President's offer; and not a single one asking its acceptance."

Separate conferences between the Southern Railway officials and representatives of the striking shopmen on its lines, broke up finally today, when the men declared that only a national settlement of the strike could be accepted by them, even though the railroad conceded seniority rights to returning strikers. Fairfax Harrison later issued a general notice to all its employees that the company considered it "had more than fulfilled its obligations to its striking employees," and that its duty was now to provide unimpaired transportation service. "This we will perform," Mr. Harrison declared.

Bishop Kilgo Reported To Be Resting Quietly

Charlotte, Aug. 8.—Bishop John C. Kilgo, whose condition for the past 36 hours has been regarded by members of the family and physicians as precarious, was said this morning to be resting comparatively quietly.

YEGGS BLOW TWO SAFES AT STORES IN BELL ARTHUR

**Only About Seventy-five Dol-
lars Secured at Both Places,
However**

According to information received over telephone from Bell Arthur this afternoon yeggmen entered the stores of Nichols and Hemby early this morning, blew two safes and made their escape after securing about \$75 and several notes and checks.

While authorities had obtained no information regarding the identity of the robbers late today, it is believed they will be apprehended within the next several hours. They were tracked on the Wilson road a short distance outside of Arthur and police believe they went directly to Wilson after leaving Arthur.

It is believed the yeggs were after money entirely as an investigation of the stock of goods in both stores failed to show anything else missing. This is the first robbery that has occurred in the section in several weeks and citizens of Arthur were surprised when they awoke this morning and discovered that the safes had been entered.

ON SLOW SHOOTING RESULTS IN TENSE SITUATION TODAY

**Negro Removed to Hanover
County Jail After Shooting
Rural Mail Carrier**

MOB VIOLENCE IS FEARED BY THOSE IN CHARGE TODAY

**Flat Denial of Any Lynching
is Made by Citizens in
Swansboro Section**

Wilmington, Aug. 8.—George Williams, Frank Dove and Fred Dove, three negroes held for the shooting of Cyrus Long, Swansboro mail carrier, have been placed in the New Hanover county jail here for safe keeping. The negroes were brought to Wilmington early today from Jacksonville, mob violence being feared.

Sheriff George C. Jackson at first declined to admit the negroes were here, but Jailer John H. Davis late this afternoon announced that all three were held here.

Great excitement prevailed in Onslow county today as the result of the probably fatal attack upon Cyrus Jones, rural mail carrier, by a party of negroes late Saturday night and a serious clash between the races is feared, according to information reaching New Bern from Swansboro.

A man arriving in New Bern from Onslow county today declared that a mob of fifty men seized Bayner Blackwell, negro lodge leader at Swansboro, Sunday night, carried him to a woods and riddled his body with bullets. Onslow county authorities say their information is that the negro was run out of the county, but was not shot. Swansboro is being guarded by armed white men because of reports that negroes plan an attack upon the town.

Four negroes arrested in connection with the attack upon Jones were quietly removed from the Jacksonville jail last night to an unannounced destination when reports reached the authorities that a mob was forming for the purpose of lynching them.

Jones, who is said to have had some words with some negroes about riding them in his automobile about a month ago, was attacked and severely beaten by a party of negroes Saturday afternoon. He managed to drive his car to Swansboro and give the officers the names of the attacking party and the four negroes were arrested. One of the negroes is alleged to have confessed to the officers, implicating Blackwell as the instigator of the attack on Jones.

NEGRO SENTENCED TO THE ROAD ON VAGRANCY CHARGE

**Four Other Cases Given Con-
sideration Before Mayor D.
M. Clark Today**

Jarvis and Daisy Parker, colored people of this city appeared before Mayor D. M. Clark in this morning's session of police court on a charge of assault. Daisy was released upon payment of \$5 and cost of action while her husband was only required to pay cost.

The most important case taken up for consideration, however, was that against George Smith, charged with vagrancy. After hearing all the evidence produced by the police Mayor Clark sentenced the defendant to 30 days on the roads.

L. C. Skinner, charged with parking an automobile on paved street over night, was released upon payment of cost.

Now that opening of the tobacco
market draws nearer the farmer
should make it his business to care-
fully prepare his tobacco for the
opening. This is a feature that
hasn't been given proper attention in
the past and unless the planter look
after his own interest he can't ex-
pect anyone else to.

With both cotton and tobacco sell-
ing good this year the farmer should
be able to come out of the hole caused
by deflation last season. The fu-
ture was never brighter and by pro-
per application of thrift everyone
should be able to come out at the
big end of the hole with colors fly-
ing. The thing to do is to take every-
thing calmly, forgetting hard times
talk, and rest assured everything
will come out to the advantage of
everyone.

The return of members of the Pitt
county chamber of commerce from
the inspection trip through Georgia
and other southern states will be
received with interest here. The ex-
perience the Pitt countians will derive
from their trip should be of advan-
tage to them in the future, especially
where farming is concerned. Every
state is more or less interested in di-
versified farming such as Georgia is
trying out this year and members of
the chamber of commerce should get
some mighty fine ideas.

