DR. MUILBERGER HEAD OF MUSIC DEPT. CITY SCHOOL

Instruction to be Given in Expression and Public Speaking by Miss Doles

MISS EDITH HARVEY HAS BEEN SECURED AS TEACHER OF ART

Dr. Muilberger for the Past Year Has Been Director of Music at Kinston Church

Believing that the people of Greenville want the very best schools possible and believing that music is one of the biggest single factors in the success of any school the board of trustees of the Greenville schools has always encouraged musical projects in the local schools. During the past year there were three full time piano teachers. In addition to the regular piano work there was organized successfully a Glee Club and orchestra. In order to carry this work on still better the school has secured for the coming year in addition to the three music teachers of last year, the services of Dr. A. E. Muilberger. Dr. Muilberger will head the department of music in the schools here. He received his training at the Missouri Musical Academy of St. Louis and he studied under private teachers in Chicago and also at the Century school of music and oratory in Chicago. Later he was accompanist at the Century school. For two years he was director of music at Eastern College, Manassas, Virginia. Then for 7 years he was the head of the music department at the Atlantic Christian College at Wilson, N. C. For the past year he has been director of music of the First Christian church of Kinston and also organist. In addition to this he taught private lessons, in pipe organ, piano, voice and chorus work. In the Greenville schools he will teach, piano, voice chorus work, and perhaps pipe organ provided some arrangement can be made whereby the use of an organ can be obtained. The schools are arranging for people out in town who wish to take any of the above to come down to the school building and obtain instruction. The work will all be on a tuition basis.

Another department has also been added to the schools this year. There will be instruction given in expression and public speaking. Miss Lady Corrine Doles of Elm City will have charge of the work in this department. Miss Doles has had very good training for this work. Last year she taught in Sanford, and during the past summer was a student at Columbia University, New York City. This work will also be on a tuition basis, and all parents who wish for their children to take this work can see the superintendent about it or speak to the principals of the various buildings on the opening days of school.

To teach art this year to take the place of Miss Martin the school has secured the services of Miss Edith Harvey of Rome, Georgia. Miss Harvey is a full graduate of the art department of Shorter College, and after graduation taught art at Bethel College, Hopkinsville, Ky. During the past summer she has been studying at Peabody College.

POE ATTACKS THE REPUBLICAN COAL CONTROL BILL

Speaks Straight From Shoulder in Denunciation of the Bill

Washington, Aug. 29.—Tearing the mask from the faces of administration pretenses and exposing the utter futility of the measure that President Harding has proposed as a remedy for the strike situation and to answer the cries for coal that are coming by the thousands from the country, Congressman Edward W. Pou, ranking Democrat on the rules committee, dissected the Republican proposition.

Congressman Pou spoke straight from the shoulder in his denunciation of the bill. His speech created a profound impression. He deplored the spinelessness of the President. He declared his wish that the President could be strong enough to ask for a real measure of relief, to ask for the power to really control the situation and take over and operate the mines for the benefit of the American people, should it be necessary. He deplored the fact that the President seemingly fears to really have any real power committed to him. The North Carolina Congressman said that day after day the newspapers are publishing encouraging stories inspired by the White House while the situation grows worse and winter comes on with insufficient coal to be distributed and with rapidly decreasing railroad equipment with which to carry the coal to carry the coal to the people. He declared that he himself was ready to give the President the power to seize both the coal mines and the railroads and that the time for compromise has passed. He rebuked those Republican representatives who are seeking to have the congress adjourn and go home and loaf and repair political fences while cold and want stand just ahead of millions of American people with no adequate means provided, or in sight, to furnish them relief.

It was a speech that rang clear as a call to action, and Mr. Pou closed by declaring that "If this bill is your best answer to the cry for fuel going up throughout this nation, I say God have mercy on those who are not now provided with their winter's fuel."

