TERRIFIC EXPLOSION OF DYNAMITE AT SPENCER RAILWAY SHOPS CUTS OFF PRINCIPAL SUPPLY OF WATER

Burning of Several Box Cars
and Heavy Firing Features
Day's Activities

WILL NOT SEND ANY
TROOPS TO THE CITY
UNTIL A LATER DATE

Explosion Does Serious Dam-
age to Main Supplying the
Rail Shops With Water

Spencer, Aug. 20.—The blowing up of a 12 inch main feeding water to the Spencer shops of the Southern Railway shortly after midnight, an outbreak of promiscuous shooting a few hours later, closely followed by the burning of several box cars in the yards, and the arrival of twenty-five more new employees marked the strike situation here today.

No call for troops to stand guard at the shops has been made by authorities and the nine organizations of National Guardsmen today confined their activity to establishing their camp at the Fair Grounds, three miles away from the shops. Col. Don E. Scott, of Graham, and members of his staff made a survey of the situation this morning, their visit to the shop premises leading to rumors that soldiers had been detailed for guard duty.

The terrific blast that shut off the only means of water supply in the shops stirred the population of Spencer and Salisbury as no occurrence here in many years. Following the arrival of the nearly 500 soldiers yesterday, the tenaciousness of the situation appeared to be relieved and the local populace put aside a marked feeling of anxiety. The presence of the khaki-clad men had a salutary effect and Spencer and Salisbury folks went to bed last night expecting nothing of an exciting nature. Saturday had been quiet with the exception of the arrival of the troops and two cars loaded with new employees sent here by the Southern.

Shortly after midnight this morning the surrounding section was rocked by an explosion that brought hundreds from their beds and again cast anxiety over Spencer and Salisbury. Hurried investigation located the scene of the blast inside the yards between a row of unused box cars and the wooden wall which sets the shops proper off as a place entirely unto itself. A hole in the ground large enough to accommodate a small house and gushing of water from a 12-inch main told the story that the only source of water supply to the shops had been cut off.

A colored fireman narrowly escaped death, being painfully hurt by flying debris, medical attention being necessary. He stated he passed over the main and noticed a hole dug around it. Just as he had gotten a short distance away the explosion occurred, covering him with flying dirt and splinters. A picket post is located 75 feet away and several men on picket duty said they were endangered by the mass of dirt and pieces of the main hurled into the air. As far as could be learned none of the men on picket duty was injured.

The big main feeds water to the shops direct from the Yadkin river and normal city pressure was being maintained at the time the explosion occurred. A large section of the pipe was blown out and the immediate vicinity was flooded for several hours before the supply was cut off at its source. The small-sized flood added to the excitement, but caused no damage.

COLORED GIRL SHOT BY TOM PHILLIPS SUNDAY EVENING

Colored Youth Shoots Girl
When She Refuses to Walk
With Him

Tom Phillips, sixteen year old colored boy of the Winterville section, on yesterday afternoon shot and seriously wounded a 15 year old colored girl of the same section. Immediately after the shooting Phillips was arrested by officer Hobgood, of Winterville and brought to Greenville where he was given a preliminary hearing and committed without bond to the county jail until the seriousness of the girl's condition can be determined. He will in all probability be tried at the next term of court.

The girl was brought to the Skinner-Smith emergency hospital here, where upon examination it was found that the bullet entered the face just below the cheek bone and lodged in the base of the brain. An operation will be necessary in order to remove the bullet and it is doubtful whether or not the victim will recover.

From information gained Phillips and the girl both worked on the farm of Mr. Charlie Langston and were walking along the country road when the shooting occurred the dispute growing out of the girl's refusal to allow Phillips to accompany her home.

SUPERIOR COURT BEGINS TWO WEEK TERM HERE TODAY

Civil Court Convened This
Morning With Judge T. H.
Calvert Presiding

NEXT WEEK WILL

CRIMINAL CASES

Girl Charged With Throwing
Baby In Hog Pen to be Given
Hearing Also

The regular August term of Pitt county superior court for the trial of civil and criminal cases convened in this city this morning with Judge Thomas H. Calvert, of Raleigh, presiding.

There are some forty or more cases on the calendar for this week and the way things started off this morning it is believed the calendar will be completely cleared by the end of the week.

The criminal term next week will involve a number of important cases. Of especial interest to people in this immediate vicinity will be that against a colored girl of the Hanrahan district, who is alleged to have thrown her baby in a hog pen sometime during the month of May or June. The child, it is alleged, was in a pitiable condition when rescued by the girl's uncle and died as a result of the injuries received when attacked by the hogs.

Session got well under way this morning following usual preliminaries and at noon adjournment two divorce cases had been disposed of. Hearing will be continued this afternoon with renewed vigor and the middle of the week will probably see the calendar greatly reduced.

PRICES CONTINUE TO MOUNT UPWARD ON LOCAL MARKET

Break Slightly Lighter Today
But Prices Show General In-
crease Over Last Week

While the break on the local tobacco market today was somewhat lighter than usual, prices showed considerably greater strength over last week. In fact, the increase ranged all the way from two to ten cents a pound, and farmers were highly elated over the showing.

