BOARD CONSIDERS EXTENSION OF CITY SEWER SYSTEM

Committee Ordered to Determine Needs of Various Sections and Report Soon

CITY TO FURNISH
WINTERVILLE WITH
ELECTRIC CURRENT

Mayor Ordered to Draw Up
Contract as Soon as Winter-
ville Builds Electric Lines

Members of the board of aldermen were in regular session at the city hall last night and discussed a number of matters vitally affecting the city at this time. The meeting was presided over by Mayor D. M. Clark with practically every alderman being in his place.

The most important matter taken up during the evening was that regarding the proposal to furnish the town of Winterville with electricity. The mayor and clerk were empowered to draw up a contract in favor of the proposition as soon as the proper lines are built by Winterville to Greenville.

A committee composed of F. J. Forbes, Z. P. Vandyke and C. W. Hearne was appointed to investigate the need of additional sewer line throughout the city and make arrangements for financing the project. The committee was ordered to report to the board at its next regular meeting.

The special license tax for the ensuing year received due consideration and will be made public next Monday.

Mr. George Dobie, of Rocky Mount who had charge of the audit of books of the various city departments, presented the audit, same being accepted.

Mayor Clark was instructed to draft a one side parking ordinance on Fifth street, between Five Points and Washington street. Traffic has increased to such an extent in this part of the city, that careful parking will be necessary in the future.

The purchasing committee of the board was ordered to get the cost of the corrugated iron for filling in the open ditches of the city. There are three or four such places in town in bad condition and the improvement is a much needed one.

Sunday laws regarding the opening and closing of filling stations and garages of the city were brought up by representatives of local concerns but after short consideration the matter was tabled.

RAIL EXECUTIVES ACCEPT HARDING'S STRIKE PROPOSAL

Want to Hire Only Few Strikers to Bring Forces Back to Normal

EXECUTIVES WILL
CALL UPON HARDING
DURING THE DAY

No Announcement Made Regarding Deliberations of Railway Managers

New York, Aug. 11.—The executive heads of 148 American railways tonight conditionally accepted President Harding's second proposal for settlement of the nation-wide rail strike.

This unofficial announcement was made shortly after 7 o'clock following a prolonged conference at the Grand Central Terminal surrounded by the greatest secrecy.

Officially, it was merely stated that a committee representing virtually all the railroad in the country would wait on President Harding at the White House tomorrow afternoon with a reply to his program drafted by a committee appointed by the association of Railway Executives, and approved by the body as a whole.

The conditions which went into the acceptance, according to unofficial sources were:

First—That the President's requests that the strikes be taken back should be interpreted that as many strikers should be re-hired as needed by the roads to bring their shop forces to normal.

Second—That such strikers should be taken back unconditionally and that the railroad labor board later should determine whether they were to regain their seniority privileges.

President Harding had suggested that all strikers be given back their old jobs and that the question of seniority be left to the railroad labor board to be thrashed out later.

SEVERAL CRIPPLES OF PITT COUNTY TO RECEIVE STATE AID

Member of State Rehabilitation Department Here Yesterday Looking After Work

Mr. L. A. Ranson of the State Rehabilitation Department spent several hours in the city yesterday, according to a statement by Mr. Futrell, Supt. Public Welfare, conferring with a number of physically handicapped men with a view of assisting them under this department.

A number of crippled men were interviewed at the Welfare office and others were called on while in the community. Mr. Ranson came here from Washington where he had conference with a number of men. After the interviews here Mr. Ranson department for Farmville where, with the assistance of Mr. Futrell, he had a number of men waiting to interview him.

Mr. Ranson stated that soldier rehabilitation had been confused with civilian rehabilitation and that a number of men and women subject to assistance under this department did not know what the United States government and the State had arranged for their benefit. He stated that any person physically handicapped by reason of disease or injury, that constituted a vocational handicap, was eligible for assistance provided they could be trained, and physically able to pursue the work after being rehabilitated. He stated that anyone wishing to know more about the department and what it is doing for the disabled persons in the county and state might do well to call at the county welfare office for further information.

