SLIGHT CHANGE OF G. O. P. SWELLING SENATE MAJORITY

Democrats Speak Lightly of
Claims as to Election Results
in Fall

DEMOCRATS PREPARE TO STRENGTHEN THEIR RANKS IN THE FUTURE

Republicans, However, Claim They Will Oust Democratic Members

Washington, Sept. 4.—The Republicans, while admittedly in a bad state of mind with regard to the chances of maintaining a Republican majority in the House in the November elections, talk of increasing their majority in the Senate, but some of their estimates are so clearly out of all reason that they may be put down to the same state of mind of the little boy who whistled as he passed the graveyard at nightfall for the purpose of keeping up his courage. The Republicans view a political graveyard for their party, so they are whistling and ballyhooing as to the prospects with the idea that this may keep up party morale.

Yesterday in this correspondence there was given Republican and Democratic estimates as to the political complexion of the next House, it being shown from Republican admissions that they were looking for tremendous reverses at the polls this fall. On the other hand, the Democrats are in the campaign in a most optimistic mood, and see ahead of them either capturing a majority of representatives or of making such tremendous gains on the present Republican majority of 170 as to make the result a Republican defeat that will spell disaster for the Republican party in the Presidential election in 1924. And it must not be forgotten that in less than twenty-two months from this date the presidential candidates will have been nominated and the country will be in the swing of a national election. So what is now happening has the greatest bearing upon the 1923 contest.

Today there is presented the opposing views as to the results of the fall elections as these will affect the membership of the Senate, one-third of the membership of that body, thirty-two Senators, to be elected in November. The Republicans are calculating upon adding one to their present majority of 24 in the Senate, but a dissection of their claims will show that there is extremely small basis for any such result. As the Republicans forecast the result, they will gain seven seats now held by Democrats, and at the same time are said to agree that there is a likelihood that they will lose six of the sixty seats now held by them. If this should prove correct, then the next Senate would consist of sixty-one Republicans and thirty-five Democrats. But "there's many a slip twixt the cup and the lip."

Getting what may be termed the "inside dope" as to the Republican outlook, this said to be from talk that breezes out from Republican National committee headquarters, the Republican Senators whose places are held as being in danger of being captured by the Democrats are: Senators McLean, Connecticut; Calder, New York; Frelinghuysen, New Jersey; Dupont, Delaware; France, Maryland; and Sutherland, West Virginia. In the Republican camp there is said to be no optimistic feeling as to the re-election of these six Republican Senators, all of whom are on the re-nomination list. That there is the hardest kind of fighting for these six Republican Senators is conceded, and the Democratic hopes are abundant as to the defeat of these six.

TOBACCO SALES TODAY LARGEST OF ENTIRE SEASON

Over Half Million Pounds Sold
At Auction; Prices Strong
and Inclined to Improve

The Greenville warehouses for the sale of tobacco at auction had the largest break today of the entire season. The three houses having first sale were either full from wall to wall or more than two-thirds filled. The weed began to roll in yesterday shortly after the noon hour and it continued all through the night up until after the opening of the sales today.

The market has sold several days between three and four hundred thousand pounds, but today the number of pounds will exceed the half a million mark, being the first time the Greenville houses have reached five hundred thousand or more.

Growers were here from Duplin, Onslow, Beaufort, Craven, Cartret, Jones, Greene, Wilson, Martin, Edgemore, Halifax, Lenoir and from some of the far eastern counties of Virginia. Several of the farmers sold here today for the first time, having in past seasons patronized other markets of eastern North Carolina. They were all highly pleased with the prices received and were heard to say that they considered the Greenville tobacco market the best in the state. With the adoption of three sets of buyers every grower is enabled to return home the same day of sale, and this feature has attracted several farmers here from a distance that heretofore have been selling elsewhere.

The prices this week are equally as strong as they were last week, and on some grades the prices appear stronger.

ENGLISH DEBATORS TO MEET AMERICANS

Oxford, Eng., Sept. 5.—Having tried their physical skill against American university men, Oxford men are now going to test their intellectual abilities against the collegians of America.

