

SAYS DAUGHERTY SHOULD BE FIRED BY GOVERNMENT

Keller Brings Impeachment Charges Against Attorney General Daugherty

SAYS HIS PART IN INJUNCTION ISSUE JUSTIFIES FIRING

Seven Specific Charges Presented by Senator Against Attorney

Washington, Sept. 11.—Impeachment charges against Attorney-General Daugherty, growing out of his petition for an injunction in the cases of striking railway employees, were presented to the House today by Representative Keller, of Minnesota, an independent Republican. After a brief flurry they were referred to the judiciary committee, with members, Republicans and Democrats, alike predicting they would never be heard from again.

Seven specific charges were set forth in the Keller complaint, embracing alleged attempts to abridge freedom of speech, the freedom of the press and the right of the people peaceably to assemble. The Attorney-General was accused of threatening citizens who had opposed his attempts to "override the constitution," he was charged with using funds of his office "illegally and without warrant" for the prosecution of individuals and corporations "for certain lawful acts," with failure to prosecute violation of the law "after those violations have become public scandal." The concluding counts charged that the Attorney-General had defied the ends of justice by recommending the release from prison of wealthy offenders against the Sherman anti-trust act, and with failure to prosecute persons legally indicted for crimes against the people.

LARGE ENROLLMENT OUT DOOR SWIMMING FEATURES OPENING POOL IS DISCUSSED BY ROTARIANS HERE

There Were 1,035 White Children Enrolled at Opening Yesterday Morning

COLORED SCHOOLS HAVE ENROLLMENT OF 365 CHILDREN

Teaching Force is Stronger This Year and Every Teacher is at Her Post

The Greenville City schools began work yesterday morning with an enrollment of 1,035 white children and 365 colored. The 1,035 white children are distributed as follows: High school 255, Model school 190, Evans Street school 540, Cotton Mill school 40.

This enrollment is about equal to the enrollment of opening day last year. The fact that the enrollment is not larger than the enrollment last year is accounted for by the fact that the Fleming school is not open this year.

The net increase enrollment of the children of the town of Greenville this year was around 50. Practically all the rooms have more than 30 children in them, some of them have as many as 40.

The strike delayed the arrival of some of the teachers, but all are now in their places. Due to the fact that the task of enrolling and registering was done last week, all the work moved off very smoothly. The children were not kept very long in the elementary grades yesterday, but today a full day's work is being carried out in all the departments.

The teaching force of the Greenville schools is stronger this year, perhaps, than any time in the past. Every teacher is a teacher of experience and fully qualified to handle the work entrusted to her.

The Yvies House is in operation in the care of Mrs. Casey again, and everything is moving along nicely there. It should be remembered by the parents of the school that it is impossible to take children whose birthday does not come before Jan. 1st, 1923. This requirement is necessary because of a state law, and also because of the lack of room. If conditions justify it, and a teacher can be secured the school will begin another first grade after Christmas. Superintendent Rose's office this year is in the high school building. His phone number is 67.

GREENVILLE ROTARY WANTS OUR CITIZENS TO READ THIS

Out of years of experience as a penitentiary warden, a prominent Rotarian wrote us specially for this educational campaign: "One of the most fruitful sources of crime is illiteracy." Any penitentiary will reveal that not more than fifty per cent of the inmates finished grammar school; less than two per cent enter high school, and less than a fraction of one per cent remain and graduate; practically none go to college. These facts are significant.

"Crime is the result, in part, of lack of balance. Education gives balance. How evident it becomes that society is obligated to leave nothing undone to foster the education of boys.

"To guide a boy INTO channels of education is to guide him out of paths that lead downward.

"No boy can face life without an education unless he faces it like a 100 yard dash man would face a test with a 10 yard handicap. Without education the boy finds himself wondering what has happened that other boys are selected and he is overlooked, and he more readily turns to those that result in delinquency.

"Society—and that means everybody—has an obligation to the boy that it ignores at its peril. The delinquent in society; the one who hates fiercely and blindly, and the one whose hand is often against every other man is generally the uneducated. Let us educate the boys and make safe their future."

CO-OPS WILL BRING SUITS AGAINST ALL CONTRACT DODGER

Four Suits to be Instituted Against Growers in Eastern North Carolina

DIRECTORS HIGHLY PLEASED WITH FINE PROGRESS REPORTED

Contract Breakers to be Dealt With to Protect Thousands of Co-Op Members

The tobacco growers' Co-operative association will immediately bring suit against contract breakers in eastern North Carolina and in South Carolina, according to announcement of association officials following a conference in Richmond, Va., today with Aaron Sapir, attorney for the association.

