LAST OF SERIES OF RECENT TRIP BY PITT CITIZENS

Secretary of Chamber of Commerce Makes Last of Series into a Summary

GEORGIA CITIZENS
SAYS BOLL WEEVIL
IS A REALITY

One Farmer Made 486 Bales
of Cotton in 1920; 10 in 1921
On Same Acreage

(H. L. SMITH.)

On the morning of Aug. 11th, the Pitt county delegation, having completed the Georgia tour, left Macon, Ga., for home, passing through Athens, Ga., Anderson, Greenville and Spartanburg, S. C., Gastonia, Charlotte and Sanford, N. C.

This, the concluding article of the series, will be a summary of the trip. At the different luncheons and dinners given, the following members of the Pitt party responded with impromptu talks: E. B. Higgs, Jno. T. Thorne, R. W. Smith, G. T. Gardner, W. B. Pace and H. L. Smith.

The following expressions gathered from all sections of the State and from various lines of business—professional, mercantile, banking, agricultural, etc., will show how Georgia views conditions in the light of the boll weevil:

"Go back home and tell your people that the boll weevil is a reality."

"I made 486 bales of cotton in 1920, and 10 on the same acreage in 1921."

"Don't be led into buying all kinds of propositions on the market for destroying the boll weevil. Calcium arsenate is the thing that has been used most successfully. Even this, however, is not a certain amount of good."

"Go back home and preach the disastrous effects of the boll weevil from early morning until midnight."

"We face the future with hope. Our people will come to their own the hen, the sow and the cow."

"We have sold 30 cars of poultry in the last four months."

"With two or three years for our program—the sow and the cow—to develop, and we will have a far more prosperous section than we had before the weevil came."

"Credit business is a thing of the past in this section. There is not a single supply store in this country."

"This crop was made from the sale of chickens and eggs."

"Fifty per cent of our fertilizer was bought for cash."

"The way to combat the boll weevil is to plant other crops."

"To plant a large acreage of cotton under boll weevil conditions is but to court expense, disgust and failure."

"Raising cotton on a large acreage, with boll weevils to contend with just can't be done."

"Since I have started this program, the sow, the cow and the hen, I see its possibilities to keenly, until I would not think of going back to the all-cotton system, even if I did not have to contend with the boll weevil."

"Tell your people to grow into the poultry, dairy and livestock business and not make the mistake of going into it. Some problems will necessarily arise and they can be met much better if you are on a small scale."

"The quickest possible way to bring bankruptcy is to plant the usual pre-boll weevil acreage in cotton, and follow the tenant system in its cultivation."

"Growing cotton under boll weevil conditions requires intelligent and scientific farming."

"I operate a 600 acre farm and have twenty acres given to cotton."

"Conditions will have to improve materially before I raise any more cotton."

"The majority of our farmers are small farmers. We do not encourage large holdings."

"The best way to farm under boll weevil conditions is for the man to live on the farm who owns it."

"The way to combat the boll weevil is to grow home supplies."

"Your people will be like a good many of ours, who had to lose everything before they realized that for your county."

Newspaper Reporter Locates
Hudson Who Committed
Crime Last February

The police were indifferent until newspaper reporters discovered the information between Hudson and Mrs. Ferguson which followed in a nationwide search of Hudson who was arrested in Chattanooga.

MISSOURI WATERMELON CROP PROVES FAILURE

Kansas City, Mo., Sept.—Missouri's watermelon crop this year was a failure, according to reports reaching here.

Then the six weeks drought came and the vines withered, causing the melons to ripen sooner than they should. So the melons shipped during August were much smaller than ordinarily would have been the case.

It was said that the melon shipments this season have been only about half as large as last year.

FRANK DUPREE TO BE HANGED TODAY AT ATLANTA, GA.

First White Man to be Hanged
In Atlanta in Fourteen
Years, It Is Said

(By International News.)