The Oxford Union will send a debating team to the United States early in September to debate with Yale, Harvard, Princeton, Cornell, New York University, Columbia, Bates and Swarthmore.

The subjects for discussion will include foreign politics and industrial problems.

K. M. Lindsay, ex-president of the Oxford Union, will head the Oxford team. Lindsay is an active member of the English Labor party and is largely responsible for the formation of the University Labor Club.

E. Marjoribanks, an Etonian and a nephew of Lord Tweedmouth, will also be a member of the team; he is leader of the Tories in Oxford, a classical scholar and a Leander oarsman.

M. C. Hollis, a Balliol scholar, a Liberal and a Chestertonian national, will compete the team.

CARRY PRISONERS TO RALEIGH TO BE PLACED IN STATE PEN

All four men were given a hearing in last week's session of criminal court for robbing stores in Winterville and Ayden.

One of the most attractive features will be a parade in full uniform, and will be participated in by every post attending. There will also be a dinner at High Point, a picnic supper at the Guilford Battle Grounds and numbers of other wholesome entertainments.

WANTS U. S. TO AID EUROPE'S RECOVERY

(By International News.)
Paris, Sept. 5.—A "land disarmament conference" at Washington should be the logical successor of the Naval Disarmament Conference and should seek to solve all Europe's tangles, according to Amadeo P. Giannini, president of the bank of Italy of San Francisco, interviewed by International News Service after studying financial and industrial conditions.

"We in America have made money out of the war," said Mr. Giannini. "We cannot now adopt a policy of total isolation from European affairs. We have a distinct responsibility."

"I found in Germany a disposition towards a revengeful spirit, but unlimited armament is not necessary to protect the world against this. Germany has no more allies. Austria is crushed, her condition is pitiful. The United States may have to have a hand in helping her regain her feet. She will become the debtor of allied nations."

"As for Russia, she can be isolated by intelligent handling of Germany and Austria. By permitting Germany, or more especially Austria, to drift towards communism we are only paving the way for a dangerous union."

BRIDGE ACROSS ROANOKE RIVER TO BE OPENED SEPT. 7

Great Event for State and Eastern North Carolina to Take Place Next Thursday.

Williamston is making great preparations for Thursday, Sept. 7th, the day on which the bridge across Roanoke river will be formally opened for public use.

This bridge is regarded as one of the greatest engineering feats of modern times. It has been undertaken and completed by the State Highway commission, connecting the counties of Martin and Bertie and shortening the distance one hundred miles to Norfolk and other northern points from all sections of North Carolina.

The Roanoke river has on either side of it from its source to its mouth from four to five miles of impassable swamps. This is the first bridge ever built over it.

The bridge is over four miles long and shortens the distance from Windsor to Williamston from 140 miles to 17 miles.

A number of Greenville people received invitations to attend the opening.

The program for the day is as follows:

First—11:00 a. m., Formal inspection of the bridge by the Governor, State Highway commission, Bankhead Highway officials, State and county officials and others.

Second—12:30 p. m., Luncheon at the Masonic Hall for the Governor, State Highway commission, and other officials. Hon. Walter Murphy of Rowan, toastmaster.

Third—2:00 p. m., Band concert at the fair grounds.

Fourth—2:30 p. m., Address of welcome by Hon. Harry W. Stubbs, introduction by Hon. Francis D. Winston of Bertie. Address by His Excellency, the Honorable Cameron Morrison, governor of North Carolina. Hon. Bonehan Cameron, president of the Bankhead Highway association, Hon. Frank Page, chairman of the State Highway commission, Hon. W. A. Hart, highway commissioner of the first district, and short addresses by other members of the State highway commission and other officials.

LEADERS PREDICT QUICK SETTLEMENT OF LABOR TROUBLE

Labor Day Speakers in Many
Cities See Early End to 'Bad
Situation'

UNION MEETINGS HELD THROUGHOUT ENTIRE COUNTRY

Demonstration in all Sections
Conducted in an Orderly
Manner

Chicago, Sept. 4.—The nation observed Labor Day today by a general suspension of business throughout the land, and with gatherings of union workers in various cities. Fears of untoward demonstrations had proved unfounded up to early afternoon.