DR. McNAIRY DELIVERS TIMELY ADDRESS BEFORE MEMBERS OF THE KIWANIS CLUB

Head of Caswell Training School Tells of Conditions Prevailing among Defectives

EVENING PROGRAM
WAS IN CHARGE OF
R. G. FITZGERALD

Expressions of Regret Sent to Jack Kilgo, Whose Father Died Recently

Members of the Greenville Kiwanis club were in regular session at the Rotary building last night and enjoyed one of the most delightful programs in several weeks. The meeting was presided over by President J. B. James.

After Dr. McNaury had been invited by W. H. Woodard minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The meeting was then turned over to R. G. Fitzgerald, who in a brief message introduced Dr. McNaury, superintendent of the Caswell Training school of Kinston. After his address, upon motion a telegram was sent to Kiwanian Jack Kilgo, expressing the sympathy in the death of his father, Bishop J. C. Kilgo, who died at his home in Charlotte Thursday night.

During the evening program the Kiwanis quintette composed of J. B. James, C. O. H. Laughlinhouse, Chas. White, E. G. Flanagan and C. B. Rowlett, rendered several appropriate numbers.

Dr. McNaury's address follows: Mr. Chairman and members of the Kiwanis club:

I congratulate myself that you have given me the opportunity to present to you this evening a few of the concepts which I have of the Institution over which I preside, the necessity of the same, and its program. I can but briefly touch upon a few of the fundamentals in the short time allotted me. I will have to ask your indulgence for my bluntness, which is my natural style, endeavoring to say as much as possible in so short a time.

First, I want to say that the words "defective" and "feeble-minded" are both vague terms and should neither be used to designate the mentally sick or the mentally deficient. There are just as many types and degrees of mental sickness as there are of fevers. There are many types of mental defectiveness each specifically designating a degree of function. Function in the only test of mentality.

Unfortunately the laity and a great many professional men and especially the educators and lawyers seem to have confused the words intellect and mentality. They are entirely two separate and distinct terms meaning two entirely different conditions. In my conception, about the same relation of knowledge to wisdom. A man may be very intellectual yet not possessing mentality to function normally or again he may possess a great amount of knowledge and yet not have wisdom sufficient to prevent him from being a fool.

Dr. McNaury here presented his chart.

Diagrammatically I want to talk to you a little about this chart which to my mind pictures the action of the brain. There is no such thing as a mind center in the brain. Mind is but the climax of physical function. It is the result of all the brain cells doing their part without interference of hereditary taints or malformation or sequel of injury or disease. Environment does nothing for the individual more than to cultivate or curb what nature has given him. It has but little to do with man's ability to function. Either prosperity or adversity will force him to his natural inherited mental level. There are so many unfortunate creatures who are heirs by inheritance of physical and mental defects that are mentally handicapped in that they have not a diseased brain in any sense but one of a varied degrees of inferiority in substance and structure. Others are born with disease or malformation of the various glancular structures that produce in the individual a condition in which he can not act normally. Much of this I believe comes from emotional instability in parents who have never learned to control their

COAL CONFERENCE FINALLY FAILS TO REACH AGREEMENT

Question of Wage Contract Bobs Up Again at the Meeting Yesterday

LEWIS CONFIDENT
EARLY SETTLEMENT
WILL BE REACHED

Farrington Takes Determined Stand Against Interstate Wage Agreements

Cleveland, Ohio, Aug. 11.—Any wage contract that may grow out of the conference here of soft coal operators and miners probably will continue in force only until next April 1, it was indicated today by discussion of the operators-miners joint sub-committee on the general terms of an agreement. No final decision on any question was reached, but the date for expiration of the contract was brought forward in considering what board or commission might be created to arrange for future negotiations. Past contracts have run for two years, expiring on March 31.

Operators on the committee declined to make public their proposal for future settlements, but it was understood to have suggested arbitration and with this respect met with the flat refusal of the miners. The Union leaders, however, were said to have approved a fact-finding commission of purely advisory powers.

Although opposition to negotiating an inter-state agreement, which is a mining rate of wage for Illinois, was raised by Frank Farrington, the Illinois miner's president, the adjournment of the committee was marked by Medical Gallagher, head of the operators, declaring "we have labored hard all day and feel we're making no progress," while President John J. Lewis, heading the miners, added that he was as optimistic as ever over the prospects of reaching an agreement.

