PUBLICITY DRIVE FOR COUNTY FAIR NOW IN PROGRESS

First Advertising Matter Appeared on Streets of the City During Week

**SPLENDID FEATURES
TO BE SEEN AT FAIR
HERE THIS SEASON**

Live Stock and Farm Departments to be Superior to Any thing in the Section

First advertising matter of the Pitt county fair appeared on the streets here this week in the form of a placard containing a large red horse-shoe with the date, November 7, 8, 9 and 10 printed in the center. These cards will be placed on as many automobiles as possible and will do their part towards attracting the largest crowd in history of the fair.

W. H. Dail, Jr., is in charge of the advertising campaign this year, and says that every effort will be made to attract people from as many counties as possible. Every department will be larger this year than ever, Mr. Dail stated, and there will be thousands of things to attract people from all walks of life.

While the many free attractions to be seen at the fair this year have not yet been announced, Mr. Dail stated there would be plenty of them, and that spectators would be well entertained every minute of the day. Races will also be superior to anything ever seen here before, and it is likely a greater number of horses will be seen in action. It is assured some of the fastest horses of the country will be here. Mr. Dail himself is owner of several horses of considerable prominence and the fact that they have carried off honors on other tracks should cause them to be to greater interest here.

From the standpoint of live stock and farm exhibits, it is believed the fair this year will outclass any other in this section of the state. The management has already been assured the hearty co-operation, those in position to furnish these kind of attractions, and when the gates are thrown open to the public every department will be complete in every sense of the word.

The largest crowd ever attending an attraction here is expected this year, Mr. Dail stated, and it will be necessary for Greenville people to throw open their homes if the enormous crowds are accommodated.

THOMAS W. LAWSON SUDDENLY DISAPPEARS

Boston, Oct. 4.—The whereabouts of Thomas W. Lawson, financier, who has had to put his South Shore estate, "Dreamworld," on the auction block to make up for stock market losses, were still a mystery tonight. Relatives, business associates and friends were without word from him since he left the home of his sister, Mrs. Mary Lawson at Southwest Harbor, Maine, yesterday.

It appeared to be fairly well agreed among those interested tonight that upset over the loss of the home-estate, which he built and furnished at a cost of about three and one-half millions, and in which he brought up his family, now scattered by death and marriage, he had decided to go somewhere for a change of scene. The home of his daughter, Mrs. Henry McCall, at Princeville, Oregon, was considered the most likely place.

NEW YORK AUTOMOBILE IN CITY YESTERDAY

One of the best looking automobiles ever seen in Greenville appeared on streets last yesterday afternoon. It bore a New York City license tag number 1,030,443 and had evidently been driven all the way from the nation's metropolis to Greenville. The name of the machine could not be caught as it passed, but it was a beauty both from the standpoint of style and construction and probably represented a substantial financial investment.

ASKS DETECTIVE TO HELP TO SOLVE MOTHER'S DEATH

Charlotte Mills Appeals to Man Who Cleared up Brunan Case

New Brunswick, N. Y., Oct. 4.—A pathetic appeal from fifteen-year-old Charlotte Mills for further assistance in clearing up the mystery surrounding the murder of her mother has been sent to Burlington county by Detective Ellis Parker.

The body of the girl's mother, Mrs. James Mills, beautiful choir leader, of the Protestant Episcopal church of St. John the Evangelist, was found lying alongside that of the church rector Rev. Edward Wheeler Hall, on a lonely farm two miles from this city on September 16th.

Parker attracted considerable public notice by his skillful work in clearing up the murder of "Honest John" Brunan, a circus owner, who was killed under mysterious circumstances at his home in Mount Holly.

In her letter to the detective, the girl wrote: "My Dear Mr. Parker: I am appealing to you to come to New Brunswick to arrest those responsible for the murder of my mother. More than two weeks have elapsed since the crime was discovered, yet nothing has been done to apprehend the guilty person or persons. I know that you will lose no time in clearing up the mystery surrounding the cruel slaying of my dear mother. Therefore, I am appealing to you to come to New Brunswick at once."

Charlotte had previously appealed to Governor Edwards of New Jersey and his petition resulted in an order to the New Jersey state police to participate more actively.

