

League President Makes Statement Regarding Action

Judge Horton Sets Forth Facts Regarding Action in Monday's Game

MEETING OF DIRECTORS BE HELD TONIGHT TO SETTLE PROTESTS, SAID

Ready to Resign as Head of League if Friendly Relations Cannot Exist

In an interview with Judge J. Lloyd Horton, president of the Eastern Carolina League, regarding the article which appeared in this paper yesterday condemning him for his action in protesting Monday's game between Farmville and Greenville, he stated that he wished to go into no controversy that would have any tendency towards separating two Pitt county towns over so small a matter as a game of baseball. He further stated that his position with the Farmville club was in a way wished upon him rather than sought when he with a few other loyal citizens came to the rescue of the team when it was about to go on the rocks and withdraw from the league owing to financial conditions.

He said that he felt that the severe criticism of him was unjust as he did not act in the capacity of a league official in protesting the game but merely furnished the funds which it was necessary to put up in order to protest upon request of the captain of the Farmville team.

Judge Horton also stated that he called a meeting of the league directors for tonight and that he had wired the vice-president requesting him to be on hand to preside over the meeting and do all the voting to be done in case of a tie. If for any reason the vice-president cannot be present at the meeting it is the intention of Judge Horton, if the people of Greenville feel that he would not give them fair and impartial decision, at the beginning of the meeting to resign his office in order that another president may be elected before the protested games are brought up for discussion, as he wishes to do everything possible for the league and clean baseball and desires no hard feelings to exist.

PRESIDENT HARDING BEFORE CONGRESS IN REGARD TO STRIKES

Recommends That National Coal Commission be Created to Investigate Industry

Washington, Aug. 18.—President Harding went to congress today and told the full story of the twin coal and rail strikes and asked the legislation to deal with the present situation so as to safeguard against its repetition. In the coal situation he recommended that it be given authority to create a national coal commission to investigate the whole industry congress will consider immediately the creation of a temporary national coal agency with capital to purchase, sell and distribute coal carried by interstate commerce. In the rail strike he didn't recommend any legislation except that relating to the protection of the alien workmen. He severely criticized both carriers and unions and declared the labor board inadequate. He affirmed the government's determination to maintain transportation at any cost.

New York, Aug. 18.—Progress towards the settlement of the rail strike it is believed was made at the conference of railway executives and brotherhood leaders today. After two half hour sessions the conference recessed until three o'clock to allow the brotherhood leaders to confer with other railroad union leaders.

NO SHORTAGE OF COAL IS EXPECTED BY SEC. HOOVER

Hoover Thinks Resumption of Coal Production Will Avert Serious Trouble

LEGISLATION TO GIVE GOVERNMENT POWER TO DISTRIBUTE COAL

Federal Control Will be Necessary to See That Shortage of Coal is Averted

Washington, Aug. 17.—Early resumption of coal production in the union fields covered by the Cleveland agreement was looked to today by administration officials to avert fuel troubles throughout the country next winter.

If the miners in those fields return to work within the next few days, Secretary Hoover declared, there should be no serious shortage of coal during the winter, although there may be some minor inconveniences. Production of approximately 10,000,000 tons of coal weekly would be up of about four-fifths of the bituminous and one-fifth anthracite will be needed, according to Federal Fuel Distributor Spencer.

Even with adequate production, Mr. Hoover asserted, action by Congress will be necessary to enable federal price control temporarily to facilitate the distribution of anthracite and to supply the needs of the Northwest.

"With the resumption of mining," he said, "the price situation will be quickly over. While there will be some control of distribution and prices necessary temporarily, the matter will quickly adjust itself."

Collapse of the fair price agreements made with producing operators, however, when the union mines resume production, was indicated by Mr. Hoover. There would be then 75 or 80 districts, he explained, to hold into line as to prices by voluntary means, "which would be an impossible machine" considering the difficulty experienced with the mines now in the price agreements.

Nevertheless, Mr. Hoover declared, the results of the fair price agreements thus far have constituted a "remarkable showing" with 70 per cent of the coal now moving being handled under the established maximums of from \$2.20 to \$2.75 a ton.

Difficulty in the price situation, he asserted, arose from the other 30 per cent which gave rise to the charges of profiteering while operators observing the agreements were passing up from \$8 to \$10 on every ton of coal sold.

Emergency price control legislation, which it is understood President Harding will suggest in his message to congress tomorrow, would apply only to coal moving in interstate commerce, in the opinion of the commerce secretary. According to the first advice at hand, he contended, the Federal authority cannot extend to coal transportation within the United States and the control of speculation, and the prices charged by wholesalers and retailers on interstate sales would be up to the state authorities.

The board also elected Guy Catoh of Greenville, and Samuel Worthington of Ayden as members of the police force. The new officers will enter upon their official duties next Monday.

