CONSTANTINE BOWS CAPTAIN COLEMAN TO WILL OF PUBLIC AND LEAVES THRONE

Crown Prince to Succeed De-throned Leader to the Head of Government

NATIONAL LEADERS MAKE NO COMMENT ON THE SITUATION

Understood Crown Prince Will Take Oath of Office Within Short Time

Athens, Sept. 27.—King Constantine, bowing to the will of the army and navy, has abdicated, and Crown Prince George, who married Princess Elizabeth, of Rumania, becomes King of Greece.

"Until the people say they want me no more, I shall hold my throne," the king declared. He accepts this swift revolution as the voice of the people.

The revolutionary army is marching on Athens and will reach the capital tonight. Three hundred army officers visited the King and urged the formation of a military cabinet. They were ready, they said, to put themselves at the head of the people to combat the revolutionists, maintain order and defend the king.

A street demonstration by prominent citizens acclaimed Venizelos and a republic. There was some rioting and former Minister of Agriculture Sideris was wounded.

Caddy enough, it was the former American bishop of Idaho, now the Greek Lemnos, that started the revolution. In 1918 Greece bought the island and Lemnos. The bishop was named Lemnos, after the naval station against the Turks in 1912. The island was named the Lemnos after a famous battle against the Bulgarians.

The revolutionists announce that they will proclaim their choice of a ministry on their arrival in Athens.

Constantine twice occupied the throne of Greece. His first reign began March 18, 1913, with the assassination of his father, George I, and continued until June, 1917, when he was forced by the demands of Great Britain, France and Russia, to abdicate, because of his pro-German sympathies.

METHODIST REVIVAL ATTRACTS CONGREGATION AND GROWS IN INTEREST

The revival services now in progress at the Methodist church are growing in interest with each succeeding service. Already the people of Greenville are realizing that Dr. Patterson is a preacher of unusual ability.

The congregation comfortably filled the church last evening and after a one-half hour song service conducted by Mr. Notestine, the preacher announced as his text "Blessed are they that hunger and thirst after righteousness." He handled this text in a masterly way, and made a deep and lasting impression upon his hearers. Many were the expressions of appreciation heard from different members of the congregation after the service.

At the morning hour today the preacher continued his discourse began on yesterday, using as a text the second half of the first verse of the first chapter of Ephesians. This too, was a most helpful message. At the afternoon service the subject was prayer and its relation to revivals.

A highly appreciated feature of all services are the beautiful solos rendered by Mr. Notestine. A large chorus choir is being built up from service to service and all are cordially invited to assist in the singing.

HAS WATSON'S BODY SHIPPED IN PRIVATE CAR

Washington, Sept. 28.—Only the timely intervention of Mrs. Alice Lytle, managing editor of the Columbia Sentinel, prevented the body of Senator Watson from going to Thompson, Ga., in a baggage car, Mrs. Lytle insisted it should go in a private coach. She found the sergeant and had him to arrange for a pullman car.

Master of Messenger of Peace Will Try to Regain Cargo of Whiskey

Wilmington, Sept. 27.—Captain Arthur Coleman, a subject of Great Britain, who has just completed a six months jail sentence in the Craven county jail for alleged selling of whiskey, was here today.

Coleman is owner and master of the British schooner "Message of Peace" and his arrest in January was in connection with transportation of whiskey on the craft. He put in at Ocracoke Inlet last January with a \$50,000 cargo of whiskey from Nassau. He said a storm had damaged his vessel and that he put into Ocracoke for repairs and supplies. He claims that the cargo was consigned to St. Pierre, N. S., and that it was not his intention to land any of it in the United States.

Notwithstanding the captain's explanation prohibition enforcement officer took the boat and crew in charge, bringing them here. Coleman and members of his crew were indicted and the whiskey stored in the customs public here where it is now under guard night and day.

Captain Coleman was charged with conspiracy to violate the Volstead act with transportation of whiskey. He was acquitted on both, but was convicted of selling whiskey while at Ocracoke and was sentenced to six months, in jail by Federal Judge H. G. Connor.

