FIFTY REFUGEES SAVED FROM DEATH BY STATE PEOPLE

New York and Memphis People
Also Among Those Escap-
ing from Doomed City.

Athens, Sept. 20.—Thrilling ex-
periences were related by American
refugees from Smyrna who have ar-
rived here. Among them were Mr.
and Mrs. W. H. Boyd, of New York,
and Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Archbald, of
Washington, N. C., and Mr. and Mrs.
Rogers of Memphis, Tenn. Mrs. Arch-
bald and Mrs. Boyd secured a launch
in the Smyrna harbor and saved 50
refugees by taking them to the
steamer, Winona. The former gave
refugees to 2000 Armenians and
Greeks just outside his home.

Washington, N. C., Sept. 20.—Mr.
and Mrs. J. E. Archbald, mentioned
in a dispatch today from Athens,
Greece, relating their experiences in
Smyrna, following the burning of
that city by the Turks, are believed
to be Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Archbald,
of this city, who have been living in
Smyrna for five or six years. Mr.
Archbald, who was born in Beaufort
county, went to Turkey to engage in
the tobacco business. Mr. Archbald's
sister, Mrs. Sam Carter lives in this
city. Nothing had been heard from
the Archbalds by relatives in the past
several weeks.

WOULD RESTRAIN ANY VIOLATION OF CO-OPS CONTRACT

Judge C. C. Lyon Issues Tem-
porary Injunction Against
Nash and Edgemore Farm-
ers

Raleigh, Sept. 20.—The Tobacco
Growers' Co-operative association
started legal action to protect the
contracts of 80,000 loyal members
yesterday when it obtained a restrain-
ing order against Z. A. Harrell, of
Edgemore county, and W. T. Jones,
of Nash county, to prevent these al-
leged contract-breakers from deliver-
ing any more of their tobacco out-
side of the association.

Judge C. C. Lyon, holding court
in Wake county, issued the restraining
order which was forwarded to
Nashville and served without delay
upon the defendants in this first case
of the tobacco co-operative. The or-
der is made returnable before Judge
Frank Daniels, holding court in
Nashville, Monday, October 9th.

Z. A. Harrell, of Macclesfield, who
signed up 25,000 pounds of tobacco
with the big co-operatives and W. T.
Jones, of Nashville, who signed up
over 10,000 pounds are alleged in the
complaint of the association to have
sold 5,000 pounds apiece outside of
the association in violation of the
contract. Both parties are alleged to
have stated they would not deliver
any of their tobacco to the associa-
tion, and papers will be forwarded
them notifying the defendants to ap-
pear before Judge Daniels at Nash-
ville, on Monday, October 9th, to
show cause why the injunction should
not be granted until the final hear-
ing of the case.

The summons filed in these first
suits of the tobacco co-operative call
for liquidated damages of five cents
a pound for all tobacco sold outside
of the association as provided in its
contract with all members, also for
attorneys' fees of \$350 in each case.

The association has instituted a
similar suit against F. W. Fairley, of
Kingstree, S. C., and has obtained
a restraining order to prevent fur-
ther deliveries of his tobacco accord-
ing to F. L. Wilcox, attorney for the as-
sociation in South Carolina.

EMERGENCY FUND ASKED FOR NEAR EAST REFUGEES

\$200,000 is Needed to Help
Distressed Americans in
Zone of Warfare

Washington, Sept. 20.—An em-
ergency appropriation of \$200,000
for relief of American refugees in
the Near East recommended to the
Senate today by President Harding
after receipt of an official estimate
from the State department that 1,000
Americans were in pressing need for
assistance.

"It is very apparent that we have
an obligation to afford relief," the
president said in his letter to Chair-
man Warren, of the Senate appro-
priations committee adding that the
need could not be met by the private
funds of the American relief organ-
ization.

Senate leaders plan to add the item
to the pending deficiency appropria-
tion bill. Quick action by the House
also was indicated, Representative
Mondall, the republican leader, notifi-
fying members that their continued
presence would be required in order
that the action might be had with-
out delay.

UNITED STATES WILL SEND REPRESENTATIVE TO ALLIED CONFERENCE

Washington, Sept. 21.—The United
States is holding aloof from politi-
cal squabbles which brought Europe
to the verge of war. The nation will
probably be represented at the Near
East conference by an unofficial ob-
server. The conference will be held
in Rome or Venice.

WAR IN NEAR EAST BETWEEN TURK AND BRITISH IMMINENT

British and Kemalists Feverish-
ly Mobilizing Armed Forces
at the Troubled Zones.

