DR. J. W. PEACOCK MAKES HIS ESCAPE FROM STATE PEN

Hacks Way Through Steel Bar and Swings Down to Third Story

LEAVES NOTE TO DEPUTY WARDEN BIDDING FAREWELL

Was Sentenced to Serve Life Sentence in Criminal Insane Department

Raleigh, Aug. 31.—Hacking his way through an inch of steel bar and swinging down from his cell window on the third floor of the State prison on a rope of five bed sheets, Dr. J. W. Peacock, committed for the rest of his life to the criminal insane department of the prison following his acquittal of murder of J. E. Taylor, chief of police at Thomasville, made his escape yesterday morning some time between midnight and dawn.

Scribbled regret that the haste of his departure did not permit him to say goodbye to Deputy Warden Bridgers, and the request that his books be packed up and sent to his wife in Thomasville, and that Bridgers himself take his rocking chair, is all that Peacock left behind him except the five sheets dangling outside to the window and a piece of his hack-saw an inch long.

Hastily organized pursuit tracked the fugitive doctor across the woods west of the prison and lost him somewhere beyond the new site of the State Blind school. Nobody saw him go, and nobody yet knows whether he went. Superintendent George Ross Pou has offered a reward of \$400 for his capture, and has broadcasted descriptive circulars all over the State. Peacock left no clue in his note, which follows:

"Dear Bridgers—I hate to go on my vacation without saying goodbye, but my extreme haste makes it impossible. Please pack my books and things and send to my wife. The rocking chair I give to you. May see you next spring if not sooner. Best wishes. J. W. P."

The note was written on the back of an envelope. The envelope had been addressed to Dr. Peacock from Thomasville and was mailed there at 6 o'clock August 15. Prison officials said that the letter was written Dr. Peacock by his wife. It is addressed to "835 West Morgan street." The note was found lying on the bare mattress from which the sheets had been stripped.

Where Dr. Peacock got the saw with which he hacked his way through the heavy steel bars is not known to Warden Busbee or Superintendent Pou. Utmost precaution has been observed to prevent him from receiving such things. His letters have been opened, his chewing tobacco has been examined, his loaves of bread have been broken open. All of his many visitors have been entertained in the presence of guards.

Peacock was a tremendous reader, and many books came to his prison house. The saw was not over eight inches long, and it is believed by prison authorities that the instrument came into the prison concealed in the covers of a book. No examination has yet been made of his considerable library. Five bed sheets in a cell are not unusual, it was said. Otherwise Dr. Peacock might have got hurt dropping down.

TOBACCO GROWERS FROM ADJOINING STATES SELL HERE

Local Warehouses Receiving the Weed From Virginia and Other States

There was another large break of tobacco on the local auction floors today, there being approximately four hundred thousand pounds sold. The prices are holding up well on all grades. A large quantity of tips are being marketed this week, and the prices received are high where the tobacco is kept in good condition.

Notwithstanding there is a short tobacco crop because of the excessive rains just prior to cutting time, there is a possibility of local market selling a greater number of pounds this year than they did last. Every day growers are coming here from a distance of seventy-five miles, and many passing some of the largest markets in the eastern part of the state. The Greenville market has already received from Virginia nearly as much tobacco as it usually sells from that state for an entire season. Many of these growers from a distance state that the local market has been recommended to them as the best in eastern North Carolina.

The good breaks of the past few days have improved business conditions generally, and the local banking institutions report that a large number of the growers are depositing a large percentage of their checks.

AUTOMOBILE THIEF GIVEN TWO YEARS ON COUNTY ROAD

Afternoon Session Given Over to the Disposition of Jail Cases.

Philip Evans who a few weeks ago stole a Hudson car from Mr. A. P. Gilbert was given a hearing in today's session of August term of criminal court and sentenced to two years on the county roads.

