RALEIGH MAN IS ELECTED HEAD OF LABOR FEDERATION

Major Moody Wins Over Caldwell of Asheville by Two to One Vote

Wilmington, Aug. 14.—A hint that Henry Ford may run for the Presidency on a platform calling for revision of the monetary system, a stirring speech on the evils of international banking, a strong address by a farmer leader on the subject "Beware of Bonds," and the election of Major W. F. Moody, of Raleigh, by a two to one majority over H. C. Caldwell for presiding officer, featured the initial session of the sixteenth annual convention of the North Carolina State Federation of Labor today in Harbor Island auditorium.

Mayor James H. Cowan cordially welcomed the delegates to the seaport city and to Wrightville Beach, and Major Moody, in responding, assured the mayor that "there are no Bolsheviks in this meeting; these men represent thousands of men and will return the keys to your city untarnished."

A message from Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, was read by secretary Charles G. Warkley. Mr. Gompers was to have been the main speaker, but wrote that the status of the rail strike prevented his attendance. He wrote in part:

"My desire is to attend the convention, but am prevented because the labor movement now finds itself in a critical condition. We are making the fight of our lives," he declared, and cited the strike of six railway shop crafts, the machinist, electrical workers, sheet metal workers, blacksmiths, boiler-makers, railway carmen also the textile workers, quarry workers and granite cutters' strikes.

The report and recommendations of President James F. Barrett, who is confined in an Asheville hospital, have not yet been read to the convention and it is predicted tonight that the committee on reports would return the report to the convention tomorrow or bring non-concurrence, especially as to Barrett's recommendation of Rev. Tom Jimison as first choice and James M. Ellis as second choice for the Federation Presidency. Several delegates have expressed keen disapproval of Barrett injecting his personal preference of a president candidate, in his last official communication to the federation and it is generally conceded by both the Caldwell and Moody delegates that such recommendations will not be passed quietly or accepted without a fight by the convention.

The committee on reports is composed of Curtis, of Wilmington; Lindsey, of Asheville, and Shafer of Salisbury.

New Bern, Aug. 14.—The Bears and the Pamlico fought through 12 innings to a 3-3 tie when darkness stopped the game. With 8 hits and only making 1 error the Pams bettered the Bears' record of 4 hits and 4 bad misuses.

Half Million Pounds Sold On Five Floors; 'Satisfactory Prices

Local Market Opens Under Most Favorable Conditions; Nearly 500,000 Pounds Sold on Five Warehouse Floors. Large Quantity of Common Tobacco Sold.

The Greenville tobacco market opened this morning, and although about three weeks earlier than the usual opening time, there were between 450,000 and 500,000 pounds of tobacco sold on the floors of the five warehouses which sold for an average of around 25 cents, the common grades selling better than double the price of last year.

For the past several weeks the warehousemen have been making preparations for this the opening day and when the tobacco began arriving yesterday the large quantity of the weed was handled with a certain degree of rapidity seldom seen on a market as large as this one.

The triple sales plan which was used on this market for the first time today was a great success and was received most favorably by the hundreds of farmers and visitors and what would have been a block sale under the old double sales system was easily avoided everything finishing up in time for the farmers to return home.

Wilson, Aug. 15.—Nearly three quarters of a million pounds of tobacco were sold on the local market at today's opening at an average of about twenty-five cents. The sales were largely attended and complete satisfaction reigned throughout.

DESIRING ACCURACY IN NEWSPAPERS, HE SENDS THEN HIS OBITUARY

Paris, Aug. 14.—Correctness was a life passion with Dr. Jacques Bertillon, for thirty years director of the Statistical Bureau of the city of Paris and the uncle of the founder of the Bertillon system, who died four years ago.

Especially was he insistent that facts about him for or quotations from him published in newspapers should be absolutely precise. He was the more severe on this subject in that he was a former Parisian newspaper man.

