Local Fan Protests Action of President In Game Yesterday

Says President Horton Disregarded Dignity of His Position With East Carolina League When He Left Grand Stand to Advise Farmville Manager to Protest Game On Ineligibility of Boehling

All the world loves true sportsmanship, but even the devil hates a yellow back quitter who will, at the last moment, take an unfair advantage to snatch from an opponent a victory honorably earned.

Baseball is the greatest of sports when maintained on a true sportsmanlike basis, but when it drops to the low ebb of trickery and chicanery it ceases to be a sport and becomes a juggery to be indulged in by spys and other hirelings of manipulators.

It is to be regretted that the Right Honorable Judge J. APPOINT COMMITTEE

ON MEDICAL SCHOOL

Doctor C. O'H. Laughinghouse of Greenville on Committee.

Greensboro, Aug. 16.—Dr. J. W. Long, president of the North Carolina Medical Society, has appointed a committee of 30 members of the society to take some action on the proposed four-year medical school to be established by the University of North Carolina. Dr. L. W. Faison, of Charlotte, is chairman of the committee. The committee will probably meet some time in the early autumn.

The location of the school and accompanying hospital is the liveliest matter for the committee. Charlotte is making a determined effort to secure it. The trustees of the University recommended in June that it be established at Chapel Hill.

G. V. MORRISON TO INVESTIGATE SPENCER TROUBLE

Notifies Adjutant General to be Ready to Act At Any Time

Spencer, Aug. 17.—Governor Morrison is en route here to confer with the sheriff over the situation in the Southern Railway shops where 17 hundred are striking. He has instructed the adjutant general to hold state troops in readiness.

Governor Cameron Morrison, will go to Spencer shops of the Southern Railroad today on his way from Blowing Rock to Raleigh and make a personal investigation of the situation there, following calls for troops from the sheriff of Rowan county.

A statement to this effect was authorized shortly before midnight last night by Governor Morrison who communicated with his Private Secretary William H. Richardson, at Raleigh, by long distance telephone.

"I will leave Blowing Rock at sun-up tomorrow morning, reaching Raleigh by night," says the statement, authorized by the Governor.

"Vigorous appeals have been made upon me by the sheriff of Rowan county for State troops to be sent to Spencer. I am withholding my decision until I can go to Salisbury and look into the matter personally. I will stop there on my way to Raleigh and will have a conference with the sheriff."

"While I have made no order calling out troops, I have notified the adjutant general's office at Raleigh to be ready to act upon a moment's notice."

The Charlotte Company of the North Carolina National Guard was instructed by the Adjutant General's office last night to hold his company in readiness for orders.

Quite prevails in the Spencer strike situation, without the slightest semblance of disorder attending the efforts of the Southern Railway to break the strike there, according to statements made to the News and Observer over long distance telephone last night by Chief of Police J. R. Cruse and by Master Mechanic McBryde.

Prices Remain Unchanged On the Tobacco Market

The local tobacco market sold approximately one hundred and twenty-five thousand pounds today. The averages on all grades remaining about the same as opening day. It is quite noticeable on all the floors that many of the growers are marketing the weed in a too high state of order. This of course will cause decline in prices, because unless such tobaccos are handled immediately the buyer will in all probability be the loser. The warehousemen are advising the farmers to grade their crops well and market the tobacco only when it is dry.

SEEK ARMFIELD FOR JUDGMENTS

Thomasville Banker's Disappeared Since His Aitall.

Greensboro, Aug. 17.—Four transcripts of judgments against J. L. Armfield, former president of the defunct Bank of Thomasville, were received today for service against Armfield by the Guilford county clerk of court, who is unable to serve them, the whereabouts of Armfield being unknown to him. The four judgments amount to \$64,422.

One of them is against J. L. Armfield as the Dixie Manufacturing Company, for \$25,000 against him as a partner in the Armfield, Griffith Company for \$4,282; another against him as an individual and the Gate City Trust Company, for \$30,247, and the fourth against him as an individual and partner in the Shaw Lumber Company, for \$29,924.

They are an echo of the failure of the bank and were secured by T. J. Flach, receiver of the bank, sent here by S. J. Smith, clerk of court of Davidson county.