While the increase is of a general nature, medium and common grade tobacco showed greater strength than all others. The farmers are marketing their crop in an unusually splendid way, and this is considered one of the important factors connected with the favorable change in prices.

With the improved price situation warehousemen are looking forward to excellent sales until the major part of the crop is exhausted, and if the farmer continues to market his crop in the usual fine way it is believed he will be even more directly benefited. The breaks the remainder of the season will not be as heavy as the opening, and this will enable the buyers to complete the sales in plenty of time for the farmer to market his offering and reach home the same day.

**Sale of "Beer"
Still Continues
At Johnstown, Pa.**

Johnstown, Penn., Aug. 21.—The sale of "good beer" continued in saloons here today. This will continue until government agents close the saloons, it was stated. Prohibition agents are eager for action, but are waiting for instructions from Washington before proceeding against orders of the mayor of the city, directing the sale of real beer.

N. B. DAWSON HOST TO OLD SOLDIERS AT CONETOE HOME

Entertains Confederate Vet-
erans and Friends at a Bar-
becue and Brunswick Stew

Saturday was a great day for our neighbor, the town of Conetoe, over in Edgecombe. It was the occasion of adinner given by Mr. N. B. Dawson to Confederate Veterans and many friends, in honor of his father, the late T. H. Dawson, of Lenoir county, and his brother, S. W. Dawson, both of whom were in the Confederate army his father in the Seniors and his brother in Whitford's regiment. That father and son should both be in the service is remarkable, as there were not a great many such instances. They were from Lenoir and that is Mr. Dawson's native county, but he has lived long in Edgecombe, is thoroughly identified with its interests and progress and one of its most valued citizens.

Lieutenant Colonel William F. Beasley, a native of Plymouth, but who lives much in Baltimore, the youngest Colonel from North Carolina in the Confederate service, was orator for the day. He made a telling speech, recounting much history and giving data of record to prove many statements he made which are not in thorough accord with the popular versions. Among these were that Henry Wyatt was not killed in battle and was not the first Confederate soldier to give his life for the cause, but that this honor goes to Missouri, where more than none was killed as early as April 1861. Another, that North Carolina was not last at Appomattox, but that Gen. Grimes report shows that the last shot was fired by Virginia. He recounted many things of great interest and told a number of jokes illustrating the spirit that animated the old Confederate in the great struggle for constitutional liberty, which he declares was the last that would ever be waged in this country. Colonel Beasley was in fine shape and delighted all those who were fortunate to be near him.

After the speaking, a dinner of barbecue, brunswick stew and etc, was served out of doors. It was just such a dinner as the good women and men of Conetoe know how to serve and the only regret was that the crowd was not large enough to do full justice to such a bounteous spread. There were about twenty-five Confederate soldiers, ages ranging from seventy-five to eighty-eight, and many others present, totalling perhaps some more than a hundred, all a few whom can not too highly appreciate the occasion. The smallness of the crowd was owing to the fact that it was not well-known, which was greatly regretted, for those absent cannot know what they missed.

After the dinner, war tales and other pleasanties were special features and a jolly good time was this. Colonel Beasley occupied the center of the stage and as long as he reeled off, an eager and interested crowd, with him, the sinking sun only, bringing to a close a day of interest, entertainment, pleasure and profit.

**DEMPESTER ALLOWS ONLY 3
HITS AND HIGHWAYMEN WIN**

Tarboro, Aug. 19.—Dempester allowed the Tarboro nine only 3 hits here today and won his third consecutive victory, shutting out the Tars to the tune of 5 to 0. The win today gave Dempester a record that has not been equalled in this league up to now, having pitched 33 consecutive innings without being scored on.

The Highwaymen hit Crump and Cobb hard and got runs on 8 hits. Gardner was hurt during the game and Crump took over his job. Crump pitched for one and 2-3 innings and was sent to the showers when Kingston was well on her way towards the four runs obtained in the second. Cobb then was put in to pitch and did fairly well allowing only one Kingston score from then on.

BONUS ISSUE TO PASS THE SENATE BY BIG MAJORITY

Poll of Senate Shows Majority
of Sufficient Size to Insure
Early Passage

CARTER GLASS AND
BORAH WILL BEGIN
STUBBORN BATTLE

Democrats Claim Measure is
of the Makeshift Nature and
Not Necessary

Washington, Aug. 20.—The Soldier Bonus bill will be to the fore in the senate when that body meets on Wednesday at noon after recess which began Saturday night. That the measure will be fought by the "Bitter ends" is assured, but there is such an overwhelming majority of the senate in favor of adjusted compensations that the opponents of the bill will be virtually run over by the vote by which the measure will be adopted. On the Democratic side of the senate there is the feeling that the measure is a makeshift plan, that it does not do for the ex-service men all that should be done for them. Senator Overman declares that as he views the pending bill it is a "Gold Brick" that is being handed the ex-service men, but they deserve something far more substantial than which is being doled out to them by the Republicans.