Atlanta, Sept. 1.—Frank Dupree will be hanged at two o'clock this afternoon. He will be preceded to the gallows by Luke McDonald, a negro who killed his sweetheart. Dupree is the first white man to be hanged here in fourteen years.

Dupree murdered detective Walker while he was escaping following the robbery of a jewelry store last December. Every effort has been made to save him the last hope dying when Governor Hardwick refused to commute death sentence to life imprisonment.

According to last press reports, Dupree was hanged at 2:05 this afternoon.

SUPT. ROSE STATES FACTS CONCERNING OPENING SCHOOLS

School to Open on Monday,
September 4th; Several
Things to Be Done First

MR. VICTOR DAVIS
EXPECTED TO ARRIVE
ON NEXT MONDAY

Children Expected to Take
Examination Requested to
Report on Sept. 4th

The parents of the town are urged to keep in mind the fact that while school do not open for regular work until Monday, September 11th, yet there are certain things to be done before that time as follows:

On Wednesday morning Sept. 6th, all members of the Freeman class report at the High School principal's office for enrollment and classification. On Thursday morning, Sept. 7th, all the Sophomores report, Thursday afternoon all the Juniors, Friday morning, Sept. 8th, all the Seniors report. This accounts as a day of school work and a pupil who fails to report will be marked absent in the year's record unless that pupil is unavoidably kept away because of sickness or because of the fact that he or she is out of town, in which case due consideration will be made.

On Friday morning Sept. 8th at 9 o'clock at the Evans street school all the freshmen must be present. This means those children who have just become six years of age, and have never been to school before. The principal of the Evans street school, Mrs. E. M. Foster, and Miss Eleanor Rouse, first grade teacher and supervisor of primary grades, and the principal of the high school will be present at that time. Also on Friday morning at 9 o'clock all the children who have moved to Greenville since the schools closed, will report at the high school building.

Mr. Victor Davis, the new principal of the high school will leave Chicago Saturday, and arrive in Greenville Monday, Sept. 4th. Mr. Davis will be in his office at the High school building every day from then on. Mr. and Mrs. Davis will live at the Vines House for the time being. Most of the teachers of the city schools will arrive in Greenville Friday, Sept. 8th. The first teachers meeting will be held in the high school building Saturday morning at 11 o'clock.

In regard to examinations, Supt. Rose announces that all those pupils who desire to take examination on any subject report to superintendent's office Monday afternoon, Sept. 4th. At that time dates will be set for the various examinations.

Supt. Rose's office this year is in the high school building. Phone 67.

GIRL WHO THREW BABY IN HOG PEN GIVEN 25 YEARS

Committed Ghastly Crime Last
May and Given Hearing In
Court Today

Nellie Fisher, sixteen year-old colored girl of the Swift Creek community, who in May of this year, threw her baby in the hog pen to be devoured by the pig, was given a hearing in this morning's session of criminal court, pleaded guilty of the crime and was sentenced to twenty-five years in the penitentiary.

The story as told by the girl when she was arrested was without doubt most ghastly to be imagined. She gave birth to the illegitimate child and not waiting it and desiring to keep the story from her relatives and friends threw the baby, a short while after it was born, into the hog pen. A few minutes afterwards the baby was removed from the pen but died a short while later from injuries received by the pig.

FATE OF BONUS BILL NOW RESTS WITH PRESIDENT

Two Courses Are Open
According to the Republican
Leaders

Washington, Sept. 1.—The fate of the bonus rests with President Harding. Two courses are open according to the Republican leaders. He will either accept the views of almost two thirds of the Senate and sign or veto knowing that a scant minority of third of the Senate is enough to sustain the veto against it.