CITY SCHOOLS TO OPEN FOR WORK MONDAY, SEPT. 11

All Children Attending for First Time Requested to Report on September 8th

The Greenville City Schools will open for work on Monday, Sept. 11. However, before that date the patrons of the schools are requested to keep the following dates in mind.

On Friday morning, Sept. 8 at the Evans Street School all children who are attending school for the first time will report. That is all beginners. There will be present at that time the superintendent, the principal of that building, Miss Keeter, and Miss Huske, teacher of the first grade and supervisor of all primary grades.

High School.
Wednesday, September 6th at 9 o'clock all members of the Freshman class of the High School will report at the principals office in the High school building.

Thursday morning, September 7th all Sophomores will report.

Thursday afternoon September 7th all Juniors will report.

Friday morning, September 8th all Seniors will report.

Also the superintendent requests that all children who have attended some other school before and who have moved to Greenville recently report at the High School Building on Friday morning, September 8th.

All this preliminary work is being done in order that there may be no time lost in getting started. It is the purpose of the school administration to eliminate so far as possible the idea that it takes a week to start off a school. In other words the pupils will get down to work on the opening day Monday, September 11th. The parents of the children are requested by the school authorities to help get this idea across in the children's minds. The superintendent feels that the taxpayers ought to get value received for their money, and hence the purpose not to lose any time.

All children not residing in the school district who wish to attend the Greenville schools may do so by paying tuition at the following rates. Primary grades \$3.00 a month; grammar grades \$4.00, High school \$5.00. This tuition must be paid to the principals of the various buildings and must be paid in advance.

The Greenville schools will change some of the books used in the lower grades this year. This is necessary because of the fact that the state Text Book commission adopted new books for the whole state. The books were adopted the past spring for a five year period. The state adopted books are cheaper than any other books.

The superintendent of schools, Mr. J. H. Rose now has his office in the High school building. His phone is 67 and he will be glad to see any of the parents at any time in his office on matters pertaining to the school.

The Evans Street school has been put in better shape than ever before. Ten new windows have been put in the building thus insuring more light. Also certain other repairs have been made.

Much of Golden Weed Sold on the Floors Here Today

There were approximately three hundred and fifty thousand pounds of the golden weed sold at auction on the five local warehouse floors today with the prices on all grades showing an improvement. On several grades the prices have advanced over last week from three to five cents in the pound. There is still a large quantity of common tobacco being marketed. While we are unable to obtain the exact figures from all the warehouses yesterday and today it is thought that advance prices have brought the market average for the two days to 25 cents.

The buyers as well as the warehouse men still insist that the tobaccos must be kept dry if the growers wish to receive the full market prices.

LOCAL MAN TO ACT AS CHAIRMAN DAVIDSON DRIVE

Campaign to be Waged to Raise \$600,000 for Expansion Davidson College

Charlotte, N. C., Aug. 30.—James Ficklen prominent tobacco merchant of Greenville, will act as chairman of Pitt county in the campaign for \$600,000 for the endowment and expansion of Davidson College, according to the announcement today of R. M. Miller, Jr., of this city, who is directing the campaign in North Carolina.

Many prominent business men and civic leaders of Pitt county are graduates of Davidson College and are active in the campaign to build a Greater Southern Presbyterian church. Davidson College is not only one of the leading educational institutions of North Carolina, but it is one of the leading Presbyterian colleges in America, and many prominent figures of the South and the country, such as ex-president Woodrow Wilson, received part, or all, of their education in its classrooms.

Approximately one-third of all Southern Presbyterian ministers are graduates of Davidson and more of its present students are preparing to enter the ministry than students of any other non-theological institution of the South. The present campaign is being conducted in order to increase the value of Davidson to North Carolina and to the South generally.

