DUBLIN BY LARGE
NUMBER CITIZENS

Cordial Welcome Extended by
Chamber of Commerce City
of Dublin and Kiwanis Club

(Continued from yesterday.)
After completing the program at
Florence, the party left at 2:00 p. m.,
Aug. 3rd, with Batesburg, S. C., as
destination point for the night. Local
people from Florence accompanied
the party several miles out of town so
that the proper detour would be taken,
thus avoiding a piece of road under
construction.

Columbia, S. C., was reached by
nightfall. Some minor adjustments
were made on some of the cars, after
which they proceeded to Batesburg.
From Camden, which was reached be-
fore getting to Columbia, to Bates-
burg and then to Augusta Ga., the
roads were excellent—sand clay roads
and well built.

The party arrived at Augusta, on
the morning of Aug. 4th, from which
place they proceeded to Dublin, Ga.,
where they were expected around
7:00 o'clock. Enroute the following
towns were made: Waynesboro,
Midville, Swainsboro.

A few minutes after 7:00 o'clock
found the party at Dublin. The
Pitt county delegation was guest of
the Dublin and Laurens county cham-
ber of commerce at an eight o'clock
dinner, where a cordial welcome was
extended by the Chamber of Com-
merce, the city of Dublin and the
Kiwanis club.

Early next morning Dublin citizens
accompanied the party to several
places of interest, including the com-
mercial hatchery, creamery, ice-
cream plant, large farm of Captain
W. B. Rice, M. C. Dornay's hog
farm.

The hatchery, under the supervi-
sion of Mr. B. F. Cochran, has made
wonderful progress. It is a 2,400 egg
capacity incubator. Mr. Cochran
states that space has been taken quite
a bit in advance of each hatch. It
is so operated that any farmer or
any one else can bring his eggs to
this hatchery, pay for his space, and
at the proper time come back for his
chicks.

The following quotations from Mr.
Cochran, who is in the wholesale
grocery business, will give his ideas
of the poultry business:

"The crop in Laurens county (Du-
blin is the county seat) was made in
a large way, this year, with chickens
and eggs."

"100 hens, properly cared for, will
net \$300.000 per year."

"I started with the English strain
White Leghorns, and with an initial
investment of \$100.00 two years ago.

Since then I have bought additional
stock. This year my profits will
reach \$3000.00."

"English Leghorns are excellent
layers."

"There is a very great difference
between breeding and show stock."

"Eggs from these chickens weight
more than half pound to the dozen
more than eggs from common hens."

"In two years from now Laurens
county will be selling as many dol-
lars worth of chickens and eggs as
she did cotton before the boll weevil."

"Investigate poultry feeder when
you start poultry movement."

"A commercial hatchery will pay
you people."

"Notwithstanding we have several
chicken farms, Laurens county has
imported over 20,000 chicks this
year."

FOUR SURPRISE FACTORS INJECTED STRIKE SITUATION

The Return of Three Eastern
Presidents Not Commented
on by Heads of Asso.

ANY FACTOR MAY
INFLUENCE ACTION
R. R. EXECUTIVES

Decision to Raise Wages Hail-
ed by Strikers as a Point in
Their Favor

New York, Aug. 22.—Four sur-
prise factors entered into the rail
strike situation yesterday any one
of which, according to representatives
of roads and brotherhoods, may vi-
tally influence the action of the as-
sociation of railway executives when it
meets tomorrow to consider peace
proposals for mediation with the big
five brotherhoods. They were:

1. The announcement that presi-
dents of three powerful eastern roads,
Samuel Rea, of the Pennsylvania;
E. E. Loomis, of the Lehigh Valley,
and William Besler, of the Jersey
Central, were expected to arrive
from Europe on the Majestic in time
to participate in the conference of
the Association of Railway executives

2. The grant by three large steel
corporations of a 20 per cent wage
increase to their several hundred
thousand day-laborers.

3. The announcement that presi-
dents of the Delaware and Hudson
and chairman of the Eastern Presi-
dents conference, that predictions of
a strike settlement and peace in the
industry were "all bunk."