TAR HEEL STATE LEADS NATION IN ITS BIRTH RATE

Record Falls Some Points Behind
That of First Three
Months in 1921

Washington, Aug. 31.—North Carolina continues to occupy the spot at the head of the parade when it comes to the matter of the births throughout the country. Yesterday there was shown in this correspondence that the figures of the death rate in the county showed the deaths in North Carolina below the average for the country and today the census bureau gave out statistics which show that North Carolina leads all the states in its birth rate. It stood at the top of the list in this respect last year, and for the first three months of 1922 it is still the leader though its record this year falls some points behind that of the first three months of 1921. The State stands far in the lead of the average for the country at large.

The year 1921, gave North Carolina first position in birth rate, the figures being 33.8 per 1,000 of population. During the first three months of 1921 the rate was 33.8 also, while for the first year the rate was 29.2 for every 1,000 population. There were 21791 births in North Carolina during the first three months of 1921 and 19,076 for the first three months in 1922. In 1921 the births in January numbered 7,115 in February, 6,900, in March 7,776. In 1922 the births in January numbered 6,390, in February 6,474, in March 6,412. These figures gave North Carolina first place in births per 1,000 population. In 1921 its closest competitor was Utah with a birth rate of 31.6 per 1,000 population, while for the first three months of this year its closest competitor is Virginia with a rate of 28.2. For the country at large the total birth rate in 1921 was 24.0 per 1,000 population. In North Carolina 33.3, while for the first three months this year the rate for the country was 23.3.

POSTPONE HEARING ON RAILROAD TAX ORDER

Greensboro, Aug. 31.—Inability of United States Circuit Judge Edmund Waddill to come to Greensboro tomorrow may cause a postponement of the hearing on the application of the Southern and Atlantic and Yadkin Railroad companies for an interlocutory injunction against A. D. Watts, commissioner of revenue of North Carolina. The hearing was to be continued until a later date, was the opinion of Judge Boyd here today.

SENATE VOTES FOUR BILLIONS FOR THE SOLDIERS' BONUS

Bill Now Goes to Conference
Where Prompt Action Is Expected

ALL PARTY LINES
DISAPPEARED ON
THE ROLL CALL

Announcement of the Outcome
Was Greeted With
Applause From Galleries

Washington, Aug. 31.—By a vote of 47 to 22 the four-billion-dollar soldiers' bonus bill was passed today by the Senate. It now goes to conference where prompt action was expected by both Senate and House leaders.

Party lines disappeared on the roll call, which followed four hours of debate. Announcement of the result was greeted with applause from the galleries which went unchecked despite the violation of Senate's rules.

Three opponents of the bonus were present, but unable to vote on account of pairs. Eight other opponents were absent, making the total number against the measure 33, or one more than enough to prevent passage over a presidential veto provided all 99 Senators were present and voting.

On the actual roll call, however, there was one more Senator supporting the bonus than two-thirds majority of those present and voting. A two-thirds majority would be sufficient to insure final enactment of the legislation even should President Harding disapprove it, as many now believe he will.

Immediately after the passage of the measure the Senate directed that it be returned to the House with a request for a conference. Representative Mondell, of Wyoming, the Republican leader, said the House would send it to conference tomorrow under a special rule.

The Senate conferees named are those who now are working on the tariff bill, and the House is expected to appoint its managers on the tariff measure. Since there is no serious dispute between the two Houses on the bonus, the conferees are expected to lay aside the tariff long enough to agree to a report on the bonus.

Four hours of debate preceded Senate action, with Senators Lodge of Massachusetts, the Republican leader; Pomerene, Democrat, Ohio; Reed, Democrat, Missouri; Sutherland, Republican, West Virginia; Trammell, Democrat, Florida; and Hefflin, Democrat, Alabama, arguing in support of the measure and Senator Sterling, Republican, South Dakota; Owen, Democrat, Oklahoma; and Watson, Democrat, Georgia, opposing it.

