MISGUIDED LABOR LEADERS WILL BE GIVEN A HEARING

Early Ratification of Pact in Hard Coal Region is Expected Soon

MINER'S LEADER CLAIMS COMPLETE VICTORY THIS TIME

He Admits That Longer Term Contract Would Have Been Better for Miners

Washington, Sept. 6.—Formal announcement by Attorney-General Daugherty that the government would "consider in due time what proceedings shall be taken against the few misguided labor leaders who have made incendiary speeches," in connection with the industrial situation, and persistent reports that secret conferences are in progress looking to some sort of separate settlement with individual roads stood out in today's developments in the strike of the railway shop crafts.

Incidentally, Mr. Daugherty said preparation of the government's case had been "somewhat hampered" by the difficulty process servers were experiencing in locating "leading officials of the shop crafts organizations."

W. H. Johnston, president of the machinists, and B. M. Jewell, official head of the seven organizations on strike, have recently dropped out of public view, although labor spokesmen have invariably denied the two leaders were avoiding the service of copies of the restraining order issued at Chicago last Friday and asserted they would be available if wanted for that purpose.

Mr. Daugherty in his statement emphasized his belief that the rank and file of labor organizations were content to ease the issue to orderly processes of the law, but said the few leaders "who have shown a contempt for the courts need not complain that they are denied the full privileges of free speech." Instructions have been sent to the United States Attorney at Chicago, the Attorney-General said, to notify counsel for the unions that leading officials of the shopmen's organizations together with their complete records, would be required before the court when the case is again called.

Both in government and labor circles today complete ignorance was asserted of any actual or impending negotiations looking to the settlement of the strike. Some officials had been informed, it was said, that the "outlook for a settlement" had been brightened by recent developments but even with the details were lacking. It was a matter of common knowledge, however, that several railroad held the views in favor of separate settlements which their representative had expressed at the recent in New York.

FIND BODIES OF UNKNOWN BABES IN CITY SEWER

In Replacing Fallen-in Parts of East Kingston Line Men Found Gruesome Evidence

Kinston, Sept. 7.—The bodies of two unidentified children, dead for several months, were found in the sewer out east of the colored school in Lincoln City Tuesday afternoon shortly after the obstruction that has blocked this sewer for some seven months was removed and the water began to move through the big pipe. The bodies, tied in copies of the News and Observer, of course, totally decomposed and there was no way to tell whether of the white or colored race, what age, about a few weeks, or anything else that might lead to the perpetrator of the crime.

It is thought that the bodies had been in the sewer, held back by the obstruction, for at least several months, and that they were put into the sewer system that drains the east section of the city, through the removal of the sanitary sewer seats. Both packages, were tied up but the papers had fallen off in places. The News and Observer noted was dated June 12th.

The obstruction was caused by the crushing in of the sewer at various intervals by the high water some months ago. Workmen have now completely renovated the line and the work is about finished. It was stated yesterday that this was not the first time such bodies had been known to have been dumped into the sewerage system here. Recently a body was found across the Iron Bridge, buried under only a few inches of soil. What was the cause of death in any of the cases, it is felt here, is impossible to discover.

FORMER GOVERNOR OF ALABAMA DIES

Emmet O'Neal Dies at Birmingham of Pneumonia Following Stroke of Paralysis

Birmingham, Sept. 7.—Former governor Emmet O'Neal died this morning at six-thirty as a result of pneumonia and a stroke of paralysis which occurred about two weeks ago.

The deceased was born in Florence in 1853. He was elected governor of Alabama in 1911 and served until 1915. He was defeated for the senate in 1920 by Senator Heflin. At the time of his death he was referee of bankruptcy for the Birmingham district.

He was an ardent advocate of Henry Ford's offer for the nitrate plant at Muscle Shoals. He stumped the south in a vigorous campaign in Ford's interest and friends believe this was the primary cause of his illness. Funeral arrangements had not been announced at a late hour today.

