ORDER MEN NOT OUT ON STRIKE TO STAY OFF JOBS

Officials of Unions Order Men Whose Lives Are Endangered to Protect Themselves

BROTHERHOOD MEN AT JOIET ILL., REFUSE TO DO REGULAR WORK

Heads of Striking Railway Workers Mark Time at Washington Conference

Cleveland, Aug. 9.—Rail brotherhood chiefs here today practically served notice that their members might decide for themselves whether objectionable working conditions at railroad terminals in connection with the strike of shopmen justify their remaining away from their jobs.

"We are not going to have our men shot up or beaten up or threatened by armed guards at railroad shops and yards," Warren S. Stone, president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers said, when told that several hundred members of the "Big Four" brotherhoods had gone on strike at Joliet, Ill., last night.

"When the men cannot go to work without having irresponsible armed guards endangering their lives, they may go home and stay there until the condition is removed," he said.

"There will be one hundred more similar cases soon if conditions are not changed," he added.

Asked if the walkout at Joliet met with the approval of the brotherhood chiefs, Mr. Stone said:

"The action does not require any approval. Our men are not expected to work under such conditions as now prevail at many railroad terminals. I am telling them that wherever their lives are endangered by guards, they should go home and stay there."

Brotherhood engineers have already been notified that they may refuse to take out locomotives in defective condition but have been cautioned not to be "too technical."

The three railroad brotherhoods with headquarters here have telegraphed their representatives at Joliet, backing up the refusal of 1,300 engineers, firemen, trainmen and conductors and switchmen of the Elgin, Joliet and Eastern Railroad to return to work while state troops are on guard.

T. C. Cashen, president of the Switchmen's Union of North America, with headquarters in Buffalo, has wired local chiefs concurring in the action of the other three brotherhoods.

Illinois Miners Ready to Return to Former Jobs

Will Join Conference Tonight in An Effort to End the Great Labor Tieup

Cleveland, Aug. 10.—Undeterred by failure of a majority of operators in Indiana and western Pennsylvania, all Illinois operators will join in a conference to end the coal strike. Miners and operators of the central competitive field are expected late this afternoon and will begin writing a new scale to permit immediate resumption of coal mining by union mines.

Congress to Back Harding in Plans to Seize Railway

Opposition to Measure Has Given Away Almost Completely, Leaders Believe

MRS. D. E. TAYLOR HIT BY STREET CAR AT NORFOLK, VA.

Greenville Woman Sustains Painful Injuries While Crossing Granby Street

Norfolk, Aug. 10.—Mrs. D. E. Taylor, 424 Warren Crescent, was severely injured at 10:10 o'clock last night when she was knocked down by a one-man trolley car at the intersection of Granby and Freemason streets. Her left shoulder was dislocated, several ribs on the left side broken, and she sustained bruises on the forehead and left elbow.

Mrs. Taylor, according to witnesses who were later interviewed by Pittman A. D. Cooper, was in the act of crossing from the west to the east side of Granby street, when she was struck by the trolley car, which was bound south in Granby street. The injured woman was taken to a room in the Hotel Southland, where first aid treatment was given by Dr. E. W. Phillips, who had witnessed the accident. Later she was taken to St. Vincent's Hospital.

E. S. Bonney, motorman of the street car, was placed under arrest by Patrolman A. D. Cooper on a technical charge of assault with a trolley car.

Note—Mrs. Taylor was formerly Miss Gertrude Critcher of Greenville, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. H. Critcher. A report received here today stated that Mrs. Taylor's condition was not serious following an X-ray examination.

CORONER'S JURY RETURNS DECISION IN WOMAN'S DEATH

Declares Helen Wooten Came to Death As Result of Premature Child Birth

Coroner S. G. Wilkerson yesterday afternoon conducted a post mortem examination over the body of Helen Wooten, daughter of Pearl Wooten, colored resident of this city, to determine whether or not she came to her death as result of criminal abortion and to indict those responsible. After a long drawn out hearing, filled with examination of a number of witnesses, the jury returned its decision without implicating any particular person.

