

TOBACCO MAKES HIGHER AVERAGE THAN LAST YEAR

Local Market Sold Over Three Hundred Thousand, Averaging \$23.46

FARMERS ADVISED GRADE WELL AND MARKET WEED DRY

General Satisfaction Prevailed Yesterday and Today; Tobacco in High Order

The Greenville tobacco market for the sale of the bright leaf at auction opened in this city yesterday selling 311,956 pounds at an average of \$23.46 per hundred as compared with the average of \$17.28 per hundred on last year's opening, showing a gain of \$6.18 per hundred pounds. Although the bulk of the tobacco on yesterday's sale was of a very low type prices ranged from \$4 to \$100 per hundred. The common grades are much higher than last season but the warehousemen are advising the farmers not to market their tobacco in high order as there is very little demand for it. Everybody who witnessed yesterday's sales were more than pleased with the triple sales plan, that is now being used on the local market, realizing that the warehouses are better prepared to look after the farmers' interest and early sales enable them to dispose of their offerings and return home the same day.

Today's sales were much lighter than yesterday with the price equally as good and everyone is optimistic over the present outlook.

WAR SURPLUS USED TO BUILD HIGHWAYS

Trucks, Autos, Tractors and Miscellaneous Material and Equipment Distributed

(By International News.)
Washington, Aug. 15.—Up to July 1 surplus war material valued at \$139,773,986 was delivered to the States for use in road construction, according to a report of the bureau of public roads of the agriculture department.

The material, which consisted of all sorts of supplies and equipment suitable for road building for which the war department had no further need, was distributed on the same basis as monetary Federal aid.

New York and Texas lead in value of material delivered, with nearly \$8,000,000 worth, and every state, with the exception of five of the smaller ones, received supplies valued at more than \$1,000,000.

"This material has been of great value in road construction," said an official of the bureau of public roads, "and there is hardly a county in the United States in which some of it has not been used."

"Probably of greatest value has been the 29,325 motor vehicles distributed, consisting of 24,752 trucks and 4,573 automobiles and, in addition, a large number of tractors."

The system of distribution, the bureau stated, has been so arranged that the States requisition only material useful to them. In some cases they fall behind in allotments in order to wait for material particularly desired.

Great ingenuity has been shown by many States in conditioning worn equipment, using war material to equip shops in which other war material is made suitable for use, according to government observers.

A large quantity of material still remains in the United States for distribution, the bureau stated. This will be further increased by supplies used by the army of occupation in Germany soon to be brought back.

Hubby struck when they attacked his wages and lost. Willy now strikes when the grocer charges the extra cents on the flour and sugar and the butcher for his increased rates on the viands, and again hubby loses; he has got to go without. Many commodities are dearer considerably than they were in the spring. In all the cost of living has gone up ten points.

MOORE COUNTY NEGROES TO DIE ON SEPTEMBER 15

Carried to Raleigh Under Military Guard After the Trial

JURY NEEDED ONLY SEVEN MINUTES TO REACH VERDICT

Angus Murphy and Joseph Thomas Sentenced to Die in Electric Chair

Carthage, Aug. 15.—Seven minutes after they had retired to weigh the evidence against Angus Murphy and Joseph Thomas, negroes charged with criminal assault upon Mrs. A. E. Ketchen, the jury was back in the box declaring to the court that both defendants had been adjudged guilty of rape and within the hour both had been sentenced by Judge B. F. Long to be executed September 15. The verdict was returned a 4:35 this afternoon.

Two thousand and more people who crowded around the improvised bar in the tobacco warehouse where the court is sitting heard the verdict and the sentence in silence. Word was passed outside where hundreds waited in the rain for the jury's decision. The woman against whom the crime was done looked on calmly, and only the Murphy negro showed emotion. He wept silently.

Tonight the two doomed negroes, and the third, John Lee, who submitted to a charge secret assault, were taken back to Raleigh under the guard of detachments from the Durham Machine Gun Company and the Raleigh Service Company, leaving here on a special train. Carthage and Moore county are settled back into their accustomed calm, satisfied with the verdict and glad that it was attained without violence.

Conclusion of the hearing came with a dash of the dramatic at 3:50 this afternoon when Solicitor Nash, who conducted the prosecution and U. L. Spence, speaking for the defense, submitted the evidence without argument and Judge Long began his summary of the testimony and the law. Thirty five minutes later the jury retired and seven minutes later they were back with the fate of the two prisoners sealed.

Both denied their guilt, and throughout more than two hours of the morning session had unfolded a fantastic alibi, the one dittoing the others statements with a precision that might have shaken belief in their guilt. But the State had one more witness, L. L. Honeycutt, a Seaboard flagman who saw them board the freight train on which they were arrested.

