THE GREENVILLE TOBACCO MARKET OPENS TOMORROW

Five Local Warehouses Are In Splendid Condition for the Opening Day

TRIPLE SALE PLAN TO TAKE PLACE OF PAST DOUBLE SALE METHOD

Warehousemen Are Optimistic Over the Opening and Predict Splendid Season

The Greenville tobacco market will open for the sale of leaf tobacco, at auction, tomorrow morning with five warehouses ready to welcome the hundreds of farmers who will sell their offerings here for the coming season.

The Greenville tobacco market is better prepared this year than ever before to serve the farmers on account of the triple sales plan which will take the place of the double sales method which has been used on the local market for the past several years. The triple sales plan will be conducted with a great saving of time on the part of the farmer and will enable him to sell his offerings and return home the same day.

Each warehouse has secured an efficient office and floor force and the patrons of the warehouses will receive the most courteous treatment and also find that the heaviest sales will be handled with such care that they will be finished in a day's time.

Already much of the weed has begun to arrive for tomorrow's sale and many visitors, to be on hand for the opening, and it is expected that tomorrow will witness the largest crowd that has ever attended the opening sales on the local market.

TEXAS SENATORIAL RACE IS BITTER

A bitter contest is being waged in the run-off primaries for the Democratic nomination to the United States Senate, in which the candidates are State Railroad Commissioner Earle B. Mayfield and James E. Ferguson, who was impeached and removed as Governor in 1917. The primary will be held August 26, the successful candidate to oppose the Republican nominee in November. Personal attacks have marked the campaign. Mayfield, originally a candidate to oppose the Esh-Cummings et and permit each state to fix its own rate, together with noncancelation of the foreign debt, and "100 per cent Americanism." He said to have the backing of the Ku Klux Klan on the latter issue. Ferguson accused Mayfield of being a member of the Klan and of not being sincere in his backing of the Volstead act. Ferguson is running on a platform of opposition to the dry law and in favor of union labor in his fight for the closed shop.

LORD NORTHCLEIFF ENGLISH PUBLISHER DIED THIS MORNING

Was Publisher of London Times and World's Largest Newspaper Owner

LONDON, Aug. 14.—Lord Northcliffe the famous English publisher, died this morning at his residence in Carlton Gardens after an illness brought on by a breakdown from strenuous activities. Lord Northcliffe was the publisher of the London Times and the owner of more newspapers and magazines than any other man in the world. During the World War he became noted for his fearless criticism of the conduct of the war.

Trainmen Strike On Account Armed Guards at Shops

TOBACCO SELLING WELL AT FAIRMONT

Fairmont, Aug. 12.—The Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association received here this week a total of 60,154 pounds of the bright weed. Large shipments have been made and there are only a few pounds left on the floors. A large number of members are perfectly satisfied with the advances made while some others are not.

The sales at auction this week were very good and the prices received were even better than last week, when the market sold 258,206 pounds at an average of \$18.22. This week a total of 462,674 pounds were sold on the two auction floors for the sum of \$112,19.64 being average of \$24.25 for the entire market.

A CO-OP MEMBER IS DISSATISFIED WITH HIS SALES

Mike Rhodes Alleges That Co-operatives Fail to Keep Promises

Wilson, Aug. 12.—The opposition to the co-operative marketing movement is circulating an affidavit copy of a letter from Mike Rhodes, a South Carolina farmer, who alleges that the Tobacco Growers Co-operative Marketing Association has not fulfilled the promises it made him when he signed up in the movement.

The following is the affidavit copy of the letter:
Mullins, S. C., Aug. 11, 1922.
The Tobacco Growers Co-Operative Marketing Association.

Dear Co-operators:—I joined your association in good faith, believing it would be a help to the farmers. I carried you the first 222 pounds of my tobacco, thinking you would be true to your word. I found out it was a fake, therefore I cannot work my wife and little children to death for a set of smart, slick-tongued, dressed sports who came from Kentucky, telling me slick tales. So therefore, gentlemen, I, being a poor man, and having a wife and several little children striving to make an honest living, trying to feed and clothe them, also trying to pay up house rent which had gotten behind, it was all I could do, and then giving to a bunch of unknown men my wife and little children's daily support, I cannot begin to do it. I sold more tobacco of the same kind with you which I only got \$9.33. I sold with the independents 20 pounds less and got \$83.76; so, gentlemen, you see where I stand. I am an honest man and will do what is right, but you won't get any more of my tobacco.