4. The announcement that several
of the brotherhood chiefs are en-
route from the West with practical
proposals for settlement of the shop
crafts strike, which they will sub-
mit to rail executives if all other
peace advances fail.

Heads of the association of ex-
ecutives refused to comment on the
unexpected arrival of the three eastern
presidents. Their return on the same
boat, and in the midst of the
present crises, was admittedly signi-
ficant, however, especially since their
respective vice-presidents have been
the nucleus of the group which the
conference of the national associa-
tion has consistently fought against
any peace plan which included rein-
statement of strikers with seniority
rights unimpaired.

The decision of the steel corpora-
tions to raise the wages of laborers,
announced just 24 hours prior to the
scheduled meeting of the executives,
was hailed by the strikers as a point
in their favor. It not only justified
their refusal to accept wage cuts
fixed by the Railroad Labor Board,
they said, but was ample proof of
an impending industrial boom which
would put the railroads, with their
thousands of bad order cars more
than ever in need of their old repair
forces.

"This wage increase will put con-
siderable fire into the veins of rail-
road labor," declared Davis Williams
secretary of the eastern strike com-
mittee. "The railroad man will find
it hard to understand why he should
get \$3.75 a day when he could get
\$4 for the same work in the mills."
"If the railroads don't settle with
the shopmen, it will be doubly dif-
ficult for them to hold the unskilled
crafts in line."

SAYS AIRPLANES TO EXPEDITE POLAR TRIP

London, Aug.—Polar exploration
will soon be revolutionized by the use
of airships and aeroplanes, according
to predictions made by Major R.
Carr, air expert who accompanied
Shackleton on his South Polar expedi-
tion.

"Very few people realize how mild
the Arctic and Antarctic summers
really are," Major Carr says. "The
airship of today is capable of doing
a trip to the North Pole and back
from London, a distance of approxi-
mately 4,580 miles, within a week,
carried, and no landings need be
made. This proves that before long
we shall have Arctic and Antarctic
exploration without the years of work
and hardship."

REV. GOUDEN BLIND CHAPLIN DIES IN VIRGINIA

Chaplain of House of Repre-
sentatives For Twenty-five
Years Died at Fort Myer

Washington, Aug. 22.—Rev. Henry
N. Gouden, aged 79, blind chaplain
of the House of Representatives for
25 years until February 28, 1921,
died today at his residence at Fort
Myer, Virginia. He had been ill
nearly nine months, but the im-
mediate cause of his death was bronchial
pneumonia.

Dr. Gouden was born in Indiana
and was educated in the State school
for the blind at Columbus, Ohio, and
the divinity school of St. Lawrence
University at Canton, New York, and
was ordained a Universalist clergy-
man in 1887. He served more than
two years in the Union army, dur-
ing the civil war, and was discharged
because of the wound which caused
his blindness. He became chaplain
of the house in 1896, during Cleve-
land's administration.

Michael Collins Was Shot From Ambush Yesterday

(By International News.)

London, Aug. 22.—Michael Collins
head of the Irish provisional gov-
ernment and the Irish National army,
was shot and killed from ambush at
Bandon, county Cork, tonight a few
hours after he had been given an
ovation by the people of Cork City,
which for the first time saw the Free
State hero in the uniform of com-
mander in chief. Thus within ten
days two of the most prominent
figures in the new Irish government
have been removed by death. Just
ten days ago President Griffith, of
the Dail Eireann, considered the
brains of the new administration, died
in Dublin; tonight Michael Collins,
the Free State military genius, was
killed at the moment when the dis-
solution of the irregular forces in
the South was considered complete.

Dublin, Aug. 23.—An intensified
campaign against Eamonn DeValera
is planned as a result of the associa-
tion from ambush of Michel Collins, com-
mander of the Irish army and minis-
ter of Finance of the free state gov-
ernment which occurred near Bandon,
Cork county, Richard Mulcahy suc-
ceeds to the leadership of the army.
The cabinet has been summoned to
consider the situation. Hundreds of
persons went to church this morning
to offer prayers for the repose of
Collins' soul. The lady attired in the
uniform of a free state general has
been removed from Cork and placed
on the steamer, Claussic, for trans-
portation to Dublin.