EXPECT NEW ARRESTS IN "KIDNAPPING" CASE

Taylorville, Oct. 4.—J. C. Gold, of Tillery, N. C., who states he is an executive of the Ku Klux Klan, returned to Taylorville today from Alleghany county, where he has been investigating the hold-up here alleged to have been instigated by S. L. Jenkins, who was in company with Margaret Smith on the night of September 14th.

Warrants have been issued, Mr. Gold said, for the arrest of five men against whom he declared there is sufficient evidence to justify their detention. He added that they will be brought to Alexander county for preliminary trial on charges of highway robbery, criminal assault and probably other charges. S. L. Jenkins, Winston-Salem merchant who was sentenced last week to two years on the Guilford county roads, also will be brought here for trial, he declared.

TIMELY SERMON FEATURES SERIES REVIVAL SERVICES

Dr. Patterson Delivered Stirring Discourse Last Night at Methodist Church

The revival services in the Jarvis Memorial Methodist church, which have been in progress for the past ten days are growing in interest with each service and Dr. Patterson is delivering some of the strongest sermons ever heard in Greenville.

On yesterday he preached three splendid sermons. At the 9:30 o'clock service he delivered an interesting sermon on the book of Ephesians. In the afternoon he spoke of China. These lectures are very interesting and show in a wonderful manner just what the missionaries are accomplishing in that great heathen country of 400,000,000 people.

Last night a large crowd greeted Mr. Patterson and heard one of the strongest sermons of the series on the text, "For Whosoever a Man Sows, that Shall He also Reap," Galatians 6-7.

Mr. Patterson developed his entire sermon from tragedies which have come under his observation. Those terrible tragedies caused by loose living of people of his own acquaintance. Some of which he had been called upon to share with those who suffered.

On the roads of sin and destruction which lead from the narrow way which leads to Heaven were beware and danger signals. The signs were labeled as follows: First, beware of the first sin. No man is ever a drunkard without his first drink; no man is ever a gambler without his first game at throwing dice, etc.

Second, beware of living beyond your means. Mr. Patterson at this point related story after story showing how easy it is in this fast age for men and women to live beyond their means, and how in the end misery and suffering are the results. He appealed to his audience to pay their just and honest debts and check the tendency to live beyond their means. A tendency which is so common today.

The third sign was that of beware of the example you set. Some one is always watching what the other man does. No one should do those things which are of a questionable nature. Live above reproach and set the best example possible for your fellowman. Mr. Patterson related several interesting stories in this connection to develop his points.

The fourth and last danger sign was beware of loose social standards. This was also developed by relating instances of people being careless and drifting into those things which degrade and pull down.

Services each morning, afternoon and evening during this week. The meeting will come to a close on Sunday evening. The singing was an attractive feature of yesterday's services.

The chief speaker for the occasion will be Mr. Duane, of Philadelphia, president of the Sons of the Signers of the Declaration of Independence, and prayer will be offered by the Rev. G. W. Dame, D. D., chaplain-general of that organization.

HAGENBECK CIRCUS TO EXHIBIT HERE TWO TIMES TODAY

Long Train Passed Into Norfolk & Southern Yards This Morning Before Day Break

**MAMMOTH PARADE
WILL BE ONE OF THE
GREAT FEATURES**

Pageant to Move Over Principal Streets of City Beginning Promptly at 10:30 O'clock

Hundreds of expectant people from in and around Greenville gathered along the tracks of the Norfolk Southern railroad this morning at an early hour to witness the arrival of the Hagenbeck Wallace circus which is to exhibit here this afternoon and tonight. It is probable that many alarm clocks failed to go off in time to awake the sightseers as early as they desired, but they got there and to say they saw the things their work tired eyes had craved for many a day would be expressing it mildly.

The long circus train moved into the yards shortly before day break, and in an incredibly short time an innumerable number of horses were hitched to the large show wagons and began pulling them toward Higg's field, on Dickinson avenue, where the circus located the mammoth tents. Cars were unloaded remarkably fast and with amazing skill, and before the spectators actually realized what had happened the work of unloading had been completed and the last of the wagons was pulled off in direction of the show grounds.