Coleman completed this sentence Saturday and was released. Upon his arrival here he said that he thought he was through with the government. No warrant has been served.

The object of Coleman's visit to Wilmington was to confer with his attorneys in regard to regaining possession of his ship and the liquor cargo. Coleman intends to make a fight for the cargo and the craft. The government it is stated will endeavor to hold the whiskey.

FORTY KILLED IN FORTRESS NEAR ROME

Rome, Sept. 28.—It is estimated that forty persons were killed when the fortress Spezia was blown up by lightning. Two entire villages were razed by the explosion.

LARGEST DEVILFISH CAUGHT AT GULFPORT

Gulfport, Miss., Sept. 28.—The largest devil fish was caught in the Gulf of Mexico yesterday. The fish measured thirteen feet long and 18 feet across. It weighed about 2500 pounds.

FRUSTRATE ATTEMPT TO BLOW UP PROVISIONAL GOVERNMENT BUILDING

Dublin, Sept. 28.—A plot to blow up the provisional government building and to assassinate members of the cabinet was frustrated when a mine was found beneath the building. Two clerks were arrested immediately and will be held pending investigation.

REVOLUTIONARY TROOPS OCCUPY CITY OF ATHENS

Athens, Sept. 28.—Revolutionary troops occupied the city of Athens today. Government buildings are being seized and sailors are patrolling the streets. Crown Prince George has accepted the throne.

FORMER GREEK MINISTER ASSASSINATED AT ATHENS

London, Sept. 28.—A former minister of the Greek government was assassinated at Athens last night, according to advices received today.

NORFOLK-SOUTHERN LAND CONTROVERSY BROUGHT TO AN END

First Train to Operate Saturday Afternoon and the Second Sunday Morning

The Norfolk Southern railway today announced the restoration of trains Nos. 17 and 18, taken off several weeks ago as an emergency measure during the strike, and the first train will run Saturday afternoon. Train No. 17 operates between Washington and Raleigh, and passes through Greenville about 6:30 in the afternoon.

The first train will run from Raleigh to Washington Saturday afternoon, and the second Sunday morning from Washington to Raleigh. After that they will operate on regular schedule.

The taking off of these two trains worked a great hardship on the traveling public as this left only two trains from both directions very day and night. With the old trains back in service transportation will be conducted much more rapidly than recently and hundreds of passengers will be able to reach their destinations several hours earlier.

BUY A GOOD COW EVEN IF YOU HAVE TO SELL THE FORD

That's What Dr. Beasley of Fountain Advises to Those Seeking Health

(Auspice Chamber of Commerce.) Every family in Pitt county with children should have a milk cow to provide them with proper nourishment for their growing minds and bodies, even if they have to make a sacrifice in order to buy and keep a cow. Milk is the most essential food in a child's diet. Have your family drink more milk and eat less meat and you will have a smaller doctor's bill at the end of the year.

Don't get the idea that milk is only good for the children, for the grown-ups need it too.

If you want the proof of the value of milk, then take one of your children and give him a quart of milk a day with his meals, and feed another one of your children with your family diet without milk, and at the end of the 7th year see which child has been the healthier and which has developed more mentally and physically. I would like to see the citizens of Pitt county provide milk for their families buying a good milk cow, even if they have to sell the "FORD" to do it.

Heber Willoughby Fails to Recover Several Acres of Land Held by Wm. McArthur

One of the longest drawn out land controversies that has engaged attention of civil court during the present term was brought to an end shortly before the noon hour today when a jury failed to return a favorable decision in the case of Heber Willoughby against William McArthur, involving several acres of land situated in the Arthur section where both men reside.

The case was taken up for consideration shortly before the noon hour Tuesday and went to the jury after argument of attorneys had been completed during this morning. It was completed today marked the ending of the second lengthy battle which has featured this term of court.

The case was precipitated when McArthur purchased a piece of land from Willoughby while under twenty-one years of age. He was required to give bond at the time, but signed the deed after becoming of age. Willoughby, it seems, claimed that McArthur was not capable of making the purchase and requested him to transfer the property back to him.