Four suits will be instituted in eastern North Carolina and two in South Carolina, according to Mr. Sapir who said a few men cannot block the 80 thousand organized tobacco growers of the Carolinas and Virginia who have behind them the national laws, state laws and overwhelming public opinion.

Although but few instances of contract breaking have occurred in the two Carolinas where the association has begun receiving tobacco the Co-operative will go to the mat with growers who break their contract and with unscrupulous persons who endeavor to induce them to do so.

The directors at today's meeting in Richmond expressed themselves as highly pleased with the working of the association, particularly the large deliveries in the eastern and South Carolina belts and the satisfactory price received from large sales made to leading leaf dealers and manufacturers.

A conference of the big tobacco co-operatives will be held in Louisville early in October at the invitation of President James C. Stone, of the Burley Growers Co-operative association in which the tobacco Growers' Co-operative of Virginia and the Carolinas and the Wisconsin, Connecticut and Maryland organizations will probably take part.

The directors of the tri-state organization made it clear at today's meeting that there have been comparatively few breakers of contracts but that contract breakers will be promptly dealt with in order to protect the interests of the thousands of loyal members of the association in three states.

SUPERIOR COURT GETS GOOD START HERE FIRST DAY

About Thirty or Forty Cases Dismissed or Compromised Here Yesterday

ONLY TWO OR THREE ACTIONS ACTUALLY HEARD DURING DAY

Expected Calendar Will be Completely Cleared by End of the Week

The September term of Pitt county superior court, for the trial of civil cases, which convened in this city yesterday morning, got down to business in real earnest shortly after ten-thirty o'clock and when the day's work was completed the calendar had been cleared of some thirty or forty cases. Compromises and non-suits played an important part in the day's hearing, and only two or three cases were actually given hearing.

Failure of plaintiffs to appear to prosecute their cases was the principal reason so many were dismissed and so many non-suits ordered. Many of the actions had been hanging for several weeks, and even months, but when they were called as they appeared on the calendar and the plaintiffs failed to make their appearance Judge Calvert ordered them dismissed. With a continuance of such rapid work it is very probable the calendar will be almost completely cleared when the session is brought to an end Friday evening.

CONTINUES ORDER FOR GOVERNMENT AGAINST STRIKERS

Federal Judge Wilkerson Orders Continuance of Injunction After Hearing

SHOPMEN'S COUNSEL PLAN TO SEEK SLIGHT CHANGES SOON, SAID

Strikers Lose Initial Battle When Court Refuses to Dismiss Injunction

Chicago, Sept. 11.—The temporary restraining order granted the government September 1 against the striking railroad shop crafts and their leaders tonight was continued in effect for not to exceed ten days. The original order would have expired at midnight.

Federal Judge James H. Wilkerson ordered the continuance on the government's motion at the close of the first day's hearing on the petition of Attorney General Daugherty for a permanent injunction to replace it. The continuance, the court stipulated, will terminate on the decision in the injunction hearing.

As a result of the continuance, the injunction hearing will be halted tomorrow morning while attorneys for B. M. Jewell, president and John Scott, secretary-treasurer of the Federated shop crafts, argue for a modification of its penalties. Donald B. Richberg, representing the strike leaders, served notice on counsel for the government that he would move some modifications when court convenes tomorrow.

Jewell and Scott were the only two of the more than 240 strike leaders and 300,000 strikers affected by the restraining order represented in court by counsel today.

The court denied their motion that the government's petition be dismissed. "I am not prepared at this time to decide that the bill fails to set up any ground for relief," Judge Wilkerson said, and ordered Blackburn Esterline, assistant to the Solicitor General, to proceed with the presentation of the government's case.

In the argument over the continuance of the restraining order, however, the court pointed out the difference between the charges of "unlawful combination" and "lawful combination to do unlawful acts" and indicated that if the defense can show only the latter is charged in the bill, some modification of the present order might be made.

This is something the city has needed for years and if we don't get it now while it has gained so much publicity it may be years before the question will be revived. If you have the slightest interest in the development of our boys and girls, then use your influence in helping the Kiwanians realize this one great ambition.