Both negroes claimed that they had left Durham on Wednesday afternoon, had gone to Raleigh on Thursday, had left Raleigh on a freight train at 9 o'clock that night, and had encountered two negroes at a station between Southern Pines and Sanford from whom they swore they bought the items of Mrs. Ketchen's personal property found on them. The young negro, John Lee, arrested with them, and whose evidence did them most serious damage, had joined them early in the morning on the train, they said.

Judge W. F. Harding announced at the opening of the regular term of superior court here today.

MINERS IN SEVEN STATES TO RETURN TO THEIR POSTS

Miners Are Ordered to Return to Their Posts Immediately by the Union

ONLY PARTIAL SETTLEMENT OF THE STRIKE

John L. Lewis Expresses Hope That Mines Will be in Operation Within Short Time

Cleveland, Aug. 15.—Immediate resumption of coal production in bituminous mines scattered over seven states was ordered tonight, and in some places the cutting of coal will be started tomorrow. Orders for miners to return to work were sent by district union officials after operators had signed an agreement renewing wage contracts that were in force when the men quit the mines last March 31.

The formal break in the strike came at 3:10 p. m., when the scale agreement was adopted by the unanimous vote of miners and operators at their joint conference. The general agreement then was signed by T. K. Maher, of Cleveland, an operator, as chairman of the conference, and William Green, a miner, as its secretary. Supplemental agreements between operators and state union officials were then executed with the union chiefs wiring local unions that work might be renewed.

President John L. Lewis, of the miners, said that operators controlling an annual output of approximately 60,000,000 tons had signed the agreement. Their mines, he said, were in West Virginia, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana, Michigan, Oklahoma and Washington. James Paisley, one of the big operators signing the agreement, announced that his mines in Charleston, Fairmont, Elm Grove and Morgantown, W. Va.; Valley Camp and Monongahel City and Lafferty and Staunton, Ohio, would be opened tomorrow.

Plans for extending the break of the strike also were laid by the union men. Frank Farrington, the Illinois president, announced that he would ask the Illinois operators to meet the union's district scale committee at Chicago on Friday. John Hessler, head of the Indiana miners, also asked the Indiana operators to join in a scale conference at Terre Haute on the same day. Van A. Gittner, statistician for the international union, announced that operators from Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma, Texas and Arkansas would be asked to meet with the union at Kansas City next Tuesday.

Under the policy laid down by the union, operators will be required to accept the interstate agreement, made at the general conference here, as the basis for their contracts with the union. This agreement provides for the re-establishment of the wage contracts, which includes the "check-off" of union dues that were in force last March 31, with the new contract to run until March 31, 1923. Further the agreement provides for creation of an advisory fact-finding committee, a meeting being called of all soft coal operators for next October to effect the selection of the committee.

Both the miners and the operators held separate meetings to ratify the agreement before joining the afternoon meeting, where unanimous voting was made, followed by signing of the documents.

ARCHAEOLOGICAL UNCOVER A PRE-HISTORIC CITY

Chicago, Aug. 15.—The ruins of an ancient city of great size, hitherto unknown, has been uncovered in Columbia by the South American Archaeological expedition of the field museum of natural history of Chicago. Ruins of the city or a collection of villages, are a portion of Columbia now uninhabited and almost unknown to science. It is evident the museum announced today, that this was once one of the great centers of population of the world but today even the name is unknown.

It seems that strikes are becoming a fad. First the coal strike, which is about to be settled after a duration of about four and one half months, then the railroad strike not mentioning the mine strikes which are taking place every day. If necessity is the mother of invention it is a great pity that necessary steps cannot be taken to stop such forms of disorder so that our country can return to normal conditions.

Judging from the list of teachers who are to compose the faculty of the city schools for the next session we are about to enter one of the most successful years along educational lines. It was a splendid representative body of Pitt county citizens who went on the automobile tour of South Carolina, Georgia and Florida and that they brought back something worth while on diversified farming and combatting the bill weevil goes without saying. They made a careful study of the marketing facilities which have been provided for diversified farm products in the above named states and the information will be very instructive to the people of this section.

The Eastern Carolina Exposition, a project recently recommended at a meeting of the directors of the Eastern Chamber of Commerce which was held in Wilson, is receiving favorable comment on all sides. If the project materializes it will be one of the best advertising mediums for this section of the state as it will show to the outside world what we are doing along educational and industrial lines. The Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce is composed of splendid business men both from the cities and the rural districts and is doing more to bring the town and country together than any one thing. The members of the local chamber are heartily in favor of the exposition and are giving to it their undivided support.

The business depression which has been so noticeable of late will be relieved to no little extent now that the tobacco market has opened with good prices prevailing. It is predicted that the tobacco will sell well throughout the season and if so the return of business activity will continue uninterrupted.