Mississippi River May Save Industrial Paralysis is Stated

Memphis, Aug. 23.—The Missis-
sippi river may save industrial pa-
ralysis in this and other river cities
was declared by manufacturers when they
announced that arrangements were
practically completed for the opera-
tion of extensive line barges to bring
coal from the fields bordering the
river to Memphis. Preparations are
under way, it is said, relative to
other cities along the stream. Str-
plus stocks of coal here are almost
depleted.

TARIFF BILL IS DENOUNCED BY POU ON FLOOR

Say That Republican Bill Is
Nothing More Than "Brick
Made of Fool Gold"

NOBODY SEEMS
TO WANT IT, NOT
EVEN SPONSORS

Floor Leader Mondell is For-
ced to Admit That He Is Not
Enthusiastic Over It

Washington, Aug. 22.—Character-
izing the Republican framed tariff
bill as "a brick made of fools gold,"
Congressman E. W. POU in the House
this afternoon declared that in his
judgment the Republicans did not
propose to put up the measure be-
fore the election, that "I may be a
false prophet, but I hazard the pre-
diction here and now that this bill
is going to lie in conference until
a very few days before the Novem-
ber election. Possibly it may not
emerge until after the election. So
I say it is a bill that nobody wants."
And he denounced the bill as "the
most vicious in its terms that has
ever been presented to any congress
in the history of this government."

The North Carolina Representative
from the fourth district had the
floor following the presentation of
the tariff bill which the senate had
sent over with its many thousand
amendments. The Republican motion
was to send the bill to conference.
The Democrats desired that it be
sent back to the ways and means
committee to be considered there, as
there were so many changes in it and
the American valuation section had
been knocked out, that it appeared
that the committee should handle it
again. Chairman Campbell of the
House ways and means committee,
just repudiated by the Republicans
of his district, had spoken in behalf
of the motion to send the bill to
conference. Then it was that con-
gressman POU verbally lapped the
Republicans and burnt the bill.

"If our physical senses did not tell
us what was taking place," said Mr.
POU, "it would be difficult to believe
that it is possible for the things to
occur that are taking place. Now
here is a bill that you are going to
send to the conference committee
by this rule which is enthusiastically
supported by nobody. There is not
a man on this side of the chamber
who is so humble judgment who in his
heart of hearts is enthusiastic for the
passage of this bill. If the chairman
of the committee on ways and means
were to express his real opinion of
this bill, his remarks would have to
be stricken from the record. They
would not bear printing. I believe
that the same is true with respect
to many gentlemen on the other side
of the chamber."

Then telling of the bill having
passed the House over a year ago,
Mr. POU made his declaration that
he did not believe the Republicans
would pass it before the election.
"There is enthusiasm for it in no
quarter," he said, "yet it is going to
be sent to the conference committee
because some time in the past, great
political party in power pledged the
people that they were going to reform
the tariff. You will not pass it be-
fore the election, in my judgment,
because you do not want to take the
risk of having a leaflet sent to every
home in this country showing the in-
creased cost of the necessities of life
that this bill is going to bring upon
the American people."

Rev. Tom Jamison's Home Now Guarded By Special Squad

(By International News.)

Spencer, Aug. 23.—A special
squad of strikers are guarding the
home of Rev. Tom Jamison the labor
advocate who on Sunday fought a
postal employee at Salisbury. Jam-
ison says that he has received threat-
ening letters. Quiet prevails in the
Southern Railway shops following
the removal of armed guards. The
Salisbury postoffice and railway
station are under guard of military
forces.

SEED SELECTION TO CONTROL BOLL WEEVIL DAMAGE.

The most of the farmers of Pitt county are thinking seriously about the boll weevil. It is time to think and the very best that all of us can do will be little enough.

Dr. R. Y. Winters, plant breeding Agronomist, North Carolina Experiment Station, Raleigh, N. C., has prepared a very interesting letter on the control of boll weevil by seed selection. Dr. Winters is a man well known in this state and his reputation justifies a careful study of the following letter:

Cotton growers who now have boll weevil can use it to advantage and the grower who has no boll weevil this year will get even greater profit from it.