Armfield was reported to have entered a sanitarium at Richmond, Va., after his acquittal on charges of misappropriation of funds of the bank, but it is not known here where he is now, and serve of the judgments will have to wait that knowledge.

Washington, Aug. 17.—An agreement between the anthracite operators and representatives of the United Mine workers will be effected before nightfall according to information received by Secretary of Labor, Davis, from observers of the department of labor who are attending the Philadelphia conference. It is stated by officials of the labor department that unless some unexpected hitch occurs the miners will be back at work Monday.

FIND MAN GUILTY ON BIG SWINDLE CHARGE

(By International News.)

Greensboro, Aug. 16.—Claude Schofield, young Guilford county white man, was convicted this afternoon in the Guilford Superior Court of swindling the American Exchange National Bank here out of ten thousand dollars last April 19 by means of a forged check. Sentence will be passed tomorrow. A sentence of one to twenty years is permissible.

His brother, Clarence Schofield, tried on the charge of complicity in the swindle, was declared not guilty. It was the biggest swindle of its kind in the history of this city. A teller paid out the money under the impression that it was a genuine payroll check, and the forgery was not discovered until the check came back from a Richmond bank on which it was drawn. None of the money has been found.

Brotherhood Men to Meet Rail Heads In New York Today

Some Hope for Settlement of Railroad Strike Seen In Today's Conference In New York When Brotherhood Leaders Meet Committee Representing Association of Railway Executives

LABOR FEDERATION ENDS CONSTRUCTIVE ANNUAL MEETING

One of Best Meetings Ever Held in History of Federation Comes to An End

Wilmington, Aug. 16.—Turning its back on the late year of storm and facing what appears will be a year of calm within the rank and file of the organization, the sixteenth annual convention of the North Carolina State Federation of Labor, adjourned this morning at Wrightsville Beach, concluding the calmest and most constructive meeting in the history of the Federation.

Just before adjourning the Federation adopted strong resolutions condemning the proposed ship subsidy bill as a "free gift to capital" for which "the people must pay," and predicting that the enactment of such a measure "would tend to further aggravate the serious industrial situation now existing in the United States."

Only a short morning session was held this morning, as most of the business had previously been transacted the officers elected yesterday afternoon, and the majority of the delegates returned to their homes last night. The proceedings today were featured by the installation of the new officers. Major W. F. Moody, of Raleigh, who presided over the meeting, installing the new officials.

The following officers were installed: James M. Ellis, of Spencer, president; H. C. Caldwell, of Asheville, vice-president; Hugh Pace, of Wilmington, second vice-president; H. F. Allred, of Greensboro, third vice-president; C. V. Jones, of Huntersville, fourth vice-president; Charles G. Worley, of Asheville, secretary-treasurer; Rev. J. Obellon, of Mount Airy, chaplain; C. A. Wilson, of Spencer, sergeant-at-arms.

James F. Barrett, retiring president, who was prevented from attending on account of confinement in Asheville hospital, submitted a written report to the convention, but the report was tabled and was not read to the delegates, because it was alleged to contain expression of Mr. Barrett's first and second choice of a candidate to succeed himself. However, after the convention ordered the report tabled, the committee on officers reports reported on Mr. Barrett's message, recommending that his report be read before the convention, except that part we have obliterated.

First Hearing In Byfield - Candler Suit September 2

(By International News.)

Atlanta, Aug. 17.—Both sides of the Byfield-Candler row have marked time since the filing of a hundred thousand dollar damage suit against Walter Candler by Mrs. Byfield. All parties concerned are apparently content to let matters stand until the first suit hearing on September 2.

New York, Aug. 17.—Leaders of the Big Four Brotherhood of Railroads and a committee representing the association of Railway Executives will meet this afternoon in what is expected to be the most important conference since the beginning of the rail strike. A plan for ending the strike was worked out by the heads of sixteen standard railroads at a conference in Washington and will be presented at this afternoon's session here. Definite progress toward settlement or a final decision to fight to a finish is expected as a result.

Washington, Aug. 17.—President Harding decided not to appear in congress today to deliver a message on the industrial situation. He telephoned Senator Watson, of Indiana that he would not go to the capitol today and if the New York peace conference this afternoon is successful he might not think it necessary to go at all.