McArthur declined to do so, contending that the transaction had been conducted in a perfectly legitimate way, whereupon Willoughby immediately filed notice of suit.

After completing the case officials began work on several other matters demanding attention, and it is probable the remainder of the week will see far greater progress. While few compromises and non-suits have figured in this term it is probable the next few days will see quite a few disposed of.

HAGENBECK CIRCUS WILL EXHIBIT HERE THURSDAY, OCT. 5

Great Show to Give Performance in Afternoon and One at Night

Do you know how the circus came about? If you don't, why we will tell you very briefly a little of its history. Thursday, October 5th, you will know Wallace circus arrives to exhibit here Saturday, October 6th, you will know a little of how it came about and see the vast improvements.

The word circus has come down to us from the Latin without changing, meaning circle and was used by the Romans to indicate the place in each city where chariot races, gladiatorial contests and feats of skill were held. In short, a circus in those days was an exhibition of skill and so it has come down to the present day. In the exhibition offered by the Hagenbeck-Wallace circus there is shown the skill of the animal trainers, the skill of the acrobats, the skill of the acrobat; nothing but a demonstration of the marvelous skill of famous performers and trainers in an offering of daring and bewildering feats, that even the Romans would be anxious to see, if the same exhibition had been given centuries ago.

So it is seen that the time-worn phrase, "Every circus is alike," is wrong, for as the years pass on improvements follow improvements and this year the Hagenbeck-Wallace circus promises to give a performance to excel all previous efforts.

WHITE WAY LIGHTS ARE INSTALLED ON DICKERSON AVENUE

Six Lights Placed Between Five Points and West of the White Row of Buildings

SPLENDID PICTURE TO BE SHOWN HERE TUESDAY EVENING

"Forever" Featuring Wallace Reid and Elsie Ferguson to be Shown at Theatre

A delicate touch of symbolism appears in the picture "Forever," Paramount's screen version of George Du Maurier's famous novel "Peter Ibbetson," in which Elsie Ferguson and Wallace Reid are co-stars.

The symbolism of "Forever" which comes to White's theatre next Tuesday, enters the picture in a manner frequently used in literature, but seldom in a motion picture production. The scenic atmosphere of the picture was made to correspond with the lives of the characters and their moods.

Another change. Gogo has become Peter Ibbetson and has begun to taste the bitterness of life. Mimi is no longer the wide-eyed child, but a grown woman, in society as Mary, Duchess of Towers. The plant life of the Pasquier garden mirrors the transition. Frost has touched the apple tree and the roses.

Tragedy Enters Two Lives.

Another and the last change in the lives of Gogo and Mimi and in the garden. Tragedy has come into the story. Peter has slain his blackguard uncle. The life of Mimi with her duke is a thing of horror. The garden is bare now. The trees and bushes are naked; the grass dead. Snow flurries come and the trees rock in a cold wind. It was necessary to replace all of the growing things for each change of season.

TWO DESTROYER DIVISIONS GO TO CONSTANTINOPLE

American Warships Sent to Turkish Waters to Protect American Interests

(By International News.) Washington, Sept. 27.—Secretary Denby today ordered two destroyer divisions, comprising twelve destroyers, to proceed "as early as possible" from Norfolk to Constantinople with extra supply of provisions, in response to a request from Rear Admiral Mark Bristol, American high commissioner at Constantinople, that they be sent "for the protection of American interests."

In addition the supply ship "Bridge" will proceed as soon as possible to Constantinople. "The purpose of sending these ships is to protect American interests," it was declared, and furnish supplies should they be needed. The method of distribution, and in general the use to be made of the supplies so furnished, will be determined by Admiral Bristol.

Orders Received.

Norfolk, Va., Sept. 27.—Orders for the movement of the two destroyer divisions were received at the office of Admiral Rodman, commandant of the fifth naval district, this afternoon. As soon as the Atlantic fleet, with which are 38 destroyers in battle practice off the Virginia Capes, report at the naval base probably tonight, it was stated, 12 of the destroyers most fit for early departure will be selected by Admiral McDonald, to sail for Constantinople. The supply ship "Bridge" also is with Admiral McDonald's fleet.