Our commissioners shouldn't wait until the next monthly meeting to consider the proposal of placing traffic officers on the hard surfaced roads, as the matter is so urgent immediate action is necessary. Speeding continues today as it always has. There will be no decrease until the guilty ones find themselves threatened by the strong arm of the law. So it is very evident the only way to get results is to do as proposed. Traffic can be governed without any great outlay of money. Deferring it may cost out people their lives and hundreds of dollars in destruction of property even before the next meeting of the commissioners, and if anything is to be done it should be immediately. The public should bring sufficient pressure to bear upon the situation as in this way alone can the menace to life and property be eliminated.

There is every indication that fall business will be good, and the merchant with a long face and gloomy tale may brighten up as the worst is not yet to come. Business has been steadily improving in some parts of the country despite the strike and other disorders, and the fellow that faces his problems like a man will find things much easier than expected. If you have been dreading the future, Mr. Business Man, stiffen up, and go to it like you mean to get your share despite adversities. Determination to make the best out of a bad thing is the most logical way of getting through life anyway. Make the best of today. You won't live always and you'll likely be sorry the way you flinched at duty when you are dead.

LET THE INJUNCTION HOLD.

Samuel Gompers yesterday launched a bitter attack against Attorney General Daugherty in a speech before a convention of typographical unions at Atlantic City, as if he expected to create sentiment in favor of the striking railroad workers. Mr. Gompers should realize by now that continued abuse of the government officials will do him no good. He might talk and criticize until the crack of doom, but there would be no favorable response from any source except that he has represented so many years. The public doesn't care about the issues involved. It doesn't care what Mr. Gompers or Attorney General Daugherty say. But the majority of people do want to see the strike ended, and if Mr. Gompers can do anything to accomplish this end they are perfectly satisfied with what he does, provided he remains within the law.

The injunction may not appeal to the strikers as fair and right, but it was necessary and the attorney general did right in getting it issued. He could not be expected to do otherwise when public rights were imperilled and strikers were taking advantage of others who enjoy the same prerogatives of Americans as any body.

The trouble with the whole thing is that the injunction didn't come soon enough. Much disorder might have been avoided if it had come earlier, but since it didn't it is up to the law to carry out its provisions in every detail.

We regret Mr. Gompers can't look at the issue through eyes of an unbiased citizen instead of the great labor

leader he has proven himself to be. If he could do so conditions would certainly improve, as he would use his influence in protecting public rights instead of attempting to destroy them.

HOW WE LOSE OUR BILLIONS

An extra two billion dollars which American farmers would have gained through bumper crops will be lost as result of paralyzed transportation caused by the strike.

And yet the strikers claim they are fighting for a principle. The truth is, they are letting a bunch of figure-heads mislead them to such extent that they are willing to let their own families suffer to do as they believe right.

This is a great reflection upon the broad mindedness of the American laborer, if there are any particularly broad minded engaged in the present strike. It will take years to make up for what they have lost alone—not considering the economic loss, and the quicker they return to work the better off they will be.

We hate to see any set of men quite so obstinate as these men have proven themselves to be. It shows a lack of discretion that is surprising indeed and industry can't expect to progress as it should until some of these ideas have been abandoned. The total loss resulting from the strike is incalculable. But we all know it will reach astounding proportions and that's why we dread to see the figures in black and white.

It's a pity the enormity of the thing can't be lessened, but this is impossible and the only thing we can do is clinch our teeth and thank our stars we came out a live.

IS IT A TRIBUNAL WE NEED?

Abolition of the railway labor board is advocated by Representative Hoch, Democrat of Texas. In making this proposal he suggested the establishment of a disinterested tribunal to settle railway disputes. Whether the labor board is abolished or not, it is readily understood that no institution can function unless it is clothed with sufficient authority to act in case this becomes necessary.

The labor board has proven satisfactory so far as its power goes. But the trouble is its power doesn't extend far enough to settle disputes in which questions of more than usual delicacy are involved. This fact has been in evidence during the present

and there will be no change until the board is empowered with greater authority.

The proposed "disinterested" tribunal would be all right, but we don't see any reason for it being disinterested. It looks like it would be more directly beneficial if it were "interested." In fact, that's the trouble with other things. There is a lack of interest that prevents more direct results.

The public won't raise any howl if the labor board is succeeded by a tribunal, but for the sake of the country, let it be empowered with enough authority to act in any issue involved by a strike.