The verdict of the jury was that the woman came to her death as result of complications produced by premature birth. The investigation resulted from rumors circulated by persons in the neighborhood of the Wootens, but none of these were found to be true. The body of the dead woman was viewed by prominent physicians during the post-mortem examination and while they found indications of premature birth, the evidence of witnesses was not sufficient to bring about the indictment of anyone suspected of having connection with the case.

RAILWAY FORCES AT ROCKY MOUNT NEARLY NORMAL

Large Shops at Waycross Also Have Enough Men to Take Care of Equipment

In the two largest shops at Rocky Mount, N. C., and Waycross, Ga., the roundhouse forces are respectively 63 per cent and 82 per cent normal. These are the forces that take care of engines which run passenger and freight trains and the yard engines engaged in switching. The so-called "Back Shop" forces at Rocky Mount and Waycross, where a large number of men are normally employed, are being recruited rapidly. These forces are assigned to heavy repair work consisting of general overhauling of engines after they have been in service for a considerable length of time.

When the strike took place on July 1st, this company had on hand more than the usual number of engines which had been completely overhauled and with its purchase of new locomotives within the last two years, is in position to defer if necessary, heavy repairs to locomotives for several months without affecting in the least the handling of current business but as our forces are being steadily increased, progress in the matter of heavy repairs can be made and is being made rapidly. Forces at all points and in all grades of work will be normal within a very short time.

STATE WILL USE TONS OF QUININE AGAINST MOSQUITO

Will Give Up Efforts to Eliminate Pest by Drainage and Oiling Waters

TO BEGIN QUININE WORK IN 20 PARTS OF STATE IN 1923

Exhaustive Investigation to be Made Prior to Opening of Campaign

Raleigh, Aug. 9.—Draining swamps, oiling stagnant waters and stocking lakes with mosquito-eating minnows is too costly and too ineffective a means of controlling malaria in eastern North Carolina and next year the State Board of Health is planning to invade twenty counties in that section of the State with ten tons of quinine and let the mosquitoes do the worst.

Five grains of quinine every day for every man, woman and child in the infected districts, whether infected or not, and from ten to thirty grains for those who are infected will drive out the disease in two years, and raise the standard of health in that section from 30 to 85 per cent in the opinion of State Health Officer W. S. Rankin.

Plans for the work have been worked out on the basis of experiments made by the board covering a period of several years, under the direct supervision of Dr. H. A. Taylor, of the International Health Board. No other means has proved effective, and cannot prove effective until every mosquito has been killed in a low-lying territory covering approximately 15,000 square miles.

Drainage of that much territory, much of it under water for many months in the year, and the extermination of the mosquito would bankrupt the State government, in the opinion of health authorities. The only other means of control is in killing the last malarial infection, and let the mosquito live unmolested. The work, covering a five-year period, will cost approximately \$250,000.

Under the plans worked out by Dr. Rankin, a staff of medical officers will be sent into a county, and a careful examination will be made of every citizen in the county. Blood tests will be made to determine if there is any malarial infection. Educational work will be undertaken to secure the co-operation of the entire citizenship.

MEDICAL SOCIETY ENJOYS DINNER AT AMUZU PARK

Dr. W. S. Rankin, of Raleigh, Principal Speaker at Barbecue and Brunswick Ctew

ILLINOIS MINNERS GIVEN CHANCE TO JOIN CONFERENCE

Miners and Operators at Cleveland Delay Action in Joint Meeting

MINE LEADERS MAKE DECISION REGARDING ADDITIONAL CONTRACT

Union Policy Committee to Finally Pass on Prospective Settlement

Cleveland, Ohio, Aug. 9.—For a second time the joint interstate conference of coal miners and operators delayed action today to permit the hold-out Illinois operators to decide whether they would participate in negotiations that may end the soft coal strike. Adjustment was taken until tomorrow, though virtual decision had been made by the union leaders to negotiate a contract with the operators already enrolled in the conference and who control only part of the coal production of the central competitive field.