Evans, who claims that he is a Cherokee Indian, came to Greenville about one month ago and applied for a job with Mr. Gilbert. A night or two later while Mr. Gilbert's car was standing in front of Mrs. Annie Quinley's residence, Evans succeeded in stealing it and made his get away. Three days later he was arrested in Elizabeth, New Jersey. Mr. Gilbert being immediately notified of the arrest.

Evans entered court today and pleaded guilty. A few witnesses were examined after which Mr. Gilbert took the stand. The case assumed only a short time, the sentence of two years on the roads being given after Mr. Gilbert's testimony.

The criminal term is attracting wide attention and the calendar is being quickly cleared, several cases having been disposed of during the three days which it has been in session.

Today is being given entirely to the jail all prisoners possible being given a hearing.

The trial of the negro girl, of the Farmville section, who threw her baby in the hog pen will be taken up during this afternoon's session.

Several minor cases have been disposed of, others not pressed and a few continued.

MAJ. LOVING WILL MAKE REPORT ON POWER PROJECT

Washington, Aug. 31.—Major Loving, army engineer, of Montgomery, Ala., has been ordered to make a detailed report on the power project which the Alabama Power Company proposes to construct at Tallapoosa River, Alabama at an expenditure of \$40,000,000. It will be designed to furnish electric power to the industries of the southern states including North and South Carolina, Alabama and Tennessee.

Secretary of Chamber of Commerce Continues Account of Recent Tour of Georgia

AUGUST TENTH FINDS PARTY TEN MILE OF MACON

A Tour of Bibb County Farms Made Before Arriving in Macon

(H. L. SMITH.)

At 4:00 o'clock on the afternoon of Aug. 10th, the agricultural committee of the Macon, Ga., Chamber of Commerce, headed by the chairman, Dr. W. G. Lee, met the Pitt county delegation some ten or twelve miles out.

Immediately a tour Bibb county farms was made. The impressions of this trip will be lasting for many reasons.

Special attention must be called to the school system of Bibb county. They have four high schools in the distinctly rural districts of the county. Driving out of Macon on the Fort Valley road, a distance of some 11 miles, you will see the Rutland High school.

The influence of the above named school is seen on the general appearance of adjacent community life. Farm values in this community, notwithstanding the boll weevil, are much higher than in neighboring sections. It is no uncommon sight to view homes with every convenience in this community. Be it said to their credit, that they also take a special interest in the appearance of their home and out-buildings. Many, many times you will drive along and see flowers, of many kinds and hues, adorning, not only the front, but the rear of the homes.

These communities are making rural life attractive and thereby the boys and girls, instead of going elsewhere for their pleasures, are finding them within their own homes. In these communities, the boys and girls can secure a high school education, and yet be with their parents.

After inspecting a number of farms the Macon pilots then escorted the party over the city, showing many places of interest. Macon is a city of 52,995, 1920 census. Among the places of interest in the city are the following: Mercer University, Wesleyan Female College, a million dollar union depot; a modern city hall, Georgia-Alabama Business College, numerous manufacturing plants. Last, but not least, you will drive throughout the city and let your eyes rest on beautiful parks. Macon has been officially designated as the rose city of the South. A few years ago the city employed a landscape gardener, who spent quite awhile on the many parks of the city.

At 8:30 o'clock dinner was tendered the party, at which a special program was rendered. The fellowship and practical helpfulness of this hour was a highwater mark of the tour and came as a fitting climax to a wonderful trip.

Judge Connor Is Chosen Lecturer At University

Wilson, N. C., Aug. 31.—Late yesterday afternoon Judge H. G. Connor of Wilson who presides over the Eastern Federal Judicial district received a telegram from President H. W. Chase of the University of North Carolina apprising him of the creation of the Ruffin lectureship, and that Judge Connor had been named by a rising vote of the directors of the board of trustees as its incumbent.