HUNT FOR HEIR TO TWO MILLION IS REWADED, SAID

William Sample Left Huge Sum Found in Bangkok, Siam; 'Samples' Appear

Popular Bluff, Mo., Aug. 30.—After a world wide search for William Sample, heir to a fortune estimated at \$2,500,000, lasting for four months the new millionaire was found on a steamship in the harbor of Bangkok, Siam, ready to sail for America for a visit to his home in southeast Missouri.
George Pind, of Cape Girardeau, has been conducting this search in order that he might turn over the vast fortune to its owner. The fortune was left to Sample by relatives who recently died.
As the news of the search for Sample found its way to every nook and corner of the globe, hundreds of "William Samples" applied to Pind for the money. When they would arrive at Cape Girardeau and find Pind the latter would make them turn around, and he would look at the back of their necks before making any statement.
Pind stated, after the rightful owner of the fortune was located, that the rightful heir had a scar on the back of his neck and that this mark would be the deciding factor in ascertaining the one William Sample for whom he was searching.
When he was found, Sample said he had been in Siam for a number of years and did not know of the search being conducted for him. He appeared to be greatly pleased with the news of his newly acquired millions and could hardly wait until his boat left for America. He was found by an amateur detective who had been assigned to assist in locating Sample. The detective, according to Pind, was paid \$5,000 for his successful search.
A greater part of the legacy acquired by Sample is in a diamond mine in South Africa, it is claimed.

MASONS HIT IT UP WHEN JAZZ PLAYED

Syncopated Records Makes Them Work Like Animated Cartoon, It Is Said

(By International News)
Quitman, Miss., Sept.—Bricklayers work like fiends when jazz music from a phonograph is played, it was shown in a test made here by A. B. Morse, general manager of the Long-Bell plant.
Mortar mixers, all of which are more productive of work in the summer, when they can take turns sitting under electric fans, another test by Morse proved.
The phonograph was installed at the plant, being rebuilt after a fire, to relieve the monotony experienced by men working at night. All the men, about forty, were of jazz, and a boy was employed with no other duty than to keep the machine running all night.
When Morse made inventory he discovered that 15,000 more bricks had been laid over the number laid in a similar period when there was no phonograph jazz.
More than that, the night men did more work than the day shift.

Installation of electric fans followed several heat prostrations among mortar mixers. The mortars were installed in a shed nearby and two shifts of men put on the job, one taking a turn at working, the other at being fanned.
Work of rebuilding the plant was completed in twenty days.

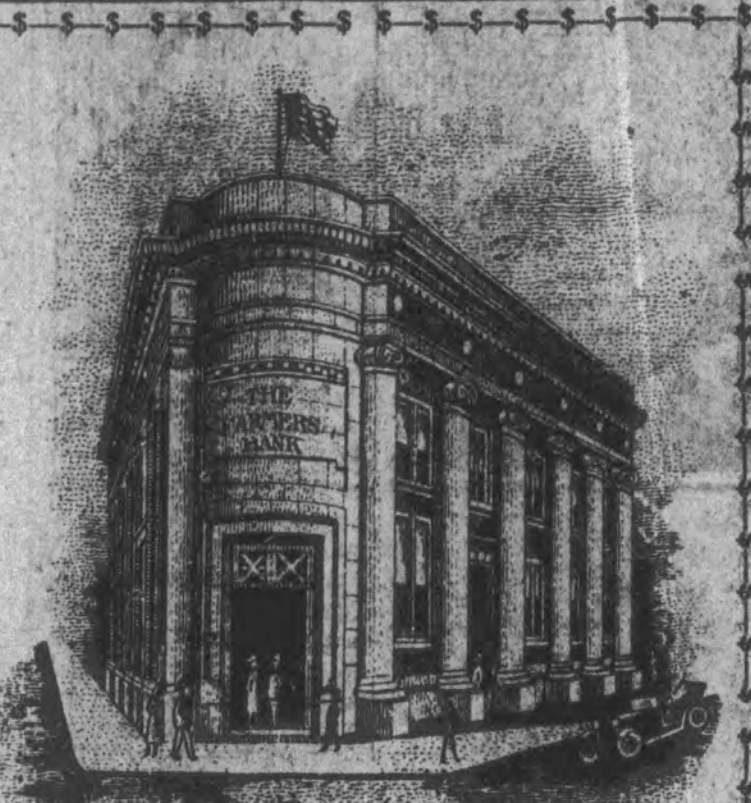

"SEVEN DAYS FOR SAFETY."

