ALDERMEN DECIDE TO MAKE NO CHANGES IN CITY TAX RATE FOR THE YEAR OF 1922; KIWANIS PROPOSE CITY PLAYGROUNDS

Several Matters of Importance
Considered at Regular Meeting
Last Night

**GENERAL TAX RATE
IS FIXED AT \$1 PER
\$100 DURING 1922**

**Kiwanis Club Receives Favorable
Action in Proposal to
Build Playgrounds**

There will be no reduction in the city tax rate during the year of 1922.

This decision was reached at the regular session of the board of aldermen last night at which time several other matters of importance were considered at length. The tax rate will remain the same, and citizens will continue to pay \$1 per \$100 for general town purposes, 50c per \$100 for school purposes and \$4.50 for poll tax, \$1.50 of which will be devoted to school purposes. The poll tax out of the city limits will be the same as the city school tax.

Another outstanding feature of the session was the petition presented by J. B. James, president of the Greenville Kiwanis club, in which it was proposed that the city cooperate in converting the ravine adjacent to the high school into a city play ground. The board was asked to: culvert and grade the ditch at Fourth and Fifth streets, after which the Kiwanians would equip the place for a modern and up-to-date playground.

The matter was referred to Aldermen Hearne, Hassell and Sellers, who will work in connection with the committee from the club relative to getting a lease on adjacent property to the ravine, which will be necessary to make the playground of sufficient size. The proposition was received with general favor on all sides and it was evident the two committees would be able to conclude their work under favorable conditions.

Dr. Spence and C. T. Munford again asked the board to fix the ravine on East Third street. They were informed by the chairman of the street committee that he was working on the project at this time and would be able to make considerable progress in the improvement as soon as teams become available.

Alderman Fred Forbes, who was recently appointed to investigate the extension of sewer and water lines of the city, stated he was not prepared to present a definite estimate on the project, but that the sewer extensions would cost approximately \$10,000 or \$12,000 and the water mains about \$40,000. The committee was requested to finish the investigation and report fully to the board at the next session.

The question of connecting the end of Fifth street with the hard surfaced Falkland road was considered, but no definite action was taken at the time owing to the financial situation. It was stated, however, that the proposition would be left under consideration and that favorable action would be taken as soon as this becomes possible.

Mayor Clark was instructed to draft an ordinance prohibiting the driving of haltered horses or mules on streets of the city for exhibition purposes. It was stated that such was an obstruction to traffic and a danger to citizens attempting to cross the streets.

TEACHERS ARRIVE FOR OPENING OF PUBLIC SCHOOLS

**Enrollment Began Wednesday
and Continued Throughout
Today**

The Greenville schools began their enrollment on Wednesday of this week and continued throughout today. The member of the high school and the first grade pupils and all new pupils have enrolled so far, and then enrollment is in excess of that last year by a goodly number.

The teachers of the schools will all arrive by Saturday morning. The first teachers meeting will be held at the high school building on Saturday morning at 11 o'clock. A number of the teachers have already arrived. Mr. Sachse, principal of the high school last year, arrived in town today and will be here for a couple of weeks. He has been studying at Columbia University this summer, and will go back for the winter session. He is here spending his vacation.

Supt. Rose wishes to call the attention of the parents to the fact that no child can be taken in school this year whose sixth birthday does not come before Jan. 1, 1923. A shortage of room prevents the taking of any others.

The Fleming school district will run their own school this year, but even with these children out the buildings will be well filled.

Superintendent Turnage Outlined Interesting Program for the Year

Ayden, Sept. 8.—The Ayden graded schools opened Tuesday morning, there being many of the patrons of the schools present in the auditorium at nine o'clock, the opening song being "America." The devotional exercise, consisting of Scripture reading and prayer, were conducted by Rev. J. M. Wright.

Superintendent J. E. Sawyer expressed his appreciation of having so many mothers present and stated that he would like to have had more of the fathers of the children present on the opening; that last year during the entire term not a single father visited his grade and only two mothers. He urged that the parents come to see the children at work.

The following members of the school board were present: J. R. Turnage, chairman; C. V. Cannon, W. M. McKinney, Mrs. J. H. S. Hodges and Mrs. Helen Turnage. Chairman Turnage was asked by the superintendent to make any remarks he might wish to. Mr. Turnage explained the change from a nine months school term to eight months, this being necessitated on account of funds available. He stated that the cost of operating the schools last year was about \$25,000, that this year's school term will be around \$20,000. He urged the citizens to work hard and get into eight months the required amount of work for nine months school. Also asked the co-operation and courtesy of the citizens of the town to the entire faculty, the local teachers as well as the out-of-town instructors, stating that people had a tendency to criticize home teachers, but hoped that this would not be the case this year, urging that these be given the same consideration as teachers from other sections. There are several local teachers composing the faculty this year and the Chairman of the Board urged that loyalty be given to them in their work.

