RAIL HEADS MEET TO OUTLINE POLICY IN STRIKE ISSUE

Eastern Managers Hold Secret Session Before National Gathering

DIFFERENT VIEWS
EXPRESSED AS TO
PEACE PROSPECTS

Eastern Moguls Standing on "No Surrender" Policy, Members Declare

New York, Aug. 21.—Preliminary to the session of the association of Railway Executives on Wednesday, when members will vote their attitude toward proposals of the "Big Five" brotherhoods for ending the shop crafts strike, the Eastern Presidents' Conference today held a secret meeting to formulate a policy for its eleven members to promote at the national session.

What action the Eastern group, which includes several of the most powerful lines, will finally pursue was not indicated, those attending today's meeting asserting they had been pledged to secrecy. The only comment was made by L. F. Loree, president of the Delaware and Hudson and chairman of the conference, who issued a statement setting forth that Atlantic coast roads, which normally employ 161,339 shopmen, had brought their forces up to 71.5 per cent of that figure on August 18.

This represented an increase of 2.5 per cent over the week ending August 11, the statement indicated. "It was expected that the ratio of increase in August would be continued on the eighteenth, but the occurrences of last week put a damper on recruiting," said Loree, "nothing can be done more destructive than to introduce a feeling of uncertainty into a situation such as this."

Roads represented at the conference were those which led the opposition when the national body of rail chiefs rejected President Harding's two proposals for ending the strike by submitting the seniority issue to the Railroad Labor Board.

The wall of silence which both labor leaders and rail officials have thrown about the strike negotiations was maintained today by both sides. In some circles it was maintained that the end of the strike is as distant as it was when the "Big Five" leaders concluded deliberations with the executives last Friday night. Others close to the situation continued optimistic, asserting that a definite understanding of the positions of both sides had been reached which would result in an early settlement of the seniority question to the satisfaction of the strikers, as well as present employees.

Federal Commission Orders Swift & Co. To Release Interest

Washington, Aug. 22.—The Federal Trade Commission today ordered Swift and Company, packing concern of this city, to divest itself of all capital stock and interest in the Moultrie Packing Company at Moultrie, Ga., and the Alusta Packing Company at Alusta, Alabama. It was alleged that in 1917 that Swift and Company purchased practically the entire outstanding stock of the concerns, resulting in lessened competition between them and violating the Clayton act.

It was also ordered that the company cease further holdings, owning, controlling and operating business of the concerns.

BOARD DECLARES BECK WAS KILLED IN LINE OF DUTY

No Evidence Reflecting Upon Honor of Dashing Aviator Disclosed in Hearing

(By International News)

Washington, Aug. 22.—Lieut. Colonel Paul W. Beck, the dashing army aviator whose death occurred at the hands of Judge Dean Day, of Oklahoma City, under sensational circumstances involving Judge Day's beautiful young wife, was killed in line of duty, according to the final report of the investigating board of the army officers. It was learned by conclusions of the board that there was no evidence worthy of credence to show that the slain officer was guilty of any act reflecting upon his honor. The report recommended that new evidence be made available by civil authorities of Oklahoma City with a view of re-opening the case. Action now rests upon the secretary of the war who, it is assumed, will approve the report. The secretary it is understood, has not yet been able to make a complete study of the report.

Senate Approves Borah's Plan to Create Commission

Washington, Aug. 22.—The Senate labor committee this afternoon ordered a favorable report on the Borah bill for the purpose of creating a federal trade commission to investigate the coal industry. The commission will be composed of five members to be named by the president. The report of the president is to be made to congress within five months.

Spencer Walkout to Be Discussed At Meeting Today

Spencer, Aug. 22.—With the train service of this division of the Southern Railway completely at a standstill as result of the walkout of trainmen last night a meeting will be held this afternoon for the purpose of deciding whether or not the walkout will be permanent. The walkout was a direct protest against the presence of armed guards at the shops.