Judge Connor will accept the position, but the date of the assumption of his duties and taking up his residence at Chapel Hill will depend largely upon circumstances. There are matters personal and also others in connection with his duties as district judge and pending legal matters in the federal court and many considerations which make the time of his entering upon his work at the university probably a question of several months.

SOLDIERS HAVE BEEN ORDERED FROM SPENCER

Governor Morrison Directs Removal of National Guard From Strike Zone.

Salisbury, N. C., 31.—The troops which have been guarding the Southern shops at Spencer are breaking camp and making their departure today following Governor Morrisons order. The outlook is quiet and no disorders have been reported.

Raleigh, Aug. 31.—Five hundred National Guardsmen who, two weeks have been stationed in Salisbury and vicinity for emergency use during the strike of seventeen hundred Southern shopmen at Spencer, will be withdrawn by noon today, Adjutant General J. Van B. Meets announced yesterday following instructions from the governor.

Governor Morrison's direction for the removal of the troops is in line with his order for the demobilization of companies stationed for similar reasons in Rocky Mount, Rockingham and Raleigh, and Aberdeen recently. Absolute quiet prevails in the strike area and no further good, it appears, will be accomplished by holding the force of five hundred guards men at Salisbury.

Last night, complete arrangements for the removal of the troops had not been made. It was stated, however, that they will be moved by noon today.

During the stay of the troops in Camp Morrison, three miles from Spencer, the guardsmen figured in the excitement incident to the attack on Rev. Tom Jimison, Methodist minister by John Sloop, a postal employee, and guards were thrown about Sloop who was engaged at his work in the post office. It was the presence of troops at the Spencer shops that brought the withdrawal of Brotherhood men from the Southern trains at Spencer and temporarily tied up traffic until they were removed by request of the Southern Railway officials.

The organizations which are removed from Salisbury are: Company A, Burlington, Captain M. V. Copeland; Company B, Durham, Captain M. B. Fowler; Company E, Concord, Captain K. E. Caldwell; Company F, Charlotte, Captain M. G. Caldwell; Company G, Winston-Salem, Captain Ben H. Gray; Company K, Mt. Gilead, Captain J. F. Carroll; Troop E, 109th Cavalry, Lincoln; Troop G, 109th Cavalry, Hickory; Medical Detachment 120th Infantry, Graham.

Yesterday afternoon, those soldiers which have been on duty at the passenger station in Salisbury were withdrawn and Colonel Scott held a conference with representatives of the striking shopmen, the Southern Railway; Postmaster A. H. Boyden, and others relative to improvement of conditions and the maintenance of law and order in the strike area.

At the conclusion of the conference Colonel Scott who has assurance from the strikers and the men inside the shop that they would control the situation, announced formally that the troops would be removed today.

French Conditions of Indemnity Must Be Modified, Said

Berlin, Aug. 31.—Following last night's meeting of the cabinet, Chancellor Wirth has notified a government representative in Paris dealing with the inter-allied reparations that Germany will not sign the French conditions of the indemnity moratorium unless modified.

Coal Production Predicted Normal Within Two Weeks

(By International News.)

Washington, Aug. 31.—Government officials today predicted that the production of coal in both the anthracite and bituminous fields will be virtually normal within two weeks.

FINAL ACTION ON COAL BILL BLOCKED BY LONG WRANGLE

Legislators Reject Every Proposal Change in Measure to Control Coal Distribution

EARLY PEACE IS EXPECTED IN THE ANTHRACITE FIELDS

Coal Control Bill to be Taken up After Soldier's Bonus Bill Is Settled

Washington, Aug. 31.—After rejecting all amendments to the administration coal distribution bill, the House ran into an unexpected storm of talk late today and was forced to quit until tomorrow without reaching a vote.

Every change proposed was either thrown out on a point of order or decisively defeated. At the end of the all-day wrangle, Chairman Winslow, of the Interstate Commerce Committee, who was in charge of the measure, predicted it would go through as framed.

