MORE THAN TWO AND HALF MILLION POUNDS WERE SOLD

Greenville Market Has Sold On Auction Floors Since Opening 2,639,200 Pounds. PRICES ARE SHOWING IMPROVEMENT ON THE BETTER GRADES NOW

Triple Sales Are Proving a Great Convenience, Especially to Distant Growers

According to figures furnished by Secretary H. A. Bost of the Tobacco Board of Trade, the Greenville market sold since the opening day, Tuesday, August 15th, 3,639,200 pounds of tobacco for a total sum of \$607,273.67. The breaks have been light each day until the latter part of the present week. For the week ending yesterday's sales, the five warehouses sold 1,388,392 for \$321,225.16 making an average in price of \$23.13. This average is one cent above that of last week, and while the prices generally have been better during the past two days, there is yet so much common tobacco being marketed that the market average is still a fraction below twenty-five cents.

One outstanding feature connected with the local market this year for the first time is triple sales. The adoption of three sets of buyers has meant a great deal to the local warehousemen, but most especially to the growers. Many of the farmers that come here from a distance of seventy-five miles and more, find this feature a great convenience to them, they being able to sell and return home the same day.

The opening up of the market county bridge at Williamston, connecting two of the most important highways of the south, which takes place next Thursday means so much to the tobacco growers living beyond the bridge who have heretofore been forced to travel by train when selling on the Greenville market. When the bridge is opened growers living as far as Bertie county and further will be able to sell with the local warehouses and return to their homes the same day.

Heaviest Rain of Fifty Years Falls

BARTLETT EXPLAINS PLANS OF EASTERN CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

Sixteen Counties, 33 Towns and 23 Banks Have Already Joined

TOWNS INTERESTED IN THE MOVEMENT GIVING SUPPORT

Lower Part of District Will be Visited Next Week by Secretary Bartlett

The last county visited and naturally the last county, to throw her influence and support behind the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce, is Washington with the little town of Plymouth, holding forth as the Capital of that county. Secretary Bartlett motored over to this county Thursday and held a meeting of the business men with a view of getting them to lend their support to the program of the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce. "I haven't found a more enthusiastic bunch of business men any where in Eastern North Carolina than I found there in Plymouth," Mr. Bartlett is quoted as saying. In fact this section of the district is especially adapted to the growing of live stock, food and feed stuffs, poultry and the like, which are the very things that the Eastern Chamber of Commerce is promoting.

These business men when informed as to what the quota of that county would be, immediately said that the county would go even beyond his mark and possibly double the quota. With this kind of support, there isn't any chance for this big movement to lag in interest or enthusiasm. Wherever the news is carried and the program explained, they fall in line, almost a 100 per cent.

Next Week's Trip.
Next week, Secretary Bartlett will go down into the lower part of the district, taking in Onslow, Jones, Pamlico, and Carteret counties. The counties are joining just as fast as they can be visited. Up to the present sixteen counties have joined, 33 towns and 23 banks. The campaign will be pushed vigorously until every county in the entire district shall have been reached and had the plans explained to them.

BANKERS SPECIAL SCHEDULED FOR WEEK SEPT. 12TH

Three Days' Trip Will Be Made Through Georgia and Alabama, It Is Said

Will Leave Sept. 12th.

PITT COUNTY BOY EXAMPLE OF VALUE OF MILK AS FOOD

Twelve Year Old Colored Boy Gains 25 Pounds in Three Months by Drinking Milk

A living example of the value of milk as a food can be seen on the Coward farm near the city in the person of a small 12 year old colored boy. The boy was ordered before Judge of the Juvenile court three months ago weighing at that time even 46 lbs. He was ordered given a physical examination before the county health officer. Dr. P. J. Chester, who advised giving the child milk to drink—at least a quart per day and half gallon if it could be obtained. At the end of the first month the child was brought to the welfare officer weighing 58 pounds, a gain of 12 pounds for the month. The child was weighed again at the end of two months and at that time weighed 70 pounds. He gained 12 pounds during the two months which made a total of 24 pounds gain for the past three months. This child has not had meats and things of that sort during the past three months. It illustrates the value of milk as a food. Many of the children in Pitt county today would be healthier and happier if they had milk to drink instead of so much meat and other indigestible foods not suited for the growing child.

COLORED BOY ESCAPES FROM INSANE ASYLUM NOW IN COUNTY JAIL

Walter James Goodwin, more commonly known as "Nicomachus," a colored boy aged 14 years, who on July 27th escaped from the insane asylum in Goldsboro has been arrested in this city and placed in the county jail. He will be returned to Goldsboro tomorrow.

