orchards you would notice that good attention had been given some while others had been neglected. Careful attention, while good for all crops

will perhaps show results as readily with pecans as almost any crop cultivated.

Albany, with her hydro-electric plant, seven lines of railroads, and farming land, 75 wholesale business and 58 manufacturing enterprises, will forge to the front.

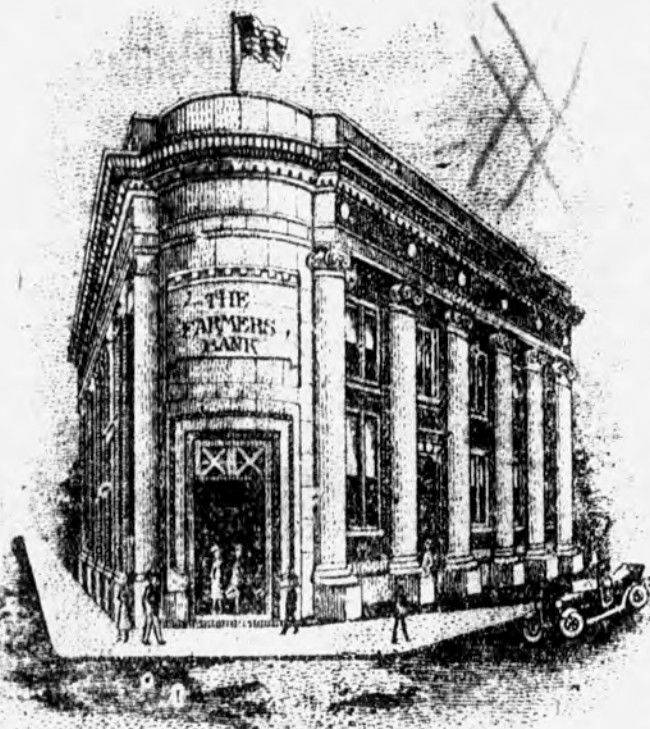

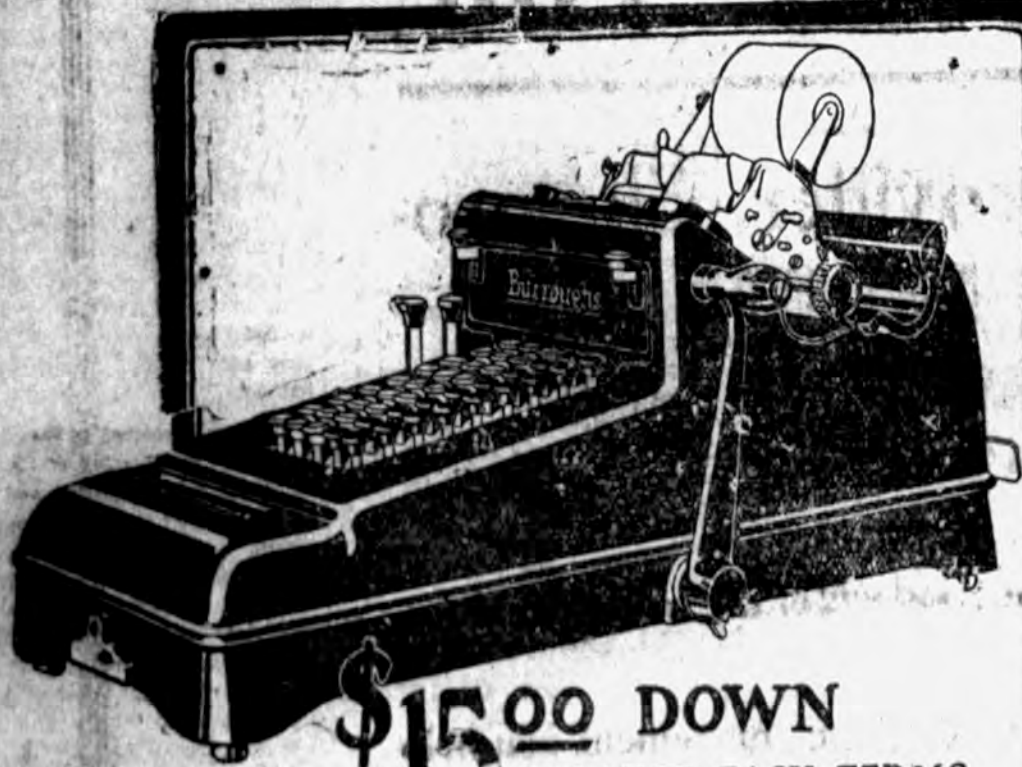

While the highway commission has provided signs for the dangerous curves on the hard surfaced roads of the county no action has been taken for improving the dangerous railroad crossings. It is admitted the curves are dangerous but they cannot compare with the menace of crossing in congested parts of the city. Overhead or underground crossings can be provided at less expense than maintaining a permanent flagmen as the eventually will be forced to do, and great loss of life may be avoided if such action is taken. County and town authorities should demand the railroads to protect the public to some extent and the sooner this is done the better everyone will feel about it.

With the approach of winter Pitt county farmers and business men should get together and plan the erection of as many potato storage warehouses as possible. Proper preservation of the potato crop will result in enormous savings to the grower, and this can be done through storage warehouse alone. Pitt county has lost thousands of dollars in past years because there was no way to prevent potatoes from rotting and the same situation will prevail as long as proper storage houses are neglected. Every community should have such houses. They be erected at no great outlay of money, and the saving will be so great they will pay for themselves even in a year's time. Bethel community is among the first to consider the houses and will be in position to handle the next crop produced. They are to be commended for this forward looking step and have blazed the pathway for others to follow.

President Harding is urging railroads to move coal and food first while the strike is in progress, believing they are the two things which the American public really needs the worst. That this is the right plan to pursue cannot be questioned, and the president probably did the right thing to make such request at this time. If the situation continues serious the president will find it to his advantage to take more drastic measure. Government control and operation of roads and mines will be the only direct way of remedying the situation and the need for this action was never more apparent. The railroaders and miners are determined to remain out and let the public suffer and if the government doesn't come to the rescue we will be confronted by one of the most deplorable situations in years. While government control is not generally favored it seems to be the best way out of a bad thing and the president will be backed up in any action taken in this direction.