As the House worked on the measure which its supporters claimed was all the legislation needed to meet the emergency caused by the coal and rail strikes, word reached leaders that attempts to settle the anthracite tie-up might succeed, and that the Senate was ready to take up the House coal bills as soon as it was through with the bonus.

President Harding's original suggestion for creation of a buying and selling coal agency was put before the House by Representative Anderson, Republican, Minnesota, with a provision indirectly authorizing seizure of mines if found necessary in connection with agency activities, but it went out on a point of order. Advised that an amendment authorizing the President to take over railroads and mines, in the event of "grim necessity," would go out in the same swift fashion, members favoring such legislation announced that nothing was to be gained by courting certain rejection.

With little ceremony, the House voted down an amendment fixing the distributor's salary at \$7,500.

Representative Fairchild, Republican, New York, found few supporting his proposal that coal distributed should be "sold at a reasonable price to the ultimate consumer." An unsuccessful attempt was made by Representative Denison, Republican, Illinois, to strike out what some members characterized as the heart of the bill, this being the provision that the fuel distributor, in trying to meet the emergency, should "prevent extortion in prices charged for coal and other fuel."

Amendment by Representative Boies, Republican, Iowa, which would have ordered a 50 per cent reduction in the freight rates on coal, to begin within ten days, was thrown out even before its reading had been concluded.

The principal attack on the bill today was by Representative Rayburn, Texas, Democratic member of the committee which framed it, while Representative Barkley, Democrat, Kentucky, and Representative Graham, Republican, Illinois, also members of the committee, supported the measure. Mr. Rayburn insisted that it would have the effect of curtailing production while Mr. Barkley and Mr. Graham declared a grave emergency existed and that congress ought to meet it without thought of partisanship.

Closing the debate, Chairman Winslow informed the House that in the presence of his committee he had talked over the telephone this morning with the President and that the president was heartily in favor of the bill, believing it would enable the government to handle "the most flagrant cases through its operation."

TWENTY ARE KILLED IN TRAIN WRECK

SOIL FERTILITY.

As every individual farmer must know, it is from the cultivation of the soil directly or indirectly that most of the wealth of the State is derived, it is but natural to infer that the one greatest outstanding need of farmers of the State is for a fuller and more complete knowledge of the many factors that contribute to productive soils. Even when a soil is well cultivated, it will fail to produce good crops until after it is well drained; well supplied with organic matter; and there is present in the soil a sufficient amount of plant food constituents in available form to produce good crop yields. Should any one of these factors be lacking, the crops even if all the others are provided for in the best possible way.

It should always be clearly kept in mind, however, that it is not necessarily the farm who produces the largest yields that secures the largest profit from his farming operations. One should not be misled by large yields into believing that the methods necessarily used in producing these are the ones that must be used by farmers generally to produce the largest profits per acre. They may or may not be the ones if adopted which will bring the greatest returns. It is almost possible for any good farmer if he will pile on the fertilizer or manure, with fairly good cultivation and ample rainfall, to produce large yields, but to produce these large yields most profitably on poor soils requires considerable skill

and thought coupled with the best farm practices.

Every thoughtful farmer must realize upon reflection that the methods that have been used far too commonly in this state, as well as by farmers in other sections, have led in far too many cases to a depletion of the productiveness of the soil instead of increasing it. This has been largely due to the assumption that the soil contains an inexhaustible supply of the materials necessary for crop growth and that the only thing that has to be done, especially if weather conditions and other factors are favorable, is to prepare the soil well and to give the crop a reasonably good cultivation. This plan, although irrational, is used far too generally by our farmers in North Carolina and as a consequence our soils in far too many cases have been run down in productiveness to such an extent that it is not possible to secure with the use of the best cultural methods and most favorable weather conditions very large returns, as is shown by the small average yields of crops per acre for the state.

EXTENSIVE DRIVE ON TUBERCULOSIS OF CATTLE NOW

(By International News.)