The boy, a native of this county, several months ago gave so much trouble by being connected with robbery and breaking other laws, that he was sent by the welfare department to the Oxford reformatory. He escaped from the reformatory twice and returned to Greenville. The last time he was given a hearing and adjudged mentally deficient and sent to the insane asylum in Goldsboro. Since leaving the asylum he has been a fugitive and committed several thefts and caused much trouble in general. He has been seen in and around Greenville for several days, but always evaded the officers. He was arrested yesterday and will remain in jail until Sheriff Dudley return him to Goldsboro.

BIG EXPOSITION GIVEN ATTENTION AT RECENT MEET

Executive Committee and Officials of Eastern Chamber Met in Goldsboro

PLACE OF HOLDING EXPOSITION TO BE DECIDED ON LATER

Chamber of Commerce Has Big Work Before It, Declares Dr. C. J. Ellen

The Executive committee and officers of the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce held a meeting in Goldsboro Friday afternoon at 3-30. President Ellen went over from Greenville to attend this meeting, accompanied by Secretary Bartlett. This was a very busy session for the committee and many plans are being made to promote the interest of Eastern North Carolina during the next few years.

President Ellen stated to a reporter of this paper this morning that the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce has the biggest work before it of any other organization ever attempted in any of the cotton growing states. "We have the resources, and all we have to do is to show to the outside world that these resources can be and should be developed," Dr. Ellen said. This is the big job of the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce, and from all indications now, very flattering results are sure to follow in the path of this big organization.

Big Exposition Being Planned.
Possibly the most important item right now is the development of ways and means of staging a big Eastern Carolina Exposition some time this winter, to definitely place this section before the world. There isn't any way that this can be done, in so short time, and with such little money, as by assembling your products, both industrial and agricultural and inviting the world to come and see for them selves what is here. If this big exposition is pulled off, it will be the one big factor in being about just this kind of a thing. The executive committee, and officers, in session Friday unanimously endorsed the plans as submitted by the manager and instructed him to carry out his plans, if possible. In speaking of this Mr. W. E. Stroud, Cashier of the Wayne National Bank, of Goldsboro, said "I don't know of a bigger nor more important project right now than this one. If this thing can be put over, I say, put it over." Mr. H. H. Taylor president of the National Bank of Kinston, and chairman of the executive committee, stated that he regarded this move as a very excellent idea and by all means it should be pulled off this winter, if possible. Mr. R. P. Holding, cashier of the First National Bank of Smithfield, and member of the official staff, said "We need this thing, and any town would do well to make an effort to get it."

Where It Will Be Held.
Just where this big event will be held is not known yet, but it is certain that there are three very necessary pre-requisites for this big show that any town will have to show to get it; first rail road facilities, second hotels, and third local support from the business men. It is conservatively estimated that any town that gets this will have at least 10,000 out of town visitors during the ten days. Any town that is interested in getting the full information about this, should get in touch with the management immediately. It is hoped that this will bring about a regular flood of visitors to Eastern North Carolina.

Had Good Sale.
Mr. K. W. Cobb has returned here from Statesville where he conducted a lot sale for the Atlantic Coast Realty Company. Mr. Cobb states that business conditions in that section of the state are booming, and as a result he had a good sale. "VALUE OF A CHAMBER OF COMMERCE."

"Of what value is a Chamber of Commerce anyway?" is a question asked occasionally by some citizens of the community. That this question should be asked results, perhaps, from several things. Should the census reports be studied and a careful analysis made, the startling fact would be revealed that those communities who have gone forward (certain exceptions to be sure) during the decade under study, are those communities who have the organized body, the Chamber of Commerce.

A recent compilation was made to bring out the above and see whether or not it was sound. After carefully going into the matter, the ten cities and towns, which had active Chambers of Commerce, showed a steady growth and improvement from various angles; the ten cities and towns with no Chambers of Commerce, showed but very little increase in population and practically no improvements.

The value of a Chamber of Commerce to a community can be seen in property values. The general trend of real estate is higher in communities with an organized body—the Chamber of Commerce—than it is in communities without the vision. Real estate men will tell you that both residential as well as business property is considerably more in demand. These are facts and cannot be contradicted, a few exceptions notwithstanding.

Perhaps one of the outstanding values of the Chamber of Commerce is that force which continually makes for unity of thought and purpose. With all the forces of the community pulling together for the common good of all, the sky is their limit for achievement. When once the co-operative, unified spirit thoroughly possesses a people, they can do and accomplish almost anything within the bounds of reason.

The people of Greenville and Pitt county should feel glad that they have this organized body for the promotion of those things that will result in community betterment. Never

In the history of the county is a Chamber of Commerce more needed than today. The problems with which we are confronted make an organization like the Pitt county Chamber of Commerce of particular moment.

DO WOMEN EAT ENOUGH FOOD?

London, Sept. 2.—"Multitudes of girls and young women eat too little, partly because the pleasures of the table make their appeal to them and partly because of their instinct for frugality."

