ATTORNEY GENERAL DAUGHERTY SAYS PERSONAL LIBERTY OF STRIKERS IS NOT ABRIDGED BY LATE INJUNCTION

Freedom of Speech and Freedom of the Press Also Not Interfered With

MEN NOT FORCED TO WORK BY INJUNCTION UNLESS THEY WANT TO

White House Speaker Says Proceedings Will be Followed up by Other Issues

Washington, Sept. 5.—The injunction obtained in Chicago against striking shopmen by the government, Attorney General Daugherty said today, will not be used to abridge personal liberty, nor will freedom of speech or the press be interfered with. But, he added, "freedom of speech and freedom of press does not mean those mediums may be used to incite riots or murders." The Attorney General also declared that the injunction had not been obtained to force men to work, nor was it a move to prevent strikes.

The statement of Mr. Daugherty, which was made to newspaper correspondents, followed earlier declarations by a White House spokesman after today's cabinet meeting that President Harding felt the injunction would not in any way endanger constitutional rights of the men on strike or of other citizens. But, it was added, the Chicago injunction proceedings would be followed up with the determination of preventing interference with transportation.

Just how far the government would be obliged to go with prosecutions against individuals, the White House spokesman said, could only be determined by events. It was indicated that no activities in connection with the strike outside of court matters were now in progress.

Attorney General Daugherty, in his statement, declared there would be no objection by the department of justice to meetings of union men to perform any of their functions "that do not interfere with interstate commerce or otherwise violate the law."

"If any one undertakes to abridge personal liberty," he added, "I will be as vigorous in upholding the people's rights as I am vigorous in opposing violence."

The Attorney General expressed the belief that the strike situation would "quiet down" this week, and added:

"I do not want to go any farther in these proceedings than is necessary. I want to be reasonable about it, but not so reasonable as to let the government and the people be trampled upon."

The injunction, he said, is "sitting very comfortable," adding that the department had received many congratulatory messages on it, including many from labor people.

COST OF FOOD ON DECLINE IN UNITED STATES

Labor Department Reports Five Per Cent Decrease in City of Milwaukee

Washington, Sept. 6.—The cost of food is coming down, the department of labor announced this afternoon.

For the period ending August 15th the decline ranged from five percent in Milwaukee, Wisconsin to only one percent in Richmond, Virginia. The decrease is believed to compare favorably in other parts of the country.

RUSSIANS PLAN TO EXPORT GRAIN CROP THIS YEAR

Experts Plan to Ship It Out of Some Ports and Buy More Elsewhere

Washington, Sept. 6.—The American farmer will benefit by the decision of the Russian Soviet Government to export part of the wheat crop just maturing, according to Government experts.

The feeling of indignation which followed announcements of the plan of the Moscow authorities to ship part of the new crop out of the country has disappeared, and officials here are inclined now to compliment the Russian experts upon the good judgment shown. The misunderstanding as to the real purpose of the Soviet authorities resulted from the action of the Soviet delegates at the Hague, who through stupidity or otherwise, gave the impression there would be a surplus of wheat in Russia this year and that the surplus would be exported.

Knowing such a surplus to be out of the question, officials here jumped to the conclusion that Lenin intended to sell the new crop to obtain badly-needed funds, leaving the population to the mercy of the American Relief Association for another winter. Hence the indignation.

Apparently there is no such motive behind the plan. Inquiry shows it practically has been forced upon the Soviet authorities because of the break-down of transportation between the northern and southern parts of the country. To obviate this difficulty grain will be shipped from the Ukraine and the Caucasus region, formerly called the granary of Europe to ports on the Black Sea, thence to be carried to the Greek, Italian and other markets.

**SOUTHERN LIMITED
WRECKED IN FLORIDA;
PASSENGERS UNHURT**

Atlanta, Sept. 6. — The Southern railway's "Royal Palm Limited" was wrecked this morning seven miles from Jacksonville, Florida, when a switch was thrown after a locomotive had been derailed.

Officials of the road stated today that first reports indicated that none were injured. Five Pullmans and two day coaches, however, were derailed long enough to cause serious tie-up of traffic.

GAMBLING IN COAL ASSUMES ALARMING SCOPE IN AMERICA

Systematic Attempt to Extort Exorbitant Prices From Consumer Discovered

(By International News.)