Graduates of the institution, North Carolina Presbyterians, and citizens of the state generally, are active in support of the campaign for a "Greater Davidson," and graduates of the institution alone, in North Carolina form a large part of the leading citizens. Of the \$600,000 raised by the campaign \$400,000 will be used for the rebuilding of the historic Chambers Hall, whose destruction by fire last year has greatly handicapped the work of the college. The additional \$200,000 will be added to the endowment fund in order to add more teachers to the faculty that are required by the present enrollment at Davidson.

At the present time the enrollment at Davidson is necessarily limited to 500. Religious and academic training are alike given in the college, and all the influences of college life tend toward building character as well as giving academic learning.

Directors of the Davidson campaign include eighty men who are leaders in America and in the South. Among them is ex-president Woodrow Wilson, who plans to give the campaign all the personal support that his present condition of health will allow, several of the most prominent ministers in the South, and many business men and civic leaders.

County Chairman in North Carolina likewise include men prominent for civic and religious leadership. Mr. Ficklen who will direct the campaign in Pitt county is a well known tobacco merchant. During the campaign he will have the co-operation, but of the ministers and business men in the county as well.

Efforts Being Made to Locate Steamer The Pan American

EXTENSION MADE IN COLLECTION OF MAIL FROM BOXES

Every Box in City to be Included in Early Morning Collection of Mail

The people of Greenville will be glad to know that the hours for the collection of mail from the city letter boxes has been so changed that letters dropped in any box in the city before 5:30 a. m. will be taken up in time for dispatch by the first morning train. Heretofore the early morning collection has only been made from the boxes in the business district and those having letters to mail after the regular afternoon collection were compelled to carry them to the postoffice or one of the business district boxes while now it is possible to drop them in the nearest box and know that they will lose no time in reaching their destination. This is indeed welcome news to the patrons of this office and shows that the postal authorities here are striving to give the people the efficient service they deserve.

GO TO SUPREME COURT WITH VANCE ELECTION

Henderson, Aug. 29.—Quick action is looked for in the appeal to the State Supreme Court in the election dispute from this county in the matter of the Democratic nomination for register of deeds. It is understood the county board of elections and the attorneys for Mrs. George T. Buchanan will join in presenting the case to the Supreme Court. The appeal follows the decision here last week by Superior court Judge John H. Kerr, in which he ruled in favor of P. E. Rowland, incumbent, when attorneys for Mr. Rowland instituted mandamus proceedings to compel the board to declare Mr. Rowland the rightful nominee, after it had thrown out five votes giving Mrs. Buchanan a majority of two in the second primary of July 1.

Thomas M. Pittman, chairman of the board of elections, said today that the case would be filed in time for hearing of appeals from this, the Third Judicial district, which are expected to reach the court probably week after next. There were some intimations today, however, that a request might be made to tackle the appeal from this county on the fall end of the second district cases, so as to get early action. The race was so close that the county is fairly well split and much interest is being manifested on both sides. Mrs. Buchanan is the first woman to seek office in Vance county.

Mrs. Buchanan, nee Miss Mae Whitfield, of this city, has many friends here who are watching her fight with interest.

Pitt Delegation Arrives in Americus, Ga., on Morning of August 10th

VISITS SUMTER'S FINE HOG FARMS AND PASTURES

Sold Over \$200,000 Worth of Live Stock in 1920, Said Sumter Citizen

The late afternoon of Wednesday, August 9th, found the Pitt delegation on their way from Albany, Ga., to Americus, which place was reached by night.

Local citizens from Americus and Sumter county, under the auspices of the Chamber of Commerce and County Agent, took the lead early on the morning of the 10th, and escorted Pitt Countians over some unusually fine farms.

One of Sumter's fine hog farms was visited. Here you saw as fine a lot of Durocs as you can generally find. Pastures, here as elsewhere, played an important part in their growth and development. We were told that 50 head of hogs—sows and pigs—grazed on a two acre plot of millet for quite awhile.

Said one of the Sumter citizens, "In 1920 we sold over \$200,000 worth of live stock." "We have been in the livestock business long enough to know that there is money in it."