Sir Malcolm Morris, famous English surgeon and physician, thus indicated the habits of modern women in his presidential address to the Institute of Hygiene.

"A great many of the nervous and other illnesses for which so many girls and young women engaged in business and professional life have to seek medical advice," he added, "are due to chronic malnutrition, the result of eating less than nature requires."

"How seldom does mere man make this mistake," exclaimed the speaker. "Women are careful to 'feed the brute' The 'brute' would be all the better for less pampering, but if women must go on overfeeding him let them at any rate be careful not to underfeed themselves."

Sir Malcolm's statement weakened a veritable hornet's nest of opinion on this subject; letters are appearing daily in the Times in which prominent doctors allege that women, who eat much at one meal, consume anything from half a dozen to a dozen "nibblings" during a day, supplemented by chocolates and candy at theatres and dances, and they argue, if these were added together they would make a far bigger total of food per day than a "mere man's" three regular meals.

NORTHLIFFE'S DEATH FAILS TO HALT PLANS FOR ADVERTISING MEET

New York, Sept. 2.—The death of Viscount Northcliffe will not affect seriously the plans which he initiated for the welcome in London when the Associated Advertising Clubs of the world hold their 1924 convention there, according to a message received here by F. A. Wilson-Lawrence, of the Union Carbide and Carbon Corporation, from Sir Charles F. Higham. During his recent visit here Sir Charles tendered the invitation in behalf of Lord Northcliffe.

CONTRIBUTES TO DAVIDSON

Charlotte, N. C., Sept. 2.—Although the campaign to raise \$600,000 for the endowment and expansion of Davidson has not yet officially opened, volunteer subscriptions to the cause were received today from William Jennings Bryan, and Dr. Henry Louis Smith, president of Washington and Lee University.

Both men, who are alike known as great religious and educational leaders, sent endorsements of the movement toward a "Greater Davidson College for a Greater Southern Presbyterian church," and both men predicted that the campaign would be successful because Davidson College stands for Christian education which is now so badly needed in America.

In making his contribution Mr. Bryan declared that "Davidson's splendid record, present usefulness, and prospective importance justifies the appeal that is being made for the rebuilding of the historic Chambers Hall that burned last year, and for the enlargement of the facilities of the institution." The money that will be raised by the campaign will be used not only to rebuild the famous Chambers Hall but to add new teachers to the faculty as well.

"This campaign will not be in vain," declared the great religious and political leader. Previous to making this donation to Davidson, Mr. Bryan expressed his admiration for the college and declared that he intended to send his grandson to the institution because the Bible was taught and believed at Davidson, and the students were not instructed in any nonsense about "man being descended from a monkey." Mr. Bryan based his praise of Christian education at Davidson on her reply to a questionnaire he sent out to a number of American Colleges.

MEXICO CITY GROWING MORE WOMEN THAN MEN

Mexico, Sept. 2.—The City of Mexico, capital and metropolis of the republic, according to an announcement by the director-general of statistics, has a population of 635,307. This compares with 471,000 in 1910 and 368,808 in 1900.

The limits of the City of Mexico are tightly drawn and beyond them are suburbs containing several hundred thousand additional population. The city itself comprises only a small part of the Federal district, which corresponds politically to the District of Columbia in the United States.

Mexico City population figures in the great disparity between the number of men and women. In 1900 there were 173,647 men and 105,251 women. In 1910 there were 218,774 men and 232,202 women. Last year's census gives 271,955 men and 343,412 women.