Strikers Ordered to Form Vigilance Committee at Once

Washington, Aug. 22.—Striking shop craft unions throughout the country have been ordered to form a vigilance committee to aid local authorities in placing the responsibility of train wrecks and damage to railroad property.

SPENCER STRIKE BROUGHT TO AN END AT NOON TODAY FOLLOWING WITHDRAWAL OF ARMED GUARDS FROM RAILROAD YARD

Southern Railway Workers Agree to Return to Work When Guards Called Off

WILL MEET TODAY
TO DETERMINE IF
STRIKE WILL HOLD

All Trains Arriving at Spencer Are Stalled; Heads Seek New Men to Man Trains

Washington, Aug. 22.—The walkout of Southern railway employees was brought to an abrupt conclusion at Spencer, North Carolina at the noon hour today when the men resumed work following the withdrawal of armed guards from the railroad yards. The situation had been very tense since the strike last night, but conditions improved considerably this morning when it was announced that the guards would be called away. The strikers, however, failed to return until the last guard disappeared from the yards at the noon hour.

Spencer, Aug. 22.—Unless members of Railway Brotherhoods, switchmen and clerks of the Southern Railroad at this point, reverse themselves at their meeting at 9:30 Tuesday morning, a tie up of all traffic at this point, already started, will be complete. A decision on the part of these workers pledging themselves individually not to go upon Southern Railroad property or to carry out Southern trains as long as troops are on duty at the shops was taken in a meeting at their headquarters tonight. In the morning at 9:30 they will meet to determine whether this decision will be made permanent.

All trains arriving here after midnight at 3 o'clock were tied up on the yards while officials are turning over the shops to find available men willing to carry the trains on. Northbound train No. 138, held up for three hours by the decision of the Brotherhood men and their associates, drew out of Spencer at 1 o'clock with Clyde Keever, general foreman of the Spencer shops, at the throttle. No hopes are felt for the moving of southern bound train No. 29, bound from Washington to Atlanta carrying tourists cars from New York to San Francisco, or for northbound train No. 33.

The action of the Brotherhood members tonight came in consequence of indignation felt by non-striking workmen for the presence of troops at the Spencer shops. The refusal creates a situation unexpected by Southern officials who admittedly have no means of meeting it adequately. Thus far, the Big Four and other organizations whose members were involved in tonight's meeting are not themselves concerned. Action taken tonight was individual and not, in any sense meant to bind the Brotherhoods as organizations.

FOUR PERISH IN A TENEMENT HOUSE BLAZE

Elizabeth, N. J., Aug. 21.—Four persons were burned to death today in a fire in a tenement house which the police believe was of incendiary origin. The dead, a man, a woman and two boys, were burned beyond recognition. The fire started in a passageway between the burned house and the next building and spread so rapidly the victims had no chance to escape.

Steel Corporation Announces Wage Cut For Coming Month

(By International News)

New York, Aug. 22.—The United States steel corporation today announced that wage rates of day labor in all plants would be increased about twenty percent effective Sept. 1st. Other rates will be adjusted also in the near future, it was stated at the time.

PRIVATE OWNERS NOT BUILDING IN ENGLAND NOW

British Decline in Import of Lumber Adversely Affects American Market

Washington, Aug.—The great increase in house building which has taken place in the United States has not been duplicated in Great Britain, according to reports to the Department of Commerce from the American Trade Commissioner at London.

House building in England is said to be limited to Government and municipal schemes and certain arrangements of large mining companies to build houses on a "no profit" plan for their own employees.

"Architects and contractors are still hoping," Trade Commissioner Dye reported to Secretary of Commerce Hoover "for the day when private parties will build houses as an investment."

"At the close of nineteen twenty one there was an increase demand in the United Kingdom for lumber, which led to rather large importations, considering the difficult conditions of industry. Consequently during the first four months of this year the importation of lumber from the United States generally declined. However, about May first importations began to increase and have been increasing ever since. In spite of the dull period at the beginning of the total importation from the United States for the first six months of this year is practically double what it was last year, although still much below previous years."