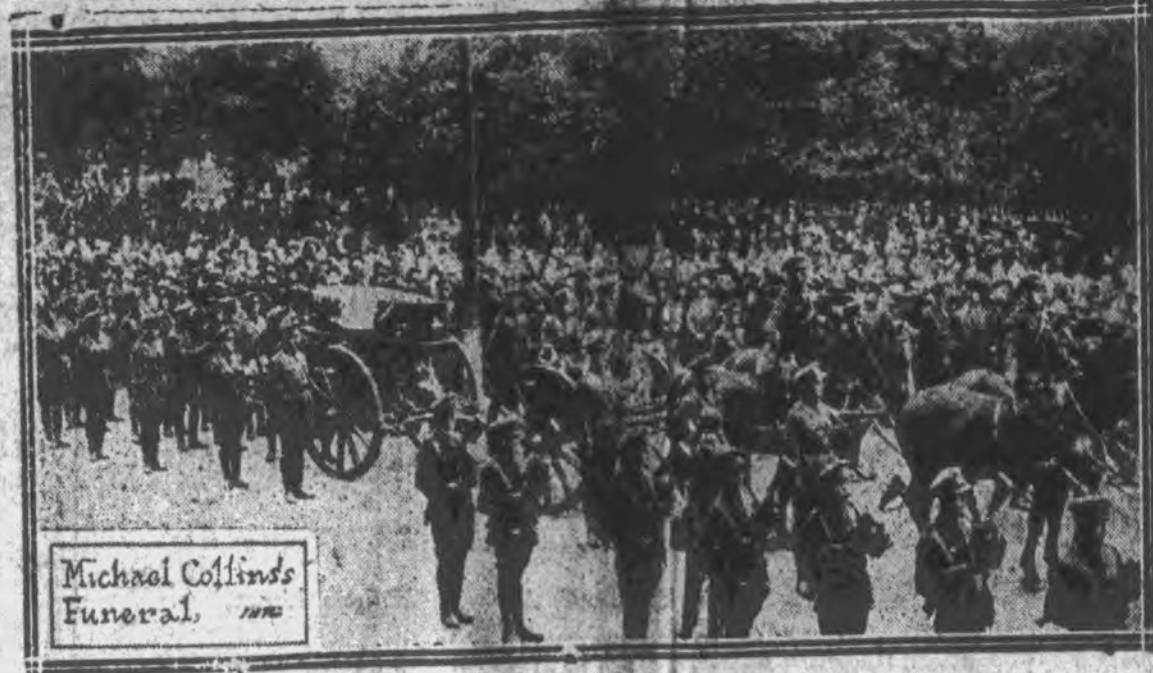
Committee From the Kiwanis Meet With Aldermen Tonight

COPPER STILL AND BEER CAPTURED BY COUNTY OFFICERS

Traffic Members Again Feel Strong Arm of the Law When Outfit is Taken

The illicit whiskey traffic of this section again felt the strong arm of the law yesterday when Deputy Sheriff Gus Stokes and Thad Williams succeeded in capturing a big still on the river road between Greenville and Bruce. While no whiskey was found at the still, the officers found six barrels of corn liquor beer. The still was superior to the usual type employed in the manufacture of contraband whiskey in this immediate section of the state, being constructed entirely of copper and capable of distilling a hundred gallons of beverage at a time. The outfit was one of the most complete captured in several weeks and indicates that the owners were turning out a superior kind of whiskey.

The still was brought back to town and placed in the confiscated cell in the county jail. The beer was poured out and the barrels demolished.

TURKS ADVANCING RAPIDLY AGAINST CITY OF ANATOLIA

Offensive Movement Has Carried Forces Within 21 Miles of Greek Headquarters

London, Sept. 7.—Turkish forces on the offensive against the Greeks on the Anatolian front today were advancing with astonishing rapidity and are now only twenty-one miles from Smyrna, set of the Greek headquarters, according to unofficial advice received this afternoon from Constantinople, Turkey.

It was stated that a hundred thousand Greeks were fleeing in all directions as result of the massacre and slaughter perpetrated by the Turks in the advance yesterday.

The commanding general of Greek field forces is reported to have been captured.

