U. S. MARSHALS ARE MOBILIZED TO UPHOLD INJUNCTION

Beginning of Tenth Week of
Strike Finds 5,500 Marshals
Mobilized

TO PREVENT LAWLESS VIOLENCE AND KEEP MACHINE RUNNING

Chief of Striking Shopmen Said to be in Eastern Part of Country

Chicago, Sept. 3.—The beginning of the tenth week of the country-wide strike of the railway shopmen found 5,500 United States marshals mobilized to uphold the drastic temporary injunction obtained by the government on Friday to prevent lawless violence and keep the nation's transportation machine running.

From Chicago, as a center of railroad activities, was directed the work of enforcing the injunction pending the hearing to make it permanent on September 11. A mass of complaints and allegations of conspiracy and attempts to ruin property and jeopardize life were being collected today for the use of Attorney General Daugherty in support of his application to make the injunction permanent. It will not be alleged that the strikers are guilty in most of the outbreaks of violence reported, but the government, it was said, will maintain that actions of the strikers or strike leaders caused the violence.

Extra forces of deputies have been sworn in by United States Marshal Robert H. Levy and are being dispatched to railroad shops and terminals to watch for acts forbidden by the injunction. The injunction was prepared in the Federal building and sent to all parts of the country for service on the labor leaders named in the injunction. B. J. Jewell, head of the shopmen, could not be found and it was reported he was in the east. John Scott, secretary of the shopmen, remained at his desk, at the union headquarters.

"I haven't violated any law," he said. "This organization never did sanction or condone violence. But we are going to carry on the work of the organization without fear or tremor, and I don't believe the injunction is intended to restrain us from so doing."

Meanwhile, three different pictures of conditions of railroads were painted by western executives, government officials and union leaders.

"We are moving the business; our men are coming back to work in increasing numbers, general conditions are steadily improving and the strike is broken," was the consensus of opinion of the executives.

Federal officials engaged in compiling the lists of acts of violence for the hearing on making permanent the injunction, pointed to the petition presented in court by the Attorney General in which he declared that half the locomotives in the country had been tampered with and that more than 1,000 mail trains had been cancelled.

Union officials reiterated previous statements that if the strike continued the railways would be paralyzed within thirty days.

In connection with the appointment during the past two days of marshals and deputies, the following statute was cited by officials of the department of Justice, being section number 788.

SENTENCE OF NELLIE FISHER CHANGED TO FIFTEEN YEARS, SAID

Several Cases Given a Hearing
During Last Week's Session
of Criminal Court

The sentence of twenty five years in State prison which was given to Nellie Fisher for throwing her baby in the pig pen, was changed to fifteen years before the adjournment of last week's session of criminal court.

A large number of cases were disposed of during the week of criminal court, several continued, some remanded to county court and several not pressed.

The next term of court will be for the trial of civil cases and will convene on Sept. 11th.

The calendar for this term consists of about one hundred and seventy-five cases and are appeals from justices of the peace of the Superior court. In a large number of the cases the parties are not represented by lawyers, but according to Judge Calvert they will be called and will be either tried, dismissed or finally disposed of.

Miners Committee Ratifies the Pepper Reed Agreement

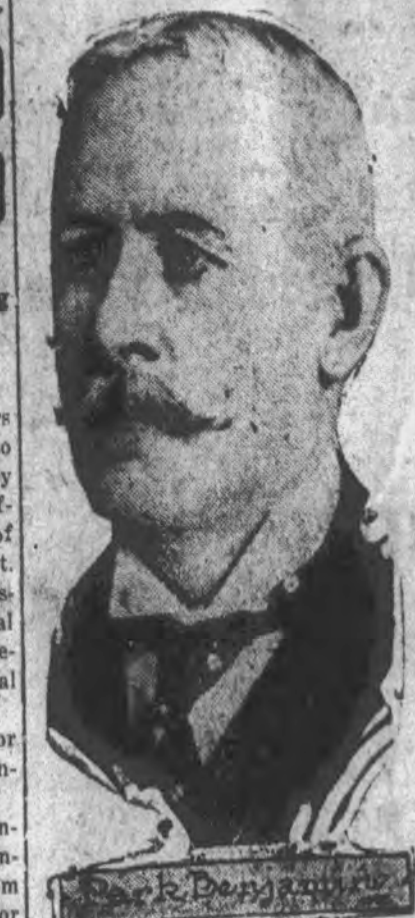

GREAT INTEREST IN DEVELOPMENT STRIKE SITUATION

Car Loadings Show Soft Coal
Production Rapidly Return-
ing to Normal

(By International News.)

Business Revival
Not Expected to Be
Seriously Retarded

If Roads Have Situation in Hand by October Car Short- age May be Inevitable

New York, Sept. 3.—Developments in the coal and railroad situations and anticipations on the nature of fall trade have occupied the center of the business stage during the past week.

Car loading figures indicate that soft coal production is rapidly returning to normal, or to distinctly encouraging levels. Thus incomplete figures suggest that the total output for the week will run well over 9,000,000 tons, or, perhaps, close to ten million tons. This rate compares favorably with normal weekly averages.

Reports on the general movement of railroad traffic show that recent rates, which approximate the best of the year, are being maintained. Total loadings for the week ended August 19, the latest for which figures are available, are 859,000 cars, which represent an increase of 6,639 over the preceding week and 41,072 over the same week a year ago.

It is still too early to measure the effect of the growing soft coal movement, but usually well informed quarters see no evidence of the movement in general merchandise being affected to an important degree as yet. On the other hand, it is felt that a resumption of anthracite mining, added to the crop carrying burden, will impose a severe strain on the transportation system. In this connection interest centers on the railroads' attempts to put their shop forces back on a normal basis.