The public is again confronted by an acute coal shortage, if recent reports concerning the rapidly diminishing supply is true, and before the winter is over prices will be considerably greater than at the present time. While it is certain the supply is short we cannot help believing the cry of a serious shortage has been brought about simply for the purpose of increasing prices. The public has had much experience with similar experiences, and operators are not fooling anyone when they claim the reserve supply is exhausted and that a

really serious situation is in store. The American people have been subjected to many questionable deals in past years, especially by members of the coal industry, and it is the duty of the government to investigate and keep prices down as much as possible. The closing down of factories because of the expected crisis is not really necessary, but is a measure of manufacturers to increase prices of their products. They first cause the public to believe their product is seriously short and hardly before the statement is made prices are increased. It is hard to believe American business men are so devoid of feeling for their own people, but past experiences have prove a great teacher, and it isn't likely the future will see any noticeable improvement.

Speeding on the hard surfaced roads of Pitt county has assumed such serious proportions that it is dangerous to travel over them when traffic is heavy. That something should be done to remedy the situation has been very evident from the first and but so far speeding continues and will increase by leaps and bounds as the system is enlarged. While it would be out of the question for the county to maintain a permanent traffic cop on all roads, this should be tried out until the speeders have been given a taste of the law. Fines would pay the expense of the officers for the first month or so, and after that time the personnel could be reduced on the quiet and speeders would never be able to determine when the cops would spot them. Something must be done before loss of life assumes appalling proportions and the quicker action is taken the more the same driving motorist will like it.

Pitt county farmers will be able to get their heads above the water this season if tobacco prices continue to show the same great strength. The price situation at present time is all that could be expected and the farmer that carefully prepares his crop for the market will find conditions very favorable indeed. There are many who lost heavily as result of the slump last season or so, but with price improvement conditions ought to be much better the present season. Of course, many farmers will lose heavily this year as result of crop shortage, but what they have produced will bring good prices and subsequent happiness. The grower should redouble his effort to produce better crops in the future and to use more care in preparation for the market. In this way alone can he expect to make his industry what it should be. He will mould his own destiny, and the next few years will be thrifty.

ATLANTA PLANS TO 'GET INTO MOVIES'

Atlanta, Aug.—Efforts to make Atlanta a leading picture production center are revealed in the granting of authority by the Georgia Securities Commission to proceed with plans to that effect.

The plans contemplate formation of a \$1,000,000 picture finance corporation and the erection of a \$100,000 studio in Atlanta.