The settlement of the hard coal strike, hard upon the heels of adjustment in the bituminous fields and the textile industry in New England, together with the continuing decrease in unemployment in all sections, were hailed by speakers as promising of a quick stabilization of the industrial situation and an early revival of business generally. Recent wage increases announced for the steel industry also were regarded as indications of the safe passing by the nation of the critical period of industrial readjustment, speakers declared.

Secretary of Labor Davis delivered an address at Mooseheart, Ill., on the keynote of the necessity of finding some means to settle industrial disputes "without recourse to the futile arbitrament of force."

Postmaster General Work addressed the United National Association of Postoffice Clerks at Buffalo. President Samuel Gompers, of the American Federation of Labor, and John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers, were scheduled to speak at a meeting of the Central Labor Union of Philadelphia.

Parades were the principal features of programs in many cities. In many eastern places, however, inclement weather interfered with outdoor festivities. In Chicago, no arrangements had been made for the customary parade, though meetings were held by various organizations last night and today.

The dawn of Labor Day and the sixty-sixth days of the railway shopmen's strike found United States Marshals mobilized to enforce the government's strike injunction and prepared to keep a close watch on labor demonstrations throughout the country.

Arrival of the annual holiday brought with it new sets of violent and further expressions of bitter resentment on the part of labor leaders against the federal injunction. Many union chiefs against whom the injunction was issued declared they had not been served with writs. The whereabouts of B. M. Jewell, leader of the shopmen's strike, remained unknown early today.

LEONARD ORMOND IS CAPTURED BY SHERIFF OF LENOIR COUNTY

Leonard Ormond, a white man, of Beaufort county who three years ago was given a sentence of thirty years in the penitentiary for killing Deputy Sheriff Ben Thompson, of Aurora, when he attempted to capture a still, and who escaped from the penitentiary two years ago, was captured on last Thursday by Sheriff Taylor, of Lenoir county, and returned to Raleigh.

Ormond and his brother-in-law Silverthorn, who was serving a 20-year term escaped at the same time. Silverthorn was captured about six months ago, but up until last Thursday Ormond had succeeded in evading officers.

MRS. W. M. SCALES WINS WATCH TODAY

The watch given by Blount-Harvey Co., was won this afternoon by Mrs. W. M. Scales. Little George Howard Johnston drew out the lucky coupon. Mrs. Scales' name was the first drawn. Luck seemed to follow her as she won the Victrola at Willard-Smith's sale last year.

Dyer Bill Will Not Be Passed This Session of Congress

PAYING FOR THE COAL STRIKE.

Secretary Honnold of the Illinois Coal Operators' association estimates that the coal strike has cost the residents of this state upward of \$100,000,000. He figures the loss in wages to the striking miners at \$50,310,000; the loss to the mining companies through the idleness of their property at \$25,000,000, and the loss to the public—through higher prices and freight rates on coal that should have been mined in Illinois but was hauled in from other states—at \$30,000,000.

No careful estimate has been presented of the cost of the strike to the entire nation, but guesses by coal producers range from \$500,000,000 upward.

Consumers must bear in mind, however, that the strike loss actually is all theirs. For the miners by the steady work which they are now assured during the fall and winter will make up for the wages they might have earned by broken payment through the spring and summer, while the mine operators will sell coal at higher prices and in full quantities through intensive effort at the mines. Meanwhile higher prices of coal to consumers and the increased cost of manufactured articles, into which are

figured the higher prices of the manufacturers' fuel, will make the public the actual sufferers. As Dr. Honnold says, it is the people of this country who lost the strike.