The Reflector is striving to give
its readers the best service possible
in the way of local news, but this
cannot be done unless the public co-
operates as it should. There are
many small items of news readers
may know, but which would never
reach us unless they told us; so why
not get busy and let us have the little
things. We want to print every bit
of the news happening in Pitt county,
but this is a mighty big job even with
the most perfect organization. If
you know of anything, why not call

can give more news in this way and
everyone will be benefited.

State or federal control of rail-
roads is the only way to relieve the
serious situation confronting the
country at the present time if the
miners fail to return to work in the
near future, and some action of the
kind should be taken immediately.
The miners so far have shown no
disposition of returning to work. The
operators have shown no inclination
of coming to terms, and the winter
will be serious indeed unless some-
thing is done to bring about a change.
The government should not wait un-
til the last minute and then endeavor
to relieve the situation. It will
be too serious then and it is advisa-
ble to act now while relief is pos-
sible.

Pitt county commissioners should
not forget the importance of placing
traffic officers on the hard surfaced
roads of the county before the death
toll becomes greater than it is. This
danger, however, is small compared
to railroad crossings, and there are
many in this immediate vicinity where
lives of automobile parties are con-
stantly in jeopardy. It is to be hoped
some action will be taken to relieve
the situation and cause the public
to feel perfectly safe in passing over
railroad crossings and while riding
over the hard surfaced roads.

The strike has resulted in serious
interruption of mail and train service
in some parts of the country, but the
postoffice department is largely over-
coming this situation by the use of au-
tomobile trucks. In a few years
from now when good roads have been
completed strikes will not be as seri-
ous as the present as trucks can be
placed in immediate service and in-
dustry will continue as if nothing had
happened. The public will be glad
to see this great day come, as men
will not be so self-reliant and ob-
stinate and will stick to their jobs
under conditions certainly worse
than at the present. The govern-
ment should do everything possible
to keep its service normal and this

the strike to one of their objects.

NOTHING TO IT

Report in circulation here regard-
ing low prices on the tobacco mar-
kets in South Carolina are without

months and indications for a pro-
sperous season were never brighter.
How such erroneous reports got in
circulation cannot be determined, but
people with good sound commonsense

spread gossip from one part of the
town to another and they are in-
variably always in the wrong. They
have little regard for truth; in fact,
they don't care about it. All they
want to do is to get the report go-
ing and watch it as it passes from
tongue to tongue.

The prospects for a successful
season in tobacco producing sections
are brighter than they have been in
seasons and if the farmer markets
his crop properly conditions are bound
to be all right. Let's look forward
to the future hopefully, giving cre-
dence to nothing but the truth, and
rest assured that things will come out
all right.

Paris Has Hospital
for Crazy Prisoners

Paris, Aug.—A dispensary and hos-
pital for the criminally insane who
might otherwise serve jail sentences
or be committed to insane asylums
has been established in Paris.

This institution, established under
municipal control in the Sainte Anne
Asylum, is to be known as the "Service
of Mental Prophylaxis." Its founda-
tion is directly due to agitation for
preventive measures against the ever-
increasing crime wave, of which, for
France, Paris is the center.

"The mental hygiene dispensary is
being planned along the same lines as
tuberculosis dispensaries," one of the
specialists in neurosis in charge of
the institution told a visitor. "We
give nature a chance to do most of
the healing. When we believe a pa-
tient has improved sufficiently we get
his job. We continue surveillance, however, and at the least sign of a re-
lapse into a mental condition danger-
ous to society we bring him back
here."

CLOSE CONTEST IN
KANSAS INDICATED

Topeka, Kansas, Aug. 1.—Early
newspaper returns in today's state-
wide primary from scattered parts of
the state indicate a close race for the
Republican nomination for governor.
Returns from forty out of 2,536
precincts show: W. R. Stubbs, 1-
170; W. Y. Morgan, 1,058; F. W.
Knapp 688; P. A. McNeal, 617; W.
P. Lamberston, 381. The early vote
for the two women gubernatorial
candidates, Mrs. W. D. Mowery and
Mrs. Helen Pettigrew, was almost ne-
gligible. Knapp was endorsed by the
liber unions because of his opposition
to the Kansas Industrial court.
Returns on the Democratic guber-
natorial contest are very meager, but
show J. M. Davis leading Henderson
Martin, former vice-Governor of the

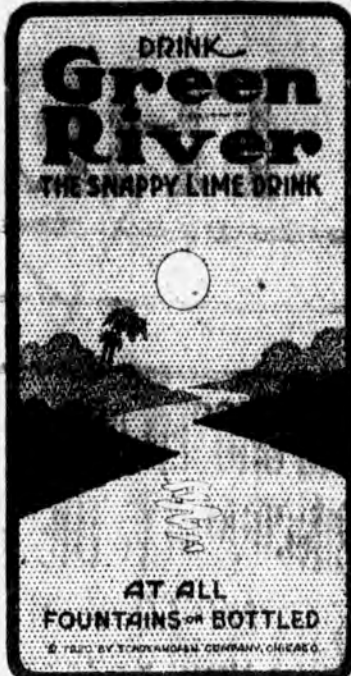