Even if the roads have the situation in hand by some time in October, it is thought a car shortage is inevitable. The consensus seems to be, however, that the shortage will not be so serious as to retard vitally the revival in business. It is also doubted whether it will cause a general rise in commodity prices, although opinions on the point are by no means unanimous.

Agricultural prospects remain remarkably little changed. The Department of agriculture's September 1 cotton crop report reduced the condition from 70.8 per cent in the previous month's figure to 5.7 per cent and cut the estimated yield from 11,449,000 bales to 10,575,000 bales. The new figures were slightly more bullish than the trade had expected, but not sufficiently so as to prevent profit-taking. As a result, cotton prices were little changed.

Both the prospective crop and the carry-over are short, but a conservative view is taken of the willingness of both domestic and foreign spinners to buy at the higher prices. Wheat futures continue to fluctuate slightly above the dollar level at Chicago and these prices are taken to indicate conservative purchasing of general merchandise on the part of farmers.

The commodity market and that for foreign exchange reacted well to announcement by the reparations commission that Germany has been granted a six months' postponement on this fall's reparations payments. It is considered that a political crisis in Europe has been averted but the reparations difficulty still remains.

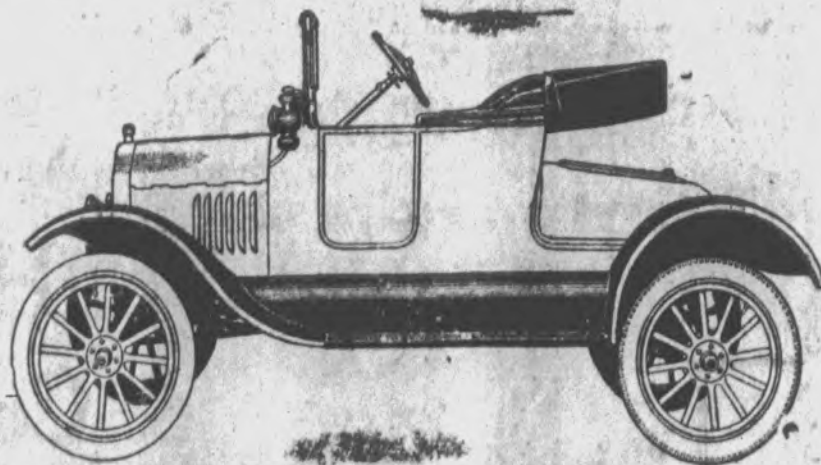

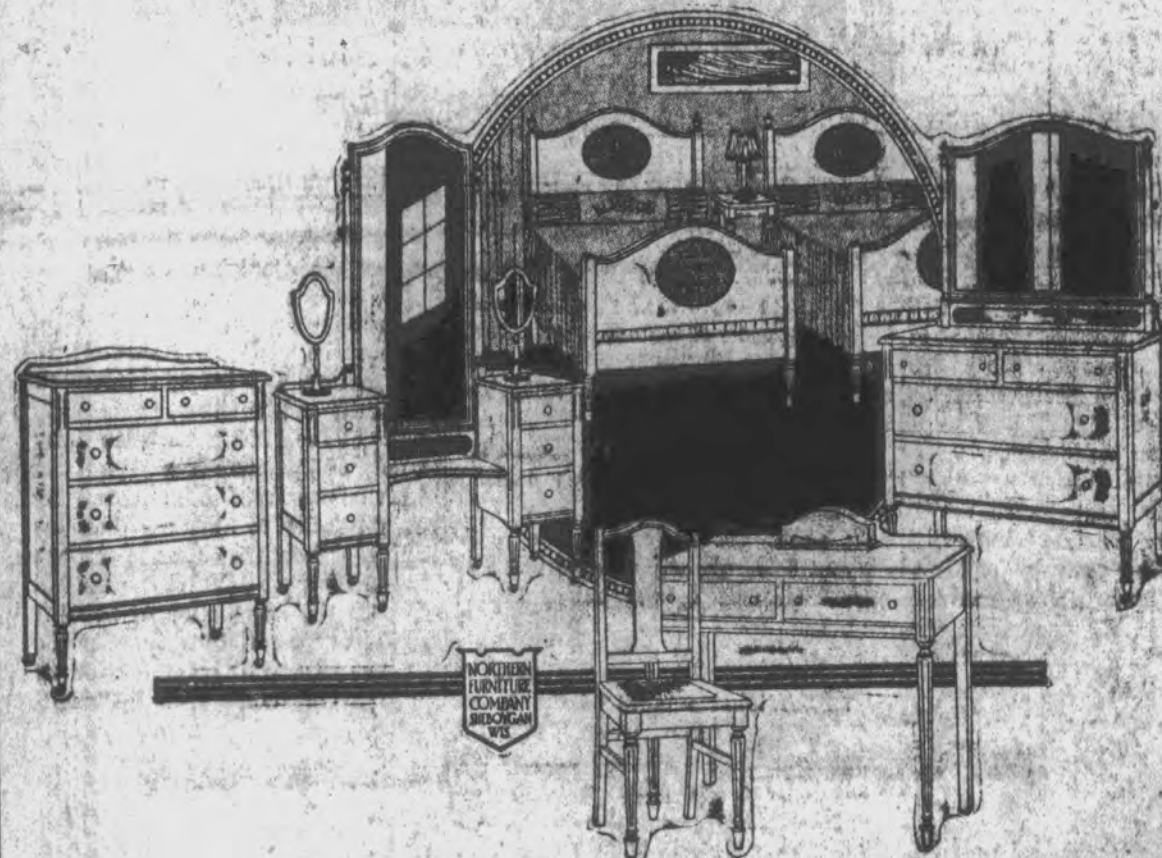