Similar strike losses by the public in the future can and must be prevented. The price of coal to the consumer can be reduced to a reasonable level if the recent proposals of President Harding to congress are carried out. His fact-finding commission should be authorized by congress without delay. Its members should be men capable of outlining such a thorough reorganization as the coal industry must undergo if the public is ever again to be treated fairly in the matter of fuel supplies and prices. The high-cost mines opened up during the war should be closed; the superfluous miners should be established advantageously in other industries; labor-saving, cost-reducing machinery should be introduced in all mines where it is possible advantageously to employ such machinery, and open competition should be restored in the coal markets.

When those changes are effected and not before can there be freedom from strikes, reasonable profits for coal producers, steady work at good wages for miners and an assurance of plenty of fuel at honest prices for the public. It is estimated that from 40 to 50 per cent of the striking miners were employed on farms or in other useful service the strike lasted. Now that a scarcity of labor in various industries is reported it is reasonable to think that the great surplus of mine workers that already exists and the further great surplus that would be created by the economical mining of coal by machinery readily would be absorbed in the general industrial activity of the country. With these notable reductions in expense the price of coal would materially decrease though consumption would increase because of the resulting stimulation to industry.

Failure to bring about these benefits through appropriate governmental action inevitably would be followed on April 1 next by another stubborn coal strike. The vicious circle must be broken. The existing conditions in the coal-mining industry are intolerable and must be remedied.