MORE THAN HALF MILLION POUNDS OF WEED SOLD HERE

Three Houses Crowded to Capacity With Others Being Comfortably Filled

PRICES CONTINUE TO SHOW STRENGTH ON ALL OFFERINGS

Farmers From Long Distance Highly Elated at Splendid Showing Made Here

More than a half million pounds of tobacco was sold at auction on the Greenville market today at prices that produced general satisfaction among farmers who came from many surrounding counties. All warehouses were comfortably filled, and three were crowded to their utmost capacity. While the floors were congested the buyers covered the houses rapidly and succeeded in completing their work in time for the farmers to reach home long before nightfall.

One of the outstanding features of today's sale was the strength of prices. Some grades of tobacco showed a pronounced increase over the last few days, and growers were visibly pleased with what they received. The price situation has been very favorable throughout the entire season, but not until the last few days has this been so evident on certain grades. It is believed this improvement will be in evidence from day to day until the major part of the crop has been disposed of.

Another feature of the day's activities was the large number of planters coming from surrounding counties. Many of these farmers stated this market was the best they had ever sold on before as prices were good and that the warehousemen did everything which they thought would interest the grower.

Adoption of the triple sale plan this season has virtually revolutionized the sale of bright leaf on this market, and the probability of blocked floors has been completely eliminated. The rapidity with which floors have been cleared is one of the main things which the growers from a distance consider, as they can sell their offering and reach home the same day. Only on a very few markets the size of Greenville is this possible, and as a consequence patronage has increased to pleasing proportions. Sales are expected to compare favorably with today's the remainder of the week and warehousemen are looking forward to one of the most successful weeks since the market opened.

MYSTERY SHROUDS KILLING OF YOUNG MORGANTON MAN

Ouray Smith Found With Throat Cut and Gun Shot Wound in His Breast

Morganton, Sept. 7.—Authorities were today investigating the death of Ouray Smith, crippled farmer who was found yesterday with his throat cut and a wound in his chest. The body was found lying in front of his uncle's home. Inside the house of Smith's uncle, a white shirt, soaked with blood, was found; used evidently in an attempt to stop the flow of blood. At first suicide was thought to have been probable, but the coroner's jury found no powder burns on the young man's clothing and other circumstances also indicate foul play.

MR. K. T. FUTRELL RETURN FROM CONCORD

Mr. K. T. Futrell, Supt. public welfare, returned this morning from Concord, N. C., where he went in charge of two youthful offenders sent up by the juvenile court to the Jackson Training and Industrial school. Mr. Futrell stated two hundred and sixty boys were there at present and when the building program was completed, now under way, room would be available for three hundred and ninety. The other boys there from Pitt county are making splendid records so Mr. Chas. E. Boger, the superintendent stated.

BELIEVE KLUXERS HAVE PUT AWAY GOLDSBORO NEGRO

Joe Pender, After Assault on Aged White Farmer, is Arrested; Taken by Klan

Goldsboro, Sept. 7.—A masked mob of 15 or 20 unknown men, wearing the insignia of the Ku Klux Klan, took Joe Pender, colored from the hands of Deputy Sheriff Walston and Officer Nathan Sellers, of Fremont, when the officers were about two miles from Fremont last Friday night, and since then no sight has been seen of the negro or the Kluxers. The officers were told to go back to Fremont, which they did, and the negro was led off not to be seen again. It is presumed that he was severely dealt with, but no information can be obtained as to whether he was lynched or not. It is thought, however, that such was the negro's treatment.

It seems that the negro had a fight with his landlord, an elderly farmer, Frank Hooks, last Friday, and hit the white man over the head with a heavy stick, injuring him badly. Deputy Sheriff Walston, with the aid of Officer Sellers, night policeman at Fremont, went out to the farm that night and made the arrest. They had some trouble with the negro but finally had gotten him about half mile from Fremont when the Klansmen took the man from them, sent them to town, and took the negro off to an unknown fate.

MADDENED MAN KILLS CHILDREN WHO FOUGHT HIS

Bill Farris Held at Clover, S. C. for Murder of Two Children and Injury of Four

Clover, S. C., Sept. 7.—Bill Farris, mill hand, was rushed to the state penitentiary under heavy guard following a shooting spree yesterday afternoon in which he fired on a group of children, killing two and wounding four.