LEEDERS OF ALLIES OUTLINE PLANS FOR PEACE CONFERENCES

British Preparing to Deal Trem-
endous Blow by Land and
by sea.

Constantinople, Sept. 20.—The
British are mobilizing every available
warship, men, horses and cannon with
in reach of the troubled zone. They
are preparing to deal a tremendous
blow by land, sea and air if provoked
by the Kemalists army, which, ac-
cording to the latest reports, is con-
centrating feverishly aroused Ismid
and Chanak.

All the British barracks in Con-
stantinople have been evacuated and
troops are marching in the streets
of the capital, which is having a
sombering effect on the exuberant
Turks. The British soldiers are
headed for strategic points on the
strait.

Transports with British cavalry,
heavy artillery and supplies are ar-
riving at Saida-Pasha, on the Ismid
railway.

The men of the Constantinople
garrison are constructing entrench-
ments at Scayuer, on the Asiatic side
of the Bosphorus, which will be the
second side of defense, the first be-
ing at Yaryinja a small railway sta-
tion between Saida-Pasha and Ismid.

It is estimated the present total
British strength in Constantinople
and the Dardanelles, area is about
16,000 men, which, when reinforce-
ments now on the way arrive, will
be increased to nearly 75,000 effec-
tives.

These forces will be further
strengthened by large detachments
from the Atlantic and Mediterranean
fleets.

Mr. R. Y. McAden is temporarily
in Pitt county with headquarters in
County Agent Paces' office in the
court house at Greenville. Mr. Mc-
Aden is a representative of the as-
sociation and members and others
are asked to call and get first hand
information.

Until a receiving agent is appoint-
ed at Greenville members can deliver
their cotton to Mr. McAden, who will
make the shipment and arrange with
the member to get his advance of
\$50.00 a bale.

The banks of Pitt county as well
as elsewhere throughout the cotton
belt of the state will gladly cash
the members drafts for their first
advance, when the proper order notifi-
fying bill of lading is attached to the
draft.

MORRISON CALLS PEOPLE BACK TO OLD DEMOCRACY

Governor Opens State Cam-
paign With Plea for Return
to Woodrow Wilson Spirit.

Charlotte, Sept. 20.—Declaring that
the people should get back to the
democracy as represented by Wood-
row Wilson, and praising the record
of the present Democratic adminis-
tration in North Carolina, Governor
Cameron Morrison opened the Dem-
ocratic campaign in the State here to-
night.

Governor Morrison sounded no
alarms and threw into the hearts of
the assembled Democrats of Meck-
lenburg and surrounding counties no
fear of Republican victory. Broken-
hearted over the Harding adminis-
tration, he could conceive for them
no strength sufficient nor spirit mili-
tant enough to make any inroads
upon the majority party's lead in
North Carolina.

The Governor, speaking in fine
spirit before a throng that packed
the county court house, was frequently
applauded from the time he was
presented by Hamilton C. Jones,
chairman of the county committee,
until he sat down after an exhaus-
tive review of the things the State
has done and is doing.

"Never before in my day has there
been such slight interest in an ap-
proaching election, and yet I have
never known such general and intel-
ligent interest in governmental af-
fairs as the people are now taking,"
he declared. "The unprecedented
lack of interest in the approaching
election is not due to the lack of in-
terest by the people in good govern-
ment, but because there is almost
universal security felt that the su-
premaccy of the Democratic party in
the State was never before so secure,
or the danger of victory by the Re-
publican party less promising. I
cannot with sincerity sound any
alarm, because I believe the Republi-
cans are almost heartbroken with dis-
appointment over Harding's adminis-
tration, and I am pleased to think
they are intelligent enough to know
that a successful assault upon the
Democratic State administration is
impossible.

PREDICT PLENTY MONEY FOR AMERICAN FARMERS

Washington, Sept. 21.—Farmers
will be able to borrow plenty of
money at low interest with which
to finance their crops movements,
treasury department officials announ-
ced today. A sharp increase in farm
product is also expected.

National Convention at New
Orleans to be Discussed and
Plans for Trip Outlined

Members of the Pitt county post
of the American Legion will meet
at the Rotary building in this city
Tuesday night, Sept. 26th, at eight
o'clock, for the purpose of outlining
plans for the national convention of
the legion to be held in New Or-
leans October 16-20.

Every effort will be made to send
a large delegation from the Pitt
county post and this matter will be
discussed from every angle at the
meeting called for Tuesday night by
Dr. G. G. Dixon, commander of the
Pitt county post.