For some reason it seems that Sumter county has not been as badly hurt on account of the boll weevil as some other counties, however the loss cannot be attributed to indifference on the part of the citizens of Sumter county, for they know that farming on the former scale will bring disaster.

The Pitt party was told that Sumter county produced 190 bales in 1921, where they had raised as high as 10,000 bales before the weevil; Wilkinson county produced 170 bales in 1921, with a pre-boll weevil production of 8,000 bales; Bibb county 1,752 bales with a pre-boll weevil production of 8 to 10 thousand bales.

Leaving Americus, the Pitt party passed through the famous peach belt, touching Montezuma, Marshallville and Fort Valley. This section shipped approximately 7,500 cars of peaches this season.

After taking noonday luncheon at Fort Valley, Macon was next destination point. Perhaps one of the finest rural sections in the entire State will be seen from Fort Valley to Macon—pastures, orchards, cotton, corn, livestock, dairying, modern homes with waterworks and other up-to-date equipment, diversified farming, as is evidenced in this section, is not a losing proposition, but one that pays.

Hundreds Attracted Here by "Heart of the Season Sale"

The "Heart of the Season Sale" which has been in progress since Friday of last week at Blount-Harvey Company has probably broken all previous records in the number in attendance each day. It has not only been people from throughout Pitt county, but scores have been attracted here from the adjoining counties.

Today saw possibly the largest crowd since the opening day, the occasion being a special sale of Aluminum ware with other special offerings throughout the store. An hour before the doors were thrown open the door ways and side walk in front of the building was thronged with people. Hundreds of those visiting the store during the morning hours were forced to leave without admission as standing room was a premium. At the aluminum counters, those in charge of this department were kept busy waiting on anxious buyers until 2,016 pieces had been disposed of. In conversation with a representative of the Reflector this morning both Mr. Blount, manager of the company, and Mr. Schaut who has charge of the sale, expressed their regret that the supply was inadequate to meet the demand.

BUILDING AND LOAN GROWTH.

In the growth of assets in her
building and loan associations during
the last fiscal year North Carolina
outstripped all states, according to
Commissioner Wade's report, while
only four states in the Union exceed-
ed her in the number of new associa-
tions formed during the year. About
a hundred million dollars is invested
in these 220 associations, and com-
missioner Wade says that they have
been of inestimable value in the
growth and thrift of the state.

There is hardly anything that con-
tributes more surely to the steady
growth of a city than good building
and loan associations and the legis-
lature has displayed wisdom in fos-
tering them. For the town or city
dweller they afford a great opportu-
nity to build a home and pay for it.
For the country investor they afford a
safe and profitable medium for his
savings. They do not offer chimeri-
cal visions of great wealth from small
investments but they do offer a guar-
antee from great disappointment and
insure a safe growth of small mon-
thly or weekly savings into substan-
tial sums of money. They keep all
this money at work in the home com-
munity and by upbuilding it steadily
they bring additional profit and op-
portunity to the investor.—Lexington
Dispatch.

EARLY CHILD LABOR LESSENS CHANCES FOR ADULT EFFICIENCY.

Both child and community are
losers by a policy which allows chil-
dren under the age of 16 years to be
gainfully employed, according to a
report on "The Working Children of
Boston" just issued by the U. S. de-
partment of Labor through the Chil-
dren's Bureau. They have not re-
ceived an education of the sort to
make them adaptable to changing in-
dustrial conditions or to give them
an understanding of the duties of citi-
zenship. They are "subjected also to
positive damage," the conclusions
state, "from irregular habits of work
from labor unsuited to their needs
and capacities, and from unsuitable
associations and environments."