WHITE WAY TURNED ON DURING WEEK

Ayden, Aug. 12.—Ayden's white way lights were turned on for the first time this week and made an excellent appearance, though they will show up considerably better when the streets are gotten in better condition, the paving operations causing the streets to be in a torn-up condition at present.

There are 42 of the park lights, all of which are on the regular lighting circuit, these will be kept burning all night while 31 of them are on a separate circuit and can be turned off at will, it being deemed unnecessary to keep all the lights burning after the majority of the town's citizens have deserted the streets, one light on each street intersection will burn all night.

Mr. A. W. Sawyer, superintendent of the light plant, has worked hard and faithfully to get the lights installed and we have been told, saved the town considerable expense by making the installation himself instead of the contract being let to outsiders, and we think he should be commended for his untiring efforts in behalf of the municipality.

The new lighting system will not be such a great expense to the town as some have thought as it would have been only a short while before the lighting poles which were removed would have had to be replaced as the majority of these were rotten and would not have stood up very much longer.

One Case in Mayor's Court.

There was only one case given consideration in this morning's session of mayor's court that being against Sam Williams, colored man of this city, charged with being drunk and disorderly. He was released upon payment of \$10 and bond.

In the death of Bishop John C. Kilgo, of the Methodist church, the state lost one of its most sublime characters, a man who has done much for the educational and religious development of the state and south. Dr. Kilgo was one of the most influential members of the Methodist church and his death will leave a gap difficult to fill. As head of Trinity college several years, Dr. Kilgo performed a service for our young manhood that will stand out prominently in his life's work. He was one of those pioneers who helped blaze the trail for the greater North Carolina today, and in his passing we have sustained a distinct loss.

Negotiations on the wage contract will probably result in the breaking of the great coal strike according to latest reports received. Whether the strike comes to an end as result of these negotiations or in some other way the public will be delighted to see it ended. The situation is becoming truly serious shipments from England and other coal producing countries and the coming winter will see conditions even more accentuated unless something is done to bring about amicable settlement of the tie-up of industry. The miners should realize by this time that it is futile to continue wrangling when there is no chance of getting the operators to yield and are doing themselves and the nation an injustice to continue negotiations. They should bring the issue to a conclusion and then settle the question while things are in operation.

President Harding's proposal to bring the great rail strike to an end so far has not met with favorable consideration of the railway workers or owners either for that matter and it begins to look as if the issue is to be prolonged. This is to be regretted exceedingly as we were hopeful something would be done to relieve the situation. The railroad men might find it to their advantage to return to work and thresh out their problems as they go. This would eliminate waste of time and money and place both factions in position to discuss the various issues rationally. As it is they can't arrive at any definite decision, and there is no hope of accomplishing anything so long as they continue in indecision. The president's proposals may suit him, but whether it will be to the advantage of the railroad workers cannot be determined. At any rate they would do nothing to accept it and get back to work before things become worse.

The good tobacco prices reported from the South Carolina markets will be received with considerable interest in this part of the country which will experience its first opening next Tuesday. The price situation has been anything but favorable the last two years, and if there isn't an improvement this year things will indeed be serious. But we aren't expecting anything but good prices, however, and the farmer needn't have any fear about the outcome of the season. The most important matter to consider is the careful preparations of tobacco before carrying it to market. Any tobaccoist will say that carefully handled tobacco will bring better prices than that not receiving similar attention and it is up to the farmer to look out for this. Triple sales on the Greenville market will greatly expedite sales this season, and the farmer will be able to reach home the same day he brings his tobacco. Congestion occurred when we had double sales, but with three auctioneers and three sets of buyers handling the sales at the same time it is certain everything will move along with clock like regularity and precision. The farmer that sells his tobacco in Greenville may rest assured of getting the top of the market and the best attention possible to receive anywhere.

The farmer that sells his tobacco in Greenville this season may rest assured that the warehousemen will do everything in their power to please him. They have secured the most competent men to conduct their sales and this experience will count largely in the farmer's favor. There will be no more gutted floors as in recent years for the simple reason that triple sales will result in all floors being cleaned up in time for all farmers to reach home the same day they sell. This will be of interest to every one, especially those who have been forced to wait day after day on glutted markets before selling their offerings. The probability of the slightest congestion has been removed as facilities of the warehouse and stemming plants are sufficient to keep distribution at normal all the time. The probability of the a long distance should consider these facts as they will mean much to him in the conservation of time and money.