Everybody in Pitt county interested in poultry raising will be gratified to learn that the county poultry club is making preparations to have the best exhibits seen at the Pitt county fair in years. It is realized that poultry raising should be fostered more extensively in every community and it is for this reason the club intends to have such a fine showing. The raising of chickens and other kind of fowls has proven very profitable to those who have given it a trial, and there is no reason on earth why it shouldn't prove of equal value to others. There is also much pleasure in the growing of thoroughbred chickens, and those who convert their idle back yard into a chicken farm on a small scale is in a fair way preparing themselves to do away with idle moments for lucrative employment. Chickens aren't so much trouble if they are raised properly and only in very few instances to they fail to pay for themselves several times. They keep the home well supplied with good fresh eggs and the raiser oftentimes has some to sell. The Pitt county fair is the best place the club could have chosen to exhibit their fowls and it is hoped the public gives the exhibits the attention so surely deserved.

FINE ROLE FOR ALMA RUBENS

Popular Player is Featured in "Find the Woman"

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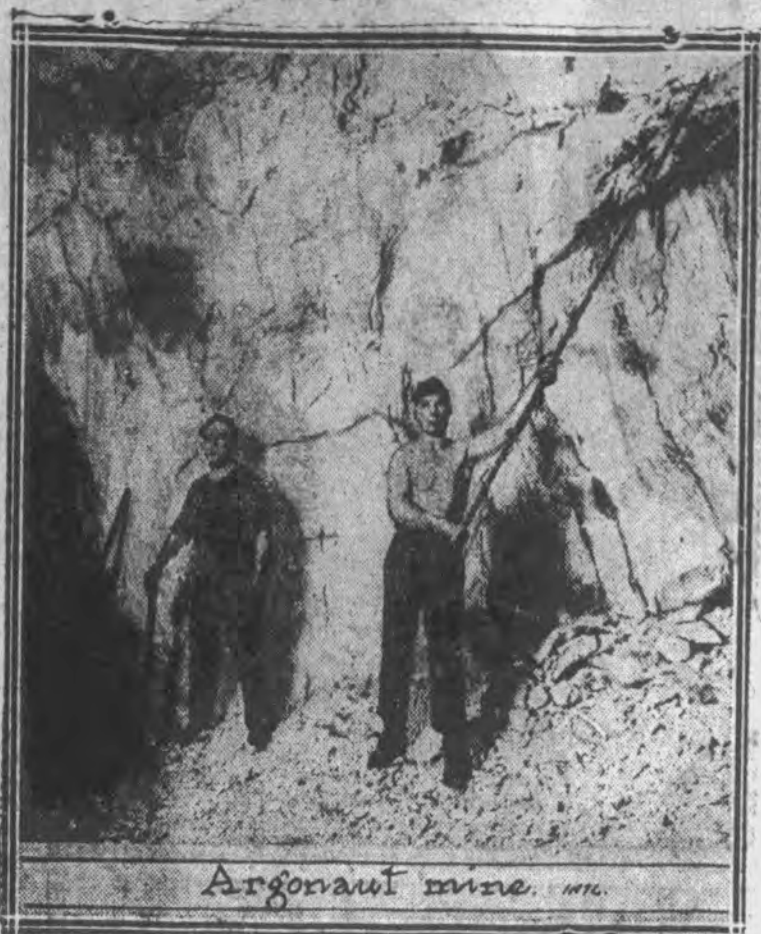

RADIO ABROAD IS FORGING AHEAD

(By International News.)
Washington, Sept. 12.—Reports to the Commerce Department from its agents abroad indicate that radio development is generally proceeding rapidly.
The Japanese government has mapped out a plan for linking up the various islands of the Empire by wireless telephone and telegraph, American Vice-Consul Correll, at Nagasaki, reported. The first step will be taken this month, Correll said, when telephone communication by radio will be opened across the Chosen Strait. The stations at Fukuoka and Fusan contain the necessary equipment, and it is expected that the shipping along the coasts of Kishu and Chosen will take advantage of this service, Correll stated.

No laws have yet been passed to govern wireless telephony in Argentina, according to Commercial Attache Feely, but a bill is being drafted for presentation to the next congress to regulate the use of radio sets. No regulations at the present time in effect prevent the sale of broadcasting and receiving sets, Feely reported. The latter, he said, are being sold to some extent locally but of very inferior quality, and sell at from 200 to 700 pesos.