Editorial desks of local dailies were astonished to receive from Bertillon recently his own "obituary," together with a note in his handwriting: "When you receive this I shall no longer exist."

Wonderingly several editors telephoned his home. "Monsieur Bertillon just died!" a hushed voice told them.

TO PROBE "FOREIGN" SCHOOLS IN HAWAII

Honolulu, Aug. 15.—A Federal investigation of the public school system of the territory of Hawaii will be made in the near future to determine whether or not the "foreign language" schools now conducted here for children of alien races shall be permitted to continue in operation according to word received from John J. Tigert, Federal Commissioner of Education.

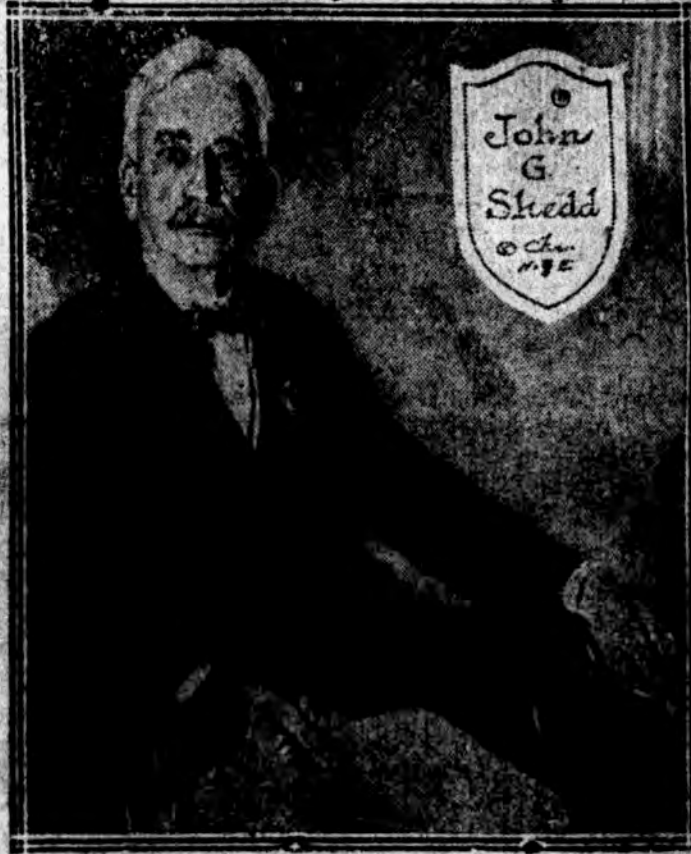

EASTERN CAROLINA EXPOSITION NOW UNDER DISCUSSION

Much Interest Being Manifested in Project by Chamber of Commerce

Announcement was made this morning by President Ellen, of the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce that the executive committee is balloting this week, or whether the big Eastern Carolina exposition will be held this year or not. The full details have been worked out by the manager and these have been forwarded to each member of the executive committee for his approval or disapproval.

When asked what he thought about it, Dr. Ellen said, "I think it will be the most effective way of getting Eastern North Carolina's resources before the country, that we could adopt at this time." Nothing is more effective than seeing, and this is what the exposition would bring about. Visitors from other states would come and see for themselves just what this section of the country has to offer.

Just where the big exposition will be held, if the committee votes to attempt it, is not known. Two things will have to be forthcoming for any town to even qualify. These are first rail road facilities and then there must be good hotel facilities for taking care of the visitors that would visit the city during the ten days of the show. There is much interest being manifested in this project because it will surely get results for this section.

When asked what time it would be held, President Ellen, said that some time this winter, either December, January, or February. It will be an indoor affair. Booths will be rented to firms, counties and individuals for advertising purposes. A musical program will be put on each day and night, and some of the biggest men in America will be booked for engagements during the exposition. If the committee decides to tackle it, it means a mass of work for the organization, but it has the prospects of being a money maker for the people who own property in eastern North Carolina. The full details and plans will be announced within a very few days, or as soon as the committee takes definite action on it.