Cotton growers and agricultural experts to the South of us know what it means to see one-fourth to three-fourths of the cotton bolls of a field destroyed by weevil. They tell us that during seasons favorable to the weevil very little cotton is set after the first part of August. After this time the weevil have multiplied in such large numbers that practically no squares are left. Under such conditions the amount of cotton we pick in the all depends upon the number of bolls set now. Examine your fields and you will find stalks that have ten to twelve bolls set and others that have less than three. Seed from the

plants that have ten or more bolls set will reproduce plants of this kind. The plants that have the largest number of bolls now are not only safer from boll weevil attack but will produce the greatest amount of lint this fall. Seed from these plants will pass this quality on to the crop next and for years to come. Then, if these plants are our heavy yielders and reproduce heavy yielders, saving seed from them will pay whether we have boll weevil or not. The results from this work last year gave an average increase of 91 pounds of lint per acre over unselected seed. When the cotton was sold the increase due to saving seed from the best plants amounted to \$18.58 per acre.

One man can mark enough good plants in a day to supply six bolls of seed. This will plant five to six acres. Figure your profit. Do you know any work on the farm that will pay better than this?

Begin right now by marking the plants that have the largest number of bolls set. Mark them with a tag or colored strips of cloth so the cotton may be picked from them in the fall. Just before the general crop is picked send a careful picker in the field to save the seed plants. Store it in a dry place and when the rush of picking and ginning is over, clean out the gin thoroughly and gin the seed free from mixtures. Remember it will pay whether you have boll weevil or not. If you have the boll weevil you cannot afford to overlook this remedy. If you haven't the weevil now is the best time to begin preparation for them.

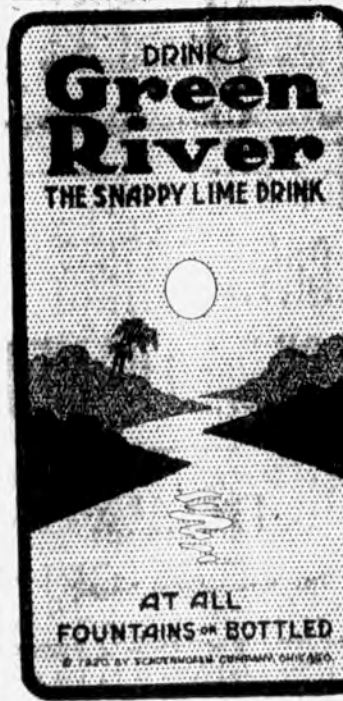

ENGLAND NOT TO RELINQUISH ALL IRISH CONTROL

Hoopes Free State Will Restore Order, but May Yet Exercise Some Restraint

SEE FISCAL SUPERVISION

Open Break Feared if British Assume Guiding Hand Role in Money Matters

(By International News.)

London, Aug. 19.—Great Britain is not done with Ireland.

This firm conviction is reluctantly but nevertheless generally admitted in government circles despite the fact that the British government has had little or nothing to do with the Irish Free State since that eventful summer night when "Mick" Collins's army fired the first shell into the Four Courts and started a civil war that threatens to know no end until Ireland lies in devastation.

Winston Churchill, Colonial Secretary, confidently voices the hope that the Irish Free State will restore Ireland to peace and order and that good government will soon be an accomplished fact, but these statements are for publication. The private views of the government are that Great Britain will eventually have to again resume some measure of control over Ireland.

The British government is not anxious to again become active in Ireland, and it is probable that it will strive to keep clear of such intervention, but it seems certain now that there must be at least fiscal supervision from Great Britain if nothing else.

Ireland is daily piling up a huge war debt, and according to all reports reaching London the revenues are falling far short of the expenditures. Ireland apparently is treading the path which leads to bankruptcy.

Great Britain will not allow Ireland to go into bankruptcy. This has been officially stated to International News Service. What measures Great Britain will take are not disclosed, but it is learned from authoritative sources that the British government may find it necessary to exercise fiscal control in Ireland, holding a whiphand over expenditures and forcing the collection of revenues. Whether it would be possible for Great Britain to take such a step without forcing an open break with the Irish Free State is a matter of considerable doubt.