Advancement in school work seems
to have exercised a favorable in-
fluence over even the children's
first earnings in regular positions,
and the advantage of those who had
completed normal or higher than nor-
mal grades for their ages was still
more definite in regard to wage in-
creases, steadiness of employment,
and earnings over an extended period
of time. The study dealt with con-
ditions which attended the entrance
into working life of all children in
Boston, Cambridge, Somerville, and
Chelsea, Mass., who passed their four-
teenth birthday in a given year and
who entered employment within two
years thereafter, a total of 5,692, or
approximately one-third of the chil-
dren of their ages in these cities.
Information concerning subsequent
working histories was secured for a
number of these children about three
years later, and the advantage of
those who had completed higher
grades in school appeared at this
time to have grown more pronoun-
ced, and suggests, the report says,

"that even the small amount of edu-
cation which the eighth-grade grad-
uate could boast over the sixth grade
graduate was a real industrial asset."
The children interviewed who had
started work at least a year before
the interview took place had been
unemployed 14.4 per cent of the time
since they had started work, and
many of them had spent long periods
out of school before entering em-
ployment. Of 823 children inter-
viewed 33 per cent had held new
positions on an average once every
three to six months, and another 8
per cent still more frequently. The
average monthly earnings of the chil-
dren who had worked for a period of
a year or more preceding the time of
the interview (in 1918) were only
\$16.68, though workers steadily em-
ployed and not subject to "lay-offs,"
as were those taken on for depart-
ment store sales and for seasonal
work in needle trades, attained a
monthly average not quite \$3 higher
than this amount. The occupations
in which children between 14 and
16 years of age can be employed are
are restricted by their lack of phys-
ical strength and lack of education,
and to a certain extent by law. Most
of the positions held by the children
studied involved simple mechanical
tasks or running errands or carrying
articles, and in the vast majority of
cases, the report states, were not of
such a character as to offer a future
in themselves or a training for any
occupation by which the child could
hope to earn a living as an adult.

The reason most frequently given
by the children for going to work
was that of economic need, but re-
tardation and lack of adjustment to
school life appeared to be important
factors also. Of 3,399 who had en-
tered full-time employment, all of
whom were at least 14 and a large
proportion 15 years of age, 50.4
per cent had not completed the eighth
grade before entering industry. Many
of those interviewed gave as their
reason for leaving that they dislike
school or were dissatisfied with their
progress. These facts show the press-
ing need, the report declares, for
the study and application of methods
of training adolescent boys and girls
which shall make the most of what-
ever capacity each may possess.

34TH SESSION OF
STATE COLLEGE
TO OPEN SEPT. 5

Found Necessary to Assign 3
Students to Each Room in
Watauga Hall

Raleigh, N. C., Aug.—With comparatively few changes in the faculty, the thirty-fourth session of State College will open with the registration of students on Tuesday, September 5. Registration will continue through Wednesday, the sixth, and class work will begin Thursday morning, September 7.

More than three hundred new men have already been admitted to the Freshman class and applications are still being received at the Registrar's office on every mill. It has been found necessary to assign three students to each room in Watauga Hall and the First, Second and Third dormitories, but this congestion will be somewhat relieved with the completion of the three new sections to South Dormitory which are expected to be ready for occupancy about the first of October.

Ricks Hall, the new Agricultural

extension building, and Page Hall, the new home of the department of Mechanical Engineering, will be ready for use at, or soon after, the opening of college, but the additions to the dining hall doubling its present capacity of 750 will not be finished until about the first of November.

Construction work at the dining hall will not interfere with the present accommodations for feeding the students as the new addition is practically a separate structure being located in a new wing immediately in the rear. The old kitchen will serve both wings, but it has already been enlarged and new and more modern equipment has been installed throughout.

There will be no changes in departments heads in the teaching personnel, although a few additions have been made in some of the subordinate positions and in some cases it has been necessary to fill positions made vacant by resignations.

Many of the department heads are still absent from the college and it has been impossible to ascertain the other new men added to the teaching staff as all negotiations with applicants have been handled directly by the department head concerned.