CINCINNATI DRUG EVIL EXCEEDS BOOZE TRAFFIC

Cincinnati, O., Aug. 15.—The whiskey evil in Cincinnati is a minor thing compared to traffic in drugs, according to Harry A. Abrams, assistant U. S. District Attorney, who has been conducting the prosecution of narcotic peddlers here. In commenting on the annual report sent to Attorney-General Harry M. Daugherty from the District Attorney's office here, Mr. Abrams said: "The outstanding feature of the report is to be found, not in the liquor prosecutions, but in the efforts that are being made to stamp out traffic in narcotic drugs. The drug trafficker's ring in Cincinnati is a far greater menace than any so-called whiskey ring."

BETTER HEALTH CAMPAIGN

The plan for a better health campaign as outlined by the Pitt County Medical Society and presented by Dr. C. O'H. Laughinghouse to a representative body of Pitt County citizens at the medical meeting last week, will, when accomplished, be one of the most progressive steps ever taken by the people of the county and should receive the support of everyone who has the welfare of the county at heart. The twenty or thirty lectures will be of untold value to every community, especially the isolated ones and with the proper support the campaign will be the great success which it should be. Pitt County is one of the best along educational, agricultural and industrial lines and with health conditions improved it will be second to none in the state.

It is indeed welcome news to the people of the county, especially those living on the north side of the river, to learn that the contract has been let for the hard surfaced road from Greenville to Bethel. Our system of roads will soon be one of the best to be found anywhere and the highway commission cannot be commended too highly for the great work which it is accomplishing.

It is gratifying to know that the local tobacco market has adopted the triple sales plan. It is a great improvement over the double sales method as it means a great saving of time to the farmer and also enables him to return home the same day that he brings his offerings.

Three barbecues and get-together meetings in one week's time does not show up bad for a county the size of Pitt but on the other hand it shows how progressive the people of this community really are. Let us hope that the good work will keep up as it creates a spirit of friendliness a nothing else can.

It is to be hoped that the Pitt county commission while doing their good work on the roads will not forget that bad stretch of road beyond the teachers college. This piece of road is one of the worst in the county and has caused the public no little inconvenience in having to detour every time this section is visited by heavy rains such as have fallen throughout the summer.

SLOW UP FOR SAFETY.

Once there was a successful young attorney who worked for a corporation. His ability was first class and the only thing that seemed to menace his future career was his over-confidence for strong drink.

He was sent to a distant city on important business which he no sooner concluded than he started in on a wild spree that delayed his return for several days.

Fearing that his employers would hear of the escapade, and make things unpleasant for him, he decided to make a clean breast of the matter, so when the manager asked where he had been so long, he owned up that he had been "trying to drink all the whiskey in sight."

The manager's advice was "slow up for safety—you are going too fast."

In these days, many automobile drivers ought to slow up for safety. The list of daily disasters at the railroad crossings should be a warning to every driver to watch his step in that place of danger.

You may have a natural expectancy of many years of life yet to come. If so, you are fortunate and surely ought not to risk, by any rash act, the spoiling of such pleasant prospects.

There are drivers who do not come to attention when they approach tracks that are to be crossed. They go on, thinking about things that are mere trifles compared to the serious question of safety of life and limbs.

Only too often, there is a sudden, horrible awakening to the fact that the engine has "gone dead" right on the crossing, just as the train is bearing down upon them.

Too late comes the realization that day-dreaming is out of place at the grade crossing. Then the end comes suddenly.

What matters now all the plans about future prosperity and success? Thoughtlessness having taken the place where vigilance should have been on guard, every plan and hope and aspiration is suddenly terminated and nothing remains of the life that looked so promising but sad memories in the minds of afflicted kindred and friends.

Slow up for safety at the crossing. Make no effort to cross unless the coast is clear.