CABTREE SLAYER ALLOWED NO BAIL IN FIRST HEARING

**Charles Klutz Bound Over to
Superior Court at Raleigh for
Murder of Detective**

Raleigh, Sept. 7.—Charles M. (Boots) Klutz, alleged to have fired the shots that ended the life of Tom Crabtree on August 31, was yesterday morning bound over to the Superior court without privilege of bail from the city court, after Judge Harris found probable cause in his case. The defendant was charged with "wilfully and feloniously" murdering Tom Crabtree by shooting him and by running over him with an automobile. Klutz' lawyers entered a plea of "not guilty."

A large crowd packed the city court room to hear the first guns of the legal battle that will be fought to save the youthful slayer from the chair. His hearing followed several long drawn out trials and the crowd waited restlessly for his appearance.

About 12:30 under a guard of policemen the defendant was escorted into the court-room. He came on crutches without a coat, collar or tie and took a seat behind his attorneys at the lawyer's table. During the whole proceedings he sat in practically the same position with downcast eyes, and never uttered one word above a whisper. With a saddened expression on his face and with a great mop of tangled black hair falling over a high, broad forehead he looked like anything else than the perpetrator of coldblooded murders. Accompanying Klutz were Charles U. Harris and R. Lee Wright, his attorneys and C. B. Wright, his grandfather. Both the Wrights are from Salisbury. R. Lee Wright formerly represented Rowan county in the legislature.

MAYNARD CRASHES SENATE APPROVES TO HIS DEATH WHILE BILL TO CONTROL FLYING IN VERMONT PRICES OF COAL

**Two Others Meet Death When
Plane Falls Three Thousand
Feet in Vermont Town**

**"FLYING PARSON" WAS
GIVING AN EXHIBITION
FLIGHT AT THE FAIR**

**Attempted Tail Spin, But Machine
Failed to Act, and
Crashed to Earth**

Rutland, Vt., Sept. 7.—Lieutenant Belvin W. Maynard, known as "The Flying Parson," was killed while flying at the Rutland fair today.

Lieutenant Charles Wood, of Ticonderoga, N. Y., and Charles Mionette, of New York, a mechanic, also were killed. The plane fell from a height of three thousand feet.

The aviators went up for a trial spin before taking passengers for flights, as had been their custom during the week the fair had been in progress.

Lieutenant Maynard, the pilot, apparently misjudged his distance before attempting a tail spin. The machine refused to recover, and he then attempted to throw it into a nose dive. This also failed and the plane crashed to the field.

Lieutenant Maynard was alive when spectators reached the wreckage, but died before reaching a hospital. Lieutenants Wood and Mionette were instantly killed.

The plane had been in the air 20 minutes when the fatal plunge came. The three pilots had been making daily flights at the fair grounds as a "flying circus."

Lieut. Maynard, "the flying parson," became internationally known in 1919, when he won the transcontinental round trip between New York and San Francisco.

He always kept up his work as a parson, no matter how insistent the call of the air.

Two weeks ago Lieutenant Maynard soared up over the Hudson while L. Wilson Bertrand, another noted flyer, and Miss Helen Virginia Lent, and while in the air made them man and wife.

Enlisted as Private.
When the United States went to war with Germany, Maynard was a student in the Wake Forest Theological Seminary, a Baptist institution at Wake Forest, N. C. At commencement time in June he went into the army, enlisting as a private and soon was sent over seas.

In the aviation service he rapidly advanced and was commissioned a lieutenant. He showed such aptitude for the air that he was designated a reserve military aviator, a coveted distinction, and shortly afterwards was appointed chief test pilot at the big air base of the A. E. F. at Romorantin, France. There in that dangerous capacity, he flew hundreds of machines of every type.

**URGES GOVERNMENT
TO RESCUE FARMER
FROM SPECULATORS**

**EXPORT REVENUES
INCREASE TWENTY
MILLION RECENTLY**

**Federal Control of Distribution
is Also Provided in the Measure**

**SEVEN SENATORS
NOT IN FAVOR OF
STOPPING GOUGING**

**Bill Will Now Go to Conference
for Adjustment of Differences**

Washington, Sept. 7.—With only seven negative votes recorded, the Senate late today passed the first of the emergency coal bills, the House measure designed to check profiteering and control the distribution of coal. The vote was 40 to 7 and the measure as amended was sent to conference for adjustment of differences with the House.