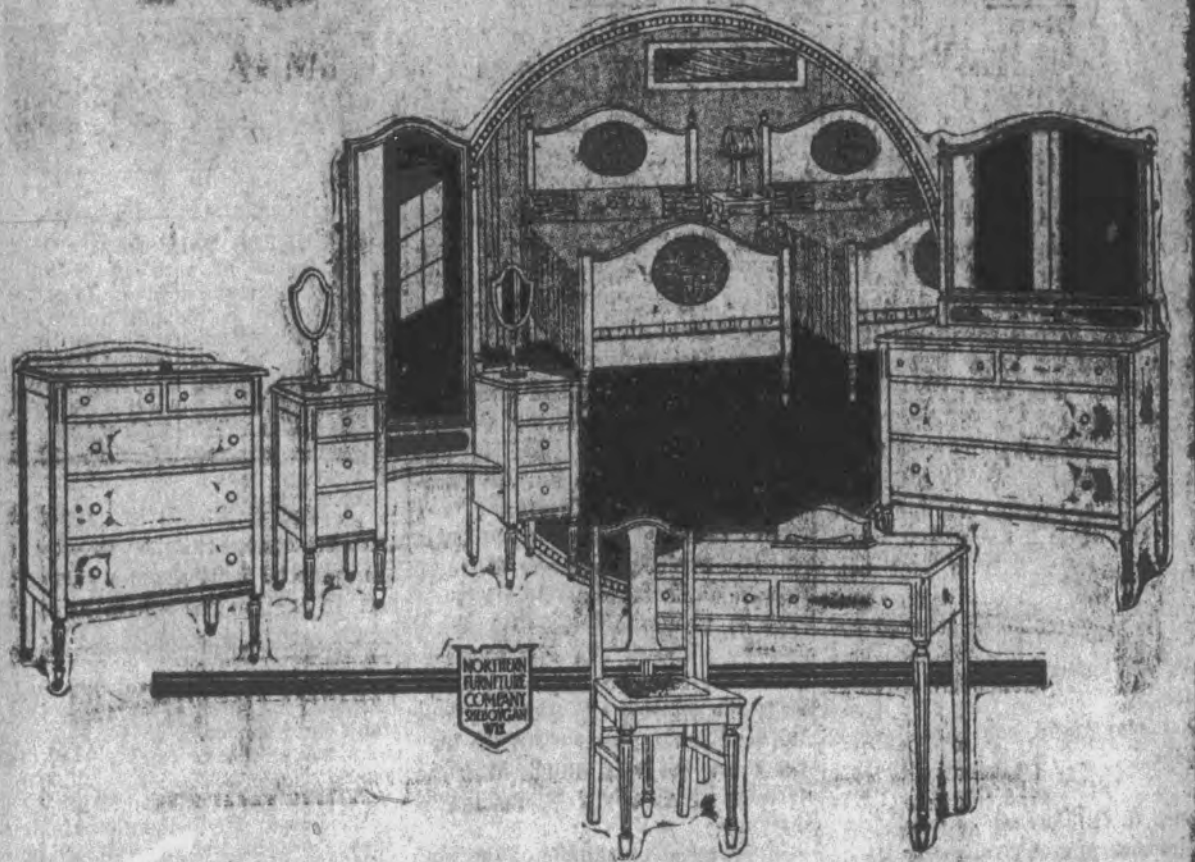

MEMORIAL FOR PERSHING PLAN

(By International News)
Knoxville, Tenn., Sept.—A shaft in memorial on the site of the home of General John J. Pershing's mother, in Blount county, has been selected. The stone will weigh around 8,000 pounds and will be hewed from Blount county marble. A fitting inscription will be chiseled into the stone. The stone will be erected at commemoration exercises which will be held on Armistice Day, November 11, on the farm of G. W. Shields, near Maryville Tenn.
The shaft will be ten feet high, three feet thick and four feet wide. The base of the shaft will be made from old stones gathered from the old Pershing home, which now is a mass of debris.
The memorial committee of the Captain E. J. Jones, Maryville, American Legion post passed a resolution asking the State of Tennessee through its historical society to participate in the erection of the General Pershing memorial.
When General Pershing was in Knoxville to attend the celebration and dedication of the monument to the 11th infantry, formerly the old Third Tennessee National Guard regiment, he was presented with photographs of the birthplace of his mother, and of her marriage license, which had been discovered in the dust of the Blount county courthouse archives.
Pitt County Post, No. 39.
The Pitt county post has, since its organization, been the strongest post in the first district. It includes all of Pitt county, and has an active membership scattered over the entire county, including the larger town of Greenville, Farmville and Ayden. It is ably officered this year by Dr. G. G. Dixon, of Ayden, commander; L. J. Smith, of Greenville, adjutant. Meetings are held at the principle towns in the county, the local Legionnaires in each town supplying the entertainment for their fellows from a distance.
A remarkable example of the work of the post was a special edition of the Reflector at Greenville last spring in which the members to the post secured the advertising and the reading matter, the edition being known as the American Legion special. It made some money for the post in addition to being an excellent advertisement for the Legion in the community.—Oteen Echo.

Disabled and Wounded Sol-
diers of World War

great sacrifices during the world war. Citizens' committees are to be named in cities and towns throughout the country. Women's clubs, war workers and the ladies who took part in the home activities that contributed so much to the comfort of the men "over there," will be asked to take part in the "Forget-Me-Not Day" movement, by active participation in the making of the flowers that are to be sold, and again, on November 4th, taking part in the sales of the flowers. Wounded and disabled American veterans, patients in hospitals throughout the land, are already engaged in making the forget-me-nots, from cloth or paper, so that the number to be disposed of will mount into the millions, and all America will engage in the great, national movement for the betterment and comfort of the disabled "buddies."

In a proclamation just issued from national headquarters of the Disabled American Veterans here, Captain Cook stated that every city and town in the United States will be requested to enter into the "Forget-Me-Not Day" project on an active scale, so that the response from the nation on November 4th will be a unanimous one, indicative of the feeling and sentiment existing everywhere in the country for the men who gave up so much during the world war.