As a forerunner to the conference session tomorrow afternoon, the union policy committee will meet in the morning to pass finally on the question of prospective settlement which would affect most Ohio mines, also scattered ones in western Pennsylvania, Indiana and Illinois, these four states forming the Central competitive field. The committee also expects to consider extension of the central field to other parts of Pennsylvania and West Virginia.

Sentiment favoring a settlement with the operators here seemed predominant among the committee members, and was regarded as forecasting approval of the union leaders' decision, which became known after President John L. Lewis, of the miners, had received assurance from operators in states outside the Central Competitive Field of their willingness to negotiate contracts on the basis made for that field.

Only a short session marked the conference today, adjournment being followed with the announcement that the delay to permit "certain important operating interests" to decide whether they would join in the negotiations. Word had not been received at that time of the decision of the Illinois Operators' Association in refusing to participate unless the union accedes to arbitration. Mr. Lewis had informed the Illinois operators that he would not agree to their demand for arbitration.

Assassians of Marshal Wilson Die On Gallows

Reginald Dunn and Joseph O'Sullivan Die As People Pray in Streets of London

London, Aug. 10.—Reginald Dunn and Joseph O'Sullivan, assassians of Field Marshal Wilson were hanged today. Crowds prayed in the streets all night long and a general spirit of excitement prevailed throughout the morning. The men faced death calmly and went to their fate without a murmur.

Sunday School Teacher Held In Liquor Case

Knoxville Man Arrested for Having Two Stills in His Possession

Knoxville, Tenn., Aug. 10.—Frank Smith, Sunday school teacher, and former president of the Sullivan county Sunday school association, was arrested here today in connection with the seizure of two stills near Bristol, according to federal agents. The raid is the beginning of a campaign to destroy moonshining in the Big Creek section where it is said more liquor is made than any other section in the south.

GARVAN DEMANDS HARDING CLEAR HIM

Writes to President That He Has Been Grossly Misled by Daugherty.

New York.—Flatly refusing to return to the United States government a single chemical patent right owned by the Chemical Foundation, Inc., of which he is president, Francis P. Garvan, in a spirited and energetic letter to President Harding, asserted that the President, "grossly misled by the attorney-general," is, for the first time in American history, attempting to abrogate a solemn Executive order of a predecessor, and is acting, moreover, on information "furnished by German agents and interpreted by lawyers whose sole knowledge of the war and its lessons is derived from association with German clients."

Absolute legality in the sale of 4,700 and odd former German patents to the Foundation, and complete publicity in the organization and operation of this quasi-public institution, together with the highest of ethical motives, are earnestly maintained by Mr. Garvan in his communication, and he asserts with emphasis that no person connected with the Foundation has ever made a dollar out of it, or ever could do so under its charter and by-laws, himself least of all; he fortifies that statement with figures which show that the capital of the institution consisted of \$428,900, all of which has been spent in the purchase of the patents and in educating the people through schools and colleges and in the encouragement of chemical societies, and says that the Foundation income from licenses barely meets the modest running expenses.

All of these financial details have long been available, Mr. Garvan reminds President Harding, and demands that the President ascertain the truth and tell the people whether the Foundation and its head have deserved the abuse they have received.

"Gave All and Got Abuse"
"It has given its all," Mr. Garvan writes, "You can take away nothing but the opportunity of service. It was all we got from the government. It is all we have."

"Mr. President, you have had the temerity to impugn the honor of the gentlemen who bore a part in the great work of building up or preserving the possibility of progress in organic chemistry for America. You have again been misinformed as to the nature of the trust we bore. That trust was not for the German Kartel, the owner of practically all the important patents, who had received them under the unthinking graciousness of laws they had induced. That trust was for the American people, their industrial independence and for the safety and health of their children and their children's children."