HAWAII WILL HAVE BIG SUGAR YIELD FOR 1922

Honolulu, Aug. 15.—Hawaii's sugar business gives every promise of experiencing a very prosperous year, despite the pessimistic predictions which were freely made earlier in the year.

Word to this effect comes from practically all of the Hawaiian plantations, where growing conditions are reported as having been so good during the spring and early summer that the cane is now in excellent condition.

It is now expected that the 1922 crop will run considerably over the estimated amount, which was about 500,000 tons of raw sugar. The 1923 crop will probably be even better, it is thought.

Paris, Aug. 14.—Parisian men, of letters and of science are poking fun at the report that American astronomers are going to try to build a telescope that will reveal the secrets of Mars.

"Let's not let ourselves be buffeted with what seems big," said, in effect, an observatory astronomer reporter for Bonsoir. "These giant telescopes have not been and never will be productive of fantastic results."

"For purposes of studying life on Mars an opera glass is as good as the best telescope. And, anyway, no true astronomer is interested in whether there is life on Mars or not. We are absorbed in studying the laws of gravitation, which is a problem of equations, not of observation."

A paragrapher demanded if the placement of the proposed telescope in a well were symbolical of the Americans' attempt to find the truth, so far as it concerns the planet.

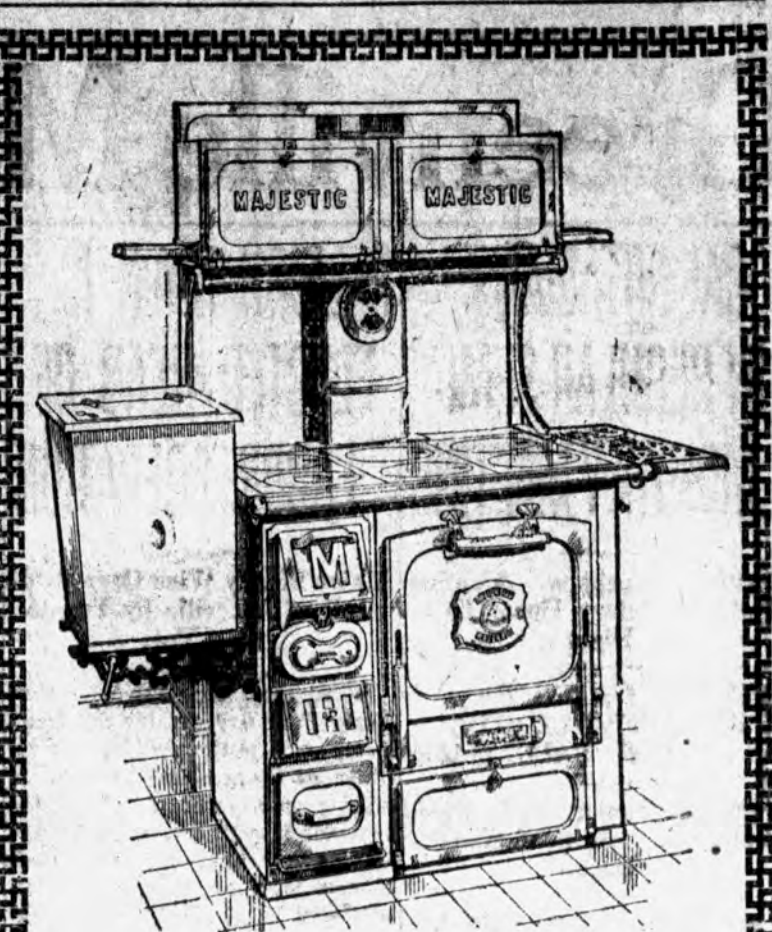

McCormick-Walska Wedding Cause Sensation

It was my privilege and indeed a pleasure to visit the Pythian Home in Clayton on Sunday, July 6th. I had heard much of the great work this institution, though small, is doing for the children of departed members of this great Order, but did not dream that they were being cared for in such an elegant manner as they enjoy.