Everything else may advance, but so long as the price of gasoline continues to decline the most of the world will be happy.

The strike in the coal fields has produced a serious situation in South Carolina, and the state is on verge of one of the worst famines in history, according to a report of the railroad commission. While this fact is to be regretted, it is probable they may find relief in shipments of coal coming from the mines which have resumed operation. It isn't expected this supply will be anything great or can be depended upon to fill demands of the entire state, but yet it will be better than nothing and will help stay off the famine until the miners resume work and things improve. Other states are also facing a situation similar to South Carolina and unless an improvement occurs in the strike within the next few days the government will be forced to seize the mines and meet public demand until the miners decide to return. That's about the only way to solve the problem.

tempers or govern their appetites or to anticipate the results of their actions. Many if not all of us are brought into the world with more or less handicaps and none of us I believe are soegotistical as to believe that we are capable of doing the right thing at the right time in the right place always. This should be the action of normalcy, what ever that is. Like electricity, better known by action. The question would naturally arise, what is right? My assistant gave me this definition and I accept it without question. "That thing is right for the individual that brings the most good to the greatest number and the least harm to the individual." There are in North Carolina hundreds of thousands of people who can't function normally and others who can't function at all. They are found in every walk of life from the hovel to the palace. Doctor Crane, the state psychologist, recently published the statement based upon his observation and examination of school children, the inmates of county homes and jails that there are fifty thousand of these unfortunate persons here in our state. The laity confuses mental sickness with mental deficiency. Mental sickness is acquired or developed and mental deficiency is born. Defective when it comes and defective when it goes. One feeble-minded in the common accepted terms always. About 1910 Dr. Ira M. Hardy presented a paper to the Seaboard Medical Society, I think it was in Winston, setting before them some facts about the states infortunae and the neglected condition in which they were forced to live and plead with the medical profession and others to put their shoulders as it were to the plow. That great doctor and statesman, Cyrus Thompson, of Jacksonville, North Carolina, discussed it in his own peculiar way, giving it an impetus which caused the society to godfather the movement and through the splendid efforts of our own Dr. Ira M. Hardy and others what is now The Caswell Training School had its birth.

Caswell Training School was opened for the reception of pupils July 1st, 1914 when we received fourteen girls including idiots, imbeciles, and morons. In six months we had taken about one hundred and sixty, there being three buildings, the administration building, where the officers and staff are housed on the first floor and teachers and helpers on the second. On either side was a dormitory, one for girls and one for boys. In 1915 and 1916 we built a building known as the hospital building containing two hospital wards and two large dormitories. This enabled us to thin out the over crowded girls building and take in others to the number of two hundred and twenty. December 1919 the dormitory for the higher grade girls was burned including our chapel and school room. In January the hospital and dormitory for the lower grades was destroyed. Since that time the state has spent something over \$600,000 in the construction of modern fire proof buildings which gives us a capacity now for over four hundred children. The

budget committee and the legislature of 1921 failed to provide sufficient equipment and maintenance. We have now three hundred and ten children which is more than we can maintain with the present maintenance therefore we will be compelled to cut out the literary or scholastic work until more money is provided. We have children from every walk of life. Mental deficiency has no respect of families. Our purpose is to take these children from the homes in which they are most often a burden, and embarrassment and a social stigma to other members of the family, at the same time an economic handicap. We think for every four children we take we let loose three bread winners. This means much in an economical way. We further feel that we have greatly relieved the community from further embarrassment and expense in defending prosecution and in providing room in the various county homes and jails and further that if we can carry out our conception of our task there will be fewer requests admission to Samracond and Jackson Training School and other child caring institutions. It is our purpose first to create an environment as much as it is possible after a well ordered home in which every one is made happy. Second, it is our purpose to make every possible test known to medical science psychiatry and surgery, removing all malformation and diseased organs and physical handicaps that is possible such as bad teeth, tonsils, etc. Where there is glanular insufficiency it is our purpose to supply as far as possible the same by giving extracts especially in the cretin and mongolian idiot. Further it is our purpose to supply wholesome well balanced rations with the proper physical training to keep our children in the best possible physical condition. Then to keep them in an environment that will contribute to their normal development.