Washington, Aug. 16.—Agreement between railroad executives and labor organization leaders to hold another conference tomorrow in New York to seek a settlement of the shopmen's strike, it was said today, had resulted in President Harding questioning the desirability of making his expected report to congress and the country on the strike situation within the next few hours. Plans made for the reception of his communication tomorrow at a joint session of the house and senate consequently were understood to be on the verge of a revision tonight, as the President was represented as being desirous of withholding his statement of the case if the unions' chiefs and the railroad presidents could hold out any prospects of a mutually satisfactory settlement.

Heads of the seven labor organizations on strike met today with the officials of unions not involved in the controversy, and after some delay reached a decision to take almost the entire group to New York for the discussions with the executives. Though officers of the five organizations of train service employees, the engineers, firemen, conductors, brake men, and switchmen will be the only ones actually to meet with the committee of railway executives, their chairman, Warren S. Stone, declared they desired close at hand all the strike leaders and the spokesman for all the other railroad unions. Some objection to this plan developed among the strike leaders, but they finally arranged to send most of their group, including B. M. Jewell, their chairman, to New York, and to call in all concerned in case any settlement proposals emerged from the discussions.

Second Primary for Miss. Senator To Be Held Sept. 5

Jackson, Miss., Aug. 17.—Complete unofficial returns of the entire state gave Vardaman's lead of six or seven thousand over Hubert Stephens in the race for Senatorship. It has been announced that the date for the second primary may be changed to September 5.

"Congress will tackle railroad strike," says a headline. Evidently it finds that nothing was gained by ignoring the coal strike for months. They have learned by this time that a stitch in time saves nine and are going to work on the railroad strike before it reaches alarming proportions.

Judge Harding spoke a great truth in Guilford county court when he said that law obedience is needed rather than law enforcement. Some men seem to take great pleasure in evading the laws. The weak always follow the strong and if those who know the laws would be law abiding citizens there would be no need of law enforcement?

The benefits to be derived from the widening of Dickinson Avenue are more noticeable now than at any other time since the work was finished as large tobacco trucks can easily pass automobiles without blocking traffic as was the case during the tobacco seasons heretofore.

It is to be regretted that some people regard their lives and the lives of others so lightly that they take great pleasure in seeing how fast they can drive on the hard surfaced roads which lead from this city to Farmville and Ayden. A motorcycle cop is needed badly on these thoroughfares and money could not be better spent than to pay a man to stay on the road and see that the speeders are brought to justice. The sooner it is done the better it will be for all parties concerned.

Reduced rates from all points in North Carolina and Virginia to the American Legion Convention which will be held in Greensboro in September has been announced by the Southeastern Passenger Association. It is to be hoped that a large number of the legionnaires will take advantage of the reduced rates and attend what promises to be one of the largest conventions ever held in this state, the results of which will be far reaching.

The announcement of the coal strike ending will be gladly received in all sections of the country. Coal is something that is absolutely necessary and if the strike had continued until the winter much suffering would have been caused and business along all lines would have received a great set back. It is to be hoped that the work in the mines will be continued from now on without any interruption.

OUR TRADE WITH JAPAN INCREASES WHILE OTHER COUNTRIES DECREASE.

Japan is the one important country of the world with which our 1922 trade shows an increase. Our imports from the whole world in the fiscal year 1922, says the Trade Record of the National Bank of New York, show a fall of 28 per cent in value while from Japan alone, our imports show an increase of 18 per cent. The 1922 exports to the whole world show a reduction of 42 per cent in value while those to Japan show an increase of 30 per cent. The imports from Japan in the fiscal year 1922 approximate \$300,000,000 against \$253,000,000 in the fiscal year 1921, and the exports to that country in 1922 were approximately \$245,000,000 against \$189,000,000 in the preceding year. This estimate of the 1922 trade with Japan, adds the Trade Record, is based upon official figures of eleven months while those of the trade with the whole world during the full fiscal year are official.

Practically all of the increase in our imports from Japan occurs in raw silk while the increase on the export side includes a large number of manufactured articles. True, raw cotton is the biggest single item in our exports to Japan but the number of manufactured articles which that country now takes from the United States is steadily increasing and in

a dozen or more of the important manufactures the figures of 1922 while in most cases the increase in quantity is much greater than that of mere value.