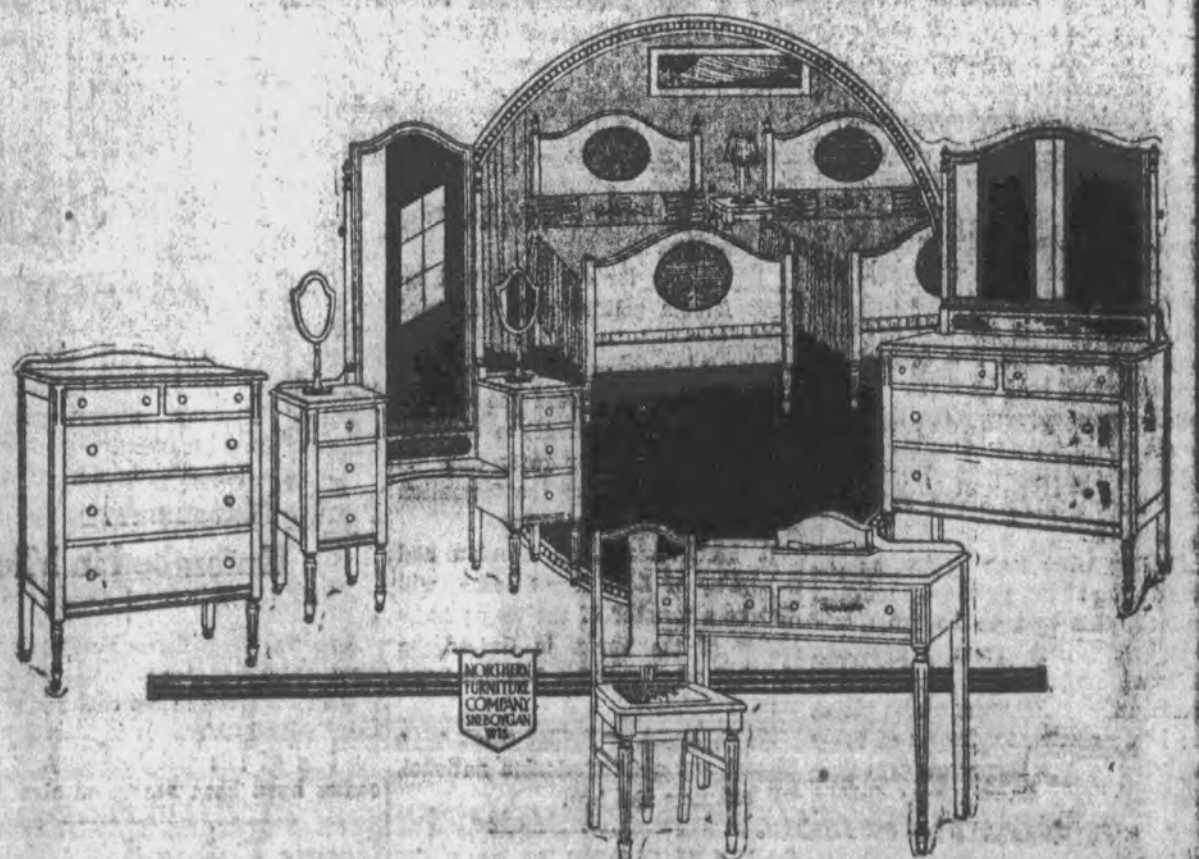

FIRST RADIO SET FOUND IN LONDON

London, Sept. 3.—The home-made apparatus with which David Hughes, the Anglo-American electrician and inventor, made his early wireless experiments has been found among a heap of old clothes, shoes, books and umbrellas that have laid for more than twenty years in a store in the Tottenham Court Road district of London.

The gear, consisting of knitting needles, sewing needles and ashtrays, largely put together with sealing wax, is stated to be intact.

Among it was a little clock used with one of the first microphones. Hughes used to leave the clock making sparks in his house while he walked with the microphone and the battery in his pocket connected to the telephone which he held to his ear. He could hear little clicks as the sparks were made. The farthest he could hear with certainty was 300 yards.

The whole of the apparatus, together with his notebooks, which were bequeathed to the British Museum, are now at the London Science Museum.

Recently she met Beck, face to face, on a subway train. They decided the logical thing to do was to obtain a legal separation.