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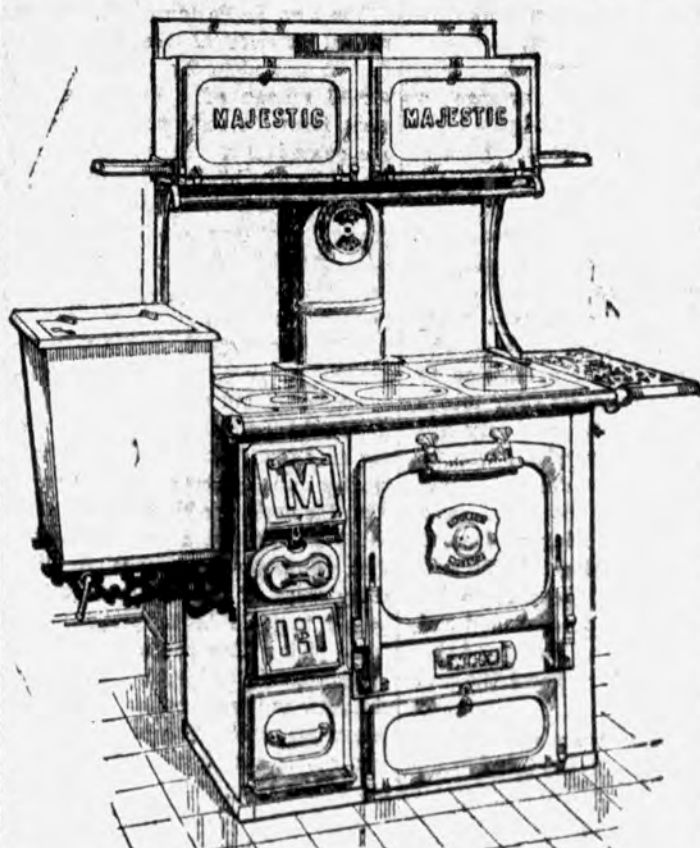

FOR YEAR 1922-23

ORDINANCES

Town of Greenville Revenue and Taxation.

Section One: That the following special and privilege license tax here with levied, shall be collected for the year beginning, July 1st, 1922 and ending June 30th, 1923:

Amusements—Merry-go-rounds, stands or places for games or places used for profits, \$2.50 per day.

Amusements—Shooting galleries or switch back railways or any other place of any kind of games without a name, \$25.00 per year.

Agencies—Collection agencies, \$25.00 per year.

Agriculture—Implement dealers in that are either stored or sold in town \$10.00 per year.

Auctioneer—Public \$10.00 per year.

Auction House—\$50.00 per year.

Auction Sale—(Real estate) \$25 per day.

Auction Sale—(Real estate) local town Co., \$10.00 per day.

Automobiles—When used as common carriers of persons or passengers for hire, \$15.00 for each machine per year.

Automobiles—Any person, firm or corporation selling or dealing in automobiles \$75.00 per year.

Automobiles—On garages where automobiles are stored or repaired, in addition to automobile dealers specially license tax, \$25.00 per year.

Section Two—That the privilege tax or license levied as above set out and specified, shall be collected from all persons, firm or corporation according to the above schedule, who shall have been operating or doing business on and after July 1st, 1922, and to all of the aforesaid privileges or special license not paid October 1st, 1922 there shall be added and collected a penalty of 10 per cent on the original amount named in said schedule; provided this penalty shall not apply to operations begun on and after October 1st, 1922; and in cases where the aforesaid privilege tax or license have not been paid by January 1st, 1923 there shall be added and collected in addition to the amount specified in the schedule, 25 per cent thereof as a penalty for failure to pay on or before January 1st, 1923; provided this penalty shall not attach unless operations are begun prior to January 1st, 1923.

Section Three—That it shall be the duty of every person liable to any license under this act to exhibit his license to any officer (police) of the city and upon failure to do so every such person may be arrested and

held to answer the charge, and it shall be unlawful for any person to carry on or practice any itinerant trade, business or profession for a license is required under this ordinance without having in his actual possession at the time of so carrying on or practicing such trade, business or profession, said license or duplicate thereof. And it is expressly made the duty of the chief of police and police officers of the city to inspect each and every place or location where such trade, business or profession is carried on and see that said license tax is not only paid, but posted in a conspicuous place.

Section Four—That no person shall do any business or trade for which a town license or tax is required before same is paid, every license shall be a personal privilege and shall not be transferrable. All licenses shall be revocable at the pleasure of the board, upon the recommendation of the Mayor and Chief of Police, or for a violation of any criminal law of the state or any city ordinance, or for any cause which the board may deem sufficient. When license is revoked no refund will be made.

Section Five—That all persons violating any of the provisions of the foregoing ordinance, shall upon conviction pay a fine of \$50.00 for each and every offense.

The foregoing is a true and correct copy of the ordinance adopted by the board of aldermen of the town of Greenville at the regular August meeting 1922.