The Southern Motion Picture Finance Corporation provides studio facilities and distribution is handled by the W. W. Hodgkinson Corporation of New York.

Fifty-two feature productions will be handled annually by these coordinating organizations. Emphasis will be given to the production of pictures dealing with the South.

to pay for any work done except to the secretary general and his staff who give their entire time to this work. For instance, Tom Pettus, of the Wilson Club organized the Greenville Club and never a cent did he get for it neither did he expect anything, but gave his time freely for the love of Rotary.

And our own Sis Ellen organized a club in a nearby town and he gave his time and talents for his love of Rotary.

This is enough to cause us to be proud when we realize that nearly 1300 clubs have been formed in this way.

But you may ask after hearing this "what is Rotary?" My answer would be like an electrician when asked "What is Electricity?" He could not tell you what electricity is in all probability would tell you what electricity could do.

I might say that Rotary is a group of men with high ideals who live up to them, but this would not tell you exactly what Rotary is.

Rotary does not try to do so much as a club but it tries to make its members better churchmen, better Masons, better members of the Chamber of Commerce and better everything to which they belong or come in contact with.

Rotary is an organization built entirely on "Service" and our motto is "Service above Self." He profits most who serves best" and in our code of ethics you will find "Do unto others as you would have them do to you." Some one has said that we use platitudes too much and we have been cautioned not to be to complacent and not to let our motto be "as tinkling of cymbals and sounding of brass" but that we must make it a real live motto that means something to each of us.

There is nothing new in Rotary. It is as old as the hills. Confucius taught it in ancient China cycles ago and Buddha later taught it to teeming millions in India.

At this time of so much economic, political and social unrest following the era of prosperity through which we have just passed it is the bounded duty of all good men whether Rotarians or not to have a note of sympathy in their dealings with their fellow men and in every responsibility that comes to us it is our duty to fulfill same so as to lift the level of our standards a little higher than they were before.

We must at all times view the affairs confronting us in a broad liberal manner and be very loth to criticize the other fellow until we are absolutely sure that we are right.

But, should things happen in our community detrimental to society as a whole it is up to us to criticize and try to prevent anything happening that will hurt us morally or specially to the best of our ability.

Fellows, if there was ever a time that the world needed Rotary now is the time and the best people in the world are looking to us to help lead in everything that is best for the citizenship of our country.

But above all, fellows as the poet says: "Be true to thyself and as surely as night follows the day thou canst be false to no man. That's Rotary."

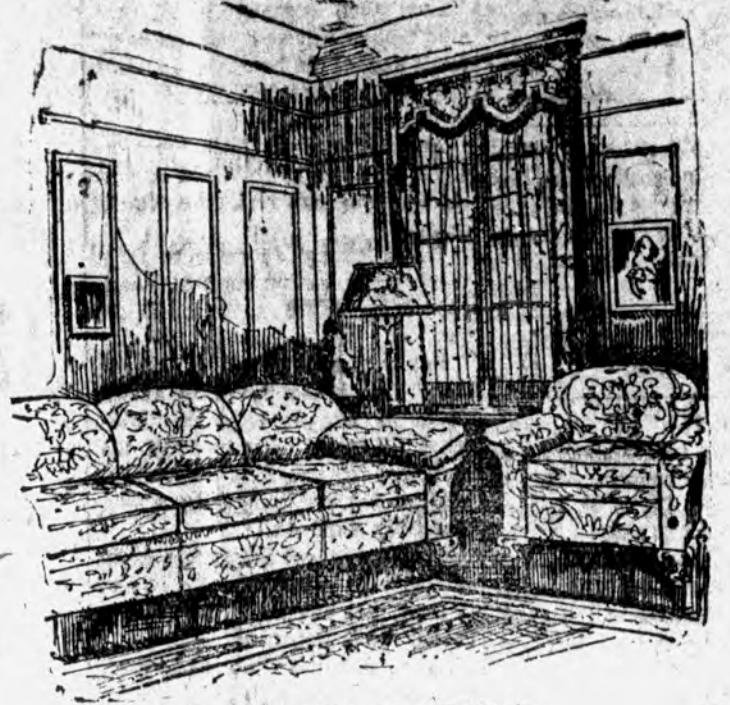

PARIS FLOODED WITH FAKE MASTERPIECES

Paris, Aug.—A mysterious hidden studio which is, in reality a veritable factory for turning out counterfeit masterpieces, is the object of search by prefecture detectives.