Your letter received this morning, glad to hear from you.

The association opened up Monday, we received and graded tobacco two days so far and the grading has been satisfactory to the farmers. I have heard no complaint. In some places they tried the graders out the first thing, by splitting a pile of tobacco to see if they would be graded the same, and each time it was tried they were graded in the same grade, which was very satisfactory to the farmers.

There were over two hundred contracts signed Monday and Tuesday. The farmers are grading and tying their tobacco much better than I had expected to see it done here.

I know of one man, where the tobacco was divided the tenant selling on the auction floor, and the landlord delivering to the association. The association advanced more than

the other half for at auction. I know this to be a fact.

Several who delivered to the association yesterday told me that their advance was more than they got for the same tobacco (barns) last year. So you see the farmers were satisfied.

They do not speak of the advance as on a percentage basis, but each grade has a loan value, and this is paid when the tobacco is delivered.

I believe that by Saturday night the association will have received three million pounds and then some.

Tell Mr. Gorman how things are going.

The letter above was received by Mr. Skinner, Friday. I have a letter written Wednesday by one who is buying at Lake City on the auction floor. He writes that the association had around 300,000 pounds at Lake City the first day, and that he heard of no dissatisfaction from the farmers and he knows most of them personally. These letters coming as they do, I know to be the truth, since they were written as personal letters.

I will be at the warehouse all day Monday and Tuesday and will be pleased to talk to any one interested.

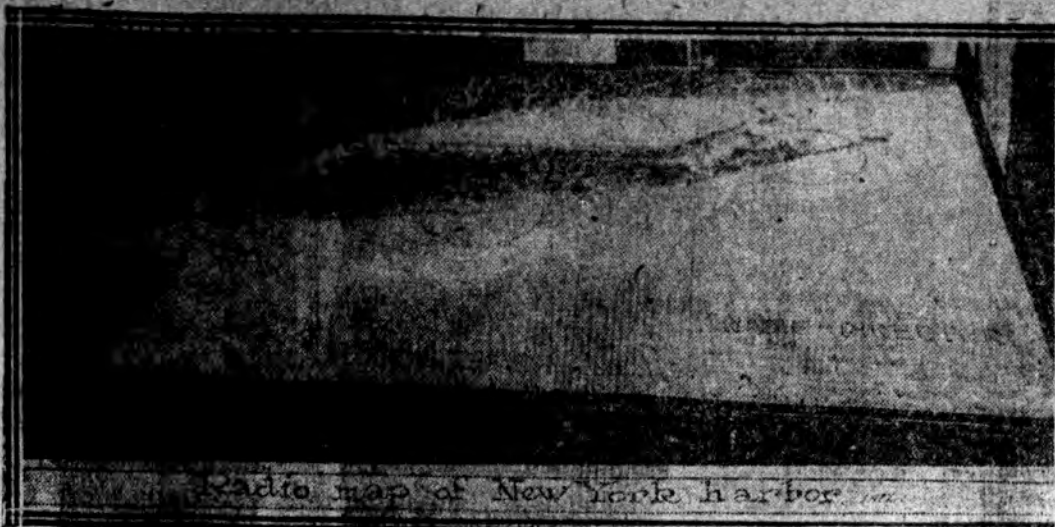

National Conference Highway Education

Engineering and Highway Transport Leaders to Meet in Washington Oct. 26

Washington, D. C., Aug. 11.—Plans for a second national conference for the study of highway engineering and highway transport education are being prepared by the Highway Education Board, Dr. John J. Tigert, chairman, according to announcement here.

Leading figures in the teaching of highway engineering and highway transport, officials in charge of highway construction programs, members of the automotive industry and kindred fields, together with representatives from other countries are being invited to attend.

The conference will be held in Washington October 26 to 28 inclusive, and, according to the tentative program, this period will be devoted to the intensive study of highway and engineering problems.