At the outset of his letter Mr. Garvan states that he has forwarded to the Alien Property Custodian the Chemical Foundation's formal answer to his demand, an answer "as an American corporation ready at all times to defend its rights in the courts," but that the public in whose interests the Foundation was organized, is entitled to be fully informed as to the circumstances under which the demand was made and the reason why it is unqualifiedly refused. The demand itself, Mr. Garvan asserts, together with the letter written by the President and the statement made by Attorney-General Daugherty, "demonstrate that you, Mr. President, have been grossly misled by the attorney-general, both as to the law and the facts of the case."

Eliminating "Enemy Interest"

Thereupon Mr. Garvan contends (1) that the attorney-general has listened exclusively to German agents, which is no investigation; (2) that the United States government has no interest in the sale brought by the Foundation to determine the ownership of funds held by the treasury; (3) that when President Wilson authorized the sale of the German patents, neither the President, secretary of state nor alien property custodian was, under the law, in the remotest sense a trustee for the German enemies; (4) that specific power to sell the patents was granted by Congress after full committee hearings on November 4, 1918, and on December 3, 1919. President Wilson, vested with power to supervise all sales, authorized Acting Secretary of State Frank L. Pick to approve the sale of the German chemical and other patents; (5) that on February 26, 1919, Pick ordered the sale in the public interest, noting that a public sale was not in the best interests of the public because it would offer opportunity for the patents to get into the hands of speculators and monopolists, and that the Chemical Foundation, obligated to grant non-exclusive licenses, was the best means for "eliminating alien interests hostile to American industries and of the advancement of chemical and allied industries in the United States;" (6) that President Wilson, returning from abroad, confirmed Pick's order on February 13, 1920, with this comment: "My reasons for the foregoing determination and order are stated in the said orders of Frank L. Pick..." and in addition, "Records, the public interest will be best served by the elimination of any enemy interest adverse to American citizens arising by reason of said choice in action, or rights, interests and benefits under said agreements."

"This sale," Mr. Garvan continues, "was made in the full light of all branches of the government and in the full light of publicity. The idea of its favoritism was the result of the intimate knowledge of the past use of these patents in a manner hostile to the United States interests, and in full consultation with all of the executives of the government, the experts of our army and navy, and leaders of our chemical business organizations and the heads of all our scientific and research organizations. I do not ask you

to accept my present statement of the matter, but insert here an extract from the report of A. Mitchell Palmer, filed with the President February 22, 1919, and by him forwarded to the Congress, and by that Congress made a public document and most widely commented on by the press of the country."

Palmer's Version of It
Mr. Palmer stated in the course of the report referred to by Mr. Garvan: "These patents, as had already been indicated, formed a colossal obstacle to the development of the American dyestuff industry. Evidently they had not been taken out with any intention of manufacturing in this country or from any fear of American manufacture... upon consideration it seemed that these patents offered a possible solution for the problem, hitherto unsolvable, of protecting the new American dye industry against German competition after the war... The idea was accordingly conceived that if the German chemical patents could be placed in the hands of any American institution strong enough to protect them, a real obstacle might be opposed to German importation after the war, and at the same time the American industry might be freed from the prohibition enforced by the patents against the manufacture of the most valuable dyestuffs. Accordingly these considerations were laid before various associations of chemical manufacturers, notably the Dye Institute and the American Manufacturing Chemists' Association. The suggestion was met with an instantaneous and enthusiastic approval, and as a result a corporation has been organized to be known as the Chemical Foundation (Inc.), in which practically every important manufacturer will be a stockholder, the purpose of which is to acquire by purchase these German patents and to hold them as a trustee for American industry... The first president of the Chemical Foundation will be Francis P. Garvan of the New York bar, to whose clear vision and indefatigable industry I am chiefly indebted for the working out of this plan. The combination was not objectionable to public policy, since it was so organized that any genuine American, whether a stockholder of the company or not, could secure the benefits of the patents on fair and equal terms."