Dye said that building costs, both for material and wages, have decreased during the last six months.

"At the present time" he continued, "wages in the building trade are still about one hundred per cent above pre-war rates and material is about seventy-five per cent above. The output of labor, however, is higher than it was six months ago and considerably higher than it was two years ago."

Serious Shortage of Coal Reported At Kingsport, Tenn

Washington, Aug. 22.—The governor of Tennessee today reported to the federal fuel commission that an acute situation existed at Kingsport, Tennessee, due to the lack of railroad cars. He urged that the situation be remedied as early as possible.

CHICAGO CURATOR TO SEEK ANCIENT FOSSIL

Chicago, Aug.—A five-year hunt for the fossils of prehistoric animals, extinct for from 550,000 to 2,000,000 years, in the jungles of the Argentine is the task undertaken by Professor Elmer S. Riggs, associate curator of paleontology at the Field Museum of Natural History, and three assistants.

The search will extend from the Argentine pampas to the Magellan Straits. Particularly ancient remains are expected to be found in Patagonia. The party will travel by motor truck and a canvas motor boat.

JOE, NOT PHIL!

Toledo, O., Aug.—Joseph Sousa, succumbing to cool Lake Erie breezes at Toledo Beach, peacefully went to sleep playing a bassoon solo of "Stars and Stripes."

'BIG FOUR' MEN REFUSE TO WORK AT LOUISVILLE

Western Division of The Southern Tied Up By Walkout of Trainmen

Louisville, Ky., Aug. 21.—Official notice of a walkout of the "Big Four" Brotherhoods of trainmen on the western division of the Southern Railway Company from Danville, Ky., to St. Louis, Mo., was received late today by officials of the company here following a second strike of firemen at 12:30 o'clock this afternoon at Princeton, Ind. Others were given for the annulment of trains between Louisville and St. Louis until further notice.

"The firemen today repudiated their agreement they made with me at Princeton," said J. F. Sheridan, superintendent of the Louisville St. Louis division. "The settlement had been made," he said, "on the condition that the guards be zoned off and kept from the railroad yards. The claim upon which the men are basing their new strike is that the equipment is unsafe and that they refuse to work where guards are located."

The fifty firemen who quit work at Princeton Saturday morning returned to work yesterday, but suspended service again this afternoon. "Until 12:03 a. m. Thursday, when the strike of trainmen becomes effective on the western division, day trains will be operated from Louisville to Huntington, Ind."

The train due out of Louisville at 9:50 o'clock tonight for St. Louis was the first passenger between Louisville and St. Louis annulled on account of the strike, Mr. Sheridan said.

Notice of the strike was given the railroad officials by the firemen and engineers this afternoon. It will affect approximately 40 men located at terminals at East St. Louis, Ill., Princeton and Huntington, Ind., it was said.

DIVORCE CASES FEATURE FIRST DAY OF COURT

One White and Two Colored Persons Granted Absolute Separation Yesterday

Divorce cases played the most prominent part in the opening session of superior court here yesterday and when the day's work was completed the calendar had been cleared of three issues. Defendants in two of these cases were colored and others white. Absolute divorce was granted in each instance as evidence was of such a nature as to make this perfectly justifiable.

Mrs. Mamie Tyson was granted divorce absolute from Joe Tyson, well known white farmer of this county. Immoral relations and non-support, it is alleged, were grounds upon which separation was sought. Divorce was granted Della Knight from Fred Knight and to Maryland Jones from Geneva Jones. Facts involve in these two cases were similar to those in the other.

The remainder of the week will witness the most intense activity in the court room and it is expected the calendar will almost be completely cleared when the civil term closes Friday afternoon.