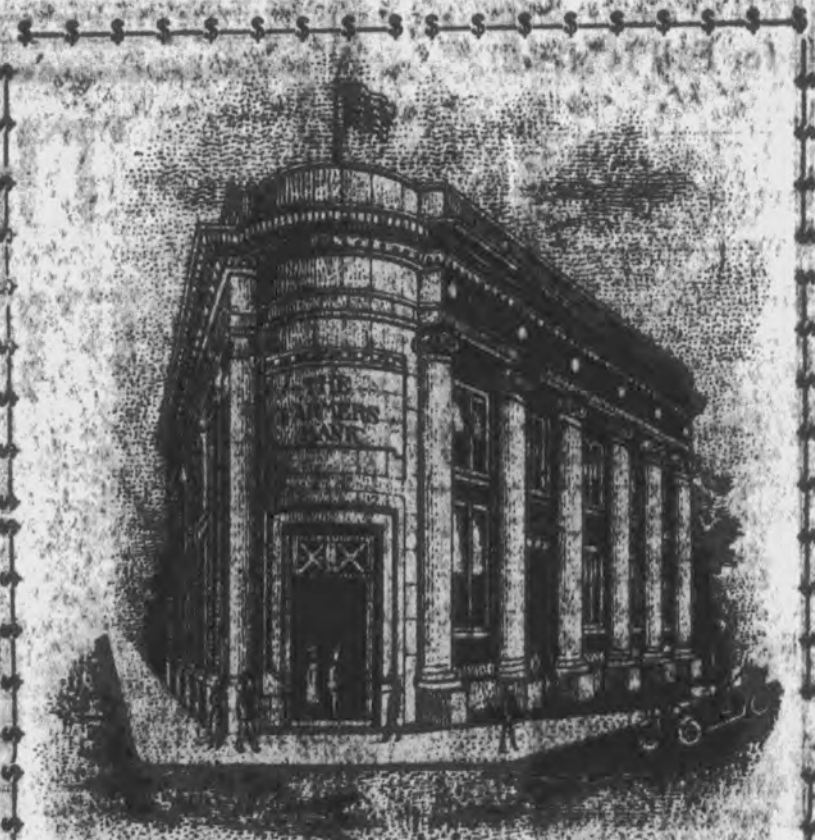

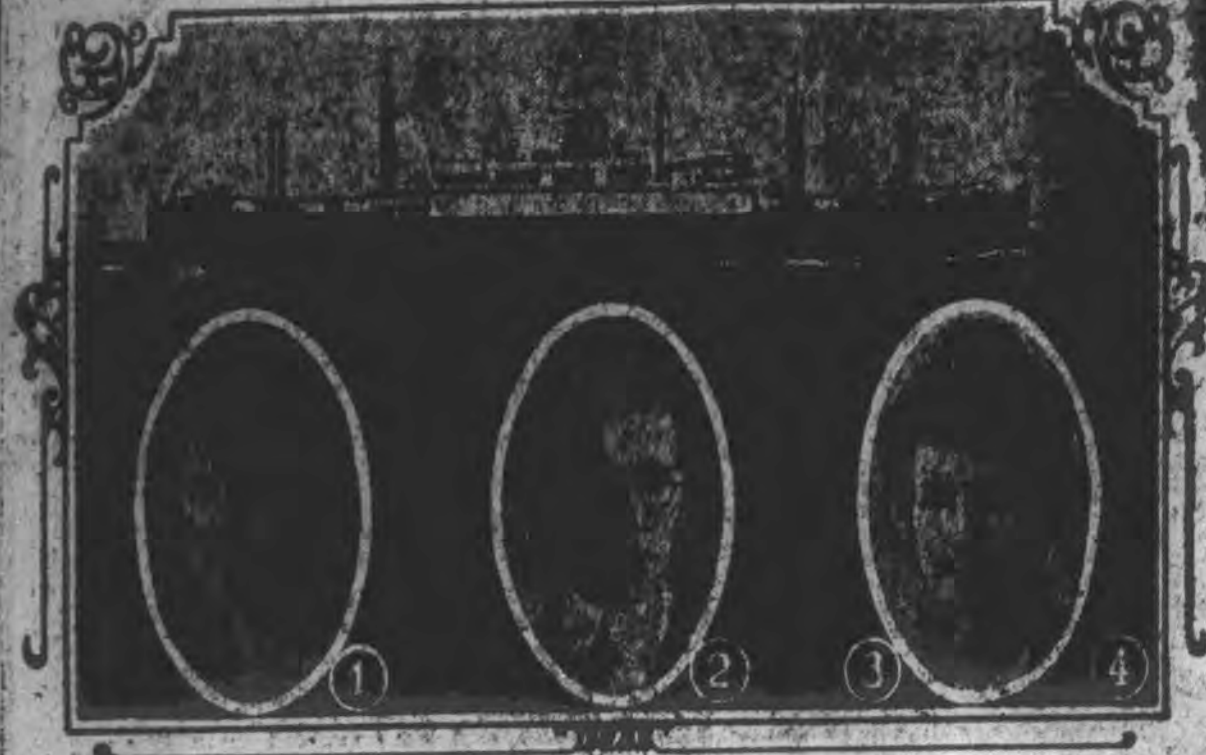

North Carolina Sends Three Young People As Missionaries to China



Miss Katie Murray (1), Rose Hill; Rev. L. E. Blackman (2), and Mrs. L. E. Blackman (3), of Princeton, who sailed from Seattle September 2 on the Admiral Line President Jackson (4), for missionary service in China under the direction of the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. Miss Murray will take charge of a girls' school in Chongchow, Honan Province, Interior China, while Mr. and Mrs. Blackman will engage in evangelistic work at Tangchow.

WITH the sending out this season of fifty new missionaries by the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, 250 new workers have been sent to foreign fields during the 75 Million Campaign, one-half the goal that was set in the number of workers to be provided during that movement. It is anticipated that the remaining 250 will go out during the remainder of the campaign period that will expire in December, 1922. The workers going out this season will enter the fields of China, Japan, Africa, Palestine, Brazil, Argentina, Uruguay, Chile and Mexico.

Inasmuch as the largest missionary effort of the denomination is centered in the Orient, the larger portion of the workers sent from Seattle Saturday, September 2, on the Admiral Line President Jackson for stations in China and Japan. The missionaries for fields on other continents, sent from New York on various lines and some of them will not depart until September 30.