AIR PHONOGRAPHERS ARE TO MAP ALASKA

Washington, Aug.—Believing that the national forests of Alaska abound with undiscovered lakes, many of which may be valuable water-power sources, the Forestry Service of the Department of Agriculture is evolving plans to map this "No Man's Land" of the north by means of aerial photographs.

That there are many lakes on the headlands and islands traversed by the inside passage between Seattle and Skagway which to not appear on the map has long been known, an official of the Forestry Service said. During the New-York-Nome flight made by army aviators lakes frequently were sighted which could not be found on the latest and most authentic maps of the territory.

Tales of unknown water bodies are constantly being brought to the attention of the Government by trappers and prospectors. Less than a year ago a lake four and a half miles long and half a mile wide was discovered at the head of Short Bay. This lake according to the Forestry Service, has more than 1,000 acres of surface area and is less than one and a quarter miles from tidewater; yet, because of the rough topography of the surrounding country, it has remained unknown and unnamed.

Officials arranging the plans for the locating and photographing of these "lost lakes" estimate that a few days' flight will be sufficient to cover the area with a degree of accuracy that would require many years and great expense to accomplish by ordinary methods.

This venture will mark the latest uses to which airplanes have been put. The work has been approved by the Federal Power Commission and will be done by seaplanes flying from Ketchikan as a base.

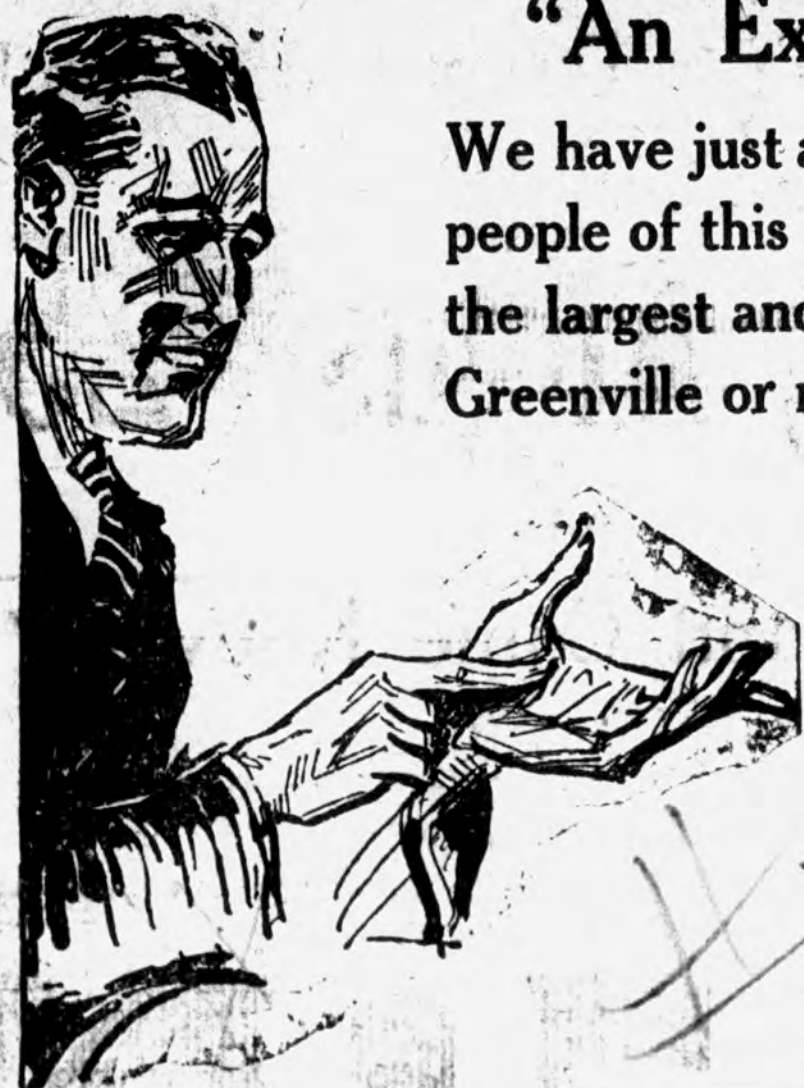