Farris, witnesses stated, armed himself with a shotgun and picked off the children as he emerged from his home. The children were all members of the family of James Taylor. Feeling around Clover was intense immediately after the crime was committed, but there were no threats of physical violence, probably due to the age of Farris, who is said to be about 55 years of age.

The shooting is said to be an outgrowth of a dispute occurring between the two families several months ago. Farris, however, became enraged by a fight between some of the Taylor children and his children and it was not until this occurred he showed any signs of violence.

Reservoir is Blown Ut at Wilkesbarre

QUICK AGREEMENT IN THE STRIKE ISSUE INDICATED TODAY

Daugherty Declares Leader Need Not Complain of Not Being Treated Fair

LEADERS OF STRIKE CANNOT BE LOCATED EASY AS THOUGHT

Temporary Injunction of Government Comes in for First Attack in Senate

Wilkes-Barre, Penn., Sept. 6.—All indications tonight point toward a speedy ratification of the peace pact between operators and miners of the anthracite region by the tri-district convention of hard coal mine-workers which began its sessions here today.

More than 1,000 delegates, representing 400 local unions in the anthracite districts were present when the convention was called to order shortly after noon. The majority were uninstructed, but John L. Lewis International President of the United Mine Workers, claimed he had a majority that would overwhelm any opposition to the settlement plans of the union leaders which would conclude the five months' suspension in the hard coal fields.

Mr. Lewis was optimistic as also was Philip J. Murray, vice-president of the union, who accompanied the president here from Philadelphia, where last Saturday night miners and operators' representatives agreed to a plan of settlement involving principally the continuation of the old wage scale existing prior to the suspension April 1 until August 31, 1923.

Addressing the Kiwanis Club of Wilkes-Barre at noon today, the miners' chief admitted that the union would be forced to have a longer term of contract, but asserted that expediency for the public welfare demanded that the pact submitted by Senators Pepper and Red of Pennsylvania, at the behest of President Harding, be accepted. Mr. Lewis asserted, however, that the miners had won a clean-cut victory.

The opposition to the peace pact that has developed came principally, it was understood, from the delegates representing the Pottsville, Pittston and Old Forge districts. Meetings were held among the delegates representing these locals before the convention opened, according to reports, which indicated that the international officers were criticized for not holding out for the 19 demand for the miners formulated at Shamokin. They were also indignant, it was said, because the officials did not hold out for a continuation of the old wage scale until April 1, 1924.

Strikers Institute Counter Suit Against Government Agents

It is estimated that over 1,900
miles of new road is under construc-
tion in North Carolina at this time.
It will cost approximately \$34,000-
000, and who says it won't be worth
every cent of it. There is nothing
that increases the value of living more
than good roads, and the public will
have no cause to regret the enormous
sum of money to be expended in the
extensive program planned in this
state. Improved roads have been of
invaluable aid in development of
other thriving communities and there
is no reason on earth why they
should not prove so in North Caro-
lina.

Freedom of speech and freedom of
the press will not be interfered with
by the injunction issued recently by
the government as a means of pre-
venting the strikers from overstep-
ping the bounds of public rights.
With such provisions, it is difficult
to understand where Samuel Gompers,
labor leader, has any just cause
for calling the injunction a violation
of the national constitution. He
should know from experience that
it is necessary for the government to
take such action as advisable to pro-
tect public rights of the working-
man, whether he be a member of the
union or not, and it is futile for him
to take up the time of the public in
expressing such an opinion. No one
will deny the striking railroad shop-
men the right of upholding that which
they consider their prerogatives. No
one has attempted to do so and it is
hardly likely anything so drastic
would be contemplated. The govern-
ment has seen the necessity of
fully protecting American industry,
and in enjoining the strikers not to
interfere with operation of the vari-
ous railway systems it has done some-
thing everyone will approve. It is to
be hoped the action will be consid-
ered in the right light and that the
shopmen will get busy, settle their
differences, return to work and help
America return to normalcy.