HAWAII YIELDS BIG REVENUE TO AMERICA

Honolulu, Aug. 14.—A total of \$67,525,293.46 has been contributed by Hawaii to the Federal Treasury during the past twenty years, according to figures on internal revenue receipts just made public by Colonel J. Walter Jones, Collector of Internal Revenue for the Territory of Hawaii.

Internal revenue collections for the year 1921-22, which are now going forward to Washington, amount to \$15,444,064.79, a slight decrease from the preceding year.

HEAVY GUARD TO GO WITH NEGROES TO CARTHAGE

Durham and Raleigh Companies to Guard Carthage Trial Today

Raleigh, Aug. 14.—Sixty members of the Durham Machine Gun Company and the Raleigh Service Company will accompany the three negroes held in the State Prison here for safekeeping when they are taken to Carthage this morning to be arraigned for criminal assault on Mrs. A. E. Ketchen and seriously wounding her husband, near Southern Pines ten days ago. The prisoners and their guard will leave on an early train.

Trial of the three negroes will begin this afternoon and will possibly be completed before Judge B. F. Long adjourns court for the day. Solicitor M. W. Nash will ask the grand jury to act immediately on the indictments against the negroes, and so soon as they are arraigned he will proceed with the trial. Little testimony is to be given.

Reques for the armed forces of the State was made on the Governor several days ago by Sheriff D. A. Blue, of Moore county, when renewed threats to lynch the prisoners were made during the past week. The size of the guard, and the cooling temperature of the Sandhill citizens is believed to have removed any possibility of disorder. Indications are that the hearing will be attended by tremendous crowds.

The three negroes, John Lee, 46; Angus Murphy, 36, and Joseph Thomas, 20, have been identified positively by Mrs. Ketchen as the three who entered the Ketchen camp at 1 o'clock on the morning of August 4, shot her husband through the left breast, assaulted her, and stripped her of her jewelry and money. The younger of the three has confessed in part. The other two deny any knowledge of the crime.

What is regarded as conclusive circumstantial evidence against Murphy and Thomas is provided in the finding of a monogrammed wrist watch belonging to Mrs. Ketchen, as well as other personal property stolen at the time of the assault. These things were found in the pockets of the two negroes. The younger negro tells a very connected story of the assault, but declares that he took no part in it.

Capture of the three negroes was effected at Aberdeen by Deputy Sheriff Beck within a few hours after the crime was committed. They were hiding in a coal car attached to a freight train passing through the town. Lynching was narrowly averted by the timely removal of the prisoners to the state prison here. Enraged citizens pursued the sheriff to the prison gates and the prison was guarded throughout the night by the Durham and Raleigh soldiers as a precautionary measure.

Mr. Ketchen was removed to a Carthage hospital for treatment, and is practically recovered from the bullet wound in his body. The bullet passed entirely through him. Mrs. Ketchen has remained in Carthage. Both will testify at the hearing today. The Ketchen family was en route by automobile from Florida to Connecticut. They were encamped for the night when the negroes attacked them.

OUR TRADE WITH INCREASES.

Japan is the one important country of the world with which our 1922 trade shows an increase. Our imports from the whole world in the fiscal year 1922, says the Trade Record of the National City Bank of New York, show a fall of 28 per cent in value while from Japan alone, our imports show an increase of 18 per cent. The 1922 exports to the whole world show a reduction of 24 per cent in value while those to Japan show an increase of 30 per cent. The imports from Japan in the fiscal year 1922 approximate \$300,000,000 against \$253,000,000 in the fiscal year 1921, and the exports to that country in 1922 were approximately \$240,000,000 against \$189,000,000 in the preceding year. This estimate of the 1922 trade with Japan, adds the Trade Record, is based upon official figures of eleven months while those of the trade with the whole world during the full fiscal year are official.