STATE'S VETERANS RE-ELECT OFFICERS AT ASHEVILLE, N. C.

Adopt Resolution Censuring Railroads for Withdrawing Low Rate

Asheville, Sept. 27.—All officers were re-elected by the North Carolina Division, United Confederate Veterans, at a business session held in connection with the reunion here today. The officers follow. General William A. Smith of Asheville, Commander; General A. H. Boyden, Salisbury, Commander First Brigade; General P. G. Alton, Louisville, Commander Second Brigade; General George H. Hall, Red Springs, Commander Third Brigade and General James M. Ray Asheville, Commander Fourth Brigade.

Resolutions, in addition to one of thanks to Asheville included a measure urging that the original route of the proposed Lee Highway be adhered to; that the North Carolina State Highway Commission designate the State link of the Jefferson Davis Highway; that the railroads of the State be censured for refusing to grant the customary rate of one cent per mile to such reunions; and a resolution of regret at the death of James I. Metts former Commander in Chief of the Veterans.

A ball tonight opened by General Julian S. Carr Commander-in-Chief of the United Confederate Veterans, leading on the grand march, was participated in by many of the veterans, sons of veterans, maid, sponsors, members of the U. D. C. and Confederate Memorial Association. The parade tomorrow morning, in which all veterans will ride, will mark the close of the convention which has been attended by approximately 550 veterans, a striking contrast to the crowd of 3,000 which came here 18 years ago for their reunion.

GREEK REVOLUTION CONTINUES SERIOUS IN EVERY SECTION

Only Comforting Aspect Is No Collision Between the British and Turks

KEMALISTS CONFRONT BRITISH AND REFUSE TO YIELD TERRITORY

Turks Even Decline to Recognize the Existence of Neutral Territory

London, Sept. 27.—A Greek revolution has been added to the ever deepening Near East difficulty and the Allies are now faced with a more complex situation than ever. An impromptu cabinet meeting tonight found the Ministers in a very pessimistic mood. The only comforting aspect of the critical position was that no collision has yet occurred between the British and Turks in the Chanak zone.

In other respects the situation contains every element of danger. The Kemalists, who are on both flanks of the British line at Chanak, apparently refuse to budge and even decline to recognize the existence of a neutral zone.

After the cabinet council tonight the proposed peace conference was described as "not on the horizon at present." Yet until the conference materializes every one here realizes that the danger is extremely grave. Both British and Turks are hastening the concentration of their forces and the British public is apprehensive that any movement might bring about an unfortunate incident setting the opposing forces in action.

The people are anxiously asking how the disappearance of King Constantine and the new situation in Greece will affect the question of Greek evacuation of Eastern Thrace required by the Allies and insisted upon by Kemal Pasha as a preliminary to any peace conference. From the confused and conflicting accounts reaching here from Athens, this is a matter of extreme uncertainty.

The revolution seems to have taken two different lines, one demanding the defense of Thrace the other asking for the formation of a pro-Bentente government. It is also reported that General Popoulas, the new military governor of Thrace has gone to the revolutionist headquarters in the Laurium region to consult with the leaders of the coup.

It is stated that Greece has 80,000 troops in Thrace ready to fight the Turks and in the event of a revolutionary government coming into power with a determination to defend the provinces, the question arises who will undertake to enforce Greek evacuation to satisfy Kemal demands.

GEORGIA NEGRO LYNCHED TODAY

Sanderville, Ga., Sept. 28.—Jim Johnson, negro, was lynched here yesterday following assault upon a white woman. A mob composed of fifty men took the darkey from officers, who were carrying him to Wrightsville for trial and hanged him to a bridge.

HUNDRED ATTEND FUNERAL OF SENATOR TOM WATSON

Thompson, Ga., Sept. 28.—Hickory Hill, the home of Senator Watson, was a mecca to hosts of admirers arriving from every section of the country to attend the funeral at two o'clock this afternoon. They arrived by train, by automobile and every form of conveyance possible.