Everyone will regret to learn of
the massacre of christians in Greece
by the Turkish army, as it is addi-
tional evidence that barbarism and
absolute ignorance still prevail in
foreign countries. The Turkish peo-
ple are probably the most ruthless
of modern times. They have done
more to terrorize neighboring coun-
tries than all other enemies com-
bined and unless the allies take some
action to protect the defenseless men,
women and children of other coun-
tries their outrages may still be con-
tinued. The massacre of people these
days because of national jealousies
and religious faith is something that
cannot be tolerated by more enlight-
ened nations, and the sooner Turkey
is brought to her senses the better
off humanity will be.

Everybody is glad to recall that
Pitt county will be in the front rank
in hard road construction within the
next few months, as improvement
along this line is something in which
everyone is more or less interested.
The entire state will expend approx-
imately thirty-four million dollars for
hard roads if the proposed system is
completed, but we will have some-
thing everyone will be bound to be
proud of. Road development has
played an important part in the pro-
gress of other states, and it will cer-
tainly prove nothing less to a state
filled with such progressive people
as North Carolina. Pitt county for-
tunately grasped the opportunity for
road construction offered by the gov-
ernment a few years ago, and today
we are realizing in a small way the
wisdom of such action. A million
dollars is lots of money, to be sure,
but who in Pitt county regrets this
amount which be spent for improve-
ments of the kind in the next several
years. The entire amount is not
available at this time, but we have a
sufficient sum to keep construction
work moving at a lively clip, and
that's about all any good citizen
could ask for.

IS THE GOVERNMENT POWER- LESS.

It is claimed now that members of
the Republican party are unable to
prevent gouging of the public by coal
brokers. In fact, the Interstate Com-
merce commission and the National
Fuel administration have confessed
their inability to furnish a remedy to
control the sweep of profiteering even
after sufficient evidence has been
presented them that such condition
prevails.

This is certainly an unusual plight
for a government to be in, and de-
serves more serious consideration on
the part of those who have the power
and influence of protesting against
the highway robbery, for it can be
termed nothing less.

Miners and coal brokers, it seems,
have formed a secret combine for
the distribution of coal while the
strike is in progress, and essential
industries cannot purchase large
quantities of fuel unless they pay the
price demanded. When they are re-
fused and demand an explanation
various excuses are offered, but when
they finally decide to pay a price that
is exorbitant beyond question, the
coal and the cars to ship it in are
available immediately.

If the government is unable to cope
with the situation, then we don't
know where to carry our trouble. It
is shameful indeed to permit such
high handed robbery and profiteering
to continue without the promoters be-
ing punished, or frightened so badly
they will at least let up awhile. But
when two of the most powerful
agencies confess their inability to im-
prove conditions it looks like things
will go from bad to worse.

This is another instance of some-
thing lacking in administration effi-
ciency and one that will not be soon
forgotten.

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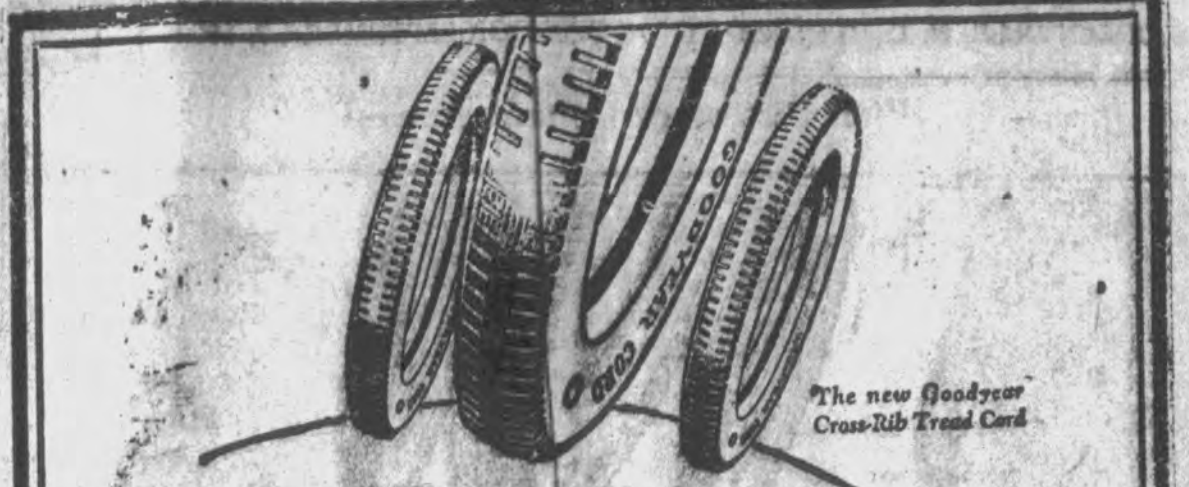