A Quasi-Public Idea
Mr. Garvan goes on to state that at that time he was a dollar a year man, with no extraneous whatever of becoming alien property custodian; that it was only when Attorney-General Gregory resigned and Palmer was appointed attorney-general that Palmer asked him to take the custodian's place. Three months later, he writes, he testified before the Ways and Means Committee of the house: "The foundation of the Chemical Foundation was an effort to form an organization to represent as nearly as possible at that time the public interests. Judge J. P. Graham of New York and Judge Gray of Delaware had charge of drawing our charter and our trust agreement and our certificate of incorporation. We have endeavored to make it as nearly a public institution as our laws allow, and at the same time to have it an official organization. We wanted to sell these patents to the government, and if there had been any method by which we could make them a working force and still have them owned and controlled by the government, it would have relieved us of a great deal of responsibility, and if there is at this time any suggestion for modification or amendment of our plan which will insure in the minds of the committee a more definite and certain fulfillment of the intention and purposes of our organization I am certain that the Chemical Foundation and all its stockholders and all who are interested in it would be glad to conform to the wishes of the committee, because, in so far as we have public recognition and public support and government support, we become more efficient and become more able to carry out the intentions which are in our hearts and minds."

Mr. Garvan states that the total or gross income of the Foundation has averaged \$143,216.65 per year. The running expenses, bare overhead, have averaged \$121,971.35, a net excess of \$21,245.30 or 14.8 per cent on the \$428,900 invested, allowing nothing for depreciation. The average life of the patents is eight years; so that 12 1/2 per cent of the \$271,850 cash paid for the patents, or \$33,981 per year, should be subtracted from the above net receipts per year, which leaves an actual annual operation deficit of \$12,735.70. In educational work, Mr. Garvan informs the President, the Foundation has spent \$294,017.85, the entire balance of its capital.

Quotes English Prediction
Firmly maintaining that the Foundation is the keystone of the wall raised to protect the American people from German chemical domination, Mr. Garvan maintains such protection is indispensable to the future happiness, health and safety of the American people, and quotes from a recent open letter to parliament written by James Morton, English carpet manufacturer of England, "Organic chemistry is the key to the world of new values, and that America in five years' time will have done works and general chemical works equal to Germany."

As regards the development of organic chemistry for national defense, Mr. Garvan calls to his aid testimony by Marshal Foch and the late Field Marshal Sir Henry Wilson to the general conclusion that a nation thoroughly equipped chemically may almost guarantee the peace of the future. And as regards its importance in the development of medicine he quotes Prof. Julius Stiglitz of the University of Chicago, world famous chemist:

"The pitiful calls of our hospitals for local anesthetics to alleviate suffering on the operating table, the frantic appeals for the hypnotic that soothes the epileptic and staves off his seizure, the almost furious demands for remedy after remedy that came in the early years of the war, are still ringing in the hearts of many of us. No wonder that our small army of chemists is grimly determined not to give up the independence in chemistry which the war achieved for us! Only a widely enlightened public, however, can insure the permanence of what far seeing men have started to accomplish in developing the power of chemistry through research in every domain which chemistry touches."

"These," Mr. Garvan concludes, "were the thoughts which were in the minds of the men who knew the war and its lessons when they formed the Chemical Foundation."

COASTWISE REGULATIONS WOULD HELP PHILIPPINE SHIPPING, SAYS MARIAS

Preliminary Examination for
Candidates to be Held On
August 13

Manila, Aug. 1.—Joseph F. Marias, general agent of the United States Shipping Board in Manila, believes that for the benefit of Filipinos and Americans coastwise shipping regulations should be put in force here at once.

"I believe," he said, "it is possible to prove to any fair minded Filipino that extension of the coastwise shipping regulations to the Philippines will benefit Filipinos and Americans alike."