Washington, Aug.—Efforts of many states to eradicate tuberculosis among cattle has gained such headway that officials of the Department of Agriculture regard the end of the fight against the great cattle plague as a practical possibility.

"Many counties are now raising large amounts of money for this purpose," the department states, "and the clean counties have set an example that stimulates others to follow. Progressive communities are beginning to realize that they cannot have diseased herds and expect to compete with farmers and breeders in localities that are entitled to divert the ill ofotointoainshruaoni free of tuberculosis."

According to records of the department, a dozen states now have one or more counties in which all of the cattle have been tested one or more times.

Oregon now has seven counties in this class; Washington and Wisconsin, four each; Michigan and Mississippi, three each; Nebraska and Montana, two each; and Idaho, North Carolina, Utah, Virginia and West Virginia, one each.

Intensive work directed toward the eradication of tuberculosis is now being done by 128 counties in twenty-two states. In this list Missouri has eighteen counties; Nebraska, sixteen; North Carolina, fourteen; Maine, eleven, and New York, ten. Preliminary work is being done in 256 counties and seventy-nine communities in thirty-three states. Iowa has thirty-one counties in this list; North Carolina, thirty; Idaho, twenty-six; Kentucky, twenty-eight; Oregon, twenty-three; New York, seventeen, and Nevada and Wisconsin, ten each. Forty communities in Georgia, thirty-one in South Carolina and a few in Louisiana and Vermont have started eradication work.

The board of supervisors in a number of counties in North Carolina have made appropriations to assist in fighting tuberculosis on the "area plan." Some Kentucky counties have used money for this purpose from the general tax levy. In Missouri, where a large number of counties are doing area work, the county courts appropriate money to assist in paying for animals slaughtered because of being infected with tuberculosis. Nebraska is also making long strides in the area work. California was one of the last states to enter into co-operative work with the agriculture department, but the work is now being carried on actively in two counties.

HEAVY BREAKFAST FOR BRAIN WORKER

Forty-six States Show Overwhelming Majority in Favor of the Heavy Breakfast

A substantial breakfast followed by a light lunch is the healthiest regime for those engaged in sedentary occupations. That is the overwhelming conclusion reached in a survey conducted by the Medical Review of Reviews among leading physicians of the country.

The survey was made to ascertain whether it was preferable to start the day with a substantial breakfast of fruit, cereal, bacon and eggs, toast and a beverage, with later a light but

nourishing lunch, or to proceed on the "no breakfast" or "cup of coffee and slice of toast" plan, developing a midday appetite for a hearty meal.

Forty-six states, represented by physicians including commissioners of health of state and city, show an overwhelming majority in favor of the heavy breakfast. 73 per cent in favor of starting the day with a substantial meal; 13 per cent opposed to a heavy breakfast; 14 per cent inconclusive answers, is a summary of the replies.

Fifty-seven doctors base their advocacy of a heavy breakfast on the fact that only a light lunch is necessary after consuming a substantial meal in the morning, thus leaving the brain active and alert for the afternoon's work.

Dr. S. J. Crumblin, executive officer and secretary of the Kansas State

Board of Health, says:

"It is my judgment that the day should be started with a fairly substantial breakfast, and that the noon lunch should be light so as not to interfere with vigorous mental or physical effort of the day's work."

Dr. E. J. Underwood of the Mississippi State Board of Health feels that "it is preferable to start the day with a fairly substantial breakfast, consisting of fruit, cereal, bacon and eggs, etc., eat a light but nourishing lunch, and have the heavy meal at six in the evening. I don't think there is any doubt but what one could do better mental work by following out this plan."