Requisition has been made on the
Pullman Company for a ten section
pullman sleeping car with sun par-
lor and observation platform, with
writing desk and stationary case in
the sun parlor. In addition to oc-
cupying the car to and from New
Orleans the Legionnaires will occupy
the car as a hotel while at the con-
vention, arrangements have been
completed for the Southern Railway
company to park cars at a convenient
location where shower baths with
cold and hot water, also telephone
booths, have been installed adja-
cent to the track on which the car
will be parked.

Cost of the trip per person, rail-
road and pullman fare to and from
New Orleans, including occupancy of
the car while there, also lights, drink-
ing water, sanitation and shower
baths will be \$63.16, lower berth,
one person to the berth; \$59.76, up-
per berth, one person to berth; \$56.
26 lower berth, two persons to a
berth. The only necessary expense
to be added to this will be for meals,
which will not be included.

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PRESIDENTIAL VETO OF BONUS MEASURE UPHELD BY SENATE

Final Hopes of Supporters Blat-
ed When Senate Fails to
Support House

ANOTHER BONUS BILL MAY COME OUT IN FUTURE

Advocates of the Measure De-
termined it Shall Not Die
With Veto

Washington, Sept. 20.—The ad-
vocate's bonus bill failed of enactment
late today, the Senate sustaining
President Harding's veto. Previous-
ly the House had overridden the
veto by a large margin.

The Senate roll call showed 44
yeas to 28 nays, or four less than the
necessary two-thirds majority to en-
act the measure without the Presi-
dent's approval. The vote in the
House was 258 to 54, or 50 more
than the required number.

Although it was reported that a
new bonus bill might be introduced
tomorrow, it was certain that the
bonus fight would be renewed until
next session of congress which will
begin on December 4th.

Most of the House vote to sustain
the president was cast by members
from eastern and southern states,
with western delegations voting al-
most solidly for the bill.

Announcement of the results of
the voting in the House was receiv-
ed in silence by both the number-
ship, and the fairly well filled gal-
leries. The same was true in the
Senate.

Within an hour after the House
acted, the bill and the president's
veto message were sent to the Senate.
Discussion of the subject there how-
ever, had been under way for some
time, with Senator Reed, (d.), Mis-
sour, supporting the measure, and
Senator Williams, (d.), Mississippi
opposing it.

While the Alabama senator was
talking, leaders agreed to have a
vote before night. The debate was
closed by Senator McCumber, who
warned that the bonus question could
not be settled finally until it had
been settled in accord with the judg-
ment of the great majority of con-
gress.

"While the power to destroy it to-
day may be in existence," he said,
"that power will continue in exist-
ence in my judgment in the next few
years. I am inclined to say that this
issue will live."

KANSAS CITY CUTS DOWN ON ACCIDENTS

Fewer Fatalities from Autos
Despite Increase in Popula-
tion

(By International News.)
Kansas City, Mo., Sept.—Although
Kansas City's population has increas-
ed perceptibly during the past year,
accidents have shown a decrease.

Figures issued by the Safety Coun-
cil of the city show a total of 113
accidents for the eight months end-
ing August 31, 1922, whereas 112
accidents were recorded for a similar
period in 1921. And motor traffic
here has increased 20 per cent in the
last year.

Vehicular accidents have been
scarcer the last eight months, there
being fifty-one as against fifty-four
for a corresponding period last year.
However, there were eleven collisions
in August this year and only three
in August 1921.

Principal streets of the city looked
 mighty bad last Sunday and every
 effort should be made to bring about
 an improvement by next Sabbath day.
 Our main streets should always present
 a creditable appearance on the
 day when our people go out to wor-
 ship the Lord. They give the visitors
 a better opinion of our citizenship
 and cause them to believe our auth-
 orities are making every effort to
 encourage cleanliness.

The public should do everything
 possible to support the Kiwanians in
 their effort to establish a playground
 in the ravine near the High school
 building. This is something the city
 has been in need of for years and
 the sooner it is established the bet-
 ter everyone will like it. Develop-
 ment of our children should be of
 interest to all parents. Physical im-
 provement is just as necessary as im-
 provement of the mind and there is
 nothing that brings about the later
 more than a public playground.

While America has intimated that
 she will not take part in the warfare
 around Smyrna, England evidently
 means to handle the situation as best
 she can despite refusal of France to
 take part. The Turks have been re-
 ceiving the support of France. That's
 one reason they have been able to
 battle so effectively against Greece
 where the most destructive warfare
 in history has been in progress the
 past several days. England will make
 an effort to put down the atrocities
 as soon as possible. Massacre of
 Christians and destruction of prop-
 erty valued at millions of dollars has
 become intolerable and the world will
 applaud Great Britain's effort to im-
 prove the situation.