"Let us take the actual situation. Filipinos now have no ocean ships and only a portion of the inter-island ships. If coastwise regulations go into force all ships, including those in the inter-island service, will be under American registry; no cargo between the islands and the United States will be carried in foreign vessels. Filipinos will have the same opportunities as Americans to acquire and operate inter-island and ocean ships. They can operate ships economically, and they can man and officer them, too; there is no reason to

believe that with the coastwise laws extended to the islands they would not soon have an important part of the ocean carrying trade between the Philippines and the United States in their own hands.

"They have the same rights under the American flag that Americans have. As to seamen, their chances for employment would be greatly increased."

"The Philippines are capable of developing into an important manufacturing country, but cannot do so as long as the islands are held in the grip of foreign ship lines. Rates are generally in favor of the shipping out of raw products; for their reason alone manufacturers already established here find the going difficult."

"The coconut oil industry is an example. Unfavorable rates have caused the oil mills in Manila to close. It is advantageous to ship the raw copra to Europe and America and extract the oil there rather than to extract it where the copra is produced. Europe, in other words, gains profits that it would be to the mutual advantage of Filipinos and Americans to leave in the Philippines. Until the coastwise laws are enforced here, however, the situation cannot be controlled for the benefit of Filipinos and Americans."

TIME FOR AGREEMENT.

It begins to look as if the government will be forced to take some action in the rail and coal strike, and the sooner it is done the earlier the industrial crisis will be completely set aside.

Everything has been done to bring about amicable feelings among the miners and operators, the shippers and railroads. It has been ineffectual because one side or the other would not be pleased. The government has made certain proposals, the railway labor board has done the same, but still a solution seems as far away now as ever.

Government intervention seems to be the only advisable means of bringing about a change, and President Harding probably did the right thing when he asked congress to remain in continuous session until something has been accomplished. It is a pity the warring factions cannot reach an agreement and avoid the displeasure of the public, but they seem helpless at this time and will continue so unless the government takes a hand.

Public sentiment is rapidly crystallizing against the strikers and it is liable to grow in intensity unless they get down to business and come to terms. The president will have the hearty support of the public in any action he may deem advisable now, as conditions are becoming intolerable with each succeeding day.

Pitt county farmers must not get the idea in their heads that boll weevils will not destroy their crops to any great extent next year, as they will as the future will show. Destruction to crops in other parts of the country has been terrific and we can't expect that the weevil will pass through Pitt county without leaving destruction in his wake. The farmer should begin fighting the pest early next year and make such advances that the pest will be cleaned up before the cotton blooms. There are many methods open to the farmer. The farm demonstration agent will be glad to assist in every way possible and those who take advantage of the knowledge will come out at the big end of the horn.

DON'T KNOCK—BOOST.

There are a number of baseball fans in Greenville who have a habit of criticizing members of the baseball club when they fail to measure up to expectations, regardless of how good they may have played in the past. This is the wrong thing to do, as it makes the players feel bad when they should always be in the best of spirit, capable of walking out in the field feeling confident they have the undivided support of every fan on the field.

No ball player or any other person for that matter is perfect. They have their off days and can't be expected to show up like big leaguers all the time and when they make a play their support should be as hearty as ever.

We have one of the best ball clubs in the league. If we did not we would not be at the head of the standing of clubs. These men have fought hard to place us in this enviable position and it is poor appreciation indeed to say bad things about them just because they drop one or two games out of six or seven. No club can win all the time. It has never been done and never will, so the best thing to do is to praise the club at all times and let the boys know we are behind them. This will instill a splendid spirit and produce a higher morale.

Don't knock, but begin boosting right now and see what a great difference there is. Our prospects of winning the last half will be better in fact, the whole thing will take on a rosy hue and eventually we will have the pennant clinched.

It is to be hoped Pitt county farmers will make an effort to increase the agricultural offerings at the Pitt county fair this fall, as in this way alone can the public be impressed

with the importance of this section as a farm center. The fair is the best place in the world to advertise the importance of a section, it matters not along what line, and farmers can derive great benefit from the experience. If you have anything, get busy and place it on exhibition at the fair.