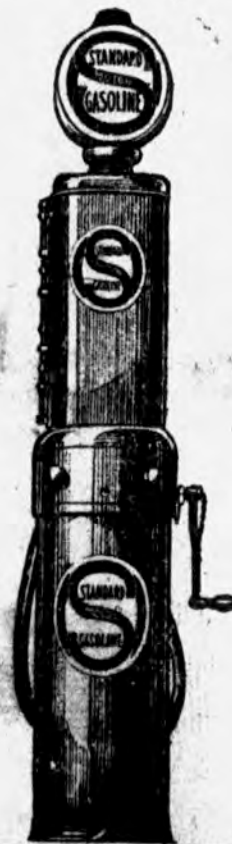

AMERICAN LEGION MEMBERS MEET IN NEW ORLEANS SOON

**Ships, Pullman Cars, Tents and
Army Base Buildings and
Private Homes to be Used**

New Orleans, Aug. 31.—Ships, Pullman cars, tents, and army supply base building, private homes and hotels will house the thousands of delegates and visitors expected at the American Legion convention in New Orleans, October 16-20.

A preliminary canvass by the convention hotels and housing committee has demonstrated the fact that New Orleans will be able to house 150,000 guests.

Passenger liners will be docked and former "gobs" and marines will be allotted first cabin accommodations on them.

A Pullman city of hundreds of cars, to be established in three large railroad yards, will care for 14,000 visitors, the convention committee has announced. The "hotels on wheels" will be provided with all the conveniences of a modern hostelry. Dining car service will be maintained, shower bath will be erected and all equipment will be electrically lighted while parked.

The railroads have established a charge of \$12 for parking in addition to the \$54 for daily Pullman car rental. The average cost of the Pullman guest will be about \$2 a day.

If the size of the convention crowd warrants it, tents will be erected on the parkways of some of the more centrally located boulevards. A model barrack, patterned after those of entomment days, will be established in the Army Supply Base, a fifteen million dollar structure on the river front. Private homes will be thrown open to the veteran who brings his wife to the convention.

New Orleans hotel men have agreed upon a uniform rate schedule of \$1.50 a day without bath and \$2.50 with bath. Charges in the tent cities and improvised hotels will be from fifty to seventy-five cents a day and the cost in private homes will compare favorably with the hotel rates.

All reservations for rooms during the five days of the convention must be made through the Legion department adjacent of the state from which the visitor comes.

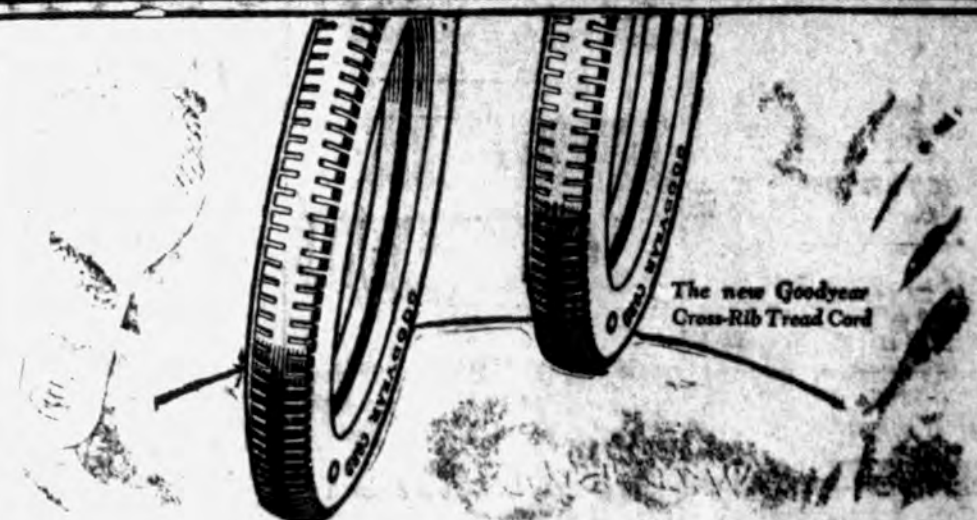

GUESTS AT KENNON HAD WILD NIGHT

Awaken to Find Intruder Prowling Around in Their Room at Hotel

Goldsboro, Aug. 30. — Sounds of a struggle, punctured by cries of "help! help!" attracted the attention of Night Clerk Ward at the Kennon about midnight yesterday. Rushing to room No. 391 where the cries emanated, Mr. Ward found S. F. Perce, a guest, struggling with an intruder. When the man was quieted and the lights turned on he was found to be John Denning, young Goldsboro man, who was one of the thirteen poker players jailed before Judge Oliver H. Allen yesterday afternoon. He was jailed on a burglar charge. Officer J. G. Langston making the arrest.