SCHOOL CHILDREN AT BIRMINGHAM POISONED

Birmingham, Sept. 28.—Reports from public school officials this morning show that scores of school children poisoned yesterday from eating school luncheon are in bad condition. The food could not be analyzed because it was all eaten up.

Henry Ford forgot to pay income tax on two million dollars he had deposited in a Canada bank. He is not the only one suffering from the same kind of forgetfulness, according to advices from Uncle Sam.

The American Legion in Pitt county is making arrangements for the celebration of armistice day November 11th. Nothing they can do will make preparations too elaborate. Armistice day should be appropriately observed by every organization and all people of the world. It has a significant we will be long in forgetting, and should be more extensively observed with each succeeding year.

The fact that the loading of freight cars is on an increase in this country indicates that the roads are gradually recovering from the strike. This is one of the best indications of the fact, except the restoration of regular passenger train service, and it won't be long before we hear of that. With more freight cars available it seems the coal gouger would have to look to some other way to justify high prices. They claimed the scarcity of cars made it impossible to supply coal at old prices, so we are wondering what they will do now conditions have improved.

The dairy campaign now being promoted by the chamber of commerce deserves to be the greatest kind of success, and enterprising citizens in all parts of the county should do what they can to make it so. There is nothing that would prove of greater value to Pitt county than dairying, and the sooner it is given a trial the better off our people will be. There are hundreds of children gradually starving to death as result of insufficient nourishment, such as milk affords. If there were more cows and more interest in dairies this condition would be removed and our men and women would be much healthier. The chamber of commerce has decided upon a plan that should be well received by everyone. It is something vitally affecting the welfare and happiness of people in all walks of life and should receive the attention it deserves. A cow on every farm and more extensive use of milk in towns and cities would be salvation for our people.

Limley M. Garrison former secretary of war, predicts a scrapping of the two dominant political parties in this country as result of their failure to find an issue upon which they can differ. If this is sufficient cause for the breaking up of two of our oldest parties, then it is a wonder they did not voluntarily blow up long ago. There is as much chance to find something to differ over as ever, and if party leaders are looking for it they can certainly find it. There isn't the slightest chance of Democrats and Republicans existing without finding something to wrangle about. They have never failed to find it in past years and it isn't likely the future will be so devoid of material. Mr. Garrison must be talking simply to hear himself talk, as the old saying goes. He can't possibly be serious.

It isn't so long now before fair time will be with us, and it is up to our people to get busy and have their exhibits in readiness. The attraction this year must be bigger and better than ever, and to make it so it will be necessary for everyone to co-operate in whatever way they can. The fair management can provide attractions of a certain kind, but it is up to the people to provide those things of local color and interest. Pitt county raises and produces many things in which the outside world will be interested, and the fair is the best place in the world to show them. Exhibits of every kind were better last year, and as everything is supposed to grow and develop with age it is natural to suppose it will be still greater this year. This is possible only in one way. And that is for the public to resolve to make it so. Every organization and institution should make it a point to provide an exhibit of some kind, as in this way every department of the fair will contain something of greater interest than ever before. Let's make the Pitt county fair truly expressive of Pitt county people. If this is done, then we will have the best attraction in this part of the state.

The state child welfare commission has just completed a survey of conditions in Greenville, and the future should see a great improvement in the enforcement of this legislation. Business houses and manufacturers have assured the commission of their hearty and loyal support after being enlightened as to what law they are expected to observe and the future is very bright indeed. These laws cover other things besides employment of children and of properly enforced conditions here should be much better. The local superintendent of public welfare is doing everything possible to reduce violations and information gained through the survey will enable him to work more intelligently than formerly. Nothing can be accomplished, however, if the public fails to co-operate, and it is hoped those interested will do everything in their power to assure success.

Other tobacco markets have been raising a howl over averages made the past week, and yet they haven't been able to equal Greenville's record. The local market has made a remarkable record this season and farmers from surrounding communities have not failed to take advantage of it. Our warehousemen have been making an effort to give their patrons the best to be had in the way of service and prices and how well they have

succeeded is reflected in a comparison of prices made here and on other markets. Figures talk as nothing else can do and the farmer who is in doubt as to the best market has nothing to do but compare figures. They will tell the story.