A poll of the senate is said to give the bonus vote as 69, a number sufficient to over ride the veto that President Harding had indicated will come if there is not in the bill a money raising feature of the sales tax being favored by him. That there will be no sales tax provided by the measure is certain, and there is a large bit of skepticism as to President Harding going to extreme of vetoing the bill. The fall elections are close at hand, and the Republicans are mortally afraid of the soldier vote so they will pass the bill with or without the say so of President Harding. Col. Hantford MacNider, national commander of the American Legion, predicts that the measure will be passed by the first of September. It may be possible for the opponents of the measure to delay its passage but they will not get beyond this. Senator Borah on the Republican side and Senator Glass on the Democratic, will contest the bill's passage.

The measure that will come before the senate has in it five plans from which the ex-service men will be allowed to select any one, but his choice must be of one plan only. These five plans in brief are:

First. Adjusted service pay in cash. This is only for veterans whose adjusted service credit is not more than \$50, based upon \$1.00 a day for domestic service and \$1.25 a day for foreign service.

Second. Adjusted service insurance certificate. This will be a paid up twenty year endowment policy, the face value of this to be 3.38 times the amount that would have been paid on a cash bonus, the computation to be on a basis of \$1.00 a day for domestic service and \$1.25 a day for each day of over seas service. The face value of the policy would be payable to the veteran at the end of twenty years, or in the event that death occurs within the twenty years the full amount of the policy would go to the beneficiary named.

Third. Vocational training. An aid of \$1.25 a day while taking a course in vocational training. The amount thus paid is not to exceed 140 per cent of the amount that would have been paid in cash.

Fourth. Farm or home aid. This is to amount to not more than 140 per cent of what would have been paid under option one, the pay in cash option, on the money to be used in purchasing, improving, or making payments on an approval farm, city or suburban home.

Fifth. Land settlement. This option provides for the settlement by the former service men of land to the reclaimed.

THE CROP OUTLOOK

There is a great difference of opin-
ion among the farmers of this sec-
tion as to the amount of damage be-
ing done, or likely to be done, by
the boll weevil. Some say that they
have no apprehensions, believing that
the amount of destruction wrought
by the pests will be nominal. Others
contend that the boll weevil is go-
ing to destroy a great deal of cot-
ton, and that consequently the crop
will be short. We suppose that prac-
tically all of the expressed opinion
is simply guess-work, as few of the
farmers in this section know anything
about the boll weevil.

It is generally agreed, however, that
the wet weather is doing a good deal
of harm to cotton, which is a plant
that thrives in hot, dry weather, and
consequently is retarded by long,
rainy seasons like that which we have
been experiencing. As to the price of
cotton next fall, the success or fail-
ure of the crop in this state will have
very little effect, as what North Car-
olina raises is but a drop in the buck-
et. If the crop is a failure in the
cotton belt, proper, we may look for
good prices, according to the law of
supply and demand.

There is one encouraging feature
to the situation, however, even should
the cotton crop of the South generally
be a failure or the price should be
low: There are good crops of grain,
forage, potatoes, peas and food stuffs
generally, and the majority of the
farmers will not have to buy their
bread and meat, as was largely the
case in the all-cotton days.

We believe it will be a long time,
though, and the demand through in-
creased population will have to be
much greater, before the Southern
farmer can make any money at sell-
ing bread and meat. With the pres-
ent population, the west can produce
abundance of foodstuffs for domestic
and some foreign sale without the

south's help. Only recently a shrewd
business man, who also runs a farm,
told an Observer reporter that a
southern farmer absolutely could not
sell his grain and corn at a profit.
The butchers, he said, bought the
western meat in preference, suppos-
edly because they could buy it cheaper
in the west than the southern farmer
could raise it.

However, a farmer with full barns
and smokehouses, poultry on the lot
and milk cows in the pasture is in
mighty good fix, and under ordinary
circumstances will get on Easy street
eventually.—Fayetteville Observer.

FIRST LARGE SALE BY CO-OPERATORS

Satisfactory Prices for Association
Tobacco; Warehouses Open
Thursday

The Tobacco Growers' Co-operative
Marketing Association has consum-
mated a large sale of its members'
product within ten days after the
first deliveries to its warehouse in
South Carolina, according to a mes-
sage from Richard R. Patterson, gen-
eral manager of the leaf department,
received at Raleigh headquarters yester-
day.

Highly satisfactory prices were re-
ceived for the association's tobacco,
according to Mr. Patterson, though
the grades of tobacco and the name
of the buying company were not dis-
closed. One large sale and several
smaller sales were made last week, ac-
cording to officials of the leaf depart-
ment.

The week's receipts of tobacco in
the co-operative warehouses have run
over 3,300,000 pounds, and the en-
thusiasm of the members for the
new system of marketing is on the
increase, according to C. O. Dixon,
manager of warehouse for South
Carolina.