Practically all of the increase in our imports from Japan occurs in raw silk while the increase on the export side includes a large number of manufactured articles. True, raw cotton is the biggest single item in our exports to Japan but the number of manufactured articles which that country now takes from the United States is steadily increasing and in a dozen or more of the important manufactures the figures of 1922 show an increase in value when compared with 1921, while in most cases the increase in quantity is much greater than that of mere value.

Of refined copper the exports to Japan in the eleven months of the fiscal year of 1922 for which details are now available are over 11 million dollars in value against less than a half million in the same months of last year, while the quantity in 1922 is eighty-seven million pounds against less than one million in the preceding year. Of lumber the exports to Japan in the eleven months of 1922 are valued at 8 and one-half million dollars against one and one-half million in the preceding year and the quantity 376,000 M feet against 45,000 M a year earlier. Steel sheets aggregate in value in 1922 approximately eighteen million dollars against about five million dollars last year, while the quantity in the 11 months of 1922 is 567,000,000 pounds against 72,000,000 in the same months of the preceding year. Zinc in the 11 months of 1922 is twelve million pounds against less than a half million last year. Other articles which show increases in value in 1922 as compared with the preceding year are sole leather, kid upper leather, and fuel oil, gasoline, paraffin, wire, raisins, and curlious, rice, grown in the United States, for the first time appears in the official list of articles exported to Japan one of the great rice-growing countries of the world.

Raw silk and raw cotton are, of course, the biggest item in the trade between the two countries. Our imports of silk from Japan in 11 months of the fiscal year of 1922 were 344,000,000 pounds valued at \$218,000,000 against only 18,000,000 pounds, valued at \$115,000,000 in the same months of last year. Our exports of raw cotton to Japan in the eleven months of 1922 were 848,000 bales valued at \$73,000,000 against 447,000 bales valued at \$40,000,000 in the same months of last year. In both of these articles, raw silk and raw cotton, the prices appear in 1922, to be a slight change as compared with those of 1921, though in other articles, the prices of 1922 are far below those of 1921.

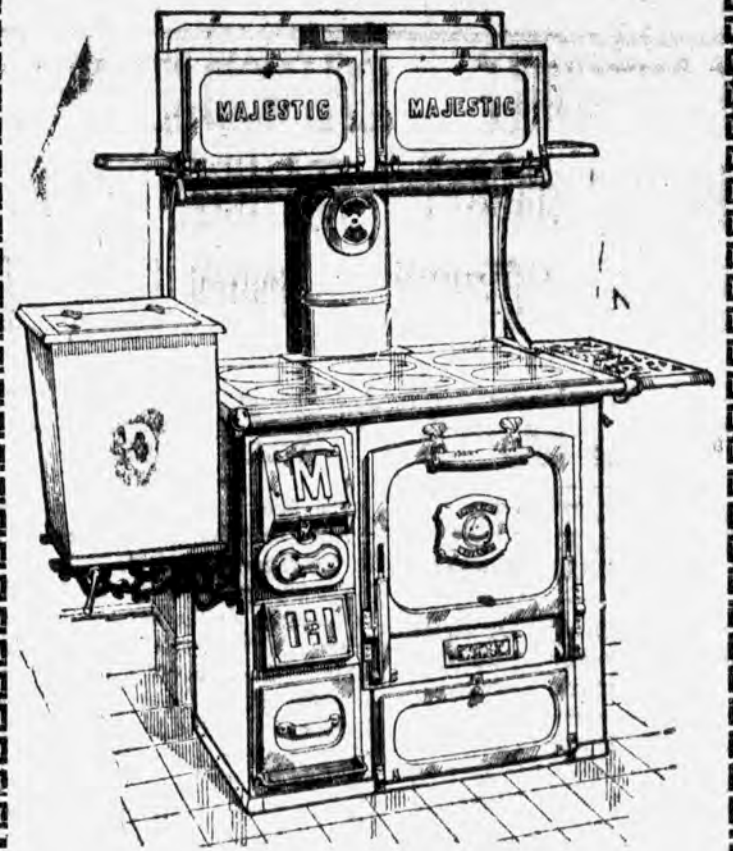