The Life Savings Corps of the American Red Cross should be able to accomplish much good in the protection of young swimmers. The organization has grown in strength to no little extent and the next season or so will see it practically doubled in size. The young men and women have taken an active interest in their work and at this time are on the verge of competing with Raleigh for state championships. This is a signal honor in itself and Pitt county may be expected to make a splendid showing in the contest. The Red Cross has been able to accomplish much good in this section and it has taken a long stride forward in organization of the life saving corps.

BRITISH DOMINANT IN PERSIA, ASSERTS RUSSIAN OFFICIAL.

Soviet Russia Must Rush Aid to Persian Liberty, Says Ambassador Rothstein

Moscow, Aug. 9.—Great Britain was practically established a protectorate over Persia, and Soviet Russia must aid the Persians in their struggle for liberty, according to Russian Ambassador Rothstein, who has just returned to Moscow from his post in Persia.

"Entering Persia last year, I found British domination at its height, with a protectorate practically in operation," Rothstein said. "The British bank was publishing paper money and pumping silver and gold from the country. British financial advisers and army instructors were most active."

"Unoffending Russians were arrested in Persia on charges of suspicion of being Bolsheviks. There was no Parliament or political parties or contemplated elections."

"It is our obvious mission to help Persia out of this British domination. The masses in Persia have received our emissaries with an awakened spirit and have now elected a brilliant and unswerving Anglo-Persian agreement and removed the yoke."

"The political parties in Persia are now consolidating, the Liberals, Nationalists, Socialists and Communists joining together."

"Soviet Russia must become the ally of Persia, since a free and powerful Persia, lessens the danger of war on our borders and increases the possibilities of complete emancipation for Asia."

Classical Bandit Is Caught; Peasants In Mourning for Him

Milan, Aug.—There is sorrowing among the peasants of Catania, for Turi Rapparda, a classical Sicilian bandit, has been captured.

Turi fought a long duel with carabinieri at the age of nineteen and has been a fugitive ever since, but he has established a law of his own and has wrecked vengeance upon the unjust. Turi has defended the peasants against robbers, he has pacified families in feud, has forced men to marry women whom they have abandoned and has recovered stolen property for its rightful owners.

Turi was captured at a peasant dance. Thousands of peasants have petitioned the King for his release.

MOVIES INCREASE CRIME, YANKEE TELLS BRITONS

London.—Commercial recreation is retarding civil life and making it impossible for cities to attain permanent civilization in America, Gen. Albert Bellamy, of Cleveland, Ohio, declared before a convention here.

The influence of the motion picture upon the imagination of American youth is responsible for the growth of crime, Bellamy said.

Ohio Politician Has Odd Slogan

Columbus, O., Aug.—Here's something new in the way of political campaigning.

A local candidate has displayed evidence of originality by entertaining a large crowd at a street corner with jazz orchestra music emanating from a large Magnavox which is

connected with the diaphragm of a phonograph.

While the music box played the candidate distributed campaign circulars.

REMARKABLE PICTURE OF FATAL RAILROAD WRECK



Thirty-seven persons were killed and 17 others injured, twenty-five of them seriously, when passenger train No. 22, of the Missouri & Bonne Terre Railroad, an all-steel train, crashed into the rear end of the fast Texas train No. 4 of the Missouri Pacific Railroad, on a high bridge near Sulphur Springs, Mo. The engineer in charge of the M. & B. T. train is said to have disregarded block signals. He was killed. Four of the wooden coaches were crushed to splinters and three others hurled off the bridge.

Increased Deaths From Booze Are Shown by New York State Figures

Albany, New York, Aug. 8.—Figures tabulated by the state department of health shows deaths from acute and chronic alcoholism in all parts of New York state for the first five months of 1922 are increasing at an alarming rate over the corresponding period of a year ago.

The figures, based on reports from cities and rural districts, show the death toll from alcohol to be 122. The total deaths for 1921 were 145.

