

HARDING'S SPEECH MERE RECITAL OF FACTS IN STRIKE

President Offers Nothing in
Long Message That Could
Give Strength to Issue

SUMS UP THE VALUE
OF LAW ENFORCEMENT
IN SPEECH CONGRESS

Senator Simmons States His
Views as Regard Message
by the President

Washington, Aug. 19.—Congress heard President Harding's message today on the matter of the strikes with interest, for it was expected in some quarters that he would take some definite position as to what should be done at this crisis in American affairs. At some of his rolling sentences whooping up the value of law and order enforcement the Republicans gave most liberal applause, but when it was over there were some who were making inquiry as to "what is it all about." Beyond a mere recital of facts as seen by the President in the matter of the rail strike there was no suggestion of a remedy, of a plan of action, President Harding simply hearing down hard on the declaration that this is a country of law and that the law must and shall be enforced. But he did not let the congress in on the secret as to how he was going to use the law to make the rail employees and the rail executives get together and end the strike.

As Senator Simmons well says of the message of President Harding in regard to dealing with the matter of the railroad strike, it was a declaration of general principles with reference to the duties of the government that nobody disputes, while the possible value of it is summed up by Senator Overman, who said: "I hope that the moral effect of the President's message will be good."

Valiantly and repeatedly President Harding declared that law is supreme in America, that these laws must be obeyed, that there are enough laws to take care of the strike situations as they arrive, but beyond this he got nowhere in the matter of telling how to end the rail strike. With reports that the coal strike about to come to an end his recommendations that there be a commission to investigate coal conditions and that some kind of a Federal board be created to see that the country gets coal in interstate commerce will probably never be put into law. As for a coal investigation that has been going on for years, but still strikes recur.

Agreement May Result in Settling the Rail Strike

New York, Aug. 19.—A Gentleman's agreement which has been reached between executives and railway brotherhoods for settlement of the shopmen's strike could be quickly transacted into a definite settlement for the ending of the strike it is believed. Executives will meet here probably Tuesday to answer.

PRESIDENT HORTON CALLS LEAGUE OFFICIALS IN SESSION TO SETTLE AFFAIRS NOW IN 'HELL OF A MESS'

At Request of Judge Horton, Directors of East
Carolina Circuit Met In Farmville Last Night
to Deprive Greenville of the Fruits of Honest
Victories; Shake Up In Standings

Upon the request of the Honorable J. Lloyd Horton, the league president, who stated that the league's affairs were in a "hell of a mess," and that if Greenville's representative would attend the meeting of the league directors at Farmville on last night, that everything could be harmoniously adjusted, the president of the Greenville club, in company with several of the Greenville fans, journeyed to the alleged "harmonious" meeting, and thereby hangs a tale, from which the public is invited to draw its own conclusions as to whether or not the league directors have played Cricket with Greenville, or whether Greenville has been robbed of the fruits of an honest victory.

The meeting was called to order by the president of the league, all towns being represented. The first business to be taken up was the forfeiture of the games from New Bern to Farmville and Greenville, respectively, on account of the non-appearance of the New Bern teams upon the ball fields at the designated times.

Kinston's representative immediately arose and moved that the two games be not forfeited, but that the games be required to be played off (a shot at Greenville in the interest of clean sport); this motion however did not receive a second, since it would not have redounded to Farmville's benefit to knock this game from its win column, and thereupon Greenville's representative moved that both games be declared forfeited, which motion was carried, and the President moved on to other business, to wit: the contention by Tarboro that Greenville had knowingly moved its home plate some thirteen inches nearer the pitcher's box for the benefit of Greenville's two fast ball artists. Mr. Fountain explaining that Manager Stewart had, upon the suggestion of some of his players, proceeded to our diamond on Tuesday morning after Mark Webb had won his game on Monday previous, and taken measurements, which disclosed the alleged shortage. While Mr. Fountain did not charge any particular person with the alleged rascality, the insinuation and subsequent action of the directors has an unmistakable meaning. After Mr. Fountain's statement, Mr. Dunn for Greenville stated that if there was a shortage of distance between home plate and the pitcher's box, it existed without the knowledge or consent or connivance of any of the officers of Greenville's club; that Manager Smith had been informed upon two occasions by the negro, who looks after the diamond, that he had found the home plate out of the ground, and that he had put the same back, such a condition had occurred on account of Sunday games played by the town boys, or had been dragged up by the drag which goes over the diamond every day; that while Greenville regretted such a condition, there had been no foul play and that Greenville was the innocent victim of a circumstance over which it had no control; that the advantage or disadvantage as the case might be resulted alike to both clubs. This statement was taken as so much "bull," and the vote proceeded. Tarboro, Kinston and Farmville voted to throw out the games. New Bern, Greenville and Washington voted against the motion; thereupon President Horton broke the tie in Greenville's favor, upon the ground, that the alleged defect was remedied.