The establishment of telephonic communication between England and the Netherlands, the department has been advised, is expected shortly as the result of the completion of an ocean telephone cable extending from Aldeboro, England, at Domburg, on the Dutch coast. From Domburg the trunk lines will form a connection through the Middleburg Exchange with the long-distance lines of Holland.

This cable, owned jointly by the two countries, was planned in the early part of 1914, but the outbreak of the war prevented its completion until the present time. Up to now there never has been any telephonic communication between England and Holland.

PRINCE OF WALES CHANGED BY TRIP

London, Sept. 12.—What has the India tour done to the Prince of Wales?
Has it destroyed his youth?
These are the questions that all London now asks. Everyone now sees the change in the Prince since his return from his adventurous tour, and the general inquiry is whether it was worth while, after all.

From a fresh-colored, smiling, eager boy the Prince has turned into a man of early middle age. All of the old light-heartedness seems to have deserted him, and wherever he appears, he looks weighed down by care.

And there is a curious, apprehensive watchful glance in his eye that none of his friends like. Talking to a friend, his glance is always roving the ground fifty yards ahead. It is not fear, but a kind of sub-conscious watchfulness. He seems like a man never released from an unending strain.

Rest—perhaps a happy marriage—may bring back the old ease and gaiety. But at present the young Prince looks like a man who has survived a terrible ordeal.

FRENCH DISAGREE
ON WHEAT OUTLOOK

(By International News.)
Paris, Sept. 10.—How much wheat will France import in 1922 is a live question this summer, difficult to answer and important in its bearing on exchange.
There are three schools of thought on the subject according to newspaper comment.
One is the optimistic school which believes that the French harvest will be so good, due to the wet summer, that little wheat will have to be imported.
Second is the pessimistic school that insists that last fall's drought still is being felt unfavorably this summer, and that it will be necessary to import at least 20,000,000 quintals.
The third type of commentator is the one who urges action to prevent further importation. He is the advocate of the promulgation by law of wheat substitutes, of which the most often recommended are rye and sorghum. Opponents of the theory point out that the pushing of any substitute for wheat will at once raise the price of the new grain far beyond its value and the people will have to pay white bread prices for brown bread.