The resignation of Evans was the outcome of his suspension by the mayor for six days, drawing out of a disturbance which occurred in the colored section of the city last Saturday night.

GOV. MORRISON WILL NOT SEND TROOPS, SPENCER

Governor Holds Conference With Railroad Attorneys and Striking Shopmen

TALKS WITH THEM FOR FOUR HOURS IN DISCUSSING STRIKE

Men Are Under Orders to Persuade People Not to Take Jobs; Can't Force Them

Salisbury, Aug. 17.—Governor Morrison will not order troops to Spencer in connection with the strike in the Southern Railway shops at this time, he announced late today after conferences lasting nearly four hours with Sheriff Krider and special guards, railway attorneys, President J. M. Ellis, of the North Carolina Federation of Labor, and the strike committee. Future action will depend upon later developments, Governor Morrison said.

The Governor arrived here this afternoon on his way back home from Blowing Rock. The Governor had engagements with parties interested in the strike situation and he talked with different delegations for four hours, leaving at six o'clock for Raleigh.

To those who thought troops should be sent here the Governor said, "Put the evidence of such need in writing and send it to me." To Mr. Ellis and others representing the striking shopmen he said, "You must keep the men within the law." This they promised to do.

The governor declared that when he sent troops he sent them not against the strikers, but sent them with written orders to treat all law-abiding citizens alike. "Only the men who desire to break the law need fear any troops that I send," said the governor, "for I send them under orders that are almost unparalleled in the world's history," and he quoted Samuel Gompers' commendation of his proclamation and orders in the Concord strike case.

"Peaceful picketing may continue," said the governor, "but the men on picket duty must remember that they are not to use force."

The governor expressed admiration for the men who appeared before him, representing the strikers' side of the controversy, and hoped that they would be able to keep their men in check. It was expected that Governor Morrison would visit the shops and see for himself how picketing is being done. He thought this unnecessary. He was invited to remain here for tomorrow's meeting of the craftsmen and address them, but he declined this invitation, leaving a message to the men for Mr. Ellis to deliver.

Mr. Ellis arrived home today from the State Federation meeting and issued a statement in which he denied the existence of conditions that would justify the sending of troops here. The men are under orders to try to persuade in a peaceful manner anybody from taking their jobs but they are forbidden to use force. The men who carry guns on picket duty do so to protect themselves from the negroes of the "Sugar Springs Hill" settlement, according to Mr. Ellis and the pickets have no orders to prevent people from getting on or off of trains.

Picketing continues about the shops and all the railroad property in the two towns, the strikers understanding that the federal injunction secured against them at Asheville yesterday does not prohibit this. Deputy Marshal Swann came here from Asheville at noon and has been spending the afternoon serving the injunction papers on 27 individuals and officers of the various crafts including J. M. Ellis mentioned in the papers.

BOY WHO DERIDED COF IS FINED ONE DOLLAR

We hear un-American this and un-American that so much that really we have something to live for to see what next will be given that name.

Industrial strikes are occurring every day. In fact they seem to be almost an epidemic and a very contagious one. We only hope that it does not reach this immediate section of the country.

If there are only two sides to the railroad strike, settled or fought to a finish it is to be hoped that it will receive immediate settlement if satisfactory terms can be agreed upon so that the country may return to normal conditions.

We have heard of whiskey being made in coffee pots and of stills being found in houses but the recent capture of a man's still in operation on his front porch in a Florida city is a new one. Surely our black-aders will not try their hand at it.

That Ayden, our progressive neighboring city, will have some of the prettiest streets in the state when completed cannot be doubted in the least. Their width makes them not only attractive but far beyond that of the average city street for usefulness.

The capitol gossip that president Harding would not make any specific recommendations to congress when he appeared before them to discuss the railroad strike was surely correct as he did not appear at all. Evidently things are getting too warm for his majesty and he thinks it advisable to pass it on to congress.

While Greenville is making improvements along all lines it would be well to remember that there are still one or two open ditches running right through the heart of the city that need immediate attention. Tilling could be used at a small cost compared to what the open ditches will lead to if left uncovered for any length of time.

It would not be a bad idea if those having the proper authority should pass a law requiring every vehicle to carry a light at night. It is almost impossible to see a buggy or wagon in the shaded spots on the country roads at night by people driving automobiles. It will be too late to take these steps after a serious accident occurs. Several states have already made it a law and it is to be hoped that it will not be long before it becomes a law in this section.

Greenville is one of the progressive towns in eastern North Carolina but unless someone sees fit to build houses for newcomers it will soon reach the place where it will stop growing. It would be a wise investment if some far-sighted men would build several houses. For with the demand just now they could easily be rented. Greenville has conducted one of the biggest building booms for the past several months in the history of the town but more houses are still needed.