Washington, Sept. 6.—Gambling in coal is being engaged in on a big scale by unscrupulous brokers and speculators who abandoned what was once gambling for a systematic attempt to extort exorbitant profits from the country's dire need for fuel. Members of the senate charged today.

Gouging among the speculators has assumed such great proportions that immediate action on part of the government will be necessary to prevent the public from suffering severely during the winter months. It is claimed that the shortage of cars in which to ship the coal makes it impossible to obtain large quantities at fair prices, but it has been discovered that cars are always available when the consumer agrees to prices almost double what it is worth.

The campaign is one of the most systematic ever before attempted in this country and will be the means of fleecing hundreds of consumers who find themselves helpless in the clutches of the gouger. Members of the senate have been asked to prevent such bold robbery and it is expected some drastic action may be taken at a later date.

PROF. MUILBERGER LEAVES KINSTON FOR GREENVILLE

Prof. Albert E. Muilberger, who has acted as organist of the Christian church here and conducted special classes in various forms of music here for the past few years, left yesterday morning for his new home in Greenville, where he will have charge of the music in the public schools there and also conduct special lessons both at the East Carolina Teachers College and privately. Mr. Muilberger's leaving leaves a big hole here in the cultural side of life, as he had a great influence in musical circles and was popular. He will play here on Sundays in the Christian church for some weeks, till other arrangements are made.—Kinston News.

DUPLIN WOMAN IS VICTIM OF ATTACK BY UNKNOWN MAN

Miss Julia Rhodes, Criminally Assaulted, Unable to Give Coherent Account of Crime

BLOOD HOUNDS PICK UP TRAIL WHILE POSSE SCOUR WOODS

Citizens Block Every Avenue of Escape of Fend Who is Believed to be a Negro

Warsaw, N. C., Sept. 6.—Bloodhounds arrived here at 1:45 o'clock this morning and immediately picked up the trail of an unknown man who, at 8 o'clock last night, attacked and criminally assaulted Miss Julia Rhodes, daughter of a prominent farmer living three miles east of this place, on the Kenansville road. At this hour, it is reported, Miss Rhodes is still unable to give a more coherent account of the terrible crime than to say that her assailant was a tall, dark man. A physician remains at the home.

Miss Julia Rhodes, daughter of a prominent farmer living three miles east of Warsaw, was the victim of a brutal attack and criminal assault early tonight and is reported to be in a critical condition. Whether her assailant was white or black is yet undetermined. The attack occurred a few minutes after 8 o'clock when Miss Rhodes stepped out upon the back porch of the home to get a drink of water. She was seized and dragged off the porch into the yard, the fiend choking the victim unmercifully.

It is not clear whether Miss Rhodes' father was at home or not. A brother who had undergone for her, heard frantic cries but when he got into the yard the man had gone. Tracks leading off in a northerly direction were discovered, and these are being carefully preserved in order that bloodhounds, which have been ordered from Raeford, may pick up the trail easily.

Sheriff Ingraham and a posse of citizens are scouring the woods, while citizens have every road for several miles blocked to prevent the fiend's escape. Feeling is high and the situation is described as tense, but everything is orderly. The fear is expressed, however, that a lynching will take place if the criminal is apprehended.

TURKISH FORCES KILL CHRISTIANS AROUND ANATOLIA

Allied Warships Rushing to Smyrna to Prevent Turks Entering City

(By International News.)

London, Sept. 6.—The advancing Turkish army at Anatolia has begun to massacre Christians along its line of march, according to Athens reports received here this afternoon. The Turks were reported to be about 75 miles from the city of Smyrna, which at the present time is being used as Greek headquarters.

Allied warships, including American yessels, were today on their way to Smyrna to prevent the Turks entering the city.

The last dispatch received this afternoon stated that the Greeks were making a determined stand along the Anatolian battle front, and hope to hold off the onrushing Turkish army until aid is received.

LA FOLLETTE DEFEATS CANFIELD FOR SENATE

Madison, Sept. 5. — LaFollette swept the state of Wisconsin in the senatorial contest against William Canfield by a vote of two to one, according to returns received today from over half the state. His majority is expected to pass the hundred and fifty thousand mark.

Siberian King Suspends His Older Brother



Prince George of Serbia has been deprived of his rights of communication with the Royal Serbian house for twenty months, according to a report from Belgrade. Prince George is an older brother of King Alexander, who ordered the suspension, following his overtly alleged threatening letters written by Prince George, who renounced his rights to the Serbian throne in 1909.