Having thus taken two games from Greenville, the Judge, that is the President, proceeded to take up the protest against Joe Boehling, of the Greenville team, which he had made in person on the Greenville diamond on Wednesday, further stating that he would hold that Thursday's game was protestable for the same reason regardless to the rule of the league that a deposit of \$25 must be made with the umpire at the time of the protest. Immediately, Mr. Dunn arose and stated that he had advised the management of the Greenville team that Wednesday's protest was good and that Greenville would not oppose the forfeiture of this game to Farmville, but that there was no reason or fairness in the protest lodged against Thursday's game in which player Boehling participated; that Boehling had returned to Greenville, on Tuesday morning, after playing in Richmond on Saturday, without Greenville's knowledge and consent that Umpire Whitaker was at the train and saw him arrive; that he was in the "dug out" on Tuesday, and that on Thursday he had been with the team a sufficient time to render him eligible, and that good clean sportsmanship demanded that this game stand as played. Upon this statement, Judge Horton remarked that the player had not been reported to him, though he was quite aware that he was in Greenville) and suggested that Greenville's manager had not complied with a formal technicality, to wit: that he the President had not received a card advising him of the return of Player Boehling.

Thereupon the vote was taken, and it was a foregone conclusion that the game would be forfeited to Farmville. Kinston, Tarboro and Farmville voted that the two games be forfeited to Farmville. "New Bern, Greenville and Washington voted that Thursday's game stand as played; thereupon the president voted that the games be forfeited to his home town, his interview in Friday's Reflector to the contrary notwithstanding.

Thereupon, it sufficiently appearing to the Greenville representative that the "cards" had been stacked, he left the meeting, feeling that Greenville had not had a square deal and that victories honestly won had been wrongfully taken from us. If such action be clean sportsmanship, then hereafter let us keep out of baseball.

LOCAL MARKET AVERAGES \$22.24 OPENING WEEK

Greenville's Five Warehouses
Sell for First Week \$47,452,-
000; Prices Better

According to figures furnished by Secretary Bost of the Greenville Tobacco Board of Trade, the local market has sold since the opening last Tuesday, 847,452.00 pounds for a total of \$188,493.23, making an average of \$22.24 per hundred pounds for everything sold.

The sales each day consisted almost entirely of primings, and because of weather conditions, a majority of these were in bad shape, being too high in order. The grades being marketed are all bringing good prices. And the low prices being made for some of the grades are due to growers marketing the tobacco when not in proper shape to be handled by the buyers. The common grades are possibly bringing the biggest prices this year ever known on the local market for the same quality of tobacco.

An advance of from \$3 to \$5 per hundred on some of the better grades was made on the local floors yesterday. And from all information that can be gathered, prospects for better prices are very bright for the coming week.

CONTRACT LET MILLION DOLLAR HOTEL IN RALEIGH

C. V. York Construction Com-
pany Given General Con-
tract for Work

Raleigh, Aug. 19.—Contracts were signed yesterday for the construction of Raleigh's new million dollar hotel which will in all probability, be known as the Sir Walter, and which, for a term of twenty years will be leased by T. L. Bland, of Rocky Mount, and V. St. Cloud.

With the foundations laid, a building permit was secured yesterday for the building which will cost \$750,000 and which will be built by C. V. York Construction Company. The lot valued at \$100,000 and the furnishings to cost \$150,000 make up the million.

Two cars of steel have been received for the job and others are in transit, delayed somewhat by the transportation tie-up. But all steel work will be done by the Truscon Steel Co., of Youngstown, Ohio. Sub-contracts awarded yesterday include: Heating and ventilation to B. N. McKenzie, of Greensboro; Plumbing to L. F. Waldrop Co., of Raleigh; electric fittings, Thompson Electric Company, of Raleigh; painting and papering, elevators, Otis Elevator Co., of Richmond; plastering, to Davis-Riley Co., of Baltimore.

With ten stories and 240 guest rooms, the new hotel which will be completed by June 1, 1923, will have entrances on Davie and Fayetteville streets, and on the first floor will have space for six stores on Fayetteville street, one on Davie and three on Salisbury.

The approach to the spacious lobby is by steps leading up six feet from the entrance elevation. A grill room faces Davie street while the dining room 34 by 85 feet is on the balcony floor as is the Assembly Hall which may be used for lectures, dancing and for banquets.