PRINCIPALS IN KILLING



(By International News.) Jack Bergen, handsome "daredevil" motion picture actor, stumbled out of the home of George Cline, motion picture director, at No. 190 Undercliff avenue, Edgewater, N. J., shortly after 9 o'clock on the night of August 25, mortally wounded, with a bullet hole through his chest. He died shortly afterward, but not before he had scribbled on a bloody piece of paper the words, "George Cline killed me." Cline when arrested told a dramatic story of how he had befriended Bergen for several years until word came to him recently that the young actor had become over-intimate with Mrs. Cline. Summoned to the Cline home, according to the director's story, Bergen admitted his misconduct with Mrs. Cline while the three were at Saranac Lake, "on location" for a motion picture. Cline said he then challenged Bergen to go upstairs in the Cline home, where the two were to fight a revolver duel in the dark. He declared that Bergen attacked him while they were going up the stairs and the fatal shot which killed Bergen was fired. Several days after Cline's arrest detectives uncovered a clue revealing that a "mysterious blonde" was in the Cline home on the night of the killing. It developed that she was Miss Alice Thornton, bank employee and sweetheart of Bergen. She had revealed to Cline, she admitted, Bergen's alleged intimacy with the former's wife which Mrs. Cline confessed to also. Mrs. Jack Bergen, the deserted wife of Bergen, when informed of her husband's slaying was undisturbed. She observed that he had "died as he lived," and indicated no sign of grief. Mrs. Bergen said that she and their four-year-old daughter had not seen Bergen for four years. Mrs. Cline's brother, Charles Scullion, now in Hackensack Jail with Cline, is said to have been in the Cline home on the night of the tragedy and, according to the testimony given to Prosecuting Attorney Archibald Hart, went upstairs and procured the revolver given to Bergen, with which he was to battle in the dark with Cline. Miss Margaret Walz, of Philadelphia, sister of Cline (whose real name is Walz), has rallied to the moving picture director's defense. She attributes the tragedy to the "recklessness of youth."

Both the wife and sweetheart of Bergen have publicly declared their belief that "Bergen got what he deserved."

Famine-Haunted Schooner Has Arrived



The captain and crew of the four-masted schooner William H. Smith, which reached San Francisco after a voyage of 143 days from Faisi, Solomon Islands, suffered for a long period because of the lack of food. They gave much credit to the skipper's wife, Mrs. Nels Peter Jansen, who cheered them in their distress. The schooner left Sydney February 7, and eleven days later a bouncing baby boy was born to Mrs. Jansen. It was discovered too late that the greater part of the food put aboard at Sydney was unfit to eat. The cook became ill, and Mrs. Jansen took his place. There were three other little Jansens beside the baby to look after. The crew was finally reduced to a ration of one pound of food a day. On August 14 the motorship Annie Johnson was sighted, and she furnished provisions. Mrs. Jansen has sailed all over the world for the last fifteen years, but will never go again, preferring to live in the home her husband has bought for her in San Francisco.