Of refined copper the exports to Japan in the eleven months of the fiscal year of 1922 for which details are now available are over eleven million dollars in value against less than a half million in the same months of last year, while the quantity in 1922 is eighty-seven million pounds against less than one million in the preceding year. Of lumber the exports to Japan in the eleven months of 1922 are valued at eight and one-half million dollars against one and one-half million in the preceding year and the quantity 376,000 M feet against 45,000 M a year earlier. Steel sheets aggregate in value in 1922 approximately eighteen million dollars against about five million dollars last year, while the quantity in the eleven months of 1922 is 557,000, 600 pounds against 72,000,000 in the same months of the preceding year. Zinc in the eleven months of 1922 is twelve million pounds against less than a half million last year. Other articles which show increases in value in 1922 as compared with the preceding year are sole leather, kid upper leather, gas and fuel oil, gasoline, paraffin, resin, wire, raisins, and, curiously, rice, grown in the United States, for the first time appears in the official list of articles exported to Japan, one of the great rice-growing countries of the world.

PACIFIC TRADE IS SHOWING INCREASE

San Francisco, Cal., Aug. 14.—Pacific trade is picking up.

Statistics for San Francisco port compiled by Jerry Dailey, manager of the Marine Department of the Chamber of Commerce, show that ship arrivals for the first six months of 1922 increased 878 over the same period in 1921. The figures for 1921 were 1,838, and the figures just compiled for 1922 show 2,621 vessels arriving.

Even more illuminating as to trade conditions is the tonnage record. For the first six months of 1921 the ship tonnage arrivals totalled 5,180,000 tons, while the ship tonnage of arrivals for the first six months of 1922 was 4,955,658—an increase of 1,436,989 tons.

Ship departures show a similar leap. During the first six months of 1921 they totalled 1,795, while the total for the first six months of 1922 was 2,673. Ship tonnage in departures increased 1,515,23 tons in the first half of 1922 over the similar period of a year ago. The figures for 1922 were 4,941,749 and those of 1921 3,426,518.

According to shipping men cargo offerings are now so heavy that ships on the Orient, Central America and New York runs of the various companies operating on these routes are unable to take it all, frequently leaving many tons for the next vessel.

An interesting feature of the statistics for ship arrival tonnage was the fact that during the first six months of 1921 sailing vessels accounted for 128,00 tons, while for the first half of 1922 sailing vessels accounted for only 49,459 tons, despite the big general increase in tonnage. Outgoing in 1921 132,765 tons of the aggregate tonnage was represented by sailing vessels, while in the same period of 1922 only 94,005 tons represented sailing vessels.

CROP REPORTS SHOW ABUNDANT YIELDS

Washington, Aug. 8.—Bumper crop production in general this year resulting from highly favorable growing conditions during July was indicated by the government's August crop report issued today.

A three billion bushel corn crop for the fourth time in the history of farming in the United States was forecast.

A record crop of hay estimated at 93,100,000 tons is being harvested, surpassing the record made in 1919 by 1,300,000 tons.

The second largest crop of white

potatoes ever grown was reported in prospect, the total production being forecast at 440,000,000 bushels, or 2,000,000 bushels less than the record crop of 1917.

Sweet potato production this year probably will make another record, according to the August forecast, while equals the record crop of 1920.

The fourth largest crop of tobacco ever grown is forecast with a total production of 1,425,000,000 pounds.

Another 200,000,000 bushel crop of apples, the eleventh in 33 years, is indicated with this year's production more than double that of last year.

Peaches are plentiful with a total production this year second only to the record year of 1915.

July's weather influence on the growing crops was said to have been extremely beneficial, as indicated by the increase in forecast of production

this month as compared with those of a month ago. Spring wheat showed an increase in its production, forecast amounting to 150,000,000 bushels; corn, 175,000,000 bushels; oats, 64,000,000 bushels; barley, 10,000,000 bushels; white potatoes, 11,000,000,000; tobacco, 10,000,000 pounds; apples 12,000,000 bushels and peaches 1,700,000 bushels.

steps into the ring with Dempsey next September he will have everything to win and nothing to lose, and furthermore that Dempsey is a smart little boxer and a terrific hitter.

Willard is using a great deal of system about his present training. Five or six rounds of boxing, skipping the rope, shadow boxing and taking a long road jaunt and a few body punches make up his programme. He has no trainer—a few friends help him by holding the watch and making themselves useful in general.