MINE UNION OFFICIAL IS CHARGED WITH THEFT

Fairmont, W. Va., Aug.—Gallio R. Tucker, former treasurer of the Laura Lee local of the United States Mine Workers of America, has been brought to jail here charged with embezzling \$320 of the local's funds. He says he did not take the money. He feared handbills, he said, and put the money, which was all in currency, in the inner band of his hat. This proved to be accurate, he said, until he walked along a river bank one day and the wind blew his hat into the river. He went out and got the hat, but the money had disappeared. Tucker was arrested near New Martinsville by Constable C. Q. Stout, who brought him to Clarkburg. Tucker had been working for a road contractor in Wetzel county.

CATALOGUES HAVE BEEN MAILED OUT FOR STATE FAIR

Premiums Totalling \$39,943.75
Are Listed in the Premium
List of the State Fair

Raleigh, Aug. 18.—Premiums totaling \$39,943.75, an amount 50 per cent in excess of what has ever before been offered at a North Carolina fair, are listed in the premium list, of the sixty-first North Carolina State Fair on October 16-21, in which has been mailed out to all known exhibitors by Manager E. V. Walborn. Already 2,500 of the catalogues have been mailed out and the demand for them is brisk, although the entry list will not open until September 1.

A horse show, with prizes aggregating \$1,000, and a dog show, in which prizes equal to half that amount will be offered, will be distinct innovations at the next fair, but for the most part the increase in the total amount of premiums has been obtained by more liberal awards offered for the regular exhibits.

However, in addition to the horse

show and dog show, special attention is being given this year to the racing program, and in order to make the races particularly attractive a total of \$5,000 has been offered in purses, the amount being more than twice what was offered last year.

In all other departments, the general increase of 50 per cent has been rather closely adhered to in the premiums offered. While the same departments have been retained, the organization of the fair has been made more compact and the premium list has been revised to conform to these changes in organization. 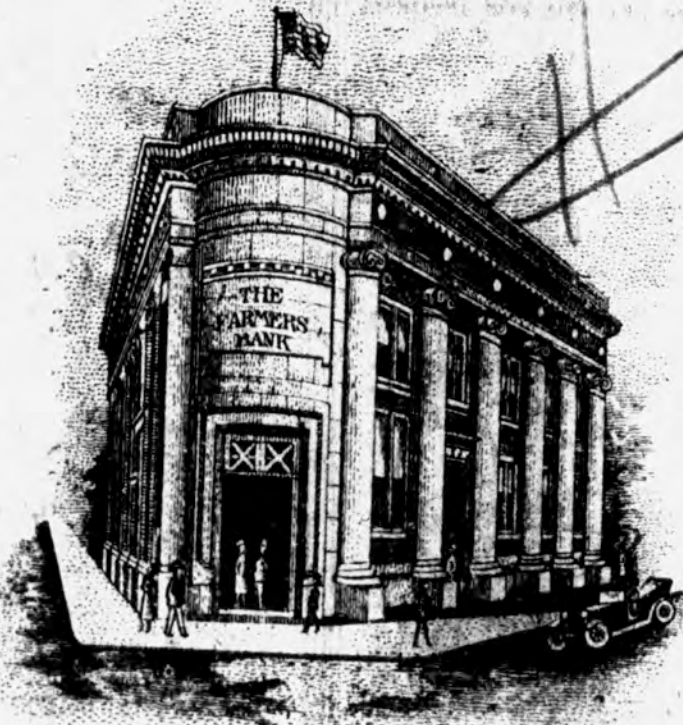

GENERAL CONDITIONS ARE IMPROVING ON THE A. C. L.

The following statement was issued to the public from the General Offices of the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad Company at Wilmington yesterday:

General conditions over the entire system steadily improving. In the last eight days six hundred and seven new employees have been taken into the service at our various shops, a large proportion of which are skilled men; most of them left other employment to secure work with this company at the prevailing rates of pay which are those established by the United States Railroad Labor Board effective July first nineteen twenty-two. This brings the total force of men up to sixty-four per cent of the force employed in the shops on July first when the strike took place. At more than twenty points on the system the normal force is at work. At many other points the

force is from seventy-five per cent to ninety-five per cent normal.

Inspection and repairs to locomotives and cars are being well maintained by the force now at work which is amply sufficient to take care of the situation, although the volume of freight traffic being handled is about fifteen per cent greater than last year.

During the month of July ninety-three per cent of the passenger trains maintained their schedules. The entire movement of perishable freight, consisting of more than four thousand cars most of which originated on the lines of this company, was delivered on time at destination. All other freight was handled promptly. There is no accumulation at any terminal or on the line of road.