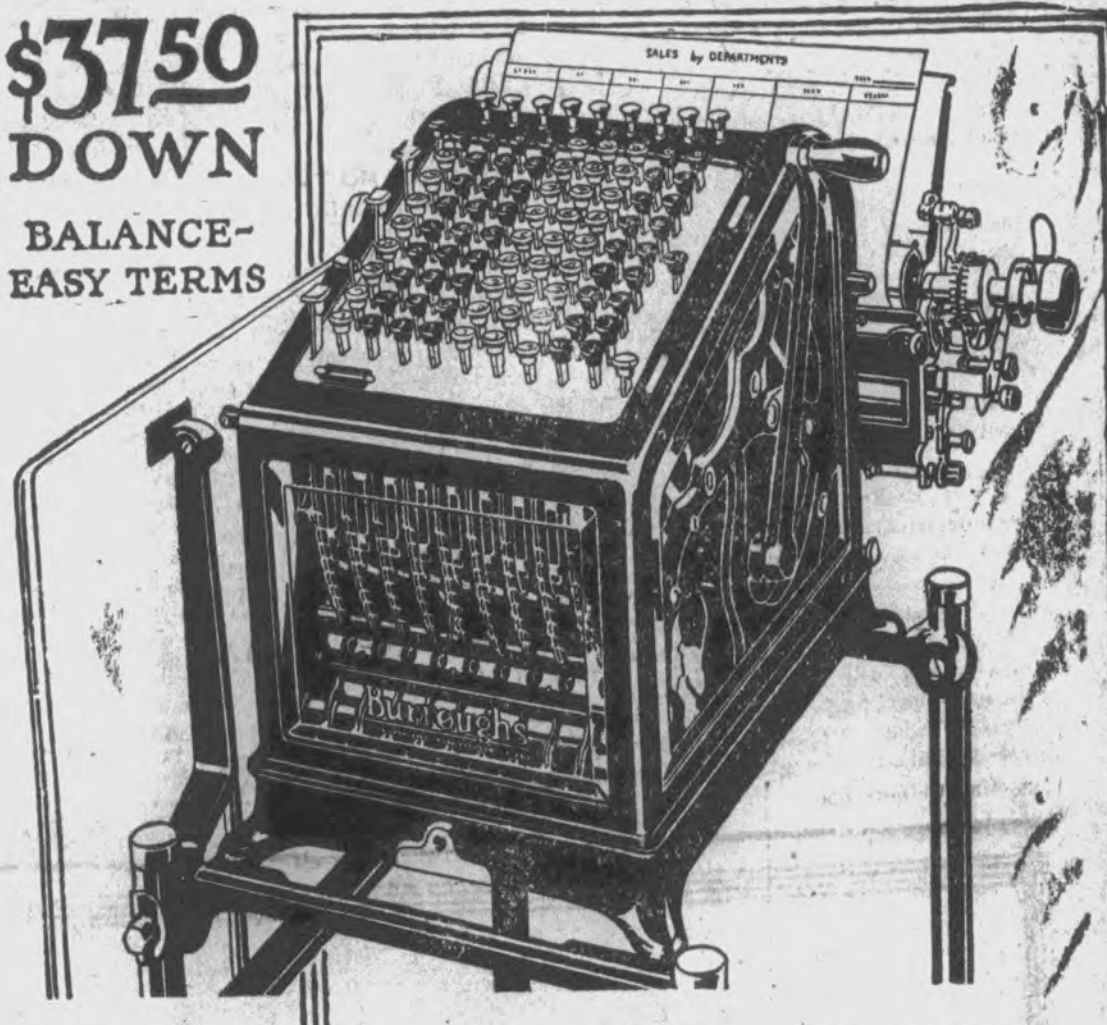

GREAT INDUSTRIAL BOOM IN ILLINOIS

Despite Strikes, Building is Going Forward Rapidly in Prairie State

(By International News.)

Springfield, Ill., Sept. 10.—Building operations all over the State of Illinois are booming, according to George B. Arnold, director of the State department of labor.

Arnold bases his statement on a statistical survey of building, employment and general business conditions in the Prairie State. From Chicago down to the small towns a renewal of work has been shown in the last two months, the director declared.

"There is plenty of work in Chicago, and workers are anxious to be employed there," Arnold said,

"Peoria so far this year has had as much building completed as was completed in 1921. Rockford reports activity in all lines.

"Even wage increases have been given at Decatur. At Bloomington, Moline, Rock Island and East Moline more men could be placed than are available."

At Aurora large mills have re-opened after a shut down.

The improvements leading to the industrial revival in the State came in the face of strikes and other obstructions, the director declared, but when settlement of such controversies arrives a record-breaking business era is expected.

"When industrial dissension is obliterated among the workers Illinois is bound to take the lead over industrial states in a prosperity that has never before been reached," the director forecast.

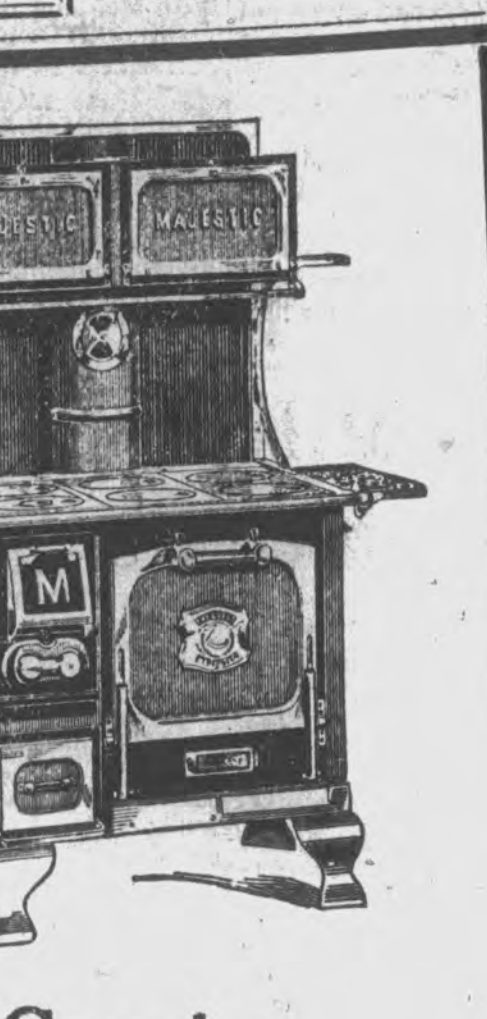