CAPTAIN COLSON KILLED IN FIRE ABOARD SHIP

Pensacola, Sept. 6. — Captain H. Colson was killed and a third engineer badly injured by fire aboard the shipping board steamer Coltraps, operated by Page and Jones of Mobile, Alabama.

The fire was burning fiercely when discovered and it is believed the vessel will be a total loss. The ship was laden with rosin, lumber and oil and the fire made rapid headway despite frantic efforts of firemen.

WILSON TO PLAY CHARLESTON CLUB FOR CHAMPIONSHIP

Virginia and South Atlantic League Winners to Play in Wilson Thurs. and Fri.

Wilson, N. C., Sept. 6.—Interest is running high in this vicinity and surrounding territory over the coming series between Wilson, pennant winners of the Virginia league and Charleston, winners of the South Atlantic League to decide the championship of the South Atlantic States. The first two games are to be played in Wilson on Thursday and Friday of this week with Charleston drawing the next two on Saturday and Monday.

The series is to run until one team wins four games, the selection of the towns where other games will be played is left to future choice. Extensive preparations are being made in Wilson to handle the largest crowd ever seen at an Eastern Carolina base ball contest. Requests for reservation are pouring in from all sections of the country and the local base ball authorities are working hard to take care of all applications.

Both clubs are in fine condition and each is priming itself for a hard fight. Adherents of both leagues are strong in the support of its favorite, both orally and financially and before the series begins interest will have reached fever heat.

POULTRY RAISERS TO HOLD MEETING IN CITY FRIDAY

Dr. Morrill Issues Call for Session of Association at Chamber of Commerce

Dr. J. Morrill, president of the Pitt county poultry association, issues a call for a meeting of that body for next Friday afternoon. The meeting will be held in the Chamber of Commerce rooms at 3:00 o'clock.

The poultry business is one that will pay splendidly, when the proper thought and attention is directed. An example of what can be done in the poultry business is furnished by a county in Tennessee. They ship annually \$8,000,000 worth of poultry products.

Pitt county now has a wonderful opportunity of becoming the poultry center of North Carolina. This can be done without leaving off the cotton and tobacco crops.

A representative citizen of Greenville made this striking statement recently: "The state of Kansas produces more wheat than any other state of the union, and yet the total value of her poultry products exceeds that of her wheat crop." Kansas has wheat for her money crop, but raises chickens to care for all of the operating and household expenses.

Mr. Grobaine was for a long time violinist with the Symphony orchestra.

The admission price for both the picture and minstrel scene will be 25 cents and 50 cents, and a full house should greet the performers this evening.

STRIKERS DENY ANY MOVEMENT TO END WALKOUT

Railroad and Shopmen's Officials Say Recent Reports Are Unfounded

SHOPMEN'S HEADS SAY NO MEETINGS HAVE BEEN CALLED

Any Such Reports Said to be Plot of Railroads to Fool the Public

Baltimore, Sept. 5.—Daniel Willard, president of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company, at the Belvedere hotel tonight emphatically denied that he has been in conference with B. M. Jewell, president of the Railway Employees' Department of the American Federation of Labor, relative to a modified seniority concession to the striking shopmen or an agreement to oppose the shopmen's plan for a seven-cent wage increase.

Mr. Willard said he had not seen Mr. Jewell, that he knew nothing of the proposed concession and declared that the Baltimore and Ohio is "going ahead, trying to reach a settlement with its own men."

Jewell registered at the Emerson hotel last Saturday morning and left between 5 and 6 o'clock Monday afternoon, it was said tonight at the hotel.

When told tonight that it was reported in Chicago that Jewell is ready to call a meeting of the executive committee of the shopmen to submit a modified seniority concession as a result of Jewell's visit to Baltimore, Mr. Willard said:

"You can deny that for me. I know nothing of any meeting and have not conferred with Mr. Jewell." Leaders of the striking railway shopmen denied tonight reports that a call had been sent out for a meeting of the union policy committee of ninety men in Chicago Thursday. "Any such report is a plot on the part of the railroads to deceive our membership," declared J. F. McGrath, vice president and spokesman for the union in the absence from headquarters of B. M. Jewell.

That the Greenville tobacco market is growing in importance is very evident from the number of farmers appearing on the market with their offerings from day to day.