Three Aviators Rescued Today From Atlantic

The trip, as the public know, was made under the auspices of the Pitt county Chamber of Commerce and the county agent.

The party met at Goldsboro on the morning of Aug. 2nd, and made ready for the trip. Placards, which had been previously provided by the Chamber of Commerce, were placed on the rear of each car. This arrangement showed the name of the Chamber of Commerce and the town from which each car came. This feature of the trip alone focused attention all along the route. Also descriptive matter about Pitt county towns and county was distributed. The advertising value of the trip was fine.

The party was met at Fayetteville at noon by the secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, R. M. Hornburgh, who showed the delegation every courtesy possible. Following dinner, the trip was resumed with Florence, S. C., as destination point.

The party was met several miles this side of Florence by a representative of the Chamber of Commerce and piloted through Pelee swamp, which was the worst place encountered on the trip.

On the morning of Aug. 3rd, the Florence Chamber of Commerce took charge of our party and visited several places of interest, including the Experiment Station. At noon, the Rotary club entertained at a luncheon. Every one seemed to take particular pride in being cordial. The spirit manifested at Florence is the spirit that makes for progress and development.

The principal thing derived from the stop at Florence was the advice given by "Daddy" Currin of the Experiment Station. He said: "Don't get every machine that is offered on the market to fight the boll weevil." The most of them are "humbugs." "Again, do not be held into buying all kinds of mixtures to kill the boll weevil," said "Daddy" Currin. Calcium arsenate is the only thing that we have found profitable and that only when it is applied correctly and in reasonably dry years. To do other than this is but to court expense, disgust and failure."

THE LOG-CABIN SCHOOL WINS.

By Stanley Johnson, New York City.

Throughout rural America there are still in operation many log-cabin schools. This is particularly true of the Southern States. Within the present decade, in one of these schools with never more than fifteen pupils, a record of ten sessions has been kept by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction for the State of West Virginia. He finds in this brief period this rude, sequestered temple of education in the forest has given to the world "two practicing physicians, a college graduate, a public school teacher, a justice of the peace and postmaster, and a Teachers' Institute instructor."

In a public high school in one of our largest metropolitan centers, recently, an examination prepared by the Regents of Education for the State of New York was given to the pupils in a room that was crowded with an enrollment of seventy-two. Only twelve of the seventy-two passed.

In the little log-cabin school there was abundant opportunity for an intelligent instructor to give the rarest of a born teacher's gifts—inspiration added to this was sufficient time for individual attention; not to solve problems for the pupil, but to awaken and guide his logical mind to its latent powers of self-help; above all to create within him the power to think.

In the metropolitan school, with an enrollment double what all educators believe is the normal number for a classroom, there were none of these opportunities. Every fine cut of six failed!

The two instances point to one of the gravest evils besetting public education in our large cities and towns; there is no guidance in the art and power of actual thinking.

The writer recalls a decade of life spent in a provincial New England community as principal of a high school with less than forty pupils. Every morning from twenty minutes before nine to nine guidance was given to all pupils who came to the desk. We had classes in French, German, Greek, Latin, biology, astronomy, geometry, algebra, chemistry, physics, English—in fact every thing, as it seemed. But we never solved a problem, or translated a sentence in Vergil. We guided. A little word here and the tracing of a subject or a direct object there, and the pupils' mind almost invariably answered with a flash of light.

There were pupils in that school who passed examinations for higher institutions that the principal himself confessed he could not have passed!

Why? It was the art of Socrates—the street-corner instructor, the greatest teacher of all time. It is greater than teaching. It is leading a young mind.

This is what our log-cabin school in West Virginia does. Our great metropolitan school does not do it. And because it does not our public schools are falling down—Pictorial Review.

WORK OF STATE BOARD OF HEALTH.

There is no department of the State government that is more efficient than the State Board of Health. Dr. Rankin, secretary of the board, keeps thoroughly abreast of the times and is always ready to meet any emergency that may arise.