One of the principal features of the circus will be the mammoth parade to take place promptly at ten-thirty o'clock. The line of parade was decided upon during the week, and embraces practically all principal business thoroughfares of the city. The pageant will move off from show grounds, pass down Dickinson avenue to Ninth street, thence down Ninth street to Evans street, down Evans to Five Points, from Five Points down Fifth to Cotanch street, up Cotanch to Third street from Third to Evans, down Evans to Five Points, then out Dickinson avenue to the show grounds.

After the parade is completed the show people will prepare for the big show which begins at two o'clock and continues until late in the afternoon. The circus is said to be the best on the road, and judging by appearance of the paraphernalia as it was moved from the cars early this morning this will be the verdict of Greenville people after today.

Among the many circus celebrities with the show this season, is the Davenport Troupe of equestriennes, John Helliott, in a series of groups of wild animal acts, the Wallace troupe of high school performing horses, among whom are Porter, the world's highest jumping horse, and Maid of the Mist, a riderless horse who jumps for the fun of it. Mesdames Alma Wood and Marion Drew presenting a herd of trained elephants the Stokes and Brock troupe of acrobats the two flexible Nicholasons, the carrying equestrian acts by Lowande and Ryan, and the Riding Crandalls, sixty Japanese jugglers, and a Chinese troupe of acrobats.

FOREST FIRES SPREAD RAPIDLY IN MINNESOTA

Northern Section of State Covered by Smoke Screen, According to Report

Duluth, Minn., Oct. 4.—Northern Minnesota's forest area today contained a veritable sea of sombre colored smoke dotted with fires, some under control, some admittedly beyond control and the whole threatening further wide-spread destruction at the slightest provocation of the elements.

In St. Louis county alone there were one hundred and five fires burning, according to the latest report from Adjutant General Walter F. Rhoton, who personally is co-operating with the forestry department in the fire zone.

A call for help was sent out late last night from Vineland, after Onamia, where it was declared the fire was out of control one settler's home burned and the entire town endangered. Additional fire fighters were asked for immediately.

Another call for help came from Kelsey, where it was said the fire was threatening a \$20,000 school building. Women and children have been removed from all of the threatened area to places of safety and personal belongings were being either taken out or made ready for instant evacuation.

REFUGEES NOT PERMITTED TO LEAVE SMYRNA

Smyrna, Oct. 4.—Embarkation of the Greek and Armenian refugees from Smyrna has been stopped by the Turks, the time limit set by Mustafa Kemal Pasha having expired. Approximately 300,000 persons have been evacuated and those remaining will be deported to the interior, whether men, women or children.

The Turkish military began a house to house search for those liable to deportation. The Belgian consul asked the authorities to grant exemptions for a handful of Greeks whom he regarded as indispensable, particularly employees of the city water works who remained at their posts throughout the crisis at his request and who are now unable to depart.

A similar request was made by the American relief committee on behalf of the Greeks who have been employed in their refugee bakeries but the reply of the local authorities in each case was: "No exceptions can be made."

GREENVILLE HIGHS IN FINE TRIM FOR GAME HERE FRIDAY

ROCKY MOUNT WOMAN ENDS LIFE WITH GUN

Rocky Mount, Oct. 4.—Miss Lottie Sumner, age 32, daughter of Police Sergeant L. E. Sumner, died at her father's home this afternoon as the result of a self-inflicted bullet wound in the head this morning. The prostrate body was found by a child of one of the neighbors who happened to enter the house and neighbors entering the home found the pistol nearby with one chamber fired, though the shot was not heard by any, according to reports.

It is believed that it must have been fired shortly after 10 o'clock judging from the fact that neighbors had conversed with her and seen her about her daily tasks about the home before that hour.

Miss Sumner several weeks ago was accidentally gassed when about the kitchen range and it is known that the incident preyed upon her mind and its mention by friends was a matter of irritation to her. This is the only fact known to friends which they believe might have prompted the rash act. Miss Sumner is survived by her father five brothers, Herbert, Alfred, William and Ben Sumner, of this city and L. E. Sumner, Jr., of Fayetteville, and two sisters, Miss Rachel Sumner, of this city and Mrs. Mary Coley, of Nash county.

prevent them from increasing their

about all there is to everything.