There were four of the members of Eureka Lodge, No. 167, of Ayden in the party. We were welcomed by that estimable superintendent, C. W. Pender and Mrs. Pender, and taken over the grounds around the building.

The tract of land consists of 183 acres, much of which is under cultivation; corn, cotton, etc., being tended by one hired man and the boys of the home. The building sits up on a high hill within a beautiful grove, where a cool breeze was ever present, even on as hot a day as we picked for the visit.

The Knights of Pythias built this home in 1910 and Mr. C. W. Pender, of Goldsboro, was elected superintendent in 1911, when it was first opened for the care of children whose father was a Pythian and who had passed to the beyond. Also children of Pythians whose mother is not living is taken into the home by the father paying a nominal sum for the upkeep of same.

The place is not at all like an orphanage, in fact, you would insult that big-hearted foster-father, C. W. Pender, by calling it an orphanage. It appeared to us just like a great big family, and he calls them his children and loves them with the tenderness of a real father, and they appear to return his devotion. There are now 47 children in the home, which is really about the capacity of the building as it was not built to take care of a larger number than this. The children do not look like orphans at all; Mr. Pender would not entertain a suggestion that they be put in uniform and have other children point to them as inmates of an "orphan asylum" as so many are called. He says that when this is done the Pythian Order will have to get another superintendent as he could not stand to have the spirits of his children crushed in this manner.

The members of the Pythian Home family attend the graded school in Clayton, another feature which Mr. Pender says is not only cheaper than having a school at the home but it better prepares the children for the

battles of life to have them mingle with other folks and when they leave the home will not be so timid and have the appearance of a bird released from a cage. (These are not his exact words but similar in meaning.)

The girls who show a talent for music are given every advantage to become proficient in this profession. In fact, one girl has become a remarkable musician. Two of the girls who finish High School in Clayton were

sent to G. C. W. in Greensboro last year, one is to become a nurse, and all of the girls are being prepared to make a living for themselves or become excellent home makers at their maturity. They are as bright a bunch of young folks as one generally sees in a crowd of the number which we had the pleasure of meeting.

Soon after we arrived at the home the boys and girls began arriving

from Clayton where they had attended Sunday School and Church. Some came in automobiles, the people of Clayton picking them up and taking them to their home, and some walked. The home is located some over half a mile from Clayton.

When dinner hour arrived, we were invited into the dining room and seated at the same table with the children who entered in the most orderly manner, stopping immediately behind their dining chairs awaiting the arrival of the entire group, then upon the tap of the bell by the superintendent, who sat at the head of the table at which we were placed, all were very quietly seated. And a delicious dinner greeted our eyes; not side meat and corn-meal dumplings but a real appetizing dinner was placed on the table and plenty of it. Sliced ham, roast beef, corn, butter beans, boiled potatoes, sliced tomatoes

sweet milk and butter milk, and other things which we cannot remember; for dessert we had delicious apple pie and pound cake. We have heard that a child's table-manners is an index to its training, which we believe is true, and at the table which we were guests, we did not discover that a single one of these bright boys and girls had other than perfect table manners. In fact, we do not believe that the guests in the dining room of the Waldorf-Astoria, consume their meals in a more dainty style.

After finishing the meal, another tap of the bell, and everyone very quietly left the table and went up stairs, the dining room being on a lower floor. Mr. Pender says that when the building is enlarged, plans of which are now on foot, that he wants the dining room enlarged so that he will not be separated from his children but can continue to dine

with them as he would his own. His idea is to leave the main building as it is with the exception of adding to the dining room and build additional cottages to take care of the increased demand for space. The sum of \$100,000.00 is now being raised by the Pythians of the state to enlarge and better equip the home. There are many things which are needed at present such as a laundry, swimming pool, etc., and it is expected that these will be supplied within the near future by the more than 10,000 Pythians in the state.