Passage of the profiteering bill was followed immediately by consideration of the fact-finding commission measure but final action on it was deferred by a sudden and at times heated debate over provisions which would direct the commission to study the question of nationalization of lines along with other phases of the industry.

Before quitting for the day the commission bill was amended to direct the agency to make a separate and distinct investigation of the anthracite industry and to inquire into any "organized relationship" between miners and operators if they exist. The change was a direct result of the recent settlement of the anthracite tie-up and Senator Borah, sponsor of the bill in the Senate, had previously withdrawn it from consideration in order to await developments of the settlement negotiations.

The commission is ordered to make its report on the anthracite inquiry not later than July 7 next year. A report on the bituminous study is due, under the bill, in five months from date of passage.

An effort by Senator Shields, Democrat, Tennessee, to amend the bill so that representatives of both miners and operators would be specifically prohibited from membership on the commission was rejected, but only after Senator Borah had said he agreed with it, but desired "in the interest of harmony" not to inject that features onto the bill.

DR. BEN EDWARDS HOLDS REVIVAL AT FARMVILLE CHURCH

**Services Largely Attended

Dr. Ben M. Edwards, well known evangelist of the Christian church, who is conducting a revival at Farmville, was in the city today visiting friends.

Dr. Edwards stated that the Farmville revival started Wednesday night and that much interest had developed since that time. The building has been well filled at every service and indications for a successful meeting are very bright.

Associated with Dr. Edwards this year are Mr. and Mrs. Roy Jarman, who have charge of the song service. They have proven a great help at Farmville with their splendid singing and add much to the success of each service.

Dr. Edwards is well known in this section of the state, having conducted a series of services at Eighth Street Christian church in this city for the past two years, and it is expected a fairly large crowd will attend the Farmville meeting.

Bethel township people are to be congratulated upon the erection of a sufficient potato storage warehouse to preserve this year's crop. The completion of these buildings is the realization of a dream in which many progressive farmers have taken a part in past months, and no one can estimate the great good which they will derive from it. Potato storage warehouses are a necessity in every potato producing community. Other parts of the country have saved thousands of dollars annually as a result of the buildings and Pitt county will certainly be able to do the same. The loss which this county alone has sustained in past years through improper preservation of the crop is starting in every sense of the word. It is so large that the warehouses should pay for themselves in the course of a year or so. Bethel growers have taken a forward looking step and deserve to be commended for taking the initiative in this instance.

The Greenville tobacco market is still gaining prominence in other parts of the country, and before the season is brought to a close it is likely many important growers from a distance will be marketing their crops here. The last several days have seen many visitors here. They were not here simply for the purpose of looking over the market and comparing it with others, but to sell their tobacco for prices which they recognized superior to those received anywhere else. It is said that several of these men expressed great satisfaction after making sales. They found warehousemen perfectly willing to co-operate with them in every way possible, and this resulted in their receiving the advantage of every facility provided by the second largest bright leaf market in the world. If outsiders can say such splendid things about local conditions what should our own planters think of them. This is very easy to answer, as the question is being answered every day now by the crowded floors of all our warehouses. The prosperity of the farmer is receiving greater attention at this time than ever before, and the splendid treatment they have been receiving on the market here is the culmination of a desire of our tobaccoists to give their farmer friends the best to be had.

The new cotton crop will soon be ready for the market, and every grower at this time is watching the market eagerly, hoping against hope that prices will climb upward in time for him to receive something satisfactory. It may be his dreams of better prices will come true. Conditions at present seem favorable, and if nothing out of the ordinary occurs it is very likely prices will begin to climb upwards when selling begins. Cotton is one of the largest crops of the south. When it sells for a good price prosperity generally holds supreme sway and everyone is happy. The grower has seen starvation staring him in the face the last two or three seasons, and unless the situation is more favorable this season his load will increase to unbearable proportions. Pitt county is one of the great

otton producing counties, even though tobacco is the principal crop, and the way the staple sells will play an important part in the lives of our growers. Everyone will watch the market opening with more than general interest, and if things come out as expected it's a safe bet conditions will be more favorable than in many seasons.

IMMEDIATE ACTION NEEDED.

It is to be hoped the county commissioners at their next meeting will devise some means by which the speeding craze on the hard surfaced roads may be checked. The situation is becoming so serious that something must be done, and it is up to the commissioners to consider the issue and find out what is most advisable.

The loss of life is small at this time compared to what it will be in the future unless something is done to improve conditions. Everyone must realize that speeding cannot continue indefinitely without damage to life and property and it must be discouraged before things become more accentuated.