Profiteering in the coal industry will be very pronounced during the approaching fall and winter unless the government gets busy. This fact has been very evident for several weeks, in fact, ever since the strike began, and unless something is done the situation will be very serious to the consumer who has been forced to pay outrageously high prices for fuel for many years. There is no reason for such a situation. This fact has been established and at this time those who have to buy fuel in large quantities are waging a great fight to have the profiteer ousted before he gains such sway. The government can play an important part in this, and it is up to officials to get busy and see what can be done before demand increases.

The Greenville tobacco market has been growing in importance from year to year, but this year it is recognized from a greater distance than ever before. Farmers from a number of surrounding counties have been selling their offerings in Greenville the past several days. That they were pleased with the excellent facilities afforded by the large and commodious warehouses is affirmed by continued patronage. The farmers received living prices for their products and returned home highly gratified at the treatment accorded them by the warehousemen. Greenville has always been destined to become the greatest bright leaf distributing center in the world, and developments the last several years have shown this in an unspeakably plain and interesting manner. The triple sales plan effective this year has played an important part in success of the market. Farmers have been able to market their tobacco and reach home the same day. This in itself is something in which every farmer should be more or less interested and with their support the market will continue to improve to their advantage. This will probably be one of the most successful seasons in years and the fact that farmers from many counties will share in this makes it even more pronounced than under ordinary circumstances.

Leaders of railway shopmen, it is gratifying to note, have denied that they sanctioned recent violence occurring among union members in various parts of the country. This is certainly to their credit. If they will condemn such activity in stronger terms it may be conditions will improve and that railways will be able to continue service without fear of serious violence and loss of life. The public has condemned the strike in no uncertain terms, and the cause of the strikers is a lost one unless they fight their battles above board and without physical violence. The thing is serious enough without causing it to become more accentuated and if the strikers can pursue their way peacefully it may be they will come out better than at present time expected.

Samuel Gompers charges the government with overstepping its authority in issuing an injunction against the strikers. He presented this thought in a labor day speech, expecting probably to convince the public that the cause of the strikers is right and everything else wrong. The public will have little interest in what Mr. Gompers says, unless he should call the strike to an end. It is realized that something must be done to protect the country and what Attorney General Daugherty did was in behalf of the great cause the government first of all should protect. Judging by recent disorders, transportation would be completely paralyzed, were it not for certain restrictions prescribed by the law. This has been evidence time and again since

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the strike was called, and if the government had not been supported by certain legislation, goodness knows what the outcome of the tie up would be. Mr. Gompers has proven himself a capable leader of labor, but when he says the government cannot protect public rights through such legislation as deemed necessary, he is greatly in the wrong. Everyone is thankful this is so, and hopes it will continue to be until the strike has been amicably concluded.

The boll weevil is the principal subject of discussion in all parts of the state at this time and before the year comes to an end it is likely every farmer of any intelligence will have decided upon some effective plan of combatting the pest for his next crop of cotton. Some would have us believe reports of destruction by the weevil are merely imaginary. Such people are not only damaging themselves, but their community and should not be listened to. The weevil is here and unless some definite action is taken an incalculably large acreage of cotton will be destroyed next year. County farm agents are doing everything possible to get the farmer to realize the seriousness of the situation. If they should be fortunate enough to get the attention of the majority of our growers, then the weevil will be beat at his own game. It is hoped Pitt county planters will be in the front ranks of those employing effective measures to combat the pest, and if they should be conditions will be everything hoped for.

NEW MANDATE IS CALLED GREATEST DOCUMENT TODAY

Voliva Says Import is Not Exceeded by King John's Magna Charta

HOMELAND BE RESTORED

Saints to be "Caught Up" to Heaven, Earth Visited by Judgments, His View

Ston, Ill., Sept. 6.—The ratification of the Jewish mandate, giving the Jews the right and protection to re-enter their homeland, is regarded by Wilbur Glenn Voliva as the greatest document in history—not excepting the famous Magna Charta signed by King John at Runnymede. This ratification by the Supreme Council of the League of Nations on July 24, 1922, confirms the Balfour declaration and places Great Britain as the mandatory Power and guarantees protection by international law to the Jewish race in their return homeward, after wandering throughout the earth for centuries.