The national chairman of the Re-

sees to be so happy about we haven't
able to find out. It must be that he
is trying to put up a bold front when
he doesn't feel that way. Anyhow,
the future isn't as rosy as he would
have the public believe and no one
knows it better than leaders of the
party.

of Father's Day should be as exten-
sive as those for Mother's Day. Each
occasion should be of more than ordi-
nary significance to everyone.

are all indebted to, and it is the duty

One hundred Democratic orators

The Irish provisional government
has issued a proclamation granting
amnesty to members of the Irregulars
who will surrender before the 15th
of this month. This measure is ex-
pected to reduce the number of re-
bels to no little extent and may
eventually result in the downfall of
the rebel army. This would be one
of the greatest blessings possible at
this time. What it means to the coun-
try will be brought out in an inter-
esting way in the near future.

The New York Americans and Na-
tionals have again appeared in the
limelight by winning the championship
in their respective leagues. It is
something unusual for two teams
from the same town to perform the
same feat two years in succession.
That they have a right to be proud
of their success goes without saying,
and the rest of the world doesn't
blame them for crowing about the
record.

Seventy-four railroads of the coun-
ty have signed an agreement to re-
turn to work and it shouldn't be so
long now before every line is operat-
ing about seventy per cent normal.
The Atlantic Coast Line, of course is
an exception. This company was
able to maintain service about 95
percent normal throughout the entire
strike, and if they were able to do
that when conditions were so bad, it
is certain they should give 100 per-
cent service in the next few weeks.
Demoralized transportation worked
great hardship in every branch of in-
dustry, but recovery will be possible
much earlier than thought if every-
one gets down to work and endeavors
to make a showing they will have
cause to be proud of. This much, at
least, is demanded of them and it is
hoped they won't be slow in recogniz-
ing the duty.

The Democratic handbook recent-
ly mailed out to Democrats in all parts
of the country didn't fail to portray
virtues of the party in an interesting
way. In fact, the book goes into
party achievements in a way that
won't appeal to members of the Re-
publican party. The book contains
over two hundred pages and each
page fairly bristles with opposition.
That the opposing party will feel the
weight of this kind of opposition goes
without saying, and while they may
not feel it until election day they
can rest assured they will get plenty
of it then.