Traffic officers could be placed on the roads at small expense to the county. In fact sufficient arrests would be made to pay expenses of the cops and the county certainly would not lose anything. If this arrangement is not satisfactory each own connected together by the roads should provide the officers at their own expense.

The responsibility, we should think, rests more directly upon the county and it is to the commissioners the public is looking to for relief, and it is hoped no time will be lost in providing it.

THE DRAGNET TIGHTENING.

Pitt county officers are watching bootleggers and blockaders as vigilantly today as ever. Nearly every day some questionable place of business is raided with good results, and the dragnet of the law has been drawn so tightly around the traffic members that they are more vulpine in their movements today than ever before.

But it matters not how crafty and cunning they may become in their operations. The strong arm of the law has been far more sharp and experienced than the average blockader, and whatever may be done their raids will continue just as long, as the bootleggers insist upon being parasites to society.

While conditions are as serious as several months ago, it cannot be said the traffic is conducted as boldly and openly as customary. The hundreds of captures made in past months have served to stimulate violators of the law to greater activity, but not that kind where they are eternally threatened with arrest and sentence to jail. Many are quitting the game and returning to the status of law abiding citizens and it is in the new capacity that we mingle with them on the streets and in society, unaware of their previous vocation. Whiskey has brought sorrow and suffering to thousands of homes in this country. But today, thanks to prohibition, things are changing and these homes that were saddened have blossomed forth into some of the most cherry and happy of the land.

RECEIPT AT CO-OP WAREHOUSE IN GREENVILLE INCREASING ADVANCE AVERAGE THURSDAY WAS \$11.34

Thursday's receipts were the largest so far of any day since Gorman's warehouse started to receiving. At six o'clock a. m. we had only one wagon, but by nine o'clock the drive way was crowded. The planters had the privilege of designating the stations at which they wanted to deliver. The merchants, bankers and business men of the smaller towns got out and used their influence with the planter to induce him to deliver at their town, and this has turned many away from Greenville who have heretofore sold here and is causing the smaller towns' stations to receive more tobacco than Greenville station.

I never saw a better pleased lot of farmers than we are having. On our Thursday's market our average advance was (\$11.34) eleven and thirty-four dollars per hundred pounds.

On several divided lands, half of the load going to auction the other being left with us, the most the auction got above our advance was double and one of our advances was more than the tenant received for his lot at auction. Thursday we had a Mr. Jones come in and sign a contract, then bring a load which he had taken to auction. His advance and the loan, of like amount made him by his bank, gave him \$26.00 more than the load was taken in at and it was a small load at that. You see from these that our advance is more than a third of the auction prices, although what we advance is about a third of the "bankers valuation." With the variation of prices as they do on the auction floors no one can figure what is a hundred dollars worth of tobacco, hence can not figure a percent of value from the auction floor.

**WOMEN TO RULE
LABOR PARTY IN
GREAT BRITAIN**

Leaders Smilingly Tolerant of Lady Astor's Belief They Won't Support Women

London, Sept. 8.—When I arrived at the headquarters of the British Party to ask party leaders what they think of Lady Astor's statement that the Labor Party "will be the last to elect women to Parliament," my question was received with somewhat kindly smiles of amusement.

"No one really takes Lady Astor seriously," remarked one leader, "and such a statement is ridiculous. Lady Astor must have forgotten that the Labor Party was the only party that pledged itself to woman suffrage and carried on a campaign for it."

Perhaps I should not have asked them if men will regard Labor's women representatives in Parliament any more seriously than they do Lady Astor. There was some little embarrassment on the part of everyone but very stanchly one or two of them declared that the whole attitude of men will change.

However, I found when I went to see Miss A. Susan Lawrence, one of the seven women whom the Labor Party has endorsed for Parliament, a far more convincing advocate for the cause of women in the Labor Party.

"Why do I belong to the Labor Party?" she repeated. "Well, first of all, because it is the only political party that offers perfect equality to men and women—perfect equality tempered with special privileges for women." Her gray eyes sparkled when she said this, and she brushed back a few strands of her soft gray hair as she stepped back, with just a suggestion of preparing for a fight that she hoped would come to her.

"What special privileges?" I asked.

"The privilege of having every member of the executive body of the party a woman. Men never had that privilege, and they never will have it. The constitution of the party requires that there be at least four women members on the executive council. We can have as many more as we elect. But the men have no clause for even a minimum number of men." Miss Lawrence smiled broadly as she triumphantly gazed back at me.

"And do you think that women will elect only women?" I asked her. "If they are better representatives they will—not otherwise."