With his wife, Mr. Perce arrived here on a late train yesterday evening. They had been asleep but a few minutes before Mr. Perce was awakened by the scrapping of a belt buckle on the iron bedstead. He listened intensely for a few seconds. There was a repetition of the noise. His eyes having become accustomed to the darkness, Mr. Perce managed to make out the figure of a man bending over the foot of his bed. He made a lunge for the intruder.

Mrs. Perce, awakened by the struggle, lay terror stricken while her husband tussled with young Denning. When Night Clerk Ward arrived he found the pair almost exhausted by the struggle.

Upon the appearance of J. C. Van-story, the proprietor of the hotel, and Officer Langston a search of Mr. Perce's pockets were made. Two dollars, later found under the bed, were found missing.

Denning denied touching any money or that robbery was his motive. He had been drinking, he said, and "just wandered in the room." In fact he declared that he was too drunk to realize his predicament.

Mr. and Mrs. Perce are from Henderson.

Denning is married and the father of one or two children, it was stated this morning. He was not registered at the hotel, the presumption being that he gained the stairs to the third floor by walking boldly through the lobby. There are so many guests going and coming at this hour that egress in this manner is possible without detection. The door to Mr. Perce's room was not locked.

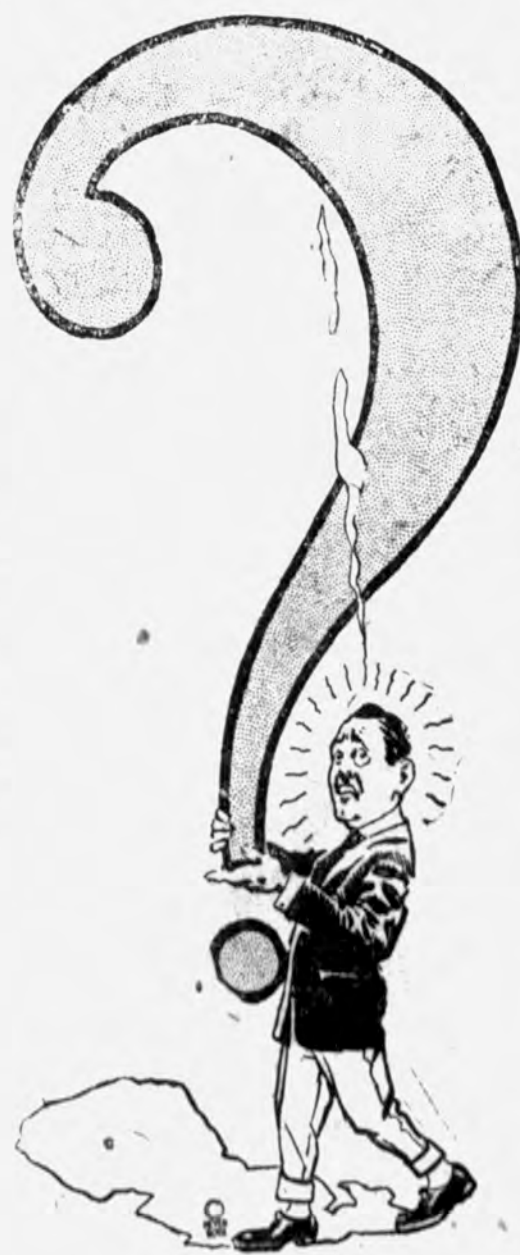