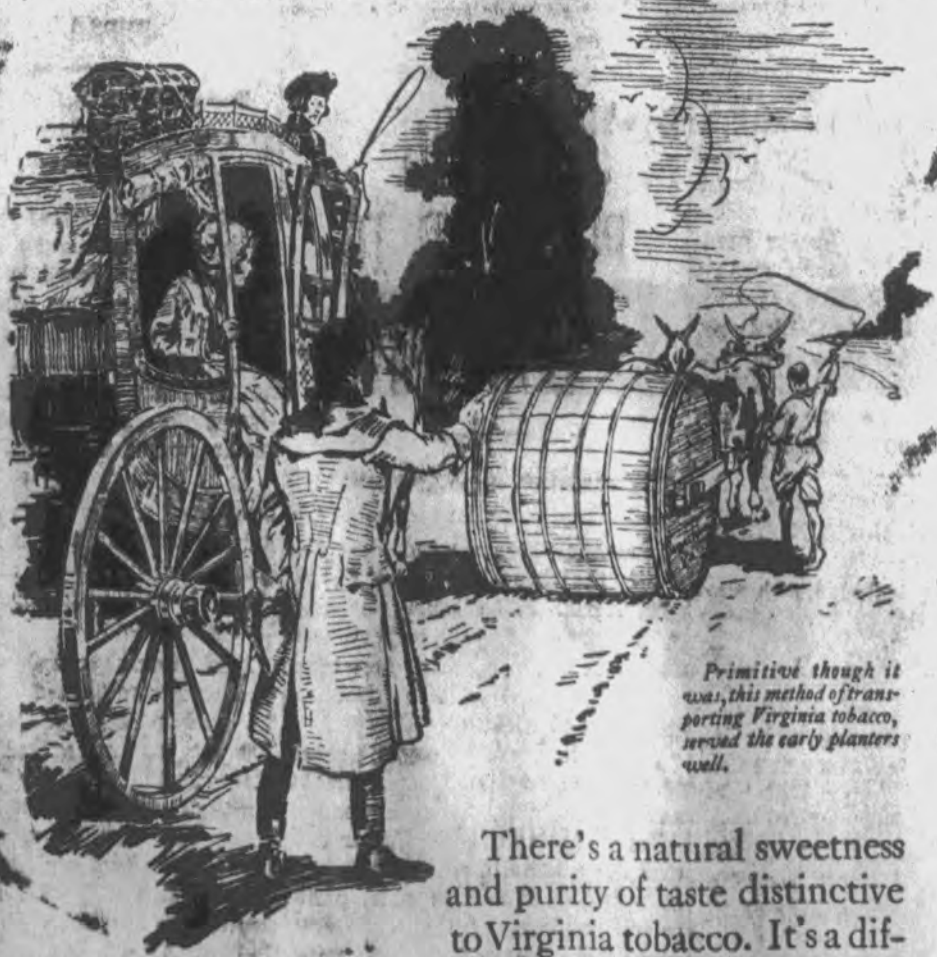

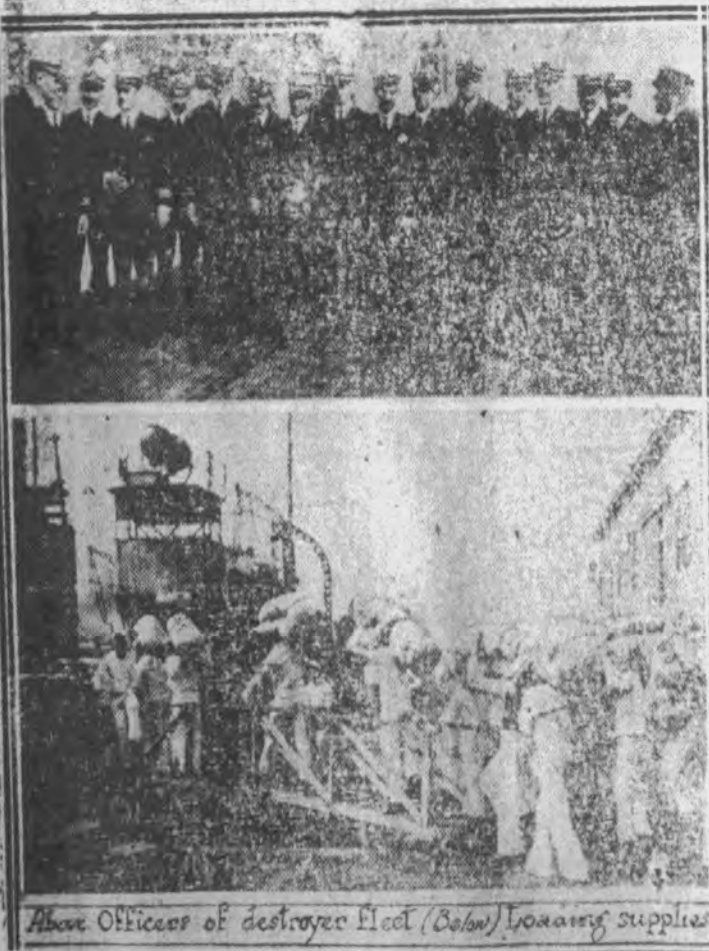

CHILDREN PREDOMINATE IN FRENCH CRIME WAVE; GUILLOTINE NOT FEARED

International News Service Staff Correspondent.

Paris, Oct. 3.—Dark prisons, which date from centuries past; bleak colonial coasts, where all work and no play makes Jacques a living skeleton; even the gleaming blade of the hideous guillotine itself—thought of none of these is deterrent enough to stem the crime wave that is sweeping over France in general and Paris in particular.

Official figures now confirm the intensity with which the city of Paris is being infected with the crime germ and reveal the alarming fact that an astounding proportion of the increase of crime is among the youth.

These figures, taken from a report by Emile Maszard, Municipal Councillor, are quoted by the Paris-Midi.