This factory is somewhere in the Latin quarter. There poor students and starving artists, it is believed, are paid too tempting wages for copying the works of great painters, the originals of which would command

huge prices. These copies are then sold at auctions either deliberately in place of the original, which may be in a private collection, or as a "newly discovered" work of the master.

Discovery of such "art treasures" on the market has led to the belief in the existence of this "masterpiece factory" and to the combing of the Latin quarter by the police in search of it.

In particularly, spurious works of modern painters of note have been detected, a variation of the old game of counterfeiting the older masters. All of the counterfeits discovered so far have been signed with the painter's name, cleverly forged.

ILLINOIS THIRD IN AGGREGATE INCOME

With \$4,962,000,000 Total, the State Ranks First in North Central Group

New York, Aug.—Illinois with \$4,962,000,000 as the annual aggregate income of its citizens leads the North Central States, according to computations announced today at the headquarters of the National Bureau of Economic Research.

Illinois receives 7.12 per cent of the nation's income, a figure which is exceeded only by New York and Pennsylvania. Pennsylvania ranks second in the role of States with six billion, while New York tops the list

with nine billion dollars annual income.

The data is taken from the advance sheets of a report by the National Bureau of Economic Research, entitled "Distribution of Income by States." This study which was prepared by Oswald W. Knauth, supplements an exhaustive investigation of "Income in the United States," upon which the research staff of the bureau under Dr. Wesley C. Mitchell, has been engaged for more than a year.

The East North Central States—Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan and Wisconsin—according to the report, "Distribution of Income by States," had in 1919 a total income of nearly \$15,000,000,000, which was 22 per cent of the income of the entire country. At the same time their population was exactly one-fifth of the total. As a group, therefore, their average income of \$308 was somewhat higher than that of the whole country, which

was \$627, though less than the \$783 average in the Eastern States, and the figure of \$736 enjoyed by the Pacific States.

The balance of income between that which is due to agriculture, and to other sources, according to the National Bureau of Economic Research, is almost exactly the same in the East North Central States as for the entire country, about one-sixth. This means that as a group these States are practically self-supporting. In contrast, the Eastern States get only one-third of their income from agriculture and must therefore depend upon food supplies brought from the West. The Western States, and most of the Southern States, get about one-third of their income from agriculture, and must therefore ship food extensively in exchange for manufactured products.

Detailed figures for the East North Central States show that while the

aggregate income of Illinois was about \$4,962,000,000, or 7.12 per cent of the nation's income, Ohio came next with \$3,967,000,000, then Michigan with \$2,582,000,000 and Indiana and Wisconsin with less than \$2,000,000,000.

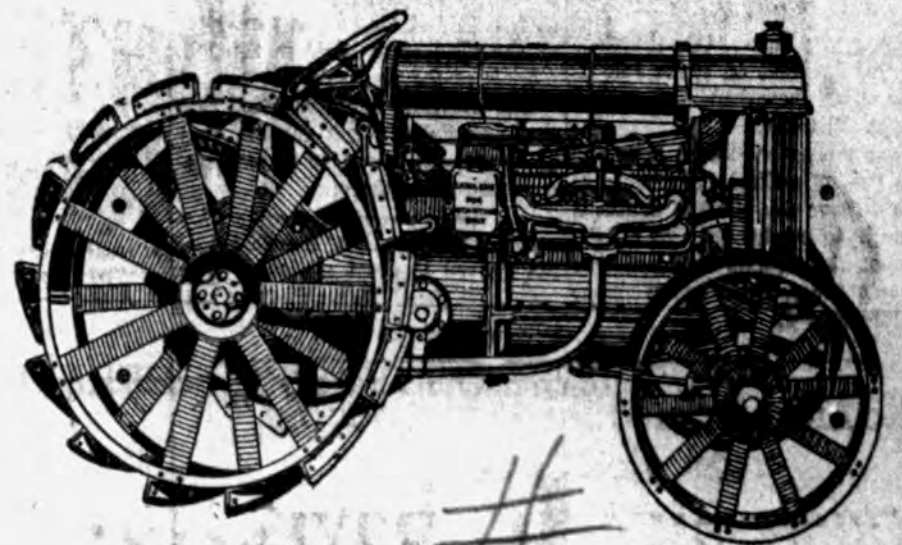