Members of the State Hospital Commission say there is no doubt that insanity resulting from alcoholism will show an increase this year. In 1921 there was an increase of seventy-one cases of alcoholic insanity over the previous year.

Reports from rural sections show that persons there are drinking more liquor than ever before. For twenty-

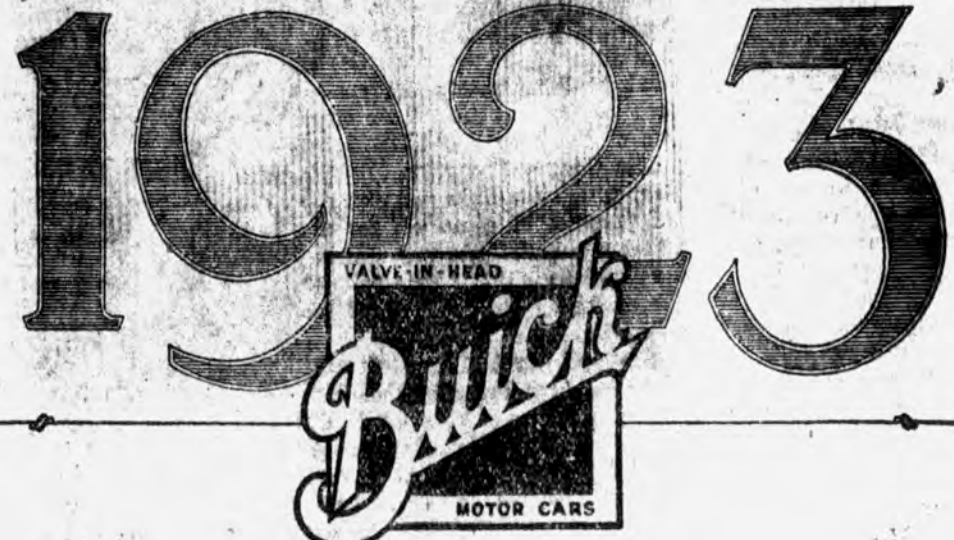

WOMEN URGED TO FILL HALF CONGRESS

**Ann Martin, Nevada Suffragist
Says English Women Sur-
pass American in Politics**

New York, Aug. 9.—Women voters in America should have equal representation with the men in congress, Miss Ann Martin, of Nevada, asserted upon her arrival here from Europe, where she made a study of woman suffrage in England and Germany.

English women are surpassing American women in political acumen and activity, she said.

Miss Martin is as the National Arts Club. After serving a time as president of the Nevada Suffrage Association she became chairman of the National Women's party and was the first woman nominated for United States Senator.

In Europe, where she lectured for nearly a year, Miss Martin met the leading members of her own sex in all the countries she visited—Germany, Italy, France and England. The English women impressed her most because the militants and the conservatives, bitterly opposed during the votes for women campaign, had buried the hatchet and were now working for the real equality of sexes before the law and for election to office of men who recognize this equality in their interpretation of the laws.

"There are thirty-seven women in the Reichstag in Germany, and whenever a question relating to women comes up the men leave it to them to discuss and decide," said Miss Martin. "In England numerous women's organizations have combined to support feminine candidates. They have many equality laws, but the men who interpret them discriminate; they have got to put women in those offices if they hope to put sex out of politics."

Judge Clarence M. Goodwin, of Chicago, presided at the sessions of the Bar Association delegates. Great interest centered in the sessions of the Section on Public Utility Law. Edwin O. Egerton, former Railroad Commissioner, of California; Nathaniel T. Ghersey, of New York; Hugh Gordon, attorney for the California Railroad Commission, and Franklin T. Griffith, of Oregon, were among the experts on the programme for addresses.

Dr. John Larsen, inventor of the "lie detector," was to explain and demonstrate his apparatus for the Criminal Law Section, and Chief of Police August Vollmer, originator of the "scientific cop," was to speak on "Policemen."