Invitations to fifty representatives from each of seven groups concerned in highway safety are bringing a deluge of suggestions for incorporation in a national safety campaign planned to retard the accident and death toll of the country due to traffic mishaps, according to announcement by the Highway Education Board.

Almost without exception, replies indicate an eagerness for such a campaign, stressing the timeliness and need for a national movement of this nature. Groups requested to offer suggestions include pupils, teachers, superintendents of schools, automobile clubs, chambers of commerce, police officials and automobile dealer associations.

Outstanding suggestions received to date, it is said, include a national essay contest among all pupils doing class room work in the fifth to eighth grades, a national safety lesson contest among teachers, the observance of "Seven Days for Safety," and the distribution of "Pledges of Carefulness" among pedestrians and drivers alike. October 8 to 14 seems the date most favorably agreed upon for the observance of "Seven Days for Safety," according to the general tenor of the letters received.

**GASOLINE DEMAND VARIES
100 PER CENT BETWEEN SEASON**

One of the greatest problems of the oil industry is the seasonal demand for gasoline, which varies more than 100 per cent between seasons.

The lowest point of consumption is reached during the winter months. As the weather grows warmer, farm tractors, pleasure automobiles, motor boats and all manner of internal combustion engines increase consumption and the demand rises well over 100 per cent above the winter requirements.

In order to meet this fluctuating demand, it is necessary for the oil refineries of the country to operate on practically a uniform basis throughout the year. Otherwise, 50 per cent of the refinery capacity would be shut down during periods of low consumption and the industry would be unable to meet the gasoline demand during periods of greatest consumption.

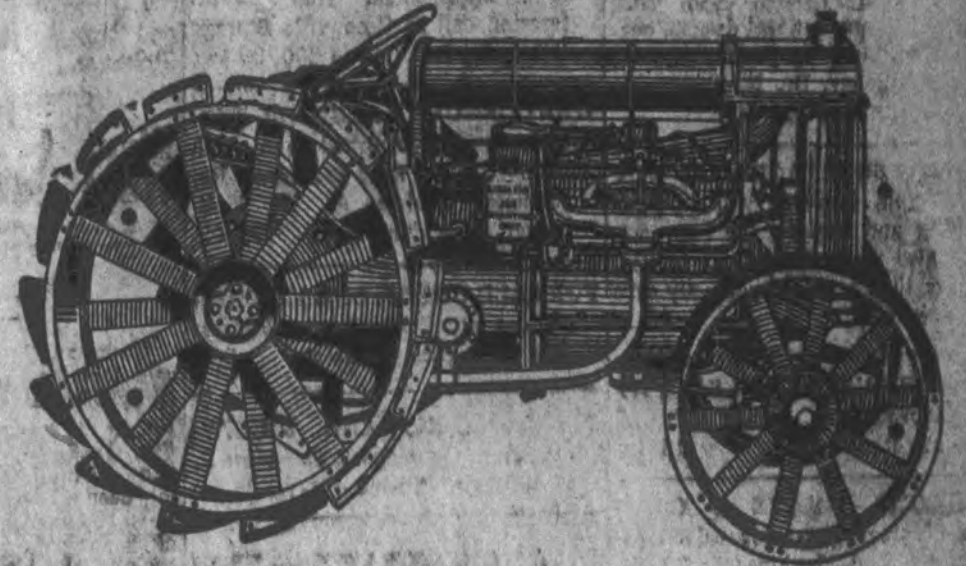