The publications sent out free from the offices of the board are a great blessing to the state. Information is given which is of much value as to the prevention and treatment of diseases. We fear our people are

not taking advantage as they should of the aid which the board of health is anxious to render. Free clinics are held in every county for the treatment of those afflicted with many of the more prevalent diseases. Persons desiring to take the typhoid preventative can be vaccinated without cost. In 1914 8,390 persons in this state had typhoid fever, while last year 2,800 people had the disease, a decrease of over 60 per cent. The percentage of deaths was the same each year, showing that the saving of life came from prevention rather

than from treatment.

The board does not discount the important work being done by reputable physicians. On the contrary, it strongly advises persons who are afflicted to see their family physician immediately, and have him advise them what to do. It aids physicians, again, by exposing quack doctors and patent nostrums.

The board of health is to be commended for its efficient and important service, and we urge our people to avail themselves of the benefits which it offers.—Biblical Recorder.

GERMANS TO PAY UP WAR DEBTS IN GOODS

Paris, Aug.—"Made in Germany" is to become the commonest of common labels in France's devastated areas these days.

Beginning this month, war sufferers in these districts are permitted to order, from German merchants, goods equal in value to the damage caused them by the war. The value of the goods is charged up to reparations.

The chamber of commerce (French) of Cologne is organizing a service to put war victims in touch with German merchants who must, under the agreement, supply them with the goods ordered. It is feared, according to the Chamber, that tariff enforcement will interfere with the perfect working out of this phase of reparations.

Kansas Pageant Is to Review Farm History

Leavenworth, Kas, Aug.—A pageant of interest to agriculturists throughout the entire nation will be presented here in connection with a celebration which is to mark the tenth anniversary of the first county agent in the Sandhopper State, who was appointed in nineteen twelve. The pageant will review the agricultural history of the nation from the time the Pilgrims founded their first colony at Plymouth Rock, in 1617 until the formation of the American Farm Bureau Federation.

Among events which will be depicted in the pageant are the organization of the first agricultural association in America by Benjamin Franklin, the explorer, the prospector, the cowboy, the ox cart and the prairie schooner, the pioneer farmer of Kansas at war with hot winds, grasshoppers and prairie fires; Lincoln signing the act creating the land grant colleges, and the first farmers' institute in the United States which was held at the Kansas State Agricultural College.

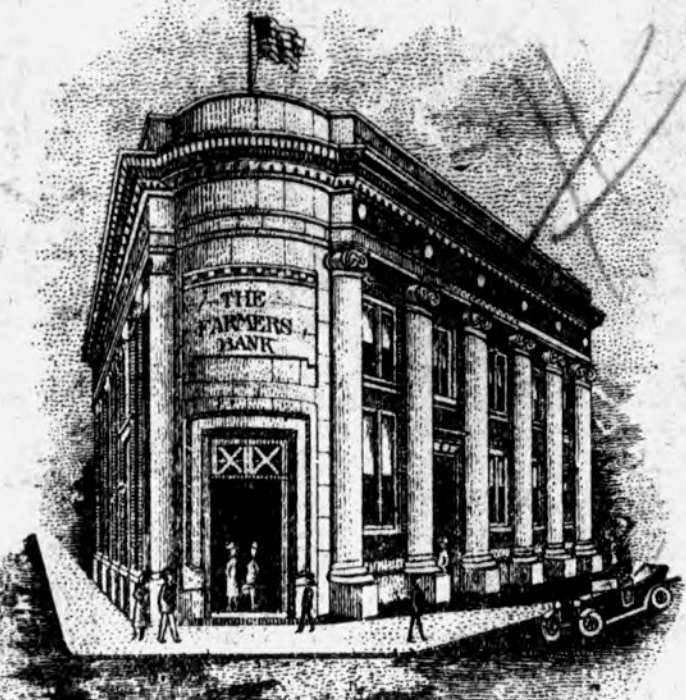