President Harding says if the railroads will furnish more cars that the shortage of coal will be greatly relieved. If this means that profiteering will be reduced then everyone will hope the cars will be supplied by the thousands. The end of the rail strike means that more cars will be available within the next several days, but if all of them are sent to the coal mines the public will derive little benefit unless prices are held down to normal. The president should give this important matter some attention also. Ugly as he does the winter will be one of the most serious the country has known in years.

MILK COWS, PASTURES AND FENCES

By C. R. Hudson, Auspices W. B. Pace, County Agent

This trio, according to agricultural extension workers, is to be one of the important factors in off setting the efforts of the boll weevil in cotton territory in the state. Their slogan is, "A Cow for Every Farm, A Pasture for Every Cow, A Fence for Every Pasture."

It is said, that in the cotton counties of the state, there is only one cow to every fifteen people, or one to every three families, consisting on the average of two grown people and three children. Figuring the matter up we find that this allows only about one half pint of milk per day for each. Physicians and dieticians tell us that each growing child should have as much as one quart of milk per day. From this we realize that there is a great scarcity of milk in the Coastal Section of the state. There seems to be only one way to remedy the matter and that is to get more cows, and better cows. Before this occurs, however, there must be pastures to support the cows, otherwise they will be too expensive and would soon be abandoned. No kind of farm animal, as a matter of fact, can be profitably maintained without pasture grasses and legumes. By proper management grazing may be had almost the year around.

Milk and butter play a most important part in the nutrition of the human body. When produced on the farm with pastures, they are not expensive. Milk is one of the most complete food rations known. A pint of milk is equal in protein to two eggs, to three ounces of steak, or to one fourth pound of fowl meat. In energy to four eggs, 7 ounces of steak, or 7 ounces of fowl meat.

"Board of Censors" Idea Losing Ground

Washington, Sept.—A New York magistrate dismissed a case worked up against a New York publisher by a society devoted to trying to make other people's morals conform to the society's standard. The society's agents haled the publisher into court, along with several of his books, on a charge of publishing obscene literature. The magistrate read the books, threw the case out of court, commended the books as contributions to literature and knowledge, and scorned the agents for the self-constituted moral censorship, and ended by insisting on the reality of the principle of the right of free speech when such free speech is within the laws of the land.

The New York stage has just formulated a plan by which the evils of police censorship over plays is eliminated, while permitting judgment as to what is and what is not objectionable to the public, by the public. According to this plan any person objecting to any part of any play on moral grounds may state his or her case to John M. Gilchrist, commissioner of licenses, and cause the appointment of a jury of twelve nontheatrical men and women to pass upon the show.

The jury panel will include 300 names of persons not interested in the theatre or in "reform."

In event of a complaint, a jury of twelve is to be dispatched to see the production. A vote of nine to three is required to "carry" a verdict. But even an adverse verdict will not be final, for the producers and author of the offending play will then be invited to reform the production where-in it is found to be offensive.

Capital City Seeks Pedestrian Safety

Washington, Sept.—The police authorities in the Capital City are using to the full powers given them to approve or deny operators' license cards to applicants. During the month just passed twenty per cent of those who applied were refused permission to drive a car. Five hundred and sixty people who thought they could operate an automobile were undeceived by the police, who demanded a practical demonstration of driving ability as well as knowledge of police regulations.

With automobile accidents increasing daily because of congested traffic conditions and large numbers of cars, both business and pleasure, police departments in other cities are watching with much interest the drastic rules enforced in the Nation's Capital. Until recently in most municipalities the "examination" consisted of an oral statement of a few elementary rules of the road and an ability to say which end of the automobile was the front in Washington the applicant for a license car is now required to drive his car in downtown traffic, with an experienced police driver by his side, and thus, to demonstrate his or her ability to handle a ton or more of moving steel with safety to himself and pedestrians. Many who apply have had but a few "lessons" in automobile driving and while they know perfectly well how to start, stop, and steer a car, are unable to utilize that knowledge quickly and effectively when confronted with a crowded street and a heavy jam of other vehicles.