That the boll weevil is going to
 be stubbornly combatted in Pitt
 county next season is very evident
 by preparations being made by our
 farmers in various parts of the coun-
 ty. The fact that the weevil has al-
 ready been discovered in a number
 of fields has caused number of grow-
 ers to awaken to the seriousness of
 the situation. By next year it is a
 safe bet that some definite plan has
 been decided upon and that very few
 growers will give away to the rav-
 ages of the pest without first putting
 up a fight of a most worthy charac-
 ter. That's the kind of stuff Pitt
 county planters are made of and it's
 safe to say all of them will in the
 forefront of the campaign.

The administration's bill to pre-
 vent profiteering in the coal indus-
 try during the coming winter months
 passed the house yesterday, and
 within the next several days it is prob-
 able machinery of the government
 will be in full swing. We will be
 glad to see things get started as
 gouging will assume greater propor-
 tions each day it is permitted to con-
 tinue without federal authorities tak-
 ing a hand in the issue. The Ameri-
 can people have seen too much goug-
 ing in past years, and if there is any
 possible chance of stopping it we
 hope it will be done and that imme-
 diately. Business can never be what
 it should in this country until viola-
 tors of the law are impressed with
 the government's desire to do away
 with them so as to protect the public.
 Coal is the best thing in the world
 upon which to profiteer. It comes
 from the ground a long distance from
 section in which much of it is con-
 sumed. It passes through several
 hands and each gets a rake off. These
 rake offs, however, have become so
 high they are intolerable and unless
 some action is taken the situation will
 be more serious than in years. The
 government is on the right track. No
 doubt about that. But what we want
 to see is prices in proportion to cost
 of production. If the government
 can't bring that about we don't know
 who to look to, that's all there is to
 it.

The Pitt county highway commis-
 sion might be able to do something

To decrease the amount of speeding
 in the hard surfaced roads of the
 county by conferring with the state
 commission. That something must
 be done has been very evident in past
 years. If it isn't done soon it may
 be too late after awhile, and that's
 exactly what we want to prevent.
 There are automobile owners in this
 county who have little respect for the
 law. Their respect, or at least what
 little they have, grows smaller with
 each succeeding day they are allow-
 ed to go unharmed or without the
 law interfering with them. If they
 aren't brought to account at an early
 date there's no telling what may hap-
 pen. The county commission may
 have its hands full in building roads,
 but it should get busy and use its in-
 fluence in getting the state board to
 station traffic officers at strategic
 positions. There are organizations
 in the county ready to help them and
 when the first move is made in this
 direction there will be plenty of as-
 sistance coming, there is no fear on
 that score.

It will be of interest to the travel-
 ing public to learn that numbers of
 trains are resuming service on vari-
 ous railroads of the country. The
 taking off of these trains resulted in
 greater disruption of transportation
 than the public at first comprehended.
 In fact, this state has suffered only
 in a slight way compared to other
 states. One of the main railway
 systems operating in North Carolina,
 the Atlantic Coast Line, has been
 operating about ninety-five percent
 normal throughout the entire strike.
 This fact is considered short of re-
 markable when it is remembered that
 other lines were operating hardly
 fifty or sixty per cent normal. The
 Coast Line has been able to keep its
 shop forces pretty near normal de-
 spite walkouts on other lines, and this
 enabled them to keep trains in reg-
 ular operation at all times. With
 the resumption of service of trains
 on other lines the transportation situ-
 ation will become much better and
 the public will not feel the effect of
 the strike as severely as in past weeks.
 Everyone will be glad to see train
 service normal again and the sooner
 the strikers come to terms the better
 we like it.

The white way system of Greenville
 has been attracting attention of late
 if a letter received from the Kinston
 chamber of commerce can be count-
 ed for anything. The Kinston or-
 ganization desires information re-
 garding the cost of construction and
 operation. It probably has been
 furnished by this time, and before
 the words get cold it is likely Kinston's
 system will be assured. There
 are some mighty progressive people
 in our neighboring town and when
 they set out to do a thing it's a safe
 bet they never stop until it is done.
 They have been able to accomplish
 some wonderful improvements thru
 this spirit of tenacity and if they de-
 sire a white way they will get it,
 and in double quick time. The
 Greenville system will show up
 to much better advantage after all the
 telephone polls have been removed
 on Evans street. Visitors will then
 be able to get a better idea of the
 size and beauty of the system. While
 a pretty good sum of money is in-
 volved, Greenville people have nothing
 to regret. They are pleased in
 every sense of the word and would
 go back to the old way of lighting
 for anything in the world other than
 a larger system than we have at the
 present.