SAVANNAH MAY QUIT OLD 'SIESTA' HABIT

Modern Industrialism Imperils Century-Old Practice of 2-Hour Lunch Time

Savannah, Ga., Sept.—To "siesta" or not to "siesta"? That is the question—as Hamlet soliloquized—about something else. For this is no gloomy meditation. It is a live question to Savannah,

whether it shall shake off the customs of two hundred years of closing down tight every afternoon from two to four while all citizens indulged in slumber and lunch or scramble about for something to eat in a quick lunch room during a half hour period. Efforts to relegate the custom of mid-day siestas to the discard have failed in the past. Periodically the question is debated and as often the old custom is clung to. Now comes Mayor Stewart with the assertion that the old practice is "obsolete," and calling on the heads of civic clubs and banks to join with him in inaugurating a half-hour lunch period with a subsequent earlier knocking off in the afternoon. The Board of Trade directors have endorsed the Mayor's proposal. Others have not acted on it.

LADY ASTOR IS FOR RUM CURB IN GREAT BRITAIN

Would Not Emulate 'Pussyfoot,'
but Wants to Put Control
In Hands of People

COUNTRY NOT READY
TO DO AS PLANNED
BY LEADING WOMAN

Eugenics Won't Rid Nation of
Weak-Willied Citizens, She
Declared Recently

London, Sept. 7.—Lady Astor is
not after the laurels of "Pussyfoot,"
Johnson.

Plymouth's titled M. P. denies that
she is seeking prohibition for England,
despite the fact that she has intro-
duced a Liquor Bill in the House of
Commons which would restrict the
sale of liquors.

"I am not advocating a prohibition
act for England," Lady Astor stated.
"Public opinion in this country is not
prepared for this. On the other hand
it is surely a counsel of despair to
sit with folded hands and wait for
weak-willed citizens to be eliminated
by a process of eugenics. As an in-
dustrial trade we simply cannot afford
either the inefficiency, loss of time or
stockness caused by drink or the high
taxation (and so increased cost of
production) due to our having to spend
so much on the victims of alcohol in
prisons, police courts, infirmaries,
hospitals, workhouses and asylums."

Lady Astor explains that her liquor
control bill is merely by a measure
to give the control of Britain's liquor
traffic into the hands of the people.
The bill provides that the degree of
control of the liquor traffic shall be
determined by popular vote. Under
such conditions Lady Astor is con-
fident that the British people will even-
tually restrict the sale of intoxicants
to such a degree that entire prohibi-
tion will be unnecessary, or at least
that it will be made difficult for those
who abuse the privilege of alcoholic
stimulants.

Lady Astor is not alone in her ef-
forts to restrict the liquor trade of
England, for her bill is but one of five
which were introduced before Par-
liament rose for its summer vacation.
In the proposed bills the question of
local option is brought to the front,
and there is but little doubt that with-
in the next few years English voters
will be given an opportunity of ex-
pressing their wishes with regard to
the liquor trade.

Race Horse Doping In Paris to be Probed; Americans Blamed

Paris, Sept. 7.—The biggest doping
scandal since pre-war days, involving,
according to report, several American
trainers, is the sensation of that
large part of Paris known as the rac-
ing world. Stewards of the racing

club have the cases under advisement
and it is expected that several train-
ers will be barred for life from French
racing stables.

Frequently, throughout the season,
dark horses have come in as winners,
upsetting all predictions and all dope
based on records. The saliva of some
of the horses which had been acting
peculiarly was examined by a veteri-
narian, Dr. Kauffmann.

L'Eclair pointedly stated that these
examinations were directed especially
at several American trainers. Accord-
ing to the sporting editor of this pa-
per doping is an American custom
and, despite their energetic denials,
if doping has been introduced into
France the Americans are responsible
for it.

Live Peacefully If You Would Live Long

Kansas City, Sept.—If you want to
live long, live peacefully.

This is the recipe for longevity,
according to David C. Barnard, 102
years old, who has been visiting here.
"Get religion and it'll make you so
happy you'll just live easy," the cen-
tenarian explained.

Another contributing factor toward
a long life, Barnard declared, is con-
sistent exercise. Barnard, a Civil
War veteran, lives with one of his
nine children at Jericho Springs, Mo.

Lord Curzon Snoozes As Reception Awaits

Orleans, France, Sept.—Lord Cur-
zon, British Foreign Minister, arrived
here to consult a specialist recom-
mended by the King of Spain.

He was awaited at the station by a
reception committee, acquaintances
and newspaper men.