Varied Types Workers Sent
Included in the list of missionaries are preachers and evangelists, teachers, doctors, nurses, one architect, one expert in domestic science, and special workers among women and children. William Barrie Hines of Spartanburg, S. C., who goes to Shanghai to assist in the construction of all mission buildings in China, enjoys the

distinction of being the first architect ever sent out by the Foreign Mission Board, and his appointment indicates the vast extent of the Southern Baptist work in that country. More than half of the total number of missionaries in the employ of this board are located in China, where the results of their labors are very gratifying to the officers of the board.

Large interest centers, also, in the launching of an intensive missionary work in Palestine, to which country there go Rev. and Mrs. Fred Bunyan Pearson of Monrovia, Ala. and Rev. and Mrs. J. W. Watts of Laurens, S. C. Some active missionaries are already at work in Palestine, and the outlook there is considered very encouraging, despite the present complicated political and racial controversies.

Campaign Brings Enlargement
In addition to the sending out of 250 new workers to foreign fields, the 75 Million Campaign has made it possible to increase the number of native workers from 771 to 1472, practically double the missionary equipment in the older fields of China, Japan, Africa, Italy, Brazil, Argentina, Chile, Uruguay and Mexico, and to enter the new fields in Spain, Hungary, Hungary, Roumania, Southern Russia, Palestine and Siberia. (Southern Baptists now have a practically unbroken string of mission fields encircling the globe, and a possible mission audience

of 900,000,000 people, or one-half the total population of the globe.

And the results on the field have kept pace with the larger investment in the work and number of workers. Since the outset of the campaign the Foreign Mission Board reports the organization of 117 new churches, 21,786 baptisms, 211 new Sunday schools with a gain of 17,576 pupils, native contributions to Baptist work of \$1,003,380.66, and 529,442 treatments administered by missionary physicians. Churches on the foreign fields, exclusive of the new territory in Europe and the Near East, now number 633 with 54,361 members. There are also 771 Sunday schools with 53,691 pupils, and 694 mission schools of all grades with 38,867 students.

Expense Ratio Is Low
More than \$1,250,000 net has gone from the campaign into foreign mission work, and so economically have these funds been handled, the board reports, that \$6.24 cents out of every dollar has actually reached the foreign field, only 3.74 cents out of each dollar being required to pay for the total cost of administration. But with these larger receipts and economical administration the board is unable to meet the demands upon it, and at its last annual meeting it was compelled to reduce the request of the missionaries on the field for appropriations by more than \$1,000,000.

New York, Sept. 5.—Counsel for Edward Rich, statistician for the Underwood Typewriter company, is preparing to take legal action to find out whether the baby born to Mrs. Bertha Rich, of No. 22 Dwight street, Jersey City, on August 12 was a boy or a girl, and whether her own child was returned to her by a sanitarium in which it was placed.

Mrs. Rich says it was a boy. Her husband says his wife told him the baby was a boy. The officials of the Bergen Sanitarium, Clinton, and Madison avenue, Jersey City, say the baby was a girl.

Rich declares that the sanitarium did not give Mrs. Rich her own baby, and he has retained Charles E. S. Simpson, an attorney.

According to Rich, his wife told him that Dr. David Russell said to her: "It's a boy." Rich told his office associates that he was the father of a boy, and mailed announcements to his friends.

On August 18, says Rich, Dr. Russell asked him what name he desired to give the child. Rich selected "Edward, Jr.," whereupon Rich says, the physician wrote "Edwina" on the birth record. On the same day, according to the puzzled father, Mrs. Rich told the new nurse to "give the boy a bath," whereupon the nurse exclaimed: "It's a girl."

Dr. Russell's explanation is that Mrs. Rich's desire to have a boy was so strong that she thought the child born to her was a boy. When the baby was born, he said, he told Mrs. Rich it was a girl, and so did the nurse.

Dr. Peter Maras, vice-president of the sanitarium, said that Mrs. Rich's baby was born prematurely and weighed between three and four pounds, and if there had been a thousand babies in the sanitarium at the time it would have been impossible to have made a substitution.