According to a statement of the program committee, the object of the conference is "To review the field of highway engineering and highway transport education in the light of expanding state and federal highway program and the rapidly increasing social and commercial use of the highways; to discuss general and special courses in undergraduate and graduate curricula; and to exchange views on educational trends arising from these developments in the national transportation system."

Members of the program committee charged with the duty of arranging an adequate program are Professor T. R. Agg, professor of highway engineering, Iowa State College, Ames, Iowa; Professor Arthur H. Blackard, professor of Civil Engineering University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, Mich.; Professor C. J. Tilden, professor of engineering mechanics, Yale University, New Haven, Conn.; Professor Lewis W. McIntyre, professor of civil engineering, University of Pittsburgh, Penn.; H. G. Shirley, chairman Virginia State Highway Commission, Richmond, Va., and Dr. Watson C. John, U. S. Bureau of Education, Washington, D. C., chairman.

Seven principal committees will function as the chief activities of the conference, but a program of unusual and exceptional merit, it is said, is being arranged.

Tentatively the committees will be assigned to the study of the following problems:

1. Undergraduate and elective courses in highway engineering.
 2. Undergraduate and elective courses in highway transport.
 3. Graduate work in highway engineering and highway transport.
 4. Short courses in highway engineering and highway transport.
 5. Introductory general course in highway engineering and highway transport.
 6. Vocational training for non-professional highway personnel.
 7. Traffic regulations and safety.
- Invitations to the conference are being issued by the chairman. Information with regard to the conference may be had upon request to the Highway Education Board, Willard Building, Washington, D. C.

bute as far as possible to their happiness. We propose to give them such literary training adopting about the same curriculum as is used for normal children up to the fourth grade, there are very few who are able to take the same. The training that offers us the most hope is the industrial as far greater number of our pupils are susceptible to such training. We hope after a study to find a vocation for each individual that will contribute most to his present and future happiness and support. There are hundreds and thousands of children knocking at our door. We beg and plead with you gentlemen, you Kiwanians, and other members of your organization throughout this good old state. We respectfully ask all other men and women whose hearts respond to the call of these mentally unfortunate, who are so because of no fault of their own, to see to it that North Carolina comes to their rescue and provide adequate means and equipment for their care and training. We respectfully ask the budget commission and legislature of 1923 to give us one million and three hundred thousand dollars to equip our institution with sufficient buildings and a hospital that will enable us to care for one thousand in a modern, scientific and up-to-date way. This will enable us to begin to handle our problem as we think it should be which no other southern state has done to date. Then our dreams is to build colonies of cheaper construction and group and grade our children when we will be able to place them in more home like surroundings. Then our hope is, after playing safety first, to return these children to their respective communities on a better environment where we trust they may be better understood and accepted, woven back into the social fabric where they may no longer be a burden or menace. They can then be happy with friends and loved ones who recognize their unfortunate mental state and are willing to help and sympathize, with none to worry, tease, torment, or misguide or make them the scape goats of society. Gentlemen we must teach not only our children but the present and coming citizens of our state the cause and how to prevent mental deficiency. Can you think for an instant what it means for a state of less than three million people to have fifty thousand mental defectives, Dr. Crane says, who can not manage their own affairs with any degree of prudence. This is two per cent. I have been considered radical when I suggested that there were between three and four thousand in the state. Oh, God give us the vision. How can our children escape this great economical and social burden unless we awake to our obligation? It is utterly impossible as every normal person must admit unless something more efficient is done to enlighten the masses and to instruct them in better methods of handling and preventing the reproduction of the mental deficient, societies most unfortunates from which springs the anti-social, the social unfit, the emotional unstable, the criminal, the prostitute, the agnostic and mentally sick. We will have to enlarge our child caring institutions, orphanages, corrective institutions, almshouses, jails, chain gangs, and penitentiaries. Our homes for the mentally sick will have to ever increase their number and capacity and many more institutions, such as we hope to make The Caswell Training school, will have to be built. We believe that every one who is normal and properly informed wants to and will do right and when they don't there is some cause and reason why they don't that can be found in their mental and nervous mechanism manifesting itself through their sub-conscious nature over which they have no control, preventing them in the state of emotional instability from being able to look into the future and reason consequences or act normally.