"I consider this mandate the greatest document in history," said Overseer Voliva, "not excepting King John's Famous Magna Charta, signed by him at Runnymede. It means that we have reached a stage in the world's history the significance of which cannot be estimated—it is so stupendous in importance. It is a sign to the whole world of the approaching end of this age. When Jesus said: 'And they shall fall by the edge of the sword, and they shall be led away captives into all nations; and Jerusalem shall be trodden down of the Gentile, until the times of the Gentiles be fulfilled, (Luke 21:24) His words were literally fulfilled and we find that the Jews have been scattered throughout the world for centuries, without a home, and yet not losing their identity. The world war of 1914, and the capture of Jerusalem by General Allenby as a result of that war marked a stage in the world history of tremendous importance. It meant the death-knell of the reign of the Gentiles and the restoration of Israel with the throne of David."

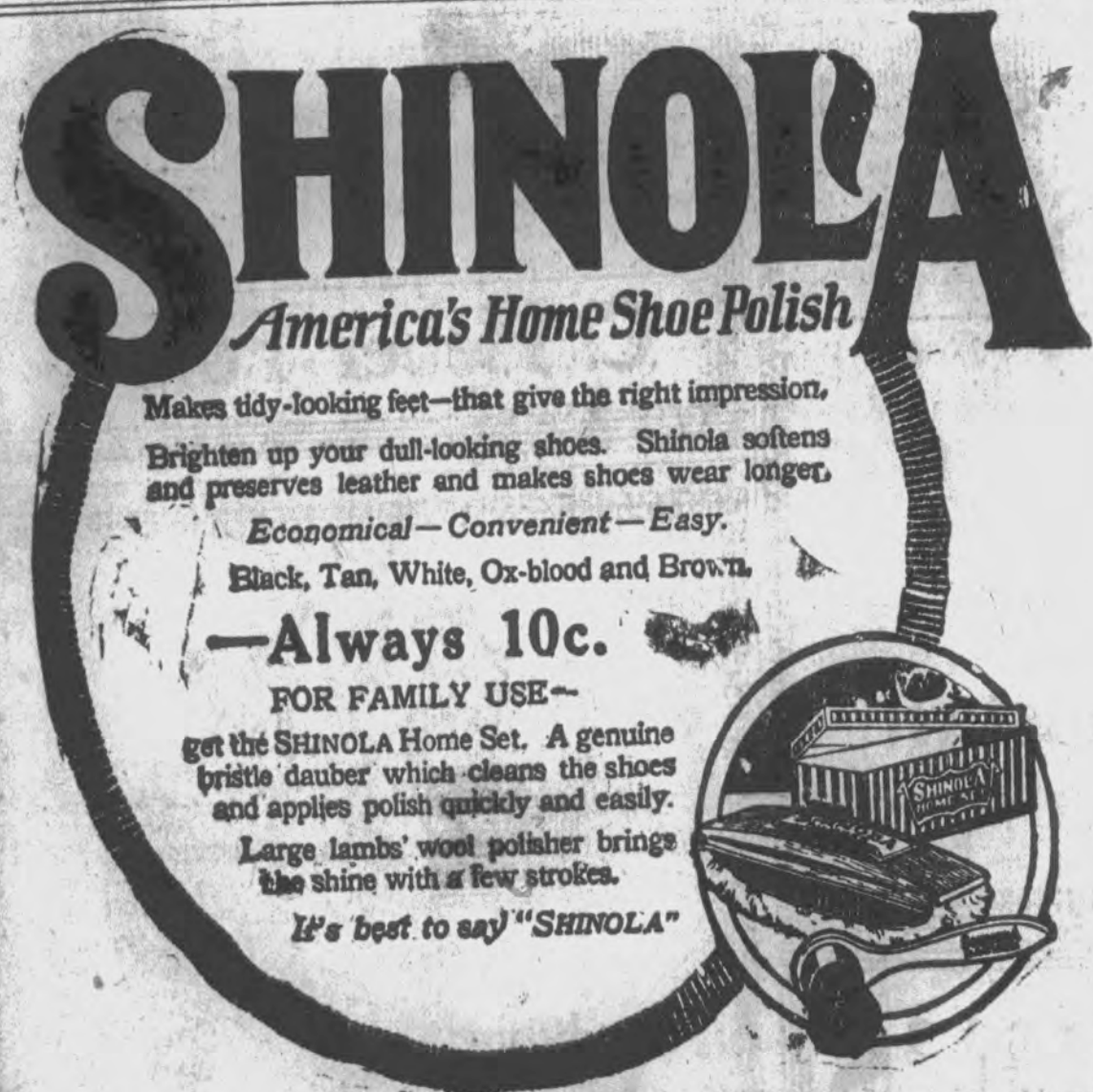

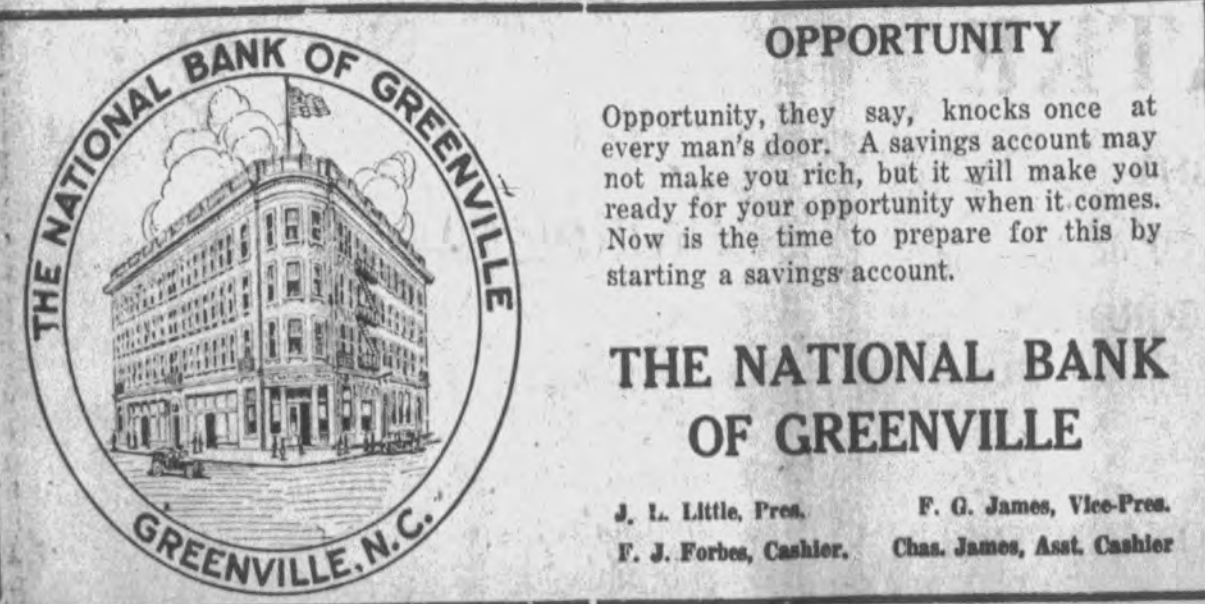

NEW LAND LAWS FOR RUSSIA ARE FORMED

BOYS THRIVED ON LOST GOLF BALLS

Peasants' Ownership is to be Protected, but They Can't Sell or Lease

(By International News.)
Moscow, Sept.—A new land law has been published by the All Russian Central Committee, codifying all suggestions made by the recent all Russian congress. The law has a distinct pro-peasant slant.

Each village may decide how the land within its borders is to be worked—by communal methods, individual farms, or co-operative large-scale farming.

Every peasant is protected in the right to the land, so long as he uses it; but he can neither sell it nor mortgage it nor give it away, nor even rent it, except under certain stresses of misfortune which may make short-term renting necessary.

Lands courts are established as part of the machinery of Government, from village boards up to the highest Central Land Court, which is chosen by the Department of agriculture and the Department of justice and confirmed by the Central Executive committee. Appeals may be carried up to the highest court, and must be heard on each appeal within two weeks.

Pomeroy, O., Sept.—Just before the world war Glenn Johnson, farming a few acres near here, decided to sell off his stock. Then he enlisted in an artillery outfit and went to France, where he saw active service.

BRITISH ARE BUILDING SEAWORTHY FLYING SHIP

London, Sept.—What is described as the largest flying boat in the world is being built for the British air ministry at Southampton.

Great secrecy is being maintained as to its design and construction, but it is understood that the main idea is that the boat should be able to

keep out in the heaviest of weather. It is intended that the boat shall not only cross the sea but also be able to remain at sea whatever the state of the weather, and for this purpose living quarters for the crew will be provided.

The hull is nearly completed and it is expected that the craft will be finished this year.