If every Pythian in North Carolina would visit this home and see what this institution, which is in charge of that fatherly and motherly couple, is doing for their brothers' children, they would not only consider it a privilege but a great pleasure to give to Mr. Pender every wish that he might have, not for himself, but for

his children. While talking to us he never once mentioned a thing he wanted for himself, but the thing uppermost in his mind was the welfare and comfort of his children, who love and respect him as a father, yet who fear his displeasure. They are taught to work, though he says he is unable to teach them to love work, and are not sent away from the Pythian home until they are prepared to meet life's battles as other folks' children.

The demands upon the home are increasing daily and the Pythians of the state cannot turn a deaf ear to the outstretched hands of the little fatherless and motherless children of their brothers.

Mr. Pender has been invited to bring his singing class to Ayden and we are sure the little folks will receive a hearty welcome by the big-hearted citizens of this community.

STATE CORN CROP, IMPROVES GREATLY OVER LAST SEASON

Report of State Department Shows Four Per Cent Increase Over Last Year

Raleigh, Aug. 14.—The corn crop made a four per cent improvement in condition, during July, over the state. The wet weather of the eastern counties did not damage it as much as was expected," reports the Agricultural Statistician, of the Federal and State Departments of Agriculture, as based on the several hundred reports for August 1st conditions.

With a corn condition of 83 per cent on 2,526,000 acres, the forecasted production is 48,508,000 bushels, or 19 bushels per acre, which is still below the ten-year state average. The national crop is also better at 85.6 per cent condition, indicating over three billion bushels.

Wheat at 9 bushels per acre is poor, but better than for the past two years. The forecasted production is 5,508,000 bushels, or less than half of the state's food requirements. The quality is only fair, due to poor development during the ripening stage. The United States average of fourteen bushels per acre forecasts a production of 341,400,000 bushels which does not include the spring-planted northwestern crop.

The state wheat crop shows an increase of one million bushels, or 22 per cent more than last year, while the United States crop is 485,000,000 bushels, or 17 per cent less than the last crop.

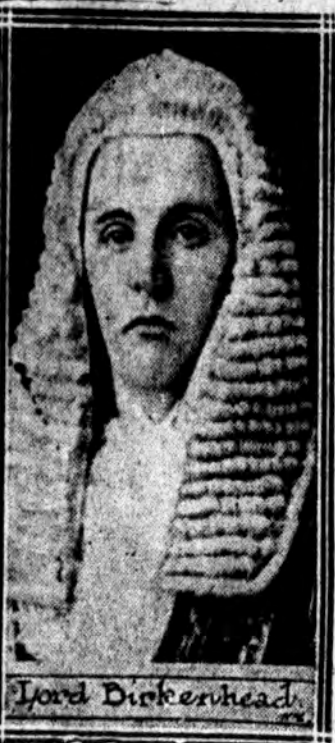
The cotton belt outlook, judging from the present conditions, and if favorable conditions follow, forecasts a crop of over eleven million bales, at 73 per cent of a full crop—normal condition. The boll weevil has done very little damage yet, but this is only the early part of his working season. Less than half of our cotton area is yet infested and only a few counties seriously so. The state condition of 77 per cent is about the same as for the past two years for cotton, with the acreage much more than last year and almost equal to the 1920 crop.

With an average condition of 82 per cent of a full crop, the probable yield of oats will be 3,283,000. The condition is almost seven per cent less, but our yield is much less than the average national average.

CADDIES WORKERS? THE LAW MUST ANSWER

Raleigh, Aug. 14.—Is caddying employment or pleasure? This is the problem that the Minimum Labor must solve. Under the law providing for unemployment compensation, employers are forced to pay a certain amount in unemployment insurance every week. The question arises whether golf clubs are forced to pay unemployment compensation for caddies, and it is to be determined whether caddying is em-