"The sad end of Meclias Charrier—who killed a man in the course of robbing an express train and exploded his crime under the guillotine—hasn't halted for one minute those who walk in his footsteps, or even those who g hion on better," is the comment made.

"In one year the total number of arrests for all crimes has exceeded in Paris alone, the astounding figure of 40,000!

"But the most disquieting thing of all is the recrudescence of juvenile crime.

"Four hundred culprits were less than fifteen years old; thirteen hundred were from fifteen to seventeen and 3,200 had not yet attained the age of twenty!

"And that is only the boys. More than 1,150 young girls appeared before the courts. One hundred of these were less than fifteen years old; 350 were between fifteen and eighteen years old."

INCOME TAX IS SCOURGE TO THE ENGLISH PEOPLE

London, Oct. 2.—British citizens
are just undergoing their annual tor-
ture—that of the income tax offi-
cials.

Compared with it the Star Cham-
ber and the Spanish Inquisition were
institutions of mercy. They merely
tortured physically. The British in-
come tax leaves the citizen prac-
tically without a cent and entirely with-
out self-respect.

For the average person in Britain
the income tax is five shillings in the
pound—25 per cent of income. For
the wealthy, when combined with
what is known as "supertax," it may
amount to as much as 80 per cent of
income.

Puzzling Statistics.

To begin with, the average com-
mon or garden taxpayer has to fill in
forms relating to his income. In con-
sidering statistical details they would
puzzle any well-informed accountant.
With these he does his best. And
then the person known as the "in-
come tax surveyor" begins to dis-
pute.

He begins by assuming that the
innocent taxpayer is attempting to
defraud the Treasury. He demands
more and further information and
threatens the direst penalties of the
law.

The taxpayer makes further re-
turns, but meets with the same fate.
He is told that his return is incorrect
but that the income tax commis-
sioners have assessed him at a cer-
tain figure. That figure is usually just
three times the amount of the citizen's
return.

And the powers of these income
tax people are entirely arbitrary. If
the amount they demand is not paid
to the minute they can do practically
what they please. If they wish they
can just descend on the taxpayers'
home—without notice—and seize and
sell all his furniture without more
to do.

FINE OPENING BY CO-OPERATIVES

Much Enthusiasm Over First
Deliveries in the Old Cotton
Belt

Danville, Va., Oct. 5.—Co-opera-
tive marketing swept across the old
cotton belt with enthusiasm and success to-
day when well over two million
pounds of tobacco were delivered by
members of the Tobacco Growers' Co-
operative Association to 33 delivery
points in Virginia and North Caro-
lina. On 24 of the association mar-
kets the entire deliveries from 34
grades were sold to leading manu-
facturers before the first day of co-
operative marketing had ended in
Virginia and Western Carolina.

No previous opening of the big
co-operative has brought out the en-
thusiasm and loyalty of thousands of
members over both the grading and
their first cash advances as today's
opening of the old belt.

Deliveries at the two association
warehouses in Danville approximated
200,000 pounds. South Boston re-
ceived well over 100,000 pounds from
the organized growers of Halifax
county, Chase City, 75,000; Ken-
nesaw, 40,000; Drake Branch, 60,
000; Chatham, 50,000 and unexpec-
tably large deliveries at all Virginia
ports reporting.

The old belt of North Carolina also
saw expectations at Madison with
10,000 pounds reported on the floors
of 11 wagons were waiting at sun-down
to unload tobacco. Elkin reported
deliveries of 200,000 pounds. Greens-
boro, 100,000; Pilot Mountain, 80,
000; Stateville 75,000; Walnut Cove,
75,000, and Mt. Airy, 60,000. At
South Boston and Danville scores of
new members joined the marketing
association and several hundred new
marketing contracts were signed in
the two States.

"The best tobacco since 1915,"
was Mr. Patterson's comment on the
first deliveries to the association on
the Virginia markets.

"I've often received lower prices
for better tobacco," was a frequent
expression of the growers on the co-
operative floors today when refer-
ring to the first cash advance which
they received with their participa-
tion receipts. Local banks through-
out Virginia and North Carolina are
loaning money today upon the secu-
rity of these participation receipts in
addition to the first cash advance.
